We focus on the strengths of our families to start the healing and education process, asking "what's right with you," instead of "what's wrong with you." WILD ABOUT CATS RESCUE AND SANCTUARY Saving the lives of cats and kittens

Wild About Cats Rescue and Sanctuary (WACRS) is a nonprofit organization based near Clancy, Montana. We are 100% volunteer operated.

WACRS has saved the lives of hundreds of cats and kittens. We accept cats from owners that are moving or can no longer care for them. We also rescue cats that have been abandoned or abused. It is our goal to give them forever homes with owners who will love and care for them.

While the cats are in our care they are spayed/neutered and given their first shots. There is an adoption fee upon approved application.

If you are unable to care for or choose not to keep the cat you may return it because we have a lifetime commitment to our cats.

In addition to adopting cats as pets we also provide trap/spay and neuter/return (TNR) service for feral cats which includes rabies shots. We humanely trap colonies of feral cats and then return semi-feral cats available to those that seek to adopt barn cats.

served 178 children. A majority of these children are 0 to 5 years old. Each year during the holiday season, I'm always reminded of how compassionate our community is for the generous support you give to help the children in foster care. We would like to thank the Helena community for participating in Empty Stockings in previous years. Your donations make it possible for families in need to celebrate during the holidays.

There are nearly 4,000 Montana children in foster care who have experienced abuse or neglect. Instead of playing with neighbors and making happy family memories, they are attending court hearings, adjusting to new foster homes and transitioning to new schools. That is a heavy burden for a child to carry.

With a court-appointed special advocate (CASA) volunteer dedicated to their case, our community's most vulnerable children have someone by their side. Each volunteer is appointed by the judge to advocate for the child's best interest. They stay with each case until it is closed and the child is in a safe, permanent home.

Our volunteers work with legal and child welfare professionals, educators and service at egilmore@helenacasa.org.

This year to date, we have providers to ensure that judges have all the information they need to make the most well-informed decisions for each child. Our best-interest advocacy is driven by the guiding principle that children grow and develop best with their family of origin, if that can be safely achieved. Most of the children we work with are in foster care, but some are with their family of origin. We are "the eyes & the ears" of the court and are trained volunteer advocates who provide all activities necessary to promote the health, safety and welfare of children. CASA has 59 active volunteers and over 200 children in the system.

MONTANA LEARNING CENTER Providing scientific adventures for students

Because of you, more students than ever had scientific adventures at the Montana Learning Center in 2019. More than 325 youngsters experienced summer camps ranging in topics from Crime Scene Investigation to Space Quest at both the Center's unique lakeside environment and in Yellowstone National Park. It has also been a record year for our adult programs, with 80 teachers participating in 6 workshops. These science and math educators take their enthusiasm for what they learn to classrooms throughout Montana.

For the first time, campers and adults experienced the wonder of the night sky and learned about astronomy at the largest public telescope in Montana, located on our campus. Students observed the Moon, galaxies, nebulae, and star clusters, and they also had the opportunity to safely observe the sun. The new observatory is also open to families, groups, and individuals from the general public who are interested in exploring the universe.

Supporters like you help make the Montana Learning Center an ideal location for new programs. As you may know, we now have an exciting partnership with NASA. The Center was one of 14 institutions nationwide chosen as regional hubs for the Apollo 50th Next Giant Leap Student Challenge. Thirty high school

While in California in mid-August, the Moon Dancers toured the Griffith Observatory and the teams from each division had had a special tour of the NASA Jet that will shape their future.

Propulsion Laboratory, a facility that creates space rovers. Since many of them had never seen the Pacific Ocean, they were very excited to take a special trip to the coast and wade in the waves.

We have again been selected by NASA to host the ROADS on Mars Student Challenge for Montana. We expect to have a larger turnout than last year. The grand prize will be an all-expense paid trip to watch the Mars 2020 Rover launch into outer space from the Kennedy Space Center.

For summer 2020, we plan to expand our summer learning camps for kids from 20 camps to 26 camps over an eight-week period. We are currently looking to continuing offering camps like Montana Treasures and Explore the Universe, while introducing robotics camps to engage a wider audience.

The Friendship Center (TFC) provides safe shelter and a broad range of support services to victims of domestic and sexual violence and their families. All of our services are free, confidential and available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. This year, we are on track to serve more than 500 unique and known individuals at TFC, and many more through our anonymous hotline. We work with people who come to us in a time of great need. Our small but mighty staff provide a multitude of free and confidential services including group therapy, in-person crisis counseling and safety planning, assistance with Orders of Protection and court accompaniments, and accompanying victims of domestic and sexual violence to medical exams. Here at The Friendship Center, we do everything we can to help clients be safe, strong and independent, but it depends on community support to help provide many of the day-today necessities that families need. Many of the women living in our shelter are job hunting, have numerous appointments, children to take to school, and



and entertainment and we strive to ensure that events are free for our participants.

For some individuals PEERS Social Club events are the only outings where they can hang with friends they may rarely see, meet new friends, have the opportunity to experience their community (sporting events, museums, wildlife, camp), try new things (Karaoke, dancing, fashion shows) and enhance knowledge of ways they can make a difference in their community by volunteering. PEERS volunteers and 1 part-time staff welcome new participants and have created trusting relationships with regular participants which creates a sense of safety in any environment.

In future years we hope to expand our services to include SKILD (Skills and Knowledge for Individuals Living with Disabilities), a program to teach social, relational, and foundational education skills for adults with disabilities. Art has the ability to help individuals transcend and even transform their sense of self in the face of disease or physical discomfort. During art making, people often shift away from the presence of illness in their lives, momentarily forgetting that they are sick or disabled and awaken to experiences of departments within St. Peter's other than illness. Patients observe that they can often rise above illness, overcome pain, and get past fears and anxieties.

For the past year, the Holter and St. Peter's Health have partnered to create a program to bring the healing arts into the medical community. The Holter Healing Arts Program provides patients and their families the opportunity to experience art with hands-on projects as well as art displayed gallery-style throughout the hospital.

The program, which is free to all who want to use it, currently consists of three components: The Holter Art Cart, Maker Stations and a Mini Museum. The Art Cart is a mobile art studio that contains all of the supplies necessary for creating art in a variety of mediums.
