



awoke to the sound of my iPhone alarm at 5 a.m. on a Saturday in late September.

Normally I follow my regular routine of letting the dog out, showering, exercising, and then rewarding myself with a black coffee or tea and some reading at Joe Sippers Cafe before clocking in at work around eight for the morning sales meeting.

However, this particular day was different because I was scheduled to be off of work and had made some other plans. On a trip to Alton, Missouri last year I spent some time looking over a local map for places to possibly visit in the future and I discovered a trail that leads to the point where the Missouri River flows into the Mississippi – "the finest confluence in the world," according to French explorer Father Pierre Francois de Charlevoix, who visited the spot in 1721.

I myself have always been drawn to river bottoms and have spent plenty of time exploring areas of the Embarras, Kaskaskia, and Little Wabash. So the thought of getting to do so along the Mississippi greatly appealed to me.

The bottoms are not only a great place to encounter birds and other wildlife, but they are also areas that often undergo change due to flooding. This sort of cleansing is something that us humans need for the soul now and then, and spending some time in nature is a positive way to accomplish that.

With my plan in place, I gathered my things and left my home

in Dieterich. I stopped in Effingham to pick up my cousin, and after a few cups of coffee and a pecan waffle at Niemerg's we merged onto I-70 westbound toward the big river.

North of Troy we continued west onto I-270, crossed the New Chain of Rocks Bridge into Missouri and then took the exit for Highway 367/67 North at Spanish Lake. We stayed on the highway until we turned back east onto Riverlands Way in West Alton.

Riverlands is a 3,700-acre migratory bird sanctuary that is maintained by the Army Corps of Engineers. The first building that you come to in Riverlands is the Audubon Center. I had previously read about the Center online and had the intention of visiting, but at that moment I decided to keep moving toward our

destination while it was still relatively cool outside.

After a mile and a half, the blacktop becomes Riverlands Drive and Riverlands Way cuts south and turns to gravel. We followed the road into Jones-Confluence Point State Park and along the way passed a group of people who were planting native grasses. Hundreds of butterflies flew all around us as we cruised on and after 4 1/2 miles of gravel, we finally reached the parking area at the trailhead.

The trail is a little over 1,500 feet of pavement that leads you through a wooded area and out to the point, a short trip from the car to the water. We followed the path through the woods and emerged from the tree line to see the flowing waters of the two big rivers.

I walked out beyond the pavement and onto the rocks to the very tip of the point so that I could really take in my surroundings. While standing there looking toward the south, I imagined that I was on the bow of a ship destined for New Orleans.

I thought about the importance of this spot in human history and these rivers being the original highway system on the continent, allowing for a sophisticated trading system and the growth of civilization.

The mysterious ancient cultures that resided in the area built large cities of mounds, and the later native inhabitants encountered French explorers and fur traders floating down from the north who would eventually settle and change the way of life in the region.

I thought of the steamboats that dominated the rivers, and of

my grandmother reading the story of Huck Finn and Jim braving this behemoth on their raft heading for Cairo.

I soon directed my attention toward the southeast to the Illinois side of the Mississippi and began searching for Camp Dubois at Wood River, where Lewis and Clark had departed on their journey into the wild in 1804, passing by where I was now standing and paddling up the Missouri River.

So much activity in my mind while in that moment silence surrounded me. All that could be heard were the chirps and calls of birds in the distance and the occasional sound of water hitting the rocks.

After a while, we decided that it was time to leave and made our way back to the car and out of the park. I pulled into the Audubon Center, where they had an event going on

with several guided tours throughout the day. The staff members there were extremely kind and almost had us talked into taking a one-hour guided tour discussing pollinators.

But our stomachs were telling us that it was time to eat, so we settled for a few minutes of walking the grounds, taking in what was left of the cool morning air before heading into the city for lunch.

If you are ever in or around St. Louis and are interested in getting out in nature for a bit, I would highly recommend visiting Riverlands. See for yourself what the bottoms have to offer and you will not be disappointed.

CLARK COUNTY ATTRACTIONS

Archer House

The Archer House, located at 717 Archer Ave in Marshall, was built in 1841 and is the oldest hotel still in operation in Illinois. It was entered into the National Register of Historic places on March 16, 1976. Both presidents Abraham Lincoln and Grover Cleveland were guests at the Archer House.

Stone Arch Bridge

Stone Arch Bridge was constructed in 1831 with no mortar and is still in use today. The National Road runs over this bridge and it is located on Archer Ave. at the west edge of the City of Marshall.

Located seven miles northwest of Marshall on the Lincoln Heritage Trail Road. Mill Creek Park opened May 29,1982 and consists of 2,600 acres of land and 811 acres of water with 39 miles of shoreline. There are picnic areas on either side of the boat launch and at areas around the lake, a 139-site campground with shower facilities and a playground, 15 miles of ATV trails, horse and walking trails, courtesy dock facilities, annual leased docks, fuel dispensing, cabins, and boat rentals. The park also has a picnic area with four shelters and three playgrounds, as well as nine primitive camping sites. Please call 217-889-3901 or 217-889-3601 for more information.

Moonshine

Moonshine, located about 12 miles southeast of Casey, is the home of the Moonshine Burger and the annual Moonshine Run - a must for motorcyclists everywhere. For more information on the event, please visit the Moonshine Run Home page.

Lincoln Trail State Park

Whether you are looking for history, unusual plant life or recreation, Lincoln Trail State Park has something to interest you. Located just west of IL Rt. 1, 2 miles south of Marshall in Clark County, the area is named after the trail Abraham Lincoln's family followed enroute from Indiana to Illinois in 1831. Three Native American groups, the Miami, Kickapoo and Mascouten, occupied the site before it was ceded to the United States in the early 19th century. Today, visitors to the 1,023-acre park can enjoy the sights of an American Beech woods; wildflowers, including the unusual squaw-root and beech drops; and recreational activities such as boating, camping, fishing, hiking and winter sports.

World's Largest

Casey has become home to a growing display of "giant" objects, earning the small town several spots in Guinness World Records book. Displayed throughout the city are gigantic wind chime, golf tee, knitting needles, pitchfork, mailbox, clogs and rocking chair.

Terre Haute Casino Resort: 'There is palpable excitement here'

he casino and three restaurants at the Terre Haute Casino Resort was scheduled to open April 5. The hotel and remaining amenities are scheduled to open May 15.

Mike Rich, vice president and general manager of the Terre Haute Casino Resort, said in March that all of the gaming tables and slot machines would be available and ready for gamblers by April 5; so would the Four Cornered Steakhouse, the Rockwood Bar and Grill — both of which offer elegant dining experiences — and the Soda Shoppe, which boasts a '50s-style diner vibe.

On May 15, the hotel will throw open its doors; that evening, it will offer a fireworks show at 9 p.m.

Also open will be the Queen's Beans, a coffee shop with food, the hotel lobby bar, the VIP Lounge, the Crossroads Center Bar (offering sports betting in the heart of the casino) the 10th-floor Altitude Bar and Lounge, and the Pool Bar.

"There is palpable excitement here, between those who work here and those who are excited about visiting," Rich said.

Several thousand people have signed up for the casino's Player's Club cards, and another 10,000 have requested more information about the program.

The Indiana Gaming Commission board approved the Local Development Agreement — also known as a LDA — between the city and Churchill Downs, owner of the Terre Haute Casino Resort, in March.

Mayor Brandon Sakbun appeared before the IGC and thanked Churchill Downs for negotiating its relationship in the community. He said the casino would add to the accomplishments and growth the city has seen of late.

The Terre Haute Casino Resort installed its slot machines in February.

Rich described the equipment as factory fresh.

"We will be the only casino in Indiana with 100% new product," he said.

Data is abundant for a list of the most popular slots — Churchill Downs' other properties provide the information, as do third parties.

Rich said that manufacturers creating the most popular slot machines include Aristocrat, Light & Wonder and Bluberi, a company that recently entered the slot business.

"Bluberi is very popular and they're new to the scene," Rich said.

Some of the games the casino offers are popular games like Black Diamond Deluxe, Blazing 777, Triple Double Cash, Target Lock Keno and Quick Hit as well as newcomers such as Mighty Cash Ultra and NFL Super Bowl Jackpots.

Rich said there are several pieces to strat-

egizing where to place slot machines in a casino space.

"You want to put the super-popular product at the entrances to make them pop," he said. "But you also have to spread them throughout the casino so that people will venture in and visit the entire casino."

In addition to the 1,000 slot machines, the Terre Haute Casino Resort features 34 gaming tables and nine food and beverage venues.

Rich added, "Interior construction is making great progress and will be ready for our opening on the 5th."

Meanwhile, trainees at the casino have been preparing.

Timothy Bicknell, who goes by the nickname "Lucky George," is living up to his moniker at the roulette wheel. He's placed a chip or two on the precise number that has turned up on the wheel several times in a row. which would pay out 35 times each chip's value.

Not so luckily, he's not actually winning anything.

As a gaming table trainee for the Terre Haute Casino Resort. he and other trainees are just pretending to be gamblers around the wheel, helping other trainees learn the nuances of serving players at a variety of games.

Camryn Wilkey spins the ball with a snap and feeds the gamblers their winnings while Sierra Dobson is "mucking" chips — organizing and stacking the chips that gamblers have recently lost so that they're ready to reenter play. When the ball audibly slows its spin around the wheel, Wilkey spreads her arms across the table like a baseball umpire signaling "safe" and

announces, "No more bets."

Tonne Newton, a table games instructor/supervisor for the casino, said roulette dealers can either snap or push the ball on the wheel, but style is everything for gaming table dealers.

"Snapping to me is more preferred," she said. "You get more revolutions on your spin, the ball goes around a lot longer, you have longer to check for bets. Snapping is a lot cooler - it's one of those things that give you that flair."

Likewise, dealing cards is best done with flair, as well.

"There's an art to dealing and when it's done right, it's very pretty," said Newton, who shuffles chips in her hand while she speaks. "The casino business and what you do as a dealer, it's an art form. It should be smooth, it should be pleasant to watch, so we teach them the procedure.

"It shouldn't be choppy — my students always say, "Tonne likes pretty, just like a ballerina," she added. "It shouldn't just be robotic. I tell them when it comes to blackjack, you need to focus on how you look doing it as well as the fundamentals of doing it."

Newton emphasizes creating specta-

after elementary school.

"She taught me how to do everything," he said. "We had a little ritual on the weekends where we'd wake up at 2 a.m. to watch 'Poker After Dark.' I fell in love with poker at the age of 6. What better way to live with my great-grandmother's memory than by being a dealer at a casino."

Minor, from Staunton, Ind., had only been to a casino once before enrolling for gaming training.

"As a new person who has never dealt before, I wouldn't say I'm bad," she said.

She added that the training had made her more outgoing.

"I'm finding myself when I'm out in public more open and I can talk to people more," Minor said.

Like most trainees, Young and Minor have been counting down the days until the casino opens — it stood at 83 when they were interviewed.

"They're nothing but excited," Lanier said. "They're definitely looking forward to the grand opening and so am I."

Even losers feel like winners when they play with an entertaining dealer, Newton said.

"It doesn't matter how much they're losing — when I was dealing, people just liked to play with me because it was fun, it was exciting," she said.

"One gentleman told me, 'I didn't even think about how much money I was losing — I was having such a good time.' That's what we want — I want people to have the experience of the entertainment, that's what's going to get them in and draw them in. If we can sell someone on the experience, then we have a repeat customer."

cle for the paying customers at the gaming tables.

"This profession is not for the meek and quiet," she said. "I tell my students, 'We are their entertainment. They're there to be entertained.' It should be like an opera when it's done, it should look like a ballet. People can go play the slot machines if they don't want that entertainment."

Classes for prospective dealers at the casino began in October near the casino's construction site on Terre Haute's east side, with students beginning their training on blackjack tables.

"Blackjack is the easiest," Newton said. "You can get your feet wet with cards, chips, familiarizing yourself with the different income rates and denominations. Once they leave blackjack, we can open them up to all of our carnival games and what we call our core games — your roulette, your dice, your baccarat."

Craps is the most difficult table to run, she said.

"Dice has a lot of moving parts to it — it's a lot of verbiage, it's a lot of different bets being made on the dice table," Newton said. "Anyone who is a veteran dealer will tell you that's the monster."

She has been encouraged by the quality of her students.

"We have had some really, really outstanding people," Newton said. "I didn't realize that there's a lot of people who had never set foot inside a casino, don't know anything about a card or what this is or what this does.

"Some of them come in very wide-eyed and once they get the concept of what they should be doing, it gets easier," she added

Andrew Lanier, senior director of table games for the Terre Haute casino, said the goal was to train 150 dealers. Most will deal blackjack, with 30-50 manning the gaming tables that require more expertise.

About 50% of those who sign up for training don't make the cut, which he said is "typical," but those who have passed have done so enthusiastically.

General Dean Suspension Bridge

The General Dean Suspension Bridge spans the Kaskaskia River at Carlyle. It is named after Major General William F. Dean, a native of Carlyle who served during the Korean War. The bridge is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and was added to the Register in 1973.

Cholera Cross

Driving along the main road south of Breese, you will pass a soaring white cross, about 25-feet tall, a remembrance of tragedy that happened 183 years ago. The Cholera Cross is a local landmark with a notable history. Built in 1850, the cross is a memorial to those who lost their lives in the cholera outbreak of 1832. It was a devastating disease caused by contaminated water or food, and transmitted by personal contact. This outbreak was first diagnosed in Chicago, where part of the militia fighting the Black Hawk War was struck. The disease spread quickly, raging like wildfire, eventually reaching southern Illinois where the towns of Breese, Germantown and Carlyle suffered the most devastating losses. During this time, a local farmer, Joe Altepeter, prayed to God to spare his family, and promised that if they lived, he would erect a large cross to profess his faith. His family was spared and Altepeter constructed the cross and mounted it at the road in front of his home. A brass plaque notes the story, a reminder of one man's pledge and a county's devastation. The cross sits at the original location on County Highway 7, about one mile south of Breese, just off the lane that runs to a dairy farm. Be sure to stop and take note the next time you drive by.

Coal Miners' Monument

Joseph Koch, who along with eight other local miners died in a mine explosion in 1947, is depicted here. Today the Coal Miners Monument on Louis Street in Beckemeyer depicts these downed workers, and pays tribute to the men who helped build one of Clinton County's largest industries.

Breese Historical Park & Garden

Located at 496 N. 2nd Street in Breese, IL, peruse Breese's history in photographs, memorials and on the granite pyramid in this neighborhood park. Benches and seasonal plants make this a guiet spot for rest and reflection. Make Breese Historical Park & Garden your spot for picnicking and playing.

Clinton County Historical Museum

This museum is an independent, non-profit organization dedicated to preserving Clinton County's heritage through education, written and photographic documentation, artifacts and oral histories. Built in the late 1800s as a private home, the museum holds many artifacts from the area, including genealogical material, books and periodicals on the history of the county. Open every Thursday, except the first Thursday of the month, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and by appointment.

Excel Bottling Company

Excel Bottling Company is located in Breese, IL, where Ski and other all-natural, pure cane sodas have been produced since the mid-30s. Tours are available. In 2012 Excel Brewing was established, home to several craft beers including Carlyle Lake Lager and Shoal Creek Oktoberfest, Wheat, & Winter Ale, Hop Heist, Piague Bringer and Double IPA.


Charleston Riot Historic Marker



Palestine

Palestine is the oldest town in the state of Illinois still in its original location. The entire business district is listed on the National Historic Register, and many turn-of-the-century buildings house art galleries, antique and collectible stores, and gift shops. Visitors come from all around to visit this historic village full of rich history. Palestine is home to the Fife Opera House, the annual Pioneer City Rodeo and Labor Day Festival, and many other history rich events throughout the year.

Hutsonville

Hutsonville, at the Wabash River Bridge on the northeast edge of the county, features the Hutson Memorial Village. A "town" made up of original, furnished log cabins, a log barn, and log church, is named in honor of the Isaac Hutson family which was massacred by Indians in 1813. Each year, the event is re-enacted, and several other family oriented events are held at the complex throughout the year. Antique and specialty stores round out the village, along with a bookstore located in the house where Illinois' ninth Governor, August French, was married.

Flat Rock may not be the retail mecca of the county, but it does get a big "thumbs up" when it comes to a great milkshake, fresh pie, and friendly conversation. The annual Flat Rock Homecoming is a great time to visit the village for memorable family fun. After a disastrous fire in 1912, an ordinance was passed that all new buildings must be constructed of brick. The town has more concrete sidewalk per capita than anywhere in the nation.

Cumberland County Courthouse

Visit the completely restored Cumberland County Courthouse located on the square in Toledo, IL. Built in 1887-88, the building is Cumberland County's second courthouse. The first courthouse, located at the same site as the current one, was built in 1856 and burned in 1885. The second courthouse was designed by architects S. S. Goehring and L.L. Pierson. The building's design features a central clock tower, arched entrances on the east and west sides, column-supported balconies above the entrances, and a balustrade along the roofline. The building has continuously served as the seat of county government since its opening. The courthouse was added to the National Register of Historic Places on June 11, 1981.



Sears "Catalog Homes"

Tuscola is home to four "catalog homes." From 1908 until 1940, the Chicago-based catalog giant Sears, as well as Montgomery Ward, offered and sold roughly 100,000 build-it-yourself home kits. There were 450 various models ranging in price from \$150 to a little more than \$5,000. One home is located at 309 N Main. It was ordered in 1931 and is called "The Cambridge". Another is located at 106 E. Buckner. The home was built in 1915 and located 5 ½ miles west of Tuscola, before being moved to it's present site in 1946. Yet another home is located a few miles north of Tuscola on Route 45. It was built . 1920-22. The fourth home is located on Scott St. and was built in 1915.

Douglas County Courthouse

The Douglas County Courthouse sits on a full block on the south side of Tuscola. It is the home of murals printed by E. Martin Hennings, circa 1912. It was built in 1912-13 in classical style architecture. The woodwork is all white oak, floors in public places are of tile and terrazzo and corridor walls are wainscoted with finely polished marble. All columns and pilasters are of scagliola exquisite workmanship. In the center of the building and extending throughout the three stories is a beautiful glass dome.

Illinois Amish Heritage Center

The Illinois Amish Heritage Center was first created in 1994 as the Illinois Amish Interpretive Center located in Arthur, Illinois. The Center offered an introductory film to Amish life, exhibits on Amish heritage and culture, a gift shop, and Amish Country Tours of Amish homes, farms, businesses and meals in Amish homes

In 2010, the Center was moved to Rockome Gardens and renamed The Illinois Amish Museum. The museum remained open at Rockome through 2014 when Rockome went up for sale. Rockome was purchased later that year and the new owner began implementation of a wildlife park. The Amish Museum was subsequently put into storage and the search for a new facility began.

In the year 2000, two historic Amish houses were saved from destruction and moved to a location behind Yoder's Kitchen in Arthur, Illinois. In 2014, plans had been made to move the houses to Rockome Gardens, \$102,000 was raised, and a state tourism grant was written. The pending sale of Rockome and state budget problems put a hold on these plans.

In 2016, five acres of land were secured one mile west of Chesterville and three miles east of Arthur, Illinois. In September, the houses were moved to the new site and a plan for the construction of a new museum building and Amish living history farm were developed. Restoration on the Schrock house and planning for a steam threshing event in the summer of 2017 began. A development plan laid out a four year time table for the completion of the site.

The mission of the Illinois Amish Heritage Preservation Center is to enhance the preservation, understanding, and appreciation of all aspects of the culture and heritage of the Amish people in Illinois

The history of the MILL ROAD THRESHERMAN ASSOCIATION show

he first Thresherman's Demonstration was held on July 24, 1982. It was started by neighbors Louis Milleville and Wayne Mueller, who thought it would be fun to thresh wheat and oats with a 1930s era 2238 McCormick Deering threshing machine owned by Louis.

The first event took place on what is known as "Mill Road," which is just south of the 1-70 interchange in Altamont. A group of friends and neighbors gathered together with their antique tractors, implements, hit-and-miss engines, and cars. They threshed oats in the morning, and after an "old fashioned lunch" served by the Altamont Jaycees, wheat was threshed in the afternoon.

The day was a big success, with more than 400 people registered in attendance. It was decided to move the next show to the Effingham County Fairgrounds, July 16-17, 1983. (Every show since then has been held there.) The group also wanted to find a steam engine to use to power the threshing machine.

The Blomberg family of Farina owned the nearest operating steam engine, and agreed to let the group use it, provided they could find a capable operator. A local man, Ben Winter, had extensive knowledge and experience in operating steam engines. Ben agreed to run the steamer, and an even bigger show was held in 1983.

In order to help organize and operate the next show in 1984, the group was incorporated as the Mill Road Thresherman Association, Inc on May 1, 1984. After the next show, held July 14-15, 1984 (The first show held without sponsorship of the Jaycees), the charter and bylaws were approved and signed

October 5, 1984, by the three original directors. They were Marlin Milleville of Altamont, Ed Jansen of Sigel, and Eldo Tate of Stewardson. Officers elected were: President, Louis Milleville; Vice President, Ben Winter; Secretary, Roy Cochran; and Treasurer, Art Trost.

Jumping ahead to the present: The club is very active with the mission of preserving past farming practices and equipment, and educating the public on how it used to be done through field demos and our annual show.

Thanks to the great support from the public and many local businesses, we are able to not only put on our annual show but add other events such as a tractor drive/farm tour and a parade for local nursing home residents. We also support area FFA chapters with a scholarship program and our local food bank with the collection from our worship service at the show.

Our goals for the future is to add more farm ground to give

exhibitors a place to show off their equipment. Also to add more activities. We recently added potato digging, getting the kids involved in picking up potatoes. You would think those potatoes were candy the way the kids went at it. We have also added squeezing cane and cooking molassis.

We have a museum set up at the annual show, but our goal is to have our own building that would house a permanent display. We are blessed to be able to rent one of the finest facilities for our annual show, the Effingham County Fairgrounds. Many of our exhibitors and vendors comment that this is their favorite place to set up.

Our goal is to increase our attendance so more people can enjoy the show.

We involve area FFA chapters working at our show and have many activities for younger children as we are a family show. Our goal is to get more younger folks to join the club. Our club won't survive another 40 years if we do not get the younger generation involved, then who is going to be around to preserve this part of our rural American history?





The Dr. Charles M. Wright House Museum





The Vandalia State House, built in 1836, is the fourth capitol building of the U.S. state of Illinois. It is also the oldest capitol building in Illinois to survive, as the first, second, and third capitol buildings have all disappeared. It is located in Vandalia, Illinois, on the National Road (and National Old Trails Road), and listed on the National Register of Historic Places. 



Lincoln Home National Historic Site's first YOUTH EXHIBIT

he Lincoln Presidential Foundation ("Foundation") and the Lincoln Home National Historic Site ("Lincoln Home") announce the grand opening of Lincoln's Springfield, the first-ever exhibit designed

for a youth audience within the federal site.

The exhibit, which is located inside the historic Corneau House across from Lincoln Home, explores the stories of six members of Lincoln's community whose diverse life experiences illustrate the promise and potential of the American experiment.

teractive features, this exhibit brings to life the stories of Henry Carrigan, William Donnegan, Charlotte Rodriguis De Souza, Jameson Jenkins, Francis Springer, and Mariah Vance.

In addition to showcasing the stories of Lincoln's community members, the exhibit also highlights the history of the Cor-

neau family, the namesake of the house.

The exhibit was designed for audiences aged 10-14 while appealing to visitors of all ages. This exhibit is free and open to the public.

The Lincoln Presidential Foundation secured a lead gift from the M.G. Nelson Family Foundation, as well as additional individual and foundation gifts to make the exhibit a reality. The M.G. Nelson



Family Foundation stated, "Our family was thrilled to support a youth exhibit at the Lincoln Home. We felt it would fill an important need by capturing the attention of older kids and encouraging them to be curious about history, the fascinating lives of Lincoln's neighbors, and what it was like to be alive during that time. The youth exhibit was the first major project Lincoln Presidential Foundation launched following the announcement of its new partnership with National Park Service at Lincoln Home. Farm Camp: Alternative summer fun

> arm Camp grew out of a Jamestown, Indiana couple's love for family, animals, and a homesteading lifestyle.

Brandy Schroeder and her husband Brad attended a homesteading conference and she began making sourdough bread. He began making goat milk soap.

The family farm had a few animals, like chickens for eggs, but the Jamestown couple began receiving phone calls to take on

rescue farm animals. So goats, pigs and rabbits joined the farm. They had seen the reaction to the animals from friends and family.

"My mom adopts special needs kids," Schroeder said. "We had talked about how therapeutic the animals are for people with special needs and maybe we could take the farm animals to birthday parties and other events."

As the Schroeders continued accepting animals, they added an emu, alpacas, peacocks, ducks and guinea fowl. And though the farm continued to grow, the Schroeders still weren't sure they

> were ready to take the leap into business.

"I met with my spiritual adviser and was talking about our idea. Maybe we could work with people and minister in a different way through our farm," Schroeder said. "Three hours later, I received a phone call for an 11-year-old's birthday party and they were looking for farm animals. That was it." 6th Day Farm was established in the summer of 2023 and the family hasn't looked back.

Last fall, they held the first free Family Fun Day, complete with havrides, facepainting and feeding and visiting with the animals.

It was such a hit with more than 100 visitors that they've planned another event from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. May 4.

Recently, Schroeder's son made a comment about the local fields and where food came from.

"I was super proud of him and it made me think we

should give kids an opportunity to come out and learn what it's like to live on the

farm," Schroeder said. "We'll do animal care, gardening, plant some trees, do crafts and make butter from scratch. It's not only giving them some basic skills, but they'll be able to see all the things they can do on their own."

From 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. July 8 through 11, the Schroeders will hold their first Farm Summer Camp experience at 6th Day Farm for youth ages 8-15.

Spots are filling up fast and Schroeder is excited to see the variety of people interested in the event.

"I think in the long term, we want to continue to provide more awareness," she said. "We want to support parents; to partner with them in teaching children these skills and continue to offer families opportunities to enjoy time together."

It was restored in 1989 and now serves as office of Shelby Historic House and Inn. For more information call 217-774-3991

Shelby County Courthouse

Shelby County Courthouse in downtown Shelbyville was built between 1879 and 1881. It houses historic paintings, including the Robert Root depiction of the Abraham Lincoln-Anthony Thornton debate. Hours are 8 a.m to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday and courtrooms are generally open for viewing when court is not in session.

Tree-filled Forest Park

Tree-filled Forest Park in Shelbyville is a beautiful place to spend a day. There are areas for picnicking, hiking and fishing. During summer there are swimming, basketball, baseball, softball, volleyball, soccer and tennis facilities.

Lincoln Public Square

The Lincoln Public Square houses the Soldiers & Sailors Monument, designed by local artist Robert Marshall Root. The square was erected in 1907 in memory of the fighting men in the county. The square also has a plaque in honor of Abraham Lincoln, who practiced law in Shelbyville. There is also a plaque of Horrace Tallman, the inventor of the first mechanical pick-up hay baler. Flags are placed around the square during Memorial Day and Labor Day. On July 3, 2002, an eternal flame was dedicated to the men and women who have served in the past wars. The black granite base of the flame contains etchings, such as General Douglas McArthur wading ashore in the Phillipines in 1945, Marines raising the flag at Iwo Jima in World War II and Shelbyville resident August West.

Johnson's Goat Tower

Johnson's Goat Tower is located at 1968 N. 2500 East Road at Windsor, IL 61957. The tower is a structure consisting of 5000 handmade bricks from North Carolina, 276 concrete steps that are 40 inches long and cantilevered into the brick and a copper roof. The six compartments, three on each side, have a concrete floor. At 31 feet tall with a 7 ½ foot diameter, it is the world's largest goat tower. Saanen goats, Swiss dairy goats that love to climb, live in the tower. Phone (217)454-2337 and leave a message or text. goattowerfarm.com

Paddling Lake Shelbyville

Established in 2020, the Lake Shelbyville Water Trail - Kaskaskia Branch travels downstream from Denham Pit Primitive Boat Ramp to Forrest W. Bo Wood Boat Ramp. In total, it is just under a 12-mile kayak trip that takes around 4 hours to complete (at normal lake level.) This versatile trail offers distances for all paddling experience levels with several put in/take out points along the route and quiet coves to explore!

Moweaqua Coal Mine Museum

Moweaqua Coal Mine Museum at 129 S. Main St. in Moweaqua, IL has displays and memorabilia from a bygone era in mid-western prairie history. Most well-known for the Dec. 24, 1932 disaster that killed 54 workers, the coal mine closed in 1935 and the museum was dedicated in 1986. Hours are 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays. Moweaqua.org

The Best Wedding Chapel

The Best Wedding Chapel is nestled in the historic town of Shelbyville. Dedicated in the 1870s, this former Catholic Church features Gothic style architecture, 14-foot original stained-glass windows, and a 33-foot cathedral ceiling with a small archway separating the vestibule from the nave. It is now the home and business of the Best family. The wedding chapel is available as a traditional, as well as non-traditional, wedding or vow renewal site. It is located at 159 North Washington Street.

The Pam & Bob Boarman Chevy BelAir Museum

The Pam & Bob Boarman Chevy BelAir Museum opened in 2005 and features Bob's private collection of Chevy's. The building is decorated in 50's sock-hop style with black and white checkered floors. The walls are lined with 50's memorabilia, Chevy clocks and neon signs. A jukebox takes you back to that popular time in history. The museum has 10 vintage cars, as well as a 1993 Indy Pace Car with only 28 miles on it. The museum is located at 224 West Main St. in Shelbyville and is open 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday thru Friday and from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturday.

Lake Shelbyville

Lake Shelbyville is a reservoir located in Shelby County, Illinois and Moultrie County, Illinois created by damming the Kaskaskia River at Shelbyville, Illinois. The lake's normal surface pool is 11,100 acres (44.9km2) at an elevation of 183 meters (600.4 ft). The area that surrounds the lake is the Shelbyville State Fish and Wildlife Area. The lake is managed by the United States Army Corps of Engineers, and the wildlife is managed by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

\$57 million was appropriated for the dam and lake project. Groundbreaking on the dam occurred May 4, 1963. Filling of the reservoir began Aug. 1, 1970. The lake was officially dedicated Sept. 12, 1970. The dam is 3,025 feet (922.0 m) long and 108 feet (32.9 m) tall with normal pool height 17 feet (5.2 m) below the top.

Bordering the lake are two state parks: Wolf Creek State Park and Eagle Creek State Park; and five federal campgrounds including Coon Creek, Opossum Creek, Lithia Springs, Lone Point and Forest (Bo) Woods. There is also Wilborn Creek and Whitley Creek Recreational Area. Lake Shelbyville's shoreline is heavily wooded and subject to severe erosion. Man-made beaches are located at Dam West (Shelbyville), Wilborn Creek, Wolf Creek State Park and Sullivan Beach. Aside from the main channel of the lake are many coves, suited for fishing. The lake is deeper than other major lakes in Illinois, so it is popular with boaters during the summer.

There are full-service marinas, resorts and campgrounds on the lake. There are three full service marinas: Findlay, Lithia Springs and Sullivan Marina. Findlay Marina is located north of Marker 5 just past the bridge on the west side of the lake. Sullivan Marina and Campground is located 4 miles south of Sullivan and includes hotel suites. Lithia Springs Marina is located on the southern end of Lake Shelbyville.


