Festival of Trees returns Dec. 3-4 to support local children

EXETER — Plans for the 27th annual Festival of Trees (FOT), one of Exeter's most anticipated holiday events, are currently underway. This year, the event will be held from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 3 and 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 4, at Exeter Town Hall, 10 Front St. Admission is free.

Proceeds from the Festival of Trees benefit the Community Children's Fund (CCF), providing warm winter clothing to local children in need. Since it began in 1998, the FOT has helped to raise almost \$800,000 for the CCF. A record of \$55,138 was raised at last

year's event and 870 children received vouchers for warm coats, hats, mittens and blankets.

"The Festival of Trees is truly a community celebration," says Bonnie Galinski, co-founder of the event. "It's a chance for families to come together, enjoy the beauty of the season, and make a real difference for local families.

Supporting this holiday tradition, are Arjay Ace Hardware, with their donation of all the live trees, Panacea Products for their donation of all the tree stands, bankprov, Chinchburg Properties, Exeter Hospital, Piper's Property Management, Tim Graham

Tire and Auto, BMW of Stratham, Cummings, Lamont & McNamee, Edward Jones-Heidi Hebert, Light-house Credit Union, Nathan Wechsler and Company, Phillips Exeter Academy, River Woods, Service Credit Union, The Cheney Companies, Best Choice Windows, and many more.

Each year, fifty beautifully decorated evergreen trees fill the Exeter Town Hall, creating a spectacular and magical holiday display. The trees are uniquely designed by local businesses, organizations and individuals and are auctioned off to the highest bidders. Organizers will, once again, be using an online bidding platform for the silent auction.

Co-founder Jan Russell says that the online bidding system has worked very well over the past few years. "Visitors can bid on their favorite trees in person, enjoy the holiday festivities and then monitor the status of their bid from the comfort of their homes."

In addition to the tree auction and underwriter donations, funds are raised through decorator registration fees, a raffle tree, donations at the door, and the ever popular cookie room.

This year's event will also include performances by the Exeter High School Chorus, the a capella group "The Afternotes" and Kevin Joyce.

Exeter's annual Block Party will be taking place on Dec. 4th as well. The event will feature downtown shopping, arts & crafts, musical performances, the "Deck the Halls" Art Show, the Gingerbread House Competition, the much anticipated arrival of Santa Claus and much more.

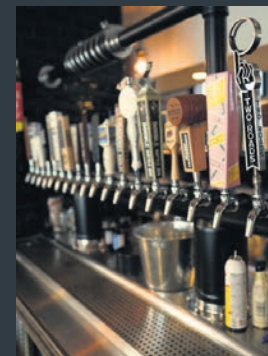

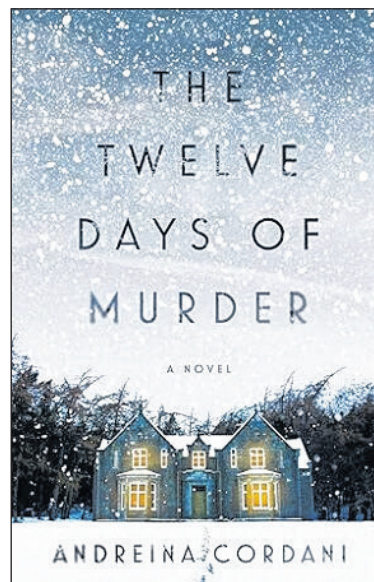

Opportunities abound for fall and winter anglers

NH Fish & Game

CONCORD — Late-season diehards and winter anglers in the Granite State have had some trout stocked especially for them. The New Hampshire Fish and Game Department stocks certain waterbodies to bolster fall and winter fishing opportunities in a variety of locations.

Fall and winter anglers chasing trout can find lists of waters that remain open to the taking of these fish all year on the Fish and Game website:

- For lakes and ponds, visit www.wildlife.nh.gov/fishing-new-hampshire/trout-fishing-new-hampshire/nh-lakes-and-ponds-stocked-trout-and-open-year.

“We stocked yearling rainbow trout into several lakes in mid-October so that anglers who want to get out on the water this fall have some exciting fishing opportunities” said NH Fish and Game Inland Fisheries Program Supervisor John Magee. “These are Akers Pond in Errol, Cedar Pond in Milan, Big Diamond Pond in Stewartstown, Pearl Lake in Lisbon, and Streeter Pond

in Sugar Hill. In November, we also stock post-spawn brook and brown trout into selected waterbodies that don’t have a closed season.

These fish can range from 2 to 3 pounds each. Some annual locations include Tewksbury Pond in Grafton, Manning Lake in Gilmanston, and Pleasant Lake in Deerfield. Numbers, dates, and stocking locations vary annually so we always recommend that anglers check the interactive stocking map. I would encourage anglers of all skill levels to take advantage of these and other stocked opportunities throughout New Hampshire.”

NH Heritage Museum Trail taps community expertise

STATEWIDE — When history needs saving, museums on the New Hampshire Heritage Trail call on the community.

“Preserving history requires partnering with those who understand both historical techniques and modern applications,” said Jeff Barraclough, President of the New Hampshire Heritage Museum Trail.

One example of this collaboration is taking place at Strawbery Banke Museum, where the restoration of the historic Penhallow-Cousins House became a multi-generational project. Kevin Hart, owner of Hart Plumbing and Heating, and his son Hunter, recently installed a century-old hot water system in the house—a hands-on act of preservation that bridges technology and tradition.

“Hunter and I have been working together since he

started when he was 19, which was 7 years ago, but he always came with me growing up,” said Kevin Hart. “Working with my son is the best thing a father could ask for in business.”

When they were approached about the project at Strawbery Banke in Portsmouth, Kevin thought it would be a great opportunity to work with his son. “It’s not very often that a father and son get to work together, and I take pride in that,” he said.

The c.1910 hot water system, a copper tank with a coil inside heated by either gas or kerosene, was discovered in a local basement. “Watching Kevin and Hunter work together is a reminder that history isn’t just about objects or buildings,” noted Linnea Grim, President and CEO, Thomas W. Haas Endowed Chair of Strawbery Banke Museum.

“It’s about people, relationships, and the stories we pass down,”

According to Barraclough, projects like these exemplify a core aspect of The Trail’s mission, which is “to preserve the skills and relationships that built New Hampshire communities. “This partnership model extends across all our member institutions, ensuring that New Hampshire’s history is preserved by the very people and families whose ancestors created it,” he said.

In addition to Strawbery Banke Museum in Portsmouth, member institutions on the New Hampshire Heritage Museum Trail are located in New Hampshire’s Lakes Region, White Mountains, Merrimack Valley, and Seacoast. To learn more about any member institution on The Trail, visit www.nhmuseumtrail.org.

Off-road vehicles can now be registered online

New Hampshire Fish and Game

CONCORD — OHRV enthusiasts hoping to register their machines for the 2025-2026 season and beyond may now apply for their registrations online.

OHRV stands for Off-Highway Recreational Vehicle. It is a broad term for a mechanically propelled vehicle used for pleasure or recreation off public ways or roads, including All-Terrain Vehicles (ATVs), Utility Terrain Vehicles (UTVs), and dirt bikes

Online registration applies only to traditional annual OHRV and snowmobile registrations and can be enjoyed by residents and nonresidents alike. There are, however, some special conditions to consider for those wishing to apply to register their machine virtually:

- The vehicle is not legally registered until receipt of

the registration and decals via USPS.

- Operation of the vehicle is prohibited until the registration and decals have been received through the mail and the decals are placed on the machine. A minimum of 5 business days may be expected for processing, and the registrant will, in addition to registration fees, be charged for all associated processing, mailing, and credit card fees.

- Temporary OHRV registrations will not be available online.

- Permanent registrations for antique snowmobiles will not be available online.

The development of an online OHRV registration platform has been a collaboration with the NH Snowmobile Association and the NH Off-Highway Vehicle Association to help make riding in New Hampshire more convenient for residents and visitors.

Please note that the New Hampshire Food Bank is not equipped to accept donations of bear meat, fowl, or wild game birds such as duck, goose, turkey, or grouse.

"We are counting on continued support from hunters who have been very generous in the past," said Dennis Gichana, Director of Operations for the New Hampshire Food Bank.

"This year, our protein donations are down 10 percent from last year, so the contributions from the Hunt for the Hungry program will fill an even bigger need this fall. Venison is especially popular and a real treat for our clients. Last year, the deer meat we received went out as fast as it came in! As always, we want to thank New Hampshire's hunters for their continued support. We couldn't do what we do without them."

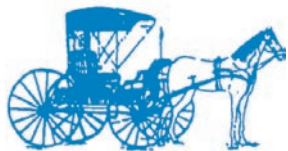
