

# 'Give me 10's, 5's,' gunman orders woman

He walked in the door, his face partially masked and a gun in his hand.  
He pointed the gun at her and ordered:  
"Give me all the 10's and 5's in the cash register."  
She gave him the money and he left.

said the Geneva woman who found herself at pistol point here last night in an armed robbery at Noonan's Liquor Store on N. Genesee St.  
The woman, Loretta Mengel, was "minding the store" for a few minutes for the owner, Mrs. Geri Noonan, when the robbery occurred, according to police.  
How much the masked bandit actually got away with was something Mrs. Noonan wasn't sure of today, police said, but she figures "maybe about \$60."  
Mrs. Noonan told police she was away from the store making deliveries when the robber appeared on the scene. She said she was only gone about 20 minutes.  
The robbery logged on the police blotter at 8:01 p.m. immediately set off area wide police surveillance. Law enforcement agencies throughout the area were alerted and a teletype composite picture of the masked robber was sent out. Geneva police on the scene included Detective Francis D'Amico who is continuing investigation today.  
Police said the woman tending the store, Loretta Mengel, described the robber as a black male, about 25 years old, approximately 5'10" tall and about 160 pounds. She said he was wearing a dark ski mask, navy blue knit cap, blue levi short jacket and light colored pants.  
About this same time last year there was an attempted robbery at a Washington St. liquor store. Two knife-

wielding men were scared off, however, when the woman proprietor of the store was able to reach the door and yell for help.

## Police, city settle pay, but not work conditions

Geneva police have settled with the city for a nine per cent salary increase in 1975, but working conditions are still up in the air, says PBA (Policemen's Benevolent Association) president John Cataline.  
The PBA will continue negotiating working conditions with Police Chief Herman Garrow, according to Cataline, who says if problems arise in this area "we'll go to impasse again."  
Police in their 10-month long bartering with the city went to impasse twice before reaching agreement this week on the money part of their new '75 contract.  
The state Taylor Law governing salary contract bargaining permits separate negotiations on salary and working conditions, says Cataline with the promise that if working conditions can't be amicably ironed out, he will as PBA president "again go before City Council." Cataline in what was called a controversial and questionable

move, last April took the council floor to express what he claimed was considerable dissatisfaction on the part of police with the policy and administration of Chief Garrow, contract says a PBA spokesman can go before court.  
"They tried to shut me up," he says, "but in reviewing our contract it says a PBA spokesman can go before council anytime."  
An issue then and one which still has police and chief at bay with one another, according to Cataline, is rotation of shifts, a practice Garrow instituted when he became chief of the department in 1971.  
Negotiations will begin again Monday, says the PBA head, who advises that all his association wanted originally and would have been willing to settle for was a 20-year retirement plan. The department now has a 25-year plan.
