
## **Delaware Employment Trends**

After peaking at 8.4 percent in late 2009 and early 2010, Delaware's unemployment rate fell more or less steadily until the end of 2011, when it hit 7.2 percent. Since then it has plateaued, remaining in a narrow range of 7.0 to 7.3 percent. A stable unemployment rate does not mean that the economy is not growing. It can also come about when job growth and labor force growth are roughly equal. Since November 2011, the state's labor force has grown by 3,400. The number of employed residents has risen by 3,700, and the number unemployed has fallen by 350. The population of residents 16 years old and over is estimated to have risen from 714,900 to 725,500 during that time. Growth in the working-age population could keep the unemployment rate relatively high for an extended period, even with relatively strong job growth.

The unemployment rate and employment growth referenced above refer to state residents. A separate measure of jobs at employers within Delaware shows stronger job growth. From the end of 2011, when the unemployment rate entered its current plateau, jobs in Delaware have increased by 7,600. In a small state with a good deal of commuting to work across state lines, the two measures can move independently for long periods. We would expect that if the current rate of job growth in the state continues, the unemployment rate among residents will eventually resume moving lower to a more normal level.



#### **Delaware Labor Force Trends**

- Delaware's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in May 2013 was 7.2%, up from a revised 7.1% in April 2013. There were 32,100 unemployed Delawareans in May 2013, compared to 31,600 in May 2012. The U.S. unemployment rate was 7.6% in May 2013, up from 7.5% in April 2013. In May 2012, the U.S. unemployment rate was 8.2%.
- In May 2013, seasonally adjusted nonfarm employment was 425,100, up from 424,000 in April 2013. Since May 2012, Delaware's total nonfarm jobs have increased by a net gain of +7,100, a rise of 1.7%. Nationally, jobs during that period increased 1.6%.



## Delaware Over-The-Year Job Change May 2012—May 2013


