## Circle of Friends program helps North Branch seniors stay connected

A select number of seniors in North Branch recently received an early holiday present to help them stay connected to loved ones during this time of extreme isolation thanks to a relatively new and innovative program initiated by the North Branch Senior Center, which is run by Catholic Charities.

Dubbed "Circle of Friends," the program provides a loaned iPad, internet access and technology training to local seniors who are a part of Catholic Charities senior dining program. The iPad is preloaded with Zoom, GoTo meeting, games, FaceTime, etc., to help them connect to friends and family during the pandemic.

Each week, seniors connect with Catholic Charities site coordinators. During this time, they can learn a new function, discuss topics of interest, receive updates about the program, be informed about learning opportunities they can participate in, and more.

"Social Connectedness is critical to any of us but most especially seniors who are alone and homebound because of reasons beyond their control," said Ruth Hunstiger, director of community services at Catholic Charities of the Diocese of St. Cloud. "Loneliness and depression can be as life-threatening as the pandemic."

According to a University of Michigan national poll on healthy aging, the number of seniors over the age of 50 who said they sometimes or often felt isolated from others nearly doubled during the pandemic, increasing from 27 percent to 56 percent.

Technology is one way to help seniors stay connected. The study found technology helped seniors connect to others.

"We recognized that some seniors had an iPad or computer but weren't sure exactly how to use it," Hunstiger said. "We also recognized that some had never seen or used that kind of technology, nor did they always have the financial means to obtain them."

### CITY OF NORTH BRANCH LENDS FINANCIAL HAND

Under the CARES Act, the City of North Branch received \$800,000. The council set aside a portion of its money to benefit non-profit organizations that serve North Branch residents.

North Branch City Administrator Renae Fry reached out to Catholic Charities at the request of the council.

## Soil and Water Conservation District takes pride in projects

Each general election year, voters elect Soil and Water Supervisors, although they don't exactly know what that position is or what purpose the Soil and Water Conservation District. As it turns out, the SWCD plays a key role in the management of such things as managing the Rum River, and the office takes great pride in their efforts.

During its Dec. 16 meeting, the Isanti County Board heard a presentation from Tiffany Determan, District Manager for Isanti Soil and Water Conservation District, regarding two large capital improvement projects taking place – Rum River remeander and Tiger Street basin project that will benefit Blue Lake.

"Both of these projects have taken a lot of perseverance, passion, and commitment to get accomplished, and we're really lucky that the district has all of those qualities," Determan said.

Before she presented about the projects, Determan told the board two stories that clarify what

gives her and her coworkers motivation to do what they do for the Rum River.

First she told the board about visiting the property of Scott Lagaard, who invited her to his and his wife's property to see if there was any erosion issues. "From the second that I walked out of the car door, he had this huge smile on his face talking about this great property – and there were forests and wetlands, and a permanent conservation easement and tons of footage of the Rum River," Determan explained. "And the smile on his face, and the way he talked about his land, just made me remember why I love to do what I do and why I stay committed."

She then told the board about shopping at a local store for a bass lure, and asking a fellow customer for a recommendation for which lure is best. The customer proceeded to tell Determan how he bass fishes in the Rum River all the time and has for years, and that the Rum River is the best resource.

# Remaining Isanti storm water maintenance temporarily ditched

Although it is for the most part complete, a portion of the City of Isanti's storm water maintenance project will remain on hold until Isanti County schedules a ditch maintenance project.

"This is to more or less wrap up the program we've had in place for five years now," city engineer Jason Cook of Bolton and Menk said, noting they postponed the project slated for last year in order to allow time to work with the county on ditch maintenance. "Currently, all the culverts along Whiskey Road are lower than the ditch bottom, because it's filled with sediment."

During the last year, Cook has worked with the county engineer on the idea of getting them to schedule a ditch maintenance project, he said. However, the project is not a top priority for the county, because the ditch is not creating a problem with water flow or standing water, Cook informed the council.

The county engineer is willing to work with the city on the project when it does become a problem, or when the county can fit it into their schedule, Cook added.

"This is the last year of the program that gets our system up to snuff, up to where we were trying to be at, so that from here on out it's just checking in on how the rest of the system is," Cook said.

Council Member Steve Lundeen asked Cook about a storm-water pond on South Passage that he thought needed brush removed. City Administrator Josi Wood said she would put it on the public works schedule to look at, since smaller maintenance items like that take place in house.

"How is Whiskey Road not a problem when the water flows over the sidewalk and the sidewalk cannot be used?" asked Council Member Dan Collison.

Cook acknowledged it is a problem, and is one of the things that can be used to push the county to move forward on improving the ditch in that area. He noted it can be espe-

cially problematic when water stands over the sidewalk and then freezes.

Collison asked about taking pictures to show the county what is happening, and Cook said that was a great idea.

### BUSINESS SUBSIDY APPROVED

The council approved a business development/subsidy agreement for Light the Lamp LED/Wolf River Electric to

purchase two parcels of land from the city for \$2 - \$1 per parcel.

Light the Lamp LED/Wolf River Electric is currently located in Isanti, but has out-grown its current facility, according to Community Development Director Sheila Sellman.

Each parcel will be five acres of a 15-acre parcel subdivided into three five-acre parcels

located along Dual Boulevard Northeast. The site is certified shovel ready, and the developer plans to build two 16,000 square-foot buildings and employ 35 employees at the beginning, increasing to 55 employees as the expansion takes place, Sellman informed the council.

Catholic Charities felt like the right fit because of their work with seniors and since they already were supplying the meals for the seniors at North Branch Senior Center.

"With the high number of seniors cut off from community and their caregivers, providing funds for the iPads was a way to provide that connection, albeit virtual," Fry said. "Meal service is always in high demand, but again with seniors being cut off from restaurants, expanding the capacity of the senior center was important."

"The North Branch Senior Center is an important service provider in our community, and the opportunity to enhance the quality of the services they provide via a grant to Catholic Charities was something the council saw as a worthwhile use of the funds."

Through the grant request, Catholic Charities asked for financial assistance to purchase additional iPads to connect with seniors and for funds to expand their meals program. The council approved a \$12,000 CARES grant for this program.

This program was seen as especially important right now, especially since the Catholic Charities' congregating dining locations are currently closed due to the pandemic. So while the seniors are still able to get their meal service in their residence, they miss out on the social interactions they rely on.

"We knew how many seniors were self-isolating and cut off from family, friends and connecting with each oth-

er because of the critical nature of the virus on older adults," Hunstiger said.

"We knew the dangers of loneliness and depression. We knew we could provide food for seniors but that sometimes food was not enough to keep them healthy and safe. We thought of the number of ways we, those in the workforce, were staying connected and wanted to pilot a program to see if we could keep seniors more connected utilizing and teaching the use of those types of technology."

The program doesn't just supply iPads to seniors. It also helps teach the seniors how to use technology to stay connected to friends and family. With the knowledge of how to use the iPads, seniors can participate in virtual learning opportunities and watch virtual concerts and shows, which have increased during the pandemic.

"It gives them the opportunity to learn about the many options for connectivity a piece of technology can provide, which also stimulates the brain and the mind," Hunstiger said.

Currently, North Branch is one of two locations with funding for the Circle of Friends program. Catholic Charities is hoping to expand the program as they receive additional funding since they already see an impact.

"Seniors are excited about it and want to learn more about this kind of technology," Hunstiger said. "One senior stated, 'My world has opened up because of the pandemic. It forced everyone to go to virtual meetings and learning opportunities that I can now attend.'"

## CONSERVATION: Two projects help decrease erosion, phosphorous in water

The Rum River remeander is a project to fill a cut in the river that took place decades ago, but is causing issues with erosion. The project began a couple of years ago, and had some unexpected delays which have taken a lot of perseverance, according to Determan.

After the cut in the river was filled the first time, using mostly wood material and dirt, there were a lot of floods the following spring which blew out the fill that was used. After consulting with a number of agencies about what to do, it was decided to fill the cut in again, this time using large boulders along with the wood material, such as trees with roots still attached.

Determan told the board the project was completed recently, and will hope-

fully be a success this time.

The Tiger Street basin project will reduce the amount of phosphorous entering Blue Lake by 25 pounds per year, according to Determan, who noted that was a large benefit for reasonable cost.

### FINAL TWEAKS TO BUDGETS

Isanti County had a few final tweaks to its 2020 budget to reflect the approximately \$4.96 million it received in CARES Act funding. This money was not originally included in 2020 budget.

It also approved the 2021 final levy and budget. The final levy is approximately \$24.28 million, which is a reduction of approximately \$239,000 from the preliminary levy, according to Finance Director Kelsey Lakeberg. The final budget is approximately \$49.7 million.

## Sunrise Township stabbing leaves two injured

A report of a stabbing taking place in Sunrise Township just east of North Branch resulted in a husband and wife receiving critical injuries and the arrest of their adult son.

According to a press release from the Chisago County Sheriff's Office, at approximately 6:05 p.m. on Monday, Dec. 21, a 911 call was made by one of the victims reporting he and his wife were stabbed by their adult son at their shared home in Sunrise Township.

Upon arrival, aid was administered to the two victims and they were transported to trauma centers for care. The victims have been identified as 50-year-old John Hiland and 49-year-old Darcy Hiland. As of Tuesday, Dec. 22, they are listed as being in stable condition.

A short time later the son, has been identified as 26-year-old Tyler John Hiland, was taken into custody, where he is currently being held on probable charges of 1st degree assault with a dangerous weapon, causing substantial bodily harm.

## Have yourself a merry little Christmas

Easily the worst Christmas I have ever experienced was back in 1979, when I was nine years old. That year my grandma, who had been diagnosed with Leukemia, suddenly died from the disease, resulting in her funeral being held on Christmas Eve. The whole family, who were scattered living in Minnesota, Nebraska, and Wyoming, all gathered together for her funeral, and naturally, the next day for Christmas.

The thing about it, though, is how vividly I remember only the good things about that year. I vaguely remember going to her funeral and crying during it, but that's really about it from Christmas Eve. Christmas Day, however, I remember much more.

I remember waking up that morning and rushing downstairs at grandpa's house to see the two couches jam-packed with presents. I remember my dad claiming he heard hoofs on the roof that night. I remember my aunts and uncles conspiring to put only a lump of coal in my Uncle Mark's stocking.

I remember all of us cousins taking various positions on the floor in order to tear into our presents. I remember getting a new watch as one of my presents, and the game "Bop, Bop, 'N Rebob" as another. (Side note: if you don't know what that game is, look it up. I'm sure my parents frequently regretted buying it as it is easily one of the most annoyingly noisy games to ever exist).

I also remember using that year as evidence that Santa does exist. After all, I never saw any packages being packed into our van when we made the trek from Cambridge down to Sioux City. So it had to have been Santa who got them to grandpa's house. (Second side note: I later learned my parents slyly packed them all up in garbage bags and they were in fact in the car the whole time. In hindsight, I should have figured that out since the wrapping paper was the same as we had in Cambridge. But remember, I was nine at the time.)

Finally, I remember us taking an unplanned trip out to Wyoming at my grandpa's behest, which brought other memories of sledding down a hill in my aunt and uncle's back yard despite one of my cousins having a cast on her arm.

I guess what I'm trying to get at here is that yes, this Christmas season generally sucks. We have a once-in-a-lifetime pandemic. We have government and health officials strongly urging us to not travel and to limit our gatherings to a small, select few family members. We also have massive, heated differences of opinion on said pandemic, along with almost every other topic under the sun.

At the same time, Christmas, or anything else in life, is only as bad as we make it out to be. If all we do is dwell on the negative, our memories will be nothing but negative. But if we suck it up and make the best of the hands we are dealt, we will be left with mostly good memories despite the otherwise bad conditions.

Sure, I was nine at the time of my grandma's death, and kids are resilient, especially when it comes to things like Christmas. But there's no reason why adults can't maintain that resilience from their childhood.

So, from myself and the rest of the staff at the *Isanti-Chisago County Star*, no matter how different or difficult this year might be, we Wish you a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

It's also a good time to take the family to enjoy the lighting displays. When our children were young we did that every year. Many times it was done following the early Christmas Eve service or after a Christmas concert at church.

**FAMILIES HAVE MANY** traditions that build memories which are lasting. Ours have ranged from ethnic foods, singing Christmas carols around the piano, putting on skits, reading the Christmas story in Luke 2 and opening gifts from youngest to oldest or vice versa.

This year COVID-19 may have a major affect on those traditions. Finding a way to stay in touch with extended families may require some extra creativity. ZOOM calls are easy and can be very meaningful.

**I PICKED UP** several thoughts from two South Dakota publisher friends via a ZOOM call recently.

It is hard to know what to believe because it appears there is so much misinformation and the information out there keeps changing.

**TRADITIONS WITH FOOD** bring back a lot of memories to me. Growing up in a Swedish home, on Christmas Eve lutefisk would be the entree with boiled potatoes served with white sauce. A potato sausage was also served for those who felt all the lye was not adequately soaked out of the cod fish. Lefse, lingonberries, herring, smoked oysters and even sardines were also on the table. Swedish Rye bread (Limpa) and fruit cake were served followed by a dessert of fruit soup and rice pudding. The rice pudding was often topped with strawberries.

Lutefisk and lefse prompted a lot of teasing between the Norwegians and Swedes.

**WHEN YOU HEAR** a Norwegian using the word "Uff da" they are expressing a frustration. Let me share a couple of incidences which prompt the use of "Uff da"... waking yourself up in church with your own snoring... noticing non-Norwegians at a church dinner using lefse for a napkin... getting swished in the face with a cow's wet tail.

As I discovered that I was adopted and learned that my ancestry was Norwegian and Danish, I quickly switched from white sauce to drawn butter on my lutefisk.

**MARRYING A GERMAN** has introduced me to new foods such as spare ribs, sauerkraut and potato pancakes. A couple of our German foreign exchange guests through Rotary introduced us to pretzels, white sausage and beer for breakfast.

**THERE ARE FEWER** mailed Christmas cards this year, perhaps due to the convenience of the Internet and savings on postage. Keeping up the mailing list is difficult.

**CHRISTMAS IS WHEN** we celebrate the birth of Jesus and recognize that He is God's Son who came into the world to sacrifice His life for our sins so that all who believe may have eternal life.

We trust that you will have joy and peace in your hearts and that the New Year will continue to bring you God's favors.

She was preceded in death by her husband Jack, parents Ken and Leone, five sisters and many friends.

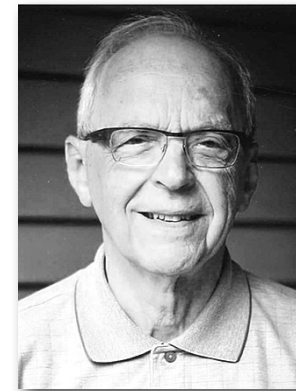

# Ziebarth signs with University of North Dakota Fighting Hawks

In Cambridge-Isanti's long and illustrious football history, the Jackets have produced a number of high-caliber college recruits, with a select number of them playing for Division I programs. Within their most recent history, however, none of those players were at skilled positions such as quarterback, running back, or wide receiver. That trend was stopped last Wednesday, Dec. 16, as standout running back Gaven Ziebarth put pen to paper and accepted a scholarship offer to play for the University of North Dakota Fighting Hawks. Although it was made official during National Signing Day a week ago, Ziebarth, who came into his senior season ranked as one of the top running backs in the state, knew he was destined to play D1 football quite a while ago, verbally committing to the Fighting Hawks last June. He had also received D1 scholarship offers from both Army and Air Force.

"It felt like home," Ziebarth said of the UND campus. "The coaches were really interested in me, and I had a good relationship with them, so that ultimately led to my decision."

"It's a lot of excitement (officially signing)," he added. "I've been waiting for this a long time as a kid."

Just looking at his numbers, its

easy to see why D1 schools showed an interest in him. According to head coach Shane Weibel, Ziebarth finished his Bluejacket career in seventh place all-time in career rushing yards with 2,584, and sixth all-time in career touchdowns with 29.

His senior season, he rushed for 1,092 yards and 12 touchdowns in just seven games, which was more like six games after he had to leave the Chisago Lakes game with an apparent head injury in the first quarter.

It was that injury, however, that seemed to kick start his season. In the three games before, Ziebarth was relatively held in check by defenses keying on him. After only being able to pick up 83 yards against Waseca, he did rush for 191 yards and one touchdown versus Monticello and 160 yards and two touchdowns versus Hutchinson. However, much of those yards and scores came later in the games after the score had become lopsided.

For the last two games of the season, Ziebarth exploded for 220 yards and four touchdowns versus Tartan and then topped that with a 307 yard, five touchdown finale in the section semi-finals versus Coon Rapids. As best as anyone with historical knowledge of the program can remember, the five touchdowns in a single game is a school record.

"I was pretty upset (during the Chisa-

go Lakes game) because I couldn't play, and it was my last season so I really didn't want to sit there," he said regarding being motivated after the injury.

Ziebarth, however, didn't take total credit for the successful last games.

"The whole team came together and played better," he said. "I don't think it was just me. It was my line blocking better."

While his high school football career

is now over, Ziebarth's high school athletic career still has a little life left. Ziebarth, who during his sophomore season was actually a four-sport athlete as he played hockey during the winter and baseball and track - where he was a medal winner in three events - during the spring, said he is planning on still playing hockey for the Jackets and running in track this spring, COVID permitting.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CITY ZONING CODE, ORDINANCE 445
SECTION 2: DEFINITIONS AND SECTION 15: FENCING, SCREENING, AND LANDSCAPING

The City Council of the City of Isanti does ordain:
Section 1 – Amendment. Ordinance 445, Section 2: Definitions, and Section 15: Fencing, Screening and Landscaping are hereby amended as follows:

Section 2: Definitions is amended and replaced with the following:
Premium Topsoil
As defined by MNDOT specification standards.
Section 15: Fencing, Screening, and Landscaping is amended and replaced with the following:

Subdivision 1: General Provisions.
B. Maintenance. All fences shall be properly maintained, so as not to become unsightly, hazardous, or constitute a nuisance. Damaged and destroyed fences shall be removed and replaced within thirty (30) days upon written notice from the Community Development Director or his/her designee.

Subdivision 2: Residential Fences
B. Exceptions. The following exceptions apply to residential fences.
4. Screening fences, as required by Chapter 227, Article II of the City Code of the City of Isanti; for screening of stored recreational vehicles within the side or rear yard shall meet one of the following acceptable screening options: (Ord. No. 608)

a. A fencing screen per Subdivision 4(A) of this Section and shall obscure from view at ground level any neighboring property or public street by at least 80% of the area.
b. Installation of a planting screen. Where natural materials, such as trees or hedges are approved in lieu of required screening by means of walls or fences, density and species of planting shall be such to achieve 80% opaqueness year-round from view at ground level at any neighboring property or public street.

(1) Acceptable plantings include arborvitae, upright juniper, upright yew, fountain hemlock, or other species approved by the Community Development Director or his/her designee.

(5) All planting screens shall be reviewed and approved by the Community Development Director or his/her designee.

(6) Planting screens shall be maintained in a healthy condition. Dead material shall be removed and replaced within thirty (30) days upon written notice of the Community Development Director or his/her designee.

Subdivision 4: Screening Fences and Planting Screens
B. Planting Screens.
3. Planting screens shall be maintained in a healthy condition. Dead material shall be removed and replaced within thirty (30) days upon written notice of the Community Development Director or his/her designee.

Subdivision 5: Landscaping Requirements
C. Residential Requirements. In addition to the general requirements noted, properties located within residential districts, shall be subject to the following regulations.
1. Soil Requirements. All disturbed areas that are not planned to receive an impervious surface shall be graded and finished with a minimum layer of four (4) inches of Premium Topsoil that is screened, pulverized and in compliance with the requirements as defined by MNDOT specifications.

a. The topsoil shall be hauled from a pre-approved source certified by the Minnesota Department of Transportation or the material shall be tested by an independent laboratory hired by the applicant. Any material tested that is not within MNDOT Standards will be considered not in compliance and rejected from use within the City limits.

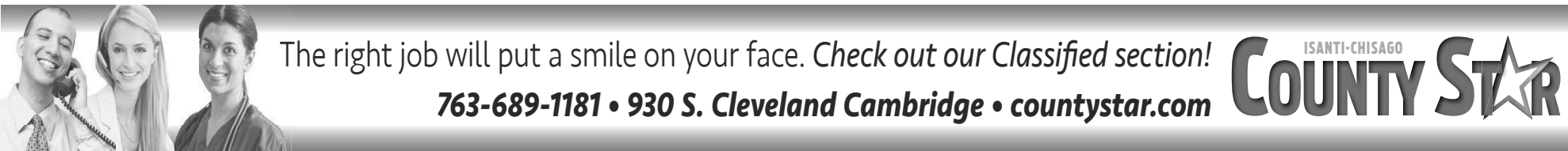
