I am a certified peace officer in the State of Arizona, having completed the 22 Arizona Peace Officer Standards and Training (AZ POST) certification process. 23 3. I have been employed in law enforcement for 17 years, and I am familiar with 24 25 our departmental policies. 26 4. I have personal knowledge of the facts contained in this affidavit based upon 27 my own observations, as well as the review of the supplemental narrative I prepared in this 28 matter, and my department-issued body-worn camera (BWC) footage taken on April 19, 2023 (Axon Body 3 X6030819B, Parts 1 and 2).

- 5. At the time of this incident, I was employed as an Acting Sergeant with the Sahuarita Police Department. I have been employed with the Department for seven (7) years total.
- 6. On April 19, 2023 at 2120 hours I was on duty, in full uniform and driving a marked police vehicle. I responded to 1124 W. Golden Meadow Path reference a domestic violence call for service.
- 7. According to the call text, the witness heard an argument at the residence and possibly heard sounds of the argument escalating. The witness believed that only a male and female reside at the residence, they are new neighbors and the reporting party did not know their names or had any further information. The arguing has been going on for approximately 20 minutes.
- 8. I arrived at the location at approximately 9:27 p.m. and activated my body worn camera (BWC) which was later downloaded at the Sahuarita Police Department. I asked dispatch if the incident location was 1124 W. Golden Meadow Path and they confirmed it was. Ofc. Woodrow, who arrived at the same time, and I approached the residence, and something was heard falling inside the residence. This activity and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 1 at video time 00:30 to 01:00 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 21:28:36 to 21:29:06 (at the upper left of the video).
- 9. I rang the doorbell and a male occupant, later identified as Stephen Aiken, came to a window located adjacent to the front door, opened the blind and asked who it was. We identified as "Police" and I shined the flashlight on my uniform and badge. I informed Aiken that we received a call and Aiken stated that his 12-year-old grandson was at the hospital. It was difficult to hear Aiken, and I asked for him to step outside to speak with him. Aiken did not want to step outside and asked if we had a "warrant." This activity and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 1 at video time 01:00 to 01:57 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 21:29:06 to 21:30:02 (at the upper left of the video).

I asked who was in the residence and Aiken stated that he was here and

"everybody is fine." I told Aiken that I needed to speak with the occupants inside the

residence, and he stated that he wasn't going to answer any questions. Aiken further stated

that he would like for us (the police) "to leave the property and there is no problem here." He

stated that he is retired cop and he knows the rules. Aiken confirmed that there was some

yelling and crying earlier, but stated that it was because of his grandson's condition and

because of the "vacc.," which I took to means something about vaccinations. This activity

and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 1 at video time 01:57 to

02:57 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 21:30:02 to 21:31:02 (at the

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upper left of the video).

- 11. I told Aiken that I would feel better if I could speak with the occupants of the residence. Aiken said, "not without a warrant," no one's life is in danger and everyone is fine. I told Aiken that I did not know who else was inside the residence. I believed, at that time, that Mr. Aiken could possibly be the victim, with the suspect inside the residence telling him what to say. Aiken stated that he understood and there was no "probable cause." This activity and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 1 at video time 02:57 to 04:11 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 21:31:02 to 21:32:17
  - 12. I observed Aiken pick up a vacuum cleaner and I asked what had happened to it. Mr. Aiken said that it "fell over." I continued to speak with Aiken, and he continued to refuse to open the door to the residence. I told Aiken that I just needed to check the welfare of the residents and he stated that I needed "probable cause" and that "I'm not going to give it to you, everything is fine, there is no crime here, no one is in danger." He seemed to again attribute any prior activity at the house as shock or sadness associated with the grandson, and whether the grandson would make it through the night. It was apparent to me that Aiken was not unwilling to talk with me, just unwilling to answer questions about the number and condition of other persons in the residence. - 13. Aiken said he was going to bed and I told him I would be back in 5-10 minutes. Aiken stated that if I came back that he would call Internal Affairs and file a complaint. This activity and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 1 at video time 07:53 to 09:10 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 21:35:59 to 21:37:16 (at the upper left of the video).
- 14. Lt. Zamora and Sgt. Heath arrived, and I briefed them on Mr. Aiken's statements. Officer Dixon was directed to call the original reporting party, and after doing so said the witness advised that a female and male were heard yelling from the residence, "No!, No!" and "You will show me respect."
  - 15. Sgt Heath requested a RAM if needed for a forced entry into the residence.
- 16. After discussing the matter with law enforcement arriving at the scene, I returned to the front door to maintain a dialogue with Mr. Aiken. At the front door, Aiken showed his hands in the window. I asked if we could come in to talk to him and he said no, as there was no one hurt inside the residence, no one was in danger, and he was upset because of his grandson, attributing any yelling to being upset over the situation with the grandson. Aiken said this was "getting close to harassment," or words to that effect. I explained it was not harassment, and explained we had further conversations with the witness, who discussed a female yelling inside the residence earlier. I asked who else was inside the residence and he stated, "I'm not answering your questions sir." This activity and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 2 at video time 00:00 to 01:26 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 21:43:15 to 21:44:41 (at the upper left of the video).
- 17. I told Mr. Aiken that he had a beautiful house and he stated that he worked hard for it. I thanked him for his service of being a police officer and that I still needed to speak with the occupants of the residence. Aiken stated, "That's not happening." I asked Aiken "Is there anything that I could say or do so he may open the door and come outside to talk to us." Aiken continued to decline to open the front door and stated that he was going to bed. Aiken also said that if we could hear yelling, then we could come in the residence. I asked if there

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was anything that I could do, and Aiken told me to "write it up as it took place." This activity and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 2 at video time 01:26 to 04:51 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 21:44:41 to 21:48:05 (at the upper left of the video).

- 18. I again told Aiken that it was a nice house, and I did not want to have to break down the front door. Mr. Aiken continued to deny opening the front door and told me to "push it further." I explained to Aiken that I did not want to push it further and I just wanted to conduct a quick welfare check. I again reminded Aiken there was a report of a woman screaming at the residence, and that's why we were there. At one point, in talking about Aiken's prior police employment, Aiken claimed that he was shot in the back while on duty with a .25 caliber handgun during a domestic violence call. Aiken asked me to "take his word" for it that nothing had occurred; I said I could not. Aiken again said the situation made him very sad, and "if a neighbor heard me, I apologize," or words to that effect. Aiken continued to refuse entry into the residence. I further asked Aiken if it would be possible to just have an officer check inside, and he could pick the officer. Aiken asked that if police could talk to his wife on the phone, would the police go away. I informed Aiken, I needed to put "eyes on" her. Aiken eventually provided his wife's phone number. I told Aiken I "just needed to check up on her." I again asked if I could see her; or send an officer in. Aiken claimed his wife could not get out of bed, so Aiken offered to take the phone to her. At that point, Aiken closed the blinds, even though I asked him to keep them open. This activity and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 2 at video time 04:51 to 15:08 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 21:48:05 to 21:58:22 (at the upper left of the video).
- 19. After obtaining his wife's phone number, Mr. Aiken allowed officers to speak with his wife, later identified as Deborah Aiken, over the phone and through the window at the front door. By this time, approximately one half hour had elapsed without Aiken opening the door, summoning his wife, or allowing us to speak with his wife about what had happened or what was happening.

After the call, I continued to speak with Mr. Aiken through the front door. Mrs.

Aiken appeared in a full-sleeve house coat that covered most of her body. I repeatedly asked

Mrs. Aiken if she was willing to talk to me separately, away from her husband. I told her "I

have to check on her, and make sure everyone is okay," of words to that effect. I told her that

she may need to tell me something away from her husband who I pointed out, remained close-

by. I informed Mrs. Aiken that if she did not open the door, we (the police) would be required

to use force to open the door. Mr. Aiken then appeared with his wife and took charge of the

conversation. I asked Mrs. Aiken if she could come out and give me just thirty seconds of

her time. I informed Mrs. Aiken that we had a tool to open the door. I also told Mrs. Aiken

I was giving her a last warning. I offered her the opportunity to come outside, but she had to

do it now. Mr. Aiken continued to argue. The RAM was shown to the Aikens, who was

advised that officers were going to force entry. At that time, Mrs. Aiken was in front of the

glass panel and Mr. Aiken was behind her. The Aikens would not open the door. The

announcement "breach, breach, breach" was given, I stepped back, and forced entry was

made. This activity and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 2 at

video time 17:35 to 23:21 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 22:00:51 to

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22:06:36 (at the upper left of the video).

- 21. Mrs. Aiken was led outside where Lieutenant Zamora talked with her to explain why a forced entry was required, including information leading them to believe someone inside the residence had been hurt or was assaulted. This activity and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 2 at video time 23:21 to 27:33 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 22:06:36 to 22:10:49 (at the upper left of the video).
- 22. Mrs. Aiken did not want officers in her house, and it was explained that the home needed to be checked. This activity and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 2 at video time 27:33 to 28:00 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 22:10:49 to 22:11:15 (at the upper left of the video).
- 23. When officers discovered broken glass in various places in the house, they warned Mrs. Aiken to watch her feet. Mrs. Aiken stated the broken glass was the result of

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Mr. Aiken dropping a glass. When a loose or broken plastic piece was found on the ground, Mrs. Aiken could not provide any explanation. Mrs. Aiken explained that Mr. Aiken "always breaks stuff." Mrs. Aiken admitted that Mr. Aiken had been yelling earlier, but that it was about their daughter, Stephanie. According to Mrs. Aiken, Mr. Aiken was upset about the grandson being given the Covid vaccine. This activity and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 2 at video time 28:05 to 30:55 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 22:11:20 to 22:14:10 (at the upper left of the video).

- 24. I requested Green Valley Fire Department (GVFD) to respond, and Mrs. Aiken declined medical assistance. This activity and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 2 at video time 30:55 to 31:10 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 22:14:10 to 22:14:25 (at the upper left of the video).
- 25. Once inside the residence, and separated by sight and sound from Mr. Aiken, Deborah Aiken continued to deny that anything had happened. Despite her denials, I observed broken glass throughout the living room and the sectional couch was apart. When questioned, Mrs. Aiken explained that Mr. Aiken no longer has feeling in his fingers drops glasses all the time. She confirmed the yelling heard earlier, stating it was related to her daughter Stephanie, who had been married three times, and Mr. Aiken was upset because of his grandson getting the COVID 19 "vacc." Steve Aiken believed that the vaccine had caused myocarditis in the grandson's heart. Mrs. Aiken said Mr. Aiken was mad at Stephanie. He was yelling to Mrs. Aiken that he, Mr. Aiken, was mad at Stephanie. Mrs. Aiken admitted seeing that Mr. Aiken was bleeding from a cut, but could not explain what happened to him. When she lifted her sleeves up, there was no injury. Mrs. Aiken confirmed that Mr. Aiken said words to the effect of "you don't respect me," (as heard by the reporting party) but was referring to Stephanie. These activities and exchanges are contained on my body-worn camera footage, Part 2, at video time 32:39 to 38:52 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time 22:15:54 to 22:22:07 (at the upper left of the video) and again at video time 42:42 to 43:06, and clock time 22:25:57 to 22:26:21.

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- 26. Sgt. Heath and I explained to Mrs. Aiken why there was a need to speak to her separately to check her welfare, confirm her safety, and possibly provide aid to her or others based on the nature of the domestic violence report. This activity and exchange is contained on my body worn camera footage Part 2 at video time 43:28 to 45:55 (located at the bottom of the video), and clock time of 22:26:44 to 22:29:10 (at the upper left of the video).
- 27. After Mrs. Aiken's interview was completed, I was informed to clear, and I departed the scene.
- 28. During the course of this incident, Mr. Aiken made a continuous effort to prevent police from speaking to Mrs. Aiken in a secure location and away from Mr. Aiken, that would allow us to maximize the chances of receiving an accurate report of Mrs. Aiken's welfare, safety, and what had been taking place in the residence. I am aware through my own training and experience that victims of domestic violence are reluctant to speak honestly while in the presence, and sometimes under the control of the perpetrator. If forced to give their version of events in front of the perpetrator or with the perpetrator close by, victims will refrain from an honest account out of fear of reprisal once the police leave. My BWC shows repeated requests for Mr. Aiken to open the door, including my statements of "Is there anything I can say or do" to have Aiken open the front door so we could ensure everyone in the residence was "okay." Aiken refused to assist in this effort for a significant amount of time, and never agreed to my requests. When Mr. Aiken did summon Mrs. Aiken, he continued to do most of the talking, and remained with Mrs. Aiken, or in close proximity to Mrs. Aiken, when she spoke. Mr. Aiken continuously refused to open the door, or allowed for a separate interview of Mrs. Aiken. He did not allow her to open the door to speak with us. Mrs. Aiken would not open the door while Mr. Aiken was present, or nearby. I believed we were confronted with a situation where we needed to separate Mrs. Aiken from Mr. Aiken,

and determine who else was in the residence, check on welfare in this domestic violence call for service, and to render emergency aid to Mrs. Aiken, or others who might be in need of aid.
