A grassroots idea to make sure families have food in light of the economic distress stemming from the coronavirus has reached South Middleton Township.

Virus likely to hamper outreach for census

The 2020 census is the first one to be offered online, and that may save this year's effort as worries grow over outreach during a pan-

The Associated Press reported that the U.S. Census Bureau made a soft launch of the 2020 census website, 2020census.gov, last Monday. Later last week, the bureau began mailing notices to

residents.

Though the mailers are still sent out and questionnaires can still be answered over the phone, it's the website the bureau is encouraging people to visit. People can use the census ID they receive by mail for the online submissions, though those who answer the questions before receiving the ID will still be counted, according to the AP.
