2020 UIL COVID-19 guidelines

6A, 5A will have later start than smaller classes

As the COVID-19 pandemic continues to hover over Texas, there will be a lot of changes to how Texas High School football will look in the 2020 season.

The University Interscholastic League has implemented several new policies for the safety and health of high school players, as well as fans and students.

One big change is that the bigger schools in the state will start their season later than the smaller schools.

Class 4A to 1A schools will start the season as planned on Aug. 27, while Class 6A and 5A have moved their season back a month, with the first day of practice scheduled for Sept. 7 and the first games of the season to start on Sept. 24.

Locally, both Lamar Consolidated ISD and Fort Bend ISD will wait until Labor Day to begin practices, while Needville ISD, Stafford ISD, Brazos ISD and East Bernard ISD opened their practices in early August.

However, LCISD athletes were able to get a couple of weeks of summer workouts in with precautions, while FBISD in early July shut down all workouts until Sept. 7.

The UIL also implemented practice guidelines over the summer to prevent the spread of the virus. Some of those guidelines included athletes bringing their own water to drink, coaches wiping down and sanitizing equipment and implementing social distancing.

Students over the age of 10, along with staff, parents and visitors, must wear face coverings upon entry of and exit of group within the restrictions of social distancing.

Also, schools must have required screening of COVID-19 symptoms, which includes temperature checks before participating in UIL activities, filling out questionnaires and immediate 14-day quarantines for those

The exact wording of the requirement has not been published by the UIL, nor have guidelines been put in place for a team that has multiple players contracting the virus. But each school district will still be allowed to handle the situation as it deems fit.

As for game days, there are also changes for players, fans and marching bands.

Locker rooms, stadium seats and other areas must be sanitized before and after each game and the seating area must have social distancing measures taken into account.

Marching bands must distance themselves by 10 feet from fans and spectators, and student groups (band, cheerleaders, drill team, etc.) must wear masks during the contest and should avoid mixing with fans or non-group members during the game.

Concession stands will be allowed to operate during games, but those working in the stands must wear masks. Also, condiments, flatware and silverware must be given out by request and individually wrapped.

Another big change is that the UIL has relaxed its longtime rule of banning live video broadcasts of Friday night football games for this upcoming season. Webcasts of Texas high school football games will be allowed beginning Sept. 25, while telecasts of games are allowed the next day.

Home away from home

Longhorns to face best Fort Bend has to offer

Fort Bend County is full of geographical oddities.

The fact that it is technically faster to drive to Mercer Stadium than it is to Traylor Stadium from George Ranch High School is one of those oddities.

Both stadiums are about eight miles away from the home of the Longhorns, but Mercer has a longer stretch of highway to cut down the travel time.

That fact will be useful with George Ranch moving over from District 23-6A to District 20-6A for the next two seasons.

The Longhorns will now face seven other programs across Fort Bend County in order to earn a district title after previously facing a tough slate against Pearland,

Dawson and Strake Jesuit.

"I think you have different challenges any time you come into a new district," George Ranch head coach Nick Cavallo said. He add-

ed the familiarity between the kids presents a new challenge.

"We don't necessarily have those built-in rivalries we've had for the past two years with the Pearland schools, Alief schools or Strake Jesuit. We had a little with Strake since we had some kids from the area that go there.

"But now, a lot of the kids from Travis, Austin and Ridge Point, they played Little League together.


"Now it adds to the competitive level. It is a different feeling when its someone that you know."

In year three with Cavallo, George Ranch has been building for this season. season.

"We're right on track where I want to be in year three," Cavallo said. "It is our third year in the same offense and our second year in the same defensive scheme and as a staff as a whole."

After a slow start, the George Ranch offense averaged 35 points during its two playoff games.

Coach Cavallo's team is hoping to continue to



fensive success with plenty of returning talent.

"We're ready for the year," Cavallo said. "Right now, we can come out with our first two units and run our base offense.

"Defensively, it is the same thing. We have one or two spots where we're still figuring a few things out, but they can all go out and run our base defense from day one.

"We're so far ahead from where we even finished the season last year."

Senior quarterback Sam Miller will be under center for the third season after throwing for nearly 2,000 yards and 20 touchdowns in 2019.

Miller's top target last season, Javon Gipson, committed to Baylor.

Gipson caught 29 passes for 637 yards and nine touchdowns last season. He finished the year with 20 receptions for 447 yards and six touchdowns in his final three games.

George Ranch junior running back Hymond Drinkard had a breakout sophomore campaign, after rushing for 1,000 yards and 12 touchdowns.

The defense also features a handful of headline players with defensive end Dave Babalola. Cavallo believed Babalola would have a handful of college scholarships offers during a normal offseason.


For now, the Longhorns are taking full advantage of summer workouts and sports-specific instruction.


George Ranch will get more than a month of extra work while the rest of District 20-6A in Fort Bend ISD has been barred from workouts until face-to-face instruction is allowed on campus.

George Ranch hopes to crack the playoff ranks with Travis, Ridge Point, Elkins, Bush and Austin being the teams aiming for the four top spots.

"It will be a challenge to face these Fort Bend schools because we haven't played them in a while," Cavallo said. "We don't necessarily know what they do offensively and defensively. We'll have to figure that out from film study."

Defense first

Stopping offense will be a strength for Travis

Lighting up scoreboards with points has been the calling card of Trey Sissom's time at Travis High School.

The Tigers have averaged over 40 points per game regularly over the past five seasons with quarterbacks Amryn Jeffrey and Eric Rodriguez, along with a host of Division-I level wide receiver including Parker Washington, Jarrell Farr, Arjei Henderson and Naveon Mitchell.

But the 2020 season will be different for the Tigers.

The 2019 seniors helped Travis secure the program's first undefeated regular season.

But Rodriguez, Washington, Farr, running back K.J. Shankle and receiver Colin Mushinski graduated.

"Obviously, that isn't the ideal situation," Sissom said. "We're fortunate the past few years that we've had a few kids come back each year with experience. (Experience) isn't something we have at the skill positions this year.

'The one good thing is we have a bunch of kids coming back on the offensive line. We have two that are coming back that would be three-year starters."

It doesn't help that the Tigers' top returning rusher Aundre Smith announced in August he would be finishing his high school career in California.

While the offense will be young, the

defense will feature plenty of returning talent, especially in the secondary.

'We're going to have to lean on the defense a little bit more than we have in the past," Sissom said. "We've been really stellar on the offensive side, and we will score points and hope the defense will slow the other team down.

"Now, we're going to have to flip that bit. The defense will have to slow things down until the offense can score."

The defensive back corps is headlined by Cameron Oliver and Cameron Moore.

> The all-district selections helped the Tigers generate a positive 20-point differential in 2019. 'We have Oliver, Moore and Ma-

son Muchaw back," Sissom said. "They are as good as you'll find. "That gives us a security blanket knowing we can take some chances

"Our guys will be tested against Foster, Spring and in the district, but we feel good about what they can do back there." It will also

help that lineman Joe Cadette

will be moving over to more of a defensive role.

Cadette, an all-district offensive lineman last year, has a skill set that will translate better on the defensive line in college.

"We want to do what's best for him and it helps our defense out," Sissom said.

The Tigers will likely go with junior quarterback Anthony Njoku.

The 6-foot-1 quarterback brings even more athleticism to the position compared to the previous Travis quarterbacks under Sissom.

In total, Travis has two starters on the offense returning. The Tigers will lean on the offensive line to be a stabilizing force, while the young Tigers get their legs under them.

"Of all of our groups, I think our offensive line will be our bell cow for us," Sissom said.

The extra challenge for 2020 is the fact that Fort Bend ISD teams are currently not practicing.

The district is not allowing for extracurricular activities until in-person instruction begins in September.

"We've put everything on the back burner to get everyone back in school," Sissom said. "Fortunately, we don't start for a month from a football perspective.

"We haven't seen the kids since June. FBISD has been shut down since the week before the Fourth of July. It has been tough not being able to see the kids."


"The biggest thing right now is making sure the kids are safe."


The combination of inexperience and lack of spring and summer training will require the young Tigers to learn on the job.

"That is what we use spring for. We evaluate those kids and throw them into the fire and see how they do," Sissom said.

Travis will face a similar District 20-6A with one change: Kempner is out and George Ranch is in.

The additional Richmond school will likely shrink the margin for error for the teams in District 20-6A attempting to make the playoffs.

Austin Bulldogs

Enrollment: 2,230.5. Coach: Mike Arogobonlo. 2019 record: 3-7, 3-4 district.

Key Returners: QB Braeden Abboud, LB Hunter Blanchette, DL Chase Meyers, ATH Keelian Bryant.

Notes: The Bulldogs lost their big offensive playmaker Troy Omiere, as he looks to make an early mark with the University of Texas. But Austin does have Abboud returning, who threw for 1,842 yards and 13 touchdowns as a sophomore last year. Meyers looks to lead a defense that will have a lot of quickness and pursuit to the ball carrier.

Bush Broncos

Enrollment: 2,532. **Coach**: Allen Aldridge. **2019 record**: 5-6, 3-4 (bidistrict).

Key Returners: LB Brandon Chambers, RB Donovan Nixon, LB Charlton Bibb, LB Preston Davis.

Notes: Expect Bush to be strong again on the defensive side of the ball after holding opponents to 221.2 yards per game. The Broncos will have depth at the linebacker position, led by Chambers, who was a first-team all-district selection as a sophomore in 2019. On offense, there are still a lot of holes to be filled, but Nixon (66 carries, 398 yards, 3 TDs) looks to be the main guy behind a veteran offensive line.

Clements Rangers

Enrollment: 2,523.5. Coach: Bobby Darnell. 2019 record: 1-9, 0-7 district.

Key Returners: TE David Kasmervisz, WR Chase Bell, LB Matt McGinnis, WR/CB Patrick Smith.

Notes: The Rangers feel that they have enough key players to make a move out of the district cellar. Kasmervisz (24 catches, 296 yards, 3 TDs) and Smith are expected to be top offensive players even as the quarter-

back situation is in flux. McGinnis is expected to lead the defense, but can several two-way players help Clements reach the playoffs?

Dulles Vikings

Enrollment: 2,600.5. **Coach**: Shane Byrd. **2019 record**: 2-8, 1-6 district.

Key Returners: OL Myles Chapman, WR Ryan Alaniz, DL Jerimiah Harrell, LB Jaxon Tilley.

Notes: Coach Byrd enters his second year with the Vikings with only

one offensive starter back in Chapman, an all-district guard. Alaniz returns to provide speed on offense and special teams. Harrell and Tilley, both all-district selections last year, look to lead an experienced defensive unit.

Elkins Knights

Enrollment: 2,543. **Coach**: Dennis Brantley. **2019 record**: 8-3, 5-2 district (bi-district).

Key Returners: WR Savion Sims,

DL Taruean Crawford, DE Malik Rugby, DB Blake Thompson.

Notes: The Knights will again have a talented athletic roster, but more on the defensive side in 2020. Thompson was a unanimous first-team all-district pick at safety last year, while Crawford was named 20-6A's defensive newcomer of the year. But on offense, it will be a youth movement. All-district pick Sims (15 catches, 292 yards, 4 TDs) is the lone returning offensive weapon.

George Ranch Longhorns

Enrollment: 2,724. Coach: Nick Cavallo. **2019 record**: 5-7, 4-3 district (area)

Key Returners: RB Hymond Drinkard, WR Javon Gipson, DE Dave Babolola, CB Stephen Woods.



Head coach Shaun McDowell has set that goal for the Falcons at every opportunity.

To reach that goal set in 2020, the Falcons will have to play until

The UIL pushed back 5A football by a month with the COVID-19 pandemic still surging in Tex-

"We have a longer season. Hopefully, we're playing in January. During a normal year we would be deep into offseason." McDowell said. "There will be a lot of challenges, but we're just going to have to plug through."

Foster once again has an opportunity to reach the goal of "state champs" with the class of 2021.

The senior group features three Division-I level players with receiver Cody Jackson, offensive lineman Reuben Fatheree II and defensive lineman Tyler Onyedim.

"The crazy thing is, the guys we're talking about like Cody. Deuce and 'TO', they've been playing for us for three years," McDowell said. "They are the stalwarts of the team.

"I think we've got some young guys and a bunch of seniors that will be playing for us.

"The 2021 class has been the backbone for the past couple of years."

"It'll be fun to place the new pieces around them to continue to make this senior class successful."

Foster will have to find a few

pieces to fit around their top play-

Xavier Smallwood will carry the ball at running back. Meanwhile, the few experienced hands will fill out the offensive line.

Taribbean Ramirez hopes to be that option opposite Jackson at wide receiver.

Jackson finished his junior campaign with 64 receptions for 1,370 yards and 18 touchdowns.

The future Oklahoma Sooner is in striking distance of the Foster career record for receiving vards. currently held by Cedarian Lamb at 3,418. Jackson is just under 2,500 yards after two seasons at the varsity level.

But the lingering question is: Who will be the starter at quarter-

Rvan Stubblefield was the man for the past two seasons. He is now at East Carolina University.

Will it be last year's backup Philip Amy, sophomore JT Fayard or another darkhorse candidate? Maryland move-

in and Yale commit Austin Tutas has further complicated the deci-



sion with his arrival in August.

McDowell keeps the expectation simple for his quarterback.

"The quarterback that is going to be the guy that gets first downs and touchdowns, bottom line," McDowell said. "That guy has to prove he can do the job not only to the coaches, but to his teammates as well."

The defensive side has plenty of talent headlined by Onyedim, who is committed to playing at Iowa State. He will have to fill the hole left by Chidozie Nwankwo.

But "TO" has plenty of help from linebacker Udoka Ezeani, along with defensive backs Justice Ugochuckwu and Ty Moore.

"The fun part is finding the pieces that are going to add to the talent that is already there," McDowell said.

Foster is attempting to speed up the defense and get more versatile on that side of the ball.

The path to the playoffs will be just as difficult as in years past.

Foster trades reigning 5A-DI state champion Shadow Creek for Manyel.

Class 6A drop-down Kempner replaces Friendswood and Katy Paetow joins the fray.

No matter the schedule, the Falcons will take it one game at a time.

"We don't look past the week we're on," McDowell said. "We want to be 1-0 each week.

"You can't win them all if you don't win the first one," McDowell added with a smile on his face.

If Foster does find themselves in the playoffs, the road will be tough in Region III-5A DI.

"Region III is one of the toughest regions in the state," McDowell said.


The region landscape has changed with District 9-5A, now featuring teams from Baytown, Beaumont and Port Arthur, along with Friendswood.


District champions Cedar Park and Dripping Springs return to head the groups from District 11-5A and District 12-5A.

The walking wounded would have been a good description of the 2019 Terry High School football team.

The Rangers were banged up early and never recovered.

Terry head coach Cornelius Anthony and the Rangers staff's hope for 2020 is that the team will grow from last year.

"The growing pains we had to deal with last year are paying dividends now," Anthony said. "There is a different swagger about those guys. They are more comfortable playing those positions. They can think outside of the box."

This senior group is special to the Rangers' head coach. It will be his first class to complete all four years under Anthony's leader-ship.

"With everything pushed back, we still have plenty of

It could be the change that Terry needs.

"If we can come out of the district healthy and make it to the playoffs, I feel like we'll be prepared to make a deep run because we'll be battle-tested," Anthony said.

The extra time was especially needed with a large group of seniors graduating.

"Unfortunately, a lot of those guys that played for the first time last year were seniors," Anthony said. "Now we're starting from scratch, but the

"Our secondary

"Our secondary struggled last year from the standpoint that all those guys were young and inexperienced," Anthony said. "That is the group I think of the most that have gone through the growing pains and now you see aggressiveness, a swagger to them."

The strong secondary play could give time for Lance McClain to do damage in the backfield.

"Lance has the opportunity to be a double-digit sack guy," Anthony said. "He's big, strong and athletic."

On offense, one of those seniors leading the way will be offensive lineman Luis Garcia.

"We were hurt by the injury of our best offensive lineman last year, Luis Garcia," Anthony said. "He's back; he's stronger and quicker than ever. He's going to be our anchor."

Garcia will block for a new quarterback.

Anthony will be going to his best athlete on the field: Kellen Stewart.

The senior earned all-district honors last year at wide receiver.

"Any time you have a person at the varsity level for the first time, there will be growing pains. However, when you put an athlete back there, when all else fails, (they can) run," Anthony said. "That is my mindset: put

the ball in the hands of the mostathletic kid in our program for every snap."

Running back Michael Odom to help relieve pressure on Stewart. Odom racked up over 400 yards rushing in 2019 in his first season at the varsity level.

Terry enters a District 10-5A DI field that has plenty of familiar faces, but also includes a few new ones.

Foster, Hightower and Angleton remain from the past two seasons.

Another Fort Bend ISD team, Kempner, joins the group along with two Houston ISD schools: Milby and Wisdom.

Reigning Class 5A-DI champion Shadow Creek moves up from 10-5A DI to Class 6A.

The competitive void is filled by Manvel, another Alvin ISD program that is no stranger to success.

No matter the district, the goal is the same for Terry.

"The playoffs are the bar at Terry," Anthony said. "If we can make the playoffs, we can make a run. This is going to be a hard thing to do with the type of schedule we have."

Fulshear struggled, but have gained invaluable experience for the program's return to 5A action.

Fulshear hasn't gotten away from the towns where Friday night football is the only show in town. The towns in 5A are just bigger with equally passionate fan bases.

College Station replaces Sealy. Hunstville replaces El Campo. Bryan replaces Columbia.

"Our kids know what it's like to go to a school for Friday night football where it is the only show in town," Fulshear head coach Oschlor Flemming said. "We've gone to El Campo and Sealy. Now we're going to Huntsville and A&M Consolidated. That won't be something new for us."

Now Flemming is hoping his program is finally finding its footing with the class of 2023 leading the way.

"We'll still have a bunch of young guys this year," Flemming said. "This freshman class was the best group that has come through here, and quite a few of those freshmen will be playing on Friday nights."

"We'll be young in a couple of spots, but that sets us up for success down the road."

The winning mentality has finally come for the football program at the lower levels, and the Chargers are

hoping to tap into

"This is our first freshman class that has been successful overall. They were 9-1 and the second team was 8-1. So, this is a talented sophomore class. We'll build around them and move forward."

In District 10-5A DII, the Chargers hope to push past three of the seven teams for a playoff spot.


"We want to get into the playoffs," Flemming said. "We want to be the first Fulshear football team in the postseason. That is our goal."


Fulshear already collected a win over Montgomery Lake Creek over the past two seasons and scrimmaged against Lamar Consolidated.

Effort over everything

Mustangs start over with coach Johnson in charge

If there is such a thing as an ideal start for the first head coaching job, Lamar Consolidated head coach Kiah Johnson didn't get that.

He got far from it.

Johnson was promoted from special teams coordinator in April amidst a pandemic.

The first-time head coach did not get to physically interact with his athletes until June, and he is having to prepare for 2020 while social distancing.

Johnson is forging ahead without excuses and aiming to build on the success of his predecessor, new Ridge Point head coach Rick LaFavers.

The Mustangs' coaching staff has wasted no time setting the tone on the practice field during summer strength and conditioning and sport-specific work.

"My main focus is how you perform at

practice," Johnson said. "We reward effort around here. Everyone is not talented, but you don't need to have talent to have effort."

The focus on overall attitude will be key for a Mustangs' roster that lost 26 seniors from last year.

"If you build the foundation for a program, even if you don't have the talent, you're going to have a chance in a fight in the end," Johnson said. "So when you get that wave of talent and you keep that foundation, you catapult."

The 2019 team was one that catapulted with the program's first playoff victory since the team won the state title in 2007.

Now the Mustangs start over with 10 starters returning.

"We want to push every kid on that field like they are the best player on the team," Johnson said. "We don't let anyone slide. I don't care who you are, you're going to give me your best effort.

"That is going to be who we are, if we aren't already that."

On offense, Lamar Consolidated will have to replace a core of skill players.

Junior Dylan Garrett will take over at quarterback.

The lissome 6-foot-3 signal-caller stands tall in the pocket and chucks the ball down field.
"I need to see who is going to

step up at running back," Johnson said. "And it's going to be Dylan's first year at quarterback. He's going to be tested early."

Johnson points out a key hole for Lamar, the graduation of allstate running

back Taye McWilliams, who will be playing at Baylor in the fall.

"I want the offense to be just as aggressive as the defense," Johnson said. "We're going to be an aggressive team. We're going to have fun out there and play fast."

Garrett will have a veteran offensive line to work with including Mark Munoz, Cameron Thompson, Allen Gerbermann and Cedric Pearson adding a year of experience.

It will help to have two-way player Rayshawn Glover back to help spark the offense.

Glover is the leader in rushing and receiving yards among returning players.

Additionally, Darrin Boston and Michael Clark will help out wide

"Michael Clark stepped up because he was getting kids together while things were shut down in the spring," Johnson said. "He was the first guy up when we were back."

Boston will also help on defense in the secondary, along with Isaiah Jenkins and Daniel Anomneze.

"Boston has been big. It's his

third year on varsity," Johnson said.

But the secondary remains a concern for coach Johnson.

"The front seven is pretty set. My worry is the back end," Johnson said.

The front seven will feature Eugene Mayfield, who is the returning leader in tackles and sacks for Lamar Consolidated.

The Mustangs will again hope to be in the playoff hunt in District 10-5A, Division II with a slightly different field.

Katy Paetow has been replaced by another LCISD team, Fulshear.

A&M Consolidated and Huntsville will again be tough challenges for the Mustangs, but both teams were also hit hard by graduation.

The margin for a playoff spot could be larger as a result, but that could all depend on Montgomery's bounce back and the ascension of Bryan Rudder.

Either way, the Mustangs have the speed and athleticism to make it to the playoffs for the third time in a row.

Jays ready to run it back

Needville fully stocked for another historic run

Last year was a season to remember for Needville head coach Mike Giles.

The Blue Jays won the program's first outright district title and reached the third round of the playoffs for the first time since the 1980s.

But Giles' Blue Jays aren't resting on their laurels.

"Not being complacent," Giles said. "Not being satisfied. We have a group of seniors that don't have that (complacent) mentality. They are not satisfied.

"We as coaches have to keep hammering that home because complacency can kill a program in a hurry."

Fifteen starters are back, including senior quarterback Trevor Baker.

"Our quarterback returns and a lot of our receivers are back," Giles said.

The largest question for the

The largest question for the Blue Jays will be replacing allstate running back Ashton Stredick.

Thankfully, Needville had a young roster around Stredick last season.

"We've got a bunch of guys that fill that role," Giles said.

"Walker (Warncke) can be a really good running back.

"What this allows us to do is do more things than we've done in the past and some of the things we've gotten away from the last couple of the years with Ashton.

"We're not focused on one guy, we'll try to spread it around a little more."

Baker, last season, threw for nearly 2,000 yards and 25 touchdowns in his first season under center

"Having Baker back is huge," Giles said. "If you look at our history with quarter-backs, even before I was in Needville, the second year that they've been in our program they've been able to execute better."

Baker will have plenty of returning targets to throw to with Warncke, Dax Bridges, Blake Maresh and Brandon Glover.

While who exactly will be taking over the running duties hast yet to be determined, Warncke showed he could carry the load in the playoffs with 185

Boerne in a victory.

"(Our offense) won't
change a lot, honestly,"
Giles said. "Our approach will still be aggressive. We'll push the

rushing yards against

ball downfield vertically and get the ball to our guys in space."

Equally important, the defense brings back seven starters.

The Blue Jays were able to make the major leap in 2019 after the defense made strides.

"We lost (defensive lineman Xavier) Lott and he was a really good player, but the bulk of the defen-

sive side returns," Giles said. "We feel really good about the defense."

Needville finished third in District 13-4A DII last season with 15.7 points allowed per

The defense will be led by senior defensive tackle Blake Boenisch.

Boenisch has already committed to Rice University and he will set the tone in the middle of the line.

Opposing offenses will also have to focus on fellow defensive lineman Bryant Jones. who recorded eight sacks in his sophomore

Warncke's strongest position on the field will be at defensive back. He leads the team among returning players with over 80 tack-

Needville will face a slightly different district in 2020 with Sealy and Fulshear replaced by Stafford. In District 12-4A DI, the Blue Jays will still need to get past El Campo, Columbia, Brazosport and Bay City.

"Stafford will bring in an extremely talented football team," Giles said. "I expect Bay City to be better. Coach (Tim) Sparkman is in his second year at B-Port. And we know how good El Campo and West Columbia can

The Blue Jays aren't looking past the district, expecting another long postseason. The current senior class was left out of the playoffs in 2017 as well as 2016 on a tiebreaker.

"I expect (the district) to be as competitive as last year," Giles said. The "new" district also brings a new chal-

Needville is a new region. The Blue Jays move over from Region IV to Region III for 2020 and 2021.

"It doesn't change things," Giles said. "Historically, you look at Region III, it's very competitive, very talented and a very tough region.

"Our focus is on week one and working through our non-district schedule. We're not looking past our district."

In 2019, Region III-4A DI featured district champions Crandall, Carthage, Huffman Hargrave and Navasota.

Carthage and Navasota dropped down to 4A-Division II while Crandall moved up to 5A-

The expectations are high for Needville with the Blue Javs opening the season ranked No. 17 in 4A-DI on the Texas Football-Associated Press high school football poll.

At the same time, the opportunity is there for the current corps of Jays.

The seniors have a chance to surpass the 2019 group's mark with the road to the regional crown.

Building up Brazos

Roecker's Cougars ready for next step in 2020

Brazos head coach Ryan Roecker is aiming to build a program that won't back down from a fight.

"You want a shot against Mike Tyson (or MMA champion John) 'Bones' Jones," Roecker said. "In my opinion, as a competitor, that is what you want. It may not work out in your favor, but you want to measure yourself as a man."

That mindset will be tested in 2020.

The Cougars go from one of the largest 2A programs in Texas to one of the smallest 3A programs after realignment.

Brazos returns to Class 3A after reaching the playoffs the past two seasons including a regional berth in 2018.

The Cougars trade games against state-ranked Shiner or Refugio for games against state-ranked East Bernard.

Brazos will face rival East Bernard for the first time since 2017.

The Cougars faced two other future district foes last year. Brazos beat Danbury and a loss to Rice Consolidated in 2019.

Brazos will also face Tidehaven and Van Vleck in District 14-3A DII.

"It's going to be a competitive district," Roecker said. "Friday nights are going to be fun and it will give the towns a sense of normalcy. That is the

biggest thing we're trying to do, be a beacon. We want everyone to rally around us. You've had a bad week, take your mind off things and watch the Cougars."

Despite the new challenges, the goal is the same for coach Roecker.

"District championship," Roecker said.

He would also like his athletes to grow and mature over the football season.

In order to complete that goal, the Brazos coaching staff put in extra work this offseason to make sure the Cougars had every opportunity for summer strength and conditioning.

Roecker and his staff had morning and afternoon shifts for "SAC" camp and the Cougars hit the ground running with sportsspecific instruction.

The goal for all this work is to build up the depth of the roster.

Roecker noted he's working on "closing the gap" between his starters and back-ups in performance.

It also helps that 2020 is the first "full" offseason for Roecker and his staff.

The former Anahuac assistant head coach joined Brazos in mid-June last season.

All of this hard work could pay off for players like senior Jared Demny.

Demny has played all over the field for the Cougars, and will likely do so again with the possibility that he will take over full time at quarterback. He could split his time at wide receiver and safety.

The Cougars will rely on senior D.J. Lewis to be the anchor on the offensive line.

Roecker doesn't expect one group to stand out, but he hopes the sum is greater then its parts in 2020.

"The strength is going to have to be in us," Roecker said. "Each position has strength; it may be one or two guys. But I think it's going to come down to us getting the job done together."

Brahmas don't skip a beat during 2020 offseason

Back-to-back trips to the state semifinals would be the high point for most programs.

East Bernard is not a normal football program.

The Brahmas are proud of the 2018 and 2019 teams' accomplishments, but the ultimate goal is to add to the program's two state championships.

The expectations are once again high for the 2020 squad, with the Brahmas entering the season ranked in the top 10 for Class 3A Division II in the Texas Football-Associated Press poll.

Head coach Wade Bosse will have to find some answers quickly this offseason with only eight returning starters back.

The attention for roster construction will be focused on the defensive side that has only a quarter of its starters back.

"Defensively, it's wide open," Bosse said. "We have three kids back and we have some kids stepping up. But it will be good to have another opponent and see who fits where."

It doesn't hurt that one of those returners is all-district inside linebacker Brennan Peloquin, who led the Brahmas in tackles with 117 in 2019.

"The good thing is our defensive signal-caller

is back, so that is going to help speed up the process," Bosse

It will be tough to match the effort of last year's team defensively. East Bernard ranked fourth overall in Texas among all high school programs last season in points allowed, 8.5 per game.

Overall, Bosse knows the group is inexperienced but he believes they will be up for the challenge by the time district rolls around.

The offense is another story. The Brahmas' offense has more than half of its starters returning, including junior signalcaller Dallas Novicke.

"We've got six back on our offense," Bosse said. "We had some different concerns coming into the year, but most of those concerns are actually gone at this time.

"We still have one back position we need to fill, but I saw what it's going to be."

The quarterback is often limited to a decision-maker in a slot-T offense.

Novicke, a dual-sport athlete, has shown flashes of being able to stretch the field with the passing game.

Bosse joked, "You'll wait and see." if Novicke will be throwing the ball more in 2020.

Either way, the offense's first option will be senior running back Devin Chapman.

Chapman finished with nearly 900 yards of total offense last season for East Bernard.


