

33 De Sales Students at Career Day

Thirty-three students of De Sales High School attended the annual Career Day program for Ontario County High School students at Canandaigua Veterans Administration Hospital recently.

The local students were among 134 from the county attending the program.

The Health Career Day was sponsored by the Ontario County TB and Health Assn., the Heart Chapter, Medical Society Auxiliary and the VA Hospital.

The students were taken on a tour of the hospital by hospital personnel and visited indicated areas of interest.

Audience Lukewarm As Red Talks

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)—"Communism is not a conspiracy and communists are not conspirators," Dr. Herbert Aptheker, described as a leading member of the Communist Party in the United States, told a unenthusiastic audience at the State University at Buffalo.

Communists have always opposed and continue to oppose conspiracy he told about 600 students and faculty members Friday.

The appearance of Aptheker, director of the American Institute for Marxist Studies in New York City, culminated a two-year court battle.

He was invited to appear at the university in October 1962 as part of a panel representing varied political beliefs.

But only hours before his scheduled appearance, a State Supreme Court justice issued an order barring him from the program.

However, last June 4 the State Court of Appeals upheld an appellate court ruling that reversed the earlier decision stopping Aptheker's talk.

The Student Senate, which requested Aptheker to appear in 1962, then reissued its invitation.

Aptheker said, "Marxism belongs in the American dialogue. Marxists should not be outlawed. They should be listened to for the betterment of the country. Americans have an obligation to understand if not accept Marxism."

Mrs. Elizabeth White — Family Counseling Aide Attends U.S. Convention

In large cities and small hamlets in Canada and states along the eastern seaboard, people are in need of family agencies to help solve problems and to strengthen home life.

This fact was stressed at an annual meeting of the Family Service Association of America, held last week at the Biltmore Hotel in New York City.

Among the 450 social workers and board members attending from the middle and North Atlantic regions were Mrs. Elizabeth E. White, executive director of the Family Counseling Service of Ontario County, Inc., and Rev. Richard Mangelmann, vice president of the board of directors.

Mrs. White reported the keynote workshop concerned problems of mental health and family breakdown.

The luncheon speaker, Michael Harrington, author of "The Other America" forcefully presented the problems of poverty and increasing unemployment in the United States, suggesting some new approaches to the situation in terms of training and new types of jobs.

The Family Counseling Service of Ontario County, Inc., is located at 463 Exchange St. The agency offers professional assistance to people of all walks of life in helping to recognize and cope with family problems.

Felony Charge — Beer Mug Wielder Held In Assault

Alan Handrick Blair, 20, Johnson City, a sophomore at Hobart College, waived examination yesterday afternoon in city court on a charge of assault second degree, a felony, and was ordered held for the action of the grand jury.

Blair was committed to the Ontario County Jail and bail someone threw the contents of a beer mug in his face through the window of the car.

He stopped the car, got out and then was assaulted by Blair. Blair appeared with his attorney Raymond D. Gage in court at 4 p.m. yesterday. The police said that Snyder was a district attorney's office was represented by Det. Anthony L. Cecere.

Blair was informed of his rights but stated he would waive examination.

Following the case Mr. Cecere said that police would be asked to check anyone seen with a beer mug on the street. He would be stopped and questioned why he is carrying the mug. Steps would be taken to curtail the practice.

Judge Joseph G. Cato said that anyone who carries a beer mug on the street is courting legal disaster.

A beer mug can be a dangerous weapon under certain circumstances.

It was understood that it was formerly the custom of students to possess their own individual beer mugs and to carry them to parties. The custom waned but seems to be reviving somewhat now.

School Aide Fined \$25

LOCKPORT, N.Y. (AP) — A woman school superintendent, who exhibited her disapproval of a school referendum method by refusing to leave a voting booth, has been found guilty of disorderly conduct and fined \$25.

Mrs. Mabel Lee, a superintendent of 12 schools in a supervisory district in Niagara County, was found guilty Friday night by Justice of the Peace Gordon Hasely.

Mrs. Lee refused to leave a voting booth last spring during a referendum conducted by the Starpoint Central School to determine a site for school expansion.

Mrs. Lee maintained that the referendum did not give the voters a choice about expansion, but allowed them only an opportunity to select a site.

She refused to leave the booth when a deputy forcibly attempted to eject her. She left later voluntarily and was served with a warrant at her home.
