My Personal Historical Reflection of the Helena Kiwanis Club

Growing up in a Kiwanis family in the 1950-1970s in Helena I learned that Kiwanis was truly a service club that favored youth. The Helena club was chartered in 1921 and the business and professional gentlemen who formed it pursued noble goals set forth by Kiwanis International (KI) and conducted regular Monday meetings in the format much as we do today. They weren't excited that they were asked to "sing" at each meeting, yet they did. And, our club continues to sing "My Country Tis of Thee" at the start of our meetings after the Pledge of Allegiance and we continue to sing "Montana" at the conclusion of each meeting, demonstrating our love of country and our great state. This is followed by visitation time, committee announcements and an excellent program by a community member selected by our talented Program Committee.

The Helena Kiwanis in the early days served a business connections group and did purchase items for non-profits and led eventually into the service of youth. Particular beneficiaries were Shodair Hospital, the Deaconess home, 4-H, Scouting groups, the YMCA, the Salvation Army and eventually the "community chest", which evolved into the United Way.

Over the years many notorious Helena men served as members or officers in the local and state organization of Kiwanis. Among them C.R. Anderson, a school superintendent who was honored by a school naming, Governor Sam Ford, Sheriff Dave Middlemas, Justice John C. Harrison, Governor Tim Babcock, Justice James T. Harrison, Gen. Emil Eschenburg, Norman Winestine and John Delano.

Following the motto, "WE BUILD" and the objectives set forth on page 5 of this insert the Helena Kiwanis helped build three other clubs in the Helena and East Helena area. The Last Chance Kiwanis served the community for many years (1960searly 2000s) as did the East Helena Kiwanis Club (1960-1990s). The EH Kiwanis restored and relocated the historic Manlove cabin and built the picnic tables in the Main street and Kennedy Parks. Notorious for their pancake breakfasts at the EH Firehall their membership include practically every business owner in the city of East Helena as well as neighboring farmers such as Paul Kleffner. The Last Chance club also sponsored by Helena Kiwanis started the infamous Stampede Steak booth and ran it for decades till their club closed shop and some members melded into the Helena Kiwanis - which continued the tradition up until 2019 when the American Legion took over the booth. They also sponsored the Capital High school Key Club and many highway safety programs and other community support.

The services rendered by our Helena Kiwanis Club over the years are listed at Page 11 of this insert. They are many and varied with the primary emphasis on youth support. Kathy Ramirez, Helena Kiwanis Club's first woman member and first woman Club President writes about her and her family's

experiences in the K family. She and I share the family orientation as my father was an extremely active Kiwanian, who ran for and won State, then International offices serving as Governor of the Montana District and a Kiwanis International board Trustee. Our family attended a number of International Kiwanis conventions. And, we were fortunate to be nominated by the East Helena Kiwanis in 1960 and won the right to represent Montana at the "All American Family" national pageant in Fort Meyers, Florida.

My dad and Judge John C. Harrison decided it was important to start a Key club. They did so in 1966-67 at Helena Central High school where their two sons were to be seniors. (see Key Club article in this insert)

That organization gave myself and many others a tremendous dose of service and leadership training. The Key Club was all boys in the 60s and 70s and in the 80s admitted girls as well - prior to the time Kiwanis voted to include women membership. The experiences of attending Key club International conventions and watching the national leadership perform were inspiring. Now that opportunity and the opportunity to learn, lead and serve through Key Club is rightfully available to boys and girls and is much better for it.

The Helena Kiwanis continues to support and promote Key Club at Helena High School and hope to re-form the Capital High Key Club. A new Kiwanis club in Helena "Capital City Kiwanis" is the sponsoring club for the new East Helena High School Key Club and our club offers support to that club as well.

The long list of youth groups and non-profit organizations supported by Helena Kiwanis (see page 11) bear testament to the slogan "Serving the Children of the World". We are servants of our community's children and proud to be heavily involved in many useful projects with the school district and Helena Educational foundation.

Our membership is diverse, old and young and of many faiths, careers and professions. We are proud of our historic achievements and look forward to the future. As our current President Alvaro Freye so aptly states in his message our country needs more of the type of service Kiwanis provides.

It has been a privilege to serve a Centennial chairman and plan our 100 year banquet (held Sept. 20 at the Civic Center - see program on page 10 of this insert), provide service through five community work projects this year and develop this Independent Record insert which we hope will enlighten you about the Kiwanis organization and possibly tweak your interest enough to join us.

Kiwanis History

The first Kiwanis Club was organized in Detroit, Michigan. The group received a charter from the state of Michigan on January 21, 1915, and this is regarded as the birth date of Kiwanis.

The first clubs were organized to promote the exchange of business among the members. However, even before the Detroit club received it's state charter, the members were distributing Christmas baskets tot he poor. A lively debate ensued between those who supported community service as the Kiwanis mission and those who supported the exchange of business. By 1919, the service advocates won the debate.

Kiwanis became international with the organization of the Kiwanis Club of Hamilton, Ontario, Canada, in 1916. Kiwanis limited it's membership to the United States and Canada until 1962, when worldwide expansion was approved. Since then, Kiwanis has spread to all inhabited continents of the globe.

Kiwanis was defined as "an organization for men" in the constitution and adopted in 1924. In 1987, after several years of debate and growing support, women's membership received overwhelming approval.

Kiwanis Objectives

The six permanent *Objects of Kiwanis International* were approved by Kiwanis club delegates at the 1924 Convention in Denver, Colorado. Through the succeeding decades, they have remained unchanged.

To give primacy to the human and spiritual rather than to the material values of life.

To encourage the daily living of the Golden Rule in all human relationships.

To promote the adoption and the application of higher social, business and professional standards.

To develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive and serviceable citizenship.

To provide, through Kiwanis Clubs, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service and to build better communities.

To cooperate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism and goodwill.

First Woman Member and First Woman President of Helena Kiwanis - Kathy Ramirez

The International Kiwanis Convention, held in Washington D.C., the summer of 1987, was definitely one which changed the organization forever. At that convention the delegates voted to allow women to join Kiwanis. For me it meant an opportunity to continue a life-long involvement in the Kiwanis family. My father, O.J. Sova, was a Kiwanian in Columbia Falls, Montana. I joined Key Club in high school and fondly remember working many motor cross races and bingo at the Veterans Home. I join the Carroll College Circle K serving as Lt. Governor, Governor and then International Trustee. After graduating in May 1987, I became the first women to join the Helena Kiwanis Club in September of 1987. In 1993 I had the honor of serving as the first woman president of the Helena Kiwanis. I remember the mixed feelings of the club when I joined. Most were very welcoming. One older club member, Ernie Neath, would not talk to me for about a year. Once he figured out I wasn't coming in to change everything he started talking to me again.

At that time, Kiwanis was the largest, most active service club in town. Most community/business leaders were a member of the club. If you wanted to know what was happening in Helena you would join Kiwanis and never miss a Monday meeting. People like Clark Pyfer, John Delano, Steve Browning, General Emil Eschenburg, Joe Goldes, Hal Stearns, Ed Gilleran and so many others who continually worked to make this community a better place. They were pillars of this community and it was an

honor to serve with them.

I held many other roles in Kiwanis over the years including Lt. Governor, Circle K District Administrator and interim Key Club Co-Administrators with K'Lynn Harris. My husband John and I have six children. Three have served in Key Club. Elyse and Alex both served as Montana District Key Club Lt. Governors while Mariah served as President of the CHS Key Club. Our daughter Rosie recently joined the Carroll Circle K Club.

There are so many memories - Kiwanis steak booth at the fair, puppets & books for the library, coats and toys for Head Start, bell ringing, building playgrounds, painting Batch Fields, selling peanuts & apples, leadership training for the sponsored youth groups, Y-olympics...

But, most importantly is how Kiwanis has played a key role in supporting children and young adults of all ages – making a difference in their lives, letting them know someone cares and teaching them how to be servant leaders.

Happy Birthday Kiwanis! Thanks to all the incredible K-Family members for serving the children of the Helena community for 100 years and counting!



Helena Kiwanis Service to Community:

Over 100 years the Helena Kiwanis Club has logged thousands of hours of service, provided incredible amounts of financial assistance to schools and the community and offered hundreds of club members over the years to receive the reward of performing service and developing organizational and leadership skills in the process. 
Congratulations to the Kiwanis Club for 100 years of service to the Helena community and our children!
