## Biz gives \$100K to city

### Sticker Mule donates funds for upgrades to Veterans Park

The owner of Sticker Mule presented the city's Tourism Marketing and Recreation Department with a ceremonial "giant check" for \$100,000 on Tuesday, for the purpose of installing new equipment at Veteran's Park.

Anthony Constantino — owner and founder of Sticker Mule, which has a large facility in Amsterdam — said he was walking through Veterans Park last summer, with some "co-workers from Italy", when he got the idea to donate money to the city to improve the park.

"They were saying 'this park is so beautiful, I wish we had a park like this, it just needs some work put into it,'" Constantino said.

Sticker Mule provided pictures of some of the equipment his donation is meant to purchase, including: a rope climbing wall and some 'extreme fitness' outdoor gymnasium equipment. Constantino said he also wants some children's playground equipment to be purchased.

"Sticker Mule is doing great, and I like the challenge of building Sticker Mule and making it one of the best companies in, really, the country right now, but my new curiosity is making Amsterdam the best place to live in upstate New York," he said "I think we can make that happen."

Rob Spagnola, director of the city's Tourism, Marketing and Recreation Department, said Amsterdam plans to use Department of Public works employees to construct a "quarter-mile" track "made from stone or blacktop" around the equipment purchased by Sticker Mule. He said there will be new bathrooms and a concession area where the old "Little Giants" concession area was. He said the city will also be painting lines for a soccer field adjacent to the

### Sticky notes with inspirational quotes greet AHS students after vacation

When Amsterdam High School students returned to class Monday after a weeklong break, each was greeted by a handwritten message scrawled on a Post-It Note and stuck to their locker.

The messages — hundreds of different inspirational quotes — served as a quick shot of posi-

tivity for students returning to a stressful time of the school year. The notes focused on uplifting messages to inspire teenagers — and to remind them that so much more still lies ahead of them.

"Every day is a new beginning,"

according to one note. "Take a deep breath and start again."

"It does not matter how slowly you go as long as you do not stop," another one read.

Lori Stachnik, the mother of an Amsterdam sophomore and

the force behind Monday's notes, said she wanted to give students something uplifting to think about as they returned to school this week.

"My hope was someone went into school yesterday and whatever quote they got might resonate with them," Stachnik said. "If one kid got something out of

## Diamond looks to challenge McCoski for DA

Lorraine Diamond, an attorney who lives in Fultonville, has announced she will challenge incumbent Montgomery County District Attorney Kelli McCoski in the Republican Party primary, and possibly the Democratic Party primary.

Diamond served for three years under McCoski as an assistant district attorney. She said she believes she can do the job better than her old boss is doing it now.

"I think my approach, in terms of collaborating with the community will be more of a focus than there was when I was in that office," Diamond said. "[I want to] get down to the root of the problem, getting services in place, alternatives to incarceration, that, for the lower-level crimes, can help fix the problem."

In the news release announcing her candidacy Diamond described her professional experience. She's a veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps, with 20 years of experience work-

ing in the legal field, including 13 years of experience working as a lawyer for the Fulton County Department of Social Services and as a Montgomery County Public Defender.

She said in addition to her law degree from Pace Law School, she also has budget management experience from her time in the Marines as well as a Masters of Business Administration from Mount Saint Mary College.

Diamond described herself as an aggressive trial lawyer, who will more efficiently run Montgomery County's district attorney office.

"During my recent three-year tenure as an assistant district attorney, I handled over 20,000 cases ranging from traffic and other violations, to misdemeanor animal and child sexual abuse cases, to drug sales and other felonies," she said. "I have an excellent working relationship with local law enforcement and the judiciary."

When McCoski announced her re-election bid she said she intended to seek permission from the Montgomery County Democratic Party to run in the Democratic Party primary, in a bid to claim both major party endorsements. In 2016 McCoski received permission to run in the Democratic Primary, but she was defeated by Democrat Howard Aison 469 to 372. McCoski then went on to defeat Aison in the general election. McCoski received 9,836 votes to Aison's 6,552.

Diamond said she is also seeking permission to run in the Democratic Party primary.

Both McCoski and Diamond made presentations to the Montgomery County Democratic

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# Cops: St. Johnsville woman arrested

## Six charged in 2 Colonie cases, police say

COLONIE — A St. Johnsville woman was arrested recently after an investigation, police said.

Jayquan M. Gary, 20, of Albany, and Kayla M. Mercer, 21, of St. Johnsville, were each charged with second-degree criminal possession of a weapon, felonies, while Sharif D. Sabb, 19, of Troy, was charged with misdemeanor unlawfully fleeing a police officer, seventh-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance, reckless driving and aggravated unlicensed operation, police said. The arrests happened Saturday, police said.

The incident began at about 10 p.m. Saturday when officers spotted a car going in and out of motels on Wolf Road, near 50 Wolf Road. When officers attempted to stop the vehicle, the driver, identified as Sabb, kept driving and led officers on a slow-speed chase that ended on the Northway by Exit 2W as other officers boxed in the car, police said.

Sabb was found with a small amount of cocaine and marijuana, police said.

The follow-up investigation led police to the Red Roof Inn, 188 Wolf Road, where Sabb's vehicle had been seen leaving, police

said. Occupants of room 335, identified as Gary and Mercer, were interviewed about the ownership of the vehicle, police said. They were found to have a loaded Jennings J-22LR .22 handgun, police said.

Gary and Mercer were arraigned and ordered held. Sabb was arraigned and released to return to court later, police said.

### Loaded .22 rifle

A separate incident occurred Monday and involved a loaded .22 rifle with a defaced serial number and barrel cut down for concealment, police said.

Dellaney Wallace, 43, of Albany, was charged with second- and third-degree criminal possession of a weapon, felonies, and seventh-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance,

police said. Robert Breedlove, 48, and Victoria Plaza, 36, both of Rensselaer, were charged with seventh-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance, misdemeanors.

That incident began just before midnight as officers checked on an occupied car in the parking lot of the Motel 6, 1600 Central Ave. Officers interviewed the three occupants and found the back

seat passenger, Wallace, with the rifle, police said.

Breedlove and Plaza, the front seat occupants, were found in possession of cocaine and a cocaine pipe, police said.

Wallace was arraigned and released under probation supervision. Breedlove and Plaza were released on appearance tickets to appear in court later, police said.

# Business connecting students with industry pros

JOHNSTOWN — The Kingsboro Lumber Co. and the HFM Career and Technical Center have formed a new partnership inviting building material manufacturers and wholesalers to share their insights into the construction industry directly with students.

Recently, HFM construction technology instructor Steve Derwin approached Donald Wicksell, the president and CEO of Kingsboro Lumber in Gloversville, for help arranging visits by industry professionals to the Career & Technical Center. The first of what will be a series of visits occurred Feb. 12 when Scott Dewsbury, the local territory sales manager for Reeb Millwork — the largest distributor of doors on the East Coast — spoke with the construction students about his career, the millwork industry, door material and construction, and more.

Derwin, Dewsbury and Wicksell also spoke with the students about the critical role suppliers play for construction contractors and the careers available in the field.

“The whole country needs people to supply building materials. It’s really a great opportunity for a career,” Dewsbury said, noting that many in the supply industry are now nearing retirement and job seekers with construction experience, such as CTE students, would have a leg up when entering the field.

Reeb Millwork is a family-owned company with five millwork facilities that work with manufacturers to assemble and ship pre-hung exterior and interior doors. Their smallest facility, which is in Syracuse, ships approximately 1,400 doors a day.

Dewsbury explained the wide variety

of professionals needed by companies such as Reeb including people who work in quoting and estimating, shipping and receiving, logistics, warehousing and sales. The company also requires field technicians for after-sale service.

“There is a dire need for door and window installers,” Dewsbury said, explaining the technical expertise needed to properly install modern doors and tighten the building envelope.

The HFM Construction program will continue to work with Kingsboro Lumber and bring in more material representatives to speak to students. Future topics planned include windows and insulation.

“Partnerships with local businesses and professionals have always been an important part of Career and Technical Education, and we thank Kingsboro Lumber for helping to expand these relationships,” HFM

Career and Technical Center Director Jay A. DeTraglia said.

During his visit, Dewsbury’s final advice for students entering the workforce was to look beyond just getting a job and to focus on long-term career goals.

Open to local high school juniors and seniors, construction technology is a two-year program that stresses career preparation in the building trades.

Through building projects on the HFM campus, students are exposed to a variety of construction trades including residential construction, blueprint reading and estimating, building materials and tools, surveying, foundations, floor wall and roof systems, insulation, window and door installation, home electrical wiring, and energy use analysis. Particular attention is paid to modern framing techniques and green building strategies.

The event is free and open to the public.

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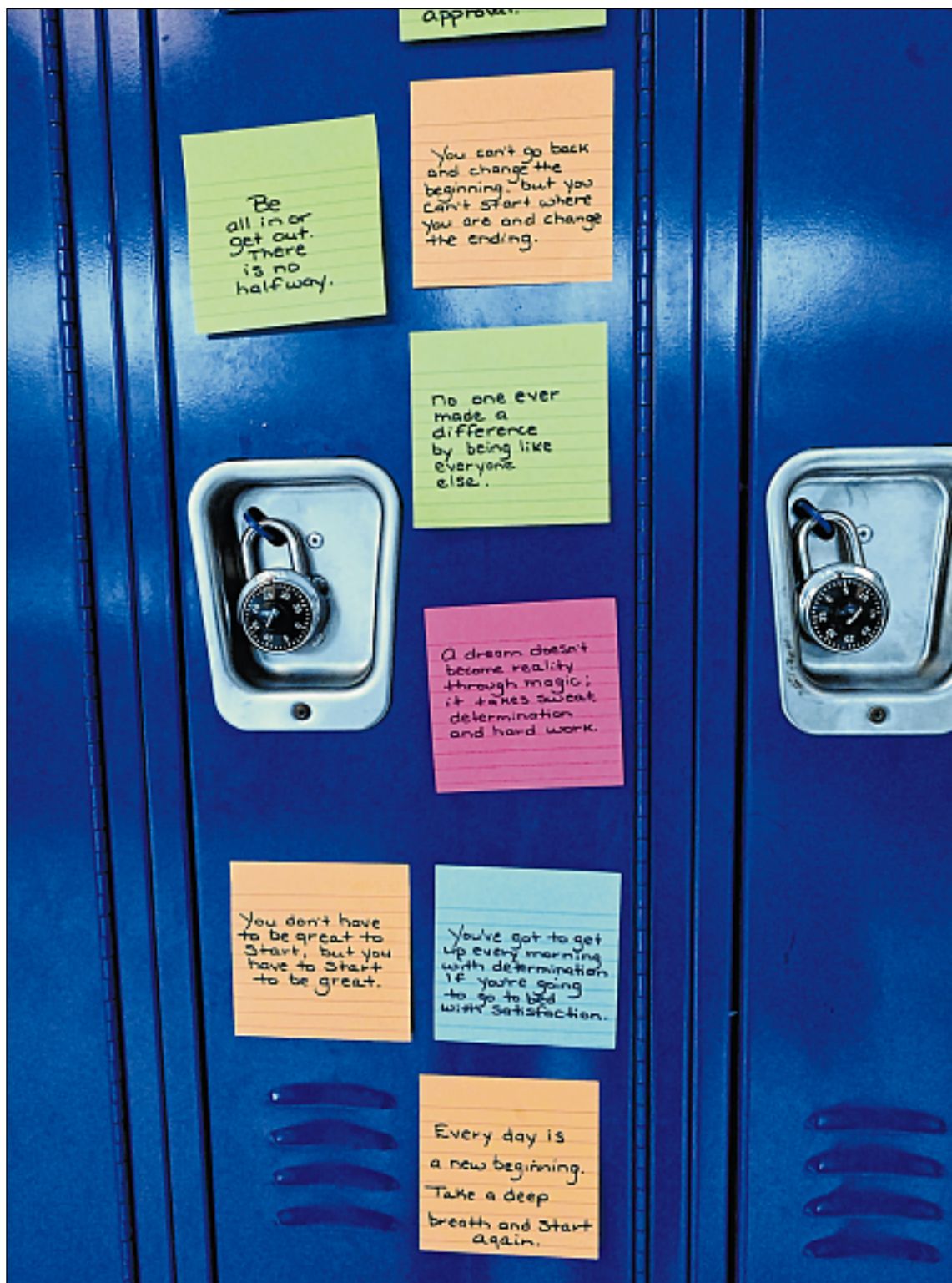

it or two kids got something out of it, it was worth it all."

Stachnik, who graduated from Amsterdam High School in 1980, said she got the idea from reading about a middle school student who had done something similar for her classmates. Stachnik reached out to Nancy Rad, a longtime friend and community schools coordinator for Amsterdam schools, and asked if they could do something similar.

Stachnik went about identifying hundreds of different inspirational messages for teenagers, printing the quotes out and scores of sheets of paper. For a week straight, using a Sharpie, she wrote out the messages by hand; she said she could do around 100 notes a day. At one point, she scrawled out the messages while attending her son's track meet.

"I went through a lot of Sharpies," she said.

Stachnik and Rad on Friday surreptitiously posted the messages on the lockers of every student in the school, about 1,200 kids in all.

Last year, Rad and another teacher made a similar

effort, printing out notes for students that said, "You matter." But she said Monday's messages resonated more strongly with students because of the personal nature of a handwritten note and the variety of messages.

"It meant so much more," Rad said of the personal care that went into Stachnik's notes. "It was just powerful to them at a time when it's not a fun time of year."

The boost of positivity gained national attention by Tuesday morning. A reporter from Good Morning America visited to write up an article about the notes, and a handful of workers from 3M, the Minnesota-based maker of Post-it Notes, visited the high school. It just so happened they were in Amsterdam for meetings, Rad said.

"Kids, they just need to know that somebody believes in them," Rad said. "That's what those quotes do, they build you up and make you feel like a big hug."

Committee on Feb. 13, but the committee tabled the issue without voting to allow either Republican into the party's primary.

A member of the committee said both McCoski and Diamond were told to collect the required number of signatures to get onto the Democratic Party Primary ballot.

Montgomery County Democratic Committee Chairman Terry Bieniek said the county Democratic committee will meet on March 25 and decide whether or not to allow either or both McCoski and Diamond into the party's primary.

Bieniek, who is also Montgomery County's Democratic Party election commissioner, said petitions to get into the Democratic Party primary are due one week after the committee's March 25 meeting. He said either or both candidates will need the endorsement of the committee to bring to the Board of Elections when they file their signatures.

So far, no registered Democrat has declared a candidacy for Montgomery County District Attorney.

Diamond said she has not decided whether or not she will file an independent party petition to ensure she can appear on the November ballot irrespective of whether she can defeat McCoski in either the Republican or possibly the Democratic Party primary.

In 2016 McCoski also ran on the Conservative, Independence and Reformed party lines.

other improvements.

"It's our hope to have it up and running ASAP for use this season," Spagnola said. "We've kind of laid everything out on the upper end of the park, on Locust Ave [area]," he said. "It's the very north end of the park, where the old Little Giants football field was, and there will be something for everybody. Kids who are three to four years old will be able to play soccer there and go on playground equipment and senior citizens can walk the walking trail. People who are fitness buffs, or working-out for the upcoming football season, can enjoy the fitness equipment."

Sticker Mule made headlines, and quite a bit of Internet buzz, in December when it offered all of its employees surprise \$1,000 bonuses. Constantino said his company, which manufactures custom stickers ordered by customers through an online interface, has experienced explosive growth in recent years, providing him with the funds for the recent philanthropy.

Constantino said when he decided to invest in upgrading Veterans Park he tasked his local marketing manager Dani Whelly — whose prior job was as assistant Director of the city's Tourism, Marketing and Recreation Department — with coming up with a plan for how to invest in upgrades that will make an impact for the park.

Whelly said she wanted the new equipment to provide Veterans Park with attractions that will make it stand out for the area.

"This is going to have things for different skill levels, the stuff that is around the trial are more for the everyday exerciser, and the ones in the obstacle course are more for intense physical training," she said. "[This will offer] something for somebody into extreme fitness and wants to train. There's nobody in the area at all that has any of these types of equipment, so it will be a draw to the area, and a benefit for people who live in the community."

Spagnola said Sticker Mule's money will be going into a "dedicated account" only for this project.

"[The money will be] solely for this project, so it's not intermingled with general account budgeting," he said.

Spagnola said a company called "MoveStrong" is the maker of some of the equipment that will likely be purchased as part of the project.

"We'll have to go out to bid on some things, but some of this equipment is so unique that we wouldn't need to," he said.

Spagnola explained how the \$100,000 donation will cover the cost of the planned project.

"We're going to do a lot of the work

ourselves. We want to be careful, and spend the money wisely," he said. "We appreciate such a large donation. Yes, the easy thing would be to hire somebody and say 'do this and do that,' but we can't get the same bang for Anthony's buck that way. I think the \$100,000 gets us the track, the playground equipment, the exercise equipment, [a] youth soccer [field]."

Michele Pawlik, the city assistant director for Tourism, Marketing and Recreation, said the project is going to enable the Amsterdam Youth Soccer Club to return to the city from operating in the town of Amsterdam.

Lawsuit settled

Amsterdam Mayor Michael Cinquanti did not attend the press conference Tuesday because he was attending the proceedings of the city's insurance claim lawsuit regarding a hail storm in 2014. The city has sued its insurance company the New York Municipal Insurance Reciprocal after NYMIR paid \$106,000 worth of damage from the hail. At issue in the lawsuit was whether the insurance policy covered "cosmetic damage", which the city claimed caused more than \$2 million worth of damage.

The case was settled in Montgomery County Supreme Court before Judge Rebecca Slezak.

Cinquanti said the terms of the settlement will not be disclosed by the city due to a confidentiality agreement.

In a text message statement, Cinquanti said he was sorry he couldn't be at the press conference due to the legal matter and praised Sticker Mule for its donation to the city.

"It is very hard to come up with the words necessary to properly thank Anthony Constantino for his incredible generosity and his just as incredible ongoing commitment to improving the quality of life here in Amsterdam," Cinquanti said. "When completed, the project he is underwriting will be like no other in the Capital District and serve as the dynamic centerpiece of a renovation that will make Veterans Park once again one of the most popular recreational resources in our city. Sticker Mule's phenomenal commercial success permits it the freedom and resources to locate their base of operations anywhere in the world, so not only are we grateful for this specific contribution, we are also grateful that he has chosen to locate such a significant portion of his company here in Amsterdam."

Roger Stone jurors say bias played no role in conviction

NEW YORK — Three of the jurors who convicted Republican operative Roger Stone for lying to Congress and witness tampering testified that political bias played no role in their decision, pushing back against Stone's contention that he deserves a new trial.

U.S. District Judge Amy Berman Jackson did not issue a ruling at the end of a Tuesday hearing on Stone's request. But the judge said a juror's social media posts criticizing President Donald Trump did not necessarily mean she was biased against Stone, who was convicted in November and sentenced last week to three years and four months in prison.

At the beginning of the hearing in Washington, the judge sharply criticized the president and "false" news reports for promoting claims of bias she said could endanger jurors. "The risk of harassment and intimidation of any juror who may testify in the hearing later today is extremely high," Jackson said, adding that "the jury has even been publicly criticized by the President of the United States."

The notion that Stone's trial was tainted by left-leaning jury members, particularly the foreperson, has been promoted aggressively by Trump and right-wing media in recent days. The president, who has also hinted he may pardon his longtime ally, tweeted further on the issue Tuesday.

Heir to Hot Pockets fortune sentenced to 5 months

LOS ANGELES — Michelle

Janavs, heiress to a frozen foods fortune, was sentenced Tuesday to five months in prison for paying \$100,000 to fix her daughters' college entrance exams and agreeing to pay twice that amount to sneak one girl into the University of Southern California by misrepresenting her as an elite beach volleyball player.

Janavs, a resident of Newport Coast, pleaded guilty in October to conspiring to commit fraud and money laundering, admitting she paid William "Rick" Singer, a Newport Beach college admissions consultant, to rig ACT exams for her daughters and bribe a USC administrator to misrepresent the older girl's athletic skills.

The five-month term, handed down by U.S. District Judge Nathaniel M. Gorton, came short of the 21 months federal prosecutors had requested. They wanted an enhancement for what they called an abuse of trust, saying Janavs used her status as trustee of her daughters' school, the Sage Hill School in Newport Beach, "to insulate herself from the fraud."

In addition, she must pay a fine of \$250,000, perform 200 hours of community service and remain on supervised release for two years.

Janavs, the 15th parent sentenced in the admission scandal, was among four parents who reversed their not-guilty pleas last year after learning they would likely be charged with bribery.

Woman who smuggled rhino horns fined \$2,000

LOS ANGELES — A woman convicted of participating in an Orange County-based

scheme to smuggle the horns of endangered black rhinoceroses across the globe was sentenced this week to three years' probation and a \$2,000 fine, according to the Justice Department.

Nhu Mai Nguyen's probation period includes one year of home detention, authorities said. She also was ordered to forfeit 100 blocks of gold and \$9,000 in cash seized from a safety deposit box, according to a document signed by Central Court District Judge Christina A. Snyder.

Nguyen told Snyder through a translator Monday, "I know that what I've done is wrong. If your honor would forgive me for what I did," City News Service reported.

Nguyen's attorney, Mona Soo Hoo, could not immediately be reached for comment.

Nguyen is among six people who pleaded guilty in 2012 for taking part in an international smuggling ring, based in the Orange County city of Garden Grove, that sold black rhinoceros horns to Vietnam and China between 2011 and 2012. Some believe the horns have medicinal powers.

Assange lawyers dispute U.S. claims

LONDON — Lawyers for imprisoned WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange on Tuesday disputed claims that he was responsible for the release of unredacted U.S. cables con-

taining the names of secret U.S. sources.

The U.S. Justice Department is seeking the extradition of Australian citizen Assange, 48, for conspiring with former U.S. military intelligence analyst Chelsea Manning to leak a trove of classified material in 2010.

Lawyers for the U.S. government told Monday's first day of an extradition hearing that WikiLeaks' circulation of unredacted cables had put sources in Afghanistan and Iraq at risk, adding that some of the sources had since "disappeared."

Expert blind spots

Stamina is a factor in major tournaments. Today's deal arose in the Reisinger Teams at the end of the 10-day Fall NABC, and everybody was tired.

South's jump to 3NT was quite a gamble. West led the jack of spades, and South took the king and had nine winners — but no way to reach the ace of diamonds. He ran his hearts, and West threw two clubs, all three diamonds and two spades. East let go three diamonds and a club.

LAST SPADE

At Trick Nine, South exited with a spade. West cashed three spade tricks, and East, a top expert, had an aberration when he pitched his king of diamonds (it looked like a loser) and then a club. At Trick 12, West led his nine of clubs, but South played low from dummy and had his ninth trick.

Clearly, West could have kept one more spade. And if East saves the A-10 of clubs and king of diamonds, West's last spade winner squeezes dummy. East-West win the last two tricks.

As it happened, East loses the deal even if he beats 3NT. In the replay, his teammates were minus 300 at five hearts doubled.

DAILY QUESTION

You hold: ♠ 9 2 ♥ 8 7 3  
♦ A J 9 8 7 5 ♣ K 3. Your partner

opens one spade, you respond 1NT and he rebids three spades. What do you say?

ANSWER: This case is close. Partner promises about 16 high-card points with a good six-card suit. You have spade tolerance, a side ace and a possible ruffing value in clubs. Raise to four spades, especially if your side is vulnerable, with more to gain. The contract may depend on a finesse, but such is life.

# Recipe: A creative spin on beans and greens

Joe Yonan is the first person to admit that he's a bean guy.

The Washington Post food editor has written a number of vegetarian-friendly cookbooks in the past 10 years, but his latest, "Cool Beans: The Ultimate Guide to Cooking with the World's Most Versatile Plant-Based Protein, with 125 Recipes" (Ten Speed Press, \$30), focuses on what is clearly his favorite subject.

Red beans, black beans, spotted beans, tiny beans, oblong beans. If you can think of a bean, Yonan has cooked with it, and he's compiled years of knowledge into a celebration of this nutrient-rich ingredient that he argues can be substituted for meat in every dish where meat appears.

He offers general cooking advice — e.g., cook a pot of beans every week to use a little each day and don't ever ever throw out the cooking broth — as well as specific techniques to bring out the best of each variety. He orders specialty beans, such as the borlotti or cranberry beans called for in this recipe, on the internet, usually through Rancho Gordo (ranchogordo.com), but higher end grocery stores are starting to

carry other brands, such as Elegant Beans or the Idaho-based Zürsun.

## ORECCHIETTE WITH BORLOTTI BEANS, BITTER GREENS AND LEMONY BREAD CRUMBS

The idea for this dish comes from New Jersey chef Michelle Fuerst, who calls the combination of pasta, beans and bread crumbs her "triple carb threat." Bread crumbs are an essential element of so many great pasta dishes, adding that irresistible crunch that here balances the creamy borlotti (aka cranberry) beans and the al dente pasta. An unorthodox addition is a little red miso, which provides the salt and umami you'd get from, say, anchovies.

¼ teaspoon kosher salt, plus more to taste  
¼ cup plus 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, divided  
1 cup panko-style or other dry bread crumbs  
2 tablespoons finely grated lemon zest  
1 pound dried orecchiette or other pasta shape

1 yellow onion, chopped  
3 cloves garlic, chopped  
6 cups lightly packed baby bitter greens, such as baby kale, arugula, mizuna, radicchio or a mix  
2 cups cooked borlotti (cranberry) beans, drained and liquid reserved  
1 tablespoon red miso  
½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper  
1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice  
½ teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes (optional)  
Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil.

While the water is heating, in a medium skillet, preferably nonstick, over medium-high heat, heat 2 tablespoons of the olive oil until shimmering. Add the bread crumbs and cook, stirring frequently, until browned, 3 to 5 minutes. Transfer to a small cup and stir in the lemon zest and the ¼ teaspoon of salt.

Add the pasta to the boiling water and cook for 1 to 2 minutes less than the package directions, until al dente.

While the pasta is cooking, in a large deep skillet with a lid, or a Dutch oven, set over medium heat, heat the remaining ¼ cup oil until shimmering. Add the onion and garlic and cook, stirring, until soft,

about 6 minutes. Add the greens, cover and cook, tossing occasionally, just until wilted, 3 to 4 minutes. Uncover and stir in the beans. Turn off the heat and cover to keep warm.

When the pasta is cooked, drain it in a colander, reserving 1 cup of the cooking water.

In a small bowl, whisk the miso with a little pasta cooking water and stir it into the bean mixture. Add the pasta, tossing and stirring it into the beans and greens. Add more of the cooking water and/or bean cooking liquid, as needed, to moisten the pasta and create a little sauce. Stir in one-third of the bread crumbs and the pepper. Taste and add more salt, if desired.

Transfer the pasta to a large serving platter or individual shallow bowls or plates, and top with the remaining bread crumbs. Drizzle (or squeeze) the lemon juice over the top and sprinkle with the red pepper flakes, if desired. Serve hot. Serves 6.

## Culinary SOS: We've cracked the code on an eggless frittata

*My husband and I absolutely love the chickpea frittata at Go Get Em Tiger. We've tried to replicate it at home at least 10 times but it's never the same. The GGET version is crispy on the outside, soft on the inside and the veggies have the perfect flavor. Can you find out the recipe and technique for how to make this come out so perfect?*

Turns out, this (vegan!) frittata contains just five ingredients: chickpea flour, shallots, kale, tomatoes and olive oil.

Mostly, it requires a little patience. Anyone can nail the basic techniques — caramelizing vegetables, whisking batter, searing baked frittata slices — but this dish takes time to mimic the taste and texture of a custardy frittata without any eggs.

Shallots caramelize slowly so they sweeten and soften without burning. After kale wilts in the skillet, tomatoes get a turn so they stay plump. The vegetables alone nearly fill the loaf pan, which is why this frittata packs so much flavor. What binds it all together is a chickpea batter that needs a long bake in the oven to firm and an overnight chill to set and mellow to an egg-like taste.

That wait is worth it. The next

morning — and after that too — the cold loaf slices easily into neat golden squares dotted with tomatoes. Seared in hot oil, each piece becomes crackly on the outside and tender within. It's delicious on its own or with a green side salad or toast.

### CHICKPEA FRITTATA WITH TOMATOES AND KALE

1 hour 45 minutes, plus overnight chilling. Makes one 9- by 5-inch loaf.

½ cup plus 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, plus more  
6 medium or 3 large shallots, thinly sliced  
Kosher salt

1 bunch Tuscan kale, stems discarded, leaves cut into 1-inch pieces

1 pint cherry tomatoes, halved  
Freshly ground black pepper  
1½ cups chickpea flour  
Heat the oven to 350 degrees. Coat a 9-by-5-inch loaf pan with nonstick cooking spray. Line the bottom with parchment paper and spray the parchment.

Heat 2 tablespoons olive oil in a large skillet over medium-low heat. Add the shallots and a pinch of salt and cook, stirring often, until caramelized, 7 to 9 minutes. Raise the heat to medium, then add the kale and a big pinch of salt. Cook, stirring, until wilted,

2 to 3 minutes. Remove from the heat, add the tomatoes and a pinch each of salt and pepper, and fold until evenly mixed. Pour into the prepared loaf pan and spread evenly.

Whisk the chickpea flour and 2½ teaspoons salt in a large bowl. Add the remaining ½ cup olive oil and whisk to combine. Add 1¼ cups water in ¼ cup increments, whisking well after each addition to keep the batter smooth. Slowly pour into the pan over the vegetables. Tap the pan to eliminate air bubbles, then cover the pan tightly with foil.

Bake until set, about 1 hour. Uncover and bake until golden brown in spots on top, an additional 15 to 20 minutes. Cool in the pan on a wire rack, then turn out onto a cutting board and discard the parchment. Wrap the loaf in plastic wrap and refrigerate overnight to set.

When ready to eat, unwrap the loaf and cut as many 1-inch-thick slices as you'd like to serve. Heat a layer of olive oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium-high heat. When the oil shimmers, add the slices, spacing them apart. Cook, turning once, until browned and crisp on both sides, about 5 minutes. Serve hot.

**Make ahead:** The baked loaf can be refrigerated for up to 3 days.

## Book offers some fun facts about tonic water

When you think of quinine water do you think of stout, pink-faced British sea captains being revived by gin and tonics? "Just the Tonic: A Natural History of Tonic Water" (Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, \$25) turns that image on its ear.

Written by Kim Walker, a medical herbalist who is working on her Ph.D. on cinchona (the South American tree from which the bitter compound quinine is derived) and Mark Nesbitt, a botanist at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, the book tells the engaging and multifaceted story of the popular beverage.

They collaborated on this tonic water tale, says Nesbitt, because "there are loads of books about gin but nothing on its essential counter-

part, tonic, even though quinine (key ingredient of tonic) is a big botanical story."

Richly illustrated with botanical drawings, posters and advertisements touting the benefits of the numerous tonics made from cinchona throughout the decades, the book winds its way through the natural history and horticulture of the "fever tree," dips into malarial medicine, pharmacology and chemistry, traces the invention of "aerated" soda water and the rise of the soft drink industry, and discusses the roots of mixology, with a quick detour to the use and production of ice in beverage culture.

After several decades of popularity in India and China, gin finally comes into play as tonic's partner in Britain in the 1920s — before that the cocktail was considered a refresher in those Asian tropic climes rather than

a standard drink order.

Says Nesbitt in an email, "the gin and tonic did not evolve as an anti-malarial (we were always suspicious of that story), nonetheless the G&T is so clearly of Indian origin. I hadn't quite appreciated what the word 'tonic' in tonic water has a specific medical meaning about boosting the body's systems."

The minuscule amount of quinine in a glass of water, it seems, would have no effect on preventing or curing the disease.

"Tonics were a category of medicine that helped to strengthen and tone body systems, nerve tonics, digestive tonics, etc.," Walker said. "The important thing is that the first 'tonic waters' were not aimed at treating malaria — they were general digestives."

## Shrimp cakes extra tasty alongside homemade 'slaw

Fish cakes have many versions and types of fish used. The most popular are crab cakes. Here's a variation using bought, cooked shrimp, which takes only minutes to make. The base recipe for fish cakes usually has Worcestershire sauce, hot pepper sauce and onions or scallions. Use this recipe with shrimp or add whatever cooked fish you like.

Homemade coleslaw is a breeze with a ready-to-eat sliced coleslaw mix from the supermarket. This one tastes great the second day as well. Make extra for another meal. Or, if you're pressed for time, make the shrimp cakes and serve store-bought coleslaw to go with them.

### Helpful Hints:

- Chop the shrimp by hand or use the pulse button on the food processor. The cakes have more flavor if the shrimp is left in small pieces rather than finely chopped.

- The shrimp cakes will be delicate. Carefully turn them with a spatula.

- Any type of onion can be used for the coleslaw.

### Countdown:

- Make Quick Coleslaw.
- Make Shrimp Cakes.

### Shopping List:

To buy: ¾ pound peeled, cooked shrimp, 1 small bunch scallions, 1 bag ready-to-eat sliced coleslaw, 2 medium tomatoes, 1 jar Dijon mustard, 1 red onion, 1 jar reduced fat mayonnaise, 1 small bottle Worcestershire sauce, 1 bottle hot pepper sauce, 1 bottle distilled vinegar, 1 small container panko crumbs, and 1 small whole grain bread. Staples: canola oil, eggs, sugar, salt and black peppercorns.

### SHRIMP CAKES

Recipe by Linda Gassenheimer

¾ pound cooked, shelled shrimp  
3 tablespoons reduced fat mayonnaise  
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce  
Several drops hot pepper sauce  
4 scallions, thinly sliced  
2 tablespoons Dijon mustard  
Salt and freshly ground black pepper  
2 egg whites  
1 cup panko crumbs  
1 tablespoon canola oil  
2 slices whole grain bread

Coarsely chop shrimp with a knife or in a food processor. Add the mayonnaise, Worcestershire sauce, hot pepper sauce, scallions and mustard and mix to combine the ingredients. Add salt and pepper to taste. Blend in egg whites. Shape into 4 cakes about 4 inches in diameter. Place panko crumbs on a plate and season with salt and pepper to taste. Place shrimp cakes on the crumbs, carefully turn them making sure both sides are coated with crumbs. Heat oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium heat. Add shrimp cakes and cook 5 minutes. Turn and cook 5 minutes. Place bread in a toaster oven or broiler to warm for a few minutes. Serve shrimp cakes with coleslaw and bread.

Yield 2 servings.

### QUICK COLESLAW

2 cups ready-to-eat sliced coleslaw  
½ cup thinly sliced red onion  
2 tablespoons distilled white vinegar  
1 teaspoon sugar  
Salt and freshly ground black pepper  
2 tablespoons reduced-fat mayonnaise  
2 medium tomatoes, sliced

Add coleslaw and onion to a large bowl. Add the vinegar and sugar. Toss well. Add salt and pepper to taste and mix again. Add mayonnaise and combine ingredients. Add more salt and pepper, if needed. Place on 2 plates and arrange sliced tomatoes on the side.

Makes 2 servings.

# Reject Trump's justice meddling

The rule of law is essential to the enduring strength of the nation and its economy.

Voters should keep that in mind as they consider whether to reelect President Donald Trump, whose efforts to undermine the judicial system's legitimacy are deeply troubling.

This is not a partisan issue. Attacking the courts and hyper-politicizing prosecution is intolerable regardless of who is in office.

In recent weeks, Trump smeared the courts, pardoned a rogues' gallery of notorious law-breakers and prodded prosecutors to go easy on a thuggish crony caught lying to Congress. Then he declared himself chief law enforcement officer. Where is the widespread outrage that helped check overreach by past administrations — are Americans too worn down to care?

Six Trump associates and campaign leaders have now been convicted of crimes, including lying and deceiving Congress. These are not petty crimes. They were not prosecuted because of a liberal conspiracy or witch hunt by Democrats; rather, they were prosecuted by federal attorneys in the Trump administration.

Roger Stone, the latest crony sentenced to jail, was found guilty of seven felonies, including obstructing a congressional investigation, making numerous false statements to Congress and witness tampering. The latter included threats to kill a witness and his dog, including a message that said "prepare to die, (expletive)." Stone also threatened the judge, posting a picture with rifle crosshairs added.

After prosecutors suggested a seven-year jail sentence, Trump tweeted that was "horrible and very unfair" and "cannot allow this miscarriage of justice!" There should be no dispute that what was horrible was Stone's behavior.

As if on cue, Attorney General William Barr withdrew the recommendation. The department then told the judge "far less" prison time "would be reasonable" — prompting four prosecutors to resign from the case, including one who quit the job. Barr later complained about Trump's tweets, saying they "make it impossible for me to do my job and to assure the courts and the prosecutors in the department that we're doing our work with integrity."

So even Barr is saying Trump's going too far. Though Barr could also be trying to avoid going down in history as a toady. Perhaps he should have intervened before the higher sentence was recommended.

U.S. District Judge Amy Berman Jackson ultimately sentenced Stone to 40 months for his criminal behavior.

"If it goes unpunished, it will not be a victory for one party or another; everyone loses," Jackson said during sentencing.

At this point, Trump and his supporters cannot deny that his inner circle during the tainted 2016 campaign included multiple criminals and liars. They were prosecuted on his watch, by his administration.

Rather than disavow or condemn the crooks, Trump is attacking the justice system and undermining the rule of law. That causes lasting harm in pursuit of his short-term political gains.

Voters should consider what this all says about Trump's judgment and values, not to mention how it reflects on the country.

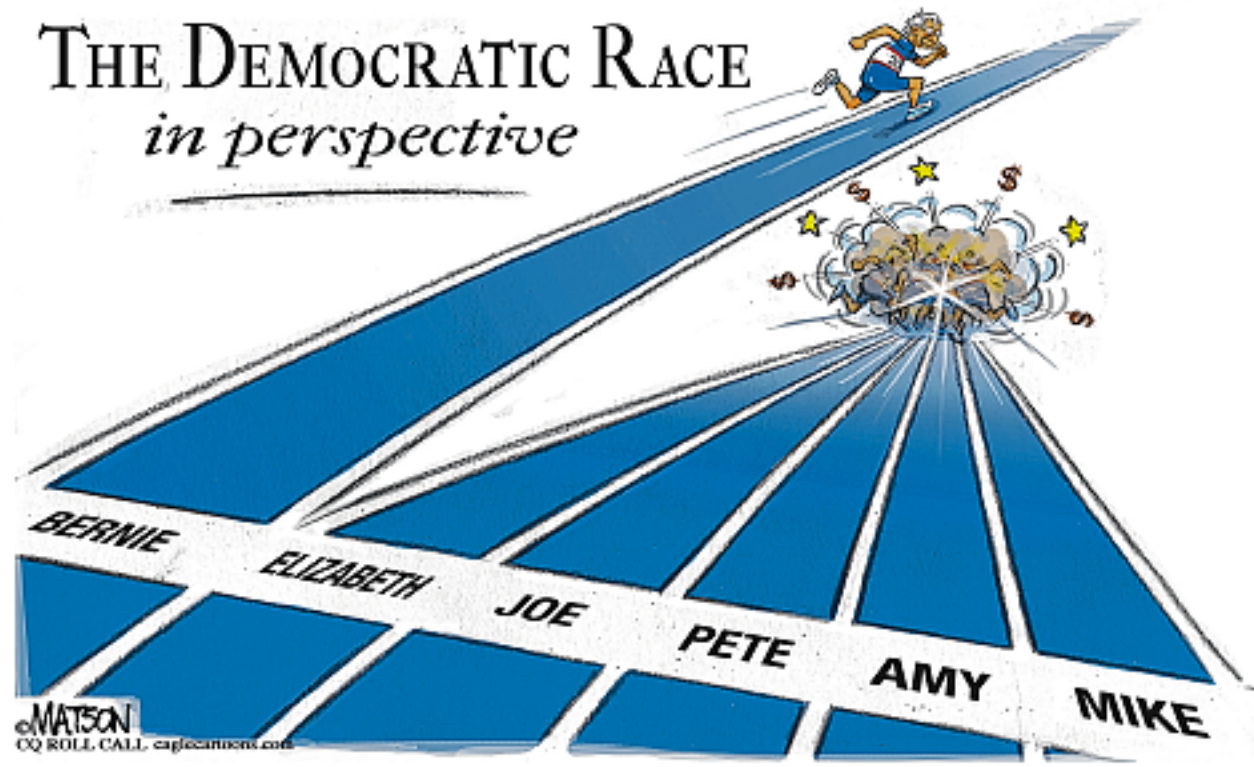
It's one thing to elect an unconventional president who shakes things up. It's something else altogether to elect one who knocks down pillars of government to deflect attention from his pals' criminal behavior.

This year's election is time to consider what core values transcend partisanship. Is it worth winning a fight to lose what we're all fighting for?

## 'Ethnic food' photo op hackneyed

During a third-grade lesson on Latino culture, my teacher assigned me a Spanish name: Francisco.

I never thought that information would be of use to anyone, so I've never shared it. But Democratic presidential candidate Amy Klobuchar thought differently last week when she proudly told a group of workers from the Nevada culinary union that, when she was in the fourth grade, "Me llamo Elena."

In the video, the largely Latino audience responded with deafening silence. Pundits and social media posters quickly accused Klobuchar of pandering to Hispanics, or "Hispandering." It was the latest example of what has become a familiar political tradition among people of color: laughing at the cultural blunders of presidential candidates.

Over the years, candidates' attempts to reach people of color have gifted us with a long and hilarious highlight reel of cultural gaffes, starting with Gerald Ford biting into a tamale — still wrapped in its husk — during his unsuccessful 1976 presidential run. Last year, then-South Bend, Ind., Mayor Pete Buttigieg stumbled with Latinos by admitting to enjoying salsa mixed with ranch dressing. And in 2016, we got the unexpectedly poignant existentialism of Hillary Clinton staring down a cup of boba tea in Flushing, N.Y.

I've always found these awkward outreach efforts terribly outdated and embarrassing for all parties. Who is swayed by these gestures — the occasional mangled words of Spanish, or the hackneyed "ethnic food" photo op?

They seemed to be premised on some bizarre assumptions. If Klobuchar gets grass jelly in her half-sweet, no-ice boba tea, does that mean she understands Asian American youth culture? Should future candidates practice eating tacos? And what guarantee is there that these attempts will amount to anything more than a photo op?

I decided to visit some Los Angeles eateries popular with presidential candidates and see if I could find anyone whose vote was swayed by appeals like these. I also asked people what kind of outreach they would choose, if they had the chance to give the campaigns some advice.

I started at Dulan's on Crenshaw, a cafeteria-style soul food restaurant that has hosted Joe Biden and former President Obama.

Last year, Biden donned an apron and helped serve breakfast to a group of community leaders there. Reginald Ridgeway, longtime pastor of the Faith Way Missionary Baptist Church, wasn't aware of the visit. Still, he's a Biden supporter, and he appreciates that the former vice president decided to spend time talking to members of the community.

Knowledge of African American culture and eating soul food — these things weren't as important to him as spending the time, Ridgeway said.

"You don't have to eat our food. I'll eat my own food. Just listen to us ... give us a genuine feeling that you hear what we have to say," Ridgeway said. "We can eat at a Taco Bell if we get that."

Ridgeway thinks the stakes are too high in this year's elections to worry about cultural gaffes and who said what to whom. He'd love to see a female president someday and believes in many progressive causes, but his main priority is electing anybody who isn't President Trump.

"The only reparations I need is being true to the Constitution," Ridgeway said.

Barbara Melancon and Willimae Fulton, two social workers having lunch, also appreciated that candidates took time to stop by. But they were tired of symbolic gestures of solidarity.

"We've seen so many candidates come here and do this, but once they get into the office, they just forget us," Melancon said.

"We should hold them to a higher standard," Fulton said. "It's 2020. Time is up for these traditional politics. I'm supposed to vote for you just because you enjoy our culture? Nah," she said. "It's all about what are you going to do."

My next stop was King Taco #10 in Pico-Union, where Clinton, Biden and many others have made stops. Biden ate some tacos here last year, accompanied by Mayor Eric Garcetti.

Jesse Ramirez, a recent USC graduate, didn't remember Biden's visit. He appreciates when candidates try to speak Spanish and show an interest in Latino culture. Still, he's going to cast his vote based on policy.

"They're trying to reach out," Ramirez said. "Effort is good but that doesn't mean they get my vote."

But Rudy Lico, 20, was mostly unimpressed.

"We're not all about tacos," Lico said. My last stop was Mr. Boba in Koreatown, where last year Biden met with Korean American community leaders over a cookies-and-cream milkshake with boba. Aaron Vallejo, 29, said Biden showing up in Koreatown "surprised the hell out of me."

"To see this kind of person come here, it's really rare. It kind of puts Koreatown on the map," Vallejo said.

At the end of my presidential campaign food crawl, I felt differently about these cultural gestures. Just because they are symbolic doesn't mean they can't be powerful, said Karthick Ramakrishnan, professor of political science at UC Riverside.

There's a generational divide in the way these messages are received, he said. To college-educated, second-generation or younger Americans like myself, these gestures are often condescending and reductive. But to immigrants and those who rarely feel inclusion in U.S. politics, even clumsy and awkward attempts to reach out are seen as long-awaited signs of respect and inclusion.

"It sends the signal that your culture, your community, your food, is American too," Ramakrishnan said. "It suggests that immigrants don't need to assimilate, that the candidate is comfortable with the prospect of a multicultural nation."

And research shows these gestures do help garner votes, said Rudy Alamillo, assistant professor of political science at Western Washington University.

In an analysis of 2016 presidential candidate Jeb Bush's appeal among Latino voters, Alamillo and his co-author Loren Collingwood found that Bush's identity-based strategy was one of the most influential factors. Cross-racial mobilizations — things like speaking Spanish, emphasizing that he has a Mexican American wife and commercials depicting Bush eating Mexican food — were a more powerful factor than even party identification or ideology.

The efficacy of these appeals, Alamillo said, allows Republicans to go after Latino votes without meaningfully supporting causes and issues that Latinos care about.

"They can run ads in English saying we'll build a wall and favor mass deportations," Alamillo said. "But in Spanish, they'll just make identity-based appeals. It allows them to run two different campaigns at the same time."

We're headed toward a future in which racial politics will become a regular part of political campaigning. Winning elections in an increasingly diverse country will require many kinds of cultural appeals. But if our votes can be easily bought with gestures of respect and inclusion, we lose the chance to advocate for the causes most important to us.

I have to admit I would be highly entertained by the sight of future presidential candidates trying to suck the meat off chicken feet at dim sum, but I want so much more than that. And so did a lot of the people I spoke to.

Ramirez proposed a "King Taco Town Hall" where presidential candidates would answer questions posed by customers and locals for an hour, rather than primarily addressing cameras and gathered media.

Melancon suggested that the candidates sit down with gang members to draw attention to the roots of crime and poverty.

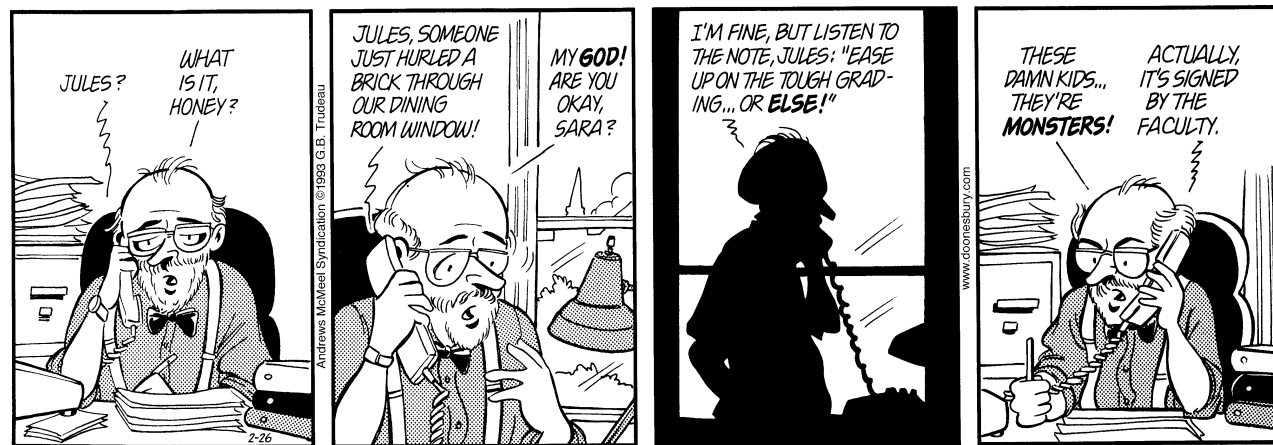
Fulton said she'd love to see a presidential candidate shadow some social workers for a day to highlight the mental health crisis and flaws in the safety net.

Fulton also suggested campaigns hand out free school supplies in impoverished neighborhoods to point out the fact that schools in black and Latino neighborhoods receive unequal funding.

To me, all these suggestions sound far more practical and convincing than what any presidential campaign has tried. They show that it's possible to convey symbolic cultural meaning as well as highlight substantive and meaningful issues.

And no one has to choke on a tamale.

# CDC: Coronavirus spread in U.S. inevitable

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has advised communities to take precautions in the event that the coronavirus spreads — something officials believe to be inevitable.

“Ultimately, we expect we will see coronavirus spread in this country,” CDC Director Nancy Messonnier said. “It’s not so much a question of if, but a question of when.”

Messonnier advised parents to talk to schools about the possibility of internet-based learning in the event that COVID-19 spreads and students would need to refrain from attending classes in a school building, and for businesses to think about how to use teleconferencing meetings in the event that employees would need to work from home. Messonnier said officials would also need to consider

whether large community-based events would need to be canceled in such an event.

There is still no vaccine for the virus, which has killed more than 2,700 people — mostly in mainland China. Though the CDC’s mandatory quarantine prompted health officials to scramble and has stirred growing fears within communities, it is one of the few tools officials believe can mitigate the spread of the disease.

Messonnier reminded people to take proactive steps in washing their hands and cleaning exposed surfaces. She also reiterated that despite fears over coronavirus, the flu still poses a greater risk to the public.

There are currently 53 cases of confirmed coronavirus in the United States — 40 of those are repatriated individuals from the Diamond Princess cruise ship.

Stock prices plummeted for the second consecutive day as investors grew increas-

ingly skeptical that the virus would soon be contained, thus raising prospects that the outbreak could do further damage to the global economy.

The Dow Jones industrial average, which had skidded 1,032 points Monday, dropped an additional 879.44 points Tuesday to 27,081.36 for a decline of 3.2%. The blue-chip average now has dived 8.4% since setting a record high Feb. 12.

The S&P 500 fell 3% on Tuesday and the Nasdaq composite index lost 2.8% in the worst selling on Wall Street since the fall of 2018. Stocks of companies involved in travel, energy and consumer goods continued to take the worst hit amid fears of a slowdown in consumer spending and demand for crude oil and gasoline.

The price of crude on U.S. markets dropped 3% to just under \$50 a barrel. American Airlines Group fell 9.2%, Marriott International lost 8%, American Express Co. fell 5.7% and Exxon Mobil

Corp. dropped 3.8%. As they fled stocks, many investors continued buying U.S. government bonds, further sending the bonds’ yields lower.

The yield on the benchmark 10-year Treasury note fell to a record low 1.34%. There’s also speculation that the Federal Reserve might have to cut interest rates in response to any virus-sparked slowdown in economic growth. Richard Clarida, vice chair of the central bank, said in a speech Tuesday that while the U.S. economy currently “is in a good place” and that “U.S. inflation remains muted,” the Fed is “closely monitoring the emergence of the coronavirus.”

He said it was “still too soon to even speculate about either the size or the persistence” of a virus-related economic disruption, but “if developments emerge that, in the future, trigger a material reassessment of our outlook, we will respond accordingly.”

## Talks underway in Congress on ‘Retirement 2.0’ savings package

WASHINGTON — Republicans and Democrats have begun discussing a new round of retirement savings legislation centered on House Ways and Means Chairman Richard E. Neal’s proposal to require businesses with at least 10 employees to offer retirement plans and automatically funnel a portion of their workers’ pay into savings.

Backers, including insurers and other investment providers who will gain new customers, say the requirement will fill the biggest gap in America’s workplace retirement system: small businesses, who often don’t have the wherewithal to bear the costs and administrative burdens of setting up 401(k)-style plans. Such plans have tax benefits that outside savings plans do not, and also often come with the added bonus of an employer match.

Most workers who don’t have access to workplace plans work for smaller firms, analysts say. Absent individual savings, these workers could have to rely in part on Social Security’s average annual benefit of less than \$18,000 to get through retirement.

Workers without a company-backed savings plan can make tax-deductible contributions of up to \$6,000 this year to a traditional Individual Retirement Account — \$7,000 for individuals ages 50 and older — or to a Roth IRA, to which an individual can make nondeductible contributions that are tax-free

upon withdrawal.

But those tax benefits are limited based on income, whereas contributions to a workplace savings plan are tax-deferred — or tax-free withdrawals in the case of a Roth 401(k) — regardless of income. In addition, workers can contribute much higher amounts: up to \$19,500 in 2020 to a 401(k)-type plan, plus an additional \$6,500 catch-up contribution for those ages 50 and older.

The default option under Neal’s proposal would be a Roth, which costs the government less upfront since taxes are taken out first, but ultimately it costs more decades down the road because the built-up savings aren’t taxed again. With a tax-deferred account, the Treasury takes in less in the early years but gets its cut when workers retire.

The American Council of Life Insurers, a trade group, estimates Neal’s auto-enrollment plan would provide access to workplace plans for 30 million workers. Workers can opt out of participating, but ACLI estimates 22 million are likely to enroll, cutting in half the size of the workforce that currently doesn’t have the opportunity to build up assets in an employer-sponsored plan.

Neal, D-Mass., told CQ Roll Call that he has started talks with Ways and Means ranking member Kevin Brady, R-Texas, on a “Retirement 2.0” package — the first installment was a suite of incentives that became law late

last year, including tax credits for small firms that set up workplace plans. Neal said he expects the automatic enrollment measure to be the key feature, though other measures would be added. Neal said he spoke late last year with Senate Finance Chairman Charles E. Grassley, R-Iowa, about a new bill as well.

Both Neal and Grassley said last year that they expected a second retirement package to emerge once the first had become law. Another bill authored by Senate Finance members Rob Portman, R-Ohio, and Benjamin L. Cardin, D-Md., which among other provisions would allow companies to make matching 401(k) contributions for employee student loan payments, could also be fodder for the new package.

“I would prefer that we tailor it around direct retirement savings, but to get things done sometimes you have to expand, not contract,” Neal said.

Neal’s auto-enrollment provision is “the known centerpiece” of “an active negotiation,” said Armstrong Robinson, vice president of legislative affairs at the Association for Advanced Life Underwriting.

“We think it is the perfect, powerful build on the foundation of” the smaller 2019 retirement savings law, said Susan Neely, ACLI’s president and chief executive. “We know the huge area of need is employees in small businesses who have not had access because it’s not as easy or affordable.”

## Trump declines to condemn India’s anti-Muslim law

NEW DELHI — Wrapping up a two-day trip to India, President Donald Trump declined Tuesday to condemn India’s new citizenship law, which discriminates against Muslims, and downplayed the threat from the coronavirus, which has spread rapidly around the globe, claiming it’s “very well under control in our country.”

At a news conference in New Delhi, the normally opinionated president appeared visibly uncomfortable and tentative at times as he tried to deflect thorny questions about India’s religious violence and the guilty verdict in New York for former Hollywood mogul Harvey Weinstein on rape charges.

When asked about the verdict and whether justice was served, Trump, who has faced numerous sexual misconduct allegations, instead discussed Weinstein in personal and political terms, claiming that Michelle Obama “loved him” and that Weinstein wanted Hillary Clinton to win in 2016.

“I was never a fan of Harvey Weinstein,” Trump said. “He said he was going to work hard to defeat me in the election. How did that work out?”

Asked specifically by a reporter to deliver a message to “women in America who are still afraid to come forward and share their stories of sexual harassment and assault,” Trump, an avid watcher of television news, claimed he had not paid close attention to the trial while he was in India. Weinstein was convicted of rape and a felony sex crime Monday in New York.

“I don’t know the actual results,” Trump said. “From the standpoint of women, I think it was a great thing and it sends a very strong message.”

Trump was also asked numerous times about the growing threat from the coronavirus, which has panicked the world and roiled financial markets.

Trump tried to downplay the threat, claiming it’s “very well under control in our country” and that people infected in the United States “are getting better. They’re all getting better.” The reach of the deadly virus has increased quickly and there is no known cure or vaccine.

Saying he didn’t want to say anything to overshadow his “fantastic” trip to India, Trump declined to criticize Prime Minister Narendra Modi’s new citizenship law, which excludes Muslims and has helped fuel a new wave of communal violence.

Ten people have been reported killed in Muslim-majority neighborhoods north of the capital since Sunday. The clashes began between protesters in favor of the law and those against it, but the violence quickly took on religious overtones, with Hindu and Muslim mobs fighting each other.

The law passed by India’s parliament last year prioritizes citizenship for Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists, Jains, Parsis and Christians while excluding Muslims.

Trump, asked several times about Modi’s support for the new law, praised the Indian leader.

“He wants people to have religious freedom,” Trump insisted. “They have really worked hard on religious freedom.”

Trump appeared to back Modi’s concern that the majority-Hindu country is being overrun by Muslims.

“He told me, I guess they have 200 plus, 200 million Muslims in India, and a fairly short while ago, they had 14 million,” Trump said.

India had about 35 million Muslims in 1951, according to the first census after independence, or about 9.8% of the population. The 201 million Muslims today are 14.2% of the population.

Later, Trump was asked again about the citizenship law. “I don’t want to discuss that, and hopefully they’re going to make the right decision for the people,” he said.

The question was awkward for Trump, who has drawn criticism for his own anti-immigrant policies, including his travel ban. The White House pitched a ban on all Muslims entering the country, but federal courts blocked that, so it was later trimmed to visa restrictions on 13 specific countries — including six added this month. Most, but not all, are Muslim majority.

## Havana gives front-page coverage to Bernie Sanders for praising Fidel Castro

While presidential candidate Bernie Sanders has created a storm of criticism in the U.S. after his recent comments on Fidel Castro, there is a place where the Vermont senator has become front-page news, and in a positive light.

That place is Havana, where the newspaper of the Communist Party prominently displayed a report about Sanders and his praise of “some of the social programs implemented by the historic leader of the Cuban Revolution Fidel Castro.”

“US Senator Bernie Sanders, today one of the strongest candidates for the nomination of the Democratic Party to the November presidential elections, recognized Cuba’s role in sending doctors worldwide,” Granma said.

The newspaper said Sanders seemed “unstoppable” in his move toward the nomination.

Granma and several state media outlets also reported the comments made by Sanders in an interview with Anderson Cooper for “60 Minutes”

on Sunday, in which the senator said it was “unfair” to say that “everything is bad” in Cuba, and praised the literacy campaign implemented by Castro shortly after he rose to power in 1959.

Castro died in late 2016. His brother Raúl currently leads the Communist Party.

But in another example of how the Communist Party censors state media, all outlets left out the senator’s reference to “the authoritarian nature of Cuba.”

Granma, which has published several reports bashing President Donald Trump, highlighted that Sanders, who calls himself a democratic socialist, supported the reestablishment of diplomatic relations with Cuba under Barack Obama and has called for the elimination of the embargo.

The report also mentions that Sanders had recognized the role of Cuba in sending “doctors all over the world,” another Castro initiative, but incorrectly attributed these comments, made during a debate in the 2016 elections, to the interview with Cooper.

## Needs Tommy John surgery

DUNEDIN, Fla. — The New York Yankees took a big blow Tuesday.

After months of testing, resting and anti-inflammatory treatments, Luis Severino was diagnosed with a partially torn ulnar collateral ligament. The right hander will have Tommy John surgery and will miss the 2020 season, Yankees GM Brian Cashman announced.

Considering that Severino first felt the soreness in his right forearm back in October, it's been a frustrating journey of months lost trying to diagnose the issue. The injury, however, did not present the normal red flags of a torn UCL and needed a contrast dye MRI and the consultation of team doctor Chris Ahmad and Mets team doctor David Alchek to finally confirm the diagnosis, Cashman said.

Severino is still deciding what surgeon will do his procedure, Cashman said, but the bottom line is that a Yankees rotation that was once considered overflowing after the signing of ace Gerrit Cole, is now looking for two arms to fill spots.

"He's out for the year, so it just, obviously, he's not a choice for us in the 2020 season so it leaves us with obviously people competing for the vacant spot," Cashman said.

Veteran left-hander J.A. Happ, who the Yankees had looked to trade this winter to try and get some salary relief after signing Gerrit Cole to a \$324 million deal, moved into a solid spot in the rotation when the Yankees announced James Paxton had back surgery earlier this month and was expected to

# Rangers beat Islanders in OT 4-3

In their first meaningful, post-deadline game in three years, the New York Rangers had newly signed Chris Kreider in the lineup, but not Pavel Buchnevich or goaltender Igor Shesterkin, who were involved in a car accident Sunday night that shook up Buchnevich and knocked Shesterkin out for at least a couple weeks with a broken rib.

So Alexandar Georgiev got the start in goal against the New York Islanders in a game full of playoff implications, and coach David Quinn moved third line center Filip Chytil into Buchnevich's spot on the right side of the top line, with Kreider and Mika Zibanejad.

But Georgiev always plays well against the Islanders, and he did again Tuesday, making 42 saves to keep his team in it until Mika Zibanejad's goal, 28 seconds into overtime, gave the Rangers a 4-3 win that inched them that much closer to a playoff spot.

The Rangers, who were outplayed much of the night, took a 3-1 lead when Brett Howden scored his eighth goal of the season at 9:34 of the third period. An apparent Islanders goal was waved off for goaltender interference with 7:44 remaining in regulation, and after the Island-

ers challenged the ruling, and failed to get it overturned, the Rangers had a power play that gave them an opportunity to ice the game.

But they failed, and the Isles got goals by Jordan Eberle, at 14:23, and then, with the goaltender pulled for an extra skater, by Brock Nelson, with 17:9 seconds left in regulation, to force the overtime.

The win was the eighth in nine games for the Rangers (34-24-4), who set a franchise record with their eighth straight road victory. It also was their third victory in four games against the Islanders. The Rangers are four points behind Columbus for the second wild-card spot in the Eastern Conference.

## MAPLE LEAFS 4, LIGHTNING 3

TAMPA, Fla. — For the first time in almost two years, the Tampa Bay Lightning have lost three games in a row. The return home after a bad loss in Arizona wasn't enough to help Tampa Bay, which fell to Toronto.

The last time the Lightning lost three in a row was to New Jersey, Arizona and Boston in March 2018. It wasn't a streak this year's team wanted to match. To make matters worse, the Lightning lost Steven Stam-

miss at least the first month of the season. At that point, lefty Jordan Montgomery, making a comeback from 2018 Tommy John surgery, seemed like the frontrunner for the fifth spot.

Now, Happ and Montgomery would be the third and fourth starters behind Cole and Masahiro Tanaka.

The Yankees will look internally for a fifth starter right now, because the trade and free agent markets are nearly nonexistent before the

June draft. Free agent starters still not signed include Clay Buchholz, Andrew Cashner, Jason Vargas and Matt Harvey.

"I mean, we're always constantly looking for upgrades anyway. This time of year you always look from within and give opportunities for what you have," Cashman said. "That's how it shakes out, especially until after the June draft regardless. So, you rely on your depth. I wouldn't say expect any domino effect or cause and effect in terms of us being able to go to marketplace where a marketplace typically this time of year doesn't exist."

So the Yankees will be looking at guys already in their camp: some-

times a starter and sometimes a reliever Jonathan Loaisiga and prospects Michael King and Deivi Garcia. They also have veteran pitchers who were also invited to camp like Chad Bettis and David Hale. Domingo German, who went 18-4 last season, is serving 63 games of an 80-game suspension under the domestic violence policy to start the season, or he would be an obvious contender.

Cashman and the Yankees now have to hope someone steps up and takes the job.

"That's what you go through spring training for: people get the opportunities," Cashman said. "The beginning of spring training perfor-

mance isn't something that you're really gauging as much as health and getting a workload, built in and then with the second half the spring you start to really try to get a laser focus on who, especially in the beginning of the season is going to join your club as you move north.

"Clearly with losing Paxton and losing Sevy. We're going to be in a situation where we're gonna have to really rely further on what we already have," Cashman said. "I can't fast forward and tell you how that's gonna play out just yet. We're certainly hopeful that we have a lot of talented hungry personnel wanting to make a name for themselves."

There is no denying this is a big

loss for the Yankees, who extended Severino's contract on a four-year, \$40-million deal last spring. The 26-year-old was 42-26 with a 3.46 ERA over parts of five seasons in the big leagues. He struck out 589 batters over 530 innings pitched.

But now, Severino has pitched just 20.1 innings in the first two years of his new contract because of injuries. He pitched just 12 regular-season innings in 2019 after dealing with right rotator cuff issues and then suffering a grade 2 strained, or partially torn, lat muscle.

# Judge: Giants will listen to offers for pick

INDIANAPOLIS — New York Giants head coach Joe Judge gave an NFL draft nugget during his press conference at the combine. The Giants are open to trading down from the fourth overall pick, according to Big Blue's rookie head coach, but nothing is set in stone this early in the game.

"We don't have to do anything, but we'll listen to anything," Judge said of flipping the No. 4 pick for more draft assets. The Giants are in an advantageous position picking so high in the draft. If a team wants to trade up for Alabama quarterback Tua Tagovailoa or Oregon quarterback Justin Herbert, the Giants are in a prime spot to trade down with a quarterback-needy team.

The Giants do not have a third-round pick this year after they traded for Leonard Williams in the middle of last season. So acquiring more picks to fill a roster riddled with holes is a sound idea. Judge comes from the Patriots, who have been notorious for trading down in the draft.

"It depends on who's available at that time, what you think their value is," Judge said. "If you don't think there's someone worth taking at that point and you can gain maybe more assets, there's value in that. So look, everything's on the table as far as options. We'll listen to everybody ... We don't have to do anything just because we're listen-

ing to somebody. But our ears are open right now and we'll be open to whatever's out there to offer."

That's a bit of a contrast from how Dave Gettleman has run the draft in the past. Gettleman has shown the tendency to stay where his draft slot is and select the top player on his board. Surely, discussions surrounding trading down will be explored between now and the first round.

There is one area where Judge and Gettleman are definitely aligned: taking the best player available wherever they wind up making their selections in the draft.

"I think with the age of the team right now and where we're at, there's a blanket just to look to add as many good players as we can," Judge said. "So whether it's building the line or the secondary or skill players, you've got to have enough people at the position that it gives you versatility and depth. But we're at a point right now in the program where I don't think there's any one position we're targeting. It's really let's look at everything as a whole."

Gettleman echoed those same sentiments about collecting the best talent on the board.

"We're gonna take the best player," Gettleman said. "More often than not, when you draft for need, you're gonna make a mistake."

Whoever the best player is left on the board for the Giants, it's safe to assume they will be a member of the team. At this point in time, the Giants haven't solidified who

is going to be on their big board.

"As far as evaluating the tape, you've got to create more hours in the day if that makes sense," Judge said. "You gotta be clear on how you're managing your time ... At this point we've gotten through all the free-agent prospects. I haven't watched everybody in the draft yet, but I've got a snapshot of the players through talking with the scouts and getting their reports."

Gettleman is aware the Lions are actively shopping the third pick in the draft, hoping to receive a ransom of draft picks for a team that's thirsty for a quarterback. "I

mean, they've announced they're open for business," Gettleman said. "That third pick is, as Joe would say, beachfront property. We'll see. Of course what they do will affect what we do. Absolutely."

If the Giants stay at fourth overall and a team trades up to the third pick for Alabama quarterback Tua Tagovailoa, they'll be in a prime position to land Ohio State cornerback Jeffrey Okudah, Auburn defensive tackle Derrick Brown, or Clemson linebacker/safety Isaiah Simmons. In the event that they trade down into the lower areas of the top 10, they have a slew of offensive tack-

les to choose from to solidify the protection. Iowa's Tristan Wirfs, Alabama's Jdrick Willis, Georgia's Andrew Thomas, and Louisville's Mekhi Becton will all be worthy candidates.

The Giants, again, are in the advantageous position of picking near the top of the draft. If they can maximize their asset allocation they'll be in a good position to improve upon their 4-12 record from a season ago.

At the very least, Judge and Gettleman seem to be on the same page in regards to their thoughts on the draft.

## Free agent Brady dominates talk during combine

INDIANAPOLIS — Welcome to the 2020 NFL combine — a place where no one can escape Tom Brady rumors, speculations or questions.

"Brady 2020 watch" has been in full effect since the Tennessee Titans defeated the Patriots in the AFC wild-card round. Instagram posts have been overanalyzed. Real estate rumors went off the rails. Even a photo of Brady talking to Las Vegas Raiders owner Mark Davis, at a UFC event nonetheless, briefly set the internet on fire.

That brings us to this week in Indy.

The NFL Network reported that Brady's agent Don Yee will talk to the Patriots this week about a potential contract. There are also rumors out there that teams like the Raiders, Tennessee Titans and Los Angeles Chargers are interested in the future Hall of Fame quarterback.

On Tuesday, several NFL coaches and general managers were asked about Brady. Not everyone was willing to comment, but not everyone shied away, either. For example, Tampa Bay Buccaneers coach Bruce Arians was asked what quarterbacks he'd be willing to pick up the phone and call when free agency starts on March 18.

"Tom Brady," Arians said. "Philip [Rivers] is another guy. We'll see."

The hottest rumors about Brady have linked the Titans, Raiders and Chargers.

Tennessee makes the most sense. Brady is friends with head coach Mike Vrabel, his former teammate. The Titans general manager, Jon Robinson, came from the Patriots organization. Plus, the Titans are ready to win now. As far as the rumors go, the Titans brass wasn't willing to speculate.

"Tom's a teammate, a former teammate. He's a friend. He'll all ways be a friend," said Vrabel. "I know with like a lot of people, he'll do what's best for him and his family. Whatever that may be, I'm not sure."

"Players that are under contract that aren't on our team, I can't comment on those guys," Robinson said when asked about Brady. "I won't comment on those guys. But we're just working through the process here at the combine and whenever that time opens up when we can negotiate with other players, regardless of what position they are, whenever that window opens up, we'll attack that just like 31 other teams attack it."

The Raiders are an interesting fit. As they move to Las Vegas, someone like Brady could help bring in fans. Of course, they would need to bring in more help to ensure Brady isn't walking into a team that's not ready to compete. It's also unknown how Brady would do in coach Jon Gruden's system. There's also a big

elephant on the wall — Derek Carr. The Raiders quarterback is signed for three more seasons.

On Tuesday, Raiders GM Mike Mayock praised Carr, but didn't completely close the door on moving on to a new quarterback.

"Derek played at a high level last season. I'm very happy with Derek," Mayock said. "But as I've said before, we will evaluate every position on our roster and if there's a chance to upgrade, we will look into that."

The Chargers are in a similar situation to the Raiders. They need to put fans in seats and Brady would help with that. They have solid offensive weapons with Keenan Allen, Austin Ekeler and Mike Williams. However, they'd need to show Brady that they could compete following a 5-11 season.

With Rivers not returning, Los Angeles needs a quarterback. Could it be Brady?

"When it comes to all free agents right now, since they're all on other teams, I don't think it'd be real good for me to comment specifically about players that are out there," said Chargers GM Tom Telesco. "Obviously, we know [Brady]'s a good player. But I wouldn't talk about any specific free agents that aren't free agents yet until March 18."

"I don't know. Just rumors, I guess," added Chargers head coach Anthony Lynn. "I don't know. All options on the table for us though."

Brady was a hot topic on Tuesday. Some GMs and coaches didn't want to touch the topic, like Colts GM Chris Ballard and Jets coach Adam Gase. Broncos GM John Elway said he hopes Brady stays in Foxborough. Former Patriots assistant coach Brian Flores, now the head coach of the Miami Dolphins, said he didn't think Brady would want to go to the Dolphins.

"I don't want to speculate. That's what it is right now," Flores said. "A lot of speculation, a lot of smoke-screens."

Until Brady signs somewhere, that won't end.

### MAHOMES WON'T NEED KNEE SURGERY

From the moment Patrick Mahomes shooed away a cart in Denver to the moment he propped to his feet and walked to the locker room without assistance to the moment medical tests indicated he escaped serious injury, a best-case scenario unfolded for an NFL franchise quarterback, and eventually the franchise itself.

It continues.

Mahomes will avoid surgery on the dislocated kneecap he suffered during a game in Denver, Chiefs coach Andy Reid said. Mahomes missed two weeks with the injury, which occurred in October at Denver.

"He's fine," Reid said before later adding, "I think our doctors did a great job with that — [head athlet-

ic trainer] Rick [Burkholder], his whole crew, handled that the right way. I think that was important."

In most cases of dislocated kneecaps, according to doctors who spoke to The Star this season, high-performing athletes can put off surgery initially but later opt to repair the medial patellofemoral ligament (MPFL) with an operation.

The structure of Mahomes' right knee, however, is sound, according to tests conducted after the Super Bowl. He has already begun training this offseason, reuniting once again to Bobby Stroupe, his childhood trainer who owns the APEC gym in Fort Worth.

Upon the kneecap's dislocation, Mahomes remained stationary, as teammates and even the Chiefs' owner feared his season would be done. But immediate tests inside the locker room in Denver showed no further significant ligament damage. Within a week, he had returned to practice. Within two more, he returned to games. Within months, he hoisted the Vince Lombardi Trophy.

And now he marches on — progressing to an offseason workout program the same month he was named the Super Bowl LIV most valuable player. He opts for limited time off.

Recently, he was throwing footballs to wide receiver Dez Bryant, who is trying to work his way back into the NFL.

"Pat handled it the right way," Reid said. "Pat had the right mentality. He didn't miss a practice — because he didn't want to miss a practice. We were the bad guys, pushing him down."

### RHULE WANTS NEWTON

New Carolina Panthers coach Matt Rhule made it clear that he wants a healthy quarterback Cam Newton on Carolina's roster.

Rhule spoke to the media at the NFL combine for the first time since his introductory press conference. He praised Newton's work ethic in his attempt to return to full health for the first time in two years and continued to emphasize that the team does not know exactly what the future holds.

"Oh yeah, absolutely. I absolutely want Cam here. There's no doubt about that," Rhule said when asked if he saw Newton on the roster in September. "Again, I'm going to be very methodical about the way I do things. That makes me kind of boring sometimes, I get it. But at the end of the day, it's all about what's next for us. We have to make sure that we continue to get him healthy. And he's doing a great job of that, I want to make sure I say that — he's going above and beyond in that regard. When healthy, there's no doubt about who he is or what he can do. We just have to get him there."

Rhule wouldn't commit to New-

ton being the Panthers' starter in Week 1, but said that philosophy applied to every player on the team — not just quarterback; everyone has to earn their place, prioritizing keeping the feeling of competition among all of the players on the roster, regardless of how things stood last year.

"I think it's really important to me as I go in there that first year, I want to create a culture of competition. I want to create a culture where nothing's promised to anybody," Rhule said. "I think in years two and three, maybe it'll be a little bit different. But that being said, I don't think that has anything to do with Cam. That just has to do with overall philosophy."

He added that Newton has been doing a "great job" of getting himself ready to return to play: "We haven't really seen a healthy Cam in two years. ... I don't really care if he's full speed until September."

Rhule also pointed out that the Panthers have to do their part in getting Newton back to full health, along with what the quarterback has been doing, and specifically said that bringing him back "slowly" would be part of the process they have for him.

When asked on the subject two weeks ago, owner David Tepper kept the topic strictly to his health, despite Newton expressing that he would "absolutely" be in Carolina for the 2020 season during the week prior to the Super Bowl.

"I'm not a doctor. I've said it a million times, is he healthy? And [Newton's] not a doctor, there's a lot of different things that can happen. But first, is he healthy?" Tepper said. "Tell me that and then we can talk."

Considering Tepper's recent comments, Rhule was asked if the owner was on the same page in his feelings towards Newton.

"We all have to assess the health of every player we have. I think there's tremendous alignment from Dave to [general manager] Marty [Hurney] to myself," Rhule said. The good part about being the coach is I get to coach the guys. The other guys have different roles. As the coach, I want to coach Cam. I want to get him healthy. ... I think there's no question within our organization about the alignment, in terms of Cam or any other player in terms of where we're at."

A report from NFL Network early Tuesday said much of what was already known about the team's situation. Newton is on the road to recovery and he has been in the team's facility this offseason. A potential trade of the franchise quarterback has always been complicated by his injury.

Newton missed all but two regular-season games in 2019 due to a Lisfranc injury in his left foot he suffered during the team's third preseason game against the Patriots. He started the first two games

of the regular season, both losses, but didn't play again after he and the team decided it made the most sense to try and get fully healthy following his experience with a shoulder injury. He has had two shoulder surgeries, and it especially impacted him during the second half of the 2018 season.

The Panthers placed Newton on injured reserve Nov. 5 and he had surgery Dec. 9 after evaluating his options. The quarterback will be 31 years old when the 2020 season begins. Newton is entering the last year of his deal with the Panthers. The team would save \$19.1 million by not having him on the roster and he would be a cap hit of \$21.1 million if he is on the team.

### SPIELMAN SEES DIGGS STAYING WITH VIKINGS

Minnesota Vikings general manager Rick Spielman did his best to quash speculation about Stefon Diggs' future, saying at the NFL combine "there's no reason to anticipate [Diggs] is not going to be a Minnesota Viking."

Diggs caused a stir on social media earlier this month when he removed all pictures of himself in a Vikings uniform from his Instagram account, following a season where he incurred more than \$200,000 in fines for skipping two days of meetings and practices following the team's Week 4 loss to the Chicago Bears. His absence, sources told the Star Tribune at the time, stemmed from frustrations that had been building since the spring over the direction of the offense and his role in it.

The 26-year-old wide receiver gave an enigmatic news conference after his return, saying "there's truth to all rumors" when asked about his unhappiness, but finished the year with a career-high 1,130 receiving yards while establishing himself as one of the NFL's top deep threats in the Vikings' play action offense. His recent social media actions caused a stir, even for a player given to maintaining a cryptic online presence.

Diggs' five-year, \$72 million contract runs through 2023.

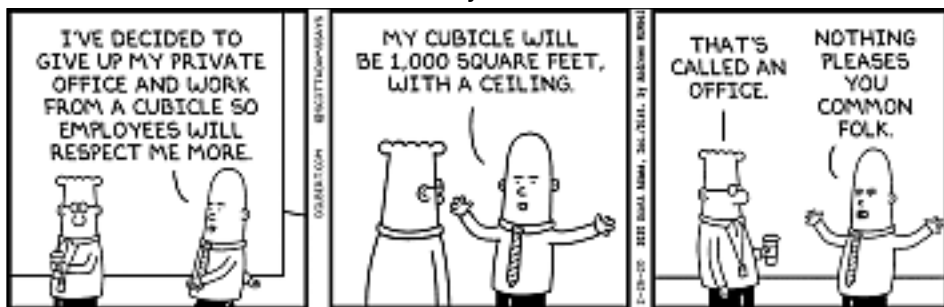
"Stefon, last year, had probably his most productive year, and he's a young receiver we just extended [before the 2018 season]," Spielman said in his first public comments since November. "He's not only a major part of our offense and a major part of our organization winning games, but he also does a lot of things for this organization off the field. There's no reason — the rumors or whatever you're talking about — to anticipate that Stefon Diggs is not going to be a Minnesota Viking. When you have some of the offensive talent that we have, with him and Thielen together, with [Kyle Rudolph] and Irv Smith, with Dalvin Cook and [Alexander] Mattison, we have a pretty good support cast around our quarterback."

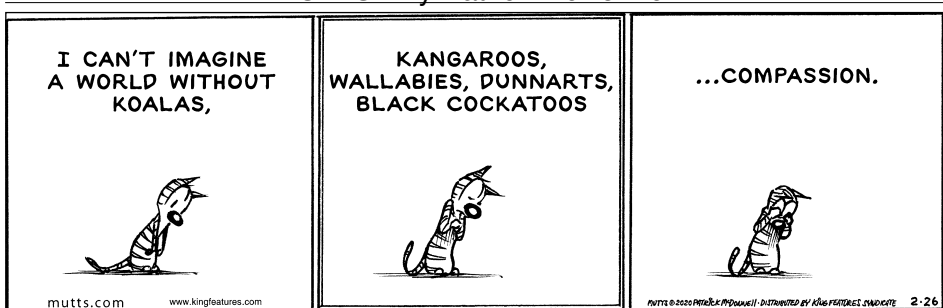

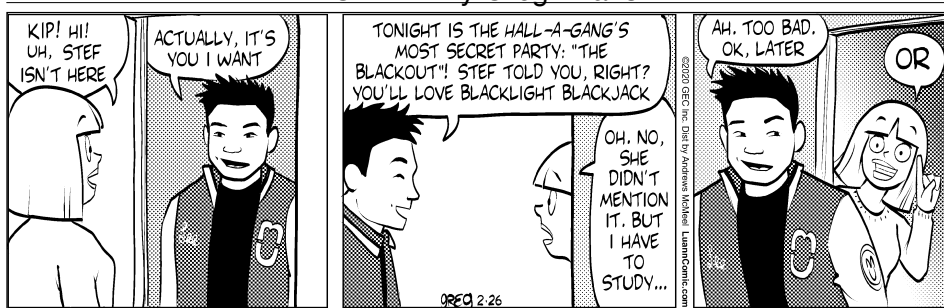

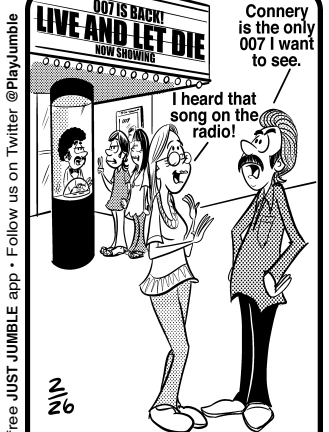

## Safety official slams Tesla, regulators for misuse of tech

The chairman of the National Transportation Safety Board slammed Tesla and unnamed “government regulators” for jeopardizing traffic safety by not taking measures to prevent “foreseeable abuse” of Tesla’s Autopilot driver-assist feature.

Robert Sumwalt, chairman of the NTSB, led off a board meeting Tuesday focused on a March 2019 fatal crash of a Tesla Model X that killed the driver, Walter Huang. Huang had Autopilot engaged and crashed into a safety barrier while playing a video game on his Apple smartphone, Sumwalt said.

“Government regulators have provided scant oversight” of Autopilot and self-drive systems from other manufacturers, Sumwalt said. He apparently was referring to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, or NHTSA, which, unlike the NTSB, has enforcement power and can recall defective cars with defective automotive technology.

In 2017, the NTSB recommended that automakers design driver-assist systems to prevent human driver inattention and misuse. Automakers including Volkswagen, Nissan and BMW reported on their attempts to meet the recommendations, but Tesla never got back to the NTSB. “Sadly, one manufacturer has ignored us, and that manufacturer is Tesla,” Sumwalt said Tuesday. “We’ve heard nothing, we’re still waiting.”

Tesla couldn’t be reached for comment.

Sumwalt also criticized drivers who use Autopilot as if it were a self-driving system. “You cannot buy a self-driving car today,” he said. “You don’t own a self-driving car so don’t pretend you do.” He warned drivers not to sleep, read, text, eat or otherwise do anything to take away attention from the task of driving while using a driver-assist system.

Families of Huang were in the audience at the Washington, D.C., meeting. Sumwalt addressed them directly: “Our goal is to learn from what happened so others don’t have to go through what you’re going through.”

The safety board picks crashes to investigate “that can advance our knowledge of safety issues.” It’s highly selective. There are millions of highway crashes in the U.S. each year. The board is currently investigating 17 crashes, three involving Tesla’s Autopilot technology.

The NHTSA, an arm of the federal Department of Transportation, is probing at least 13 Autopilot-related crashes.

Autopilot is an automated driver-assist feature sold as part of what Tesla calls a “Full Self Driving Capability” package for \$7,000 that can speed up, brake and change lanes automatically, although the driver is supposed to pay attention.

Other car companies make similar systems, though none is as technologically aggressive as Tesla’s, and none refers to “self driving,” which even at Tesla remains an aspirational term. Cars that can fully drive themselves are not being sold by anyone to individual customers today, and most industry experts say it will be years until that happens. Tesla has said the upfront \$7,000 buys current features plus self-drive features to be added over time.

According to NTSB investigators, Huang, a 38-year-old father of two, was driving his 2018 Tesla Model X on Autopilot when it sped up from 62 mph to 71 mph and plowed into a damaged safety barrier at the end of a concrete wall. The wall divides a left-hand exit ramp that veers away from U.S. Highway 101, known locally as the Bayshore Freeway.

Huang, of Foster City, had dropped off his youngest child at day care and was taking his regular commuting route to Apple offices in Sunnyvale. The investigation showed Autopilot engaged for nearly 19 minutes before the crash, and that Huang’s hands were off the steering wheel in the last six seconds.

The impact twisted the car counter-clockwise and into a freeway commuter lane to the right of the concrete wall.

Two other cars collided with the Tesla. The front end of the Tesla was sheared off. The car’s battery burst into flame. Huang was pulled out of the Model X by three men and taken to the hospital by ambulance, where he was pronounced dead.

Two major factors contributed to the severity of the Mountain View, Calif., crash. One, with Autopilot in control, the Model X drove straight down the middle of a “gore lane,” a white striped zone where cars aren’t supposed to go, crashing head-on into a flexible steel “smart cushion” that’s intended to soften the impact of a crash.

Two, the cushion already was severely damaged. After a Toyota Prius crashed into it two months earlier, the length of the attenuator was shortened, offering less protection against the 3-foot-tall concrete median wall behind it. The safety device had gone unrepaired by the California Department of Transportation, known as CalTrans, until three days after Huang’s death.

The NTSB already has recommended ways CalTrans could fix broken highway safety devices more quickly.

The ramifications of Tuesday’s conclusions following the two-year investigation are yet to be determined. The NTSB is an independent federal agency, not part of the U.S. Department of Transportation, most famous for its probes into airline disasters. It lacks enforcement power but its recommendations are considered thorough and are taken seriously by policymakers.

In a preliminary NTSB report on a January 2018 Autopilot-related crash, where a firetruck was rear-ended by a Tesla Model S on the 405 Freeway, the board laid blame on the driver’s inattention, misuse of the Autopilot system, over-reliance on Autopilot, and Autopilot itself, which the NTSB said permits driver disengagement from the driving task. No one was injured; the NTSB investigation continues.

# Bob Iger steps down at Disney

In a stunning move that marks the end of an era for one of the entertainment industry’s great corporate success stories, Bob Iger on Tuesday stepped down as chief executive of Walt Disney Co. after 15 years in the job.

Bob Chapek, a 27-year Disney veteran who most recently led the company’s massive important parks and consumer products business, was named Iger’s successor, effective immediately.

Iger has assumed the role of executive chairman, the company said. In that role, he will direct the Burbank entertainment giant’s creative endeavors and help guide the company’s board through the leadership transition until the end of his contract on Dec. 31, 2021, Disney said in a news release.

Disney’s CEO succession plan has been the subject of speculation for years as Iger delayed plans to leave the company. Other executives who were rumored as potential successors included Fox TV executive Peter Rice and Disney direct-to-consumer chairman Kevin Mayer, who recently oversaw the successful launch of streaming service Disney+.

Nonetheless, the timing of the announcement came as a surprise in the industry because Iger still has 20 months left on his contract and he has relished his role as one of America’s most successful CEOs. Iger last year published a book detailing his rise through the entertainment industry and his time building Disney through key acquisitions, including Pixar, Marvel and, most recently, 21st Century Fox.

In a conference call with analysts, Iger explained the sudden timing by saying he wanted to allow Chapek time to get a handle on all aspects of the company before he steps away for good. Just in the last 12 months, Disney has become an even bigger behemoth with the \$71.3-billion purchase of the Fox assets, as well as the high-profile debut of Disney+, which is Disney’s all-in bet on subscription video service.

He also wanted to free himself up to focus on creative aspects of the business, he said. “I could not do that if I were running the company on a day-to-day business,” Iger said.

By naming Chapek to the CEO role immediately, Disney’s board avoids a repeat of what happened four years ago when Iger’s apparent successor, Thomas Staggs, was ousted after serving as chief operating officer.

But some company insiders and industry analysts were taken aback by the news.

“Tom Staggs left in 2016. Why is the CEO changing today?” asked Laura Martin, a media industry analyst at Needham & Co. “I don’t think they explained it well.”

Chapek has overseen a major expansion of Disney’s parks business, including the recent addition of the two ambitious Star Wars: Galaxy’s Edge attractions at Disney’s parks in Anaheim and Orlando.

“With the successful launch of Disney’s direct-to-consumer business and the integration of 21st Century Fox well underway, I believe this is the optimal time to transition to a new CEO,” Iger said in a statement. “I have the utmost confidence in Bob and look forward to working closely with him over the next 22 months as he assumes this new role and delves deeper into Disney’s multifaceted global business and operations, while I continue to focus on the company’s creative endeavors.”

In the call with investors, Iger said: “We feel this change gives us the ability to manage the company much more effectively.”

As the Burbank company’s new CEO, Chapek will directly oversee all of the company’s business segments and corporate functions. Chapek will report to Iger and the board of directors and will be appointed to the board at a later date.

Chapek has served as chairman of Disney Parks, Experiences and Products since 2018. Before that he was chairman of Walt Disney Parks and Resorts since 2015. As chairman of Disney Parks, Experiences and Products, Chapek oversaw the company’s largest business segment, with operations around the globe and more than 170,000 employees.

From 2011 to 2015, Chapek was president of the former Disney Consumer Products segment. Before that, he was president of distribution for Walt Disney Studios.

## Juul faces 39-state investigation of e-cigarette marketing to teens

NEW YORK — Juul Labs Inc.’s legal woes expanded on Tuesday as 39 state attorneys general announced a joint investigation into whether the top U.S. e-cigarette maker is marketing its addictive nicotine products to children.

The probe will also examine Juul’s claims about its products’ nicotine content and their effectiveness in helping long-time smokers quit, the states said in a joint statement. The bipartisan effort is being led by Connecticut, Florida, Nevada, Oregon and Texas.

A similar coalition of states announced an investigation of opioid marketing in 2017. Many of those states — along with thousands of local and municipal governments — went on to file lawsuits against major opioid manufacturers and distributors,

who are expected to pay tens of billions of dollars to settle claims.

Juul has been under fire following a surge in teen vaping and a lung-injury outbreak that sickened thousands and was later tied to THC-containing e-cigarettes.

“As Florida’s attorney general and a mother, I cannot sit on the sidelines while this public health epidemic grows, and our next generation becomes addicted to nicotine,” Republican Ashley Moody said in the statement.

Juul seeks to “earn the trust of society by working cooperatively with attorneys general, regulators, public health officials and other stakeholders to combat underage use and transition adult smokers from combustible cigarettes,” Juul spokesman Austin Finan said in a statement. “Our customer base is the world’s 1 billion adult smokers and we do not intend to attract underage users.”
