Last Missing Flier May Still Be Alive

PLATTSBURGH, N. Y. — Forest rangers battle snow and zero temperatures today in an attempt to track the last of eight airmen still missing since Friday night, when the crew parachuted from its disabled jet bomber into the lonely Adirondack Mountains.

Seven airmen were found during the weekend.

The search for Staff Sgt. Pierre Maheux, 27, of Auburn, Maine—suspended Sunday night as a snowstorm approached—centered in rugged terrain near North Hudson, N.Y., where a parachute believed to be Maheux's was spotted.

The other airmen were found alive within a 20-mile radius of the search area. Some were injured in landing in trees, one severely.

Laotians Move To Oust Red Pholsena Rule

VIENTIANNE, Laos — A majority of the Laos Parliament today moved to oust the day-old pro-Communist government of Quinim Pholsena.

Assembly President Thio Samanth left Savannakhet for Luang Prabang to ask King Savang Vatthana to summon a special session, according to a dispatch from the AP correspondent at the rightist headquarters.

Rightist rebel deputies, holding 38 of 58 Assembly seats, stood ready to vote a quick death to the Quinim regime.

Savannakhet radio earlier claimed the Assembly already had voted to dissolve Quinim's government.

Quinim, member of information in the neutral regime who seized power in Vientiane when government leaders fled, declared defiantly today: "We will fight to the last bullet if they attack us."

Quinim indicated he would defy the assemblymen and possibly even King Vathana himself if the king comes out against the Vientiane regime.

The Soviet Union rushed arms and supplies by air to the leftists holding the capital, which is surrounded by right-wing pro-Western forces led by Gen. Phoumi Nosavan.

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Number of Jobs Also Establish New Mark

Four Million Jobless Set Post-Depression Record

WASHINGTON (AP) — Unemployment topped four million in November—the highest tide figure for the month since depression days of the 30s. The number at work was also a record.

The government reported today that job changes between October and November were mainly seasonal, but a further decline of 150,000 in factory employment. These are the November figures:

Employment — down by 300,000. The totals were 67,490,000 in October as compared with 67,192,000 in November.

Geneva Shivers On Coldest Day In 18 Years

If you thought it was cold here this weekend, you were right. The official 10 below zero and unofficial 15 below area readings were the coldest recorded here in the last 18 years.

Accompanying the sub-zero temperatures was a 2.3 inch snowfall which reminded residents that although winter is still officially nine days away, (3:27 p. m. Dec. 21) it is here for all intents and purposes as far as the weather is concerned.

The Geneva weather was one of the coldest in western and central New York.

Muffled-clad and shovel-wielding area residents were still shaking in and shaking off their boots this morning after a weekend that brought with it the first sub-zero weather and first real snowfall of the season.

In fact, say New York State Experiment Station officials, the weekend of Dec. 10th may just shatter a weather record or close to it. The Station weather bureau recorded 10 below yesterday morning, while some country residents reported 15 below early Sunday.

Past station tabulations show that on Dec. 29, 1933, the temperature dropped to 21 below and on Dec. 30, the same year to 12 below. Dec. 20, 1942, was the last time the mercury took a noteworthy dip and at that time, it fell to 18 below.

Station records registered a 2.3 inch weekend snowfall for Geneva. After finally reaching a maximum temperature of 19 above yesterday, thermometers in Geneva dropped again this morning to 13 above.

Elsewhere in the area, temperatures last night ranged from "down to zero" in Lyons to about one above in Waterloo. Evans Chemetics Plant officials reported that one above reading on their thermometer while the State Dept. of Public Works employees reported "about 10 above."

From light to blustery snows brought out plows and sanders the area over. The first big snow was not big enough to close schools or halt traffic.

Rusk Named Secy. of State, Adlai Appointed to U.N. Job

PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — son's appointment meant, therefore, that he was willing to serve today picked Dean Rusk, head of the Rockefeller Foundation, to be his secretary of state.

Kennedy also announced at a news-conference the appointment of Adlai Stevenson as ambassador to the United Nations.

And he named Rep. Chester Bowles, D-Conn., as undersecretary of state.

The three appointments were announced by the president-elect on the patio of his Atlantic shore home.

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Kennedy offered the U.N. ambassadorship to Stevenson, the 1952 and 1956 Democratic presidential nominee, last week. But Stevenson asked for time to think it over — apparently wanting to know first who would be secretary of state.

In response to a question, Kennedy said he met Rusk for the first time last week.

Rusk arrived at Kennedy's ocean front home Sunday evening, but there was no word to reporters that he was on hand until this morning.

Kennedy said he and Rusk had both talked by telephone to Stevenson and Bowles.

Asked whether Stevenson was satisfied with the selection of Rusk for the top foreign policy post, Kennedy replied he "could not say that the relationship is a satisfactory one to all concerned."

Kennedy said he plans to appoint another undersecretary of state — one who will have charge of economic affairs.

And he said he hopes to announce another Cabinet appointment by Wednesday.

Rusk's appointment is the first to one of what have been called the "big three" Cabinet posts. The others are secretary of the treasury and secretary of defense.

33-Mile Winds

At midmorning the temperature in New York was 15 degrees and the north winds were howling in gusts up to 35 miles an hour as snow continued to fall. Airports were closed and ferry boats crept across the harbor. The boats operated with skeleton crews, because many hands could not reach their jobs.

The storm, driven by high winds out of the Southwest, also battered New Jersey, Philadelphia, central Indiana, Baltimore, Kansas City, Boston and many other cities. At least 15 deaths were attributed to the storm over the weekend—four of them in Philadelphia.

The storm dumped as much as 15 inches of snow in the Philadelphia area, a foot in New York and 11 inches in New Jersey. Temperatures ranged from Sun-See BLIZZARD Page 5

San Antonio, Tex. (AP) — How much radiation the Discoverer XVIII satellite encountered on its 48 trips around the world is expected to be determined today when Air Force scientists open up the gold-plated capsule from the satellite containing human tissue, algae, bacteria, bread mold and radiation measuring devices called dosimeters.

Dr. George W. Crawford, a nuclear physicist at the School of Aviation Medicine at Brooks Air Force Base, said a more accurate estimate could be made by midweek.

A seven-man panel of scientists last week reported that study of the Discoverer XVIII capsule, which orbited the earth Nov. 12-14, encountered unexpected heavy radiation because of an explosion on the sun but that it could have carried a man safely through space.

The Discoverer XVIII capsule was snagged in a similar manner by a C119 after a parachute had slowed its descent over the Pacific Ocean 400 miles from Hawaii Saturday.

14 Killed

BUENOS AIRES (AP) — Fourteen persons were killed and 10 injured in three accidents during Argentina's Grand Prix stock car races Sunday. Most of the victims were struck by two cars which plunged off the track and into crowds of spectators.

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Compromise Sought — Ceylon to Offer U.N. Peace Plan for Congo

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Ceylon planned to lay a compromise peace plan for the Congo before the U.N. Security Council today.

Sir Claude Corea, the Ceylonese delegate, worked during the week-end in an attempt to find a middle ground for the Soviet bloc and West to deal jointly with the African crisis.

Diplomats connected with the 11-nation council said whatever resolution Corea might propose was the only hope for council action. They predicted that rival Soviet and Western resolutions introduced earlier would fail when put to the vote tonight or Tuesday.

The council was expected to reject the Soviet resolution—calling for the release of deposed Premier Patrice Lumumba, the disarming of Col. Joseph Mobutu's Congolese army and the withdrawal of all Belgian personnel from the Congo.

The Soviet Union was expected to veto the rival resolution sponsored by the United States, Britain, Italy and Argentina upholding human rights for all Congolese prisoners, expressing hope for Red Cross measures for their welfare and asking secretary-general Dag Hammarskjöld to continue efforts for law and order in the Congo.

Corea has already told the council he aimed to propose that (1) give Hammarskjöld more power to keep order, (2) direct the U.N. force in the Congo to disarm illegal private armies, (3) call for Belgian withdrawal, (4) seek the release of all imprisoned Congolese political leaders and (5) Fort Worth, clear. Geneva, N.Y. snow. Salt Lake City, clear. Honolulu, M. The Ceylonese delegate, after Indianapolis, cloudy. sounding out the rival factions, told a reporter he was "quite prepared to modify his perspective plan to get support.
