Desiree Carlyle grows Far Out Farm from ground up

ELKO — Desiree Carlyle, owner and operator of Far Out Farm, runs a multi-animal, multi-product homestead which she hopes to expand into a larger commercial operation from its current

"I'm a huge animal lover. When I was younger, I grew up in the country and I raised rabbits and chickens," she said.

status as a "micro-farm."

"A couple years ago, the economy, the world and the food industry started me on making more drastic changes," she said. "I like to control what I put in my body. Eating organic is pretty important to me."

But she's just getting started.

"We're in the process of forming our LLC in the state of Nevada," she explained. In order to sell farm shares such as a half or a quarter of a pig, she needs a business license.

"We started here with High Caliber, which is a local handyman service. We've been in business for three years with the farm. We're just now getting into the process of incorporating and we're going to be selling farm shares of our pigs," she said. "I'm looking at getting my cottage license, because I do make a lot of bread items. We're just getting going."

Carlyle said she recently brought ducks and goats to the farm. "So we're still growing."

"The chickens started with egg layers and then we brought in some meat birds. After that, we brought in some turkeys and then pigs and then emus and now goats," she said. "We had to kind of weigh out what was going to be more cost-efficient for us."

Her husband Jeremy Carlyle has his eye on raising steer sometime in the future, she said.

HUGE RESPONSIBILITY

She said she is thankful for how her husband provides a source of income outside the farm.

Running a farm is a huge responsibility, because the animals' needs come first, she noted.

"The day starts and stops with them. I firmly believe that if you're going to have animals and

you're not raising them with love and kindness - and, of course, all the husbandry that goes along with it — then this probably isn't for

Being in charge of animals' wellbeing means calling in sick is not an option.

"At 9 p.m. last night, I'm still out, going to check on my sow," Carlyle said. Ellie, the sow, is expecting piglets any day now.

She said she finds herself "up with her all night, checking on her, trucking across the yard ees. with a flashlight."

"If she doesn't have babies today or tonight, that her milk came in," she said. then I'll be up with her again tonight. And we have a goat that's supposed to kid right around

March 30," she noted. "In the meantime, somehow on Saturday, I'm supposed to go to Twin Falls to do my Costco run."


She praised her "right hand."

"My right hand is Dr. Tessa Morgan. She's a local farm vet here. Without her knowledge, without her expertise, without her being as hands-on as she is, I don't know that I would have gotten this far," Carlyle said, especially considering how the farm has no other employ-

"The first thing I did was text Dr. Morgan, 'Ellie's got her milk," Carlyle explained. "If I keep her in the loop and everybody's on the same page, then hopefully things roll smoother. And the same with the goats. She knows that the goats are supposed to have babies around March 30, she knows these are the goats' first kids."

Which leads to still another aspect of Carlyle's farm life: milking goats. She manufactures her own dairy products and makes yogurt.

QUITE A MENAGERIE

What does the current menagerie of Far Out Farm look like? "We have guard dogs, of course, to help protect the livestock," as well as farm cats, she said.

She owns a set of breeding Kune Kune pigs, which are a type originating from New Zealand, as well as a Kune Kune and commercial pig cross.


The farm raises Oberhasli goats, a variety of Swiss dairy goat. It also has Peking and Muscovy ducks, two emus and a whole pen of egg-laying hens.

Along with keeping turkeys for eggs and meat, "we do raise a couple sets of meat chickens every year for a freezer," she said. "Part of the farm share is offering meat birds for sale."

Her dogs also benefit from the livestock and produce, making dog food to supplement their kibble.

"A lot of what we raise here goes back to them," she said, adding "we primarily feed non-GMO as long as humanly possible and I also ferment some of their feed. And then, of course, fresh fruits and vegetables. I'm just now starting my seeds for this year's garden — and primarily, 97% of that garden goes back to them too."

As a personal hobby, she also runs a medicinal garden.

For instance, the season plays a role, too.

"We're going to enter into the winter season, which in our supply regions, that's summer. But we have to deal with, you know, freezing temperatures coming into the United States," Kraus explained.

"On the dress side, we carry formal wear for bridal, bridesmaids, prom, homecoming and men's formal wear. Logistics on the bridal side are very interesting as well, because we're dealing with a lot of international shipments," Kraus said. "It's getting better now, but there were a lot of supply constraints, a lot of places that, after COVID-19, didn't really come back on the manufacturing scene."

"We prefer to have our bridal "S appointments feel like an exclusive experience, so we book out the entire shop anytime someone makes a bridal appointment, so Bridal Studio in

they get a very exclusive and private shopping experience, which you also don't really get anywhere else," Hatch said.

"We're very conscientious, especially on our bridal side, with all of our gowns. We don't carry multiples of any one style or size, because we're too small in the community. So a bride can come in here and feel confident that another bride is not going to have that gown," Kraus added.

She said business involves "taking care of our clients at a higher level than our competition."

"We're gearing up for holidays, and we do plan on the bookstore side to start hosting more local authors," she said. Any authors interested in hosting signing events can reach out to the store.

"Supporting any local authors, making sure that they get a place

to meet their readers, that's something we're very passionate about," Kraus said.



StarLIGHT Productions shines spotlight on women leaders

ELKO — Built around a core of female leadership, local theater company StarLIGHT Productions is expanding its artistic expression to reach out to more of the Elko and Spring Creek community.

"Where we started was with a children's theater company. What we have evolved into would be a performing arts company that encompasses different avenues, like education, empowerment and entertainment," Susan Nelson, the creative director and spokesperson.

Founded in 2022, the group's first production was "The Nutcracker Prince."

"Part of what we do would be providing live entertainment — but we still have that education piece where we have theater workshops, we still work with children and we will still have productions," she said. "But we also have this branch

that allows us to support entertainers inside the community and to be able to perform at different kinds of venues," such as the Women in Business event.

"At this point we're opening it up to all ages," said Carrie Snyder, who directed the group's first big production, "Treasure Island: A Musical Panto."

"She's providing other services, like she's bringing up teaching classes on keynote speaking and public speaking, dance, theater, music. Like we're opening that and offering education and classes to the community," Snyder said.

"We also represent local artists as well, to give them opportunities and find opportunities for them to be on a stage somewhere," Nelson said.

"As women, I think our approach to running it at this point, is finding

the strength in each other," Snyder said. "We have a board

of eight women who

are different ages, have different skill sets and are from different walks of life. Carrie [Snyder] founded the company and brought us together with this original idea of the children's theater," Nelson said.

"I don't think we intended for that to be only women ever. We're not exclusive in that sense," she said. They have recently consulted with Overland Stage Theatre Company director George Jones for an upcoming project.

"It just happens that that is the group that that came together," Nelson said.

"My forte is singing and acting,"

Snyder said. "So, I'm going to be teaching classes for adults," she said, "like finding your voice, how to belt, those kinds of opportunities."

PAYING IT FORWARD

Along with helping both children and adults develop performing arts skills, they also hope to encoursaid.

Mia Nelson also enjoys mentoring child actors with StarLIGHT. "Her favorite thing to do is work with those actors and help them find their legs and get experience. But she's still young enough to connect age adults in the arts to work with with them. Watching her grow and younger performers, Susan Nelson expand, and now watching her turn around and give that back, to me, is huge," Nelson said.

"There are big performances, big productions but not everyone is getting a chance to do things. ELKO — With its mural of Elko County scenery painted across the wall, Mattie's Taphouse and Grill offers guests a welcoming atmosphere in the busy Elko Junction shopping plaza.

Mattie's serves comfort foods like wings, burgers, salmon and steak and features a bar with over 20 beers on tap, "you can find just about anything on our menu,"

owner Patti Van Kirk said. "If you brought in eight different people, they could all find something that they like."

She and husband Bruce Van Kirk have owned the restaurant and Cool Beans Coffee and Ice Cream next door, for a couple of years.

"Bruce has worked in the food industry for years and with his food knowledge and with me wanting a change in career, this provided an opportunity for our whole family," Patti Van Kirk said.

"Our family's all here. Our grown children have moved home to help us with this. So it's super rewarding to be able to have a family business and a family restaurant," she said. "Although Bruce is not in a position to help us day-to-day with his current job, he helps make sure things are running smoothly while still helping other local restaurants

Around 17 Mattie's employees are related to each other in some way, she noted.

"One of our biggest strategies is to treat everybody like family and keep that family atmosphere," she

Speaking to customers makes a difference, Patti Van Kirk said. "We have a lot of regulars who come in on a regular basis. And taking suggestions from them on, 'What would you like to see on our menu and what could we do differently?' — I think just building that customer relationship is huge."

She explained some of the challenges, too.

"We're constantly looking for new help," she said. "We do have a lot of lifers who've been here for many years. But we also have one or two positions where we just have people constantly rotating in and out."

Patti Van Kirk said time management is a crucial part of keeping a restaurant in order. "If you want to be successful, you have to be present."

Having enough staff ties in with time management, she said. "We've implemented an extra person on certain shifts, just to help the kitchen run smoothly and to help food get out in a quick fashion."

High food costs pose a challenge as well, she said. She said the solution is monitoring costs and updat-

ing them where needed, as well as "having a partnership with your

food representative." In the end, "our long-term goal is to keep it in our fam-

ily," Patti Van Kirk said. "We're building this for the

future of our kids, who are in their 20s," she said.

She said the other long-term goal is to "keep the customers happy" and coming and provide something that is one of those comfort foods for Elko."

GBC is "committed to dual credit," McIntosh noted. "Our students can graduate with an Associate of Arts and a high school diploma and they have skills right then and there. And they're also really engaged."

The college aims to help develop workplace programs to suit certain industry locations, McIntosh said.

"Amber worked out a partnership with William Bee Ririe Hospital. That's who pays for the instructor through that partnership — and then it's held at GBC," she said. "They respond to each community's needs - as long as you do the work, as far as gathering the information, they come right in," she said of the college.

McIntosh explained how GBC also saw successful involvement with English as a Second Language education.

"I talked to Amber and said, 'We have a population who really needs this ESL program.' And she had that program stood up in Ely in three

weeks," McIntosh said.

"When I moved back to Ely in 2016, we gathered all of our industry together" to talk about pressing needs, she noted.

"And what was needed? Two things: the nursing program — which, Amber, she became president, set it up and did it through a partnership. And the second thing was a Diesel Technology Program. Those are the two prime priorities for the community."

After experience being an elementary principal, a middle school vice principal, a grants manager, a special ed director and an assistant superintendent in White Pine, she became the Lyon County School District Superintendent a position she held from 2008 to 2012.

"That was during the Great Recession - and Lyon County was the third most stressed county in the nation. So, there were foreclosures and bankruptcies and unemployment," she said.

"We just had a lot of couch-surfing kids, kids where their families were in bankruptcy, they were in foreclosure of their homes. And I learned so much about food insecurity there. At one point, we had moved the commodities distribution in Silver Springs to the high school. There was a fistfight in line and I realized how desperate people were," she said.

"The school district opened up a five-day-aweek food pantry in Silver Springs because we needed to make sure that we addressed food insecurity," McIntosh noted.


