

#### 'The kids embrace the fire truck. They love the fire truck

ver three days in December, Effingham fire trucks can be seen around town, traversing nearly every street in the city. But it's not to look for fires or put them out.

They're escorting Santa Claus, bringing the Jolly Old Elf to residents, rather than them coming to see him.

The Santa Run, a tradition that started three years ago when Brant Yochum became the new chief of the Effingham Fire Department, is not your typical Santa visit. Yochum had seen similar events in other cities and was inspired to bring it to Effingham, but he made sure to add a local twist to make it unique.

"Sometimes, our Santa Claus will get off the truck and visit with the kids, take a picture," he said.

Yochum admits firefighters weren't sure what to think of it when he first suggested it.

"I think it was like 'what do you want to do?' he said.

But after two Runs and gearing up for the third this year, Jenn Alwardt, executive secretary to the fire chief, can attest "everybody loves it."

To cover as many streets as possible in a single night, while still observing bedtimes, the department divides the city into two areas, with one fire truck covering one area and a second covering the other.

Over three days, the fire trucks set out between 5:30 and 6 p.m. and head back to the fire station by 8 p.m.

To give residents advance notice when fire trucks would be coming to their street, Alwardt last year began posting live updates on Facebook of the fire trucks' locations. Alwardt said she has even had some people call to notify them that they were missed.

"I'll take it down and get a hold of whoever is in that spot and make sure they go back to them. It was kind of nice last year since they knew where we were at and knew if they were getting missed," she said.

However, some streets are too challenging for the fire trucks to drive down. In that case, people will meet the fire trucks at parking lots, such as the East Side Veterinary Clinic on Jefferson Avenue.

Each fire truck is accompanied by a staff car that serves as a spotter and communicates with the truck via a radio channel.

For example, Yochum said, "We'll just tell 'hey, let Santa

know there's a kid on the right-hand house coming up."

For some kids, it's not only a chance to see Santa Claus but also the fire truck.

"The kids embrace the fire truck. They love the fire truck," said Yochum.

Aside from putting smiles on faces, the goal of the Run is to encourage fire prevention.

"It helps our ISO (Insurance Services Office rating) cause it gives us community outreach. So, when we go out, we hand out some kind of fire prevention information. But then they get to see Santa Claus, and that's what draws the people out," said Yochum.

While adults get educational literature, Santa makes sure to bring candy canes for the kids. Many stand outside to greet Santa. However, some choose to stay inside.

"Some families make the choice just to wave from the living room window, which is really sweet too," said Alwardt. "They just stay in if they can't make it out."

Alwardt and Yochum note that parents appear just as excited as their children.

"Even people who don't have kids will come out," said Yochum.

"We had a couple of elderly neighborhoods where they were just so excited and stood at the front door of their houses and waved," added Alwardt.

"They have told me, 'This is just awesome that you guys are doing this," said Yochum.

The Run also provides firefighters with an opportunity to socialize outside of work.

"So, whenever we get together for that, it's hard not to stand around and visit," said Alwardt.

However, when it comes to starting time, Alwardt ensures they stick to the schedule.

"If it's supposed to start at 6 and it's 6:02, I'm out the door, go," she said.

Yochum said the event serves as a moral boost for the firefighters, putting them in the spirit of the season.

"It's a really good time," he said.

Paid-on-call firefighter Jake Burrell has been donning the Santa suit since the Run began. He rides on the fire truck all

three nights. He really gets into the role, according to Alwardt and Yochum, who said he asks the kids what they want for Christmas and lets them know the number of nights until Santa will arrive with those gifts.

"He does a really good job with it. He's got really big passion," said Yochum.

Alwardt said Burrell is a huge help with the program every year.

"He really does everything he can to make sure this program happens," she said.

Burrell had only been with the department about a year when the program started and didn't hesitate to volunteer.

"I just wanted to help out the department as much as I could," he said.

Burrell is finally realizing his long-time dream of being a firefighter and also of playing Santa.

"I like seeing the joys on the little kids' faces, and, believe it or not, there are actually some people my age and older that really get a kick out of that when we come around. And I like

seeing that, especially that time of year, at Christmastime, because it's supposed to be a time of joy," he said.

Burrell loves it so much that he has begun donning the suit for others, including the Special Olympics and St. Anthony Church.

Burrell said Alwardt and Yochum are Santa's big helpers when it comes to the Run.

"She helps me out with everything I need to try to get organized," said Burrell of Alwardt. "Jenn plays a big, big role in all this stuff. She does pretty much all the routing – where

we're going to go from night to night."

Burrell notes his wife is a big contributor as well.

"She runs in the truck with us and will actually take photos of the kids," he said.

Burrell enjoys getting out and seeing the kids' faces with big smiles on them.

"Smiles on the kids' faces is what this Run is all about," he

Burrell recalls one girl during the Run who uses a keyboard to talk. She always comes up and gives him a great big hug and types what she wants for Christmas.

"Actually makes a tear come to your eye when you see something like that. You know you're out there really putting a smile on the faces of children," he said.

The Santa Run this year is scheduled for Dec. 15, 16 and 17.

#### FOR EFFINGHAM WOMAN, THE ORNAMENT DOESN'T FALL FAR FROM THE TREE

or nearly 20 years, Ashleigh Crockett has gone all out decorating her home for the holidays not just Christmas, but all the holidays, including Flag Day.

"I mean, who doesn't love holidays. It just puts you in the spirit for all the holidays," she mused.

After she relocated to Effingham and moved into her newly built home on Newcomb Drive in 2021, she set her sights on the city's annual holiday display contest. She entered for the first time in 2023 and lost.

"I was so bummed," she recalled.

So, she decided to up her game and try again the following year. To her surprise, she won.

Passing motorists were greeted by giant letters spelling "Merry Christmas" in front of her home, flanked by two giant candy canes. The windows were adorned with large snowflakes, and the entrance with snow people, and more candy canes, all vibrantly lit.

But what they couldn't see was that inside the home were rooms full of decorations. From stairways to bathrooms, every nook and cranny was adorned with festive cheer.

It's an annual tradition for Crockett, whose penchant for decorating stems from her mother. Growing up, Crockett's mother would decorate their whole house for the holidays.

"I thought it was pretty cool. So then, I started collecting stuff and just kind of rolled on from there," Crockett explained.

Crockett started her year-round obsession with holiday decorating in 2006 when she lived in Virginia. It was an expressive outlet for her as a forensic accountant for the Department of Defense - now known as the Department of War - at the Pentagon.

"I sit behind a desk all day looking at numbers. That's not a lot of fun, decorating is," said Crockett, who now works remotely from home since she moved to Effingham to be close to her parents. "It's kind of a happy place, and you can express your personality in decorating."

At her home in Virginia, Crockett decorated 80 Christmas trees of various sizes and hosted big Christmas parties. Now that she has a smaller house, she only displays five or six full-size trees.

Still, Crockett finds setting up her trove of decorations to be time-consuming.

"When you're setting up a tree, you want everything to be perfect," she said.

Crockett stores all the decorations in her basement in

organized sections for each holiday, including Easter, Fourth of July, Valentine's Day, Thanksgiving, Halloween, and, of course, Christmas. The decorations consume the entire basement, with Christmas taking up the most space.

"I kind of laugh when I have people come over to do heating or air conditioning maintenance, wondering what they're thinking when they go down to my basement," she said.

Crockett gets help from her 14-year-old daughter, Patience, in carrying the bins up the stairs. She admits her daughter is sometimes reluctant to bring them up and thinks her decorating is too much.

"But then once it's all up, she really likes it and that's with every holiday," she said.

Crockett likes to change her décor every year, from color schemes - last year's Christmas scheme was red and white - to decorating themes. And when it comes to decorating Christmas trees, she has no limits, having created a golf-themed tree, a wine-themed tree and one with penguins, to name a few. But one of her favorites was a Dr. Seuss tree.

"I don't know what I'm going to do this year," she said as fall arrived. "I haven't decided yet."

Crockett has no method for choosing each year's décor.

"I just think about it. Think about what I want and the colors I want to use. It's just kind of my own brain. I talk to my mom. See what she





thinks too," she said. "She has a great eye."

Jackie Ruholl says her role is helping bring her daughter's visions to life.

Ruholl has been collecting decorations for decades and has even more than Crockett, enough to fill a big barn from top to bottom, which Crockett has borrowed from, including the giant Merry Christmas letters in last year's outdoor display.

Like her daughter, Ruholl's love of decorating also stems from her childhood. Her mother would take her downtown to see all the animatronic figures in the storefronts in Texas, where they lived, and in New York. As an adult, Ruholl started collecting them when the stores closed.

"I have a lot of the elves and penguins that are all animated. They come out once in a while, but most of the time they stay in a climate-controlled area," she said.

Ruholl said she and her daughter are close, and for them, decorating is more than just a physical activity they enjoy together.

"It's good therapy. It's kind of nice we can talk the whole time we're doing it," she said.

Ruholl, who decorates a few residences and businesses for Christmas, said they are both picky when it comes to decorating.

"We just want it perfect," she said. "We just want to put a smile on your

face. We want everybody to enjoy it."

Crockett describes her style as classy and inviting.

"I think Christmas is all about classic and home," she said. "Like 'oh, that's awesome looking, I want to go into that house and celebrate with them."

While she doesn't subscribe to the Griswold style of decorating on display in the movie "Christmas Vacation," she does consider herself a maximalist.

"Maybe I go a little overboard," she admits.

That's because it puts her in the spirit of the holiday.

"Just makes me happy. Cause you know, when you're surrounded by beautiful twinkle lights, it just makes you feel like a Norman Rockwell kind of thing. It makes you feel like you're for sure at home. And you're wanting to celebrate with your family and friends," she said.

Neighbor Jayne Genta looks forward to seeing what Crockett will put out next.

"I get excited that she does it cause it's fun to have somebody else who has the passion and loves it like I do," she said.

Her favorite of Crockett's outdoor holiday decorations is

- Jackie Ruholl, **Ashleigh Crockett's mother**  Christmas, which she realized extended inside when she attended a holiday open house that Crockett and her daughter hosted after moving in.

"It was beautiful. It was a house full of Christmas inside as well as she does outside," she said.

Crockett said she gets a lot of compliments.

"Some people come by my house just to see what I have up. So, that kind of makes you feel

good," she said.

Genta said it's fun for the whole neighborhood, which also has other decorated homes.

"It's a nice cul-de-sac of beautiful homes that decorate and get the spirit going on. It just makes you happy as you drive by. A lot of people drive by and go slow and enjoy that," she

Crockett makes all the décor decisions except for the tree in Patience's room. She chooses what goes on that.

"She's been wanting to do a dog tree. So, I've been collecting dog ornaments," Crockett said, adding the year before Patience wanted a dinosaur-themed tree.

"I know it sounds really funny or weird, but it actually

turned out really good," she said. Her daughter has also chosen "Frozen," along with mermaid and unicorn-themed trees.

Crockett likes to shop for unique ornaments at local specialty shops. But if she knows what she wants, she will log onto eBay and see if anyone has it. If she can't find the item she's looking for, she will find someone who can make it.

"There's a lady that made my Santa. So, if I wanted another type of figurine, I could message her and maybe have one made. It's just networking, finding out who does what," she said.

She does shop at commercial chains like Hobby Lobby, as well as "re-imagines" the décor she currently has. One Christmas decoration

that is special to her is a White House tree in her office, which she puts up every year. She has collected every official White House ornament released annually.

Crockett has even been to the White House at Christmastime, an experience she describes as "awesome."

Her dream has been to be one of the volunteers who decorate the White House. Unfortunately, when she lived in Virginia, her work schedule always interfered.

"If I could do that, I would have done that in a heartbeat," she said.

Still, Crockett wishes she could turn her decorating into a full-time job.

"But I think you need to live in a bigger city to be able to get the clients," she said.

As Crockett decided on her Christmas décor for this year, she noted fall is her busiest time, between work and getting ready for the holidays.





he 2025 Effingham High School Red Regiment Marching Band show, "Arcane," was inspired by wizards and magic. The marching band won several awards this season for its hard work and dedication to the show, including outstanding color guard and best music.

Throughout the season, the band, led by EHS Band Director Trent Mason and Junior High School Band Director Logan Andrews, competed in five competitions and performed one exhibition show.

Starting the competition season strong in September at the Metro East Marching Classic in O' Fallon, the class 1A band won best music, best general effect and first place in its class. Following this was the Tiger Ambush Classic in Edwardsville where the Red Regiment took home Outstanding Color Guard, first place in class 1A and Grand Champion of both 1A and 2A classes. A week later, the award-winning band hosted its own competition at EHS for over 20 marching bands in central and southern Illinois.

The final three competitions of the marching season included the Illinois State Marching Band Championships at Illinois State University, Bands of America: St. Louis Super Regional, and the Illinois Marching Band Championship at University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign. The Red Regiment competed against more than 40 bands at each one.

Illinois doesn't have an official state competition, said Andrews. So both the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign competition and the Illinois State Marching Band Championships bill themselves as the state competition.

"A lot of schools don't go to both, so you're never really comparing apples to apples," said Andrews. "We have gone to U of I every year for years and years. This will be our first time that we've gone to Illinois State. ... The only other time to my knowledge that Effingham went was in, like, 2009."

This was the band's second year competing in a Bands of America competition. During last year's Bands of America competition, the Red Regiment placed eighth out of 20 in class 1A and 67th out of 88 total bands.

"We knew we were jumping into the deep end, but we were pretty pleased with the result," said Andrews. "It was really about the experience."

The fantasy theme for "Arcane" was born on Halloween 2024 when a handful of band students walked into the band room dressed as wizards. This prompted Mason to ask Andrews about creating a wizard and magic themed marching band show. Andrews shared Mason's sentiment, and they began brainstorming show titles. The duo landed on "Arcane" because it's simple and catchy, said Andrews.

It wasn't until a month into the marching season when Mason and Andrews realized "Arcane" is also the name of the popular "League of Legends" show when one of the show designers asked if the two were related. Neither Mason nor Andrews knew about the show.

"We even had a judge comment about it: 'I wonder if this has to do with the show 'Arcane," said Mason. "That character is purple, and you guys have purple.' I learned that in that judge tape."

"Arcane" uses three backdrop screens, a cauldron and a wizard's tower that a father of a marching band member built. He has built some of the previous marching band shows' props, as well as the school's musicals' sets.

"The three threads we started with were the first being a summoner, and then a protector and the final movement being an illusionist. That still is kind of maintained in the current show design, but the design kind of took a different turn after that point. So it's a little bit less concrete than our original vision, but it's still kind of the inspiration," said Andrews. "Color-wise, purple is a big focus because it has that mystical, magic-related vibe. The color guard costumes are various shades of purple, but they all start in a lighter purple cloak. Then at the third movement, those are shed, and there's a darker – but still bright - purple."

At the end of each school year, Mason and Andrews hold a few after-school meetings where they teach students who are interested in becoming a drum major the basics of conducting, as well as how those techniques transfer to conducting on the field. Then, auditions are held, which include an interview, conducting through basic conducting patterns at various tempos and conducting a song of their choosing, making sure to include aspects such as dynamics and queues.

This was Lydia Young and Nevaeh Musson's first year being drum majors. During their freshman and sophomore years, Young marched flute, and Musson marched trumpet. Although the juniors were the only two to audition to be drum majors, Mason and Andrews commended them for doing so, especially because there wasn't a senior to lead them along the way. Young said she took notes her entire sophomore year.

"It's terrifying, but it's cool because me and Lydia are two polar-opposite people, and we're able to just come together and be able to work together," said Musson.

After Young and Musson were selected to be this season's drum majors, over the summer they attended Phantom Regiment's academy for drum majors since EHS does not have any specific training for drum majors. There were 53 other people with various experiences at the academy, said Young. Besides keeping time, Young and Musson assisted Mason and Andrews throughout the season by fixing mistakes the directors didn't catch, taking equipment to the field, keeping morale up and sometimes running stretches and warmups.

One way the duo kept morale up is through certain traditions at the end of each rehearsal and marching band season. During rehearsals, Young and Musson kept an eye out for a few members that went above and beyond. Then at the end of rehearsal, they read off the jokes on the back of Laffy Taffies and distributed them to those they noticed working hard. At the end of the season, every member got a "trophy," which were Little Debbie snacks. Last year, Young's trophy was "Small and Mighty," and Musson's was "You Guys Should Order the Number 12 from Taco Bell with a Baja Blast. It is Gas." As drum majors, they also "encourage and uplift good perfor-



mance," said Young.

If either saw someone making a mistake, they fixed it one-onone rather than calling them out in front of everyone.

"Mason has said that we should do it like a sandwich: We give a compliment, and then tell them what they should fix, and then give another compliment," said Musson. "Then it's not like, 'Oh, we're targeting you' type of thing."

Both Young and Musson enjoyed seeing the show come together from an observer's viewpoint, especially because it's their first year doing so.

"It's amazing to just see this group of people – a lot of people have a lot of different personalities – but they come together and are able to become one," said Musson. "It's just amazing to see that group effort and teamwork."

Those interested in being a section leader complete an application and an interview with Mason and Andrews. Mason also tells the student that along with the sit-down interview, he observes how the student does over the course of a school year to see if they would fit well in a leadership position.


This is Jackson Somodi's first time being section leader for the tubas. Now a junior, he had always wanted to join marching

> band. In eighth grade a junior from the wind ensemble told him he needed to do it, which really solidified his decision to join. Since joining, he likes seeing the progress from the start of the season to the end, along with making friendships.

Somodi plans to attend college to be a music teacher, but his dream is to be a tuba professor.

"I'm gonna be all up in band," said Somodi. "I really idolize the guy at ISU, the tuba professor there. I think he's really cool, and I wanna do stuff like he does, like just be able to teach college classes and stuff like that."

Flute Section Leader Ella Knierim, a junior, and Saxophone



Section Leader Sam Collins, a senior, share Somodi's sentiment about making friends.

"I like the community that we build after years of being in marching band. The only extracurriculars I do are purely from a band standpoint, and if I hadn't been in band for any of those, there is not a very good likelihood that I would have as many friends as I do now," said Collins.

Outside of marching band, Collins is also involved with jazz band, winter drumline and concert band. Next year in college, Collins plans on joining a music program and a marching band.

"I'd love to go into music. ... I'd love to be in one of those college marching bands, but if I also want to have money after I graduate college, I need to look at a more affordable one. And a lot of the more affordable ones don't have marching bands," said Knierim. "The one I'm looking at now is Lake Land, and they don't have a marching band. There is an option to join Eastern's marching band and march with them. So I'm highly considering that."

It takes a village to organize and put on a successful marching band show, and the Red Regiment couldn't do it without the help from their volunteers, like Amy Crear - Collins' mother. During the Effingham Marching Invitational in the first week of October, she volunteered to work the whole day to help with scoring, director's packets and one of the entrances to the bleachers to make sure people didn't enter or exit during a performance. Although this was her fourth year volunteering, it was her first time monitoring the bleachers.

"It's all very interesting," said Crear. "It's amazing how well the organization has done putting an event like this together. I mean, 25 bands and there's not been any major hiccups or anything. It's impressive, quite impressive."

Crear marched clarinet her freshman year of high school and enjoyed it, but she had to quit due to personal reasons.

"I loved going to competitions. ... It's great hanging out with your friends, and then seeing other bands and what their shows entail, what their shows represent, their outfits, props," said Crear. "Back when I was in marching band, it was nothing this extravagant. ... We didn't have these big props and elaborate costumes and things like that. So it's very interesting. I love watching the shows."

This was Deb Mosher's eighth year volunteering for the Red Regiment. Her grand-daughter, Ivy Durkin, is a senior who played percussion in "Arcane."


When Mosher was in high school, she marched trombone all four years. Mosher's main volunteer duty is to manage the marching band's uniforms and keep them organized, but she helps out wherever she can. She rides the bus with the band kids to every competition and loves it, but she might quit volunteering because of her age.

"It's a lot with the uniforms because you're trying to get across to the kids that this is, like, a \$700 uniform, and we have to take care of it because we're not getting any more anytime soon," said Mosher. "But they're learning. By the end of the season, they know how to hang up their uniforms correctly."

# The marching band won several awards this season, including outstanding color guard and best music.

During the Effingham Marching Invitational, Mosher helped monitor one of the bleacher's entrances, like Crear did, and she was amazed that more students than parents waited until in between performances to enter and exit the bleachers.

"We had one kid – he's one of my best friend's sons – and his first year was just really rough. He wasn't a people person, very, very shy, and by the end of the year, we say he found his people," said Mosher. "He's a drummer, and he's a senior now, and he's just not the same kid. But that's what happens when they find their people. They find where they belong."
