Preliminary levies nearly identical

In an unusual moment of synchronicity, the cities of Cambridge, Isanti, and North Branch, plus Isanti County, each are going forward with a preliminary levy increase within one percent of each other — between 5% and 6%.

Additionally, the city of Cambridge and Isanti County took similar paths before settling on their amounts — 5% and 5.74%. According to Cambridge Finance Director Caroline Moe and Isanti County Administrator Amanda Usher, when the budget process first began earlier this year, both governments were looking at a double-digit percentage increase in the preliminary levy over last year.

According to Moe, she took steps she is normally hesitant to take in order to get the preliminary levy down to an acceptable amount. Specifically, Moe said she is taking one-time revenue, for example, the sale of city-owned land, and applying that to reduce the 2026 levy increase. The downside to doing that, she said, is that it will put additional strain on future

With the county, Usher said they are taking an across-the-board budget cut approach. After all budget requests were initially turned in,

Residents express concern over school zone traffic

North Branch's busiest school-zone street is also home to the most car collisions, and residents are demanding changes.

A Facebook post about near-misses with young students in crosswalks and dangerous speeding generated multiple comments from community members, sharing their stories of unsafe activity during the busy before- and after-school rush.

Police chief Dan Meyer said Grand Avenue traffic has been a concern since he started with the city 27 years ago, but traffic has increased immensely in the last few years.

Meyer told the council the daily number of vehicles using Grand Avenue has more than doubled since 2022. The current closure of County Road 30 is playing a part, he said, and thinks traffic will decrease when that re-opens, but "aggressive driving and speeding issues will remain.

With 14 car collisions so far this year, Meyer said Grand Avenue outpaces everywhere else in the city, and he only has so much staff to go around for traffic enforcement, which he views as a short-term solution

"We can try to calm the traffic while we're out there," he said, adding his officers have been making stops and staying visible, "...but as soon as we're out of there, stuff starts ramping up again."

The city did receive a grant to update its Safe Routes to School program, which hasn't been done since 2011, according to Nate Sondrol, the city's community development director. They are awaiting approval from MnDOT on the contractor, Alta Planning and Design, which will hopefully begin collecting community input this fall and winter, he said.

The city has taken measures to improve pedestrian safety in the last several years, including adding rectangular rapid flashing beacons at the intersections of Grand Avenue and Maple St., 381st St. and 378th St. These are the button-activated lights attached to pedestrian crossing signs near crosswalks.

It placed in-crosswalk signs at Grand and Maple to remind drivers that state law requires stopping at crosswalks to allow pedestrians to cross, signs that school volunteer Charles Klopp says "get hit all the time" by inattentive drivers.

When, where to see best fall colors

Pumpkin spice lattes, cozy sweaters, cool weather, and fall colors - well, we can have a pumpkin spice latte this week anyway. With warmer than usual temps, the fall colors aren't quite as brilliant as they usually are this time of year, and we can expect some more warm weather in the 70s and 80s through Sunday and into the 60s next week.

With temperatures ranging from 5-15 degrees warmer than usual this time of year, fall color is being delayed. However, with

an adequate amount of rainfall this summer in central Minnesota, fall colors are expected to be bright. If you traveled north, you may have noticed delayed fall color as well with color not as bright due to dryer conditions, especially in northwest Minnesota.


In central Minnesota near Pine



Fascination with trains

rom an early age, I have had a fascination with trains. They could be passenger or freight, they could be steam locomotive or diesel electric.



Perhaps this was brought on by the fact that I grew up in White Bear Township on Otter Lake Road next to the Soo Line tracks. Actually, it was the Sault St. Marie Railroad that ran from Minneapolis to Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan. As a young child, I knew we had an 8 a.m. passenger train going east and at 5 p.m. the passenger train was returning to Minneapolis.

As a child I had a wind-up train and always wished for an electric train. At the end of World War II, the Gilbert Hall of Fame in New Haven, Connecticut, who had been a manufacturer of three rail electric trains introduced the two rail, real life style 3/16th gauge train set. My parents purchased one for me in 1946 and I was delighted. It was a 462 engine with a baggage car and three coaches. That was the beginning of building layouts in our basement.

Over the years I have collected American Flyer, Lionel, LGB and several other brand toy trains, both foreign and U.S.

For our 57th wedding anniversary in August, Kathy and I wanted to do something special. We met after my first wife, Joan, died from a diabetic condition. My daughter, Julie, was 10 years old when Kathy and I were married.

The memorable moment of the wedding day was when we were leaving the church and Julie came running up to Kathy in a very excited way and said, "Now I can call you mom!"

Our honeymoon was to Glacier

National Park, Banff and Lake Louise, including Lake Moraine. From there we went to Washington and visited some relatives and then to California where there were more relatives.

We visited Disneyland and Knott's Berry Farm, and on the way home took a helicopter ride into the Grand Canyon. The 6,000-mile trip is one we will always remember.

Our anniversary celebration turned out to be a 2 ½ hour dinner in a private dining compartment aboard the Wisconsin Great Northern Railroad Dinner Train at Trego, Wisconsin, just north of Spooner.

The private car gave Kathy and I time to reminisce on our years of marriage. I think if we were there when the leaves were changing color, it would have been very pretty. There was a scenic stop crossing the Namekagon River.

The coach we were in was articulated and had a bend in the middle. The oldest car on the train was the one ahead of us from 1912.

The owners of the Wisconsin Great Northern are Craig and Mardell Freeland. They have quite a number of cars at their newly built depot and railyard. They were also able to purchase the Mark Twain Zephyr that had been in a trainyard in Madison, Illinois near St. Louis. They obtained the Zephyr in 2020 and are continuing to restore it for future excursions. The Zephyr was built in 1958 and it passed through eight private owners over 62 years before it was brought to Trego.

We have also enjoyed the train excursion out of Osceola, Wisconsin and the train that begins in Durango, Colorado which climbs a narrow gauge up the mountainside to Silverton and Telluride

On a one-way road, pull to the nearest side and stop. If you are in an intersection, proceed through it before stopping. Remain stopped until all emergency vehicles have passed.

A law enforcement officer with probable cause to believe you have violated this law may arrest you within four hours of the violation.

You do not need to stop if the emergency vehicle is separated from your lane of traffic by a physical barrier like a fence, wall or median strip.

New study reveals gaps in autism diagnosis for girls

Researchers at the University of Minnesota recently discovered the most compelling evidence to date that girls present with different symptoms of autism spectrum disorder (ASD) compared to boys—highlighting the need for new and innovative approaches to improve diagnostic practices.

For decades, autism researchers have sought to understand the differences and similarities between autistic males and females. ASD is commonly considered a male-dominant condition, with three to four males diagnosed for every female. Females are also typically diagnosed later than males. Research led by Dr. Casey Burrows, an associate professor in the Medical School on the Twin Cities campus and licensed psychologist at the Masonic Institute for the Developing Brain, analyzed data spanning 18 years and over 4,000 participants to investigate potential sex differences in autism symptoms in children. This study followed younger siblings of autistic children, who are at higher likelihood of developing autism themselves. This method reduces bias caused by studies

that only focus on children who

come to clinical attention on their own. The research sheds light on why females are underdiagnosed and offers recommendations on how to improve early identification.

The study, published in JAMA Network Open, found:

ASD traits can present differently in males and females.

Notably, females showed fewer

Notably, females showed fewer issues with eye contact — a key early marker of ASD — than males.

When researchers accounted for sex differences in how autism is best measured, females had milder symptoms.

Many existing studies only include children who are already diagnosed, missing girls who go undetected during early screenings and perpetuating diagnostic bias.

"Sex-related biases are likely baked into the current ASD identification system," said Burrows. "We think there are more females exhibiting autism-related concerns than epidemiological estimates would lead us to believe, and we want to improve early detection for these females. For example, our findings show that

females are less likely to show difficulties with eye contact, which is probably the best-known autism symptom. It's no wonder then that we're missing autism concerns in females."

Current diagnostic thresholds do not account for sex differences, but implementing sex-specific thresholds may improve early identification for girls. Burrows advocates for a shift in research practices, including recruitment methods that reduce bias — such as sampling children with a family history of autism — and expanding diagnostic criteria to include traits that are more common in females, like milder difficulties with eye contact and inflexible behaviors.

"Typically developing girls and boys show differences in their language and social development," said Jed Elison, a professor in the College of Education and Human Development and co-author of the paper. "It makes sense that we should take those differences into account when studying something like autism, which is defined by social challenges and is often accompanied by language delays." -The Masonic Institute for the Developing Brain

Minnesota Starwatch for October 2025

This year, the moon and planets dominate October's skies.

The month opens with Venus outshining everything else in the predawn sky. Look for it low in the east, just before dawn starts to break. Don't wait too long, as our sister planet will soon be lost in the rising sun's glare. To Venus's upper right, three bright objects form a diagonal line. Highest is Jupiter; in the middle is Procyon, in Canis Minor, the little dog; and holding the anchor position is brilliant Sirius, in Canis Major, the big dog.

At nightfall, a waxing moon opens the month in the south, below the big Summer Triangle of stars. The moon glides steadily eastward to keep a rendezvous with Saturn on the 5th. The moon's glare will probably wash out the Circlet of Pisces, a dim ring of stars above Saturn and below the Great Square of Pegasus. The Circlet represents one of two fish that join to form the constellation Pisces.

The next evening—the 6th—the moon reaches fullness. As the closest full moon to the fall equinox, this is the harvest moon. This year, though, it's essentially a tie with September's full moon, which was almost as close to the equinox. But unlike September's, October's full moon will be a supermoon. It falls less than two days before perigee, the point in its orbit when the moon is closest to Earth. Moon fans will notice its large size, which is best appreciated when the moon is close to the horizon.

But the moon doesn't rest on its laurels. The evening of the 9th, it will be close to the lovely Pleiades star cluster. During that night, the moon will glide right across the Pleiades. And don't miss it in the predawn sky on the 19th, when a thin old crescent moon visits Venus.







Talking tick-borne diseases with University of Minnesota

Across Minnesota, there has been an uptick in tick-borne disease diagnoses - ranging from Lyme disease, the most common tick-borne disease reported in Minnesota, to emerging threats like Powassan virus and Alpha-gal syndrome (red meat allergy).

Benjamin Clarke, PhD, with the University of Minnesota Medical School, Duluth Campus, speaks about the growing threat of tick-borne diseases, common misconceptions and what people can do to protect themselves.

Q: In general, what are the concerns around tick-borne diseases?

Dr. Clarke: Attention to the severity of tick-borne diseases has been overlooked by both the medical community and the public. There are misconceptions that diagnostic tests are completely reliable and that antibiotics can resolve any infection. The emergence of the Lyme pandemic was only realized by screening insurance records for patients exhibiting flu-like symptoms that were resolved by antibiotic treatment. Under these criteria, we now realize the true magnitude. In 2023, there were 89,000 cases reported to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention by state health departments; however, approximately 476,000 people were diagnosed with Lyme disease, which was only uncovered by reviewing insurance

Q: Can one tick bite transmit more than one illness at the same time?

Dr. Clarke: One tick bite can transmit multiple infectious disease agents, though similar symptoms between different diseases can cause confusion. For example, the blacklegged tick is responsible for spreading Lyme disease, but the symptoms are mimicked by other infections such as babesiosis, anaplasmosis or the Powassan virus.

The onset of disease can become more complicated, resulting in confusion for diagnosis and treatment plans.

The bacteria causing Lyme disease are the overwhelmingly most common tick-borne disease, while the other potential infectious agents are less common. Combinations of two or more diseases resulting from a single tick bite are a troubling possibility.

Q: What should people know about newer tick-related issues like Powassan virus or red meat allergy?

Dr. Clarke: The Powassan virus is spread by blacklegged ticks and causes inflammation in the brain. There are no effective medical treatments, and the disease has the greatest impact on the elderly, with about 10% mortality. The red meat allergy is a provocative disease because it does not involve an infectious disease. Rather, it's an

immune response to the saliva from the lone star tick. The tick bite causes an acute and severe allergic response to all red meats, including products containing gelatin. Neither chicken nor fish will cause the allergy. Consumption of the red meat can result in severe anaphylaxis, causing death.

Q: What can people do to protect themselves as tick-borne illnesses are on the rise?

Dr. Clarke: The best protection is vigilance. Use a tick repellent, such as DEET or permethrin, when you venture outdoors. Wear light-colored clothing, making ticks more apparent and easier to remove. Wear long trousers and long-sleeved shirts, and tuck the pant cuffs into your socks to block easy access to your skin. Also, consider the time of day and weather. Ticks avoid direct sunlight, hot temperatures and low humidity. Early mornings and late afternoons are active times for the ticks. Ticks are most active in the early spring, coinciding with the melting snow, and late fall around the first

Q: What work are you doing at the University of Minnesota to advance research into tick-borne diseases?

Dr. Clarke: Several investigators are studying tick-borne diseases. My laboratory studies how Lyme disease



bacteria, Borrelia burgdorferi, cause inflammation. We also engage community-based research to increase awareness and to solicit submissions of ticks. These ticks are analyzed for pathogens, and to assess the total microbial community in the tick to identify factors favoring disease transmission.

Dr. Benjamin Clarke is a professor at the University of Minnesota Medical School, Duluth Campus. His research interests include Lyme disease, immunology and endocrinology, and the development of active learning tools to teach biomedical

resulting in the double-digit increase, all departments were instructed to slash one percent from that request. Usher noted some departments wound up voluntarily decreasing their requests by more than one percent.

Additionally, the commissioners agreed to take the contribution requests of outside non-profits and cut them by 5%. These organizations are not run by the county; however, they offer valuable services to county residents. Since government bodies are not allowed to make donations, they can instead make contributions in consideration of the services those organizations provide. The entire board felt that making a flat cut to everyone's requests

was the only fair way to alleviate the financial impact on next year's levy. At the very least, it was more preferable to completely eliminating contributions to some of the organizations, which most likely would result in eliminating that organization's services to the county, if not the dissolution of the organization

The city of Isanti is likewise going with a 5% levy increase. As has been its process recently, the city reached that number by thoroughly combing through all aspects of its budget, cutting little bits here and there.

Although not directly connected with Isanti County, the city of North Branch is also joining in on the common amount, coming in at an increase of 5.93%. This is a decrease from the

original proposed levy, which featured an 8.5% increase. To get to that amount, \$170,247 were cut from the initial staff budget requests.

The one outlier to the common levy increases is the Cambridge-Isanti School District. Its preliminary levy, which Finance Director Chris Kampa states is established by the state and thus the district has no control over, is set at an increase of .79%.

There are three more aspects of the preliminary levy that all the government entities have in common. The first is that since tax bases have increased due to the continued influx of new residents and businesses, the tax rates will go down. This means if a property has the same valuation for 2026 as it did for 2025, that property owner's taxes will

The second and third commonalities are connected to one another. All the government entities remind residents that preliminary levies aren't necessarily what the final levy will be. There is a ceiling amount that cannot be increased in the final levy. The final levy, however, can be lower than the preliminary levy, which is exactly what each entity is striving to do.

"We still have a lot of work ahead of us between now and December (when the final levy must be approved)," Isanti County Chair Alan Duff said.


DNR seeks input on year-round bass season

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is asking for input on new fishing rules that would allow for a year-round bass season that includes a period for harvest and a period for catch-and-release fishing.

The proposed expedited rules would adjust the inland waters fishing regulations by creating a year-round bass season. Portions of the year would be catch-and-release only while the other parts of the year would allow for bass harvest.

All the current harvest periods would remain the same, with catch-and-release-only bass season periods expanding to include periods that until now were closed to bass fishing. If enacted, the new rule would go into effect for the 2026 fishing season.

The Minnesota DNR is taking input on this proposal through Thursday, Oct. 23, and more information is available on the Minnesota DNR website (mndnr. gov/input/rules/fisheries/continuous-bass-season. html). Netting schedules vary by lake and are based on expected water temperatures. As the water temperatures cool, game fish head to deeper water while cisco and whitefish come to shallow water for fall spawn-Some lakes that are more susceptible to factors that

impact water temperatures will open and close to netting with a 48-hour notice posted at lake accesses, other public places, and the DNR website. Other lakes are open to netting based on the set netting schedules listed on the DNR website.

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources allows netting when there is little chance that fish other than cisco and whitefish will be caught. Game fish incidentally taken in nets must be returned to the water immediately.

Complete regulations, including designated lakes, netting schedules and requirements related to use of gear and invasive species, are available on the Minnesota DNR website (files.dnr.state.mn.us/rlp/regulations/fishing/whitefish-tullibee.pdf).

GRAND AVE: Drivers are speeding in the school zone

The school district began providing crossing guards in the afternoon at Maple and Grand earlier this year, but one commenter quoted in the meeting agenda packet said they are no longer at the crosswalk by the time middle school students arrive to walk or bike

Council member Patrick Meacham pointed out one percent of vehicles captured by speed trailers are going more than 10 miles per hour above the speed limit is not as harmless as it may sound —that's seventy vehicles a day.

"Same thing with 85% of vehicles that are traveling 34 or less — that leaves almost, roughly 1,042 per day that are driving 35 miles per hour or faster," he said.

Chief Meyer agreed. "When you're talking that many vehicles, one percent is a problem," he replied. Meacham went on to ask "what solutions are out there that isn't staff?'

Klopp suggested increasing traffic fines, while Mayor Kevin Schieber suggested the city providing additional volunteer crossing guards.

Schieber and City Administrator Matthew Hill also pointed out upcoming changes to nearby roads may redirect traffic in ways that reduce congestion.

Council member Robert Canada suggested discussing the issue at the next public safety commission, to which he serves as the council liaison.


