



even years ago, Eland Spittler was wondering what to do with the barn he had built after adding a bathroom to it.

"I thought I'm gonna put it on Airbnb. If it pays for the utilities, pays the taxes, that would be kind of cool," he recalled.

The Greenup Airbnb, named Crooked Creek Cabin, has surpassed that. It has become a bustling hub for renters, particularly popular among hunters due to its serene country location.

Inspired by the success, Spittler came across a shipping container that had been converted into a living space online. He had just the spot for it on 35 acres he owns in Greenup, a mile from the cabin.

Spittler has since opened two more Airbnbs – one in Martinsville and another in Casey. But the shipping container, which he calls Fox Den, is the most popular. He attributes that to its uniqueness.

"That's what I tell people: the more unique, the busier they are," he said.

He also attributes it to the tiny house craze.

The 320-square-foot rental accommodates four guests with two sets of bunk beds, a kitchenette and bar, a sitting area with a couch, and a bathroom with a shower. One comment Spittler said he hears a lot is, "Wow, it's a lot bigger than I thought."

Spittler gets a lot of repeat guests who make the Fox Den a regular stop when passing through.

He estimates it's booked at least 60% of the year. While most stays are one to two nights, he has had people stay much longer, including a traveling nurse working at HSHS St. Anthony's Memorial Hospital, who stayed for two months straight.

The remote location of the Airbnb keeps it secluded, and the vast, mowed grounds around it are popular with travelers who have dogs, according to Spittler.

While many are domestic travelers, the tiny Airbnb has attracted people from other countries, including one couple who came

from France. The couple stayed there while they converted a former school bus they had bought in Tennessee into an RV, also known as a "skoolie."

The tiny Airbnb became a popular getaway for city dwellers during the pandemic.

"During COVID, it was probably one of the busiest years. A lot of people from Chicago, St. Louis, Indianapolis, wanting to get out," said Spittler. "A lot of people who had been in the city for a long time come out and can't believe the stars. I guess we take it for granted."

The Airbnb has no Wi-Fi or TV, which Spittler speculates might be part of its charm as no one has complained about the lack of amenities. He said there is, however, a lot of wildlife to see. One guest felt inspired by it, painting a fox on an interior wall of the Fox Den after Spittler granted permission, of course.

The Fox Den isn't the only unique feature among Spittler's Airbnbs.

He purchased a building in his hometown of Casey, which initially served as an old gas station and later evolved into a transmission service shop. Although it had sat vacant for years, Spittler was drawn to the building's industrial look and its location along Main Street. As the owner of an excavating business, Spittler said he likes old buildings.

"We're in the demolition business, so we tear down 50 structures a year, all kinds of different buildings," he said.

His Airbnb side business has inspired him to view old buildings in a new way.





"I drove by one day, and that old gas station was for sale," he said. "I thought that would be pretty cool.

So, I bought it. Then I thought, 'What am I going to do with this?' I thought, 'I think I can turn it into an Airbnb."

Spittler strove to preserve the industrial theme of the old gas station, repurposing what he could. He even traveled

to Memphis, Tennessee, to acquire industrial items to incorporate into it. One guest from Chicago was impressed with the decor, "from the original shop fixtures repurposed as stylish accents to the seamless blend of raw, exposed elements with modern comforts," he wrote in his review.

Anywhere he can save history, Spittler

said he does. For the Martinsville Airbnb, it was the "cool metal ceiling" that Spittler chose to leave in.

The building that houses it was originally the town's post office. The building is now used as a warehouse in the front, and Spittler has a small office in the center. But when a group of traveling linemen needed additional rooms for the arrival of more, he got an idea for a room off the back that sat empty.

"It was just a blank canvas that hadn't been touched for a long time," he said. "I was like, if you guys need more room, I can turn that into an apartment. So, I turned it into a two-bedroom apartment.

"As soon as they left, I put it on Airbnb." While Spittler is partial to the industrial look, he wouldn't consider himself an interior decorator.

"When choosing what color to paint, I'm probably not your guy," he admitted. Spittler enjoys visiting with the renters if they're in the mood to chat, whether he's mowing or bringing them firewood at the Fox Den, which features an outdoor seating area complete with chairs and a picnic table.







"I enjoy meeting people. It's fun for me," he said. Spittler is a superhost, which means he's experienced, highly rated, and committed to providing great stays for guests, and his Airbnbs are listed as highly rated Guest Favorites, consistently receiving excellent reviews. With little downtime from his excavating business, which takes him and his crew to other states, he admits that rating wouldn't be possible without the help of his manager/cleaner.

"Finding the right people sure helps make life a little easier," he said.

Spittler said he would like to own more Airbnbs and is already thinking about unique ideas for other properties he owns.

"I have a property north of Casey that I think would be good. I like to find some that are done. Turnkey, ready to do, where I can set them off like I did this one," he said of the Fox Den. "I would like to do three or four in one location of tiny houses, whether it be a tiny house or shipping container."







"We were one of the first craft fairs in the country, and it has been a core piece of the museum's development and identity," said Executive Director Hillary Esser. "It will be bittersweet to say goodbye to the fair, but our leadership team feels this is the right time.

"As culture shifts and Cedarhurst evolves, we will be re-allocating our resources to other areas moving forward - continuing to support the arts community and build affinity for our museum," Esser said.

The Art and Craft Fair has been a key program at Cedarhurst for almost 50 years, helping to support artists across the nation, raises awareness of Mt. Vernon's small-town museum, and create a noteworthy, arts-rich tourist attraction for southern Illinois.

Staff and volunteers are planning a grand farewell to send off the beloved fair and honor its place in museum history. "We are excited to make this a celebration and hope that the community will turn out to support the final fair," said Cheryl Settle, who serves as an Administrative Counselor volunteer for the museum and co-chair of the Art and Craft Fair committee. "So many of us have fond memories of the fair, and we want to give people a chance to visit one more time, share those memories, and just enjoy the beautiful experience that is the Cedarhurst Art and Craft Fair. There will be many special touches throughout the weekend."

General Dean Suspension Bridge

The General Dean Suspension Bridge spans the Kaskaskia River at Carlyle. It is named after Major General William F. Dean, a native of Carlyle who served during the Korean War. The bridge is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and was added to the Register in 1973.

Cholera Cross

Driving along the main road south of Breese, you will pass a soaring white cross, about 25 feet tall, a remembrance of tragedy that happened 183 years ago. The Cholera Cross is a local landmark with a notable history. Built in 1850, the cross is a memorial to those who lost their lives in the cholera outbreak of 1832. It was a devastating disease caused by contaminated water or food, and transmitted by personal contact. This outbreak was first diagnosed in Chicago, where part of the militia fighting the Black Hawk War was struck. The disease spread quickly, raging like wildfire, eventually reaching southern Illinois where the towns of Breese, Germantown and Carlyle suffered the most devastating losses. During this time, a local farmer, Joe Altepeter, prayed to God to spare his family, and promised that if they lived, he would erect a large cross to profess his faith. His family was spared and Altepeter constructed the cross and mounted it at the road in front of his home. A brass plaque notes the story, a reminder of one man's pledge and a county's devastation. The cross sits at the original location on County Highway 7, about one mile south of Breese, just off the lane that runs to a dairy farm. Be sure to stop and take note the next time you drive by.

Coal Miners' Monument

Joseph Koch, who along with eight other local miners died in a mine explosion in 1947, is depicted here. Today the Coal Miners Monument on Louis Street in Beckemeyer depicts these downed workers, and pays tribute to the men who helped build one of Clinton County's largest industries.

Breese Historical Park & Garden

Located at 496 N. 2nd Street in Breese, IL, peruse Breese's history in photographs, memorials and on the granite pyramid in this neighborhood park. Benches and seasonal plants make this a quiet spot for rest and reflection. Make Breese Historical Park & Garden your spot for picnicking and playing.

Clinton County Historical Museum


This museum is an independent, nonprofit organization dedicated to preserving Clinton County's heritage through education, written and photographic documentation, artifacts and oral histories. Built in the late 1800s as a private home, the museum holds many artifacts from the area, including genealogical material, books and periodicals on the history of the county. Open every Thursday, except the first Thursday of the month, from 10 a.m.–3 p.m. and by appointment.

tanding on the edge of a 300-foot limestone bluff in southern Illinois' Shawnee National Forest, Machaela Sweeney could thank the perfect words she typed into ChatGPT for bringing her to the unexpected spot.

"I literally looked up lush, magical, fairytale areas," she recalled, looking over the edge of the forest's Inspiration Point Trail.

A 30-year-old social worker from Hopkinsville, Kentucky, Sweeney was looking for a destination to recover from burnout. The AI app recommended two destinations: North Carolina or southern Illinois.

The first recommendation didn't surprise her. Sweeney said that many people in Kentucky go to the Great Smoky Mountains when they want to get away. But she had never heard anyone talk about the Shawnee National Forest in southern Illinois before.

"So this almost feels like a hidden gem," Sweeney said. "If somebody was going to the Smokies all the time and they were tired of it, I would say, 'Try mixing it up.'"

The forest stretches across the eastern and western parts of southern Illinois, from Inspiration Point Trail overlooking the Mississippi River Valley here in the west to the popular Garden of the Gods wilderness area in Herod to the east.

Sweeney is among the growing number of visitors discovering southern Illinois as a travel destination amid a recent effort to entice more people to visit for the summer season.

Carol Hoffman, executive director of the Southernmost Illinois Tourism Bureau, said the primary draws to southern Illinois are the outdoor recreation activities in Shawnee National Forest, including hiking, cycling, rock climbing and ziplining, as well as another Illinois surprise linked to the unusual terrain: vineyards and five wine trails.

The bureau has appealed to riders of the Chicago Transit Authority with a recent signage campaign that invited potential travelers to "go where the bus won't take you" and to "come see our skyscrapers."

In addition to plastering photos of lush greenery and rocky bluffs across Chicago buses and train stops, the bureau has paid to have promotional mailers, exhibits, shows and content creator posts that promote tourism to Illinois' southern region.

Southern tourism bureaus have been tapping into a trend of high visitor spending in Illinois in recent years, exceeding pre-pandemic numbers for the first time in 2023, according to the most recent available data from a 2024 report prepared for the Illinois Office of Tourism.

MORE THAN \$80 BILLION IN ECONOMIC IMPACT

In 2023, tourists spent over \$47 billion across Illinois, creating nearly 450,000 new jobs and generating over \$6.5 billion in state and local taxes, according to the 2024 Tourism Office report. The report estimated that tourism in that year generated over \$80 billion in total economic impact for the state.

Travel tourism influencer Jessica Baine, 35, has worked on tourism promotions with the Southernmost Illinois Tourism Bureau and Jackson County's Southern Illinois Tourism bureau for more than two years.

Baine, a Carterville nurse practitioner raised in southern Illinois, said she regularly receives messages from viewers online who were surprised by the content she shared, telling her, "I had no idea that southern Illinois looked like that."

Hoffman's group aims to connect with people within "an easy day's drive," typically those within a three- to six-hour driving distance from the forest, such as those living in central and southern Illinois and in the St. Louis metro area.

The advertising campaign is just one in a series of projects seeking to boost tourism in the area in recent years. The industry has seen a more than twofold increase in funding since 2023, with the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, or DCEO, giving out over \$9 million in grants to boost tourism in the southern part of the state.

That money was distributed to cities and tourism bureaus across the south-

ern half of the state for the last fiscal year, from Alton and Mattoon down to Metropolis, the officially designated home of Superman, where fans can take photos with a 15-foot statue of the comic book hero.

Past Illinois tourism campaigns have paid major returns. In the 2023 fiscal year, every dollar invested in promoting tourism generated \$75 in direct visitor spending, according to the 2023 – 2024 Economic Impact of Tourism report by the DCEO Office of Tourism.

Grant funds are matched by local hotels and motels hoping to bring travelers in, according to Hoffman.

In some cases, lodging is the attraction itself. According to Lyle and Tammy Woodrum, the married innkeepers of the Davie School Inn in Anna, Illinois, a fifth of their guests come just for the experience of staying in a former schoolhouse.

Originally built in 1853 as a school, the Davie School Inn was repurposed as a bed and breakfast, but still looks in many ways like a school, with various rooms featuring desks, globes and chalkboards covered with messages from past guests.

Susan Hill traveled from her home in

Memphis to stay at the Davie School Inn last month. She said she's done it a handful of times since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, when she was looking for somewhere to stay where she could sit outside.

According to Hill, the novelty of staying in an old school was a draw. "It's like, heck yeah, come on," she said. "It's just really quaint. I feel safe there."

The Woodrums said most of their guests have come for the area's local attractions, primarily the Shawnee Hills Wine trail and outdoor activities in the Shawnee National Forest but also for family and college reunions.

WINE JUST LIKES US'

Shawnee Hills Wine Trail is the largest of the state's five trails, comprising 12 wineries and 13 locations. It originated in the summer of 1995, when owners of the first three wineries in southern Illinois — Alto Vineyards, Pomona Winery and Owl Creek Vineyard — worked with the Southernmost Illinois Tourism Bureau and the Carbondale Convention and Tourism Bureau to start the first wine trail in Illinois.

Maggie Pugh, assistant manager at Feather Hills Vineyard on Highway 51,

said the campaign to attract tourists to the region has had a real effect on the winery. Recently, the company ran out of three of its bestselling — and most bottled — wines, which, to her, is an indicator of increased visitor flow.

"I think we are getting busier. I think the advertising has worked," she said. "I also know that the Wine Trail is doing quite a lot to try and bring more people down, because part of the problem is, this area isn't taken seriously for wine — although it should be."

Illinois is the second-flattest state on the nation's mainland, seemingly perfect only for corn. But Pugh described the Shawnee Hills region — home to many of Illinois' highest elevations — as a

"little golden nugget" in which "wine (is) just likes us, grapes enjoy our soil."

Since 2015, wineries on the trail have won over 30 medals in national and international wine competitions. Although the vineyards are geographically close together, scattered across an area of 40 miles, the trail boasts a wide range of wines, Pugh said.

"The coolest part about southern Illinois is that even a winery that's only 20 minutes away from this location right here, our wine is going to taste vastly different, even if we made it the exact same way," she said. "Our grapes don't taste the same because of the elevation, and you get those slight hints that might make or break a wine for you."



'ILLINOIS' MOST HIPPIE TOWN'

Award-winning wines and breathtaking vistas aren't the only unexpected finds in southern Illinois.

Makanda, a short drive from the Southern Illinois University campus in Carbondale, features a boardwalk of shops by local artists. Artists sell jewelry, gemstones, sage for burning, paintings, intricate metalwork and more. The tiny village of fewer than 550 people, a short drive from SIU, proudly calls itself "Illinois' most hippie" town.

Nina Kovar is one of those artists. In her Visions Art Gallery, dream catchers are hung along the front window, inviting shoppers to come browse clothing, jewelry and handmade ceramics.

Kovar said she sees graduates coming back for homecoming again and again, as well as others who are discovering the town for the first time after hearing about its hippie reputation.

"There's a certain timeless element to it," Kovar said of Makanda. "The creativity that we have, that a lot of us are artists and artisans and crafters, that it's kind of nestled in nature: it's beautiful."

Kovar said she has seen a significant increase in tourism to Makanda since the COVID-19 pandemic, with people not flying as much, but also wanting to get out of the house and into the outdoors.

Makanda also made it onto the map, Kovar said, because of the total solar eclipse that took place on April 8, 2024. A few shops down from Kovar, artist Dave Dardis painted a line through his shop to represent the path of totality at the time.

Dardis is better known as the Rainmaker, a name he shares with his bronze art studio. A backdoor in Dardis' shop opens out to his secret garden, a poorly kept secret in Makanda.

The garden features lush greenery and natural elements interwoven with bronze sculptures. Sweeney, a self-described whimsical person, said her visit to Dardis' not-so-secret garden was the best part of her southern Illinois experience.

"That's like walking into a literal fairy tale," Sweeney said. "He's like a hermit slash hippie slash, I don't know, man with wisdom," Sweeney added of Dardis. "He almost reminds me of a sage, like, you know those giant trees that talk?" Having grown up in the area, tourism

influencer Baine is well aware of the traditional engines for local economies — whether that's coal mining or agriculture. But she sees a path for tourism to become an even bigger factor in time.


"There's coal mines and there's all these very blue-collar jobs, but tourism brings even more money to our region. Tourists are spending money at restaurants, at the wineries, and they can reinvest in our communities," Baine said.

"When you live and breathe southern Illinois, and your kid goes to school here," she said, "you want these businesses to thrive."

Emiquon celebrates 25 years of restoration with free events

his year, The Nature Conservancy is marking 25 years of restoration at its Emiquon Preserve with a series of free, family-friendly public events. From paddling tours and fishing days to nature hikes and hands-on science experiences, the anniversary lineup offers unique ways for people of all ages to explore one of the Midwest's most remarkable ecological success stories.

Located along the Illinois River near Lewistown, Emiquon was once a natural backwater floodplain supporting hundreds of native plant and animal species. By the mid-20th century, it had been drained for agriculture. In 2000, The Nature Conservancy began an ambitious effort to return more than 5,000 acres to functioning wetlands.

Since then, native fish, birds and wetland plants have returned in remarkable numbers, signaling the resilience of nature. Today, Emiquon supports a thriving ecosystem, attracts researchers from around the world and serves as a hub for education and recreation.

"Places like Emiquon are rare in central Illinois – and across the Midwest," said Randy Smith, director of the Illinois River Program for The Nature Conservancy. "We're hosting these events to give people a hands-on look at how wetlands function, why they matter and how nature can bounce back when given the chance."

To mark the milestone, The Nature Conservancy will host the following public events:

- Ridge Hike Sept. 13, 12:30 p.m.—2 p.m. Take in panoramic views of the Illinois River valley on a guided hike with Conservancy staff and partners. Learn about Emiquon's ecological and cultural history along the way.
- Science Day Sept. 13 and Sept. 27, morning session. Join scientists from the Therkildsen Field Station and The Nature Conservancy for a hands-on wetland workshop. Participants (high school and up) will sample wetland macroinvertebrates, analyze findings under microscopes and learn how these organisms reflect water quality. Registration required.
- **Fishing Days** Aug. 29–Sept. 1, 5 a.m.–9 p.m. Fish along the banks during Labor Day weekend. Staff may be available.

Oblong

Oblong, located on the western edge of the county, also offers a variety of unique retailers. Collectibles, quilt and sewing supplies, handcrafted gifts, floral, and furnishings can be found along Main Street in Oblong. The Oil Field Museum in Oblong is one of only seven such facilities in the nation. It features two buildings of displays, tools, books and literature, working models and photographs regarding the boom days of oil discovery in Crawford County Illinois in the early 1900s.

Palestine

Palestine is the oldest town in the state of Illinois still in its original location. The entire business district is listed on the National Historic Register, and many turn-of-the-century buildings house art galleries, antique and collectible stores, and gift shops. Visitors come from all around to visit this historic village full of rich history. Palestine is home to the Fife Opera House, the annual Pioneer City Rodeo and Labor Day Festival, and many other history rich events throughout the year.

Hutsonville

Hutsonville, at the Wabash River Bridge on the northeast edge of the county, features the Hutson Memorial Village. A "town" made up of original, furnished log cabins, a log barn, and log church, is named in honor of the Isaac Hutson family which was massacred by Indians in 1813. Each year, the event is re-enacted, and several other family oriented events are held at the complex throughout the year. Antique and specialty stores round out the village, along with a bookstore located in the house where Illinois' ninth Governor, August French, was married.

Flat Rock may not be the retail mecca of the county, but it does get a big "thumbs up" when it comes to a great milkshake, fresh pie, and friendly conversation. The annual Flat Rock Homecoming is a great time to visit the village for memorable family fun. After a disastrous fire in 1912, an ordinance was passed that all new buildings must be constructed of brick. The town has more concrete sidewalk per capita than anywhere in the nation.



The building's design features a central clock tower, arched entrances on the east and west sides, column-supported balconies above the entrances, and a balustrade along the roofline. The building has continuously served as the seat of county government since its opening. The courthouse was added to the National Register of Historic Places on June 11, 1981.





Sears "Catalog Homes"

Tuscola is home to four "catalog homes." From 1908 until 1940, the Chicago-based catalog giant Sears, as well as Montgomery Ward, offered and sold roughly 100,000 build-it-yourself home kits. There were 450 various models ranging in price from \$150 to a little more than \$5,000. One home is located at 309 N Main. It was ordered in 1931 and is called "The Cambridge". Another is located at 106 E. Buckner. The home was built in 1915 and located 5 ½ miles west of Tuscola, before being moved to its present site in 1946. Yet another home is located a few miles north of Tuscola on Route 45. It was built 1920-22. The fourth home is located on Scott St. and was built in 1915.

Douglas County Courthouse

The Douglas County Courthouse sits on a full block on the south side of Tuscola. It is the home of murals printed by E. Martin Hennings, circa 1912. It was built in 1912-13 in classical style architecture. The woodwork is all white oak, floors in public places are of tile and terrazzo and corridor walls are wainscoted with finely polished marble. All columns and pilasters are of scagliola exquisite workmanship. In the center of the building and extending throughout the three stories is a beautiful glass dome.

Illinois Amish Heritage Center

The Illinois Amish Heritage Center was first created in 1994 as the Illinois Amish Interpretive Center located in Arthur, Illinois. The Center offered an introductory film to Amish life, exhibits on Amish heritage and culture, a gift shop, and Amish Country Tours of Amish homes, farms, businesses and meals in Amish homes.

In 2010, the Center was moved to Rockome Gardens and renamed The Illinois Amish Museum. The museum remained open at Rockome through 2014 when Rockome went up for sale. Rockome was purchased later that year and the new owner began implementation of a wildlife park. The Amish Museum was subsequently put into storage and the search for a new facility

In the year 2000, two historic Amish houses were saved from destruction and moved to a location behind Yoder's Kitchen in Arthur, Illinois. In 2014, plans had been made to move the houses to Rockome Gardens, \$102,000 was raised, and a state tourism grant was written. The pending sale of Rockome and state budget problems put a hold on these plans.

In 2016, five acres of land were secured one mile west of Chesterville and three miles east of

Arthur, Illinois. In September, the houses were moved to the new site and a plan for the construction of a new museum building and Amish living history farm were developed. Restoration on the Schrock house and planning for a steam threshing event in the summer of 2017 began. A development plan laid out a four year time table for the completion of the site.

The mission of the Illinois Amish Heritage Preservation Center is to enhance the preservation, understanding, and appreciation of all aspects of the culture and heritage of the Amish people in Illinois from 1865 to present.

It is a calm and quiet place that's perfect for meditation. Inside you will find a lushly landscaped sunken garden with it's own traces of history. A serpentine wall, that reflects a design by Thomas Jefferson, located in Charlottesville, NC, and a Lions Head fountain at the far end of the small park duplicates one found in Paris, France.

The city's oldest and principal recreation center is Twin Lakes Park, the development of which began back in 1895, when the dam impounding Paris' first reservoir was completed. 

Lincoln's New Salem expanding popular annual candlelight walk

hat could be better than exploring the village at Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site by candlelight during a crisp October weekend? How about exploring the village by candlelight during three weekends in October?

The candlelight walk at Lincoln's New Salem in Menard County is one of the most popular autumn events in central Illinois, attracting thousands of visitors to the park during the first weekend of October every year. The popularity of the walk has led site staff to expand it to three weekends for 2025 to give visitors more evenings to enjoy the event and to ease congestion at the park.

Dates for this year's candlelight walk are Oct. 3-5, Oct. 10-12, and Oct. 17-19. Event hours will be 5 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

"The New Salem candlelight walk is one of central Illinois' premier fall traditions," said Natalie Phelps Finnie, director of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, which operates the site. "We're thrilled to expand this beloved event to multiple weekends, offering people more opportunities to enjoy the beauty of the historic village by candlelight while also taking a little pressure off our dedicated staff and volunteers."

Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site relies on volunteers to ensure the candlelight walk is successful. Additional volunteers will be needed this year to help visitors during the event's expanded dates. Those who are interested can sign up today by emailing dnr.newsalem@illinois.gov. Volunteers will be trained and onboarded by site staff prior to the event.

"The New Salem candlelight walk is the wildly successful event it is today because of support from dedicated volunteers. We couldn't do it without them," said Troy Gilmore, acting superintendent of Lincoln's New Salem. "We'll accept volunteers for any amount of time they can devote over the course of the three weekends, and we'll make sure everyone is properly trained and ready to assist visitors."

During the candlelight walk, the historic village's pathways are lined with candle lanterns. Site staff and volunteer interpreters dressed in period clothing will be in many of the log homes and shops to talk about life in the original village and in 19th-century Illinois. Building interiors will be candle-lit, and visitors will be able to walk through buildings that are open. Visitors are asked to keep flashlights off while experiencing the village at candlelight.

Lincoln's New Salem is one of 56 state historic sites managed by IDNR. Built in the 1930s and 1940s as a Civilian Conservation Corps program, the site's historic village features 23 historically furnished buildings, including several homes, stores, and tradesmen's shops, as well as a tavern, school, wool carding mill, a sawmill and gristmill.

Scattered throughout the village are log barns and other outbuildings. In addition to the village, the 700-acre park features hiking trails, a campground, picnic areas, and playground equipment.

Shelby County Courthouse in downtown Shelbyville was built between 1879 and 1881. It houses historic paintings, including the Robert Root depiction of the Abraham Lincoln-Anthony Thornton debate. Hours are 8 a.m-4 p.m. Monday through Friday and courtrooms are generally open for viewing when court is not in session.

Tree-filled Forest Park

Tree-filled Forest Park in Shelbyville is a beautiful place to spend a day. There are areas for picnicking, hiking and fishing. During summer there are swimming, basketball, baseball, softball, volleyball, soccer and tennis facilities.

Lincoln Public Square

The Lincoln Public Square houses the Soldiers & Sailors Monument, designed by local artist Robert Marshall Root. The square was erected in 1907 in memory of the fighting men in the county. The square also has a plaque in honor of Abraham Lincoln, who practiced law in Shelbyville. There is also a plaque of Horrace Tallman, the inventor of the first mechanical pick-up hay baler. Flags are placed around the square during Memorial Day and Labor Day. On July 3, 2002, an eternal flame was dedicated to the men and women who have served in the past wars. The black granite base of the flame contains etchings, such as General Douglas McArthur wading ashore in the Phillipines in 1945, Marines raising the flag at Iwo Jima in World War II and Shelbyville resident August West.

Johnson's Goat Tower

Johnson's Goat Tower is located at 1968 N. 2500 East Road at Windsor, IL 61957. The tower is a structure consisting of 5000 handmade bricks from North Carolina, 276 concrete steps that are 40 inches long and cantilevered into the brick and a copper roof. The six compartments, three on each side, have a concrete floor. At 31 feet tall with a 7 ½ foot diameter, it is the world's largest goat tower. Paddling Lake Shelbyville

Established in 2020, the Lake Shelbyville Water Trail – Kaskaskia Branch travels downstream from Denham Pit Primitive Boat Ramp to Forrest W. Bo Wood Boat Ramp. In total, it is just under a 12-mile kayak trip that takes around 4 hours to complete (at normal lake level.) This versatile trail offers distances for all paddling experience levels with several put in/take out points along the route and quiet coves to explore!

Moweaqua Coal Mine Museum

Moweaqua Coal Mine Museum at 129 S. Main St. in Moweaqua, IL has displays and memorabilia from a bygone era in mid-western prairie history. Most well-known for the Dec. 24, 1932 disaster that killed 54 workers, the coal mine closed in 1935 and the museum was dedicated in 1986. Hours are 1 p.m.–4 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays. Moweaqua.org

The Best Wedding Chapel

The Best Wedding Chapel is nestled in the historic town of Shelbyville. Dedicated in the 1870s, this former Catholic Church features Gothic style architecture, 14-foot original stained-glass windows, and a 33-foot cathedral ceiling with a small archway separating the vestibule from the nave. It is now the home and business of the Best family. The wedding chapel is available as a traditional, as well as non-traditional, wedding or vow renewal site. It is located at 159 North Washington Street.

Boarman's Roxy Theatre

The Roxy Theatre ran movies until November 6, 1966, when its final curtain fell on "Mary Poppins." After the marquee was removed the building became home to several different businesses over the years. In 2003, Bob Boarman put up \$100,000 of his own money to get the ball rolling to reopen the theatre and it was decided the theatre would be named the Boarman Roxy Theatre. A group of interested business owners and towns people put in hundreds of volunteer hours to bring the theatre back to life. The first movie to be shown in the newly refurbished theatre was Mary Poppins on Nov. 6, 2003, exactly 37 years after it closed. The theatre is located in downtown Shelbyville.

Lake Shelbyville

Lake Shelbyville is a reservoir located in Shelby County, Illinois and Moultrie County, Illinois created by damming the Kaskaskia River at Shelbyville, Illinois. The lake's normal surface pool is 11,100 acres (44.9km2) at an elevation of 183 meters (600.4 ft). The area that surrounds the lake is the Shelbyville State Fish and Wildlife Area. The lake is managed by the United States Army Corps of Engineers, and the wildlife is managed by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

\$57 million was appropriated for the dam and lake project. Groundbreaking on the dam occurred May 4, 1963. Filling of the reservoir began Aug. 1, 1970. The lake was officially dedicated Sept. 12, 1970. The dam is 3,025 feet (922.0 m) long and 108 feet (32.9 m) tall with normal pool height 17 feet (5.2 m) below the top.

Bordering the lake are two state parks: Wolf Creek State Park and Eagle Creek State Park; and five federal campgrounds including Coon Creek, Opossum Creek, Lithia Springs, Lone Point and Forest (Bo) Woods. There is also Wilborn Creek and Whitley Creek Recreational Area. Lake Shelbyville's shoreline is heavily wooded and subject to severe erosion. Man-made beaches are located at Dam West (Shelbyville), Wilborn Creek, Wolf Creek State Park and Sullivan Beach. Aside from the main channel of the lake are many coves, suited for fishing. The lake is deeper than other major lakes in Illinois, so it is popular with boaters during the summer

There are full-service marinas, resorts and campgrounds on the lake. There are three full ser-

vice marinas: Findlay, Lithia Springs and Sullivan Marina. Findlay Marina is located north of Marker 5 just past the bridge on the west side of the lake. Sullivan Marina and Campground is located 4 miles south of Sullivan and includes hotel suites. Lithia Springs Marina is located on the southern end of Lake Shelbyville.


