

Avoid Parking Vehicles that Block the Sidewalk

id you know? Parking a car so that it blocks the sidewalk is not just a safety issue, it is against the law! Blocking the sidewalks poses significant challenges for individuals with mobility impairments and for those who rely on clear pathways for safe navigation. A vehicle sticking out even a little bit onto the sidewalk creates an obstacle that can be difficult to get around. It may even force pedestrians onto the street, which could lead to injury or worse.




Sidewalks are "pedestrian lanes"

that provide people a space to travel that is separate from motor vehicles and on-road traffic. Sidewalks provide a safe and convenient space for pedestrians to walk, jog, and utilize alternative modes of transportation such as wheelchairs, walkers, rascals, or scooters. By keeping these walkways clear, we can create an inclusive environment that promotes the well-being and mobility of all community members.

The Texas transportation code says that you cannot park over a sidewalk, even if on your own driveway. Your sidewalk, including the portion that spans your driveway, is a public right of way, and must remain free of vehicles, trashcans, or other impediments. If parked on your driveway, the vehicle must be pulled up enough that the sidewalk remains completely unobstructed. You can be issued a citation if the matter is reported to the Fort Bend County Sheriff.

All Sweetgrass residents should help ensure pedestrian safety and accessibility by NOT parking vehicles that obstruct the sidewalks. By maintaining clear and unobstructed sidewalks, we demonstrate our commitment to fostering a safe community environment. Please be a good neighbor and make sure that you and/or your guests are NOT blocking the sidewalk. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated, and together, we can ensure the well-being and accessibility of our community for everyone.

















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

State Highway 6, U.S. Highway 59 and U.S. Highway 90A are designated as hurricane evacuation routes and these routes affect Missouri City in both geographic areas of Fort Bend and Harris Counties.

GATHER DISASTER SUPPLIES

- Store enough food, water, supplies and medications for at least three days.
- Place important documents in a safe, waterproof place.
- Charge all electronic devices you may need and gather batteries, portable radio and chargers.
- Turn fridge to coldest temperature so that if power is lost, it will stay cooler longer.
- Keep gas tank full and keep cash on hand.

PROTECT/STRENGTHEN YOUR HOME

- Review your home owners' policy and/or consider flood insurance.
- Cover windows with plywood boards and place sandbags around doorways to reduce the risk of water damage.
- Bring lightweight objects indoors and consider moving your vehicle to a safe location.

Try to stay out of flood waters as they can be dangerous and contaminated and could pose electrocution due to downed power lines.

PREPARE FOR POWER OUTAGES

- Back up your files/important documents/photos on your laptop/computer.
- Optional consideration Generators that are portable or installed ones that run on gas.
- Know how to open your electric garage door opener and know where the manual release lever is located and learn how to operate it.

CREATE AN EMERGENCY PLAN & CONTACT LIST

- Create a plan to contact family and friends and let them know your planned whereabouts.
- Maintain a list of phone numbers for doctors, utilities, vet, etc.
- Review Cellular Plan for unlimited texting and stay tuned to social media.












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

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Father's Day history

ach year, the third Sunday in June is a time to pay homage to fathers and the millions of other men who have stepped into the role of father. While it may seem as though Father's Day has been around forever, it didn't become a nationally recognized holiday in the United States until 1972, when President Richard Nixon signed Joint Resolution 187 into law.

Many thank Sonora Smart Dodd for making Father's Day happen. In 1909, while attending a Mother's Day sermon in church, Dodd felt fathers were equally deserving of praise. To honor her own father, a Civil War veteran and widower who raised six children alone, Dodd petitioned for a Father's Day on June 5th (the anniversary of her father's death) in her native Spokane, Wash. The celebration was deferred to the third Sunday in June. Another account says Grace Golden Clayton came up with the idea for a Father's Day in 1908 in Fairmont, West Virginia. Clayton was inspired to celebrate fathers after 361 local men perished in a deadly mine explosion. Clayton brought the idea up to the minister of her local church.


Historians say that Father's Day may even be a much older idea. St. Joseph's Day, which was celebrated each year on March 19 in Catholic nations of Europe since the medieval era, and later elsewhere around the world, commemorates Joseph, the husband of Mary and father figure to Jesus. It was said that Joseph should be held up as the ideal example of fatherhood. The Coptic Orthodox Church celebrates St. Joseph's Day on July 20. In the Orthodox Christian Church, the second Sunday before the Nativity is celebrated as the Sunday of the Forefathers — celebrating

all of Jesus' male ancestors, with an emphasis on Abraham, the patriarch of the Jewish faith.
















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- Repaint of the Lakehouse interior (North half of building) The north half of the Lakehouse will be closed for repainting from June 26 until July 4. This includes the Library/Coffee Bar, Learning Center, Activity Center, Creativity Center, Ballroom, and Hallway. There will be no reservations, activities, meetings, or events in those rooms during that time. The remainder of the Lakehouse, including the Fitness Center, Aerobics Center, Indoor Pool, Locker Rooms, Billiards Center, and Lobby, will remain open and will not be affected.
- Upcoming "Spring" cleaning. -There will be an upcoming Spring cleaning of the CCGA storage areas at the Lakehouse, including closets, cabinets, display walls, and display cases. This cleaning will allow us to evaluate our storage usage, and ensure that space is being shared equitably. Remember, storage space is provided so that CCGAs have a place to keep the items they need for their regular meetings, or for an upcoming event. The Lakehouse does not have sufficient space to house all of a Club or Group's assets, or for long-term archiving of Club/Group property. Our plan is to schedule this project to occur at the same time as the painting project mentioned above. All Clubs and Groups will need to set an appointment with Stephen Martinez to review the items they have stored or displayed. Clubs/Groups who do not meet with Stephen will have their items removed.
- Re-seal of front and back porch We will soon be resealing the front and back porch of the Lakehouse. A date has not yet been set but will be announced once confirmed with the vendor. This project will include power washing and degreasing of the porches, applying 2 coats of acrylic sealer with UV resistance (to revive and protect acid staining), and adding quartz for slip resistance.
- Refurbish and resurface both the indoor and outdoor pool We will soon be working on refurbishing both the indoor and outdoor pool. The project will include resurfacing of the pool interior, as well as repairs and respraying of the pool decking. This project will be completed in two stages, with the indoor pool being done sometime this summer, and the outdoor pool being done after the summer swim season is finished. Splitting the project into two phases will allow us to have at least 1 pool available to swim in at all times. An exact date range has not yet been set, but will be announced once confirmed.

There is a federal program called SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) that provides certain food items for people in need. 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Spinach-Stuffed Tomatoes

When tomatoes are ripening fast and furious, stuffing them with a delicious spinach filling makes for great eating. These Spinach-Stuffed Tomatoes are the perfect accompaniment to grilled steak or chicken.

INGREDIENTS

- 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter
- · 2 onions, chopped
- · 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1-1/2 pounds fresh spinach, stemmed and chopped
- 1-1/3 cups whole-wheat bread crumbs
- 2 eggs, beaten
- · salt, to taste
- · 8 to 10 small tomatoes




DIRECTIONS

In a skillet over medium heat, melt butter. Add onions and garlic and cook until onions are limp. Add spinach and cook until tender and limp, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat and stir in bread crumbs, eggs, and salt.

Preheat oven to 350°F.

3 Cut tomatoes in half horizontally and scoop out seeds. Place in an 8x8-inch baking dish (you may have to trim the bottoms so the tomatoes stand up). Stuff tomatoes with spinach mixture. Bake for 30 minutes. Serve hot.

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Caprese Bruschetta

This Caprese Bruschetta appetizer is so simple and elegant. The layers of bread, mozzarella, tomato, and basil stack up for one tasty morsel! Perfect for the vegetarian at your gathering. You can prepare the ingredients in advance, then assemble as guests arrive.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 Italian baguette
- 1 pound fresh mozzarella
- · 4 Roma tomatoes
- · salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- 24 basil leaves
- · 2 to 3 cloves garlic, cut in half
- 2 to 3 tablespoons balsamic vinegar or balsamic glaze



DIRECTIONS

Slice baguette on the diagonal into 24 slices; save ends for another use. Broil until lightly toasted. Rub each slice with garlic immediately after removing from oven. Cut mozzarella into 24 pieces, about 1/2 inch thick and sized to cover bread. Slice each tomato into 6 slices.

Place baguette toasts on a platter; top with mozzarella, then tomato, and salt and pepper. Top each with a basil leaf and drizzle with balsamic vinegar. Serve immediately.



Slow-Cooker Tomato Sauce

This zesty slow-cooker tomato sauce sauce is an easy classic. Set it and forget it! And the result is so flavorful, it will quickly become a family favorite. Enjoy pasta, meatballs, chicken parm, and more!

INGREDIENTS


- 4 Tbs olive oil
- 1 small yellow onion, peeled and finely sliced
- · 3 cloves garlic, peeled and minced
- 3 pounds (about 20 medium) fresh plum tomatoes, cored, peeled, seeded, and pureed (enough to yield 4 cups)
- 1/4 cup minced fresh parsley, or 1 Tbs dried
- · 3 Tbs minced fresh basil, or 1 tsp dried
- 1 Tbs minced fresh oregano, or 1 tsp dried
- · salt and pepper, to taste



DIRECTIONS

Turn the slow-cooker on high, let it heat for 5 minutes, and add olive oil, onion, and garlic. Stir and cover. (The pot won't get hot enough to brown them.) Cook for 1 hour, or until onion is soft and wilted. Uncover and add tomatoes, parsley, basil, oregano, salt, and pepper. Reduce the heat to low, and stir. Cook with the cover off for approximately 4 hours. The sauce is done when it is thick and not watery.

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
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TALKIN' TURPIE

Presidential Libraries of Texas by JUDY TURPIE, Resident & Resident Concierge

s a major history geek, I have visited many Presidential Libraries including all three of the Presidential Libraries in Texas. Lyndon B., LBJ, Johnson's Library & Museum is on Red River in Austin on the University of Texas campus. The library was built in 1971 and dedicated on May 22, 1971. Johnson, our 36th President's library houses 45 million pages of historical documents, including the papers of President Johnson and those of his close associates and others. The historical documents include historical photographs, movies, slides, and film.





Along with the 45 million pages of historic documents, the library houses the limo used by Johnson as well as many permanent exhibits as well as special exhibits.

Located in the Texas A&M Campus in College Station is the 2nd Texas Presidential Library. The George H. W. Bush, Presidential Library and Museum honoring our 41st was dedicated in 1997. The museum houses many permanent exhibits that help us understand history during "H.W.'s" presidential term.

Texas 3rd Presidential Library is on the campus of Southern Methodist University in Dallas. The 2nd Bush library in Texas the 43rd President George W. Bush's. The George W. Bush Presidential Library maintains approximately 43,000 artifacts, primarily foreign and domestic gifts given to the President and Mrs. Laura Bush, and other items obtained throughout the presidency at events and during trips. Most famously, perhaps, the Library has the bullhorn used by President Bush during his visit to the World Trade Center after the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. These artifacts document the American experience.

While all the Presidential libraries I have been to have been serious, the events of September 11, 2001, lend a sometimes somber but mostly introspective atmosphere to the 43rd President's library. In answer to the question, I have been to the following Presidential residences and or libraries: George Washington's home, Thomas Jefferson's home, Andrew Jackson's home, Rutherford B. Hayes's home & library, Franklin Roosevelt's home & library, Dwight Eisenhower home & farm, Lyndon Johnson, Jimmy Carter, Bill Clinton, George H.W. Bush, and George W. Bush. Each library is as unique as the president whose name is on the building.





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
