

Anyways, this weeks column is about more than a stupid diet or a ketchup bottle. Maybe when someone offers me something I can't have, I'll just say, "Oh, I'll eat that in heaven." Because I know God's serving up mashed potatoes, bananas, and garlic bread with zero carbs up

City Council Approves Bid Letting for Substation Transformer

Electric Commissioner Chris White asked the Cozad City Council members during the meeting on Monday, Oct. 20, to approve the recommendation from the Board of Public Works to let out bids for furnishing and setting in place one 7.5 MVA substation transformer at the Monroe site. "This is something that has been in the works for two or three years, with the substation from the Monroe site moved to replace the one at the warehouse that is in worse shape," White explained. The request was approved unanimously.

Water/Sewer Commissioner Troy Franzen reported that his department continues to change meters and that two staff members recently attended school for additional training. "Johnson Services is in town cleaning out the sewers prior to the winter months, and I'm happy to report that our annual lead and copper testing has been completed and we passed," Franzen stated.

White also reported that his crew has been changing out three large-power customers' meters from NPPD, working on the procurement for the Monroe 7.5 MVA transformer, and rebuilding the line by Hi-Gain Feedlot. "Our new employee, Ajay Ambrose, will be starting tomorrow, and we are working on switching our load control SCADA system due to Stan Reinke retiring at the end of December," White said.

Wilson Public Library Director Laurie Yocom reported that her staff continues to address building issues. Yocom and her staff attended the Nebraska Library Association Annual Conference at the Holthus Convention Center in York on Oct. 22.

Cozad Police Chief Nick Reynolds reported that he had completed organizing all 2025 training records and that his officers will attend range training during the

first week of November. Reynolds and his officers have been contacting homeowners about moving campers and trailers off city streets before winter.

City Clerk Brandi Kloepping reported that she continues to prepare for the audit and had submitted her required annual continuing education hours as the city's treasurer after attending Clerk School and the Municipal Accounting and Finance Conference earlier

this year. She also reported that an office position has been vacated and that applications are being accepted to fill the vacancy.

Mayor Marcus Kloepping provided Public Services Commissioner Jimmy Weinmaster's report. "There has been some angst about the tornado slide being removed from Frenchy's Park. For legal reasons, Park Foreman Zach Priel and the Park Board inspect playground equipment at all parks annually to assess which items have aged out or are deemed unsafe for various reasons. The slide is being auctioned off for safety reasons and will make someone a nice addition in their backyard," Kloepping stated.

The next Cozad City Council meeting will be held Monday, Nov. 3, at 7 p.m. in the City Council Chambers. Residents are encouraged to attend, with time reserved for public comments at the end of each meeting.


Following the NHS induction ceremony, Cozad Community Scholastic Awards President Caroline Valenzuela and Secretary Brooke Barber came to the stage to present the annual CCSA Awards. Other CCSA officers include Shayla Canas, Jenny Nelson, Sheri Hladky, and Ramona Priel.

The CCSA was founded in 1958 by Bill and Mary Young, Grace Burkholder, and Dorothey Jo Stevens with the sole purpose of honoring CHS students who excel academically. The CCSA began honoring students who excelled in math and science and later expanded to include language arts and reading. The awards were based on the MAP testing conducted in early September at CHS.

According to longtime CCSA officer Sheri Hladky, "The students at CHS must be getting smarter, as we had so many of them place in the 95th percentile and above this year, with several in the 98th and 99th percentiles in some areas."

Seniors receiving 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place awards received \$100, \$75, and \$50, with those achieving the 90th percentile or above receiving a certificate. Reading honorees were Olliver Davis, 1st; Elliott Blackmore, 2nd; and Klaylee Revelo, 3rd. Braiton Snider, Emma Lindekugel,

Cozad seniors Koang Deng and Audrey Baker closed out their cross country seasons at the NSAA State Cross Country Championships in Kearney on Friday, Oct. 24.

Baker finished her season strong, improving her personal record by 22 seconds with a time of 21:35.2. Deng earned a 10th-place medal with a time of 16:41.7, tying the second-fastest time in Cozad Haymaker school history.

"It feels great being ranked fifth, but I'm not satisfied," Deng said before the meet. "I'm not too focused on the rankings because I feel that I am capable of competing with those other guys. I'm just excited to go run and push myself."

Brummer said he enjoyed watching both athletes finish their seasons on a strong note. "Hopefully seeing them put together a great race and improve from last year's state performance gives them confidence in how far they've come," he added.

For Baker, reaching state was both a reward and a reminder of what cross country means to her. "Making it to state was a big accomplishment, and I'm happy that I got the chance to compete against other incredible athletes," she said. "I've been doing cross country for so long that it has become a very important part of my life. It's taught me that even when things seem hard, having people you care about beside you makes it easier."

Baker said she was excited to test herself against top competition. "I was excited to run at state against people closer to my abilities so I could push myself and compete at my best," she said.

Both Deng and Baker represented Cozad with pride, closing out their high school cross country careers with strong performances and personal milestones.


Several parents helped throughout the years through monetary donations and by supplying drinks, bacon, and pancake mix.

Learning to Tattle on Myself

When I was a little girl, I often tattled on my younger sister. "Mommy, she won't share her toys with me," I whined. Sometimes I got my way, and other times I got in trouble.

Years later, as a mother, I heard my own children tell on each other. My go-to response was usually, "Work it out." The hardest part was not knowing who was telling the truth. Since I hadn't witnessed the offense, I couldn't decide who needed to be punished. Honestly, it would have been so much easier if they tattled on themselves: "Mommy, I don't want to share my toy, so I hit her hand when she reached for my dolly."

Now, as an adult, I find myself wondering-when was the last time you told on yourself?

Recently, I was excluded from a work email to a group of people I'm part of. My first reaction was offense. The longer I thought about it, the more hurt I felt. I began spinning a story in my mind, complete with a villain and a victim. Deep down, I wanted to tell someone who could make it better, ensure I was included, or reassure me that I hadn't been dismissed. Then, I caught myself and decided to tattle-not on anyone else, but on me.

I called a trusted loved one and confessed, probably with a bit of whining in my tone: "I don't understand why I was left out. My pride is stung, and I feel hurt. I



want to be angry."

That moment of honesty was freeing. By naming what was happening inside me, I saw the truth – I was upset because things hadn't gone my way. Life wasn't unfolding on my terms. Once I laid down my pride and resentment, the heaviness started to lift.

I reached out to the individual directly but didn't get much clarity. Still, with gentle support from loved ones, I began to see a possible reason for the exclusion. It made sense—and with that understanding, the offense lost its grip.

The truth is, I may never know the full story. But by telling on myself and sharing my honest feelings in a safe space, I could move forward. Keeping those feelings bottled up would have deepened the divide.

As humans, we misunderstand, misinterpret, and take things personally. We feel hurt, excluded, and betrayed. And sometimes-this human especially-for-



gets to believe the best about others. When I pause long enough to notice what's happening inside me, I can tattle on myself in a way that sheds light, restores connection, and brings peace.
