#### ACROSS

- SITE not size. SITE is a comprehensive answer. If the "field" is "a great" SITE, "it would be" the right size.
- NIGHT not fight. "A hard" NIGHT of work or partying "is worth avoiding," but a pro boxer might welcome "a hard" fight if the prize money is considerable and he's feeling confident.
- PLACE not plane. Plane is too vague since it could be the airline she really likes or the type of aircraft "she favors." Her favorite PLACE makes a straightforward answer.
- KEEP not keen. KEEP "on" is more apt for the clue wording "despite rebuffs." Keen "on" implies the "woman" is beginning her quest for "a higher social status."
- MASTER not waster. The clue is too vague regarding the degree of wastage, since it could be argued that everyone is a waster to some extent. MASTER is a better choice.
- POLES not roles. "Certain" POLES "are opposite" in terms of their magnetic polarity. Actors

may play "opposite" each other, but that doesn't necessarily make the roles themselves "opposite."

15. HORSES not houses. The "owners" of HORSES might well become "sentimentally attached," but grammatically speaking, it's the occupants of the houses who develop a sentimental attachment.

16. MARRIED not harried. A MARRIED "woman" who works as well as manages a home can be said to be "doing two full-time jobs." Harried is too vague since there's no indication as to whether her anxious state of mind is temporary and will soon disappear. Also, it's not clear whether her agitation is related to her workload.

#### DOWN

- MILK not mill. Trying to sell a commodity such as MILK to a market that might be saturated could be a reason for a company's "financial woes." Strictly speaking, it's not the mill itself that suffers from too much "production," but whatever is manufactured there.
- STACK not stock. If the "hay" is still outside, "exposed to the elements," it can't really be considered stock (defined as: goods kept on business premises or warehouses). STACK is best.
- EXPRESS not empress. An empress would have been well-known nationwide, making "famous" superfluous. A "famous" means of transportation, such as the Orient EXPRESS or the Pony EXPRESS, makes a better answer.

4. LEAD not load. LEAD is apt. "Strain" usually occurs by trying to carry an increased load, as opposed to simply increasing a load.

6. MEAN not lean. If a boxer is lean, this is an obvious fact; it's not just that he's appears to be so. But a boxer who doesn't have a MEAN personality could give the impression of being so by his antics in the ring, for instance.

8. FEEL not peel. It's hardly a question of not damaging the "peach" "when you" peel it, since you're in the process of slicing it up and eating it anyway. If "you don't" want to "damage it" when buying it at a store, "you have to be careful" when you are handling and FEELING it.

12. SLED not shed. "Steeplly sloped terrain" might be difficult in terms of keeping control of a SLED. It would be a question of erecting the shed on the slope where "trouble" might arise.

13. RIVER not diver. "In certain circumstances," a RIVER "may plunge" "many feet." It's unnecessary to make reference to "certain circumstances" in regards to a diver.

15. HEM not hew. "You might have to" HEM an article of clothing because of an excessive "amount of" material. However, simply because a log is chopped (i.e., hewn) into smaller pieces doesn't mean those pieces aren't being put to good use in a fireplace, for instance.
