Margo Holmes, adult services and programming coordinator, addressed the board with concerns about procedural aspects of the advisor system.

Kitty Herbel asked whether the new system was creating a hardship.

Theri Ray, library director, explained that the newly adopted system does delay book purchases and some programming decisions. She suggested clarifying that no response meant no objection, as per the policy wording. Members of the library board agreed that no response meant no objection.

NeAnne Clinton, community member, addressed with board with concerns about the graphic novel adaptation of A Handmaid's Tale by Margaret Atwood in the adult section and Juliet Takes a Breath by Gabby Rivera from the digital

Hoopla collection. Supplemental information on the books was presented to board members.

Theri Ray, library director, presented information about new criteria adopted for the placement of physical library materials in the teen section. Young adult materials rated as being appropriate for ages 16+ will now be housed in the corresponding adult section of that library to better align with local community standards. Many of the books recently challenged in the teen section would be in the adult section using this criteria. Common Sense Media's professional rating will be used when available.

The Enid Public Library employs professionally trained and customer service oriented staff members to develop and maintain the library's collection, assist library users in locating desired information, promote literacy and reading, provide programming for all ages and guide Library users to the information available from online resources. The library's collection of approximately 57,000 cataloged items includes informational and recreational resources in print and non-print formats. The library is open 60 hours per week, serving approximately 8,000 visitors per month. 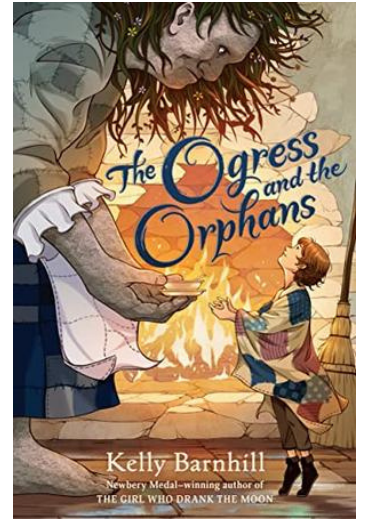
## Long Term Strategic Plan Progress

### LTSP Priority 1- Expanded Programming

#### Goal 1: Expanded Early Education

During the month of April, Mrs. Shewey, the children's librarian, partnered with one of the 4th grade teachers at Taft Elementary to read *The Ogress and the Orphans* by Kelly Barnhill. *The Ogress and the Orphans* is a National Book Award Finalist and is on the 2024 Children's Sequoyah Master List. It also received starred reviews from Booklist, Publishers Weekly, and Kirkus Review. The book is approved curriculum at Enid Public Schools.

The experience was wonderful for everyone involved! In addition to being a wonderful experience of sharing a book with students, the program was also, in part a trial for Summer Reading. We were pretty sure we wanted to use this book for a community reads project but wanted to make sure kids like it as much as we think they would. It turns out they do!



The 4th grade students enjoyed the story and were active leaders in the discussion of the story. They practiced new vocabulary and built on their advanced reading skills such as context decoding skills, predicting or theorizing, inference making, and summarizing. The class and the teacher enjoyed the story and discussion so much that the classroom teacher plans to continue to use this book in the future. We will also be using this book as a community reads project this summer.

The Junior Welfare League Honorary and Sustaining Members sponsored the purchase of 100 copies of the book for a Summer Reading community reads project.

#### Library Lawn Beautification

The soil in the front flower bed was tested by the OSU Extension and found to be depleted of all nutrients. Library staff and volunteers worked to remove the old soil and replace it with garden soil. New perennials were planted and driplines installed to make the care of the flowerbed more efficient. Mulch was added to aid in moisture retention and for esthetics.

The flowerbed around the flag pole was cleaned up. The existing plants were trimmed and new perennials added.

All the work was done by hand and took about 3 weeks.



## Summer Reading Plans

Summer Reading runs from First Friday in June through First Friday in August (6/2/23 - 8/4/23)

Theme: *All Together Now*

### Summer Reading Challenges

The library hosts reading challenges for all age groups. Summer Reading Challenges are a long standing tradition in libraries, originating in the 1890s, to help prevent what is now known as the *summer slide*. The *summer slide* is a tendency for youth, especially younger youth, to lose some of the skills they developed during the previous school year while away from school in the summer months.

The library uses Beanstack, a web-based program, to track summer reading participation. Library patrons are welcome to use either the Beanstack app or paper trackers to track their reading. The goal this year will be 3,000 minutes (50 hours) of reading for youth and will be divided into age groups; 0-7, 8-11, and 12-18. Prizes throughout the summer will consist of a small prize at every 5th hour and a book at every 10th hour.

The adult summer reading challenge is a combination of program participation and books read. Adults are awarded up to 1 free book each week for every 4 books read. There will be one grand prize at the end based on a drawing. Adult participants earn an entry into the drawing for every activity they complete in the challenge.

### Community Mural

A major component of the Summer Reading program for adults will be the creation of a community mural here in the library. The theme this summer is *All Together Now* and is about individuals and groups coming together to build community. Throughout the summer there will be art created on 4" x 4" wooden tiles. Each week there will be a different theme. The tiles will be displayed together in the library as a mural. At the end of the summer participants will be invited to collect their pieces.

### Parent-Teen Book Club- Read with your Teen

A book club for teens will return this summer with a twist; the teen book club will be a buddy style book club with teens and their parent. All participants must be a teen/parent combination. A individual parent could bring all their teen children, a teen could bring both parents, but there must be a set of at least 1 teen and 1 parent or guardian to be eligible to join the book club. The books for the summer Read with Your Teen Book Club were specifically selected because they contain multiple possible discussions between teens and parents. This book club could be continued after the summer if there is interest in the community.

### Teen Subscription Book Boxes

Teen Book Boxes are subscriptions to a monthly box that includes fun games, crafts, and special treats along with a library book picked by the teen librarian. Teens subscribe by filling out a google form each month telling us what they like to read. Then, they get to be surprised by what is picked out for them based on their interests!

The Book Boxes have been a very popular program; generally, there are about 10-15 each participants each month. It has been fun to library staff to see teens get excited about what they're going to find each month. Parents have mentioned how much they like the book boxes too.

A few books that have been picked out for them have even ended up on their "favorite books" question on a future form!

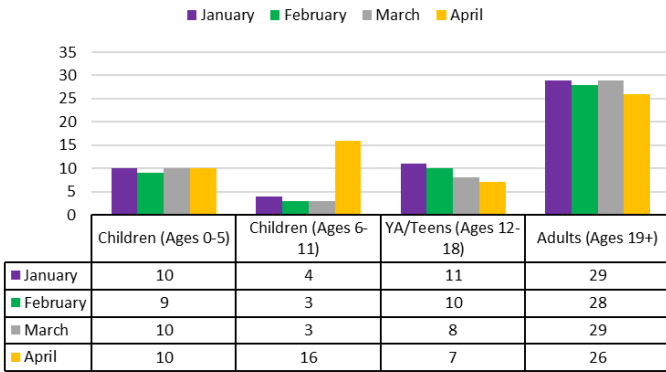

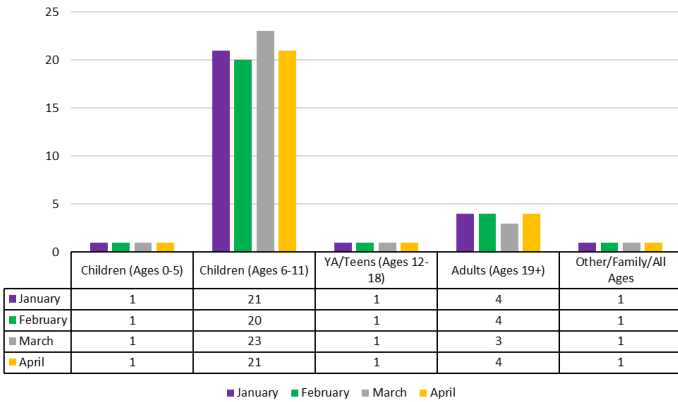

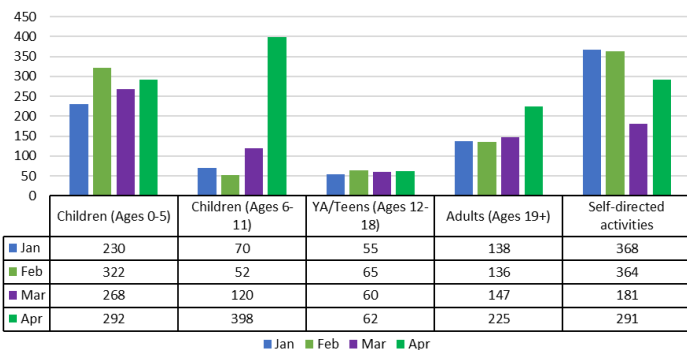
Number of Programs Offered by Target Age



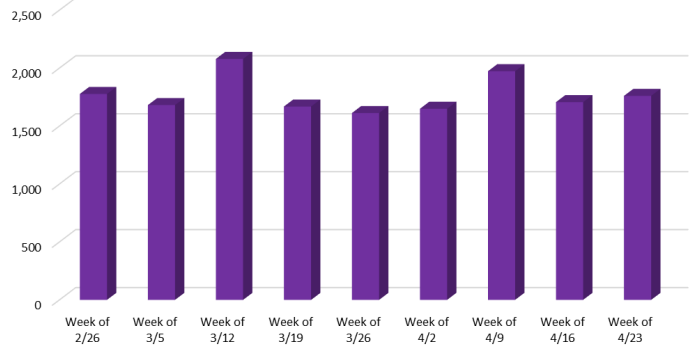
Number of Self Directed Activities Offered by Target Age Group



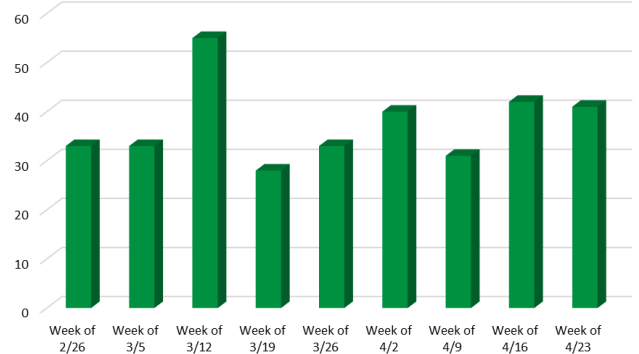
Program Participation by Target Age



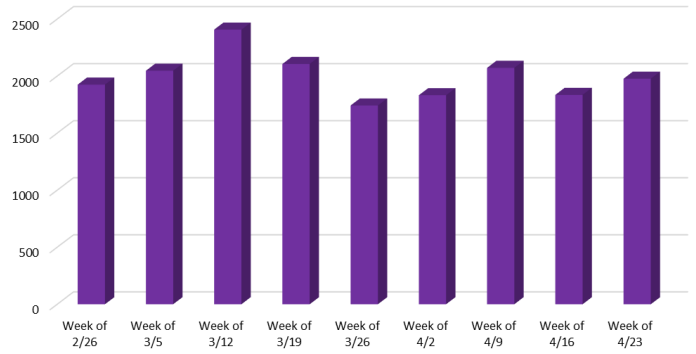
Patrons in the Library by Week



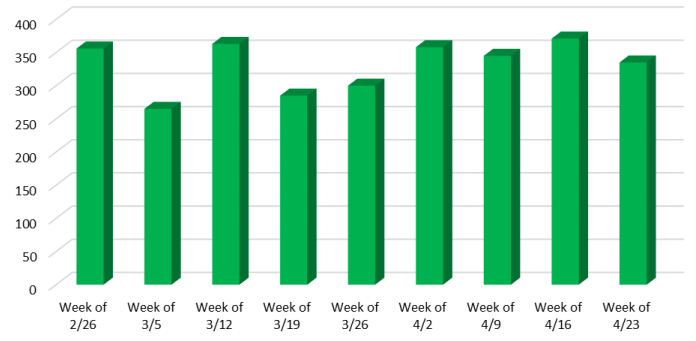
New Library Cards by Week

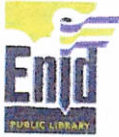

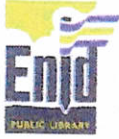
