67th Annual—Dundee Fair Will Open Tomorrow

DUNDEE—The 67th annual exhibition of the Dundee Fair will get under way Wednesday evening, and run through Saturday evening.

To open the four night and three day show, Fair officials scheduled a full card of harness pony racing with six heats and a free for all. This is something new in this particular area and race officials are especially enthused as the fair grounds has a quarter mile dirt track for the pony races.

Fair manager L. R. Hamner has announced there is a full midway of concessions and rides. The fair books the midway independently and the Holman Rides of Geneva Falls have been coming to Dundee Fair for over 50 years.

The poultry tent is showing more entries this year than some years and one early visitor reported over 600 different birds. The cattle barns are full as are the sheep pens.

The 4-H departments give promise of a bigger and better exhibition.

These boys and girls are members of clubs in both Yates and Schuyler Counties.

Thursday and Friday afternoons will be the days for the horse race enthusiast as there are full cards for both afternoons.

The Dundee Central School band will be on hand Thursday afternoon and Friday will perform on the stage in front of the grandstands. Another special is the greased pole climbing which can be entered by anyone. This will take place Thursday afternoon.

Friday afternoon is the annual tractor pulling contest which has grown to become a special event. The special event for the fair is the guest speaker Friday afternoon. The New York State Commissioner of Agriculture Don Wickham of Hector, N. Y., will appear on the stage in front of the grandstands to deliver his message.

Friday evening beginning promptly at 6 o'clock the people attending the fair will have an opportunity to see the judging of the horses and ponies. This will take place in front of the grandstands and will be through just in time for the Fireman's parade to come in on the race track where there will be many fine demonstrations of drill teams. Fire Chief Tom Disbrow states there are many entries already in for the parade and contests. The parade will form on the Dundee Central School grounds.

Thursday night and Saturday afternoon are the two big times for stock car racing. Thursday night is the Inter-Trac Championship qualifying heats and Saturday afternoon is the track championship qualifying heats.

The fair will close with the annual horse pulling contest held on the race track in front of the grandstands, Saturday evening starting shortly after six o'clock.

Swimming, Baseball — Summer Youth Recreation Program Attendance Higher

RUSHVILLE—The Middlesex Valley Central School is again in full operation and full sports are underway, but the 300 or more boys and girls who participated in the summer recreation program look back on it with pleasure and a feeling of accomplishment.

The summer youth recreation program was held five days a week from July 5 through August 11, and was open to all children in the MVCS district from second grade through high school. The staff in charge consisted of John Bell, director; William Ireland, Mrs. Claire Slack and Brian Bell, assistants.

The total attendance for the 30 day period was 4,069, an average of 136 daily, which is a sizable increase over last year. The program consisted of afternoon swimming instruction at Vine Valley Park on Canandaigua Lake, and baseball on Monday and Thursday evenings from 7 to 9 o'clock.

The swimmers were tested and put in one of four groups according to ability—non-swimmers, beginners, intermediates and advanced. During the summer almost half of the regular participants were able to advance to the next higher group. A few showed sufficient progress to advance two groups. On the last day of the program water races and a picnic were held.

The baseball program was at the school athletic field with an average attendance of 65 boys. Two teams of boys between 9 and 13 years of age were entered in the Seneca Rural League and participated in games against Gorham, Hall, Stanley and Reeds Corners. Both teams ended with a record of 5 games won and 5 lost and were tied for third place in the final standings.
