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Bexley eyes antisemitism resolution

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The Bexley City Council was expected to pass a resolution Jan. 10, condemning all forms of antisemitism in a move that council president Troy Markham said is meant to make clear where city leaders stand as “silence is complicity.”

The resolution, No. 12-22, crafted by Markham and council member Jen Robinson, reads, “Our city unequivocally condemns the recent rise in antisemitic violence and harassment targeting Jewish Americans, and stands in solidarity with those affected by antisemitism.
