

Would-Be Burglars Frightened Away From Geneva Home

Mr. Tarantelli had been home at 7:30 p.m. when everything was in good order. He had gone to the home of Mrs. Tarantelli's whose husband was to have been held today.

The bedroom which had not been disturbed by the thieves contained a locked trunk and a dresser, neither of which were touched. A pocket containing a \$10 bill, on the dining room table was not touched.

\$60,000 Damage -- Chef Dies in Club 5-20 Fire

James Rutan, 55, chef at Club 5-20, died early Sunday as the result of a fire which completely gutted the interior of the club. Rutan died of asphyxiation from fire. A certificate of accidental death has been issued. Funeral arrangements are incomplete.

Mr. Rutan was apparently trapped as he was sleeping in his apartment above the night club. Fire is reported to have broken out in the kitchen from an oil stove, died early Sunday, causing damage amounting to \$60,000, partially covered by insurance.

Geneva First on Scene Firemen from Geneva's Hydrant Hose Company were summoned immediately and were the first on the scene. They summoned the Border City, Serven and Waterloo Fire Departments. Firemen stood by until 9 a. m. when the fire was under control. The 5-20 Club is owned by Stephen DeMeo, 58 E. North St. Geneva. Mr. DeMeo stated that

to replace the building and contents would cost not less than \$100,000.

In charge of the official investigation of the fire and subsequent fatality was Sgt. Fred Sargent, BCI. Waterloo State Police, assisted by Tprs. Glenn Prosser, R. V. Heller and Gary Boerner.

Only known living relative of James Rutan, who died in the fire, is a brother, Walter Rutan, last reported to be living in Asbury Park, N. J. State police are trying to locate him so that funeral arrangements may be made. Rutan's body was removed to the Genung Funeral Home, Waterloo.

It is reported that about 20 years ago a negro employee was burned to death at the same location, although the place was then under different management.

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Voting Heavy -- Veteran GOP Town Supervisor Wins Nomination by 2-1 Margin

By JOE COOKER In the largest turnout of Republican voters Saturday in the memory of Town of Geneva residents, a GOP caucus saw 19-year-old veteran Fayette Taylor renominated 2 to 1, for the post county supervisor and town board member.

He was opposed by a surprise candidate, Donald G. MacNaughton, farmer and charter and school bus operator. Final vote was 19 for Taylor and 4 for MacNaughton.

MacNaughton Friday publicly announced his opposition to Taylor. He lost a close contest two years ago for Justice of the Peace but was defeated by eight votes.

The town board contest apparently was a fight between Taylor, advocate of the "status quo" or leave things as they are and MacNaughton, who favored changes in view of current town problems, especially with reference to the tax question.
