t may be cliche, but for Tim and Kelly Drake the saying "everything happens for a reason" is a motto they've lived over and over.

The owners of The Mill, an outdoor event center and amphitheater in Terre Haute, are into the venue's second season. Featuring acts such as Flo Rida, Jake Owen, Skid Row and Warrant over the summer, and Lynyrd Skynyrd headlining Sept. 17, The Mill is on its way to surpassing 2021's success. It may seem like The Mill has been around for longer than just one year, as

plans had been underway since 2019, but due to roadblocks and the global pandemic the future of the facility was challenged numerous times.

"What's there now, that was going to be our phase three," Tim says about the facility's current stage and outdoor music space. "The whole plan got flipped upside down because of COVID and then it seemed like it was a domino effect."

A successful entrepreneur, Tim was no stranger to the ups and downs of business, but The Mill's journey was one that surprised even the most experienced business owner. A longtime partner and investor in Show Me's and an employee of Jones & Sons Concrete and Masonry Products, Tim says he always subscribed to the phrase, "find the need, fill the need." After working for years to revamp the Bloomington Show Me's, Tim focused his efforts on his hometown along with wife Kelly, who worked in sales and customer relations for Large Inc before joining the "family business" with her husband.

Friends since middle school, Tim and Kelly dated on and off before losing touch during college. They reconnected and found the spark they felt decades before was still there. They married in 2017 and welcomed two children: Kali, 6 and Clayton, 4.

"Everything in our lives, from how we met in middle school and then lost touch and then came back together, we didn't skip a beat," Tim says.

"It's cheesy, but for us so many times we have looked back and thought everything happens for a reason. Some things are meant to happen when

they happen."

With a dream of creating a music venue; one large and one small on the same property, Tim and Kelly submitted a bid on the former International Paper property on Prairieton Road. Listed at \$2.1 million, the property had been eyed as the location for numerous businesses, including the Vigo County jail.

"We always knew that the paper property was available," Tim explains. "There wasn't any action on it and they encouraged me to put in a bid. So I called and said, 'my offer is one dollar and I'm very serious about that.'"

Tim's bid may have been rejected, but his idea was picked up by the Vigo County Commissioners. The Commissioners at the time, Brad Anderson, Judy Anderson and Jon Marvel, approved a public-private lease agreement for the nearly 60 acres of land along the Wabash River.

The couple set out to be-

ain plans with an opening date slated for spring 2020. Then COVID happened, changing the way The Mill would be constructed, opened and operated.

"The original plan was for that back building to be the first phase and do a really intimate indoor and outdoor venue," Kelly explains. "But COVID happened and everything shut down."

Continues Tim, "By the time we got the green light to be able to open, we had two months, maybe round up to say three months. We had lost our oriainal bank loan, everyone was still reeling from COVID and we had to rely on friends and family and other local businesses to help us make it happen."

The local community rallied to make it happen, some businesses even completing work "in good faith" to ensure the facility would open in time for the first headliner, Nelly. The Drakes list First Farmers Bank & Trust, Joink, Jones & Sons, Precision Lawn Care & Vigo Turf and Frey Excavation and Drainage as businesses that supported them when they needed it most along with professional stagehands, lighting and audio operators who worked tirelessly to help the first-time show-

On June 5, 2021, Tim and Kelly were ready for opening night.

"I remember standing there and you know that feeling of going down on a roller coaster? The gates open and the cars start rolling in and I'm thinking, 'here we go,'" Kelly says.

Adds Tim, "We had already jumped out of the plane, there was no reason to then check your parachute."

The couple welcomed thousands to the first show, jumping behind the bar for hours to help with large bar lines and working

to make sure the show would happen without a hitch. The couple says they learned a lot on that first night, what to do and what not to do. They made notes for the future and continued to move forward.

"When things finally slowed down and Nelly was about to go on, Tim and Hooked at each other and we knew we needed to go see it," Kelly says of the show. "We ran to the back of the stage and we were just in awe of how it looked and the amount of people, it was amazina."

Not what they originally planned, but Kelly says, "I wouldn't change it now."

The venue brought numerous artists to west-central Indiana in 2021 — and hundreds of visitors. As Terre Haute continues to work toward becoming a tourist destination in Indiana, The Mill has become a large attraction and

driver of those efforts. Tim and Kelly serve on the See You in Terre Haute Community Plan Tourism Pillar, an initiative by the Terre Haute Chamber of Commerce and Terre Haute Convention and Visitors Bureau.

"The Mill has the potential to attract many visitors from around the region," says CVB Executive Director David Patterson. "We are thankful for their investment in our community."

The Mill will slowly be expanding into a location for more than just largescale music events. This fall they will welcome Susan G. Komen for a breast cancer fundraiser. Tim says they plan to open the property up for more community events, while also working on the next phase for the property.

It's unclear which "phase" of the plan they'll enter next, but the Drakes say the phase they're in and how they got there -

was meant to be.

"The timing of it all really worked out," Kelly says. "It all happened for a reason. There was a reason why we were pushed to be outside and have a bigger venue and bigger artists. It was scary but ...

She looks to her husband and business partner, who continues the sentence.

"... but things happen in mysterious ways. It must not have been the right time prior," Tim says. "For some reason, we had to wait and be forced to do it a different way. We would have done everything completely differently with a different mindset, but it happened the way it happened and look where we are now."



The Sousa Archives and Center for American Music

Located at 1103 S. Sixth St., Champaign, IL. 217-244-9309. How did John Philip Sousa become involved with the University of Illinois? Visit the Sousa Archives and Center for American Music in Champaign and you'll find out. Located at 1103 S. Sixth St. in the Harding Band Building, near the University of Illinois Armory, it documents American music through historical artifacts and archival records and the archives of John Philip Sousa, Albert Austin Hardina (Illinois' first band-master), internationally known trumpet soloist Herbert L. Clarke and the University of Illinois bands. Opened in 1994, the museum acquired the personal papers from Sousa, the famed American composer and March King, who had a personal relationship with Harding. Since then, the museum has added many other collections, including over 50 record series documenting the history of American music, instruments, sound recordings, photographs, memorabilia, correspondence and the papers and music by and about many distinguished musicians and composers, including Harry Partch, Harry Begian, Elbern Alkire, Kenneth Gaburo, Paul Bierley, Virginia Root, Salvatore Martirano and Paul Martin Zonn.

Krannert Art Museum

Located at 500 East Peabody Drive on the campus of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and a unit within the College of Fine and Applied Arts, the museum opened its doors in 1961, establishing a permanent home for the university's existing collection of fine art. The UI Arboretum

A living laboratory, including plant collections and facilities that support the teaching, research, and public service programs of several units throughout campus. Located on the campus of the University of Illinois, it was developed in the late 1980s to early 1990s, and is currently 57 acres. Central to the Arboreturn was the development of the "All American Selection Trial Gardens." The Arboretum is available for organized events from 8 a.m. to dusk. Jacksonville museum spotlights efforts, successes of Black residents

hose wanting a closer look at Black history in Jacksonville got their chance in July, when Jacksonville African American History Museum opened at 859 Grove St.

The museum will be open from 1 to 4:30 p.m. Wednesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays into September. Visitors also can visit the museum year-round by appointment.

The museum had its grand opening on July 9, with Jacksonville native and former NFL wide receiver Creston Whitaker as a guest of honor.

Art Wilson, founding executive director for the museum, said the museum is meant to reflect Jacksonville's Black history and the history of some other groups in the area, including the Portuguese, Irish and German. He said people need to recognize the efforts of those who left the city to find success elsewhere.

"Jacksonville has a rich Black history ... of people that have gone out and done a lot of successful things who didn't get a chance to do those things here," he said. "A lot of them, they couldn't get those jobs because their peers were given those jobs. And so, they went off and ... created their own life doing things."

The museum features multiple exhibits show-casing local and national Black history from the Underground Railroad to today. One room will feature Black people from

Jacksonville who went on to prosper in politics, entertainment and sports, while another will feature those who served in the military. Other rooms feature exhibIn the future, the museum hopes to host a number of special events, ranging from a history of blues and jazz taught by a local musician to some of the people mentioned in the exhibits coming back to Jacksonville to speak, Wilson said.

its on Juneteenth and church life. Wilson said he is planning to open a room for children in about six months, featuring books that would teach them how kids in other countries

grow up.

Wilson also wants to start a "Walk a Mile in Our Shoes" program, which would distribute shoes to children in need.

Wilson hopes people understand the museum's goal of presenting Black history to the public after being "dormant," he said, noting that, when the museum said "Black lives matter," it's not saying other lives did not.

"We're just trying to show you that through our history, we didn't matter " to others, Wilson said. "If you look at our history, there's no point in time that we really mattered (to others) until something happened to make it matter."

Illinois Rock & Roll Museum in the works

he Illinois Rock & Roll Museum on U.S. Route 66 in Joliet is not a cheap trick — despite taking root in one.

"The idea kind of crept in over time," said Ron Romero, the museum's founder and executive director. "I had been to Cleveland (Ohio) a few times, Nashville (Tennessee) a few times. ... One of the things that pushed me over was that Rick Nielsen of Cheap Trick had an exhibit in Rockford," which is Cheap Trick's hometown.

People came from overseas to Rockford to see the exhibit.

"That's just one band,"
Romero said, noting that
it made him wonder what
the response would be if a
museum was dedicated to
all Illinois music. "Despite the
name being 'rock and roll,'
we honor and preserve all
genres of music."

Romero and others got together and, in 2019, bought a building at 9 W. Cass St. in Joliet.

"Since then, we've been renovating the building," he said. "We all know what

happened in 2020; it slowed us down a bit. We're not a development company, we're not millionaires. This is all grassroots."

The effort has received "really nice community support" in Joliet, Romero said, with contractors frequently donating their time to work on the building.

"The building was built in 1930," he said. "It's as solid as can be, all cement. It's listed as a fireproof building. But even though it's built like a tank, we're having to replace the elevator" and make other upgrades.

The current push is to get the first floor of the 25,000-square-foot building finished and open, after which they will finish the second and third floors, Romero said.

When exactly that will happen remains unclear.

Opening in "2020 would have been good," Romero said. "... We'd like to be open with this as soon as possible. We're going to shoot for this year and see how we do, depending on funding."

Funding also is grassroots, with "700 charter members from 30 states and three countries now," Romero said. "Memberships keep us afloat. We have donors who donate every month. ... We have an online store where we sell shirts, all sorts of things. We're able to pay the mortgage and electric and gas and keep moving forward. We've also had a lot of in-kind donations."

While they work toward an opening, Romero and his board of directors also work on the details.

"We have design people on our board of directors," he said. "The first floor is based on the blues. We had to have a place to start this story. I chose blues because ... blues is where everything kind of started with rock music."

The plan is for the second floor to hold the majority of their other exhibits, with the third floor dedicated to an Illinois music hall of fame.

"Because we're opening the first floor and the lower level first, it will have a little bit of everything," Romero said. "As we finish the second and third floors, we'll move everything into the appropriate places."

That's not a bad thing, he said.

"We want to do that because we want people not to come once and say 'I've been here' but to (want to come back). We want it to be dynamic and changing."

The plan also includes offering music lessons and courses on music business. There's a small performance stage on the lower level that will allow for smaller concerts as part of those educational offerings.

"Part of our mission here is beyond the history part of it," Romero said. "We want to honor and preserve history, but it's also a teaching museum. We're building a facility for teaching, not just music but ... music publishing (and other aspects of the industry, such as lighting and sound). There's a lot of money to be made in this industry, and not necessarily as a rock star."

Classes run for six, 10 or 12 weeks, with a performance at the end, he said.

"Our teachers are people who have real-world experience, who have toured, played with bands," Romero said. "They're not just teaching instruments. They have a good background in performance."

While organizers wait for the building to be completed, they're not waiting to establish an Illinois music hall of fame. They inducted their Inaugural Class — what was supposed to have been the Class of 2020 but didn't happen until 2021.

That first class included Chicago, Cheap Trick, REO Speedwagon, The Ides of March, Muddy Waters, The Buckinghams, Buddy Guy, Chess Records, Larry Lujack, WLS-AM radio, Dick Biondi, and The Thirsty Whale.

The recently announced Class of 2022 includes Styx, Chuck Berry, Sam Cooke, Dan Fogelberg and New Colony Six. Styx member Dennis DeYoung also will be inducted separate from Styx as a songwriter, as will Jim Peterik. Non-performance inductees include DJ John "Records" Landecker, WXRT-FM, Gary Liozzo and Mercury Records.

Chosen by a vote of the museum's charter members, the latest class was inducted during a ceremony and concert June 5 at Rialto Square Theatre in Joliet.

Stone Arch Bridge

Stone Arch Bridge was constructed in 1831 with no mortar and is still in use today. The National Road runs over this bridge and it is located on Archer Ave. at the west edge of the City of Marshall.






Charleston Riot Historic Marker

In addition to the wide variety of athletic activities available outdoors at the Sports Legends Experience, visitors can also check out the three other sports exhibits available inside the museum which are great for rainy or cold days.

One of these areas included in the Legendary Sports Experience is the National Art Museum of Sport where visitors can view art inspired by sports and athletes and make art of their

own. This part of the exhibit currently features artwork from famous Olympic artist LeRoy Neiman.

Another indoor exhibit included in the Legendary Sports Experience is The World of Sport, where visitors get to take on the role of a professional athlete, announcer and sportscaster. Visitors to this section can also provide commentary on filmed sporting events in the broadcast booth and compete in

professional race-car style pit stop challenge.

Professional sports teams from the area made significant contributions to the Sports Legends Experience. Among these contributing teams are the Indiana Pacers, Indianapolis Colts, and the Indy Fuel.

"If they're a professional sports team in Indiana they pretty much have had a say or contributed various ideas, themes, and 'tips and tricks,'" Robinson said.

Robinson said a well trained staff of coaches are also available in all areas of the Legendary Sports Experience to "facilitate active play with families" and provide assistance if families require any.

"That's a very fun, handson, health and fitness way to learn about different sports and to have a good time with your whole family whether it's parents, cousins, grandparents, aunts, uncles, you name it," Robinson said.

The sport equipment, fields, courts and goals included in the experience have been modified to best fit visitors of all sizes and experience levels. Sizes progress from youth up to college regulation.

The museum offers a vast number of exhibits, both indoor and outdoor.

Exhibits at the museum range from "Beyond Spaceship Earth," where visitors can explore astronaut artifacts and learn how astronauts live at the International Space Station, to a carousel visitors can ride that is originally from Broad Ripple Park in Indianapolis and dates back to 1917.

One exhibit at the museum that is especially popular among visitors of all ages is The New Dinosphere. The Dinosphere includes actual dinosaur fossils, some of which the museum's own paleontologists uncovered during a dig near Cody, Wyoming in a place the museum refers to as the "Jurassic Mile".

"It's literally a mile square

plot of land that is filled with fossils," Robinson said.

The museum's group of paleontologists have been digging there for a few years already and plan on continuing to do so for the next 15 years.

The Dinosphere exhibit is divided into five different areas. The "Giants of the Jurassic" section of the Dinosphere features an immersive sound and light show and sauropod fossils found at "Jurassic Mile." "Creatures of the Cretaceous" is a section of the Dinosphere dedicated to dinosaurs from the cretaceous period like the T-Rex.

"Monsters of the Mesozoic Seas" is another section of the Dinosphere exhibit.

Here, visitors can look at art and fossils from ancient and extinct marine creatures, including the section's main attraction: the fossils of an ichthyosaur, a massive extinct reptile that the museum's paleontologists uncovered in the sea bed along their dig area.

"It has eyes the size of dinner plates. Their eye sockets are huge," Robinson said.

Visitors can gain more insight into a day in the life of the museum's paleontologists at the Paleo Lab section of the Dinosphere.

"People can watch the real paleontologists who dug up the fossils clean and prep them," Robinson

If visitors want to take a

closer look, one window in the Paleo Lab is available to visitors where they can actually touch some of the fossils and talk to the paleontologists about their job and the fossils themselves. The Dinosphere also includes the Dino Art Lab where visitors can color in pictures of dinosaurs and see them come to life on a large screen, moving alongside other creations.

"We just installed two of the giant sauropods that are about 70 feet from nose to tail that we dug up in that dig site that are on display so that everyone can learn more about them," said Robinson.

A new exhibit features the life of Emmett Till and the massive impact his death had on the Civil Rights

The exhibit is set to open at the museum on Sept. 17, where it will have its debut before being taken to other locations in the U.S. for display, including the Birmingham Civil Rights

Institute in Alabama and the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Library in Washington, DC.

The Children's Museum of Indianapolis and the Legendary Sports Experience will remain open daily from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. until Sept. 5. Hours for the fall and winter of 2022 will remain the same, but the

museum will be closed on Mondays beginning Sept. 6 and outdoor experiences will close after Oct. 30.

Tickets can be purchased online in advance. Prices for adults is \$25 and \$20 for visitors under the age of 18. Admission is free for any visitors under the age of 2.

Oblong

Oblong, located on the western edge of the county, also offers a variety of unique retailers. Collectibles, quilt and sewing supplies, handcrafted gifts, floral, and furnishings can be found along Main Street in Oblong. The Oil Field Museum in Oblong is one of only seven such facilities in the nation. It features two buildings of displays, tools, books and literature, working models and photographs regarding the boom days of oil discovery in Crawford County Illinois in the early 1900s.

Palestine

Palestine is the oldest town in the state of Illinois still in its original location. The entire business district is listed on the National Historic Register, and many turnof-the-century buildings house art galleries, antique and collectible stores, and gift shops. Visitors come from all around to visit this historic village full of rich history. Palestine is home to the Fife Opera House, the annual Pioneer City Rodeo and Labor Day Festival, and many other history rich events throughout the year.

Hutsonville

Hutsonville, at the Wabash River Bridge on the northeast edge of the county, features the Hutson Memorial Village. A "town" made up of original, furnished log cabins, a log barn, and log church, is named in honor of the Isaac Hutson family which was massacred by Indians in 1813. Each year, the event is re-enacted, and several other family oriented events are held at the complex throughout the year. Antique and specialty stores round out the village, along with a bookstore located in the house where Illinois' ninth Governor, August French, was married.

Flat Rock

Flat Rock may not be the retail mecca of the county, but it does get a big "thumbs up" when it comes to a great milkshake, fresh pie, and friendly conversation. The annual Flat Rock Homecoming is a great time to visit the village for memorable family fun. After a disastrous fire in 1912, an ordinance was passed that all new buildings must be constructed of brick. The town has more concrete sidewalk per capita than anywhere in the nation.

The first courthouse, located at the same site as the current one, was built in 1856 and burned in 1885. The second courthouse was designed by architects S. S. Goehring and L.L. Pierson. The building's design features a central clock tower, arched entrances on the east and west sides, column-supported balconies above the entrances, and a balustrade along the roofline. The building has continuously served as the seat of county government since its opening. The courthouse was added to the National Register of Historic Places on June 11, 1981.

Sears "Catalog Homes"


Tuscola is home to four "catalog homes". From 1908 until 1940, the Chicago-based catalog giant Sears, as well as Montgomery Ward, offered and sold roughly 100,000 build-it-yourself home kits. There were 450 various models ranging in price from \$150 to a little more than \$5,000. One home is located at 309 N Main. It was ordered in 1931 and is called "The Cambridge". Another is located at 106 E. Buckner. The home was built in 1915 and located 5 ½ miles west of Tuscola, before being moved to it's present site in 1946. Yet another home is located a few miles north of Tuscola on Route 45. It was built 1920-22. The fourth home is located on Scott St. and was built in 1915.

Douglas County Courthouse

The Douglas County Courthouse sits on a full block on the south side of Tuscola. It is the home of murals printed by E. Martin Hennings, circa 1912. It was built in 1912-13 in classical style architecture. The woodwork is all white oak, floors in public places are of tile and terrazzo and corridor walls are wainscoted with finely polished marble. All columns and pilasters are of scagliola exquisite workmanship. In the center of the building and extending throughout the three stories is a beautiful glass dome.

Illinois Amish Heritage Center

The Illinois Amish Heritage Center was first created in 1994 as the Illinois Amish Interpretive Center located in Arthur, Illinois. The Center offered an introduc-



tory film to Amish life, exhibits on Amish heritage and culture, a gift shop, and Amish Country Tours of Amish homes, farms, businesses and meals in Amish

In 2010, the Center was moved to Rockome Gardens and renamed The Illinois Amish Museum. The museum remained open at Rockome through 2014 when Rockome went up for sale. Rockome was purchased later that year and the new owner began implementation of a wildlife park. The Amish Museum was subsequently put into storage and the search for a new facility

In the year 2000, two historic Amish houses were saved from destruction and moved to a location behind Yoder's Kitchen in Arthur, Illinois. In 2014, plans had been made to move the houses to Rockome Gardens, \$102,000 was raised, and a state tourism grant was written. The pending sale of Rockome and state budget problems put a hold on these plans.

In 2016, five acres of land were secured one mile west of Chesterville and three miles east of Arthur, Illinois. In September, the houses were moved to the new site and a plan for the construction of a new museum building and Amish living history farm were developed. Restoration on the Schrock house and planning for a steam threshing event in the summer of 2017 began. A development plan laid out a four year time table for the completion of the site.



Catfish Trail in Western Illinois

ourism groups in three western Illinois river counties are going fishing in hopes of reeling in support for the

counties' restaurants.

The newly christened Catfish Trail features more than 40 restaurants across Pike, Adams and Hancock counties that have catfish on their menu.

Quincy Area Convention and Visitors Bureau Executive Director Holly Cain credits a recently retired co-worker for the idea.

"She said, 'You should do a catfish trail.' because

there are so many places to eat catfish," Cain said. "She was just thinking of Quincy, but we cover three counties. Pike had just done a Tenderloin Trail ... that was so successful. We thought we'd sort of mirror what they did with the Tenderloin Trail.'

It's no coincidence that the Catfish Trail started when it did, Cain said.

"We thought we'd launch it right before Lent," she said, noting the 40 days in the pre-Easter Christian calendar when fish and seafood surge in popular-

But the trail didn't end with Lent.

"We want it to be evergreen so people can enjoy it year-round," Cain said.

The restaurants featured on the trail offer catfish in a variety of forms, from fried catfish dinners to catfish strips, filets, and sandwiches. Some, such as Sprout's Inn and O'Shea's in Quincy and three of the five restaurants on the trail in Hancock County, offer whole catfish as part of a dinner. Others, such as Fat Boys in Rockport, offer catfish fritters.

And, despite being a "catfish" trail, many of the restaurants also offer other fish varieties, includina buffalo and salmon, and seafood such as shrimp and clams.

"We're on the two rivers here," Cain said of the Mississippi River that creates the Illinois border to the east and the Illinois River that skirts the three counties to the east. "I think (catfish) is definitely more of a Midwestern flair here in our area. It's a Midwestern dish.'

For David Camphouse, executive director of Pike County Chamber of Commerce, which created the Tenderloin Trail, the Catfish Trail was a no-brainer.

"We had a tremendous



amount of success from our Tenderloin Trail," Camphouse said, noting that it drew "people from well into Missouri, Jacksonville, Madison County, the Metro East. It definitely helped restaurants that have had a hard time over the last couple of years with the pandemic."

Catfish was a perfect option — after tenderloin.

"We wanted to celebrate what they were known for doing and doing well," Camphouse said. "Catfish has been a staple of Pike County and a lot of our

restaurants for a long, long time."

Joining the trail also didn't require much thought from Pam Watts, owner of Wattsup Cafe in Nebo.

"This is a very small community," Watts said of Nebo, which has around 340 residents. "My cafe's the only cafe in the area. We have really good food and a really good rapport with the community. I just wanted to make sure people knew we were here."

That's why she participated in the Tenderloin Trail when the opportu-

nity arose and why she signed on to the Catfish Trail. Wattsup Café serves catfish and buffalo dinners on Fridays.

"There were people who didn't even know we were there who came to the Tenderloin Trail," Watts said.

Her restaurant's regulars know her fried fish is good, she said, adding with a laugh that it's "nothing healthy."

"People just like fish here," she said. "They can't wait 'til we serve it on Fridays."

While she was pleased

that the Tenderloin Trail attracted new customers to her small café, she's hoping, along with Cain and Camphouse, to hook a few more with her catfish.

"I hope this will acknowledge to the area that we're here, we have good food," Watts said. "Even though we're little, we're a good restaurant."

State announces \$17.5M to renovate Rend Lake Resort

Governor JB Pritzker recently announced a long-awaited renovation of the popular Rend Lake Resort in Southern Illinois will get underway in 2023 with an investment of more than \$17.5 million.

The funding will be used to renovate the conference center, restaurant, cabins, pool, and boatel, which collectively will enable the resort to host lodging guests, conferences, and other visitors and events.

"Rend Lake has been around for 50 years – and for that half-a-century, it has been a shining example of the rich history, the human ingenuity, and the values of sustainability that make Illinois special," Pritzker said in a press release. "I am proud to announce that we will be investing more than \$17 million to renovate Rend Lake Resort – restoring the site to its former glory. With this funding, we are strengthening our tourism industry, our economy, our recreational offerings, and our holistic and social wellbeing all in one."

The Rend Lake Resort is located at the 3,300-acre Wayne Fitzger-rell State Recreation Area and is operated by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (DNR) on the shore of Rend Lake in Franklin and Jefferson counties. The resort site features a hotel, conference center,

cabins, restaurant, boatel, gift shop, pool, tennis courts and more.

Opened in May 1991, the space was shuttered in 2016 after mold was discovered in the hotel and other buildings, requiring extensive remediation throughout the site. At the height of its operation, the Resort drew 2.4 million visitors annually and employed up to 125 staff members. It had an estimated economic impact of nearly \$245 million in 2010, and occupancy rates were around 90% during the high-season period between late spring and late fall.

"Rend Lake Resort was and will be again, an important part of our regional economic engine for Southern Illinois," said Mayor Jason Ashmore, City of Sesser. "The resort will offer more opportunities to visitors of Rend Lake which will in turn spur economic growth for all of the surrounding communities. We want to thank Governor JB Pritzker, DNR, CDB, Senator Bryant, Senator Fowler and Rep Severin for all their hard work on making this come to fruition."

"I want to thank Gov. Pritzker for helping us make this long-awaited project a reality," said Colleen Callahan, director of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. "This is so much more than an investment in the Rend Lake Resort. It's also an investment in our state parks, in local jobs, in the regional economy, and in the people of Southern Illinois."

Rend Lake is the second largest of Illinois' three man-made lakes with 19,000 acres of water and 162 miles of shoreline. The lake itself is operated by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and is a tremendous economic driver for southern Illinois. Easily accessible from interstates 57 and 64, it's a popular site for boating, fishing, hunting, camping, picnicking, hiking, swimming, golfing and more. The lake also provides drinking water for customers in seven Southern Illinois counties.

Wayne Fitzgerrell State Recreation Area draws more than 1.3 million visitors annually. Dedicated in 1975, the park is popular for hunting, camping, wildlife-watching, picnicking, boating access, horseback riding, field trials and other outdoor activities. The park was dedicated in 1975, and is named for the late Wayne Fitzgerrell, a former State representative from nearby Sesser who was a strong advocate for the construction of Rend Lake.

States collaborate to enable electric vehicle travel along 1,100-mile Lake Michigan shoreline

he state of Illinois and three other Midwest states are collaborating to build America's next iconic road trip route, specifically for electric vehicles (ÉV). The Lake Michigan EV Circuit Tour will consist of a network of EV chargers spanning over 1,100 miles of drivable shoreline around pristine Lake Michigan.

The multi-state partnership needed to build and maintain the EV chargers, as well as market the new eco-tourism attraction, was solidified by a Memorandum of Understanding signed by key officials from each state.

"The Great Lakes are the crown jewel of the upper Midwest, and this initiative proudly blends our clean energy goals with the natural beauty that attracts countless visitors each year," said Illinois Governor JB Pritzker. "The Lake Michigan EV Circuit Tour represents the Midwestern spirit at its best - that we are all better off when we look out for our neighbors. It's yet another reason to come Enjoy Illinois."

The tour will be a scenic route with reliable light-duty vehicle charging options along the Lake Michigan coastline that targets charger installations at key coastal communities, lighthouses and tourism attractions such as state parks, hospitality locations, breweries, vineyards, restaurants and other small businesses. Those new chargers will be tied together with existing charging infrastructure networks at large entertainment attractions in population centers along the route such as Chicago, Green Bay, Milwaukee and Traverse City.

The project will not only support the tourism industry in the Midwest, it will also elevate economic arowth. The Lake Michigan EV Circuit Tour will coordinate to advance the ease of access to some of the

region's greatest tourism attractions by the next generation of clean and electrified transportation and mobility manufacturing products, safeguard industry electrification leadership, support growth of the region's share of electric vehicles and elevate access to tools required to equip the workforce of tomorrow.

The route is also intended to provide EV drivers with a long-distance travel vacation opportunity so many have been seeking. Likewise, prospective EV drivers will have the chance to experience firsthand the joy of taking families and friends on long-distance road trips with no range anxiety, and no harmful tailpipe emissions. Many of the network's chargers are already operable today, and drivers can expect the remainder of the Circuit to be completed within the next few years.







State to award \$15M to support festivals and tourism across Illinois

WHEATON – Governor JB Pritzker and the Illinois Department of Commerce & Economic Opportunity (DCEO) recently announced \$15 million in funding to support tourism sectors across Illinois, through the second round of the Tourism Attraction and Festivals Grant program offered by the State.

Through the \$15 million investment, which opened to applicants in July, \$5 million will be reserved for festivals, which serve as economic drivers while bringing communities together, and \$10 million will support a broad range of other tourism-related project such as attractions, museums, live performance venues and more. This grant is funded using American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) dollars.

"When the pandemic struck, the tourism industry across the globe lurched to a standstill," said Pritzker. "That's why, last August, I launched the Tourism Attraction and Festivals Grant program – delivering the support our communities needed to bring back parades, festivals, and cultural celebrations that are so vital to families in neighborhoods across our state. Today, I'm proud to announce an additional \$15 million for this successful program to continue supporting our tourism sector, driving economic development, and bringing our communities together."

"From boosting local economies and small businesses to showcasing the beauty of our state, Illinois' tourism industry contributes more than fun experiences for all of us. It is also about history and community – and preserv-

ing the rich, diverse stories that make Illinois a great place to live in and visit," said Lt. Governor Juliana Stratton. "Our administration has been committed to supporting the tourism industry's recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic because of how integral it is to our state's communities. This additional \$15 million in funding is a testament to that."

This round of funding prioritizes downstate communities, communities that have experienced declines in hotel tax revenues and provides \$5 million specifically for festivals. Additionally, in order to maximize funding, applicants are required to submit matching funds with the goal of attracting additional visitors to localities and events, thereby supporting local hotels, restaurants, and businesses. Through the revised approach for the second round of funding, the State is ensuring localities and tourism entities hardest-hit by the pandemic receive additional support.

Through a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO), localities, tourism and festival businesses, and entities can apply for grants of up to \$500,000 that may be used to establish and enhance tourism attractions or festivals. Applications will be accepted until Friday, Sept. 23, 2022.

"There are so many things I love about our community that I can't wait to share with folks from across the state," said State Senator Laura Ellman (D-Naperville). "Not only will this funding showcase our community and bolster our tourism, it will boost our local economy and help us grow and thrive for

years to come. I'm so glad to see this well-deserved investment."

"Illinois tourism attractions, festivals and live venues bring scores of visitors to communities all around our state," said State Senator Sara Feigenholtz (D-Chicago). "These grants will go a long way to rebuild the diverse attractions that makes Illinois the middle of everything!"

"From historic Route 66 to its beautiful state parks and cities, tourism continues to play an important role in the economy, culture and vitality of Illinois," said State Representative Lamont J. Robinson (D-Chicago). "This critical funding will provide for more good-paying jobs and strengthen our tourism industry as it bounces back from the COVID-19 pandemic."

"The tourism industry boosts local revenues, spurs economic development and creates jobs for residents across the state," said State Senator Suzy Glowiak Hilton (D-Western Springs). "By investing an additional \$15 million statewide, we can support the festivals, museums and other live performances that sustain working families and attract visitors to Illinois."

"Illinois" travel and tourism industry continues to position and grow the state's visitor economy," said Dave Herrell, chairman, Illinois Council of Convention & Visitor Bureaus (ICCVB). "This strategic investment last year created significant value across the many destinations throughout Illinois and today's announcement by Governor Pritzker will continue to make a substantial impact for tourism

and the communities leveraging this opportunity for future growth."

"With world-class attractions, festivals, and historical sites in every part of Illinois, we're proud to support the unique destinations that make Illinois a great place to live, work and do business," said Sylvia I. Garcia, Director of DCEO. "Under Governor Pritzker's leadership, DCEO recognizes the importance of investing and reinvesting in tourism attractions and festivals that are important to residents and visitors alike, which is why today we're announcing the award of \$10 million to 41 grantees across the state and making an additional \$15 million available for continued growth of our tourism economy."

The first round of the grant program supported a broad array of tourism attractions, sites, and events throughout the state, including a five-month outdoor art exhibit featuring dozens of mythical animals inspired by Mexican folklore at Cantigny Park in Wheaton.

"Alebrijes: Creatures of a Dream World at Cantigny Park is a perfect example of how we can advance meaningful programs to serve our local communities, while lifting the state as a whole. A remarkable aroup of collaborators made this happen. Thank vou to Governor Pritzker. DCEO and the Illinois Office of Tourism for this grant that enabled our artists from Mexico City to bring this dream to life, celebrating cultural diversity and personal connection through art," said Beth Marchetti, DuPage Convention & Visitors Bureau Executive Director.

In order to be selected, each applicant demonstrated how this award would help businesses in the surrounding area, as well as the project's ability to attract visitors for overnight stays. Projects scored higher based on proximity to commercial corridors and services - including hotels/motels, restaurants, retail, and other commercial operations.

Applications for this grant were awarded on a rolling basis with awards ranging from \$11,500 to



The Lincoln Public Square houses the Soldiers & Sailors Monument, designed by local artist Robert Marshall Root. The square was erected in 1907 in memory of the fighting men in the county. The square also has a plaque in honor of Abraham Lincoln, who practiced law in Shelbyville. There is also a plaque of Horrace Tallman, the inventor of the first mechanical pick-up hay baler. Flags are placed around the square during Memorial Day and Labor Day. On July 3, 2002, an eternal flame was dedicated to the men and women who have served in the past wars. The black granite base of the flame contains etchings, such as General Douglas McArthur wading ashore in the Phillipines in 1945, Marines raising the flag at Iwo Jima in World War II and Shelbyville resident August West.

Johnson's Goat Tower

Johnson's Goat Tower is located at 1968 N. 2500 East Road at Windsor, IL 61957. The tower is a structure consisting of 5000 handmade bricks from North Carolina, 276 concrete steps that are 40 inches long and cantilevered into the brick and a copper roof. The six compartments, three on each side, have a concrete floor. At 31 feet tall with a 7 ½ foot diameter, it is the world's largest goat tower. Paddling Lake Shelbyville

Established in 2020, the Lake Shelbyville Water Trail – Kaskaskia Branch travels downstream from Denham Pit Primitive Boat Ramp to Forrest W. Bo Wood Boat Ramp. In total, it is just under a 12-mile kayak trip that takes around 4 hours to complete (at normal lake level.) This versatile trail offers distances for all paddling experience levels with several put in/take out points along the route and quiet coves to explore!

Moweagua Coal Mine Museum

Moweagua Coal Mine Museum at 129 S. Main St. in Moweagua, IL has displays and memorabilia from a bygone era in mid-western prairie history. Most well-known for the December 24, 1932 disaster that killed 54 workers, the coal mine closed in 1935 and the museum was dedicated in 1986. Hours are 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays. The Best Wedding Chapel

The Best Wedding Chapel is nestled in the historic town of Shelbyville. Dedicated in the 1870s, this former Catholic Church features Gothic style architecture, 14-foot original stained-glass windows, and a 33-foot cathedral ceiling with a small archway separating the vestibule from the nave. It is now the home and business of the Best family. The wedding chapel is available as a traditional, as well as non-traditional, wedding or vow renewal site. It is located at 159 North Washington Street.

The Pam & Bob Boarman Chevy BelAir Museum

The Pam & Bob Boarman Chevy BelAir Museum opened in 2005 and features Bob's private collection of Chevy's. The building is decorated in 50's sockhop style with black and white checkered floors. The walls are lined with 50's memorabilia, Chevy clocks and neon signs. A jukebox takes you back to that popular time in history. The museum has 10 vintage cars, as well as a 1993

Indy Pace Car with only 28 miles on it. The museum is located at 224 West Main St. in Shelbyville and is open 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday thru Friday and from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturday.

Lake Shelbyville

Lake Shelbyville is a reservoir located in Shelby County, Illinois and Moultrie County, Illinois created by damming the Kaskaskia River at Shelbyville, Illinois. The lake's normal surface pool is 11,100 acres (44.9km²) at an elevation of 183 meters (600.4 ft). The area that surrounds the lake is the Shelbyville State Fish and Wildlife Area. The lake is managed by the United States Army Corps of Engineers, and the wildlife is managed by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

\$57 million was appropriated for the dam and lake project. Groundbreaking on the dam occurred May 4, 1963. Filling of the reservoir began August 1, 1970. The lake was officially dedicated Sept. 12, 1970. The dam is 3,025 feet (922.0 m) long and 108 feet (32.9 m) tall with normal pool height 17 feet (5.2 m) below the top.

Bordering the lake are two state parks: Wolf Creek State Park and Eagle Creek State Park; and five federal campgrounds including Coon Creek, Opossum Creek, Lithia Springs, Lone Point and Forest (Bo) Woods. There is also Wilborn Creek and Whitley Creek Recreational Area. Lake Shelbyville's shoreline is heavily wooded and subject to severe erosion. Man-made beaches are located at Dam West (Shelbyville), Wilborn Creek, Wolf Creek State Park and Sullivan Beach. Aside from the main channel of the lake are many coves, suited for fishing. The lake is deeper than other major lakes in Illinois, so it is popular with boaters during the summer.

There are full-service marinas, resorts and campgrounds on the lake. There are three full service marinas: Findlay, Lithia Springs and Sullivan Marina. Findlay Marina is located north of Marker 5 just past the bridge on the west side of the lake. Sullivan Marina and Campground is located 4 miles south of Sullivan and includes hotel suites. Lithia Springs Marina is located on the southern end of Lake Shelbyville.






