

Staggered start leads to two sections

The only thing certain about the 2020 high school football season in Texas is that it's been uncertain.

Way back in March,

when Texas high schools were extending their spring breaks and then having their campuses



remain closed due to the coronavirus there was a big question floating around Texas high school football fans.

Will the football teams

get to play as scheduled

in the fall? Yes and no.

As of this writing, high school football is still on in Texas. But many teams have had to change their 2020 schedules and all have had adapt to new guidelines required by the University Interscholastic League to keep the players, coaches, trainers, fans and anybody else connected to the teams as safe as possible.

Competing teams won't end the game with the traditional handshakes and all the fans in the stands will have to wear masks.

The Class 4A, 3A, 2A and A teams are to kick off their seasons this weekend though a couple of the local teams have had a change in their schedules and

won't start for another week or so. Most of the teams have been practicing since Aug. 3. Their playoffs will begin on Nov. 12-14 with the state championships planned for Dec. 16-19.

The Class 5A and 6A teams, including the Greenville Lions and Royse City Bulldogs, don't start practicing until Sept. 7. Their seasons don't start until Sept. 24-26. Their playoffs are to begin on Dec. 24 or Dec. 26 and the state championships are planned for Jan. 11.

The Texas Association of Private and Parochial Schools also pushed back the start of practice and the season for teams like the Greenville Christian Eagles. The TAPPS teams aren't allowed to start practicing until Sept. 7, with

the first games allowed on Sept. 24 and the state championships scheduled for Dec. 11-12.

Because of the staggered start to the football season the *Herald-Banner* for the first time is featuring two high school football sections this fall. This first section will feature the Caddo Mills Foxes. Quinlan Ford Panthers. Commerce Tigers, Lone Oak Buffaloes, Boles Hornets, Celeste Blue Devils, Cumby Trojans, Wolfe City Wolves, Campbell Indians and Fannindel Falcons.

Another football section scheduled for September will feature the Greenville Lions, Royse City Bulldogs and Greenville Christian Eagles.

Several of the local teams, including Quinlan Ford, Cumby, Celeste and Wolfe City have changed their schedules. Ford lost one nondistrict opponent due to the pandemic and the Panthers are scheduled to play nine games in the regular season.

The Cumby ISD confirmed in a release that one student who was "lab-confirmed to have COVID-19 was present in the district in Cumby High School facilities on 08-07-2020." Individuals who were "determined to be in close contact with the infected individual" were contacted by telephone by the school nurse and were to remain off campus for two weeks. Thus the Trojans did not practice football for a couple of weeks and have called off several games, including those

involving Celeste and Wolfe City.


Will there be more changes ahead for Texas teams? Probably.

Will the football teams get to complete the playoff system and crown state champions, something the sports of soccer, golf, tennis, track and field, baseball and softball didn't get to do in the spring because of the pandemic? We'll see.

But Texans love their football and the state's student-athletes have shown an awful lot of resiliency through this pandemic. They are determined.

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Campbell's expecting a 'solid season'

They played an independent six-man schedule last season.

The Campbell Indians will return to district play this season with Jason Crow back as head coach. They'll be paired in District 10-A-I with 10-2 area finalist Union Hill, 7-2 Leverett's Chapel, 3-6 Fruitvale and 0-7 Savoy.

Campbell went 3-5 last season under Crow, who said he's "expecting a solid season."

The Indians return 12 lettermen off the 2019 team including offensive starters Walt Aaron, Zach Thomas and Trey Huffhines. Aaron is back to lead the blocking for Thomas and Huffhines, two backs.



Aaron, Thomas, Huffhines and sophomore Rafio Rios were starters on defense last season.

Crow lists the Indians' strengths as speed and youth.

To be successful the Indians need to "avoid injuries" and have "young players step into their roles smoothly."

How does District 10-A-I look to Crow?

"Union Hill opens as a top 10 team in the state," he said. "Leverett's Chapel and Fruitvale will be solid teams. Savoy is young and building."

As for dealing with the pandemic, "We were starting to build up our strength and conditioning before being shut down in March," said Crow. "We will have to work to build that back up when we return."

"Dave Campbell's Texas Football Magazine" picked the Indians to finish third in District 10-A-I behind Union Hill of Gilmer and Leverett's Chapel. Campbell was picked ahead of Fruitvale and Savoy.

WOLFE CITY — Winning is getting to be a habit with the Wolfe

City Wolves. The Wolves have won eight or more games in each of the past three football seasons under head coach Darren Anderson. They went 8-3 in 2019, 10-2 in 2018 and 2017 in 9-3 for an overall record of 27-8 during that time period and a winning percentage of .771.

Anderson said the Wolves worked hard this summer while following the guidelines set by the University Interscholastic League due to the coronavirus pandemic.

"It's really been the best summer we've had in terms of getting kids to work out," said Anderson. "I'm proud of the kids. They don't get caught up in all those things." Anderson said the

Wolves "are looking good" in practice.

"We've got 50 kids out, which we're excited about," he said. "We've got good depth in some key spots. We're excited about the kids we've got."

The Wolves also won 75 percent of their basketball games this past season, going 27-9 including a 100-50 bidistrict playoff victory over Boles.

The Wolves' track and field team's 4x400meter relay team finished fourth at the 2019 state meet and with all four members returning had very high hopes of moving up on the medal stand before the 2020 meet was called off due to the coronavirus pandemic.

Their recent success hasn't gone unnoticed. "Dave Campbell's Texas Football Magazine" ranked the Wolves No. 20 for Class 2A, Division I and also picked the Wolves to win the District 6-2A-I title

ahead of Rivercrest, Honey Grove, Alba-Golden, Cooper, Como-Pickton and Celeste.

Wolfe City lost some of its key players off last year's 8-3 district tri-champs, including prolific rusher Dylan Wilson and all-district defensive end Dayton Smith.

But Wolfe City still brings back six starters and eight defensive regulars from the 2019 team that outscored opponents by an average margin of 31-17. The Wolves ended up sharing the District 6-2A-I title with Honey Grove and Rivercrest.

Quarterback Amarien Jones mixed the run with the pass last season, running for 714 yards and passing for 1,018.

Three of the Wolves' top rushers return including Jaren Brummett, who dashed for 649 yards, Corey Vaughn (487) and Ben Cagle (326).



Hornets, Scribner look for success

Boles and second-year head coach Brad Scribner are hoping for more success on the football field this season.

Scribner took over at the helm of the Hornets after coaching as an assistant football coach at Caddo Mills, Lone Oak and Tom Bean, plus as a head basketball coach at Boles.

"We are young with a mixture," Scribner said before the start of last season, noting that the Hornets' roster included seven seniors.

The inexperience showed in spots the Hornets dropped two games in the win column to finish at 1-9.

They went 0-4 for the second straight season to trail the field in a tough District 6-A-I that included 11-2 Rivercrest, 10-2 Honey Grove, 8-3 Wolfe City and 4-7 Como-Pickton.

Boles has dropped down from Division I to II so the Hornets could find the going easier in District 9-2A-II. They'll have to contend with 8-4 Cumby, 5-6 Clarksville, 4-7 James Bowie, 3-7

Maud and 7-5 Detroit. Senior quarterback Santiago Sanjines has two seasons under his



"The kids are really buying into it," said Scribner.

The Lone Oak Buffaloes are ready to take the field again in 2020, just like they did in 2019.

The 2019 football season didn't go as planned for the Lone Oak Buffaloes.

Hit hard by injuries, they started off the season 1-6.

New head football coach Vince Taylor then got reassigned mid-season to another position in the school district.

Varsity assistant coach Larry McFarlin was then promoted to become the acting head coach and finished out the season with the Buffaloes.

Lone Oak wound up the 2019 campaign with a 2-8 overall record and a 1-5 mark in District 5-3A-I to finish in sixth place.

McFarlin, who previously was a head coach at Howe and Bonham, returns as the Buffaloes' head coach along with three starters on offense and nine on defense as they hope to improve in the win column and District 7-3A-II standings

McFarlin said he's expecting an "outstand-

Not so with the Fannindel Falcons in the sport of six-man. The Falcons will only have to replace two starters



on offense and defense lost to graduation. Two of the Fannin-

del returnees are big

playmakers: running back Contreal Judkins and quarterback Jabari Dowdy. Judkins led the Falcon rushers last season. Dowdy was a threat running and passing.

Branden Dillehay and Tahj McGee give the Falcons two experienced blockers up front.

Back to lead the de-

fense are end Jawaylon Shaw and defensive back Ivan Lopez.

Fannindel went 3-6 last season, reaching the playoffs after finishing second to Forestburg in a three-team district.

The Falcons will be paired again in District 10-A-II with Forestburg and Gold-Burg plus a traditionally strong

Trinidad team that went 4-7 and also made the playoffs last season.

The Falcons have a reach tradition that includes a state championship in basketball in 1989 and state semifinal appearances in basketball in 1988 and football.

"Dave Campbell's Texas Football Magazine" picked the Falcons to finish second in 10-A-II behind Trinidad and ahead of Forestburg and Gold-Burg.

Caddo Mills Foxes

No. 24 Foxes expect to be 'improved'

CADDO MILLS — An 8-3 record in 2019 and the return of quarterback Tyler Townley have helped the Caddo Mills Foxes earn a preseason state ranking.

The Foxes, who were second to Sunnyvale in District 5-4A-II last year with a 4-1 record, claimed a No. 24 state ranking in "Dave Campbell's Texas Football Magazine."

"We fully expect to be improved over last year's team," said Kodi Crane, who returns for his second season as the Foxes' head coach.

Crane said the team's strength is a "large senior class that has a lot of Friday night experience."

The head of the class is Townley, the senior quarterback who was 163-of-246 passing last season for 2,647 yards and 24 touchdowns and ran for 737 and 15 scores

on 109 carries. Senior running back Savion Neal is also back after rushing for a teamhigh 1,084 yards and 13 TDs on 134 carries. Neal so caught six passes for 60 yards and another

score. The Foxes' top two receivers are back in Gavyn Beane (52-

782 yards, 7 TDs) and Cayden Davis (26-520, 5 TDs.).

Jason Thomason appeared in nine games for the Foxes in 2019, going 5-of-8 passing for 71 yards and a TD and rushing for 54 yards on just six carries.

Jake Tumey, another savvy veteran, caught 18 passes for 246 yards and three TDs.

Three starting linemen give the Foxes even more veteran experience: tackles Jacob Hall (6-1, 245) and Jackson

Jacobs (6-2, 230) and center Dylan Sides (6-0, 251).

Linebacker Braydon Brewer, end Bryan Jones and stong safety Angus Aldridge will again lead the Foxes' defense. Brewer was one of the Foxes' leading tacklers last season while Jones was a force rushing the quarterback and Aldridge led in interceptions.

Konner Pounds and Thomason also return at safety, while tackle Sean Newark (5-9, 210)

and end Sammy Bustillos (5-8, 170) are also key defenders.

Crane predicts that the Foxes' new District 6-4A-II will be stronger than the last district. "Sunnyvale was

last year's champion, Community is bringing back most of their starters, Wills Point was a playoff team last year, Ford is dropping down from 4A D1 and Farmersville will be much improved," he said.

Crane said the Foxes will need to "stay health

and improve through a really tough non-district schedule" if they are to be successful.

They're scheduled to open on Aug. 28 against former state champion Gainesville, then will face Bullard, Canton, Waxahachie Life and Aubrey for homecoming before opening district on Oct. 9 against the favorite: Sunnyvale.

Nine of the Foxes' 10

opponents made the playoffs last year led by 12-1 Sunnyvale. The Foxes' opponents went 54-58 last season for a .482 winning percentage.

As for the coronavirus pandemic, "It has affected all of our players differently, but since summer workouts have began all of them have come back hungry ready to go," said Crane.



Ouinlan Ford faces new challenges

QUINLAN — Dropping down from Division I to II in Class 4A should help the Quinlan Ford Panthers this season.

That's the word from Panther head coach Todd Wallace.

"We are excited to drop down in division," said Wallace. "Our skill kids and linebackers are the best we have had at least since 2012.

"We don't have much size. We don't have many numbers."

Though the Panthers went 4-6 last season they didn't win a game in the tough District 9-4A-I, finishing behind Crandall, Midlothian Heritage, Life Waxahachie, Athens and Mabank. All five of those teams finished with winning records led by Crandall at 10-3.

Now the Panthers will be paired in District 6-4A-II against the likes of Sunnyvale, Caddo Mills, Wills Point, Farmersville and Community. Still no easy district schedule.

"Sunnyvale is (the) clear favorite," said Wallace. "I feel everyone else will be very close and competitive."

Quarterback Eli Chambers, a 6-2, 210-pound senior, is back to lead the Ford offense after

throwing for 671 yards and six touchdowns last season while rushing for 253 yards and three more scores.

Chambers' numbers would have been higher but he missed three games due to injuries.

Chambers is a fouryear starter who has also played running back. He was a freshman on the varsity at running back, then he played both running back and quarterback as a sophomore. Last year he focused on quarterback.

"Our goal is to win district," said Chambers. "Make the playoffs and go as far as possible."

Chambers said the

Panthers are a close team.

"We're probably the closest team I've been on," he said.

"I love being with the team. I love competition. I think it (football) shows the ultimate amount of toughness."

Running back Marquizs Graham also returns to the offense along with all-district tight end Colt Cooper. Graham ran for 355 yards and three TDs. Cooper averaged 32 yards per catch, scoring on four receptions.

Cooper has verbally committed to play football at Abilene Christian. He said he's being recruited as a tight end.

"I want to win district and get a gold ball for our school this year," he said. "Win a playoff game."

Cooper agreed with Chambers about how close the team is.

"We're as close as I've ever been for a team in my entire life," he said.





New head coach Boles to direct Cumby Trojans

CUMBY — New head coach Charles Boles wants to continue the recent success of the Cumby Trojans.

Boles, who previously coached at Miles in West Texas, is taking over a Cumby program that made five playoff trips in seven seasons under previous head

coach Tom Dracos, who is now an assistant at Class 4A Cuero. Dracos coached the 2019 Trojans (8-4), 2018 Trojans 5-6), 2017 Trojans (7-5), 2016 Trojans (9-3) and 2014 Trojans (6-5) to playoff trips. The 2019, 2017 and 2016 Trojans were bi-district champions.

"We hope to have a successful season." said Boles, who guided Miles to back to back 7-4 seasons.

Miles has also coached at Lindsay, where he guided the Knights to a 45-23 record in six seasons, going 10-3 in 2017 and advancing to the third round of the playoffs.

The Trojans return five starters on offense and five on defense from the 2019 team that whipped James Bowie

50-28 in the bi-district round of the playoffs before falling 54-22 to Grapeland at area.

Boles listed the Trojans' strength as "returning starters at skill positions."

Though all-district quarterback Cameron Scott graduated, the Trojans return junior running back Jacob DeMidio on offense, plus junior wide receiver Fabian Camargo and senior wide receiver Antonio Arellano.

Center Jacob Groves (5-10, 185, Jr.) and junior guard Tristan Arbogast (5-10, 205, Sr.) are two more holdovers on the offensive side though Boles said the Trojans must overcome and "inexperience O-line" to be successful.

Cumby's defense can count on veteran linebackers Logan Butler and Colten Lindsey, plus end Aiden Wenrick (6-1, 205, So.), safety Justin DeMidio and Emerson Umana at defensive back.

Sophomore quarter-

back Trenton Wood is another returning letterman.

Boles said the Trojans need to be "injury free" if they are to reach their goals.

He said Clarksville and Detroit are two teams to watch in Cumby's new District 9-2A-II. "Dave Campbell's Texas Football" picked Cumby to win the district, followed by Clarksville, James Bowie, Maud, Detroit and Boles.

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Celeste Blue Devils

Celeste hopes to rebound

CELESTE — After going 10-2 and 11-2 in backto-back football seasons, the Celeste Blue Devils dropped back in the win column in 2019.

They finished at 2-8 for the season and 1-3 in District 5-2A-II play, missing out on a trip to the playoffs.

"The Blue Devils got hit hard," Celeste coach Demetrius Rector said before the 2019 season started, talking about the 16 talented seniors they had lost to graduation.

That 11-2 team had won bi-district and area titles before falling 61-56 to San Saba in a threeovertime classic in the third round.

The 2019 Blue Devils lost their leading passer (Jalen Rector), leading rusher (Kaden Douglas) and three of their top receivers, Jace Givens, Isaiah Buckley and Truitt Murphy to graduation.

Those holes were so big to fill that last year's Blue Devils averaged only 13.6 points and 217.3 yards per game after averaging 40.6 points and 402.6 yards per game in 2018.

But the good news for the 2020 Blue Devils is

that this year's team won't be so inexperienced. They're returning all but one starter on offense and 10 on defense.

"We're energized," Rector about the Blue Devils' practices in preparation for the 2020 season. "Obviously what we've been going through, they've been biting at the bit to get back to some normalcy." Quarterback Thomas Powell returns to lead the offense. Powell was 48-of-125 passing for 731 yards and a pair of touchdowns last season. He also led the Blue Devil rushers with 595 yards and six TDs on

131 carries. "He does a lot of the kicking for us," said Rector.

Celeste's secondleading rusher, Bryce Jurca, graduated but they return their thirdleading rusher Damon Crook, who ran for 250 yards and three TDs on 42 carries though missing seven games.

Their top receiver in 2019, Malachi Buckley, was a senior but they return Ky Jackson (11 catches, 135 yards), Tyson Fielden (10-230 yards) and Holden Lamm (10-39, 1 TD).

The Blue Devils' leading tackler is back on defense: linebacker Thadeus Clark, who averaged 10.5 tackles per game, including 6.9 solos.

Defensive back Seth Buckley recorded 46 stops in 2019, including 28 solos.

Linebacker Brody Pryor rang up 40 tackles Lamm recorded 32 stops and intercepted to passes.

Fielden managed 21 tackles and returned an interception 44 yards for a touchdown. Powell, who booted 16-

of-17 extra-point conversions, will lead Celeste's special teams.

Celeste finished behind powerhouse Valley View, Tom Bean and Collinsville in the District 5-2A-I standings last season though beating Tom Bean.

Celeste will have to contend with 8-3 Wolfe
