Gregory Lynn “Greg” Reinhardt, of Chino, a devoted husband, father, grandfather, brother, friend, and proud Marine, passed away on July 10, 2026. He was born in Pomona, California, on March 16, 1964, to George and Virginia Reinhardt. He grew up in Chino, where he attended Newman Elementary School and Ramona Junior High School and was a member of the Don Antonio Lugo High School Class of 1982. Greg proudly served his country in the United States Marine Corps from 1982 to 1985. He remained a proud veteran throughout his life and firmly believed, “Once a Marine, always a Marine!”

Greg lived in Bullhead City, Arizona area for many years. He worked in security and surveillance for the casino industry in Laughlin and Las Vegas, Nevada, for more than 20 years. After returning to California in 2010, Greg worked as a field technician for Enviro-Chem Inc., an environmental laboratory.

Greg had many interests and hobbies. He was restoring a 1904 Ford and loved “boonie stomping” in the desert. Most recently, he created the podcast *Man Cave Archives*, where he shared stories about the legends, superstitions, and lost treasures of the Southwest. Greg also enjoyed traveling and frequently visited Disneyland with his wife as a season passholder. Trips there with his children and grandchildren were especially meaningful to him.

Greg is survived by his wife, Michelle, of Chino, California; his son Anthony and daughter-in-law Candice, of Marana, Arizona; his son Westley, of Oro Valley, Arizona; and his stepson, Tristan Torres, of Costa Mesa, California. He is also survived by his five grandchildren, Delaney, Kennedy, Adalyn, Landon, and Easton; his sisters, Patty Pierson of Needles, California, and Mila Ornelas of Rialto, California; his brother, Chris Reinhardt of Moreno Valley, California; and many dear friends.
