

Belichick, Brady and the NFL's Mount Rushmore

A decade ago the comparisons were to Bill Walsh and Peyton Manning.

Wednesday, February 13, 2019 S10 Then, a few years ago, the names thrown around were Vince Lombardi and Joe Montana.

Now, as of Feb. 4 of this year, there are no other names, at least not in the realm of pro football. There are no other faces carved on the NFL's Mount Rushmore. What the coach and quarterback duo Bill

Belichick and Tom Brady - who surprisingly aren't really good friends - have accomplished over 19 years together is unparalleled. The latest chapter in their achievement was written at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta, where the Patriots defeated the Los Angeles Rams, 13-3, in Super Bowl LIII.

So many surprising things happened that night: Defense won a championship. Brady and Rob Gronkowski paired up like the old days. And another team was outmaneuvered by Belichick.

That's six Super Bowl championships -- the same as the Pittsburgh Steelers, which had a 4-0 lead before this all started in New England.

To put that into perspective, after joining the NFL in 1971, the Patriots needed 27 seasons to win six playoff games, and that included five wins over two Super Bowl runs. Those 55 years and older know what it's like when the cupboard is bare in Foxborough.

The fact that Belichick and Brady accomplished their many feats when the NFL became "Dynastyproofed" before the turn

of the century -- with lousy draft choices, harder schedules, salary caps and social media -- is even more amazing. Franchises win and

disappear. It's simply expected. At least among 31 other NFL franchises.

Belichick had a private meeting with only six members of the media shortly after taking over football operations for the Patriots in January 2001. I'll never forget one thing he said that day: "I will never mortgage the future to win a championship.'

Why didn't he sign some of your personal favorites -people like Adam Vinatieri, Richard Seymour, Ty Law, Asante Samuel, Wes Welker, Agib Talib, Deion Branch and Danny Amendola -to new, expensive deals? Because they weren't worth it, at least in Belichick's eyes.

The coach pays for future performance, not past performance. His biggest move in his first job as a head coach in Cleveland was releasing a quarterback,

Bernie Kosar, who was a rare athlete who said he wanted to play for the Browns.

It was "heartless." It was also the right move. Kosar had a big contract at the time. He was a journeyman quarterback the rest of his career.

Brady has more than held up his end of this pairing. A rare breed himself, he drank the Belichick Kool-Aid, even when it might've been a little sour tasting the last 12 months. Belichick's magic elixir induces employees to choose winning over salary.

Look at Belichick's trusted assistants, including director of player personnel Nick Caserio, offensive coordinator Josh McDaniels and ex-defensive assistant Brian Flores, who left a day after Super Bowl LIII to take over the Miami Dolphins. All started

as "coffee delivery" boys and airport drivers for the team.

Running backs coach Ivan Fears has been here since 1991. Why is he still here?

"Because I love it here," said Fears. "I don't want to be any other place. This franchise is about winning. Isn't that what everybody wants?"

Apparently not.

Patriots owner Robert Kraft deserves his share of the credit too. He has given Belichick the resources and power to make all the calls without bureaucracy and channels of power. Kraft handed the keys to Belichick. The rest was history.

For nearly two decades, Belichick and Brady have figured it out. The only thing that matters is winning.

And they've done it better than anyone.

2. Field position

The New England Patriots not only beat the Los Angeles Rams, 13-3, in the lowest scoring Super Bowl ever. They crushed them. They never trailed. They owned the line of scrimmage. They made all of the big plays on offense and defense. Here we break down 10 reasons why the Patriots were the better team:


1. Couldn't cover Edelman

The Rams defense, including its defensive Wade Phillips, did an outstanding job keep the Patriots from blowing the game open. But the Patriots controlled the game, especially when it counted in the first half, and Julian Edelman was the Patriots' top weapon. The Rams took away the short passes to James White and long passes to Chris Hogan, but they had no answer for Edelman, who had 10 receptions for 141 yards en route to the MVP Award. They tried doubling him a few times, but it didn't work. He finished with eight first-down catches and had a catch for 13 yards on the

In last year's Super Bowl, the Patriots and Eagles combined for one punt. In Atlanta, there were 14 punts between the Pats and Rams. Why was that important? Three of the Patriots' five punts were downed inside the Rams' 10-yard line. With the Rams pinned down and having trouble moving the ball, it kept the Patriots offense near mid-field for most of the game. The Rams' average field position was the 17 vard line after those punts. "People don't like to talk field position. It's boring," said Patriots special teamer Matthew Slater, who downed two of those punts inside the 10. "To us, it's as important as anything. In tough, defensive games, you can win with field position."

3. Run, Sony, run

What a playoff run for Patriots rookie running back Sony Michel. In three games he rushed 71 times for 336 yards and six touchdowns. In the Super Bowl, it was 18 rushes for 96 yards and a touchdown.

Bill Belichick's top themes as coach are consistency and production. Michel checked both boxes. He was a tough, inside runner who

was among the top running backs in yards after being hit. When he rushed for 60 or more yards, the Patriots were undefeated (9-0).

4. Gronk's big play

Rob Gronkowski admitted during Super Bowl week that injuries caught up to

him this season. But, like Michel, he played his best football in January. While his production wasn't like "old Gronk," he was huge at the end of the last two games, including receptions on the final scoring drives in Kansas City (AFC title) and Atlanta (Super Bowl). He was the No. 2 target for Brady against the Rams (6 receptions, 87 yards), one of which was the biggest play of the game, a 29-yard goroute to the 2-yard line.

5. The other McCourty

Jason McCourty made the biggest play of the game on defense, breaking up a sure-touchdown pass from Jared Goff to Brandin Cooks in the back of the end zone. It would have put the Rams ahead 7-3 late in the third quarter, but Jason made up 20 yards in no time and barely broke it up. When we talk about this Super Bowl, this might be the play that the Rams remember most. Continued, Page S12

6. Blocking Donald

The Patriots have a history of shutting down great defensive linemen. Exhibit A is Houston Texans sensation J.J. Watt, who not only has never beaten the Patriots (0-7), he has only a half-sack against them. Aaron Donald, the reigning NFL Defensive Player of the Year, found himself double-teamed for most of the game. And he rarely got near Brady. He said going its game and you know it, in that he needed to play well for the Rams to win. It never happened. In the Rams' four losses this year, Donald didn't have a sack.

7. Defense won championship

Bill Belichick went back to his roots — defense. Belichick cut his teeth winning ugly football games. The Patriots defense had the Rams uncomfortable for the entire game. Where have we seen this before? Maybe a few hundred times. How about the Super Bowl XXXVI win over the

Greatest Team on Turf, the St. Louis Rams, who got two late TDs in a 20-17 loss to the Patriots? In this year's AFC Championship, the Patriots shutout the Chiefs in the first half, the only time that had happened this season. Against the Rams, the Patriots allowed 260 total yards to a team that had averaged 421.1 for the season.

8. Patience on offense

When your defense is on you can play close to the vest like the Patriots did against the Rams. The Patriots piled up a lot of yards (407) and never got frazzled or desperate despite it not being easy. The fact the Patriots were able to have so much balance (32 rushes, 33 passes) played into their "control." The Patriots finally had their moment when they needed to score, early in the fourth quarter, and they did.

9. Experience over inexperience

While the teams were like night and day when it came



to Super Bowl experience, the chasm was more evident on the sidelines. Belichick, 66, simply overwhelmed Rams coach Sean McVay, 33. McVay, who also runs the offense, had no feel for what the Patriots were doing on defense. His quarterback was getting hit all game and all he could be seen doing was consoling Goff. Experience really isn't a big deal on the field. The team that plays the best wins. But it mattered with the coaches. In fact, McVay noted it afterward, to his credit.

10. Adjustments on winning drive

The difference between the Patriots and the Rams, or really most teams, is how the Patriots scored their only touchdown. Offensive coordinator Josh McDaniels was upset that "nothing" was working so they drew up plays as the fourth quarter began, with Brady by his side. After a first down pass to Gronkowski, the Patriots ran three straight plays from the same formation (Rex Burkhead wide left; Gronk inside of him; and Edelman motioning from right to the left side, inside of Gronk). Brady threw to each player — Edelman, Burkhead and Gronk — the last of whom got the ball to the 2 yard line. It was the flexibility of this team that allowed the only easy drive of the game.

Super Bowl LIII MVP

Even early on, Belichick could see greatness in Julian Edelman

Jan. 10, 2010. It was arguably the low point of the Patriots' two-decade run of dominance.

After an up-and-down regular season, New England hosted the Baltimore Ravens in the AFC Wild Card round and got demolished. The Ravens led 24-0 by the end of the first quarter, and at no point in the 33-14 loss was there any reason to believe the Patriots had a shot at coming back. But something happened that day, something few noticed at the time and few remember even to this day. Julian Edelman, then a 23-year-old rookie play-North of Boston ing his first full season as a wide receiver, had perhaps the best game of his career to that point. The seventhround pick, who had been playing quarterback at Kent State barely a year earlier,

had six catches for 44 yards and New England's only two touchdowns on the day. It was a performance that

stuck with Bill Belichick. and one he came back to as Edelman was presented with the Super Bowl MVP award.

"He probably was our best player on the field,"

responsible for many of the Patriots dynasty, and he's been a crucial piece in helping New England capture three Super Bowl titles in the last five years.



He missed all of last year with a torn ACL, and then a four-game suspension for performance enhancing drug use sidelined him for the first month of this season. At age 32, there was good reason to wonder if Edelman would ever be the same player again.

But Edelman put those worries to rest quickly, matching the pergame production of his best seasons while re-establishing himself as Tom Brady's most trusted receiver.

Then, when the postseason began, Edelman took

his game to new heights once more.

In the Patriots' three play-That included several key third-down conversions late in the AFC Championship win over the Kansas City Chiefs, and then in Super Bowl LIII, he personally outgained the Rams 93-57 in the first half. He kept the offense moving even when everyone else struggled, and he earned Super Bowl MVP honors after finishing with 10 catches for 141 yards in the 13-3 win.

"I'm just so proud of him," Tom Brady said of his close friend after the game. "He's been an incredible player for this team in the playoffs and he just cemented himself, again, in the history of the NFL for what his accomplishments are."


"It's an incredible story,"

Belichick said Monday. "Coming back from the injury last year, you just see Julian in there every day competing against himself, trying to get better, trying to continue to rehab and regain the excellence at his position that he has come to do."

Once a converted quarterback with no clear future in the league, Edelman may now earn Hall of Fame consideration when all is said and done. With 115 catches for 1,412 yards in 18 postseason games, he has a postseason resume surpassed only by Jerry Rice. He's one of the few players in league history who can say they were an essential piece of one of the league's greatest dynasties.

And it all started on a cold, depressing afternoon in Foxborough nearly a decade ago.

Julian Edelman was named Super Bowl MVP, and he was deserving of the honor. But anyone who watched Super Bowl LIII could see the true Most Valuable Player for the Patriots was the defense.

Disrespected and dismissed early in the season, the Patriots put forth a championship effort, holding the high-powered Los Angeles Rams to three points. The win reflected a complete team effort, with everyone from the front seven to secondary doing their jobs to stymie the Rams and keep third-year quarterback Jared Goff on his toes.

But while no one player stood out, a strong case could be made for linebackers Dont'a Hightower and Kyle Van Noy as Super Bowl MVPs.

All game long, Hightower and Van Noy terrorized Goff while causing havoc in the Rams backfield. The two spent much of the game at or near the line of scrimmage. On a combined 45 pass-rush snaps, the two totaled six tackles, three sacks, six quarterback hits and nine pressures.

Hightower in particular was a menace to start the second half. Coming out of the break, he nearly intercepted Goff's first pass of the half, and on the next possession he hurried Goff into a bad throw while nearly picking up a safety on a third-and-6 play deep in LA territory to force a punt. GAME1 Houston at New England

Sunday, Sept. 9, 2018 Patriots 27, Texans 20

The skinny: After a turbulent off-season in which Tom Brady and Rob Gronkowski both skipped the team's voluntary workouts, the Patriots looked just like their old selves in a decisive season-opening win. Brady threw for 277 yards and three touchdowns, while the Texans' offense struggled as quarterback Deshaun Watson appeared rusty coming off an ACL injury that cut his first season as a starter short.

Key play: The tone was set early after Brady hit Gronkowski for a vintage 21-yard touchdown on the first drive of the game.

Quote: "I'm just glad to be here, glad to be part of this team, glad to be part of this organization," Gronkowski said after the game.

GAME 2 **New England at** Jacksonville Sunday, Sept. 16, 2018

Jaguars 31, Patriots 20 The skinny: In a rematch of last year's AFC Championship Game, the Jacksonville Jaguars outlasted the Patriots in a punishing heat approaching 100 degrees at field level. Jaguars

quarterback Blake Bortles had the best game of his career, throwing four touchdown passes — including three in the first half — while victimizing the Patriots with several key first-down rushes to extend drives.

Key play: Bortles' last touchdown was a 61-yarder to Dede Westbrook in the fourth quarter, which put the Jaguars ahead 31-13 and effectively sealed the win.

Quote: "We feel like if we're at the top of our game, we can't be beat," said All-Pro Jaguars cornerback Jalen Ramsey, whose team would go on to lose eight of its next nine games.

We all know the stars and the future Hall of Famers — Tom Brady, Rob Gronkowski, Julian Edelman, the guys like that. But winning Super Bowl LIII and bringing a sixth Lombardi Trophy home to Foxborough took a complete team effort, including key contributions from less heralded players. Here's a look a 10 unsung heroes of the 2018 New England Patriots season.

Kyle Van Noy, LB

It's hard to believe that just two years ago, the Patriots all but stole Kyle Van Noy from the Detroit Lions. New England acquired the talented linebacker as part of a pick swap prior to the

2016 trade deadline, and while the former secondrounder had underwhelmed to that point, he has become one of the most crucial parts of the Patriots defense ever since.

Van Noy's value has been on display all season, but at no point was it clearer than during the Super Bowl. He had a sack, three quarterback hits and five pressures on Rams QB Jared Goff, and he was solid in coverage too, allowing just one completion in zone coverage. He is also one of the more colorful personalities in the locker room, and after Sunday's win, he was not shy about letting everyone know how happy he was to have proven all of the doubters wrong.



Jason McCourty, CB

Devin and Jason McCourty are identical twins, but until this year their professional careers couldn't have been going any differently. Devin had

never missed the playoffs and almost always at least reached the AFC Championship game, while until this season Jason had never made the playoffs at all.

Last year he was part of a Cleveland Browns team that went 0-16, but this past offseason he was traded to the Patriots in a similar pick swap as the one that brought Kyle Van Noy to New England.

Not initially expected to be a key contributor, McCourty had a great season, consistently grading as one of the top cornerbacks in football, according to Pro Football Focus. He also made one of the key plays of the Super Bowl, recovering from halfway across the field to break up a sure

open Brandin Cooks. **Trey Flowers**, DE Trey Flowers isn't under-

rated or an "unsung hero" to anybody who knows football or can recognize a great defensive player. The man is an absolute stud and is going to get a huge new contract this offseason. But to the larger football public, he doesn't get as much respect as he deserves given that his sack totals aren't as gaudy as those of some of his pass rushing counterparts across the league.

But for the Patriots, Flowers is a perfect edge rusher. He's physical, talented and able to get to opposing quarterbacks with ease. He's also selfless and willing to make the less flashy plays to help the team win. Case in point, earlier this season he told reporters about a nightmare he had — not about failing to sack the quarterback but about failing to set the edge on a running play.

Patrick Chung, S

Patrick Chung embodies the phrase "Do Your Job." He has a specific job on the Patriots defense and does it just about better than anyone else in football. As a run-stopping safety, Chung does a lot of his work near the line of scrimmage. where he'll fill gaps, chase down runners and keep opposing ball carriers from getting free. But he's also solid in coverage and has made great strides since he was originally drafted by the Patriots in 2009.

Chung suffered a broken arm in the Super Bowl and also underwent a shoulder procedure to clean up an ailment that had been bothering him for weeks. While he will likely miss the team's offseason program, he is expected to be ready to go in time for training camp.

Joe Thuney, LG

The iron man of the offensive line, Joe Thuney played every single offensive snap for the Patriots this season, and dating back to his rookie year has played more than 99 percent of all of the team's snaps. He also became the first player in NFL history to start three consecutive Super Bowls in his first three years in the league. Against the Rams, he put forth a Herculean effort to help neutralize defensive tackle Aaron Donald, widely considered the best defensive player in football. Thuney, with occasional double-team help, held Donald to just two pressures, no sacks and two run stuffs.

David Andrews, C

An undrafted free agent, David Andrews has become one of the great success stories on an offensive line full of them. The University of Georgia product has now started in three consecutive Super Bowls, and this past season he was arguably the team's most reliable blocker, surrendering only one sack and four pressures while committing just two holding penalties all season.

Trent Brown, LT

Perhaps the most shrewd offseason acquisition of 2018, the Patriots acquired the gargantuan Trent Brown from San Francisco for a third-round pick, and the 6-foot-8, 380-pound behemoth proceeded to enjoy his best season as a pro. Filling in for longtime left tackle Nate Solder, Brown was a terror in the run blocking game, and he showed surprising quickness to keep up with the athletic pass rushers he was tasked with blocking in order to keep Tom Brady on his feet. Brown will most likely earn a big contract for his efforts this coming offseason.

Phillip Dorsett, WR

Few Patriots players faced the kind of adversity that Phillip Dorsett faced this season. During training camp, Dorsett was consistently one of New England's top wide receivers, fending off challenges from a revolving door of castoffs like Jordan Matthews, Kenny Britt and Eric Decker. Once the season began, he caught just about everything thrown his way, but following the midseason acquisition of Josh Gordon, his playing time all but dried up.

Dorsett hung in there, and after Gordon was suspended, he retook his spot in the lineup and continued to serve as a reliable pass catcher out wide for Brady. Surprisingly enough, Brady only threw two touchdown passes throughout the entire postseason, and both of those went to Dorsett.

Ryan Allen, P

Few coaches emphasize special teams and field position the way Bill Belichick does, and Ryan Allen has become a valuable weapon for New England in both of those areas. His skills were on full display in the Super Bowl, when Allen dropped three punts inside the Rams' 10-yard-line, all but dooming those drives as the ferocious New England defense forced quick three-and-outs, giving the Patriots great field position coming back the other way.

Albert McClellan, ST

Normally the class of the league, New England's special teams units were struggling by midseason. Kickoff and punt return coverage was an issue, so the Patriots decided to shake things up and bring in longtime Baltimore Ravens linebacker Albert McClellan. The veteran special teamer made an immediate impact, blocking two punts against the Dolphins. In the AFC **Divisional Round against** the Los Angeles Chargers, he recovered a muffed punt just before it went out of bounds, setting up another touchdown that made it 35-7 in the second quarter.



FOXBOROUGH ---Another one bites the dust. Monday morning it will sadly be a nice guy, this time New York Jets head coach Todd Bowles. Earlier this week, it was Miami Dolphins quarterback Ryan Tannehill. His head coach, Adam Gase, might join him in the free agent market by lunchtime. For almost two decades,

And then we have the Jets and Bowles. They don't have one player who could draw fans at an autograph show, nobody who can change a game.

Darnold is a big tease. He makes two or three Aaron Rodgers-like completions and the rest is ... whatever. He appears to have been stricken with AFC East Disease only four months into his career.

"Everyone starts the season thinking they have a chance and everything," said Gilmore. "Then the Patriots are like 10-2 or whatever. It's nice being on the other side. Honestly, though, the expectations here are higher than they are other places."

The Pats basically puminactive, and two of their three best wide receivers, Jermaine Kearse and Quincy Enunwa, were hurt.

It was a perfect remedy for Brady and the offense, which sorely needed a good game with a bye week ahead of them.

The run-first, pass-second offense was put on hold as Brady threw the ball often to seven different receivers. For a while on Sunday, we forgot they don't have a legitimate speed threat that every other team seems to have.

Precision was back. They were called for only four penalties. They didn't turn the ball over.

And the defense was sneaky tough again, allowing only 267 yards with those three measly points. And Kyle Van Noy scored on a 46-yard fumble return.

"Tom Brady finished? Right?" said McCown. "He figures it out. He always has. I know he's been with Bill (Belichick) for a long time, but he's had a lot of changing personnel over the years. But he always finds a way."

Dominating the AFC East has its privileges. Despite taking some lumps this fall, the Patriots finished 5-1 in the division, securing a ninth-straight, first-round bye as the No. 2 seed.

Winters said while Belichick and Brady are great, it's not just those two.

"They don't make mistakes. It's that simple," he said.

It sounds simple. Why can't any team in the AFC East emulate that?

Winters started smiling while walking away: "I wish I knew."

KANSAS CITY — Was it the best AFC Championship game ever?

Forty-eight points over the last 20 minutes. Tom Brady here. Patrick Mahomes there. Rinse and repeat. But there is no doubt about the team that won – or outlasted – the Kansas City Chiefs, 37-31, in overtime last night. The New England Patri-

ots are going to their ninth Super Bowl in 18 years. Here we go again. Two more weeks of buildup, as if we needed that.

While 50 percent doesn't cut it in a lot of things, that number – nine Super Bowls



in 18 years – is unfathomable in professional sports in the 21st century.

What did New Englanders do to deserve last night's result in overtime?

Remember, three months ago there was a Duck Boat parade for the Red Sox after their fourth World Series championship in 14 years. This Patriots run, though, was different.

A few weeks ago, your Patriots were old, slow and doubted. And to be honest with you, it was deserved. The pundits were having fun at the Patriots' expense. Brady was "in decline," Rob Gronkowski had a piano on his back, and Bill Belichick wasted a year of both.

The Patriots looked nothing like the team we've come to expect, which is near-perfection.

But doubting Batman and Robin – Bill Belichick and Tom Brady – is a losing proposition.

Beating the top-seeded Chiefs in the AFC Championship, at Arrowhead Stadium, might be one of the Top 10 accomplishments on Belichick's and Brady's unmatched resumes.

It took a dozen years and four tries to win a conference title outside

Place in History: The Patriots become one of only six franchises with four Super Bowls. Brady and coach Bill Belichick are the second QB-coach combo with four rings.

SUPER BOWL LI Feb. 5, 2017, at Houston

PATRIOTS 34, FALCONS 28 (OT) The Hero: Tom Brady or James White — take your pick. Brady got hot at the right time, completing 12

of 16 passes in the fourth quarter and overtime for 150 yards. White, like Brady, had been quiet before the comeback — the Pats trailed 28-3 late in the third quarter. White scored three touchdowns and added a two-point conversion, giving him 20 points, the most ever in a Super Bowl. Brady completed back-turned-MVP in Nick 43 of 62 passes for 466 yards. White finished 29 rushing yards, 14 receptions and 110 yards receiving.

The Game-Breaker: Julian

Edelman's incredible eventual game-tying touchdown drive, was battered and appeared to be an interception before he remarkably snatched the ball, in between two legs, just 2 inches from the turf.

Place in History: Brady and Belichick were the only player Derek Barnett. and coach to combine for five Super Bowls together.

SUPER BOWL LII

Feb., 4, 2018 at Minneapolis, Minn. **EAGLES 41, PATRIOTS 33**

The Zero: While this game will always be known as the "How-come-Malcolm-Butler-didn't-play?" game, it could also be known as the worst defensive performance in Super Bowl history. The Eagles only punted once. And they moved the ball way too easily with a backup quarter-Foles. The Patriots actually took the lead, 33-32, in the fourth quarter.

The Game Breaker: The Eagles were equally inept

on defense for 99 percent of the game. But there was one play with only 2:16 remaining in the game that all but ended the Patriots' and Brady's comeback hopes when defensive lineman Brandon Graham stripsacked Brady and it was recovered by defensive end

Place in history: It was another tough Super Bowl loss. Maybe it wasn't as brutal as the dual losses to the Giants, but it was close. Brady appeared to be leading the Patriots to another championship, in the final minute, only to have it stripped away. Literally.

SUPER BOWL LIII Feb. 3, 2019 at Atlanta PATRIOTS 13, RAMS 3

The Hero: In the end, Patriots slot receiver Julian Edelman was deemed the MVP (10 rec., 141 yards), but cases could be made for Sony Michel (18 rushes, 94 yards, 1 TD), Dont'a Hightower (2 sacks), Stephon Gilmore (1 int.), Kyle Van Noy (1 sack). In fact, the

entire Patriots defense was special. The Patriots had so many big performances when the lights were at their brightest, including head coach Bill Belichick.

The Game-Breaker: Tom Brady's 29-yard pass to a streaking Rob Gronkowski down the left side with three defenders around him changed the game. Brady dropped the ball in perfectly to Gronkowski, who went down to get it at the Rams 2-yard line. The game was tied at the time and the Patriots assumed control from there. Jason McCourty's breakup of a Brandin Cooks apparent reception, in the back of the end zone, kept the Rams from getting the lead in the third quarter. Another huge play.

Place in history: The Patriots earned their sixth Super Bowl title, tying the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most all-time in the Super Bowl era. As for Tom Brady and Bill Belichick, both separated themselves in terms of championships.





27 minutes: The length of time, still a Super Bowl record, that the Patriots and Panthers played in Super Bowl XXXVIII before either team scored. In the same game, the teams combined to score 37 points in the fourth quarter — the most ever in a single quarter of a Super Bowl.

44 yards: The passing yards attained by D. Harvey White, the first-ever Patriots quarterback, who signed in December 1959 and played just three games. He finished his season with three completions on seven attempts.

\$3.8 billion: The value of the New England Patriots, as estimated by Forbes Magazine, putting them at second in the NFL behind Dallas Cowboys (\$5 billion).





'Teddy Three Rings' thankful for Patriots, Belichick and Brady

Editor's Note: Ted Johnson played middle linebacker for the Patriots for 10 seasons, from 1995 through 2004. The Colorado University graduate was a second-round draft



pick by Bill Parcells. He not only helped the Patriots win three Super Bowls, he was named to the Patriots all '90s team. He now lives in the Boston area. He wrote this column

for this publication celebrating the 2018 Patriots season and Super Bowl championship.

All you need to know about my professional football career is my "nickname" in the Houston area: "Teddy Three Rings."

Honestly, I like it. It's got a nice "ring" to it. (Sorry about the bad pun!)

It's not as snazzy as, say, Tommy Six Rings, but I'll take it.


What can I say about your (and my) New England Patriots, fresh off another Super Bowl championship over a tough Los Angeles Rams team?

I'm a co-host of a sports talk radio show in Houston, where I spent a lot of time growing up, and I get asked about the Patriots and comparing the team to other great franchises. My answer: There isn't anything to compare it. Their success is unprecedented.

I believe, considering the financial constraints and the small windows most teams have, that this will never be duplicated. Not in my lifetime. Not in my kids' lifetimes. And not in my grandkids' — who aren't even born yet

— lifetimes.

We have to start referencing Tom Brady not with great players but with legendary athletes, like Michael Jordan and Muhammad Ali.

Look at the NFL now? There are some great quarterbacks. Who is in his category? Aaron Rodgers might be the closest, and he's not even close.

And then there is Bill Belichick.

What he's done over the last 18 seasons will never be touched again. I was there at the beginning, when he got there, in 2000. We were floundering after Bill Parcells, who drafted me in 1995, had righted the ship here in New England.

Bill (Belichick) took it to another level -- and then another level after that. His attention to detail is incredible. He also has an uncanny ability to predict what the other team is going to do. I've never seen or heard anything like it.

Now, we are in uncharted waters as a coach, remembering he is the guy in charge of the roster, too.

So what happens when you have the best quarterback of all time and the best coach of all time? You have the Patriots.

I laugh when I hear about which one has more to do with the success. They both do. Bill Belichick needs Tom Brady as much as Tom Brady needs Bill Belichick. And by that I mean unparalleled and unmatched success.

Bill may want to satisfy the itch of winning a Super Bowl with another quarterback, but I'm not sure if he'll ever get that chance. Nor should he.

Tom doesn't appear to be finished any time soon. And Tom knows there is not another team out there that can give him what the Patriots can give him, which is more Super Bowls. His best chance is to stay hitched to Bill's wagon.

I probably could have played another year or two. But I remembered thinking, "This is probably the right time to end it, with a Super Bowl ring," which was three rings in four years.

After the 2002 season, I'd considered leaving the Patriots. There were some issues I had with the organization, but in the end, I loved my teammates and I saw we would have more chances to win.

Did I predict back-to-back Super Bowls in 2003 and 2004? No.

I was lucky. I didn't have as big of a role as I did earlier in my career and lost a little money because of it, but I made the right decision for me.

Super Bowl Week in Atlanta brought back some great memories for me, especially from back in the Boston area.

Football is king back there. When I come by to visit, I can't believe the number of guys making money on the side doing advertisements and TV shows.

When I came back to the Boston area, I've had people offering to buy me a beer or pay for my dinner a lot. Fans still treat me like I'm on the team.

I guess, in a lot of ways, I still am.
