

## Fort to froggers, a Revolutionary past

A seaside stroll through Marblehead will provide plenty to do on a summer day—especially for those seeking ties to the American Revolution as the state celebrates the war's 250th anniversary this year.


The roughly 200 historic 18th-century homes lining the weaving streets of Marblehead give a scenic glimpse into the life of colonists as war broke out with England in 1776. While the town mainly commemorated its links to the Revolution with events this spring, the Marblehead Museum has compiled a list of addresses where Marblehead Loyalists and Patriots once lived or gathered that

can be viewed today.

That list is available on the museum's website (https://marbleheadmuseum. org/250resources/), along with more information about the town's American Revolution history.

The most notable home on the list is the Jeremiah Lee Mansion on Washington Street, open to visitors each summer and early fall.

The Colonial Georgian home was built in 1768 by Lee, the wealthiest merchant and shipowner in Massachusetts at the time. He used his Spanish trading contacts to smuggle weapons and ammunition into Marblehead and nearby towns as tensions grew with England. Lee was also a





colonel who led the town's rebel militia and an elected leader who dealt directly with the British military governor.

In Abbot Hall on Washington Street, the town hosts the famous "Spirit of '76" painting created by Archibald MacNeal Willard during the centennial celebrations of the Revolution in 1876. The depiction of two drummers and a fife player in the Patriot army can be viewed by the public in the Selectmen's Room.

After a stop at the mansion and Abbot Hall, visitors can taste the same molasses cookie colonial Marbleheaders and sailors enjoyed centuries ago. Named the Joe Frogger, the cookie is sold at some shops downtown and was originally created by Old Black Joe Brown and Aunt Crese, who ran a tavern on Gingerbread Hill.

The town also boasts connections to the War of 1812. Marblehead's Fort Sewall helped protect the USS Constitution from British ships


#### The Etchells sailboats compete during a past Helly Hansen NOOD Regatta in Marblehead.

in 1814 and the site can be explored by visitors today.

Fort Sewall also was where many family members watched for signs of their men coming home from sea, as Marblehead once had a robust fishing industry that thrived through the 1800s.

Marblehead Light at Chandler Hovey Park helped guide home many of these ships after it was built as a brick and wood lighthouse in the 1830s. A new lighthouse with a metal structure replaced the original in 1895 and is still spotted by boats along Marblehead's coast today, like the many yachts that come for the town's world-famous race each summer.

The annual Marblehead Race Week competition, first held in 1889, draws more than 200 boats to town each year in the last week of July for the event's Junior Race Week and Helly Hansen Sailing World Regatta Series. #### **Marblehead Festival of Art**

## CHAMPAGNE, MUSIC AND LOTS OF ART

The Marblehead Festival of Art returns July 3-6 with a lineup of music acts, art exhibits and family-friendly activities to kick off the summer.

The four-day event opens with its annual Champagne Reception fundraiser at Fort Sewall on Sunday, June 29, at 5p.m., where participants can taste an assortment of wines while listening to live music.

The festival's Concerts at Crocker Park series starts on Wednesday, July 2, at 6 p.m. and runs each afternoon and evening through July 5.

Artwork by local artists will be on display at downtown venues including Abbot Hall, The Old Town House, King Hooper Mansion, St. Michael's Church, Old North Church and the Unitarian Universalist Church from 10 a.m. to 4 or 5 p.m. between July 3 and 5, depending on the location.

An artist awards ceremony will be held Wednesday, July 2, from 6 to 7p.m. at the front entrance of Abbot Hall.

An artisan market will take place at the upper grounds at Abbot Hall on Washington Street from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.



## Salem

# A seaside city full of maritime history



You can start off your summer visit to Salem strong with a visit to Picker ing Wharf, the city's premier waterfront shopping, dining and lodging destina tion located directly on Salem Harbor.

The popular attraction, home to the Salem Waterfront Hotel & Suites and the Pickering Wharf Marina, is designed to embody the authentic feel of a New England village. There is much to do sprinkled in between history and land marks. Visitors can browse through more than 20 shops and boutiques, and even do some antiquing. Options for waterfront dining abound, with many top-rated restaurants to choose from. Or grab a coffee and ice cream, and watch the boats pass by.

At neighboring Derby Wharf, visitors can take in popular attractions at the Salem Maritime National Historic Site on Derby Street. One of the most popular, Salem's iconic tall ship Friendship, is in dry dock in Gloucester undergo ing the final stage of major repairs, but is expected to return sometime in July. The replica late-18th-century East Indiaman merchant ship was built by the National Park Service in the late 1990s using modern materials and construction methods, while retaining the appearance of the original ship, and was renovated in Gloucester from 2016 to 2019. The original three-masted, squarerigged, 342-ton vessel was crafted in the South River shipyard of Enos Briggs for the Salem mercantile firm Waite and Peirce. Launched in 1797, Friendship made 15 voyages — to Batavia, India, China, South America, the Caribbean, England, Germany, the Mediterranean and Russia — before its activities as an American merchant vessel ended when it was captured as a prize of war by the British sloop of war HMS Rosamond in September 1812.

În a typical year, Pickering and Derby wharves are filled with revelers for the city's annual Fourth of July extravaganza, which Salem will celebrate this year on July 4. You can bring beach blankets



and folding chairs to enjoy the 42-piece Hillver Festival Orchestra performing a evening pops concert on Derby Wharf at the Salem Maritime National Historic Site. The night also will feature a kid space play area, and fireworks launched over Salem Harbor.

Salem Heritage Days will return from Aug. 2 to 10, celebrating the city's past and present. Highlights include activities at the Community Life Center, the Ice Scream Bowl on the common, concerts at the Salem Willows and a "touch a truck" event for kids.

Meanwhile, more seaside fun can be found at Salem Willows, named for the white willow trees planted there in 1801 to create shaded walkways for patients convalescing at a local smallpox hospi tal. The 35-acre park, which opened in 1858, offers beaches, athletic courts, walking trails, arcades, a historic carou sel, food stands and more. The North Shore Concert Band will perform its annual

summer series of free outdoor concerts at the park's Robert Hayes Bandshell on Tuesdays at 7 p.m. from June 24 to July 29. This year's concert themes will be announced in late May or early June.

On the way to the Willows, you may want to stop and stroll the half-mile Salem Harbor Connector Path, which features stately sculptures created by regional artists.

And, of course, Salem is equally known for its place in the 1692 Witch Trials as for its role in maritime history. The city is home to a num ber of witch museums and landmarks, including Salem Witch Village and Salem Witch Museum. Or check out the renowned Peabody Essex Museum, home to works of art and culture from around the world, and The House of the Seven Gables, made famous by American author Nathaniel Hawthorne's novel. The circa-1668 Colonial is considered to be the oldest surviving 17th century wooden mansion in New England.

A walk through Lynch Park. A drive through Beverly Farms. A concert at The Cabot. Beverly offers plenty of ways to enjoy the summer as one of many scenic hubs on the North Shore.

Take a dip into the city's culture by attending the annual Beverly Homecoming, running Tuesday, Aug. 5, to Sunday, Aug. 10, at David S. Lynch Memorial Park. The event offers more than two dozen events, such as a lobster fest, lighthouse tour, concerts, a 5K road race and fireworks.

While at the park, take a stroll along the shore for panoramic sea views of the Atlantic Ocean and Woodbury Cove that was once enjoyed by Robert and Marie Antoinette Evens, who originally owned the site.

Their vast summer home that formerly stood on the park's grounds was one of the North Shore's finest estates. It hosted guests such as President William Howard Taft, who leased the property's Stetson Cottage as his seasonal White House in the

## CELEBRATING 60 YEARS

Beverly Homecoming will return to Lynch Park for another five days of family fun this summer, and celebrate its 60th year.

The beloved festival will run Tuesday, Aug. 5, through Sunday, Aug. 10, along Beverly's scenic coastline.

It usually includes about two dozen events for people of all ages, and will kick off with its first major event, a lip synch contest hosted by the city's recreation department, on the festival's opening day.

Homecoming will host its signature Lobster - Fest on Wednesday, from noon-8 p.m., selling boiled lobsters, lobster rolls, chowder and other food for visitors to enjoy at picnic tables or under the event's large tent while local bands liven the park with music as a way to raise money for the volunteer-run organization that puts on the festival each year.

On that Wednesday, the festival will also feature a Beer Garden from 4-8 p.m. and a Kids' Spirit of LobsterFest Costume Contest at 2 p.m.

A Senior Day in the Park and the announcement of Beverly's Senior of the Year is planned for Thursday during Homecoming and the annual

Bev FitFest, sponsored by Inner Cycle, will take place that weekend. Homecoming's annual grand fireworks finale will erupt over the park at 8:30 p.m., closing out the

festival and celebrating 60 years of community fun.

Beverly residents can park at Lynch Park for free with a resident sticker. For non-residents, parking is \$25 on

summers of 1909 and 1910, allowing him to host dignitaries and world leaders far from the sweltering heat of Washington, D.C.

The 16 acres that now make up Lynch Park was created through a \$400,000 donation from its namesake. Inspired after coming across a private park in London that denied access to most, Lynch asked that upon his death in 1942, his hometown create a public park that gives all residents access to scenic views and a pleasant outdoor space.

Using this donation, the newly-formed Lynch Park Board of Trustees purchased

the land from Beverly Hospital in 1943. The Stetson Cottage where Taft spent two summers was moved to Peaches Point in Marblehead, replaced with a tea house and an elaborate Italianate garden with rare plants and shrubs brought to Beverly from around the world.

The park is also home to a carriage house that is available for private rentals. Two beaches provide relief from the summer heat. Children can have fun on a play structure and splash pad. Picnics and small gatherings can be held on two neatly trimmed greens.


Visitors to the park can admire "The Falconer," a statue of a young man releasing a falcon that is beloved by locals and inspired by the original "Falconer" in

New York City's Central Park.

The park is open from 6a.m. to 10 p.m. Memorial Day to Labor Day. Parking for nonresidents is \$15 on weekdays and \$25 on weekends, cash only.


The 114 acres of Long Hill on Essex Street also boast beautiful gardens worth a free tour. The estate is the former retreat of the editor of The Atlantic Monthly and is known for its century-old collection of trees, shrubs and other plants. The site is open every day between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Looking for something to do inside? Peruse downtown shops on Cabot Street or grab tickets for movies, concerts or plays at The Cabot, Larcom Theatre and North Shore Music Theatre.

# Where history is not a past tense word

Essex likes to describe itself as "rural by choice."

Here, history is not a past tense word.


Here, homes look like they looked when they were built centuries ago.

Essex may only be 23 miles up Route 128 from mod ern-day Boston, but follow Route 133 to its Causeway and you will find yourself in a place that seems to exist in a time zone all its own. Dating to the 1600s, this "coastal prai rie" of scenic low-lying salt marshes stretch as far as the eve can see. As well as being beautiful, these marshes provide visitors with an incredible environmental experience and an ideal habitat for the clams for which Essex's seafood restaurants and clam shacks are famous.

Back in the days of sail, Essex built and sent fishing vessels by the thousands down the Essex River to Gloucester Harbor. And today, if you step aboard the Essex Ship Building Museum, you'll see vessels of all kinds still being built exactly the way they were back then.

Here, master shipwright Harold Burnham keeps his family's centuries of "ship-building DNA" alive in his and the museum's hard-working boatyards, where wood is still hand hewn by shipwrights, and you can watch them while they work. Two of Burnham's more recently built schooners — the Thomas E. Lannon and the Ardelle - offer unfor gettable public and charter sails daily through October on Gloucester's harbor and beyond.

Part of the Essex Historical



Cogswell Grant, 60 Spring St. in Essex, was the summer home of renowned collectors Bertram K. and Nina Fletcher Little. The 1728 farmhouse is a backdrop for their collection, assembled over nearly 60 years. While admission is required to visit the house, a walk on the grounds is free. Open June through October.

Society, the Essex Ship Building Museum is a great place to start your Essex explorations. Open to the public Thursday through Sunday from May to October, it offers tours, exhibits, educational programs, special events

and a great "eclectic" gift shop. It's also located smack in the heart of the Causeway (Route 133, also known as Main Street). a narrow strip of land with all of the Essex River Cultural District's many attractions within

walking distance.

Essex is known for serving clam lovers with freshly dug soft-shells steamed or fried, hard-shells such as littleneck and cherrystone baked or chowdered, and quahog, the largest of the hard shells, in award-winning chowders. So, you'll want to work up an appetite, and walking tours are a great way to do it.


You'll find everything from a 1797 Paul Revere bell to the birthplace of the fried clam. There are 16 sites to explore within the cultural district. Essex is known as the "Antiques Capital of America," and this tour will show you why. Dozens of shops offer everything from museum quality antiques to quaint New England classics to eclectic vintage.

As for the secrets and wonders of Essex wetland and wildlife, to see and experi ence them up close and per sonally, Essex River Cruises offers tours regularly — from 90 minutes to seven hours with narrated public sails and special offerings such as tidal beach clam bakes all through

The Essex River feeds Essex Bay, along with Castle Neck River and the Walker, Hardys and Soginese creeks, and abundant forested areas, wetlands and open spaces. And it's all yours to explore, along with the Allyn-Cox Res ervation, a portion of Crane Wildlife Refuge, the Stavros Reservation, and the Warren Weld Woodlanf.

So make a day of it. Or make a week of it. And while you're at it, make a feast of famous Essex clams while you watch the sun set on its clam flats.

## Beach, trails and mansion beckon

#### By Michael McHugh

Crane Beach in Ipswich offers 4 miles of white sand beach, salt marshes, and a pitch pine forest. The beachfront gets over 350,000 visitors annually, so tickets must be purchased ahead of time to gain access.

Part of the Crane Estate on Argilla Road, the pristine sandy beach features easy entry into the water, ample open space for sunbathing and walking, and all kinds of seaside play.

The beach is managed by

the nonprofit The Trustees of Reservations, which oversees more than 100 properties nearly 25,000 acres — all around Massachusetts. It is open year-round, from 8 a.m. to sunset daily.


Crane Beach is among the world's most important nesting sites for piping plovers, a threatened bird that was nearly hunted to extinction in the 19th century for its eggs and feathers. The Trustees of Reservations' efforts to

protect the shorebirds have been nationally recognized.

There are 5.5 miles of trails, which track the beachfront on the Ipswich Bay and Essex River Estuary sides of the Castle Neck peninsula. These are considered moderate hiking.

During the summer, there are lifeguards and rangers, a bike rack, bathhouses with restrooms and changing area, outside showers, picnic tables, a store with refreshments and merchandise, an information kiosk, and transportation for mobility-challenged visitors.

According to The Trustees website, visitors are required to reserve a Timed Entry Pass in advance for daily admission from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend. The Trustees have stopped selling parking permits and offer discounted admissions to any member without an active permit.

Through Labor Day, for

nonmembers of The Trustees, day passes during the week are \$40 per car, \$10 for motorcycles and \$5 for bikes. On weekends, the car rate is \$45, and the other fees are the same

Trustees members who do not have a year-round parking

sticker pay a discounted rate.

Beginning after Labor Day, passes are released at noon every other Thursday for the upcoming 2 weeks. Advanced passes are required for weekend admission through October.

neighboring Castle Hill on the Crane Estate, 290 Argilla Road, which is open daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission to the grounds is \$10 for adults, \$5 for children ages 6 to 14 and free for children 5 and younger.

Set against the backdrop of a 165-acre scenic countryside, the property offers a glimpse into the past of one of the nation's wealthiest families.

The land, which Richard T. Crane Jr. bought in 1910, encompasses a farm and estate buildings, designed grounds and gardens, and diverse habitats. The Great House — the centerpiece on top of the hill — is a 59-room, Stuart-style mansion. Designed by architect David Adler and built in 1928, it is furnished with period antiques.

The property is home to quite all manner of wildlife, including deer, foxes, nesting great horned owls, red-tailed hawks, turkey vultures and the occasional bald eagle.

Events this summer include a variety of tours and hikes, as well as a series of picnic concerts.

For schedules and reservations, visit www.thetrustees. org/place/castle-hill-on-thecrane-estate.

For hikers, Ipswich has plenty of trails through out Willowdale State Forest, Bradley Palmer State Park, and Sandy Point State Reservation, managed by Essex County Greenbelt. Riverbend, managed by the Ipswich River Watershed Association, provides guests with two walking trails to observe the riverside habitat, boat and kayak rentals, and 23 acres of lush nature including native plant gardens and rain gardens which the Ipswich River Watershed Association use to showcase its commitment to low impact development. Members are able to use the kavaks for free.

The Hamlin Reservation is another must-see destination for hikers with its broad salt marshes and a loop trail

around Eagle Island where bobolinks and other wildlife can be observed.

Greenwood Farm provides a mix of history and nature. The striking white farmhouse built in the 1800s and the 1694 Paine house behind it remain in their same rural locations. The historic homes are complemented by open vistas and a view of the Ipswich River estuary extending over the horizon. On Tuesdays from 6 to 8 p.m. in July and August, families are invited to take in live music on the EBSCO Takeout Terrace along the Ipswich Riverwalk off Union Street. The concerts are free, but weather dependent.

The Olde Ipswich Days fair brings together more than 60 artisans to sell their work on the town's South Village Green on County Road (Route IA).

This year is the 54th annual Olde Ipswich Days. The festival, historically, runs on the last weekend of July. Festival vendors will offer photography, paintings, jewelry, toys, and more.

The event runs rain or shine. Admission is free.

time.


That spirit is infectious. Gloucester wants you to have a good time and it goes out of its way to make sure you do.






From Stage Fort Park, stroll the vast formal gardens of the boulevard to Gloucester's most iconic landmark, the

Fishermen's Memorial, bearing the names of some 5.368 men who went down to the sea in ships, never to return.

Those names are a map of immigrant ethnicities over the centuries — English, Irish, Scandinavian, Portuguese, Italian — whose var ied cultural traditions make Gloucester not so much a typical quaint New England town as much as a singular colorful world unto itself.

On Middle Street, the heart of downtown's historic district, perfectly preserved homes and structures dating to Colonial days are hung with plaques inscribed with

the very English names of the sea captains who first built them.



museum's Poplar Street campus CAM Green, with exhibitions celebrating CB Fisk's singular, made-in-Gloucester pipe organs through June, and "Down to the Sea," feature a selection of photographs made by Ernest Blatchford during the early 20th cen tury documenting Glouces ter's fishing industry July 12 through September.

Down on Main Street, the 21st century marquee of The Cut is the latest addition to downtown's vibrant music scene, a 22,000-square-feet live concert venue that's drawing major music talent to its stage.

Music and art in equal parts are what's on out on Rocky Neck, a scenic spit of land on the working harbor

# Embracing a legacy built on the sea

Newburyport might be the birthplace of the U.S. Coast Guard, but the city is just as famous for its art, music and waterfront dining.

Although Newburyport is well known today as an attractive place to live and

visit, the city fell on hard times in the mid 20th century.

Originally the northern "Waterside" area of Newbury, in 1635 Newburyport was set tled as an agricultural enterprise by English colonists. It became a separate town in 1764 and eventually a city in

In the 18th and 19th centuries, the city flourished due to the prosperity of its shipping and fishing industries. But as those waned, the city eventually saw fewer and fewer visitors soon after World War II.

But in the 1970s,

Newburyport would become the first municipality to use federal urban renewal funds for historic preservation and created a downtown that has become an annual destination for thousands of visitors.





Art galleries, small shops, as well as an abundance of din ing and takeout options can be found in the city's bustling downtown, while Waterfront Park offers a leisurely stroll alongside the Merrimack

Designed by Robert Mills, architect of the Washington Monument and the U.S. Treasury Building, the Custom House Maritime Museum was built in 1835 to facilitate growing overseas trade and tax collection on imported goods and, today, offers visitors a trip back in time.


The Water Street museum features vaulted ceilings as well as cantilevered staircases, while displays tell of the city's seafaring past.

Fishing trips, chartered cruises, and whale watches depart regularly from the local docks, while Somers by's Landing Sculpture Park features large sculptures by New England artists at the west end of the waterfront boardwalk.

The Museum of Old Newbury is based in the Cushing House on High Street. It offers a broader history of the city while maintaining the stories of the three Newburys (Newburyport, Newbury and West Newbury) over 300 years.

One of Newburyport's most notable natives, abolitionist William Lloyd Garrison, was born and raised in an anti-slavery climate. His statue is located a block from



# Big things in a small package

Rockport is one of the most charming small towns in America.

Come for the Fourth of July and start the day with Rockport's patriotic Fireman's Parade and end it with a spectacular bonfire on the beach.

Come mid summer and bask in the magic of Rockport's sensational mid-summer signature event — Illumination Night — this year on Aug. 9, when the whole town is strung with glowing lanterns and the harbor is lit with fireworks.

Come any time of year and you'll find yourself in a town that's been dubbed the fifth most beautiful coastal city in the world by none other than Architectural Digest magazine.

A quaint little harbor town, Rockport calls to mind that old saying about big things coming in small packages. Within its 17.5 square miles are packed no fewer than two world-class performing centers, a top-tier restaurant scene, 30 art galleries, a nat ural wonder of a coastal state park, great boutique shop ping, and — did we mention what for some is the heart and soul of the place? — beaches. Five of them. One more beautiful than the next.

Tucked away up on the northernmost coast of

Cape Ann, Rockport's colorful downtown is nestled around what is arguably the most picturesque harbor in New England. Here you'll find Bearskin Neck. A finger of land jutting out into the harbor, this seaside bazaar is jammed with colorful fish shacks, shops, galleries and eclectic eateries where lobster is the main event.

Rockport Harbor is also home to what has got to be the most iconic fish shack in New England, if not the Eastern Seaboard: Motif No. 1. This barn red structure, strung with colorful buoys, is a favorite subject for plein air painters who gather rain or shine with their easels, a living vestige of the days when Rockport was a premier early American art colony.

Just up from the harbor, the venerable Rockport Art Association and Museum keeps that heritage alive and remains a hub and haven for member artists and art students, whose works line the walls of its spacious showrooms.

A little further up Main Street, you'll arrive at Shalin Liu Performance Center, an architectural and acoustical jewel of a music venue, and home to a summer concert

#### ROCKPORT ROCKS ALL SUMMER LONG

Rockport does things a little differently. Like its fireworks, for instance. Instead of doing them on the Fourth of July, Rockport does them Aug. 9. On the Fourth, what Rockporters do, and they do it in their own inimitable way, is a bonfire. A very big bonfire on the beach.

But before the bonfire and fireworks, a harbinger of summer is Rockport's weekly Farmers Market, held Saturdays, June 14 through Oct. 11, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., in Harvey Park at the intersection of Broadway and Mount Pleasant Street.

On Independence Day, the Rockport Firemen's Parade steps off rain or shine at 6 p.m. from Rockport High School, proceeds left on South Street, goes through Mount Pleasant Street, passes Dock Square, continues up Main Street and finally turns right on to Beach Street leading to Back Beach around 8 p.m.

At Back Beach, people stake out spots with blankets and beach chairs to take in an hour-long concert by Rockport Legion Band at the bandstand and the following bonfire of wood pallets piled high.

The Aug. 9 fireworks show will start at 9 p.m. from Granite Pier.

season that draws world-class talents of all genres to a stage with a signature backdrop of floor-to-ceiling glass, framing the blue waters of Rockport's Sandy Bay.

Rockport owes its name, topography, and former quarrying days to the last ice age, and nowhere is that more evident than the 70 coastal acres of Habitat Point State Park on Gott Avenue. By day, a coastal treasure of trails and marine habitats, by night this coastal promontory offers some of

the best star-gazing in New England. Also by day, its watch tower — built during World War II for coastal defense offers spectacular views.


Also at Halibut Point, and a vestige of Rockport's days as a major source of granite in 20th century America, is the old Babson Quarry, transformed by decades of rainfall into a serene pool reflecting sky and landscape.

A magical sight in and of itself, the quarry is the scene of dance performances by neighboring Windhover Center for the Performing Arts, a rural cluster of New England

# A summer to savor

#### Authentic Greek fare flavors menu at Ya Mas

As the warm weather arrives, Ya Mas Greek Taverna & Bar welcomes guests with enticing summer fare and refreshing cold beverages.

The popular farm-to-table restaurant, now in its second year at The Mall at Rockingham Park In Salem, is known for it's authentic Creek cuisine. Its a family-friendly spot where meticulously prepared Grecian delicacies are best savored over good conversation with friends and loved ones.

Embark on a culinary journey at Ya Mas, where owner Alhanasios Sioras, a first-generation Greek American, has unveiled exciting updates to his upscale scratch kitchen eatery.

The dining room now offers two distinct sections, each with its own unique offerings.

The fine dining section beckons with classic Greek entrees, such as lamb shank, gyros and souvlaki, and other timeless recipes passed down for generations, tried and tested to ensure the integrity of the cuisine is preserved.

The atmosphere at Ya Mas is flush with heirlooms and antiques hanging on the walls, a replica statue of Venus De Milo gracing the entranceway, and Grecian music softly filling the air.

The restaurant's summer menu features plenty of seafood, including a Mediterranean branzlno, fresh sardines and fried anchovies, as well as a traditional fish soup from Kalamata, the second most populous city on the Peloponnese peninsula.

Over in the lounge area, a new roster of Greek-inspired bar bites and other lighter fare is on tap for patrons to sample as they sip their favorite refreshers. Among the new nibbles are a black truffle and caramelized fig buffalo bite with lemon and dill-infused Greek yogurt spinach, feta and artichoke



dip; lamb tacos; Greek-style sliders made with Japanese wagyu beef; and Moroccan chicken wings with a pomegranate chimichurri, enhanced with the hot sweet and citrusy notes of berbere-spiced yogurt.

Step into the world of mixologist Asterios a Greek native with extensive knowledge of spirits and craft cocktails. He has concocted a tantalizing slate of drinks to serve throughout the week.

On Martini Mondays, you pay halfprice for classic, dirty. espresso and citrus drop martinis, along with cosmopolitans. Tiki Tuesdays offer \$8 mai tais, pina coladas, Blue Hawaiians an scorpion bowls. Wine Down Wednesdays feature \$7-per-glass sangria, with flavors including sour cherry and mango red, pineapple and peach white, and strawberry and grapefruit rosé. Thirsty Thursdays offer half-off whiskey-laced old fashioneds, while sparkling spritzers made with sour cherry and man o, pineapple and mastic, Aperol, or grapefruit and peach are \$7 on Spritiz Sundays from 2 to 10 p.m.

For \$14, get a two course express lunch served within 10 minutes of ordering between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. on Mondays cough Friday. Pick a Greek American salad, Greek Villaged or egg-lemon soup for the first course. Second-course choices include spanakopita (spinach pie), dolmades (stuffed grape leaves), braised lamb shank, or the Greek eggplant and meat lasagna known as moussaka.

There's a simplicity to Greek food that demands close attention to the caliber of the product. It's a naturally healthy, relatively unambiguous cuisine.

"You are meant to taste the food," Sioras says.

However, experiencing genuinely authentic Greek dining requires going the extra mile. That's why only 100% imported Greek extra virgin olive oil fills the fryers at Ya Mas, and the cheeses - made from sheep and goat milk (more velvety options than cow's milk)

Sioras uses only 100% American prime lamb from Colorado, acorn-fed Heritage Farm Duroc pork, and Bell Evans poultry.



In keeping with Greek tradition, Ya Mas sources most of its fresh produce from local farms, such as fruits and vegetables from Brookside Farms in Pelham.

For Sioras, no culinary detail is too small. "We just have very, very high quality," he says. "We're dedicated to delivering an unforgettable experience that leaves our customers coming back time and time again."

There are also gorgeous cranberry bogs.

Those looking to enjoy a lovely day at the beach will find it at Northern Plum Island Beach, which can be entered from several points along Northern Boulevard. Paid parking lots provide the best access, the largest being at the northern end of

the island, in Newburyport.

Also at the northern tip is the historic Newburyport Harbor Light, also known as Plum Island Light. Constructed in 1788 of wood with that traditional look, it's the exact image that pops into mind when we think of a lighthouse.

Anyone seeking to see the best of what nature has to offer can travel along the Atlantic flyway to the 4,700-acre Parker River Wildlife Refuge, a vital stop over point for more than 300 species of waterfowl, shorebirds and songbirds.

Administrated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the refuge was established in 1941 to provide feeding, resting and nesting habitat for migratory birds.

Folks hoping to see the historic Pink House that once sat on the refuge will no longer have the opportunity, as it was demolished in early March after lengthy efforts to save it.

The landmark had been synony - mous with Plum Island since it was first

constructed in 1925, drawing in eyes thanks to its unique pink paint job.

Much of the summer sees large sections of the beach closed off to protect the piping plover, a particularly endangered species of bird, which nests, lays eggs and raises its young in the refuge.

Closing off parts of the beach provides the small gray and white birds an opportunity to feed and nest undisturbed. All sections of the refuge are typically reopened by mid- to late August.

An entrance fee of \$5 per car or \$2 per walker or biker is in effect year-round at the refuge. An annual pass can be purchased for \$20. Pets are not allowed.

Traveling through the refuge eventually leads to Sandy Point State Reservation, 77 acres at the southern tip of Plum Island. The reservation is one of the state's most beautiful coastal beaches.

Across from the refuge entrance is Mass Audubon's Joppa Flats Education Center, which overlooks the Merrimack River and offers opportunities to explore wildlife-rich habitats.

Whether you are on your way out or in, it is worth stopping at Plum Island Air port to watch the planes take off. There you can visit a museum that chronicles the airport's history, including W. Starling Burgess' landmark 1910 flights.

Take it from none other than John Singer Sargent: Manchester-by-the-Sea is one beautiful place.

When, at the turn of the last century, the legendary artist visited his friend and renowned fellow artist, Manchester's Charles Hopkinson, he is said to have gazed out to sea and asked Hopkinson what he had done "to deserve to live in such a paradise."

Back then, Manchester which originated as a hum ble fishing village — was in its "Gilded Era" when, come summer, wealthy Bostonians fled to this North Shore paradise and built grand summer "cottages." There were yachts, private railroad cars, lavish entertaining, and servants.

But that is not the Man chester that Sargent was commenting on. What he was talking about were the coves, the islands, the sails and glit tering sea, the exquisite natural wonder of this classic New England coastal town.

With seven sandy beaches nestled in breezy coastal

Back in the heart of downtown, step out of 2025 and into 1823 at the Manchester-by-the-Sea Museum, originally the home of the legendary Abigail Hooper Trask and her equally legendary sea captain husband. Here, all is as it once was when Abigail — Manchester's own early American Martha Stewart — decorated it with her exquisite taste.

In these beautifully restored period rooms, you'll find plenty of evidence of Manchester's past as a prosperous furniture-making

center., as well as paintings and sculptures by master artists. Summer hours are Wednesday-Friday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., and Saturday,11 a.m. to to 4 p.m. Educational programs, speakers, and exhibits are always in the mix.

In Manchester, restaurants are a destination in and of themselves where the seafood's freshly caught and the dining experience runs from casual to upscale, from

The state of Massachusetts purchased the beautiful 3.8-mile sandy stretch that makes up Salisbury Beach and Salisbury Beach State Reservation in 1933 and developed it to ensure public access to the ocean.

The Department of Conservation and Recreation controls a large portion of the beach bordering private properties of summer homes and rental cottages.

Residents and visitors have fallen in love with the sea side boardwalk, which has even been featured in some Hollywood projects since it opened in 2017.

At the southern end of the property is the Salisbury Beach State Reservation, where folks have the chance to swim, boat, fish, and take in the local wildlife.

Facilities include a 484site campground, a few large parking lots for daily beach visitors, and boat-launching facilities.

Step off the beach and you will discover an array of video arcades and food stands to keep busy and entertained.
