



Family Homelessness

Family homelessness is a growing but often invisible crisis in Helena. Unlike the individuals we may see on street corners, families, especially those with young children-often hide their homelessness due to shame, stigma, and fear of CPS intervention. This makes the issue less visible but no less urgent.



shelter and supportive services surged during the COVID-19 pandemic and has continued

to rise. Since 2023, we have maintained a waitlist of 28 families, limited only by our capacity. In reality, the list should be twice that size. Once our shelter is finished, we aim to increase our capacity to provide services to a larger number of families in need. The high cost of housing in Montana and the severe shortage of affordable options have created a perfect storm, making it increasingly difficult for vulnerable families to find and maintain housing. Today, families remain in shelter much longer forward with dignity.



PRICKLY PEAR LAND TRUST

Thirty years ago, friends and neighbors gathered in a living room to discuss protecting the forest and trails behind Montana's Capitol. That shared vision of open space and public access has grown into a regional conservation organization protecting tens of thousands of acres of wildlife habitat, working lands, and community trails.

Helena's trail culture certainly didn't happen by accident. Decades of conservation and elbow grease built more than 80 miles of trails, a combined 2,000 acres of public open space, and now three new community parks: The Grove, Prickly Pear Park, and Tenmile Creek Park. From May to September this year, counters recorded more than 51,000 visits to PPLT parks, a clear sign these places are part of our daily lives. They're where we exercise, explore, learn, with landownand connect.

That connection starts young. Through our education program, PPLT partners with local schools to bring hundreds of students outside each year to learn about wildlife, habitat restoration, and stewardship. From planting cottonwoods along Sevenmile Creek to studying macroinvertebrates and stream health, students gain hands-on exfor conservation and the outdoors.
