

## **Cozad's Susan Hart Contributes to Artists Exhibit**

The Robert Henri Museum & Art Gallery is hosting the Impact Nebraska Artists, 'Robert Henri Tribute' in the former gallery building located between the main museum and the new art gallery. The exhibit runs through Saturday, Aug. 30. This installation was made possible through the efforts and generosity of Jim and Susan Hart and was installed by 2025 RHM interns Ally Goad and Brooke Brockman.

Renowned Cozad artist Susan Hart has been a member of Impact Nebraska Artists for 12 years. She is one of 27 artists featured in the 'Impact II Nebraska Artists' book, which is available for purchase at the exhibit.

According to Hart, "What seems like random choices of acrylic paint, hand-painted and found paper, and various materials for mark-making are prompts that often take me on an unexpected imaginative journey. My intuitive approach of adding and subtracting materials creates a history to evoke a sense of time, memory, and mystery. At first, this process feels risky, but it quickly becomes exhilarating and gives me such a sense of freedom. I've always been intrigued by the line, shape, texture, and color. Using a mix of media with a non-objective/abstract theme allows me to explore these things in my paintings."

Hart's artwork has been displayed throughout Cozad, but one of her most recognizable works is her art palette icon 'Heritage', which was commissioned by and is mounted in front of Rustic & Red. After suffering hail damage last June, Hart repaired the piece and was pleased with the results.

According to background information supplied by Patsy Smith in 2009, the first preliminary session for Impact Nebraska Artists took place in early 1981. Once the idea was conceived, organizers developed what was called the "Impact Project." This included a published book and a tour of "historical consequence." Originally limited to women in the visual arts, applicants were required to submit a resume with national accomplishments and slides of their artwork. A museum curator served as juror

for artist selection.

Due to legal incorporation, Impact qualified for several grants from sources including the Nebraska Arts Council and the National Endowment for the Arts. Governor Kay Orr later selected the project as part of her "Celebrate Nebraska - 88" initiative. The first Impact book, published by Jacob North Printing Company in Lincoln, earned three awards from state and regional publishing associations, including an Abby from the Advertising Federation of Lincoln and Best of Show from the Printing Industries of the Midlands.

The second phase of the project began with an exhibit at the Museum of Nebraska Art (MONA) in Kearney and went on tour across the U.S. Its highlight was a ten-day showing at the Cannon Office Building rotunda in Washington, D.C., hosted by Nebraska Representative Virginia Smith

Impact Nebraska is a nonprofit visual arts organization founded in 1985, with a mission to educate through outreach and exhibitions. The group has been known since its inception for its professionalism and high level of creative expression.

The organization offers five themed exhibition packages, 'Waters of Life', 'Pollinators', 'Color of Music – Rhythm of Art', 'Impact Willa Cather', and 'Spirit of Robert Henri'. These themes are developed with roots in Nebraska or the mid-Plains but are chosen for their national relevance. Each artist contributes one piece to each theme. If a piece is sold, the artist must create a new work to replace it.

The 'Spirit of Robert Henri' exhibit was previously on display in North Platte before arriving in Cozad on June 2.

Membership in Impact is limited to select Nebraska artists who have gained national recognition in their respective disciplines. Artists are elected through an independent jury process and represent a broad range of media and styles. Members commit to a four-year term and participate in all programs, exhibits, and meetings. Several founding members remain active, reflecting both

their dedication and the organization's success.

A reception for the Impact artists was held on Saturday, June 21, in the new Robert Henri Art Gallery. Attending artists included Marcia Bauerle of Imperial; Kathleen Lohr, Columbus; Janna Harsch, Greenwood; Beth Jasnoch, Kearney; Debra Groesser, Ralston; Jo Brown, Lincoln; Joan Swim, Valentine; and Cozad's own Susan Hart.

Hart's contribution to the 'Spirit of Robert Henri Tribute' is a mixed media piece titled 'In the Art Spirit', created with paint, tissue, and pencil. "My approach to this piece was inspired by Henri's painterly style and my color palette from many of his portraits," Hart said. She also credited Henri's book 'The Art Spirit' as an important source of inspiration.

Hart's resume is extensive. She grew up in Gibbon and graduated from Kearney State College in 1981 with a Bachelor of Arts in Art Education. She has completed 24 graduate hours in art and education through the University of Nebraska at Kearney and has studied under national artists through workshops, institutes, and online courses since 2001. From 1989 to 2006, she taught art in elementary schools across Dawson County.

She has lived in Cozad for 44 years and has been married to her husband, Jim, for 41 years. They have two daughters, Emily (married to Mike Stinger) and Elise (married to Jake Owens), and four grandchildren: Clara and Audrey Stinger, and Atticus and Matilda Owens.

Hart was juried into Impact in 2012. That same year, she received the Museum of Nebraska Art Purchase Award, Special Recognition at the Association of Nebraska Art Clubs juried exhibition, and an award from the 14th Annual Judeo-Christian Juried Online International Art Exhibition at Upstream People Gallery in Omaha.

She has held solo exhibitions at venues including The Burkholder Project Gallery in Lincoln (three times, most recently in 2025), Meadowlark Gallery in Grant, Robert Henri Museum in Cozad, Red Path Gallery in Seward (twice), Graham Gallery in Hastings, Dawson County Historical Museum in Lexington, Elements Gallery in Kearney, and the Minden Opera House.

Her juried exhibitions include entries in the Internation-

al Society of Experimental Artists Annual Exhibition, the Nebraska Biennial at the 1516 Gallery in Omaha, Bryan Medical Center Gallery in Lincoln, 'Spirit – Celebration of Art in the Heartland' at MONA, National Collage Society exhibitions in various locations, Association of Nebraska Art Clubs traveling exhibit, Fred Simon and Upstream People Galleries in Omaha, and the governor's residence in Lincoln (solo exhibit with ten pieces). She has also exhibited in Nebraska Art Teachers Association shows at Loves Jazz & Arts Center in Omaha and Walker Gallery at UNK.

Hart's group exhibitions include those with Impact, the Red Cloud Opera House, Medici Invitational at UNL, Doane College, Noyes Gallery in Lincoln, Prairie Winds Gallery in Grand Island, and the Nebraskaland Days Annual Competitive Art Exhibit.

Her work is held in collections at Doane College, York College, Good Samaritan Hospital in Kearney, and MONA. From 2000 to 2020, she taught children's and adult art workshops for MONA. Since 2009, she has led mixed media and collage workshops for colleges, schools, art clubs, and conferences, including the Southwest Conference Honors Art workshops in 2008, 2013, and 2015.

Hart's professional affiliations include Impact, Autumn Art Workshop, Nebraskans for the Arts, Kearney Artists Guild, Cozad Art Club, Association of Nebraska Art Clubs, International Society of Experimental Artists, and the National Collage Society.

Upcoming exhibitions for Hart include the Rustic & Red Sip and Shop on July 17, a September show at The Burkholder Project Gallery, and an October show with the Norton County Community Foundation.

In the words of Bonnie Hubbard, Coordinator of the Haymaker Creative and Historic District, "Creativity belongs everywhere. Especially here in Cozad."

Make time to visit the 'Impact Nebraska Artists Exhibit', the new Robert Henri Art Gallery, and the Robert Henri Museum before Aug. 30.

You'll experience not only Cozad's rich art history but the continuing contributions of artists like Susan Hart across Nebraska.

## Frontier Frau Hosts Men's Health Event

Amara Block and the Frontier Frau hosted the 2nd Annual Men's Health Event on Monday, June 30. The event was sponsored by the Cozad Community Health System.

CCHS paid for the mouth-watering snacks prepared by Frontier Frau, including pizza, pretzels, summer sausages, and cheeses. The Cozad Hospital Foundation paid for each attendee's in-house brewed German specialty beer.

Brett Kollars, PT, DPT, and Director of Rehabilitation Services at Cozad Physical Therapy served as the facilitator for the presentations.

Dr. Patrick Wetovick, MD, was the first

presenter, with his topic being Men's Preventive Health and Maintenance Guidelines. Wetovick stressed that checkups should be done every three years until age 50 and annually after age 50. "Preventive health topics to address with your healthcare provider include blood pressure, cholesterol, obesity, diabetes mellitus, and physical activity," Wetovick stated. Cancer prevention is vitally important, with patients advised to avoid tobacco, limit alcohol, and get screenings for colon, lung, and prostate cancer regularly. "It is also important to discuss your psychological health, including depression and anxiety," Wetovick

said. Wetovick also discussed vascular disease. "A one-time screening in men for abdominal aortic aneurysm is recommended for men ages 65-75 who have smoked. No screening is recommended for carotid disease or peripheral vascular disease without symptoms or risk factors," Wetovick stated. "It is also crucial to update your immunizations, including influenza, TDaP (tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis), shingles, pneumonia, Hepatitis B, COVID-19, and RSV," Wetovick emphasized to conclude his presentation.

Dr. Mandip Singh, MD, from Great Plains Health in North Platte, who is one of the CCHS Specialty Clinic Orthopedic Specialists, was unable to attend as scheduled, so his PA, Aaron Peterson, provided the presentation on Men's Orthopedic Health, specifically joint replacement. Also present at the event was Tyler Oberlander, Great Plains Health Clinic Manager. Joint replacement is a surgical procedure where a damaged joint (commonly the hip, knee, or shoul-

der) is replaced with an artificial implant to restore movement and relieve pain.

Candidates for joint replacement are those experiencing joint pain or stiffness limiting daily activities, pain not relieved by medications, therapy, or lifestyle changes, joint damage from arthritis, injury, or deformity, and those experiencing difficulty walking, climbing stairs, or sleeping due to joint pain. Joint replacements may involve robotic-assisted surgery, traditional surgery, or outpatient options with patients returning home the same day. Patients undergo a pre-op health assessment, education, and preparation prior to joint replacement. Peterson discussed the recovery timelines needed following orthopedic surgeries. Following surgery, physical therapy and pain management are important as patients gradually return to their normal activities. He also described the new tools and robots used for surgeries and the longevity of new joints now, with improved implant

materials making for longer-lasting joints and enhanced recovery protocols providing a quicker rehabilitation time. "New joints can last up to 20–30 years now. I want to stress how important it is to visit with your healthcare provider at the onset of symptoms and not wait until it is out of control," Peterson stated. Dr. Singh sees patients in Cozad the first Tuesday of each month.

Obstructive Sleep Apnea was the topic of discussion selected by Dr. Jack Cole for his presentation. Cole discussed the anatomy and science of obstructive sleep apnea and what to watch for. To determine if you may benefit from a sleep study, Cole recommended completing the Epworth Sleepiness Scale, a short questionnaire that helps measure daytime sleepiness and assess your need for further testing, with the results then being discussed with your primary health provider. The Epworth Sleepiness Scale was handed out to those in attendance and included eight scenarios to be filled out from 0 (no chance of dozing) to 3 (high chance of dozing). "The normal range of sleepiness in healthy adults is 0 to 10, and severe sleepiness is 18 to 24," Cole noted. Cole explained that CCHS offers two convenient home sleep study options to help diagnose sleep disorders like sleep apnea.

The first is WatchPAT ONE, which is a disposable, smart-phone-compatible device that only requires one hospital visit. It is ideal for patients who live out of town or have busy schedules. The other is Nox T3, an easy-to-use device that must be returned to the hospital the next day and is ideal for those without smartphones. "One in 10 people have sleep apnea, and men have sleep apnea at a ratio of 3 to 1 compared to women," Cole stated. "As far as treatments for sleep apnea, I believe the golden standard is still the CPAP, but there are new treatments coming out all the time, and we are willing to go with the new options, and we have referral facilities available," Cole concluded.

Kollars was the final presenter and emphasized how important exercise and using your muscles regularly is

to achieving positive outcomes, such as fewer injuries, surgeries, and illnesses. He recommended exercising 150 minutes a week. Kollars also fielded questions on specific exercise programs for specific ailments. "Tai Chi is one of the best exercise programs for balance," Kollars said. "Regular exercise builds resilience and is good for joint and bone health as well as balance. In addition, exercise has an effect on testosterone levels, as it is increased immediately, lasting 15 minutes to one hour, and regular moderate exercise can cause sustained increases. HIIT and weight training are the best for this, and combining exercises with supplementation is best for very low testosterone levels. Reducing body fat also increases testosterone levels," Kollars stated.

Kollars also shared some very accessible exercise options for any age. "When you get up to go get a glass of water or grab the TV remote, sit and stand five times," Kollars recommended.

Following the presentations, the attendees were invited to participate in a panel-style Q&A discussion.

According to Karlie Rose Buss, Director of Marketing & Communications at CCHS, the presence of CCHS employees was sizable, but she had hoped for more community members to be in attendance. "The team from Great Plains Health thought that this was a great event, and we will continue to put on these events and explore different times of the year and different times of the day."

Buss thanked the Frontier Frau for the yummy food and announced the winners of the two gift baskets funded by CCHS and provided by DBN Outdoors and 222 Hardware. The BBQ basket from DBN Outdoors was won by Don Kinnan, and the Personal Hygiene basket from 222 Hardware, which included "Dude Soap," was won by Clint Snider.

"Our goal at CCHS is to continue our community outreach. Suggested topics for the 2026 Men's Health Event include back pain, memory, and keeping one's mind and body active after retirement," Buss stated.

## Commissioners Approve Grant Signatures, Licenses and Fee Changes

The Dawson County Board of Commissioners held its regular meeting on Monday, June 16, in the commissioners' room at the Dawson County Courthouse in Lexington. All five board members, PJ Jacobson, Bill Stewart, Rod Reynolds, Joe Richeson and Chairman Kevin Swanson, were present.

Following approval of the previous meeting minutes, the board voted unanimously to accept the official receipts from county offices and the treasurer's report. Receipts included \$50,562.35 from the Register of Deeds, \$7,938.62 from the Clerk of District Court, and \$1,159,900.85 in treasurer's receipts. The claims were also approved by a unanimous vote.

Commissioner Rod Reynolds provided a brief update on the courthouse remodel. Kylie Joyce with Region II Services and Joe Weaver with South Central Services gave a joint update on their respective programs.

Chairman Swanson was authorized to sign the Victims of Crime Act grant following board approval.

Representatives Corey Steinke and Jeremy Hendricks from Central Nebraska Public Power and Irrigation District (CNPPID) discussed a draft agreement related to 2025 bridge inspections. The board voted to table the matter.

The Board noted that the special designated liquor license application for Block's business will be placed on the July 1 agenda.

Veterans Service Officer Steve Zerr recommended reappointing Mike Schmeeckle to the Veterans Service Committee. The board approved the recommendation for a new five-year term.

Sheriff Mark Montgomery addressed the board with updates on jail medical services, which he noted were progressing. The board chose to table the item. Montgomery also presented the May crime report.

County Attorney Darlene Shafer submitted an interlocal agreement for the District 11 Treatment Court. The board approved Resolution 2025-30 and authorized Chairman Swanson to sign the agreement.

The board voted to revise health insurance deductibles beginning Jan. 1, 2026. Individual deductibles will be set at \$4,000, or \$1,000 for employees participating in the wellness program. Family deductibles will be \$8,000, or \$2,000 for employees with dependents who take part in the wellness program.

An executive session was held at the request of Commissioner Reynolds to discuss a potential land purchase. No action followed the session. The meeting adjourned with no further business, and the board moved into a budget workshop.

At the July 1 meeting all five board members were present. The board approved minutes from both the June 16 regular meeting and the budget workshop. Treasurer's receipts totaling \$1,020,705.32 were also approved, along with the monthly claims.

Commissioner Rod Reynolds and Emergency Manager Brian Woldt gave a brief update on the ongoing courthouse remodel project. The board also reviewed second-quarter Paid Time Off (PTO) reports.

Jolene Block of Around the Block Catering appeared to request a Special Designated License for a Bayer event scheduled for July 23. The board approved the license. A second Special Designated License request was also approved for the Lexington Regional Health Center's "Leaving a Legacy" event on Aug. 16, presented by Beth Roberts of the Lexington Community Foundation and Jill Denker of LRHC.

Commissioner Stewart discussed Addendum #6 for the Department of Health and Human Services Annex lease and received board approval to have County Attorney Darlene Shafer draft a proposed lease agreement addendum.

Emergency Manager Brian Woldt presented a courthouse access control quote from Kidwell. The board approved the \$71,945 quote and authorized Chairman Swanson to sign the agreement.

Surveyor Mark Streit presented a proposed new fee schedule. The board approved the updated rates, accepted the new Surveyor Services Contract, and passed Resolution 2025-31 to formalize the changes.

Sheriff Mark Montgomery and Tim Kostrunek spoke about Utility and Access Easement related to the sheriff's range. The board approved Resolution 2025-29 and authorized Chairman Swanson to sign the easement agreement.

The board also voted 4–1 to reallocate Kroger Opioid Funds to the Nebraska Opioid Recovery Fund. With no further business, the meeting adjourned.



## Tomb of the Unknown Soldier Replica on Display in Cozad

COZAD LOCAL

A half-size replica of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, modeled after the memorial located in Arlington National Cemetery, is currently on display at the 100th Meridian Museum in Cozad. The exhibit, provided by Patriotic Productions of Omaha, will remain open to the public through Sunday, July 13.

The museum, located at 206 E. 8th Street, will be open Monday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Sunday from 1 to 4 p.m.

As part of the exhibit, the Sweet Adelines women's barbershop harmony group will perform a selection of patriotic music at the museum on Saturday, July 12, at 11 a.m. Following the performance, visitors are invited to participate in a quilt "Show and Tell," where individuals may share their own patriotic quilts, including Quilts of Valor or Quilts of Honor.

In addition to the tomb exhibit, patriotic quilt displays are set up inside the museum and in several businesses throughout downtown Cozad. Julie Geiger of Prairie Point Junction Quilt Shop is coordinating efforts to collect and display red, white, and blue quilts in local storefronts through July 14. Anyone interested in loaning a quilt or hosting one at their business is encouraged to contact Geiger directly.

The replica tomb honors service members who have died without identification. The original tomb in Arlington was established in 1921 with the remains of an unidentified soldier from World War I. Later, unknown service members from World War II and the Korean War were added in 1958. An unknown from the Vietnam War was entombed in 1984 but later identified through DNA testing as 1st Lt. Michael Blassie. His remains were returned to his family in 1998, and the Vietnam crypt has remained empty since.

Sentinels from the elite 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment, known as The Old Guard, have guarded the tomb 24 hours a day, seven days a week, regardless of weather, since 1948. They wear no rank insignia to honor the unidentified soldiers.

Patriotic Productions, the organization behind the traveling replica, is also known for the "Remembering Our Fallen" exhibits and organizing 13 Flights of Honor that transported more than 3,500 Nebraska and southwest lowa veterans to Washington, D.C.

Visitors are encouraged to view the exhibit, enjoy the special events, and take part in honoring those who served by decorating with patriotic themes throughout town.
