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Columbus veteran recalls his time on first class ship

Whenever out in public, Walter Niedbalski, 78, of Columbus, wears a blue hat with the words “USS Saint Paul” across the top.

He said he hopes it’ll spark a conversation about his time in the United States Navy, something he said he enjoys sharing. From 1958-1962, Niedbalski served during a time of relative peace.

“A lot of people, they have a bad taste in their mouth from the military. (When) I was in, they weren’t shooting at me, so I thought it was great,” Niedbalski said.

Niedbalski grew up in Columbus and was the youngest of 14 children. Three of his brothers had served in the U.S. Army and another three in the Navy.

“They all talked about the Navy, and I thought I wanted to see the world,” Niedbalski said. “To see all these ports, the countries on the government’s money, see all these different nationalities and to see how they lived.”

So in July 1958, he enlisted. After boot camp, he was assigned to serve on the USS Saint Paul, the flagship of the United State’s Pacific fleet. With a home port of Yokosuka, Japan, the Baltimore-class cruiser was 673 feet long and visited ports all around the Pacific.

Its mission at the time was to put on full display the might of the U.S. Naval power, Niedbalski said, recalling those on the ship giving out candy to children and allowing civilians to come aboard for meals.

“It was a goodwill type ship,” Niedbalski said. “It was just showing those other countries just what kind of power we had.”

Niedbalski is what is known as an “in-betweenner” according to Channing Zucker of Virginia. Zucker served on the ship from 1960-1963 and currently acts as archivist and historian for the USS Saint Paul Association.

He said this period between the end of the Korean War in 1953 and the start of the massive increase in U.S. military presence in the Vietnam War in 1964 was relatively peaceful for those in the service.

Niedbalski said his stay on the ship was only supposed to last 18 months,

but he ended up serving on it for two years, two months and nine days. One of his jobs on the ship was working as a helmsman.

“So I actually steered the ship, that was one of my jobs. A little skinny kid from Columbus, Nebraska, 18 years old, steering a ship that was just about 700 feet long,” he said.

Niedbalski said he remembers having to hide his cigarettes underneath his pillow so others wouldn’t mooch off of him. He said the ship had some of the best food in the entire fleet and showed movies almost every other night. One time when it snowed at the sea, he said the crew had a snowball fight.

When President Dwight Eisenhower visited the ship, Niedbalski said he was able to greet him as one one of eight honor guard members, saluting him as he boarded the vessel. But Niedbalski noted one of the proudest moments from his service was when he re-

ceived a Letter of Appreciation from his commanding officer for the cleanliness of his living quarters.

“I’m pretty proud of it,” he said of the honor, which he now displays on a wall in his home.

Niedbalski went on to serve until 1962 on the USS Watts, where he was discharged in The Philippines. He said he encourages people to give naval service a chance as it can teach social skills and how to get along with others.

And Zucker agreed. “You’re living with your fellow crew members, 24 hours a day, so you form these real close relationships with your fellow crew members,” Zucker said.

After returning home, Niedbalski went to a national meat cutting school in 1962. He went on to run Nied’s Meats & Convenient Grocery at 1520 17th St. for 35 years, selling meat and sausages. As of today, the father of five is retired.

In Niedbalski’s home

lies his memorabilia room. Down there the walls are covered with reminders of his service. His Naval uniform is hung on display, along with other photos of his youth. Next to them is a memorial to his brother, Dominic James Niedbalski, who was killed in action in Italy during World War II on Sept. 18, 1943. His story is an example of the varying experiences of those in the service.

The space also serves as Niedbalski’s workshop, where he carves wooden crosses and makes birdhouses out of ice pop sticks. While a far cry from the adventures of his youth, the old vet said he is proud of the life he’s had.

So when you see him out and about with his hat on, don’t be afraid to ask him about his service, because he’s just waiting to tell.

With Medicare Part C, or Medicare Advantage, all the benefits under Part A and B are covered through a private insurer, such as Humana, which may also include additional benefits such as fitness center memberships, a nurse advice hotline, and dental, hearing and vision coverage. Finally, Medicare Part D helps cover prescription drugs.

Myth #3: There is no way to save money on health-care plans.

There are ways to save money when choosing a Medicare plan, such as considering the total value of the Medicare plan you select along with your health, medical and budget needs for the coming year.

Myth #4: I’m on my own. Licensed insurance agents with Medicare expertise can help you select the coverage that best meets your needs. Let them know if you’re eligible for VA health care or a TRICARE for Life member, and if your spouse is eligible for CHAMPVA health care, as those details will help determine the best options for you.

A DESIRE TO GIVE BACK

Jenny began National Guard career as a way to give back

Steve Jenny initially joined the Army National Guard to help out locally in the case of an emergency or natural disaster.

The Columbus native figured with all the opportunities he'd been given growing up, he owed it to his friends and neighbors to be on the front line if Columbus, or the surrounding area, ever needed his service.

Nearly two decades later, he never imagined he'd still be putting on the uniform.

"My initial plan wasn't to go overseas or anything like that, but of course, things change," Jenny said, as he drove back from a weekend of guard duty in Grand Island. "(Serving this long) wasn't ever really part of the plan. I just wanted to help out."

Jenny has been doing that and a lot more since he first signed up in 1999 during his junior year at Dana College. The former Lakeview Viking was on a wrestling scholarship for another group of Vikings and decided it was time.

He had initial thoughts to join earlier but wanted to continue a successful wrestling career that included a Class C 106-pound state championship in 1995. He felt like he could help out even more with a college degree.

But in the summer of 1999, though he was never going to quit, he questioned his decision daily.

"It was tough, I knew I was going to make it through, but I was definitely not prepared for all the yelling," Jenny joked. "I've done OK for myself in a lot of things, but when I got there they pretty much let me know I wasn't that big of a deal."

"It was an eye-opener."

After 10 weeks of basic training, Jenny was allowed to join active duty right away. As well as he had performed in basic and scored on tests, he was allowed to pick his career path and train in that path immediately.

With a transportation company housed in Columbus, the choice was easy. His experience on the farm driving truck made the de-

cision even easier.

With an advanced skill set, Jenny was driving a truck as an active duty member for two weeks. When his time was up, college was ready to begin again.

After receiving a degree in biology and psychology with a minor in business, Jenny began the civilian part of his life as a farmer and eventual chemist for Cargill.

Little did he know, however, that his six-year contract with the National Guard included the potential to serve overseas.

After Sept. 11 and the ensuing military operations in Afghanistan and Iraq, Jenny and his transportation company were soon called up to support the troops in the middle east.

He landed in Kuwait in 2004 and served for one day short of a year driving the truck into the war zone in Iraq.

Jenny was part of mile-long convoys of 40 to 60 trucks that traveled at night and faced such dangers as sniper fire, roadside bombs and improvised explosive devices (IEDs).

He served alongside troops who were injured in battle and took fire to the back of his truck but never encountered any sort of explosion.

"It's a scary deal. We traveled at

night most of the time, so we really didn't know what was going on," he said. "You just had to rely on everybody else to make sure that you were safe."

Hearing an explosion meant waiting and listening for where the action was coming from. At that point, decisions were made about calling security, returning to base, finding out if a damaged vehicle needed to be transported back and many others.

"You just thank God it's not your vehicle," Jenny said.

"You just kind of go a little faster. You push the accelerator down and go fast. There isn't a whole lot you can do. Your biggest asset is the speed of the truck and the convoy."

Jenny's first term with the National Guard was up when he was on deployment in Iraq. Although he was unsure how long he would stick with it once he joined, being in combat together with fellow troops who had grown to be friends as much as brothers in arms meant he was ready to sign up again.

He has signed on to remain in service three times since then and has two years left on his current contract.

The National Guard has taken

him to other corners of the world, including Germany, the Czech Republic, and most recently, Canada this past spring.

Probably the most fun was in the Czech Republic when as a sergeant first class he was in charge of a group of cadets he took to Europe to train within an infantry unit in the Czech army.

They lived together out in the woods, drove Czech equipment and ate Czech food.

After 14 years of service, with many of the members of his first unit moving into other positions or ending their service, Jenny decided it was time for a change as well.

For two years now, he has been part of an aviation unit out of Grand Island. Jenny is in charge of a company that includes pilots, flight medics, crew chiefs and mechanics. His role is to ensure everyone is trained properly and up to date on all physical requirements.

The unit has four helicopters under its control used primarily for disaster relief. As the guy in charge though, Jenny stays back and keeps track of everyone while in action.

He's also used his college degree to become a medic and has decided

he'll serve at least the required 20 years to earn a military pension. Moving to the medical part of the National Guard has allowed Jenny to advance quicker through the ranks and become part of something he truly loves.

However, he also truly loves selling houses for Re/Max in Columbus – something he's been doing for the past five years.

He has a 19-month-old baby at home and plans to marry in June.

Life is about perfect for Steve Jenny as Veterans Day approaches on Sunday. As always, he'll meet up with his old buddies at Ag Park for a roast beef dinner, share a few laughs, trade a few stories, play cards and enjoy the time together.

Even if things weren't quite perfect, if there's one thing serving his country has taught Jenny, it's that everything he fights for, even the little things, are worth the struggle.

"I really appreciate what we have here in America. I wish more people would, too," he said. "If everyone could go (to Iraq) and see what they don't have and how our lives could be, they would appreciate more of what we have here – food and showers and water, just the little things that a lot of people don't have."

"For the troops, when you're in a war situation, and you can't always shower, you realize how great it is just to shower, how great it is to brush your teeth."

If you're looking for a meaningful way to mark Veterans Day this year, consider these five ways to support veterans in your community and around the country.

1. Give a veteran a ride to a doctor's appointment. Many veterans who are disabled or infirm struggle with mobility issues and may not be able to drive themselves around. Consider volunteering for the Department of Veteran Affairs Transportation Network to drive veterans to their medical appointments.
2. Raise a service dog. Volunteer to help train a service dog to become a companion

for a veteran. Organizations like Patriot Paws raise service dogs to help veterans with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and physical disabilities.

3. Send a thank-you letter or care package. Write letters expressing your thanks to the vets in your life. If you don't have any veterans in your family, the organization Operation Gratitude can help you send letters and care packages to veterans.
4. Participate in a Stand Down event. Stand Downs are events in which services are offered to homeless veterans, including food, clothing, shelter, health screenings, substance abuse treatment and veteran ben-

efits counseling. These events typically last for one to three days. Volunteer to help facilitate a Stand Down event in your community.

5. Donate to charities that help veterans. Your donations don't have to be financial contributions. Organizations like AM-VETS and Vietnam Veterans of America will pick up your used clothes and household items to donate or sell at discounted prices to veterans and their families. You can even donate frequent flyer miles to the families of injured veterans so that their loved ones can travel to be with them in military hospitals across the country.



1. When is Veterans Day observed?

Veterans Day is always observed November 11, a date that commemorates the peace agreement signed on November 11, 1918 that brought an end to the fighting during World War I. Since Veterans Day falls on a Sunday this year, some federal government offices, schools and businesses may be closed on Monday, November 12 in observance of the holiday.

2. How is Veterans Day different from Memorial Day?

Memorial Day, cele-



ada, the UK, France and Australia, November 11 is a day to remember the armistice that ended World War I and those who fought in their countries' armed forces. In these countries, however, the focus is on remembering those who sacrificed their lives rather than honoring living veterans.

4. Which spelling is correct: Veterans Day, Veteran's Day or Veterans' Day?

Although Veteran's Day and Veterans' Day are commonly used, the correct spelling is Veterans Day. According to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs website, the possessive form is incorrect "because it is not a day that 'belongs' to veterans, it is a day for honoring all veterans."

brated each year on the last Monday in May, is a day to remember those who lost their lives while serving in the U.S. military. Veterans Day is intended to honor all Americans, living and dead, who've been in the armed forces. It's a time to thank the veterans in our communities as well as the men and women who are currently serving our country.

3. Is Veterans Day celebrated in other countries?

Homelessness among American veterans

Studies show that veterans are over-represented in the country's homeless population and are more likely than non-veterans to become homeless at some point during their lifetime.

According to a study by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), there are about 40,000 homeless veterans in America. Although homelessness among veterans has dropped substantially since 2009 (by as much as 45 percent), between 2016 and 2017 it increased for the first time since 2010.


The vast majority (91 percent) of homeless veterans are men. Black veterans have a higher risk of becoming homeless than white veterans.

Veterans often report finding it difficult and dis-



orienting to reintegrate into civilian life after returning from active duty. Many of the former servicemen and servicewomen who end up living on the streets suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) as well as other mental illnesses like depression and anxiety. Substance abuse problems and injuries sustained during service are also common. These conditions often prevent veterans from finding or keeping profitable jobs and affordable housing.

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and other government organizations have worked to end veteran homelessness for decades but still have a long way to go. If you're looking for a way to help, consider volunteering or donating to a homeless shelter in your community or a charity that supports veterans and their families. You can also encourage your lawmakers to push for more resources for veterans, especially when it comes to mental health services.

More than 30 million Americans have served in the United States Army. If you or someone you care about is among them, you can now order a personalized, commemorative brick that will be permanently placed along the pathway to the future National Museum of the United States Army.

Making a Museum
The National Army Museum is rapidly taking shape at Fort Belvoir, Virginia, just south of Washington, D.C. This national landmark will be the first museum to tell the entire

history of the nation's oldest and largest military service. The massive 185,000-square-foot building will display a collection of Army artifacts, historic documents, and Soldier artwork. The vast majority of these priceless selections have never been seen by the public.
"For those who served, the Museum will provide a place of reflection," said retired Army Chief of Staff, General Gordon R. Sullivan, chairman of the Army Historical Foundation. "For the rest of America, it will be an educational institution that conveys American history through the eyes and stories of Sol-

diers, teaching our nation how the U.S. Army has shaped nearly every major event in our country's history."
In the two years since groundbreaking, the building's frame has been completed, and crews have installed the stainless-steel panels that make up its exterior. Inside, the circular walls of the 300-degree Army Theater are set, and four of the Museum's largest artifacts are in place.

How You Can Be a Part of It
The U.S. Army designated the nonprofit Army Historical Foundation to lead the campaign to

build the Museum. The Foundation developed the Commemorative Brick Program to raise funds for construction and offer serving Soldiers and Army veterans and their families a way to forever be part of the historic national landmark.
The personalized bricks are currently being installed along the pathway leading to the Museum's main entrance. Made of Mesabi Black granite, the impressive tributes will set the stage for the Museum experience.



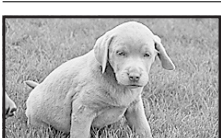

Try to picture a winning layout

Vincent Van Gogh, whose paintings I really enjoy, said, "A good picture is equivalent to a good deed."

If you were the declarer in today's deal and made your three-no-trump contract, partner would certainly think it was a good deed. Well, what should South do after West leads the spade king?

North added a couple of extra points for his long suit and took a shot at three no-trump. Note that five diamonds had no chance. South seems to have nine winners via one spade, six diamonds and two clubs. But the bad diamond break is troubling. Declarer ducks the first two spades, takes the third spade, cashes the diamond king and continues with the diamond jack, planning on overtaking with dummy's queen. But West's heart discard is a nasty deed. What now?

South has to let his diamond jack hold the trick, then try to get into the dummy to cash the rest of the diamonds. The easy part to picture is that East must have the heart ace and heart king. Declarer also needs spades to be 5-3, not 4-4. But then comes the step that is much harder to realize. He also needs East to have at

most a doubleton club.

At tricks six and seven, declarer must cash his club winners. Then he leads a low heart to dummy's 10 or overtakes his jack with dummy's queen. Here, East cannot defeat the contract.

Did you notice the very difficult deed missed by West? If, at trick three, he had shifted to a heart, East could have played three rounds of the suit to kill dummy's entry.
