Repeat offenders C-I Mock Trial again earns state berth

The Bluejacket Mock Trial team is returning to the State Tournament for the second year in-a-row and fourth time in the last five years.

The team started the season strong with two wins at the Apple Valley Pre-season MinneApple Tournament and never looked back, going undefeated in Regional competition with wins versus Cloquet, Duluth Denfeld, Albany, and Buffalo to earn a number two seed out of 18 teams in the Northern Super Region.

In the Region Finals, the Bluejackets again faced Cloquet, defeating the Lumberjacks by nine points to earn the state tournament berth.

The team is led by three-year captain Ainsley Doom and senior Kaden Kaar.

“Ainsley’s leadership has been incredibly instrumental in motivating the team to excellence and helping them to gel,” coach Michael Galligan said. “Kaden anchors the witness crew and is the only mock trial participant in school history to participate

in three state tournaments.”

The two seniors are joined by juniors Max Godeen, Avere O’Leary, Lauren Albright, and Amanda Kopp, who, according to Galligan, “are the nucleus of the team. They provide a strong foundation for everyone to stand on.”

The rest of the team is young but talented, which makes the future of the team looking positive. While only being a freshman, this is Alice Heine’s third year on the team.

“Alice has once again proven her ability to perform well above her age with incredible effectiveness, having played a major witness role in each of her three seasons,” Galligan said.

Rounding out the team in providing youthful exuberance are newcomers sophomore Maxene Vasquez and freshmen Rachel Kopp, and Sheridan Breeding.

C-I Mock Trial is also coached by attorney Hannah McDonald and Judge Carrie Doom.

The State Mock Trial Tournament is being held Thursday and Friday, March 5 - 6, in St. Paul at the US District Courthouse.

Another roundabout may be coming to Cambridge

It’s getting to the point where Isanti County residents are going to dub it “the Kwik Trip effect.” Wherever one of the popular convenience stores gets built, a roundabout will inevitably follow.

The next example of this phenomenon is being proposed for the intersection of Highway 95 and County Road 14/70, just west of the Rum River

and a short distance from Anoka Ramsey Community College, GracePointe Crossing, and Cambridge’s “Kwik Trip West.”

According to Cambridge City Engineer Greg Anderson, MnDot and Isanti County recently completed an intersection control evaluation for that intersection ahead of a planned pavement resurfacing project in 2033. The project would resurface a stretch of Highway 95 just west of the intersection

to Fern Street.

Anderson said the evaluation considered three alternatives for traffic control at the intersection. The first is to replace the existing temporary signal system with a permanent signal system and keep the same lane configuration. The second is also to have a permanent traffic control, but also expand the current lane configurations to provide for a dedicated southbound right turn lane onto Highway 95.

The third is to install a single-lane roundabout, similar to the one recently constructed near the Kwik Trip on South Main Street.

According to Anderson, the recommendations from the evaluation team were to go with the roundabout, even though that option was the most expensive of the three.

“The roundabout was found to be the safest option for both pedestrians and to reduce the crashes and have the least im-

pact on traffic flowing through the intersection on Highway 95,” Anderson said. “It is the most expensive, but as noted in their report, when they do their entire evaluation, considering crash data, delays, and construction costs, it comes out as having the most bang for your buck.”

Anderson and City Administrator Evan Vogel noted that even though the intersection

Struss returns to Isanti County as new finance director

Who says you can't go home? Certainly not Chad Struss.

The former Isanti County Auditor-Treasurer, who in July 2023 left his position to take a job in the state auditor's office, is being rehired by the county as the new finance director. The county has been without a finance director since Oct. 30, when Randal Erickson transferred from finance director to assistant finance director.

"I'm extremely excited to welcome Chad back to our county," Chair Alan Duff said. "I think he is going to be a massive help in our budgeting process. He's hitting this job running. Obviously, he has a background (with the county) and is very excited to come back."

Struss' first day back on the job will tentatively be April 6.

However, that step wasn't taken easily, as Commissioners Todd Christensen and Kristi LaRowe continued to have concerns over the scope of the project and whether it was wise to take this step despite the uncertain future of the project. Before construction can begin, the Minnesota Legislature must still approve letting the county hold a local option sales tax referendum vote in November. Plus, even with legislative approval, getting a majority of the voters to approve the referendum question isn't guaranteed.

According to County Engineer Justin Bergerson and the other three commissioners, the unknown isn't if a new building will be constructed, but rather when it will be constructed and how it will be funded. The four emphasized if the sales tax is allowed to go to a public vote, the county will need to present voters with a specific design for the building. Additionally, there is an opt-out clause in the contract that doesn't financially punish the county unless there are extra costs incurred to restart the job within 90 days of putting a pause on it. Finally, even if the county were to delay construction after the architectural design was completed, the county could still use those designs in the future.

As to who would be awarded the contract, Bergerson said Oertel Architects, Ltd's bid of \$1,137,678.25 was significantly lower than the next-lowest bid. He added the company had a smaller staff than others, however they specialized in architecture for public works departments.

After nearly an hour-long discussion, the commissioners voted 4-1 to go with Oertel, with Christensen casting the lone nay vote.

North Branch council uncomfortable with TIF request

It's back to the drawing board for a section of vacant land in North Branch as the potential developers fail to convince the council to explore tax increment financing for their project.

Unique Opportunities LLC, via its representative Samuel Herzog, proposed a three-building complex comprising 236 apartments on land west of Interstate 35 on Falcon Avenue, south of the Ecumen facilities. The build would have taken three years total, and likely required the full 26 legally allowed years of TIF funding.

Rebecca Kurtz from Ehlers Inc., the city's financial advisor, presented the project to the council at its final February regular meeting, seeking consensus on whether the developer should proceed with pursuing TIF or if the council was unlikely to support it.

Tax increment financing is a funding mechanism that allows developers of new projects to capture the increases in property taxes generated by their projects. It can enable projects that the free market would not support, providing in exchange a public benefit – in this case, 48 units set aside for low-income renters for the entire term of the TIF.

Kurtz said the TIF effectively subsidizes these units, but does not require that the owners charge any less for rent. She said the developer is considering

charging less rent for those units, and that could be part of any agreement the parties sign for the development.

The council was skeptical of the project, in part because less than a year ago the city effected a zoning change for this parcel based on a totally different plan for developing a portion of the land.

That plan involved adding single-family homes in an R3 district, a use previously not allowed under city code, and after special meetings and lengthy discussions, the council approved the change for all R3 districts in the city.

Mayor Kevin Schieber pointed out that the first proposal, with a different developer, would have resulted in a density of 12.45 units per acre, whereas the new proposal from Unique Opportunities LLC would come in at more than double that—25.45 units per acre.

"That's quite a bit more, with two acres less property," Schieber said.

Council member Jeff Goulet took the position that building all market-rate units would decrease demand in the city, thus theoretically making all apartments in North Branch more affordable without the use of a TIF district. Council member Patrick Meacham clarified that he is not against TIF as a tool, but that this particular application was not worthwhile, in his opinion.



National media shows opposite sides of same coin

Before the NFL season began and now that it and the Olympics have concluded, I have been bidding my Sunday mornings by doing a little comparison of a couple of the Sunday morning network news shows. Specifically, I take a look at Fox News Sunday and NBC Meet the Press, mainly because they are on one after the other.

I started this comparison mainly out of curiosity about if all the statements about biased national media were accurate. Long story short, they are absolutely accurate, sometimes to ridiculous extremes. Interestingly, though, is while they are polar opposites in terms of bias, they are strikingly similar in almost every other way.

Both shows are currently hosted by females. On Fox, it is Shannon Bream, and on Meet the Press, it is Kristen Welker. While they are probably perfectly competent journalists — Welker graduated from Harvard and Bream graduated with a doctor of law degree, their current positions make them seem more like mere mouthpieces for their respective networks.

Both shows follow the same template. They focus on the biggest national or world news topics from the previous week through interviews of various political figures, followed by a panel discussion of four experts, with most of them also being associated with the media.

Watch these shows just a couple times and even their similar M.O. becomes apparent. Both shows try to present an unbiased front, having both a Republican and a Democrat on each show discussing their position on the same topic. But take a closer look. Most of the time, they each interview someone from the opposing side of their bias first. After that, they interview the person with the same position as theirs. Often, that second interview includes, “you heard what (insert first person interviewed name) said, how do you respond?” By doing it this way, it gives the advantage to the second guest by letting them hear what the first person said and giving them time to come up with a counterpoint.

Even the way each guest is interviewed is the same. The first person gets the hard-hitting questions and is openly and instantly “fact-checked” more often, to the point it seems like Welker or Bream is more debating the person rather than interviewing them. The second person is then thrown softball questions.

Then there’s the expert panel. Again, in an attempt to appear unbiased, the panel typically features three people who follow the networks’ bias, plus one “sacrificial lamb.” That person is inevitably ganged up on by the other three, with the host sometimes jumping into the fray.

When I first started this comparison, I rationalized this was one way I could get both sides of a topic’s story. But after a while, all it is doing is leaving an equally sour taste in my mouth and even more reason to look forward to the next NFL season to start.

ICE actions unconstitutional

To the editor,

A recent letter to the editor was titled “Decency, respect for one another”. The writer asks where common decency and respect have gone. I, too, am asking that very question.

The 4th Amendment to the US Constitution protects individuals against unreasonable searches and seizures by the government. It requires warrants based on probable cause and specifically describe the place and items involved. It secures privacy in homes, belongings, and person, though exceptions exist for consent, emergencies, or lawful arrests.” Notice – there is no statement that the 4th Amendment applies only to US citizens. If you are here, even without legal status, those rights apply to you. ICE, in it’s current actions, is denying those rights. If ICE were to get proper judicial warrants, they can perform those searches and lawful arrests. ICE has refused to follow the 4th Amendment.

The 5th Amendment to the US Constitution protects individuals in legal proceedings, primarily the right to remain silent (protection against self-incrimination), protection against double jeopardy, the right to a grand jury for capital crimes, the guarantee of due process, and compensation for taken private property. Again, there is no statement that the 5th Amendment applies only to US citizens. ICE has routinely denied due process to the people they arrest.

It seems to me that if ICE wants our respect, they should follow the US Constitution. They should stop kidnapping 5-year-olds and sending them to Texas

without a chance to have a court hearing on their immigration status. If ICE wants our respect, they should stop arresting people that are following the law and appearing in court for their immigration hearings. In his last year in office, Biden deported 675,000 people. No one died at the hands of ICE. No one’s home was destroyed by illegal searches. The Biden administration did it the right way. The legal way.

I’m not justifying violence against ICE agents. Peaceful protest is guaranteed in the 1st amendment to the US constitution. Why should I respect ICE when they violate the US Constitution and people’s civil rights on an hourly basis? Why should my 1st Amendment rights to peaceful protest of the unconstitutional actions of ICE be under attack?

The Advertiser or Agency shall indemnify the Newspaper for any attorney’s fees incurred in defending against claims, pay any judgments against the Newspaper, and pay associated expenses and losses that are caused by the publication of any advertisement submitted by or published at the direction of the Advertiser or Agency, including claims for libel, copyright infringement, and invasion of privacy.

How to ensure you don't get fleeced

Question: I am looking to purchase a used vehicle. I have been online and checking things out and some of these listings appears too good to be true. Do you have any advice on what a person can or should do so they don't become a victim?

Answer: If it's too good to be true, it usually is. Online marketplaces are full of stolen and tampered vehicles.

To reduce the risk of becoming a victim of vehicle fraud, buyers should:

- Ask for the VIN and have it checked by your local police department, a mechanic or DVS inspection site.
- Run a vehicle history report and compare the vehicle's price to market value.
- Take the vehicle to a trusted mechanic, if possible.
- Be wary of sellers who refuse to share a VIN, pressure you to act quickly or demand cash.

- Watch for prices that are far below market value.
- Review seller profiles and reviews carefully.
- Make sure you receive a valid title or required purchase paperwork.

What to do with broken branches?

Winter winds and summer storms always leave a mess of broken branches in the yard. The mess must be picked up before any lawn mowing can be done. Then the broken bits must be put "somewhere".



Did you know those broken branches are a gardener's gold? It's called ramial wood. When the material is chipped or broken into small bits it makes the best mulch you can find. Wood chips created from small to medium-sized branches, up to about 3 inches in diameter have a high nutrient content. This material contains up to 75% of the tree's minerals, amino acids, proteins, phytohormones and enzymes, making it a powerful soil enhancer. This material is ideal for improving the soil.

As a soil builder, ramial wood chips help create an airy, spongy soil that retains moisture, resists compaction and promotes microbial life. It's ideal for permaculture, organic farming and ecological restoration.

Ramial wood chips can be created by collecting

the branches of deciduous trees (pines have too high a resin content, so keep it to less than 10% of the mix). Avoid cedar because the material breaks down too slowly & will tie up nitrogen. Process the branches through a woodchipper and include as many leaves & small twigs as possible to increase nutrient value and microbial activity.

Add the material to the compost pile, spread a 3–4-inch layer around trees & bushes or use it as a mulch in your garden beds.

Small, electric woodchippers are designed for processing this type of material and one can be purchased for under \$150.

If you don't want to invest in a chipper, much of this material is easily broken by hand into 2-4-inch bits or snipped to size with pruning shears. Simply toss the broken material under a nearby tree, bush or into a bed as you walk by. Job Done!



Isanti County recipient of Board of Water and Soil Resources grant

The Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources (BWSR) is awarding approximately \$2.5 million in Water Quality and Storage Program grants to 10 local governments for work that improves water quality and helps make landscapes more resilient to severe weather events in a changing climate.

Grant recipients include the Isanti County Soil and Water Conservation District.





is within city limits, since it involves a state highway and county road, the city doesn't have any financial obligations in the construction costs and therefore, technically wouldn't have any say in the project. However, the city was allowed to join in the evaluation and offer its preferences. Anderson said the city had two main areas of emphasis for the project: pedestrian safety and reducing vehicle speeds, especially as commuters exited the city going westbound. The city's long-range plans are to connect GracePointe Crossing and the under-construction Cambridge Cove housing development north of Highway 95 with the commu-

nity college, City Park, and Kwik Trip south of Highway 95 with a walking/biking trail. Therefore, a roundabout was the option the city was hoping for. "I appreciate the state's process as they went through this," Vogel said. "It was probably four to six separate meetings that gave city staff, the state, and the county the opportunity to communicate between the parties. Staff did state a preference to keep in mind pedestrian safety, especially considering the senior population at Grace-Pointe and the housing development to the north. We did express a desire to explore the roundabout, and to our pleasant surprise, that was the recommended option."

Five vie for open Isanti Council seat

Five Isanti residents are in the running to be appointed to fill the council seat vacated by Jeff Holmgren, barring anyone backing out ahead of the interviews. The five applicants, in the order they turned in their applications, are: Joshua Bosma, Sheryl Davidson, Erika Zdon, Mark Walsh Jr., and Brandon Boettcher. Of those five, Davidson is the only one to have attempted to be seated on the council, having run for mayor during the most recent special election. Davidson was eliminated from contention during the primary election. Zdon unsuccessfully ran for election to the Cambridge-Isanti School Board in the 2010 election. Zdon is also currently serving on the Isanti Parks & Recreation Board. Additionally, she is an active mem-

ber of Isanti Together, the organization that ran Illuminate Isanti last December. While not having a history of campaigning for office, Bosma was active in the recent Cambridge-Isanti Schools bond referendum vote, filing a fair campaign practices complaint against current Isanti Mayor Luke Merrill. That complaint was dismissed by an administrative law judge. Boettcher is a firefighter with the Isanti Fire District. He is also the department's Rodeo Association Advertising Co-Chair. No background information was found for Walsh. The applicants will be interviewed in the order they turned in their applications by the council during the March 17 meeting. The council may choose who to appoint immediately following the interviews. Whoever is chosen will then be sworn in at the beginning of the April 7 meeting.

The road gravel project is to be quoted per ton, scale tickets per load in quantity of US Tons hauled to be provided at the end of each hauling day. Trucks may be randomly weighed, the City will get a gravel sample from the gravel pit to be tested prior to the start of the project. Payments to the supplier will be made monthly after the first City Council meeting of the month, invoice to be mailed to the City 1 week prior to meeting.


