Rural Retreats

ffingham resident Robert Dust and his wife, Kimi, walk TREC trail four to five times a week year-round – even in bad weather.

"We have walked it during a thunderstorm, during a hail storm, and even during the remnants of a hurricane," said Robert, adding that level of dedication has earned them and others like them the nickname "trekky."

"It stops a lot of people, but it does not stop us. We just dress for it. When it's bad weather, we don't see a lot of other people out there, just a few of us hard-core 'trekkies,'" he said.


The couple lives about an eighth of a mile from the trail and briskly walks five miles of it in an hour, taking a different path each time. They love the outdoors and seeing the animals.

"You see all kinds of wildlife on the TREC trail, anywhere from deer to raccoons, to squirrels, to rabbits. This year, we even saw a beaver by the river. Never seen that before," said Robert. Aside from enjoying it, Robert notes the walks are good for their physical and mental health.

"Kimi's a mental health professional and she is the first one that will tell you how good the TREC trail is for your mental health if you just get out in nature," said Robert.

As more outdoor enthusiasts hit the trail this spring, work is underway on a big addition to it.

A 1,400-foot section is being added to the loop around the 53-acre nature park. Plans are to begin pouring concrete in late April, weather permitting, and finish by early summer. The project is being paid for through a matching grant overseen by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.



TREC Board members are seeking to raise \$75,000 for the final 1,200 feet to finish the loop and connect it back to the main river crossing trail. Whether that portion gets completed this year depends on how soon those funds can be raised, according to TREC Board President Mo Dust.

That isn't the only project for the trail in the works this



year.

A website is being created for TREC that will have a set of maps for the whole trail system. It will also provide a portal for people who want to donate and provide historical information about TREC.

"We're really looking forward to having that available this year," said Mo, adding he does not know when the website will be ready.

Mo is particularly looking forward to the website providing a place to volunteer.

"It also is a chance for the TREC Board to see how we can use that help," he said.

While people currently volunteer, Mo notes it's kind of "ad hoc."

"They just go out and do things. We want that to continue but a little bit more of an organized approach to volunteers and upkeep of the trail," he said.

An example is when a person donated 300 daffodils last year, and volunteers planted them in the nature park area.

"That kind of thing is where people can get involved and kind of get their hands dirty not only just to keep the trail clean and looking sharp but also to add enhancements to it," he said.

He said volunteers last year helped clean out brush in a large part of the nature park, allowing the Little Wabash River to be visible from the picnic area.

"There's more of that to do," he added.

Mo said feedback this past year about the trail's upkeep has been "really good," which he also attributes to Effingham Park District for keeping the grass cut and clean and Effingham County for maintaining the trail by keeping brush away from it, trimming trees, and repairing concrete.

"Both are doing a great job of keeping the trail up," he said.

The website will allow people to give their input, including on areas where they would like TREC to be expanded.

"We're continuously looking at: Are there other areas around the TREC trail properties that we could add a trail and really benefit the people in the area?" he said.

Another addition to the trail this year will be a TREC monument sign funded by the city of Effingham. It will be located at the Outer Belt West TREC trailhead. Mo said the sign's purpose is to let people unfamiliar with TREC know where the trailhead is.

While the trail is popular with residents, it receives plenty of newcomers. Mo has met people from outside the area – and even the state – on the trail.

"One gentleman was walking through and said, 'I don't live anywhere near here. I drive a truck and come through on the interstate system, and I found this and love it. I come here and stop just to walk the trails, and then I'll keep going," he said.

Mo has also met people from Indiana who were in Effingham for a conference at the Thelma Keller Convention Center.

"Now they come back through just to stop at the trail," he said. Robert and his wife have also met out-of-towners who stop in Effingham to walk the trail.

"They will stay the night in a motel, eat, get gas, and the next day they take off and go the rest of their journey," he said. "The last couple we met were out of Chicago and heading down to Tennessee, and they stop here all the time, get out, stretch their legs, and walk the TREC."

Robert encourages others to get on the trail and has a goal this year to get his grandkids to join them for several walks.

"I very highly recommend walking the TREC," he said.

Pana Tri-County Fairgrounds

CLARK COUNTY ATTRACTIONS

Archer House

The Archer House, located at 717 Archer Ave in Marshall, was built in 1841 and is the oldest hotel still in operation in Illinois. It was entered into the National Register of Historic places on March 16, 1976. Both presidents Abraham Lincoln and Grover Cleveland were guests at the Archer House.

Stone Arch Bridge

Stone Arch Bridge was constructed in 1831 with no mortar and is still in use today. The National Road runs over this bridge and it is located on Archer Ave. at the west edge of the City of Marshall.

Mill Creek Park

Located seven miles northwest of Marshall on the Lincoln Heritage Trail Road. Mill Creek Park opened May 29, 1982 and consists of 2,600 acres of land and 811 acres of water with 39 miles of shoreline. Lincoln Trail State Park

Whether you are looking for history, unusual plant life or recreation, Lincoln Trail State Park has something to interest you. Located just west of IL Rt. 1, 2 miles south of Marshall in Clark County, the area is named after the trail Abraham Lincoln's family followed enroute from Indiana to Illinois in 1831. Three Native American groups, the Miami, Kickapoo and Mascouten, occupied the site before it was ceded to the United States in the early 19th century. Today, visitors to the 1,023-acre park can enjoy the sights of an American Beech woods; wildflowers, including the unusual squaw-root and beech drops; and recreational activities such as boating, camping, fishing, hiking and winter sports.

Meander the fields, help with chores or just breathe the fresh air during a stay at an Illinois farm

njoy sleeping in a grain bin, riding in a combine or gathering eggs from a chicken coop for the freshest omelet you'll ever taste. If these bucolic happenings sound perfect, it's time for an overnight stay at an Illinois farm. Meet three Illinois farms offering a variety of experiences for a sojourn into the country.

THE HAS BIN

Mary and Stan Seaman grow corn, soybeans and wheat, raise beef cattle, and preserve fruits and vegetables from their garden on the Vermilion County farm where Stan grew up. They weren't looking for more work, but a few years ago they created The Has Bin Guest House after a neighbor asked Stan to help remove a grain bin from his property.

"I didn't know what I would do with the bin at the time, but I like to be creative and figure out how old things might be used for something else," Mary said.

Stan moved the grain bin to their farm and converted it into an 18-foot-diameter bed-and-breakfast. The flooring and beams came from an 1800s barn. An antique sewing machine and Victorian-era bowl were repurposed as a sink and washstand. The nonworking stove, circa 1920s, provides a surface for the coffee station. Mary's complimentary breakfast features homemade jam or jelly and eggs from their neighbor's chickens.

"I love people and hosting, and even though we are busy, this just fits," Mary said.

She enjoys treating guests celebrating special occasions with a homemade cake, card or colorful sign. Plus, it's a chance to teach guests about agriculture.

"On the farm, we've had people ride along on the combine who

don't know anything about harvesting," Mary said.

Those who do venture afield can visit a craft brewery, vineyard or parks for hiking and horseback riding. Nearby Danville has a rich Abraham Lincoln history, as he practiced law there for 18 years. However, many guests never leave the back deck, enjoying the comforts and peace on the farm.

"I'm busier than I ever imagined," Mary said. "People want to get away from the city out on the farm where it's peaceful."

GRAFTON GETAWAY GUESTHOUSES

Brandon Jeffers, a contractor who has traveled to all seven continents, is a native of Winchester, population 1,700. He bought a working farm with the sole intent of hosting people to share this rural oasis.

"These rural roots are ingrained in me," he said.

His Grafton Getaway Guesthouses consist of seven sites, all located within a 15-minute drive of Grafton and each other. The farm sits on 23 acres with picturesque red barns providing the space for chicken coops, wooded trails, a firepit and the giant yard chess board that's a signature Jeffers amenity.

"It's a new adventure to a lot of guests who have never been in a chicken coop and don't know how to fetch eggs," he said. "It's fun to be able to offer that kind of experience."

At the farm, guests will find sleeping arrangements for 26 people. The venue hosts church groups, yoga retreats, small weddings and family reunions. Amenities include a trampoline, ping pong table, putting green and kids' zone in the barn. Guests can also fish in the pond or sleep in the barn's hayloft.

Nearby attractions include Pere Marquette State Park, Tree-house Wildlife Center, a waterpark, wineries, a zipline and Eckert's Orchard in Grafton. However, most of Jeffers' guests are seeking the farm stay as their main destination.

"They're coming here specifically, and they may not leave the property," he said. "We're a place where kids can just run around and be kids."

THE COUNTRY EXPERIENCE

Ed and Elizabeth Amstutz first developed The Country Experience in Jo Daviess County for summer sleepaway camps.

"Our kids had gone to a farm camp in Ohio and came back smelly, smiley and wanting to do it all over again," Ed Amstutz said.

The Amstutz family's desire to share their ideas for growing their own food with minimal impacts also moved them to purchase The Country Experience. School tours followed the summer camp success, then farm stays soon began, inviting all ages to the farm.

"Children who aren't yet in school or summer camp-age can come and experience what it's like to take care of a pig or a goat, to feed a chicken and to harvest a ripe tomato out of the garden," said Amstutz, expanding on the decision to offer farm stays.

The 34-acre property includes five cabins, three tents, a cen-

tury-old barn and a fishing pond. Guests can come for the entire weekend, with most meals included.

"Most people come to us seeking the opportunity to be part of the actual farm work," Amstutz said, noting visitors say their best experiences stem from going inside the fences to feed and interact with the goats, cows, pigs, sheep, donkeys, chickens and rabbits.

Those who venture off-site can explore the historic town of Galena, located 12 miles away. And hiking trails abound at nearby Mississippi Palisades State Park.

"We get so many people who just want to experience rural life," Amstutz said. "We provide the oppor-

tunity for people to discover a little bit about who they are and who they can be and, at the same time, getting them closer to realizing what it really takes to raise chickens for a dozen eggs."

The General Dean Suspension Bridge spans the Kaskaskia River at Carlyle. It is named after Major General William F. Dean, a native of Carlyle who served during the Korean War. The bridge is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and was added to the Register

Cholera Cross

Driving along the main road south of Breese, you will pass a soaring white cross, about 25 feet tall, a remembrance of tragedy that happened 183 years ago. The Cholera Cross is a local landmark with a notable history. Built in 1850, the cross is a memorial to those who lost their lives in the cholera outbreak of 1832. It was a devastating disease caused by contaminated water or food, and transmitted by personal contact. This outbreak was first diagnosed in Chicago, where part of the militia fighting the Black Hawk War was struck. The disease spread quickly, raging like wildfire, eventually reaching southern Illinois where the towns of Breese, Germantown and Carlyle suffered the most devastating losses. During this time, a local farmer, Joe Altepeter, prayed to God to spare his family, and promised that if they lived, he would erect a large cross to profess his faith. His family was spared and Altepeter constructed the cross and mounted it at the road in front of his home. A brass plaque notes the story, a reminder of one man's pledge and a county's devastation. The cross sits at the original location on County Highway 7, about one mile south of Breese, just off the lane that runs to a dairy farm. Be sure to stop and take note the next time you drive by.

Coal Miners' Monument


Joseph Koch, who along with eight other local miners died in a mine explosion in 1947, is depicted here. Today the Coal Miners Monument on Louis Street in Beckemeyer depicts these downed workers, and pays tribute to the men who helped build one of Clinton County's largest industries.

Breese Historical Park & Garden

Located at 496 N. 2nd Street in Breese, IL, peruse Breese's history in photographs, memorials and on the granite pyramid in this neighborhood park. Benches and seasonal plants make this a quiet spot for rest and reflection. Make Breese Historical Park & Garden your spot for picnicking and playing.



Charleston Downtown Square

Charleston's Downtown Square has been the site of the Coles County seat since 1835. Abraham Lincoln practiced law in a previous version of the courthouse. Today, the late 19th century Romanesque courthouse sits at the center of the square. Historic buildings display stunning architectural details and serve as home to current professional offices, unique shops and restaurants.

Charleston Riot Historic Marker

Located on the Coles County Courthouse square, the Charleston Riot Historic Marker commemorates a face-to-face encounter in Charleston that took place during the Civil War between southern sympathizers, Union soldiers and citizens who favored the Lincoln administration.

Lincoln Unlocked brings new digital experiences to presidential library

he Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum has launched Lincoln Unlocked, a digital tool that gives visitors exciting new ways to explore Lincoln's legacy, see rare items from the library's collection and even connect with family and friends to play games.

ALPLM visitors can point their phones at exhibits to see historic figures spring to life. They can take themed tours to dive into the roles of women and African Americans during Lincoln's life. And they can hear "Lincoln" deliver the Gettysburg Address or listen to a music box owned by Mary Lincoln. It's also an accessibility aide, offering content in six languages and enriching visits for people who are deaf or visually impaired.

Illinois State Museum opens 'Here, There' exhibit in Springfield

he Illinois State Museum on March 15 opened "Here, There: New Perspectives on the Collection," a guest-curated exhibition featuring modern and contemporary artworks by Illinois artists, in its second-floor galleries at its Springfield location.

Three guest curators, Mariela Acuña, Sheridan Tucker Anderson, and Allison Lacher, were invited to explore and bring a fresh perspective to the museum's nearly 100-year-old collection of Illinois and regional artists. Oblong

Oblong, located on the western edge of the county, also offers a variety of unique retailers. Collectibles, quilt and sewing supplies, handcrafted gifts, floral, and furnishings can be found along Main Street in Oblong. The Oil Field Museum in Oblong is one of only seven such facilities in the nation. It features two buildings of displays, tools, books and literature, working models and photographs regarding the boom days of oil discovery in Crawford County Illinois in the early 1900s.

Palestine

Palestine is the oldest town in the state of Illinois still in its original location. The entire business district is listed on the National Historic Register, and many turn-of-the-century buildings house art galleries, antique and collectible stores, and gift shops. Visitors come from all around to visit this historic village full of rich history. Palestine is home to the Fife Opera House, the annual Pioneer City Rodeo and Labor Day Festival, and many other history rich events throughout the year.

Hutsonville

Hutsonville, at the Wabash River Bridge on the northeast edge of the county, features the Hutson Memorial Village. A "town" made up of original, furnished log cabins, a log barn, and log church, is named in honor of the Isaac Hutson family which was massacred by Indians in 1813. Each year, the event is re-enacted, and several other family oriented events are held at the complex throughout the year. Antique and specialty stores round out the village, along with a bookstore located in the house where Illinois' ninth Governor, August French, was married.

Flat Rock

Flat Rock may not be the retail mecca of the county, but it does get a big "thumbs up" when it comes to a great milkshake, fresh pie, and friendly conversation. The annual Flat Rock Homecoming is a great time to visit the village for memorable family fun. After a disastrous fire in 1912, an ordinance was passed that all new buildings must be constructed of brick. The town has more concrete sidewalk per capita than anywhere in the nation.

Visit a Clock Tower on a local farm at 138 Co Rd 500N, Sigel, IL 62462 that is powered by the old clockwork from St. Michael Catholic Church in Sigel IL. The clockwork is over 100 years old. The tower is approximately 35 foot tall, is lit at night and decorated during the holiday season.

Cumberland County Courthouse

Visit the completely restored Cumberland County Courthouse located on the square in Toledo, IL. Built in 1887–88, the building is Cumberland County's second courthouse. The first courthouse, located at the same site as the current one, was built in 1856 and burned in 1885. The second courthouse was designed by architects S. S. Goehring and L.L. Pierson. The building's design features a central clock tower, arched entrances on the east and west sides, column-supported balconies above the entrances, and a balustrade along the roofline. The building has continuously served as the seat of county government since its opening. The courthouse was added to the National Register of Historic Places on June 11, 1981.

Sears "Catalog Homes"

Tuscola is home to four "catalog homes." From 1908 until 1940, the Chicago-based catalog giant Sears, as well as Montgomery Ward, offered and sold roughly 100,000 build-it-yourself home kits. There were 450 various models ranging in price from \$150 to a little more than \$5,000. One home is located at 309 N Main. It was ordered in 1931 and is called "The Cambridge". Another is located at 106 E. Buckner. The home was built in 1915 and located 5½ miles west of Tuscola, before being moved to its present site in 1946. Yet another home is located a few miles north of Tuscola on Route 45. It was built 1920-22. The fourth home is located on Scott St. and was built in 1915.


Douglas County Courthouse

The Douglas County Courthouse sits on a full block on the south side of Tuscola. It is the home of murals printed by E. Martin Hennings, circa 1912. It was built in 1912-13 in classical style architecture. The woodwork is all white oak, floors in public places are of tile and terrazzo and corridor walls are wainscoted with finely polished marble. All columns and pilasters are of scagliola exquisite workmanship. In the center of the building and extending throughout the three stories is a beautiful glass dome.

Illinois Amish Heritage Center

The Illinois Amish Heritage Center was first created in 1994 as the Illinois Amish Interpretive Center located in Arthur, Illinois. The Center offered an introductory film to Amish life, exhibits on Amish heritage and culture, a gift shop, and Amish Country Tours of Amish homes, farms, businesses and meals in Amish homes.

In 2010, the Center was moved to Rockome Gardens and renamed The Illinois Amish Museum. The museum remained open at Rockome through 2014 when Rockome went up for sale. Rockome was purchased later that year and the new owner began implementation of a wildlife park. The Amish Museum was subsequently put into storage and the search for a new facility began.

In 2014, plans had been made to move the houses to Rockome Gardens, \$102,000 was raised, and a state tourism grant was written. The pending sale of Rockome and state budget problems put a hold on these plans.

In 2016, five acres of land were secured one mile west of Chesterville and three miles east of Arthur, Illinois. In September, the houses were moved to the new site and a plan for the construction of a new museum building and Amish living history farm were developed. Restoration on the Schrock house and planning for a steam threshing event in the summer of 2017 began. A development plan laid out a four year time table for the completion of the

The mission of the Illinois Amish Heritage Preservation Center is to enhance the preservation, understanding, and appreciation of all aspects of the culture and heritage of the Amish people in Illinois from 1865 to present.





Savor the flavors and scenery of the Shawnee Hills Wine Trail

hile the proverbial "road not taken" might appeal to poets, wine lovers prefer a trail well-traveled. In the southernmost stretch of Illinois, the Shawnee Hills Wine Trail proves that fine wines and the great outdoors are the perfect pairing.

A WINE TRAIL IS BORN

The roots of the Shawnee Hills Wine Trail stretch back 40 years ago to a visionary farmer.

"It all started in 1984 when Guy Renzaglia established Alto Vineyards by planting 5 acres of then-unheard-of grape varieties — chancellor, chambourcin, vidal and Villard blanc — that are now widely accepted by Midwestern wine drinkers," says Carol Hoffman of the Southernmost Illinois Tourism Bureau. "Word got out, curiosity grew and by the time the winery was built and the first wine released in 1987, people were standing in line waiting to buy this new Illinois wine as fast as the crew could label it."

By the summer of 1995, the owners of Pomona Winery and Owl Creek Vineyard had joined Alto Vineyards and – with the help of local tourism bureaus – Illinois' first wine trail was born.

Today, the trail spans 40 miles and 12 wineries, each offering striking views and their own unique spin on fine wine, good food and fun times. In 2006, the region earned the prestigious American Viticultural Area designation, recognizing Shawnee

Hills as a unique wine grape growing region. Along with eccentric

wines, the area boasts a range of outdoor activi-

ties and other attractions, plus views that will take your breath away.

"Along the trail, you'll encounter an array of specialty shops, farms, unique eateries, art galleries and a growing number of breweries," Hoffman says. "And the Shawnee National Forest provides some of the most beautiful scenery in the Midwest."

PEACHES & DREAMS

According to Hoffman, the trail adds an estimated \$126 million to the local economy every year and welcomes 150,000 visitors, including people like Jenny Schroeder.

When not working as a nurse anesthesiologist, Jenny's favorite pastime involved visiting wine trails in Illinois and Michigan with a group of friends.

During one visit, Jenny had an "aha! moment" while chatting with a server.

"She mentioned that she had friends who had retired and opened a winery," Jenny recalls. "It hit me like a lightning bolt that maybe my husband, Scott, and I could do that, too."

The unexpected dream became a reality when the Schroeders, originally from Watseka, purchased the Peachbarn Winery & Cafe in Alto Pass in 2020.

Scott, a former construction contractor, volunteer fire chief and beer-over-wine guy, began learning the ropes of grape farming and winemaking. Jenny took the reins of managing and rebranding the business, which had previously specialized in traditional Swedish food and formal dining.

"We try to stay authentic to our roots," Jenny says. "The Peachbarn Winery & Cafe is in a real barn that was once a livestock and produce barn built in 1946. The kitchen used to be a horse stall, and the rental suite in the basement was once a manure pit – it's fun to tell guests that."

The Schroeders grow red grape varietals Corot noir and chambourcin, which is similar to merlot, and chardonel, a white grape similar to chardonnay – and, of course, peaches.

"We only make wine from grapes that grow right here," Jenny says. "We are definitely known for our Peach Fuzz wine — it's pretty unique. It's like biting into a fresh peach. In the winemaking world, if you're making a non-grape-flavored wine, you typically start with a white wine base. But our peach wines are 100% peaches. Even more unique is that we have a dry peach wine, too."

From the sangria to the salads, the Schroeders strive to incorporate seasonal, locally sourced ingredients into their menu, like the lavender that grows at the farm just down the road every June.

"It's really fun to feature something from local farms in our creations," Jenny says. "The farms and restaurants in this region are mutually supportive. We all try to source ingredients from area producers."

CAMARADERIE VS. COMPETITION

The mutual support helped seal the deal for the Schroeders to do business in southern Illinois. It becomes even more critical today as area grape growers navigate challenges related to weather and higher costs.

"There is an obvious camaraderie in the way the Shawnee Hills wineries support each other and emphasize each other's strengths," Jenny says. "Even as a customer, I could see the cohesiveness of the trail. As winemakers and wineries, we want to produce the highest quality and most regionally authentic wines."

From the sweet peach wines and rustic charm of Peachbarn Winery & Cafe to the Apple Knocker hard cider and outdoor entertainment at Owl Creek Vineyard, you'll find something special at every stop along the Shawnee Hills Wine Trail.

As the trail's slogan suggests, you may come for the wine but you'll stay for the experience, which Jenny learned firsthand.

"It's gorgeous down here, and the people are really laid back and friendly," she says. "The Shawnee Hills Wine Trail has always been my happy place."



New Salem volunteers blame state for letting historic site fall into disrepair

After public pressure, Illinois commits \$8M to repair deteriorating site where Lincoln launched political career

early a century after the Civil Conservation Corps reconstructed the once-thriving village of New Salem where Abraham Lincoln spent his 20s working odd jobs, studying law and winning his first election, the historic site just northwest of Springfield has fallen into disrepair.

Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site is a replica of the hamlet where Lincoln lived for six years during his early adulthood, and where he won his first elective office – though only after losing his first election. For decades, it's been a destination for school field trips and tourists visiting Springfield to immerse themselves in the 16th president's adopted hometown.

But these days, the roofs on three of the site's structures are caving in.

The Carding Mill, a replica of the original machine at the site that spun wool into fabric and the only animal-powered one of its kind in the United States, is at risk of being irreparably damaged. Last month, a big section of the mill's roof "totally collapsed" onto the wheel that would have been rotated by oxen.

In fact, many of the two-dozen buildings on the site are deteriorating, according to Gina Gillmore-Wolter, president of the New Salem Lincoln League, a volunteer organization that puts on events and tours at the site. In addition to moss, saplings

are sprouting from rooftops while rot and mold are spreading inside the buildings, which was evident on a recent media tour of New Salem.

"It's no exaggeration when we say without swift intervention, we risk losing these historical assets," Gillmore-Wolter said at a Capitol news conference in February.

New Salem includes 23 historical replicas, including homes, barns, stores, a tavern, school, and three mills for wool, lumber and wheat. The site also has a visitor center with museum exhibits and an auditorium, plus an outdoor theater and acres of hiking trails, a campground and playground.

Prompted by Gillmore-Wolter's efforts, a pair of Republican state lawmakers are seeking a fix for New Salem via a package of legislation introduced in February to prioritize and fund repairs. The trio of bills, which have bipartisan support, initially sought to spend \$5 million from the state's infrastructure fund.

But state Sen. Steve McClure, R-Springfield, said that after the Illinois Department of Natural Resources informed him that it would take \$19 million to fully repair the site, he intended to amend his legislative funding request accordingly.

However, IDNR beat McClure to it in March, announcing in tandem with the state's Capital Development Board that it would spend \$8 million to repair "up to 23 log village buildings and update the outdoor theater" at New Salem.

"For decades, Illinois families have enjoyed visiting New Salem for class trips, historical demonstrations, scouting excursions, theater outings, candlelight walks, summer picnics, and more," IDNR Director Natalie Phelps Finnie said in the news release announcing the funding. "We want to ensure visitors can continue enjoying all that New Salem has to offer for years to come."

DEFERRED MAINTENANCE

Despite New Salem's deteriorating condition, the crumbling roofs and general rot of the buildings don't even make IDNR's list of top five deferred maintenance projects, according to agency spokesperson Jayette Bolinski. The \$19 million in estimated repair needs at New Salem represent less than 2% of the agency's total \$1 billion deferred maintenance bill for properties statewide ranging from other state historic sites to critical water infrastructure.

In the last eight years, IDNR has spent \$2.8 million at New Salem on projects as banal as HVAC repairs and replacements to expensive endeavors like building new bathrooms at the site's concession center, reconstructing a barn on site and repairing a covered bridge.

State Rep. Wayne Rosenthal, R-Morrisonville, who intends to carry McClure's bills in the House, said the list of necessary repairs at New Salem wouldn't be so expensive had IDNR received adequate funding from the state to repair damages when they happened instead of letting them linger.

"Normal maintenance becomes deferred maintenance when you don't have the resources to pay for it or the people to do the work," he said. "And deferred maintenance becomes deterioration."

Rosenthal served as IDNR director from 2015 to 2019, including during the state's two-year budget impasse under former Gov. Bruce Rauner. But he pointed to ex-Gov. Rod Blagojevich's administration as the beginning of a series of budget cuts that severely limited the agency's ability to maintain historic sites and national parks like New Salem.

"At one time we had probably close to 3,000 personnel and now they're down to probably 1,200, so when you lose that much manpower, it makes a world of difference on everything," Rep. Rosenthal said.

According to Bolinski, IDNR had approximately 2,400 employees in the late 1990s, but when Gov. JB Pritzker took office in early 2019, agency payroll had shrunk to 1,140. IDNR continued getting smaller even as the agency was tasked with more responsibilities in the years that followed its transformation from the hunting and fishing-focused Department of Conservation in 1995.

While Rosenthal was serving as IDNR director in 2017, responsibility for the state's 56 historic sites was also transferred to the agency's purview after the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency was dissolved into it. In the last six years, the Pritzker administration has added a modest number of staffers to IDNR; according to Bolinski, agency headcount currently stands at 1,245.

Only seven IDNR employees are dedicated full-time to New

Salem. One of those staffers is a carpenter, though he generally works on smaller projects like repairing picnic tables and fences. According to Bolinski, the agency is authorized to hire a construction company to do repairs – but only if IDNR has the funds. And for construction projects that exceed \$350,000, the project must go through approvals from the Capital Development Board, likely involving organized labor.

But McClure and Rosenthal are pushing for legislation to waive normal state procurement rules for repairs on New Salem so the state can more easily find and contract with skilled tradesmen who are capable of construction techniques true to the era in which the village was built.

One of the larger needed repairs at the site includes the Grist

Mill, a replica of the mill where New Salem residents would grind wheat into flour. The mill's drive shaft has been lying in the weeds near the structure since 2016 after it was dislodged due to flooding. Gillmore-Wolter, who grew up visiting the site as a child, said she doesn't recall the last time the Grist Mill was operable but is eager to see it repaired.

"I think this would be top on the priority list of repairs," she said, citing the mill's importance not just to New Salem but to the local economy. "It brought tourists out here. They would go on into Petersburg and eat lunch and buy gas."

Gillmore-Wolter estimated New



Salem used to draw upwards of 400,000 people a year as school buses dropped off students on field trips and visitors from across the world traveled to central Illinois.

Gillmore-Wolter said that because of the decay at the site, its popularity has dwindled significantly, though IDNR's official visitor count for 2024 was 359,950.

In addition to setting aside funds for repairs at New Salem and suspending procurement requirements, one of McClure and Rosenthal's proposed bills would also create a dedicated 13-member commission to oversee New Salem, which they said is necessary to make recommendations, develop plans and coordinate repair and maintenance efforts.

All three legislative proposals have already picked up Democratic co-sponsors but the commission bill passed through a Senate committee in February.

However, IDNR is not supportive of the idea, panning it as merely "creating additional bureaucracy and red tape."

Instead, the agency encouraged Gillmore-Wolter's group, the New Salem Lincoln League to accept its offer of re-entering into a "Friends" agreement, which include memorandums of understanding between IDNR and nonprofits with vested interest in a particular state property. The MOU outlines rights and responsibilities of both parties — including financially. The league's previous MOU has been expired since the end of 2022.

"Historic sites Friends groups and advocacy groups have been able to work well with IDNR on site improvements for years," the agency said.

LINCOLN IN NEW SALEM

When Lincoln arrived in New Salem in 1831, the village was new, having only been settled two years prior. During his six years there, the future president held a series of jobs, including as postmaster, running a general store-turned-tavern and picking up side work harvesting crops, helping at the mill and

splitting rails – a task that would later inspire the nickname "railsplitter" decades later as Lincoln ran for president.

Lincoln began cutting his political teeth soon after moving to New Salem, working the polls the day of the 1831 congressional election, which allowed him to meet most of the men in town, whom Gillmore-Wolter said were key to his development.

"The residents of New Salem really recognized his potential for leadership, his ingenuity, and they really fostered that in him," she said. "For example, some residents would bring him books to read from Illinois College."

In 1832, Lincoln was elected captain by his company in the state militia during the Black Hawk War, but he also experienced his first electoral loss that same year in a failed bid for a seat in the Illinois House.

Two years later, however, he was elected state representative, a post he'd hold through his move to Springfield. Not long after Lincoln's departure from New Salem, the town was abandoned and left to pasture.

"If it wasn't for New Salem, President Lincoln would not be in the state of Illinois, and he would have never run for office, potentially," McClure said.

State Sen. Robert Peters, D-Chicago, who signed on as co-sponsor of the New Salem commission bill, also emphasized the site's significance.

"This legislation not only safeguards a key part of our state's heritage but also guarantees the story of Abraham Lincoln's early life will continue to inspire and educate for years to come," he said in a statement.



Vahling Vineyards

Tallman House

The historic Tallman House is located at 806 Main St., Shelbyville. It was built in 1905 by the inventor of the first mechanical hay baler and is listed in National Register of Historical Places. It was restored in 1989 and now serves as office of Shelby Historic House and Inn. For more information call 217-774-3991

Shelby County Courthouse

Shelby County Courthouse in downtown Shelbyville was built between 1879 and 1881. It houses historic paintings, including the Robert Root depiction of the Abraham Lincoln-Anthony Thornton debate. Hours are 8 a.m-4 p.m. Monday through Friday and courtrooms are generally open for viewing when court is not in session.

Tree-filled Forest Park

Tree-filled Forest Park in Shelbyville is a beautiful place to spend a day. There are areas for picnicking, hiking and fishing. During summer there are swimming, basketball, baseball, softball, volleyball, soccer and tennis facilities.

Lincoln Public Square

The Lincoln Public Square houses the Soldiers & Sailors Monument, designed by local artist Robert Marshall Root. The square was erected in 1907 in memory of the fighting men in the county. The square also has a plaque in honor of Abraham Lincoln, who practiced law in Shelbyville. There is also a plaque of Horrace Tallman, the inventor of the first mechanical pick-up hay baler. Flags are placed around the square during Memorial Day and Labor Day. On July 3, 2002, an eternal flame was dedicated to the men and women who have served in the past wars. The black granite base of the flame contains etchings, such as General Douglas McArthur wading ashore in the Phillipines in 1945, Marines raising the flag at Iwo Jima in World War II and Shelbyville resident August West.

Johnson's Goat Tower

Johnson's Goat Tower is located at 1968 N. 2500 East Road at Windsor, IL 61957. The tower is a structure consisting of 5000 handmade bricks from North Carolina, 276 concrete steps that are 40 inches long and cantilevered into the brick and a copper roof. The six compartments, three on each side, have a concrete floor. At 31 feet tall with a 7 ½ foot diameter, it is the world's largest goat tower. Saanen goats, Swiss dairy goats that love to climb, live in the tower. Phone (217)454-2337 and leave a message or text. goattowerfarm.com

Paddling Lake Shelbyville

Established in 2020, the Lake Shelbyville Water Trail – Kaskaskia Branch travels downstream from Denham Pit Primitive Boat Ramp to Forrest W. Bo Wood Boat Ramp. In total, it is just under a 12-mile kayak trip that takes around 4 hours to complete (at normal lake level.) This versatile trail offers distances for all paddling experience levels with several put in/take out points along the route and quiet coves to explore!

Moweaqua Coal Mine Museum

Moweaqua Coal Mine Museum at 129 S. Main St. in Moweaqua, IL has displays and memorabilia from a bygone era in mid-western prairie history. Most well-known for the Dec. 24, 1932 disaster that killed 54 workers, the coal mine closed in 1935 and the museum was dedicated in 1986. Hours are 1 p.m.-4 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays. Moweaqua.org

The Best Wedding Chapel

The Best Wedding Chapel is nestled in the historic town of Shelbyville. Dedicated in the 1870s, this former Catholic Church features Gothic style architecture, 14-foot original stained-glass windows, and a 33-foot cathedral ceiling with a small archway separating the vestibule from the nave. It is now the home and business of the Best family. The wedding chapel is available as a traditional, as well as non-traditional, wedding or vow renewal site. It is located at 159 North Washington Street.

Boarman's Roxy Theatre

The Roxy Theatre ran movies until November 6, 1966, when its final curtain fell on "Mary Poppins." After the marquee was removed the building became home to several different businesses over the years. In 2003, Bob Boarman put up \$100,000 of his own money to get the ball rolling to reopen the theatre and it was decided the theatre would be named the Boarman Roxy Theatre. A group of interested business owners and towns people put in hundreds of volunteer hours to bring the theatre back to life. The first movie to be shown in the newly refurbished theatre was Mary Poppins on November 6, 2003, exactly 37 years after it closed.

Lake Shelbyville

Lake Shelbyville is a reservoir located in Shelby County, Illinois and Moultrie County, Illinois created by damming the Kaskaskia River at Shelbyville, Illinois. The lake's normal surface pool is 11,100 acres (44.9km2) at an elevation of 183 meters (600.4 ft). The area that surrounds the lake is the Shelbyville State Fish and Wildlife Area. The lake is managed by the United States Army Corps of Engineers, and the wildlife is managed by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

\$57 million was appropriated for the dam and lake project. Groundbreaking on the dam occurred May 4, 1963. Filling of the reservoir began Aug. 1, 1970. The lake was officially dedicated Sept. 12, 1970. The dam is 3,025 feet (922.0 m) long and 108 feet (32.9 m) tall with normal pool height 17 feet (5.2 m) below the top.

Bordering the lake are two state parks: Wolf Creek State Park and Eagle Creek State Park; and five federal campgrounds including Coon Creek, Opossum Creek, Lithia Springs, Lone Point and Forest (Bo) Woods. There is also Wilborn Creek and Whitley Creek Recreational Area. Lake Shelbyville's shoreline is heavily wooded and subject to severe erosion. Man-made beaches are located at Dam West (Shelbyville), Wilborn Creek, Wolf Creek State Park and Sullivan Beach. Aside from the main channel of the lake are many coves, suited for fishing. The lake is deeper than other major lakes in Illinois, so it is popular with boaters during the summer.

There are full-service marinas, resorts and campgrounds on the lake. There are three full service marinas: Findlay, Lithia Springs and Sullivan Marina. Findlay Marina is located north of Marker 5 just past the bridge on the west side of the lake. Sullivan Marina and Campground is located 4 miles south of Sullivan and includes hotel suites. Lithia Springs Marina is located on the southern end of Lake Shelbyville.


