## Chief: Hudson shootings connected

HUDSON - Police continue to investigate the latest incident of shots fired that occurred on Friday night, Hudson Police Chief L. Edward Moore said Monday.

This is the fifth shooting incident to take place in Hudson since April.

Moore said he believes the shooting incidents in Hudson this year are connected.

At about 6:45 p.m., multiple police agencies responded to the 200 block of Prison Alley after receiving multiple reports of residents hearing gunshots in the area.

One building was hit by bullets, but no cars were hit that police are aware of, and there were no reported injuries in the incident, Moore said.



# Cuomo urges businesses to go vaccine-only

NEW YORK — Gov. Andrew Cuomo pressed local businesses and the private sector to only accept customers fully vaccinated against COVID-19, he announced Monday morning.

State officials have started to express concern as the delta COVID variant, which spreads more easily and rapidly than the original strain of the upper respiratory illness, causes a surge of new coronavirus infections,

hospitalizations and deaths across the state and na-

Nearly all new COVID-19 cases are tied to the delta variant. The state's infection rate jumped to 2.96% Monday, up from 1.88% one week ago.

"We have a situation, as they say, and it's a serious situation," Cuomo said Monday during a coronavirus briefing in Manhattan. "Private businesses, bars, restaurants — I am asking them and suggesting them to

## Columbia County raised to high-risk of COVID transmission

HUDSON — Columbia County is now considered to be at a high-risk level of community transmission for COVID-19, according to data from the Centers for Disease Control.

The CDC recently updated its recommended guidance for fully vaccinated people. It recommends fully vaccinated people to wear a mask in public indoor settings in areas of substantial or high transmission, which now includes Columbia County.

"The designation happened because our numbers are up," Department of Health Director Jack Mabb said. "We had a pretty busy week last week. We had 11 this morning.'

The Columbia County Department of Health reported nine cases Friday, four on Thursday, four on Wednesday and nine last Tuesday.

A number of other nearby counties are also considered to have reached a substantial level of community transmission, including Albany, Rensselaer, Saratoga, Schenectady, Sullivan, Orange and Schoharie. Last week the CDC classified Greene County at a substantial level of community risk. The current level of community transmission in Greene County has been reduced to moderate by the CDC.

"Positive vaccinated people can still pass the virus on," Mabb said. "That's why there is the recommendation to wear the masks. It's a prudent thing to do at this point."

Gov. Andrew Cuomo urged local officials and government leaders Monday to impose COVID vaccine mandates and requirements in municipalities across the state's 62 counties as virus

The state's COVID-related state of emergency, and the governor's expanded authority, ended June 25 — terminating Cuomo's ability to enact statewide coronavirus mandates, including

## Cigar shop called to comply with health law

 ${\tt GREENPORT-The\ town}$ planning board approved a proposed cigar shop and deli under the condition the cigar shop comply with a public health law.

The state public health law in question prohibits tobacco advertisements within 1,500 feet of a school.

The proposed cigar shop and lounge for 93 Ten Broeck Ave. would be 1,056 feet away from the Questar III BOCES Columbia-Greene Educational Center, 131 Union Turnpike.

The law prohibits the public display of tobacco and vaping

display of smoking paraphernalia within 500 feet of a school in New York City and within 1,500 feet in the rest of the state. The public health law is a little more than a year old. Under the law, businesses cannot have smoking advertisements in a storefront, exterior window or door used for public entry, or a structure, within 1,500 feet of a

In 2019, 7.6% of students in grades 9 through 12 were cigar smokers in the United States and 2.3% in grades 6 through 8, according to the CDC.

Roy Brown, who co-owns

product advertisements and the the building and plans to open the cigar shop and lounge, said he was aware of the law and is not worried about it. He said he does not display the products referenced in the law.

"I don't do Juul," he said on Thursday. "I don't do vape. All I do is premium cigars.'

Brown added the law is focused on those e-cigarette products, not his products.

"Basically, the law is focused on those things," Brown said. "They don't want school-age children to be exposed to tobacco products. If you were to drive
