

Playmaker in waiting

Shane Sipes jumps up Saints' wide receiver depth chart

It's becoming the Saints wide receiving corps lore.

The story has been told before. The Carroll College Saints have recruited and implemented incredible athletes at wide receiver. But, at least in the last few seasons, injuries have taken a toll, leaving many to wonder what if?

This season is no exception.

Carroll entered the year with Connor Fohn tabbed to take another step forward after a stellar 2016 campaign that netted an all-conference award. Fohn, then a sophomore, had been rushed into duty as a freshman when injuries hampered the Saints in 2015. This season, Fohn hasn't been himself, nursing a hamstring injury that has all but robbed his explosive speed.

Likewise, Troy Arntson became a bigger fixture in the offense last season alongside Fohn. An injury to Kyle Griffith, which, after deliberation, prompted him to step away from football, meant more of a role for Arntson, who came up big several times last season.

Along the same line, Arntson has hardly been on the field for the Saints this year.

In steps Shane Sipes.

Sipes, a redshirt freshman from California, has jumped up the Saints' depth chart in recent weeks, highlighting the Saints' 34-3 win over MSU-Northern with an

85-yard touchdown on a kick return, a play that garnered Frontier Conference Special Teams Player of the Week recognition. He's been a threat in the receiving game, too. Sipes' on-field playing time has given him and quarterback Tanner Gustavsen a better rapport. And the athletic Sipes is taking advantage of his snaps.

"He's like a Connor Fohn as a wide receiver, but he's not quite as physical yet," Saints coach Mike Van Diest said.

The Saints knew they had an athletic playmaker in waiting. They've known they've had many athletes in

waiting. Their depth at wide receiver meant Sipes would have to be otherworldly or his cohorts would have to suffer injuries for him to see playing time at wide receiver this season. The latter, as it has played out in the past, happened.

The Saints penciled him in as a return specialist in spring ball and early in camp, but even against Montana Tech in the first week of the season, Sipes needed to be a pass-catcher.

"If we ever got Connor, him and Troy on the field at the same time it would be awesome," Van Diest said. "But I don't think that is going to happen."

Injuries slowed the Saints over the past few seasons. And while it's happening again, it's also giving Sipes

a trial by fire on the field. Sipes, so far, is developing nicely. He knows this opportunity means he gets the on-field experience he needs. Only so much can be learned through practice and film sessions. Game day brings about a different energy. No level of preparation could fully simulate that.

He, unlike many fans and people around the program, doesn't wonder about what the Saints' offense could have been with a healthy stable of receivers. He doesn't look at this iteration of the Saints' offense as lesser, or having lost value. Parts of the playbook have not been sacrificed to fit the personnel in his eyes. And just because playmakers are missing on the field, that doesn't mean they aren't having an impact.

"Everyone is really good at making sure of what everyone else is doing," Sipes said. "I noticed that especially this year, coming in and being one of the new guys and not knowing as much as the older guys. They did a good job."

The help has been welcomed.

Sipes' play is compounded by his second year of college. The difference between year one and year two at Carroll is like being a high schooler and entering a professional job. Roles and responsibilities shift both in the classroom and on the field. Schedules and time management are critical and the work load from being a business finance major have also progressed. It's no longer just about

practice and getting better within the confines of structured drills, but advancing outside of practice, working with position groups and studying the game more.

“It’s been a lot different than my first year,” Sipes said.

Sipes, who is from Newbury Park, came to Carroll after being aggressively recruited by the University of San Diego. San Diego pursued Sipes before the Saints caught wind of the 6-foot-2, 190-pound talent. Adams State, also, made an offer. And Division III schools around the Northwest recruited Sipes.

Carroll, the only NAIA school Sipes contacted, stood out.

Sipes filled out a questionnaire, landing it in Van Diest’s email inbox. Personally addressed and informed, Van Diest’s interest piqued as soon as he opened it. A phone call came shortly thereafter, which followed with a visit from Van Diest to the city near Los Angeles.

Sipes took a visit to Carroll, too, and after talking to players in the program, and pondering Carroll’s six national championships, he was sold.

“I fell in love with it,” he said. “I liked all the people and all the coaches up here. I liked the whole atmosphere, the whole small college feel.”

Sipes knew he needed to experience life outside of California. The pull of a football school with solid academics and a ski hill nearby to get his

snowboarding fix sweetened the deal. He’s the first in his family to play college football. His older sister stayed near home and is a senior at Cal-Lutheran University. His family supported his move up to Montana.

“They wanted me to go try new things and go pursue my football career,” Sipes said.

While he stood out in track as a high school student, Sipes knew he wanted to

focus solely on football at Carroll. His passion for the game was unlike his lukewarm interest in track. Sipes figured football would be time-intensive and didn’t want to marginalize his effort in multiple sports.

“After high school, I told myself I would just focus on football,” he said. “I didn’t have the passion for track like I did for football.”

Sipes figures it took a few

games to shake off his nerves when he started to get playing time this season. He also knew he needed those nerves and those experiences to get better. No non-game situation would prepare him to face the vaunted defenses of the Frontier Conference. Only nerves while lining up against Top 25 programs could really prepare him.

“For the most part, I passed that and I’m ready to move on and continue to move on and getting better at the position,” Sipes said. “We faced some really good teams. I feel like I’d be ready to play any team in the conference.”

As apt as Van Diest’s comparison, Sipes models his game after Fohn. Fohn mentors Sipes, and Sipes does everything he can to absorb the information. Each wide receiver meeting the two attend, Sipes does his best to sit near Fohn, quizzing the upperclassman every chance he gets.

“I want to model myself after him because of how great of a player he is, how great his work ethic is,” Sipes said. “He knows how to play football. He’s a great leader.”

Sipes will continue to benefit from Fohn and other upperclassmen’s tutelage. The receivers that were hurt and paved the way for him to see the field, will continue to pave the way for his on-field development.

“He’s got a chance to be very good,” Van Diest said. “It’s young in his career. It’s kind of what Connor Fohn went through when everybody else got hurt. Somebody steps up.”

“Shane is understanding that he’s important.”

Coyotes' loss of tight end could help Saints

When College of Idaho rolls into Helena Saturday, it will be a team that looks somewhat familiar from a season ago.

One major piece will be missing, however. Coyotes do-everything, three time all-conference tight end Marcus Lenhardt opted not to use his fourth year of eligibility. Lenhardt was a thorn in the Saints' side last season, catching 11 balls for 161 yards and two touchdowns as the Saints narrowly escaped Caldwell with a 28-25 win.

Lenhardt graduated with a 3.6 GPA, and plans to be married this spring. The 6-foot-4, 225-pound tight end was ready to move beyond football, which shocked many coaches around the Frontier. Some saw Lenhardt as a potential NFL player.

"I'm not used to losing arguments like that," COI coach Mike Moroski said, referencing his conversation about Lenhardt's departure. Moroski was caught by surprise when Lenhardt said he wouldn't be coming back to play football.

"I pride myself on being influential on young men's

lives," Moroski said. "I didn't quite influence Marcus in the right direction. We're really going to miss him. I appreciated how much respect many of the coaches had for Marcus."

The Lenhardt-loss Coyotes have got out to a slow start this season, similar to Carroll. COI enters the game with 1-4 record under fourth season coach Mike Moroski (13-25). The lone win came over the at-one-time-ranked Eastern Oregon Mountaineers, 28-20 on Sept. 16.

A more familiar face is back for the Coyotes this season, defensive back Nate Moore. Moore, who redshirted a year

at Carroll before transferring to College of Idaho, earned first team all-conference as a defensive back last season. This season, he's off to another torrid pace. Moore ranks No. 6 in the nation in passes defended per game (two) and No. 7 in the nation in tackles per game (11.2). He currently leads the Coyotes with 56 total tackles.

"He's a national quality individual," Moroski said.

His counterpart, Malik Whitfield, is currently ranked No. 1 in passes defended per game with 2.5 each contest. The pair are part

of COI's defense that gives up 30 points per game, and around 405 yards of offense – numbers, that are again, similar to Carroll's.

The Saints' defense entering the game gives up 31 points per game and 421 yards of offense.

On offense, the Coyotes will be trying to get as much out of quarterback Darius-James Peterson as possible. Peterson has assumed more of the quarterbacking duties in recent weeks, and helps power COI's option attack. He has 99 rushes for 396

yards this season and four touchdowns. He has also completed 71 of 135 passes for 884 yards, three touchdowns and 10 interceptions.

The Coyotes also lean on Mike Kirby a lot for rushing production. Kirby has rushed 49 times for 234 yards and three scores this season.

COI's leading receiver is Lenhardt's replacement, Keegan Crafton, who has 19 catches for 241 yards and a score.

College of Idaho is a team with a tendency to turn over the ball. In addition to Peterson's picks, the Coyotes have a league-high 18 turnovers, and a minus-six turnover margin. The Saints will hope that lends itself to turnovers, as Carroll has only registered three sacks and three interceptions through the season's first four games.

Carroll last weekend got on track in the second half against Southern Oregon

after trailing 35-0 at halftime. It's hard to say how much of that was Carroll figuring things out or the Raiders taking their foot off the gas. It lined up consistently with Carroll's three losses this season. In each of those, Carroll has failed to play an entire consistent game.

Carroll dominated MSU-Northern two weeks ago, but it's hard to say what the Saints will do on Saturday.

Mike Van Diest said the Saints could be shuffling the lineup a bit. The coach wanted to see a few different players getting in during rotations, and that could mean playing time adjustments on Saturday.

The Saints are still banged up on offense. Receivers Connor Fohn and Troy Arntson are not expected to be back in the lineup on Saturday against College of Idaho. Other receivers, Shane Sipes, Joe Farris, Paul Hart and Co. have filled in in their absence, as well as tight end Eric Dawson who has shown big-play capability at various points this season.

Sipes, 234 yards on 13 catches, and Dawson, 143 yards and a score on 13 catches, top the Saints' receiving charts.

Carroll will be focused on getting the ground game going. The Saints have given running back Major Ali and Ryan Walsh the majority of

the carries this season, and the backs have 5.4 and 4.4 yards per carry averages, respectively. Ali enters the game with 49 totes for 264 yards and three touchdowns, while Walsh has ran 45 times for 200 yards and a score. Walsh has been the best back in the passing attack,

hauling in seven catches for 75 yards and a team-high two receiving touchdowns.

The loss of Beough Meyer for the season hasn't helped the Saints' cause on that side of the ball. The Saints' tackle leaders are safety Tucker Johnson and inside linebacker David Anderson, who have 33 and 28 tackles respectively. Van Diest said he may adjust the linebacking rotation, putting transfer Alex Thomas and Chase Bowen on the field in more situations.

Carroll is 1-0 against College of Idaho at Nelson Stadium.

Carroll College Athletic Hall of Fame induction is Saturday

Six individuals and two teams will be inducted into the Carroll College Athletic Hall of Fame on Saturday. The induction brunch takes place at the Lower Campus Center, from 8:30 a.m. to 11 a.m.



They are:

■ **Andy Brown** (2001-05), a 6-foot-6 forward out of Helena High, ranks No. 18 on Carroll's career scoring list with 1,184 points. His senior year, he averaged 15.4 points and 7.4 rebounds, and was selected first-team All-Conference, Frontier Conference MVP, and 2005 NAIA second-team All-American.

In 2003, Brown set the school's season record with a 70.3 field goal percentage. As a junior he averaged 11.5 ppg and 4.9 ppg and was selected honorable mention All-Conference.

The Saints qualified for the NAIA national tournament in Kansas City in 2002-04-05, achieving Carroll's only national semifinals appearance in Brown's final season. In a 67-57 win over Saint Xavier in the quarterfinals, Brown netted a game-high 19 points and grabbed seven rebounds.

"On the court, it's obvious why Andy was our conference MVP; he's got

the biggest heart ... fighting for loose balls, getting big rebounds and taking care of the ball," Carroll coach Gary Turcott said after the game.

■ **Cassidy (Merrick) Sanders** (2002-05) helped lead the fledgling Saints women's soccer program into the NAIA Top 25 rankings while etching her name in Carroll's record books.

In her freshman year, Carroll qualified for its first regional tournament before making the regional finals the next year. In 2005, the Saints posted their highest national ranking (19) and qualified for their first NAIA national tourney.

A Helena High product, Merrick earned three All-Region selections and was a two-time NAIA honorable mention All-American. Merrick left the school with season and career assists records of 15 and 44, both of which still stand. She also tallied 14 goals, which ranks 16th on the school's all-time list.

■ **Tom McCormick** (1989-93) was a four-year starter, three-time all-conference player and a dominant force on two Frontier Conference championship football teams.

A 5-11, 170-pound defensive back, McCormick posted season highs of 57 solo tackles, 20 assisted tackles (three times), seven interceptions and 13 pass breakups. For his career, the Fallon, Nevada, native

amassed 176 solo tackles, 70 assists, 234 total tackles, 19 interceptions, 38 pass breakups and two fumble recoveries. McCormick's four picks in one game still stands as the school record.

The Saints captured Frontier titles in 1989-90. McCormick was second-team all-conference in 1990 and first-team all-Frontier his final two seasons.

■ **Jason Grovom** (1995-97) was a two-time all-conference quarterback for the Saints, earning second-team honors as a sophomore and first-team all-Frontier his senior year.

As a junior, the Capital High product helped Carroll to the NAIA semifinals. Against Rocky Mountain College his senior year, he ran for 235 yards and five touchdowns (with a long of 53 yards), tying the school record for most TDs in a game, shared by five others.

Grovom finished with a season-high of 1,550 yards passing and career totals of 3,524 yards, 214 completions and 18 touchdowns. He also posted season rushing bests of 1,162 yards and 15 TDs, with career totals of 3,032 yards and 38 TDs.

In 1997, Grovom set team total offense records of 441 yards (325 passing, 116 rushing) in a game, and a 264 yards average for a season. He finished with lifetime marks of 6,556 yards total offense, then No. 2 in school history, and a combined 54 touchdowns.

■ **Emili Woody** (2002-06) helped lead the Carroll women's basketball team to the program's first three NAIA championship qualifications, including a round of 16 appearance. A 5-10 forward/wing guard, Woody set the school's season (358) and career

(1,039) rebounding records, along with the career steals (301) mark.

The Summerville, Oregon, native was a three-time first-team All-Frontier selectee and was chosen third-team NAIA All-American her final two seasons (2005-06). In her junior year (2004-05), Woody posted 14.6 ppg and 10.3 rpg while leading the nation with 18 double-doubles.

As a junior, Woody helped Carroll to the Frontier regular-season and conference tournament championships. At the 2005 NAIA Championships in Kansas City, Carroll beat Mobile (Ala.) in the first round before losing to Vanguard (Calif.) to finish 29-7.

■ **Tiffany (Hopfauf) Hofer** (1993-96), was a four-time All-Conference volleyball player for the Saints, making first team her final three seasons. Her senior year, she was the 1996 Frontier co-MVP while earning NAIA honorable mention All-America status.

A 5-10 standout from Hardin High, Hopfauf helped lead Carroll volleyball to four league championships.

As a junior, she topped the Saints in kills (339), kills per game (3.05), serve receive (565 attempts, 94 percent), digs (339) and digs per game (3.05). Carroll went on to place fourth at the 1995 Northwest Regional tournament. Her final season, Hopfauf paced the Saints with kills (342), kills per game (3.14), service aces (51), serve receive (497 attempts, 93.6 percent), digs (373) and digs per game (3.42).

Hopfauf was twice elected team captain and her leadership was again called

upon when she was asked to stay on as an assistant coach.

■ **The 2004-05 Carroll men's basketball team** won 28 games and qualified for the NAIA championship tournament's Final Four. The Saints ended the regular season with a 12-game win streak, including a victory over NCAA Division I Idaho State, while capturing the regular-season Frontier Conference crown before placing third in the year-end tourney.

At the national tourney in Kansas City, the Saints beat Concordia (California), Oklahoma City and Saint Xavier (Illinois) in the quarterfinals. In the school's only appearance in the NAIA semifinals, the Saints lost to John Brown University (Arkansas).

Coach Gary Turcott's 2005 Saints were the first team in Frontier Conference history to reach the round of Fab Four.

■ **The 2007 Carroll College football team** earned the program's fifth NAIA national championship while giving up just 49 points for the entire 11-game regular season and 32 points in the playoffs en route to a 15-0 record.

In the regular-season finale, Carroll overcame a 14-0 halftime deficit to Montana Tech to edge the Orediggers 17-4. Coach Mike Van Diest's team than ran the table in the playoffs, beating Black Hills State, Morningside and St. Francis (Indiana) to reach the finals.

In the national championship against Sioux Falls, Carroll held off the Cougars 17-9. A photo of Carroll linebacker Brandon Day celebrating landed on the cover of Sports Illustrated.

Montana State-Northern Lights (1-4) at Eastern Oregon Mountaineers (1-3)

Previous games: The Mounties fell 62-14 to No. 5 Montana Tech two weeks ago before enjoying a bye week last week.

After relatively close contests through the season's first three games, the Mounties

were completely outclassed by the Orediggers, who the Mounties had rivaled just a season ago during their run into the NAIA playoffs. MSU-Northern enters the game a week after also being on a bye.

Prior to that, Northern got its first win of the season in non-conference play, traveling to and defeating Mayville State 43-29.

Last time the two met: Eastern Oregon went to Havre in 2016 and came away with a 52-31 win.

That was also an Eastern team that went 8-2 in the Frontier and still had quarterback Zach Bartlow.

No. 5 Montana Tech Orediggers (4-0) at Montana Western (2-3)

Previous games: Montana Tech enters the weekend rolling through the Frontier Conference. The Orediggers have outscored their opponents by a combined 114 points. The closest game Tech has endured came against Rocky Mountain. The Orediggers won that contest 34-28. Tech was on a bye last week. Two weeks ago Tech's 62-14 drubbing of Eastern Oregon shows the Orediggers have not lost a step this season. Montana Western started the season off with a 16-14 win over College

of Idaho, and then endured three consecutive losses (one non-conference loss to Weber State) before getting back on track two weeks ago against perennial bottom-feeder MSU-Northern, 61-7.

Last time the two met: The Bulldogs traveled to Butte in 2016 and left with a 35-20 loss. A lot of the pieces in that game are back in play for the Orediggers this season.

No. 8 Southern Oregon and Rocky Mountain College are both on byes this weekend. Next weekend, Southern Oregon visits Eastern Oregon and Rocky will travel to Montana-State Northern.


