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

16th Annual Hands and Hearts Golf Tournament

Fort Bend Cares 4th Annual Doggone Fun Run

For the past 13 years Fort Bend Cares has taken under its wing the underprivileged children of Fort Bend County by awarding its financial resources to other support nonprofits dedicated to serving children. Since its inception the nonprofit has raised more than \$1.5 million for several dozen different charities such as the Fort Bend Rainbow Room, TW Davis YMCA, DePelchin, Lunches of Love, Hope for Three, Catholic Charities and A Childrens House for the Soul.

In 2016, 29 local charities received grants from Fort Bend Cares, including the Texana Center, which was awarded \$18,000 earmarked for a playground specifically designed for children with autism.

Fort Bend Cares kicked off the new year with its annual Road Trip fundraiser, which attracted more than 500 people, and it's picking up momentum with its second annual fundraiser the Doggone Fun Run.

Leave it up to Fort Bend Cares to create an event that is both compelling and extremely purposeful because one look at the 4th Annual Doggone Fun Run reveals that it goes beyond a fundraiser. Not only is the event a chance for people to connect for a common cause, it welcomes family participation in a fun atmosphere that also welcomes the attendance of the family dog.

There are even "spokesdogs" — Shih Tzus Annie and Lilly — designated for the event.

"Annie and Lilly aren't just cute, they are specially trained therapy dogs that have provided over 300 hours of emotional support

and smiles to patients at Houston Methodist Sugar Land Hospital," said Melinda Henry, Fort Bend Cares publicity chair of the Shih Tzus, who belong to Mike and Linda Ruggeroli of Richmond.

Upon retirement the Ruggerolis welcomed Lilly into their home to investigate the steps required to train therapy dogs. Lilly, now 5 years old, has served as a pet therapy dog since she was four months old. 3-year-old Annie also passed therapy training.

"Annie and Lilly are no strangers to cuddles, so if you see them at the Doggone Fun Run show them some love," Henry said.

The 5th Annual Stallion Stampede supports education & community unity

This is for the kids, has been a catchphrase used in popular media repeatedly of the years, but at Walker Station Elementary in New Territory, the saying is expressed with honest devotion. The parents and teachers who have carved a special nook in their heart for Walker Station are all looking years down the line into a time when their elementary students will inherit, improve, develop and lead the community and society.

So this — the 5th Annual Stallion Stampede — truly is for the kids.

"The event was created to be a community event that brings together students, families, runners and businesses in an effort to support the school and enhance the learning environment of our future leaders," said Kathleen Randall, a member of the Walker Station PTO.

The Stallion Stampede, which is hosted by the PTO, is a certified 5k run, 1 mile run/walk event that will feature plenty of children favorites like a dunk tank, games, rides and food concessions.

"The carnival is fun because there are a lot of games," said third grader Mark Randall. "Last year, they had a basketball game."

In the past more than 400 walkers and runners have participated in the Walker Elementary tradition — with the event getting "bigger and better each year," Randall said, adding that "aside from being a lot of fun, this event is a school fundraiser."

The year's goal is to raise at least \$30,000 with 100 percent of

the proceeds earmarked for educational support for teachers, staffs and students at Walker Station, and that is a cause parent Kimberly Johnson enthusiastically supports.

"The Stallion Stampede helps supplement federal and state funds so the school can purchase items such as new school playground equipment and expensive new learning technology, which benefits a STEM curriculum," she said.

For the Community, By the Community

The event, which is open to the public, will be held at Walker Station Elementary School, 6200 Homeward Way in Sugar Land on Saturday, April 29. The certified, chip timed 5K race begins at 8 a.m., the certified and chip timed, 1 Mile Fun Run starts at 9 a.m. and the Pony Trot — designed as one lap around the track for pre-kindergartners —will kick off at 10 a.m.

Prizes will be awarded for the overall top male, female and age group competitors. Plus top high school, middle school and Walker Station grade level competitors will be recognized.

The carnival is set from 9 a.m. to noon and will feature games, rides and inflatables, a cake walk, silly string station and local food vendors. Tickets and wristbands may be purchased for the carnival. Additionally a silent auction — including items like birthday party packages, restaurant gift certificates and summer fun camps — will be held from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m.

Finally, the raffle will include kid-friendly prizes. This year a PlayStation4, American Girl Doll and LED Smart TV are among the items being raffled.


The raffle and auction will start at the school on April 24 during school hours and is open to the public. The auction and raffle will conclude on April 29 at 11 a.m. at the event.

In a time when people are becoming more and more disconnected thanks to the latest technology, parent Angela Baxter said events like the Stallion Stampede allow neighbors, friends, strangers, peers and families to connect with one another out in the community they call home.

"It's a fun outdoor event for the community," she said.

And while the Walker Station tradition is for the community, it's also by the community, Randall added.

"Teachers, parents, students, staff and neighbors all work together to host this event," she said. "We could not do it without the donations and sponsorships of businesses and local families. It ends up being a very fun day that everyone looks forward to attending. Our family has participated in the Stallion Stampede the last several years, and it is always a great event."

This Community Band Strives to Connect People Through Music

In today's world there is no limit to the ways a person can express the artist within himself or herself, considering the barrage of options from theater, sculpting and photography to writing, dancing and painting, but in the fellowship hall of First United Methodist Church in Rosenberg, Texas, one ensemble of talented men and women has found a way to channel their inner artist as members of the Rosenberg Symphonic Band.

On Tuesdays, as they have every Tuesday for the past four years, the 30 or so members meet in the fellowship hall to let free, and train, the instrumental artist within themselves and if you find yourself witnessing one of their performances, chances are you'll feel the absolute devotion and excitement they have for their art. French poet and novelist of the Romantic period Victor Hugo characterized music as an element that "expresses that which cannot be put into words and that which cannot remain silent."

Members of the Rosenberg Symphonic Band would agree.

There is just something special about music to these members. Maybe because music has the ability to transport people to other times without them having to move an inch. Maybe because it communicates emotions and memories better than words. Maybe because music is simply aesthetic.

"We feel it is our responsibility to provide musical entertainment other than what people hear on the radio," said Roger Bauer, the trumpet-playing Rosenberg Symphonic Band president. "We want to give them something to dream for."

Dreaming of Something Beautiful

In 2013 band director Ben

Ware, who for the past seven years has been Director of Bands at Strake Jesuit College Preparatory School in Houston, Texas, had a dream to start a community band in a city that did not already have one. As it turns out, the City of Rosenberg — which was awarded the title as a Cultural Arts District that same year — was receptive to the idea of a community band.

"After performing with the Houston Symphonic Band, a Houston-based community band under the direction of mentor Robert McElroy, for 10 years, I attended graduate school to earn a degree in instrumental conducting," Ware said. "After returning to reside in Rosenberg, I wanted to give back to this great community through community band performances and provide an outlet for members of the community to play their instrument and use their talents to share with others through concerts."

The band's platform consisted of fall and spring concerts, holiday and patriotic concerts, both for the city and greater community of Rosenberg, plus the overall goal " We want to give them something to dream for."

Roger Bauer, Rosenberg Symphonic Band president then handed the position to the c u r r e n t conductor Robert Cappa, who is the choir director for Wharton High School. SAT APR

of playing family-friendly music that both performers and audience members would enjoy, Ware said.

After conducting for the first two years, the baton, so to speak, was handed down Justin Allen so Ware, who also serves as the Chair of the Fine Arts Department at Strake Jesuit, could work on his Doctorate of Education from Saint Louis University. Allen, who conducted the band for a year, themselves. While many of the band's members are musical professionals or educators, the professions of the members range from doctors and lawyers to pilots and students, as well as, your average man or woman who just enjoys playing music.

Ware, who attended a the recent

Rosenberg Symphonic Band's Winter Concert with his wife Sarah, said the original aspirations he had for the band have "absolutely" become a reality.

"We were very impressed by the sound, programming and growth," Ware said. "We are very proud of all Rosenberg Symphonic

Band and its members have accomplished."

A Musical Connection

Music connects people, Bauer said, and quite possibly that may be the most appealing aspect of the band. It connects fellow musicians. It connects the public to the band. It connects the people who live in the community.

Clearly devoted to their artistic endeavors, members of the band practice every Tuesday from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. in the fellowship hall of First United Methodist Church in Rosenberg, found at 1127 3rd Street in Rosenberg, which is where most of the band's concerts are held. And although the name of the band is the Rosenberg Symphonic Band, a member does not have to live in Rosenberg to join.

"The beauty of the band, and what we are extremely proud of, is that all you have to have is passion and commitment to play," said Bauer, who lives in Cypress, Texas. "We don't even hold auditions. We don't have any limitations or qualifications, except that you have to be at least 16 years old, but we're serious about our music."

Music for the Masses

A community band is vital and unique addition to a community, said Michael Gallegos, of Houston, who said being a member is "extremely personal" to him.

He recalls his youthful years growing up in Alice, Texas in a "hard working family with limited funds" and his mother taking him to free musical events to expose him to the arts.

"It was due to my mother, that I would have a love for music," said Gallegos, who enlisted in the U.S. Army when he was 18 years old and toured throughout Europe with The 3rd Infantry Division Band based out of Wurzburg Germany.

Gallegos, who said he "dropped the horn for 25 or 30 years," picked up his euphonium again when the band was formed and "[hasn't] let go of it since" because he believes in the purpose of the band.

"This band is for the people who don't have the financial access to hear quality music [that requires payment]; this is for those hard working single parents; this is for people who just want to enjoy a variety of music," he said. "And we pride ourselves in our ability to provide that."

Gallegos and Bauer are also members of Second Street Brass Quintet, which Gallegos endearingly refers to as a "tactical unit" of the Rosenberg Symphonic Band.

"I like to call it our tactical unit," Gallegos said teasingly. "We perform more often and where a smaller group is needed as opposed to a larger symphonic band, like during events in Downtown Rosenberg."

While most of the band's concerts are held at First United Methodist Church in Rosenberg, other concerts are scheduled throughout the city at fundraisers, community events and at the parks. The concerts are always free and open to the public but donations are absolutely welcome.

The Rosenberg Symphonic

Band performs for the public on average about four times a year, presenting a variety of genres including popular tunes, theatrical themes, show tunes, classical music and even a bit of marching music to its audience.

"We are just trying to highlight different music for different tastes," Gallegos said. "And it makes us feel good to do what we do.

"Primarily the Rosenberg



Symphonic Band is a community musical organization and if a potential musician has the desire, commitment, motivation and passion to perform, then we will gladly accept that potential musician, regardless if that person has not played in the last 30 days or 30 years," he added. "Pick up your horn, dust it off and join us. We'll find a place for you and you'll definitely have fun and meet new friends."

A Place To Play

If you have the itch to play, then do it, said Ware. Re-connect with something that undoubtedly brought you joy. The beauty of the Rosenberg Symphonic Band, he said, is that is encourages the

awakening of the too often dormant musician within people.

"So many members of communities have played an instrument growing up. It's a shame to spend all that time practicing, playing, and learning, all just to put the horn away in a closet," Ware said. "Community bands provide an outlet for all citizens an opportunity to dust off the horn and improve on their instrument and with the group. Not only will the member feel they are giving back to their community through their talents, but they will also find that a community is truly built within the band itself. These friendships run deep and can result in life-long relationships. We don't just grow as band, we also grow as people."

Bauer said anyone wanting to join can simply show up to a Tuesday practice or contact the band by visiting www. rosenbergsymphonicband.com or visit the band's Facebook page. Bauer added that the band is particularly interested in woodwind players as the band's major goal this year is expanding its woodwind instruments section.

"Think about how great you feel when you play an instrument or listen to music. Add to that, great people, fun, and like-minded musicians. When you join a community band, you are part of something much bigger than one individual," Ware said of joining the band. "A large team all pushing to the same intangible goal is truly awe inspiring. If you can find a couple of hours one evening a week, you will be surprised how much fun you have. After all, when playing an instrument, we get to do the opposite of work - we get to PLAY!"

Bauer, who was one of those musicians who dusted off the case. said the Rosenberg Symphonic Band "is the place to play."



ien Nguyen graduated from Texas State Technical College in 2012, and is back at the college in his new role as the Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) instructor at TSTC's Fort Bend County Campus.

"I have the passion to teach and help students," said Nguyen. "I want to be their guide to a successful career and help grow TSTC's HVAC program."

However, HVAC was not the Richmond native's first career choice. Nguyen spent 22 years working as a Senior Systems Analyst in the computer systems field after earning an associate degree in Computer Science from a college in Nebraska.

Now, Nguyen said he hopes to change the lives of the newest HVAC generation.

earning to live again, Dillon Cannon, a United States Army veteran and now a student at Texas State Technical College, just had the experience of a lifetime.

The Cyber Security Technology student recently attended the 2017 Presidential Inauguration. The invitation came from Helping Heroes, an organization that provides military and veteran support programs and donated a house to Cannon several years ago.

The Sugar Land native had the opportunity to sit nearly 30 feet from the podium where the newly elected president took his oath.

"This experience left me speechless," said Cannon. "There is so much history in Washington, D.C., and to be a part of it was amazing. It was definitely a oncein-a-lifetime experience. There's no other way to describe it."

The 30-year-old and the group he was with were scheduled to have lunch with Vice President Mike Pence and attend a military

ball, but because of protests they were unable to attend those events.

"I was disappointed that we had to alter our schedule," he said. "We were really looking forward to it, but in the end I still got to experience Washington, and for that I'm fortunate."

It was not too long ago that Cannon thought he would never get to experience anything again. His life changed forever in December 2006 during his tour of duty in Iraq. He was serving as a military police officer when a sniper shot him in the neck, shattering a portion of his spinal cord.

"In a split second

everything changed," said Cannon. "You live the first 20 years of your life being able to do everything, and suddenly you're wheelchair-bound."

Cannon said he had to relearn how to do simple, everyday things such as writing, driving and cooking.

"Basically, I had to learn how to live again," he said.

This is Cannon's second semester at TSTC, making it his first time back in school in 11 years. He said that at this point in his life he is ready to pursue a college education and a new career.

As a Cyber Security Technology student, he gets to explore his love of computers and technology while working toward his goal of finding employment with the FBI or U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

"I've always loved computers, and I'm hoping to use that skill to stop hackers and reduce identity theft," Cannon said. Cannon is also an active volunteer with TSTC's Veterans Center and other military and veteran organizations in Fort Bend County. He works closely with disabled veterans and children, showing them that they can live a normal life and do whatever they set their minds to.
