New Houses Reflect Both Quality And Quantity

From the late 1800's to well into the twentieth century, local newspapers in Florence would routinely list the location of houses under construction and/or those recently built, along with the name(s) of the proud new owner(s). It was a major way to let the world know that the City of Florence was: (1) thriving, (2) being chosen by people of means as a great place to live, and (3) rapidly filling all vacant properties with structures of substance. Generally, such a public notice would not appear in the newspaper for a single home's construction; instead, it would be included in a listing that contained multiple new houses.

Note, for example, the accompanying list that was proudly posted in the Florence Herald on June 3, 1897. Within the six entries are the following: (1) Mr. J.T. Potterfield's work-in-progress is on Walnut Street "back of J.W. Nichols' new residence"; (2) Messrs. Jim White and Jim Angel have built "two neat cottages on Cherry Street, opposite C.C. Chapin's house" [The southeast corner of North Cherry and East Tuscaloosa Streets is still, today, known as "Angel's Corner."]; and Mrs. Lipscomb has made "extensive improvements on her residence west of the City Park." [The "City Park" was later named "Wilson Park" in honor of President Woodrow Wilson.] No doubt, these periodic listings of new homes and/or extensive renovations of existing properties did, indeed, encourage more of the same to continue as Florence has had to expand its city boundaries many times over the years.



GO FIGURE!







3. Tom Petty, in 1989, on his "Full Moon Fever" album. It topped the rock chart for five weeks.

4. Pat Benatar, in 1980.

5. "Paper Roses," by Anita Bryant, in 1960. The song was Bryant's best success, going to No. 5 on the charts in the U.S. but reaching No. 1 in Canada. In 1973 Marie Osmond released a country cover that topped the chart — when she was just 14 years old.


