Parks and Recreation, Planning, Intergovernmental Relations, Economic Development (including tourism and cultural arts), Human Resources, Finance and Communications, while Steubing will oversee Engineering, Information Technology, Environmental and Neighborhood Services, Permits and Inspections and Public Works.

First Assistant City Manager Steve Griffith will continue to manage fire, police, municipal court, public safety dispatch and aviation, and Assistant City Manager Jim Callaway is tasked with the extensive citywide planning process to prepare for annexation of Greatwood and New Territory on Dec. 12.

National award-winning Inspiration Stage is proud to congratulate one of its own - Jasmine Rogers.

A graduating senior and veteran of the school's theatre department and Sugar Land's community theatre, Inspiration Stage, Jasmine was recently awarded the coveted Best Actress nod in the greater Houston area Tommy Tune Award Ceremony for her portrayal of The Witch in Austin High School's "Into the Woods."

Hosted by Theatre Under the Stars (TUTS), the Tommy Tune Awards recognize and reward excellence in high school musical theatre created by students and educators in the greater Houston metropolitan area. 2017 marked the Awards' 15th year. The 2017 ceremony, held April 18 at the Hobby Center, recognized theatre troupes from 45 local high schools from districts including Fort Bend, Lamar Consolidated, Houston, Pearland, and more.

Participating schools performed a chosen musical before judges in the Spring, in anticipation of nominations for a variety of awards at the annual awards showcase. Jasmine was awarded the top honor after competing against eight talented peers nominated in the Best Actress category.

Jasmine brought to life, in an incredibly sinister way, the much-hated witch. Surprised and elated by her win, her Tommy Tune acceptance speech, which was riddled with the class that she portrays in all areas of her life, was filled with thanks to her mother, Jacquelyn McCardell, for all of her support through the years.

"Winning this award was an amazing experience — one that I will treasure for the rest of my life," Rogers said. "The Witch has always been a dream role of mine, and finally getting to portray her on stage was incredible. I was glad to finish my high-school career portraying such a strong character, and hope to tackle the show again in the future."

Rogers was born in Boston, where she lived until her family moved to Texas in 2010. She is currently a Richmond resident. Rogers, who knew from a very young age that she liked to perform, was seven years old when she was cast in her first play as a member of Tiger Lily's tribe in Milford Performing Arts

Center's production of Peter Pan, a community theatre production in Milford, Mass.

"Jasmine has always loved to sing, and putting it together with acting just seemed to make sense," said McCardell. "She likes to challenge herself. I remember the audition for her first musical. Jasmine was only seven and she chose to audition with

her first musical. Jasmine was only seven and she chose to audition with Popular from 'Wicked.' I asked if she might want to pick something a little easier, and she said, 'No thanks, I like this song.'"

Subsequently, she has performed in dozens of school and community productions, with some of her favorite musical roles being Mimi in "Rent," Candy in "Zombie Prom," Danielle in "Bring it On,"Aunt Spiker in "James and the Giant Peach, Jr.," and of course, The Witch in "Into the Woods." One of her favorite non-musical roles was portraying Marie Antoinette, in the play of the same name.

"Acting has taught me so many things about myself. The beautiful thing about being on stage in front of an audience is how you can feel completely vulnerable and safe at the same time," Rogers said. "The art of story telling is such an amazing thing; you have the ability to make an audience member think, change their perspective, or simply just brighten their day. There is nothing else I would rather do."

Jasmine's first show with Inspiration Stage was "I Never Saw Another Butterfly," during iStage's inaugural year.

She has dedicated hours to developing unique characters in both adult and youth productions,

but her breakthrough performance that truly wowed audiences,

was her portrayal as Mimi in "Rent" in 2016. The same year, she starred in "James and the Giant Peach, Jr.," which later traveled to Atlanta in January 2017 to compete at the Junior Theatre Festival.

For her role of James' ridiculous Aunt Spiker, Jasmine received an All Star Cast Award and the show received the festival's top honor of Outstanding Performance, both presented in front of the festival's 6.000 attendees.

"Jasmine shines onstage and off. She is a fearless performer who works tirelessly to bring her characters to life," said Mandy Seymore-Sensat, Inspiration Stage's artistic director. "She has a tremendous voice that takes your breath away."

Jasmine auditioned for and was accepted to many performing arts schools across the country, from Texas

all the way to Boston. She made her final decision to attend the Manhattan School of Music, where she will continue to train and perform in coming years, with aspirations of eventually tackling Broadway.

"Jasmine's future looks bright," said Seymore-Sensat. "It has been a joy to watch her grow and to see her spread her wings and soar. I know she is destined for big things. I'm so very proud of her."



BEEN ABOUT EQUALITY AND EMPOWERMENT

orget what you think you know about boys choirs if descriptions like "effeminate," "weak," "snobbish," or "weird" come to mind, because you are reacting to unfair fallacies and stigmas shrouding boys choirs, said William "Bill" Adams, founder of the Fort Bend Boys Choir of Texas.

"People have this image about what a boys choir is and it is so very wrong," he said. "They think boys are in the choir because they can't be in anything else. That they can't play sports. That they are weak. That they are sissies.

"This is far from the truth."

Adams, who performed in The Phoenix Boys Choir in the early 60s, has long understood the stigmas of an all-boys choir, but was never deterred from finding solace in the music.

"I loved the hauntingly beautiful sounds of boys singing together," Adams said. "That was my impetus [to get involved with the boys choir].

"When I was younger I was a big guy ... a big guy who played football and was a good singer."

And his experience is precisely why he stresses that "what other people think" should not discourage boys who enjoy singing from auditioning for the choir.

"The choir offers them an equality that is not present in the world."

"Our choir boys play sports, too," he said. "They're into all kinds of other activities. Just because they sing in the choir does not mean they can't or won't

do anything else.

"What the boys find in the choir is a comradeship because although they all come from different cultures, races and socioeconomic backgrounds, the choir offers them an equality that is not present in the world.

"On the stage they are all equal. They don't have to justify themselves to each other. They are in the choir for one reason: To sing well."

Epitome of a Positive Message

The choir is divided among five performing ensembles: the Training, Town and Tour Choirs; the alumni choir called Cantabilé; and Music Magic, an introductory program for six and seven year old boys.

The choirboys, who are selected by audition, rehearse twice a week and the Tour Choir performs concerts, at weddings and conventions, and have even been requested to perform for commercials and television specials.

"I have heard nothing but positive reviews from people who have heard our boys sing," said Tiana Mortimer, the choir's executive director who has been involved with the choir for 18 years. "And those who haven't heard us, they are intrigued by us. Especially in these times when there are so many news stories about boys getting in trouble because these choirboys are on stage proving to be a positive message."

New Territory mom Tami Hawkins praises the Fort Bend Boys Choir for offering instruction in lessons far beyond singing.

"The choir has been instrumental in teaching Eli about what it takes to be a model young man," she said. "Mr.Adams, as well as the other directors, teach each of the boys the importance of being self disciplined, being courteous and well mannered, being confident, and being kind, all while allowing them to be boys."

Hawkins' son, Eli, who has been in the choir for four years, three of them on the Tour Choir, said boys who join the choir will be amazed at the opportunities afforded to them.

"We touch people through song, become strong musicians, learn to be more mature and make friends who are trustworthy and supportive," he said. "We work hard but we have a great time while doing it."

These are precisely the lessons the directors of the choir want the boys to learn.

"We teach the boys that the world can be a better place and they can do that through music," Mortimer added. "Music is powerful. Music can transcend everything."

More than Singing Lessons

Each choirboy is required to maintain high academic standards and adequately manage their dedication to the choir as

well as to any other activities like scouts, sports, church or volunteering.

"And from early on they learn leadership roles, organization and responsibility," said Mortimer.

Liz Dewey, who has been a member of the choir's board of directors since 2012, added that the choir also teaches the boys "discipline that will help them long after they voice out of the choir."

"Mr. Adams teaches the boys: 'If you're on-time you're late. If you're early, you're great,' Dewey added.

Alex Dewey, Liz's 16-year-old son, was a member of the Fort Bend Boys Choir and testified to the benefits of the structure the choir provided.

"It helped me learn discipline and self control, which I need in band," said Alex, who is currently a member of his high school's varsity choir and band.

Mortimer also stressed that the boys learn the importance of being able to rehearse and perform alongside others who are different from themselves.

"What they discover is they are singing with other boys who also enjoy singing," Mortimer said. "They may be different in every other way, except that, and that is what brings them together."

While society may focus on uncontrollable characteristics of people like race or the social class they were born into, Adams said the Fort Bend Boys Choir is resolute in teaching the boys that it does not matter where they came from, but rather where they are going.

During the camps, Adams, who is a licensed child psychologist, discusses more than music with the boys.

"When we have our camps we incorporate in lessons from how to deal with bullies and build self-confidence to learning how to take your mask off."

That mask Adams refers to is the "face" people put on in order to reflect society's definition of success.

"I have an empty box at camp where they can put their 'mask,'" Adams said. "They can be themselves here because

this choir is about empowerment. There are no boys who are better than the others. No one has to sit on the sidelines. Every boy sings. Every boy is important."

Embraced by the Community

The Fort Bend Boys Choir of Texas is in its 35th year and it shows no signs of

fading out like boys choirs around the nation and world have. Since its inception in 1982, nearly 6,000 boys have sung in the Fort Bend Boys Choir, which Adams says testifies to the choir's uniqueness.

"This community has been awesome with its support," Adams said. "From parents and businesses to civic clubs and companies, they all have embraced us and that is why we are a unique niche. That's why we are successful."

Adams is humbled by how receptive Fort Bend is of the choir, especially considering some of the comments made when he first had the idea to start it.

"I was told: 'You know, Fort Bend is more of a sports place,' "Adams recalled. "But then I figured why not give it a try? I mean, if I didn't try I would never know."

Although there were no such organization like a boys choir in Fort Bend at the time, and Adams would have to build it from scratch, he had more than enough experience to make it happen.

Immediately prior to starting the Fort Bend Boys Choir of Texas, Adams was a director with The Singing Boys of Houston for six years. And to his credit, he has also worked with both adult and children's choirs and toured both in the US and abroad and served as a guest conductor of the Vienna Boys Choir and the Vienna Chamber Orchestra.

On top of that Adams earned his Bachelor of Arts degree with a dual major in psychology and vocal performance

from Northern Arizona University and a Master of Arts degree in psychology from Arizona State University.

With that kind of experience and encouragement from friends, especially those in the local school districts, Adams pushed forward and started the choir with 42 boys.

"And then more boys joined and I had to split the choir into two choirs and then split it again," Adams said, the pride clear in his voice. "Over the years the choir has blossomed."

The choir currently has more than 130 choirboys making it the largest independent boychoir in the world.

"When I first started the choir, I just wanted to see if it would fly," Adams said. "And it flew."

A Wonderful Opportunity

"It doesn't seem like it's been 35 years

"But society has changed so much [since the choir's inception] and I will admit this

is a difficult time for a boys choir with so much grabbing for our children's' attention.

"But the boys still come to audition and we're trying to encourage even more. So society may have changed, but it's clear people still love hearing these boys sing," he added. "And come to think of it, that hasn't changed in the last 500 years."

In early June the Tour Choir traveled to Zürich, Switzerland, serving as musical ambassadors of Fort Bend County and Texas during a two-week performance tour.

The summer tours are a traditional event for the choir, and in the past the boys have traveled to around Texas and the nation as well as Great Britain, Germany, Austria, Mexico, Canada, Denmark, Italy, Australia and France.

"This choir is a great opportunity for young boys, and not only because of the singing," Adams said. "Singing is the tool to get them excited about life. They get to travel. They get represent their community. They build their confidence.

"We teach them to become much more than singers."

An Important Organization

Tami Hawkins of New Territory praises the Fort

"My husband and I have seen such growth in Eli since he started with the choir," she said. "We are so glad that we made the

choice to join the organization."

Eli, who has been in the choir for four years said "it feels good to know that other boys look up to [him] as a role model."

"Mr. A has taught me how to be the best musician that I can possibly be," Eli said. "His guidance has even helped me become a better drummer in my middle school band. I like the fact that I am becoming more responsible and mature."

"I, at times, feel as if values such as kindness, courtesy, and manners are lacking in people, in general, today," his mother said. "The Fort Bend Boys Choir is definitely doing their part to help shape these young men to go out and positively influence everyone they come in contact with."

Eli said he also enjoys singing with his friends, learning new things and traveling to different places.

"The Tour Choir travels every summer in order to share our music in other places. My first year in Tour Choir we went to Tennessee. It was the first time I had been away from home and my family. I was gone for 10 days, I had a great time, though.

"We got to sing for a lot of different people—one of the times we sang in a cave! We don't only sing when we tour. We also went to visit the Grand Ol' Opry, went to Dollywood, and we did some zip lining."

Last year the choir went to Minnesota and has the chance to take a paddleboat cruise and visit the Mall of America.

Tiana Mortimer, whose own son was in the choir for five years, stressed getting the boys into the choir as early as possible is important.

"We are trying to get parents to see the value of getting their sons involved early because there is a limited amount of time a boys can be in this choir," she said. "Sometimes parents don't realize that their son's voices can change quickly. Sometimes it seems like overnight. That voice will be gone before they know it."

No Ice Cream Maker? No problem.

Follow these simple steps to make vanilla ice cream from scratch:

You'll Need:

2 cups heavy whipping cream

2 cups half-and-half cream

1 cup sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Time: 3.5 hours

Step 1Prep Your Pan

Freeze an empty freezer-safe shallow bowl or pan. If you can, use a 13x9inch pan, but anything stainless steel works well here. Avoid any material that might shatter.

Step 2 Mix It Up

In a large bowl, stir all the ingredients until the sugar is dissolved.

For the smoothest texture, make sure the sugar is completely dissolved before you freeze.

Step 3 Freeze

Transfer your mixture into the cold pan and stick it back in the freezer for about 20-30 minutes. Around that time, check the ice cream. Once the edges start to freeze, take out the mixture



By breaking up the ice cream, you'll help make it smooth and creamy. You cannot beat the mixture too much.

Step 4 Back to the Freezer

Return the pan to the freezer. Every 30 minutes or so, take it back out and beat the ice cream again. Repeat until it is firmly frozen, usually around four or five mixing sessions. Once it's frozen, the mixture should be smooth and creamy.

If at any time the ice cream becomes too hard, place it in the refrigerator until it becomes soft enough to beat, and then continue the process.

Store the ice cream in a covered freezer container until ready to serve.

Now that you know the basics, try these ice cream upgrades:

- Mix in chunks of your favorite candy bars.
- Drizzle in toppings like melted caramel, dark chocolate or toffee.
- Layer the ice cream between two cookies for the ultimate dessert.
