they lead by example and hold our room accountable,” Whitley said. “We have a lot of kids that are still very new to the sport, and I believe they over achieve every day.

Winning tradition alive and well for Owl girls

OSCODA – For quite some time now, the Oscoda girls basketball team has pretty much been a premier program in the area. The Lady Owls have won seven straight North Star League Big Dipper championships, and while they’ll need to rely on some new faces this winter, they still feel pretty good about the lineup that they’ll be rolling out.

“The seven that we have will be good together but it may take some time to get our sophomores up to speed and knock the rust off Lillian Piotrowski,” third year head coach Scott Lueck said. “Practices are great, we just have to figure out how much we need to get in early on. We have only (handful of) games before Christmas break so that will give us some extra practice time.”

Returning to the team will be seniors Luella Whipkey (guard, 672 career points) and Emma Michaud (guard); and sophomores Ava Taylor, Lindy Kenyon, Isla Merdzinski and Aydrria Kubik.

“This will be Luella’s fourth year as a starter on varsity, she has been all-conference multiple times. She is a very good defensive player and is close to being the school record holder in career steals,” Lueck said.

“Emma will be a third year starter at point guard for us. She was first team all-conference last year. She is also a very good defensive player and sets the tone for us on defense. She plays her role as point guard as good as we could hope for.

Ava, Lindy, Isla and Aydrria all earned varsity letters as freshmen playing as JV players that played the occasional fifth quarter. All are on varsity this year and will be major contributors.

Senior Lillian Piotrowski will play her first year of varsity; she did not play as a junior, but was on the JV team as a freshman and sophomore.

“We are very excited to have her back, she is a hard worker that understands the game and will be another fierce defender

that we love,” Lueck said. “We will have four sophomores on varsity and a base roster of seven players. We will have some JV players dress for fifth quarter availability. Ava, Lindy, Isla and Aydrria are all very impressive early in the season.

“We did get some practices and scrimmages back in June and helped them immensely. They have also had very good off season attendance with our workouts and have shown significant improvement.”

Of course, Whipkey and Micahud have been major pieces to the Lady Owls’ success in their time on varsity. They’ll probably be leaned on even harder this year to lead the way.

“(Those two) are our captains and will certainly lead us with the way they play,” Lueck said. “We have been blessed these past two years with good players but also in that they play hard. Whipkey and Michaud are great leaders by example with their effort and discipline. If our younger girls emulate their effort we will have a very good season.”

Oscoda hosted Standish-Sterling on Monday to open the season and they welcome in Bay City Central today (Wednesday). They also host Hillman on

Friday and they’ll make the trip for Valley Lutheran on Dec. 19.

“We like to focus our practices on playing fast, which includes a lot of conditioning and full court drills,” Lueck said. “The sophomores are familiar with what we do, we just need to get more reps as a whole unit with five new players.

“(We want to) play hard, play well and learn. We need to grow together as a team; the sooner the better, and the coaches feel we are off to a good start.”

And as for defending their NSL Big Dipper title, Lueck knows that what teams they’ll have to beat to keep on top.

“Tawas will be a very good foe for us and a must win if we want to win the league,” he said. “They have several returning players that could become a really good team. I would never pick against us because I think our guard play is going to be very good and at times, we will play four guards.

“That being said, Tawas has a couple post players that are really good and they will be better at the guard position this year. Rogers City and Alcona also have some nice players returning but we think the conference championship will be decided with Tawas and Oscoda.”



Expectations continue to rise for Tawas girls

TAWAS CITY – They return a veteran core. They’ve got some newcomers that should make an impact too. If everything lines up the way the Tawas Area girls basketball team hopes, they could be in store for a special winter.

“At the beginning of the year we had all of the girls on the team write down some team goals they have for this season, all of the girls and coaches believe we have the talent this year to win a conference championship,” second year head coach Jason Woelke said. “It will not be easy.

“Although Oscoda lost some important players from last season’s team, they still have some key returning players, two returning all conference players in Luella Whipkey and Emma Michaud. They are well coached and will not give up their conference crown easily. Alcona and Rogers City also are very well coached teams that have some returning players on their team.

“We also want to compete for a district championship. Roscommon, last year’s district champion, has the main core of their team returning and will

be tough, but again we believe that the combination of returning players we have along with some of the new girls added to this team that we can compete with anybody.”

The Lady Braves finished last year 13-9 overall and finished second in the North Star League Big Dipper with an 8-2 mark. Seven players are back from that squad.

“So far this season I have been really happy with how the girls have performed in practice,” Woelke said. “They have really showed strong teamwork and a willingness to push each other hard in practice and a desire to get better.

“Over Thanksgiving weekend we had a great opportunity to scrimmage other teams at Midland Dow and performed very well against two teams that were in the Division 3 quarterfinals last year (Sanford Meridian and Sandusky) and also against a strong Saginaw Valley Lutheran squad.

The girls showed great growth during the scrimmages and really improved throughout the day. We have a lot of returning players from last season with some solid new additions.”

Returning to the team will

be seniors Kelsey Look (guard, forward), Hailey Felske (forward), Kaitlyn Swales (center) and Hannah Potts (guard); juniors Quinn Seyfried (forward, 7.5 points per game, 8.5 rebounds) and Brynn Montie (center, 4.1 points, 5.4 rebounds); and sophomore Amelia Herbolsheimer (guard).

New to the team will be juniors Vivian Malewska (forward) and Teresa Dalman (guard); and freshman Gia Lesneski (guard).

“Brynn and Quinn are two returning starters from last season, Brynn is an incredible defensive player who controls the paint really well and Quinn is a great rebounder who knows how to score the ball really well,” Woelke said. “The four returning seniors contributed significantly to last year’s team. Kelsey is a great defender whose hustle gets us a lot of extra possessions. Hailey is a solid rebounder and a good defensive player who has a nice outside shot. Kaitlyn finishes well around the basket and also rebounds well. Hannah is so extremely quick who also makes a lot of hustle plays to get steals
