Cambridge council approves conduit financing

The proposed 180-unit affordable apartment complex being considered for the property just north of the former Perkins site has once again been given the green light as the Cambridge City Council approved a request for providing conduit financing to Reuter Walton, the developer of the project.

The project, which includes one, two, and three-bedroom apartments, previously ran into a stoplight after the council rejected a tax increment financing request last month.

Since that time, the developer and city staff were able to agree on a modification to the city's requirements for the project in order to decrease the total cost enough so that a TIF was no longer required to go forward with the project. Those modifications include shortening the required extension of Garfield Street North to end at the northern property line of the development, plus eliminating the construction of a street connecting Garfield to Emerson Street North.

The conduit financing request had originally come before the council in June 2025, at which time the council preliminarily approved it. In January 2026, the State of Minnesota approved allocating \$17 million in tax-exempt

conduit bonds for the project. One of the conditions of the allocation is the city/developer had 180 days to "use it or lose it." That deadline is on July 10.

During a presentation at the June 15 council meeting, Paul Keenan of Reuter Walton explained they were motivated to continue trying to construct this project based on the success of the company's other affordable housing complex in Cambridge — Bridgewell Apartments. According to Keenan, Bridgewell has seen 100% occupancy since day one.

Keenan said their market study revealed there is currently a 5% vacancy rate of apartments within the city, however "all that vacancy was in market-rate product." He added they found only one vacancy out of 177 units of what they call "workforce" (aka "affordable") housing.

"That tells us there is a high need for workforce housing just below the market-rate rents," he said.

He added that none of the apartment complexes Reuter Walton owns is classified as Section 8 housing.

WHAT IS WORKFORCE HOUSING?

Workforce, or affordable housing, is defined as units whose rent is capped based on a formula using a given

Where do we go from here?

Isanti County ponders alternative funding for new highway department facility

After having their "Plan A" of paying for a new highway department facility through an increase in the local sales tax denied by the State Legislature, the Isanti County Commissioners are now tasked with figuring out what "Plan B" might be.

According to Finance Director Chad Struss, extensive discussion among the facilities budget committee has resulted in recommending a combination of four or five different funding sources: a wheelage tax increase, expiring debt service levy, reallocate existing road and

bridge capital funding to facility debt service, property tax levy commitment, and proceeds from the sale of existing property.

Struss said the wheelage tax could be increased by \$10, which would bring in approximately \$440,000. The wheelage tax is collected with all license plate tab renewals by Isanti County residents.

The second source would be from the expiration of two 10-year bonds that were issued in 2017. This would be a levy-neutral move, where, rather than the levy decreasing due to the expiring debt, the

percentage of the area median income. For this project, 177 of the apartments would be capped based on 60% of the AMI, with three single-bedroom apartments being capped based on 30% of the AMI. Those three apartments would have rents under \$700 a month, while the rest will range from approximately \$1,300 per month to around \$1,700 per month.

"The point of this program is to offer people \$150 to \$200 discounts over the market-rate rents," Keenan said. "That gives them the ability to stabilize their budget. They are not deeply subsidized rents. These are rents that residents will need to show that they have income and they have the ability to pay the rent."

At the same time, tenants cannot have an annual income over a certain amount that is based on the number of family members at the time they initially move in. They must also report their current income on a yearly basis in order to renew their lease. They are allowed to continue renting even if that income eclipses the maximum amount by less than 140%. For simple math, if the maximum income is set at \$50,000, the tenant can continue renting until their income eclipses \$70,000.

increase their income and be able to stay in stable housing," Keenan said.

WHO WILL LIVE THERE?

Keenan said following the TIF meeting, he went back and took a look at the origins of the people renting at Bridgewell, plus those who are on the waiting list.

"The top five previous residences of the renters came from Cambridge, Isanti, North Branch, Mora, and Braham," Keenan said. "This is meant to show it is this region that this project will serve."

COUNCIL SPLIT

Following an extended public comment period and council discussion, the council voted 3-2 to authorize the issuance of conduit revenue in the amount of \$17 million. Council members Molly Christian and Aaron Berg cast the nay votes.

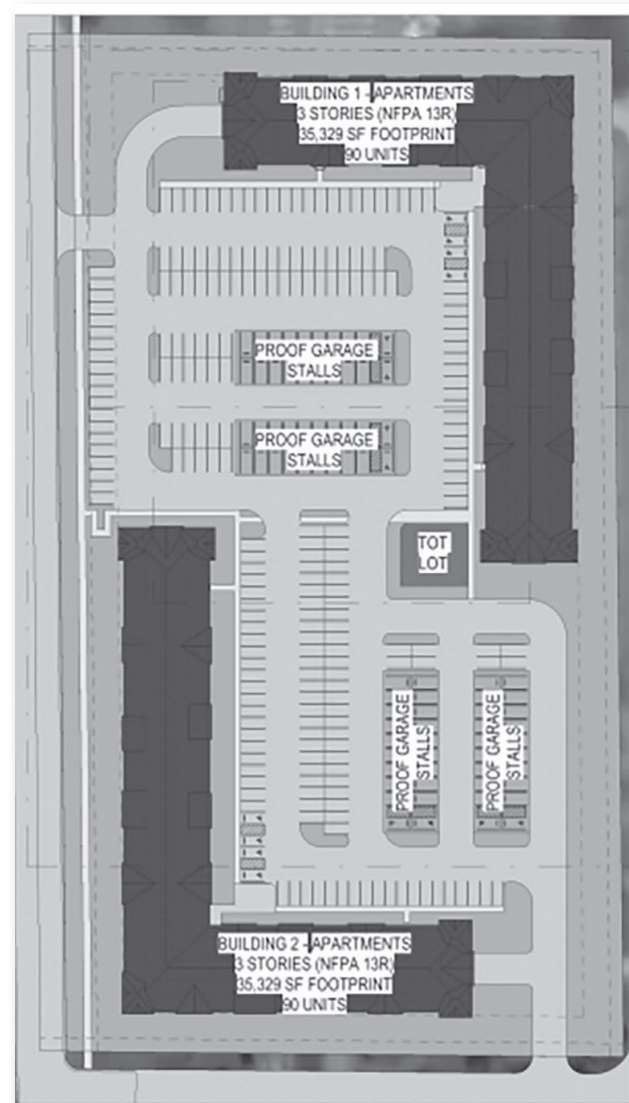
Christian repeated her general opposition to the project, citing concerns over unmentioned possible financial implications beyond

the city limits of Cambridge. She also mentioned that while campaigning for election in 2024, one of the most frequently mentioned items was residents didn't want more apartment complexes.

Berg said he wasn't against affordable housing; however, he wanted to see an updated housing study from the one the city commissioned in 2024 before he could approve this project.

In casting yes votes, Council member Mark Ziebarth countered Christian's statement, noting while he was campaigning in 2024, he heard a large number of residents who felt more affordable housing was needed. Mayor Jim Godfrey pointed to the financial benefits for the city, including an increased tax base, the conduit fee the city would collect, plus SAC/WAC fees and park dedication fees.

Phone and Internet Discounts Available to CenturyLink Customers

The Minnesota Public Utilities Commission designated CenturyLink as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier within its service area for universal service purposes. CenturyLink's basic local service rates for residential voice lines are \$16.32-\$29.00 per month and business services are \$35.48-\$39.86 per month. Specific rates will be provided upon request.

CenturyLink participates in the Lifeline program, which makes residential telephone or qualifying broadband service more affordable to eligible low-income individuals and families. Eligible customers may qualify for Lifeline discounts of \$5.25/month for voice or bundled voice service or \$9.25/month for qualifying broadband or broadband bundles. Residents who live on federally recognized Tribal Lands may qualify for additional Tribal benefits if they participate in certain additional federal eligibility programs. The Lifeline discount is available for only one telephone or qualifying broadband service per household, which can be either a wireline or wireless service. Broadband speeds must be at least 25 Mbps download and 3 Mbps upload to qualify.

A household is defined as any individual or group of individuals who live together at the same address and share income and expenses. Services are not transferable, and only eligible consumers may enroll in these programs. Consumers who willfully make false statements to obtain these discounts can be punished by fine or imprisonment and can be barred from these programs.

county would continue to collect the amount that was going towards the debt and use it for the new facility. This amount would be \$300,000.

The third source of reallocating existing road and bridge capital funding is less ideal, as it would mean a decrease in road reconstruction projects. Struss noted the amount would vary.

The fourth source is the least popular among the board of commissioners, as it means an increase to the county's property tax levy. Struss said the amount of this would vary depending on how much of the cost remained follow-

ing the exhaustion of all other sources. Theoretically, it could be as low as a 1% increase in 2027. By way of comparison, if the entire project was funded through the levy, the first-year increase could range anywhere from 7.14% for a \$27 million bond over 25 years, down to a 4.1% increase for \$17 million over 30 years.

Finally, the sale of the existing facility would bring in an unknown amount and obviously would be contingent on finding a buyer for the property.

The commissioners weren't ready to make a formal vote on any of the possible sources, with the exception of the wheelage tax. Since a wheelage tax increase would

need to be submitted to the State by Aug. 1 in order for it to begin on Jan. 1, 2027, the commissioners approved holding a public hearing on that at 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday, July 7. The commissioners may vote on the wheelage tax increase either following the public hearing or at the latest during their July 21 meeting.

OTHER NEXT STEPS

The other item the commissioners will be looking closely at is the building's design. To that extent, they will be holding a special meeting on Tuesday, June 23, to hear an update from the designer and to possibly modify the size and scope of the design.

matches volunteers with care center residents who
may have limited family connections or experience
loneliness.

According to organizers, research shows that
many care center residents experience moderate to

severe loneliness. Volunteers are encouraged to build
relationships with residents through regular visits
and activities such as conversation, reading, games,
puzzles and walks.

The program is open to individuals, couples, fami-
lies and friends who want to serve as companions. Or-
ganizers said families are encouraged to participate,
noting that many residents enjoy spending time with
children. Volunteers ages 16 and older may partici-
pate independently.

Kindred Hearts provides orientation, training and

ongoing support for volunteers.

A meet-and-greet event will be held at 5 p.m. July 14
at GracePointe Crossing. Community members inter-
ested in learning more about the program will have
an opportunity to meet residents and ask questions
about volunteering.

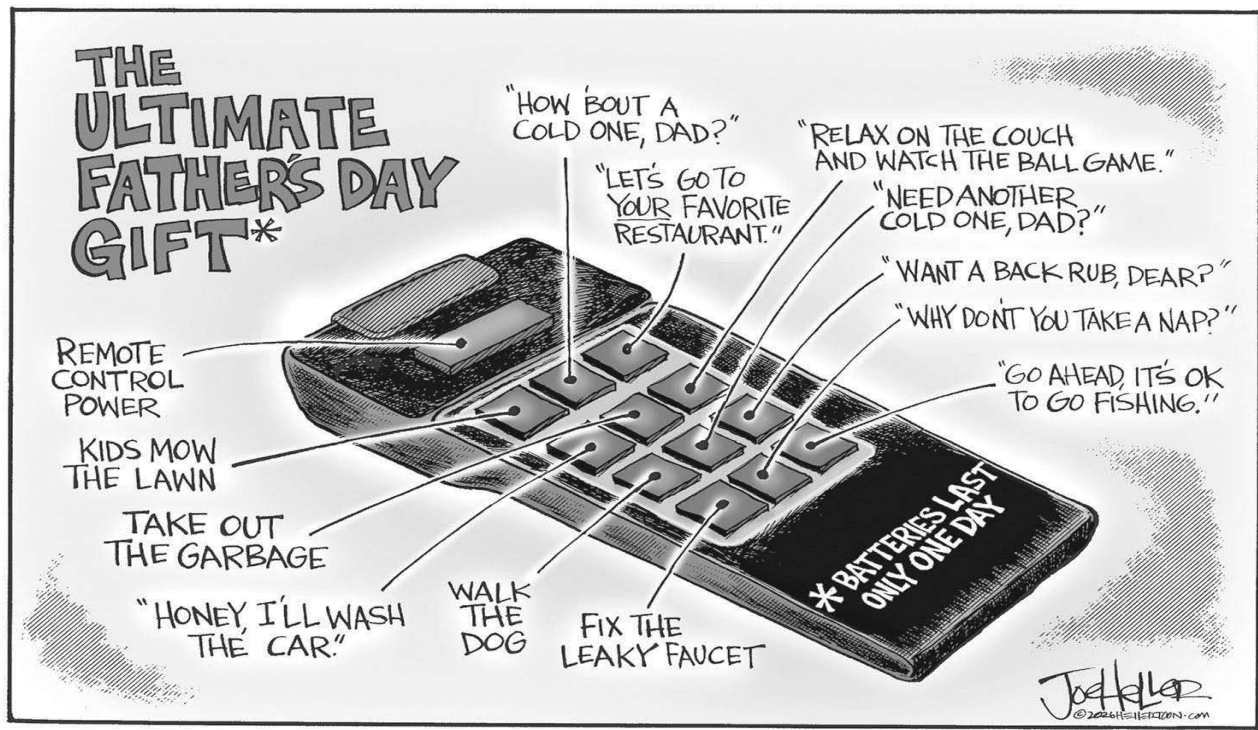

About lane splitting and filtering

Question: I saw last article talking about motorcycles. I know there was a new law last year about lane splitting. Can you write about that?

AnsWER: Lane splitting and lane filtering was legal in Minnesota as of July 1, 2025. Motorists and motorcyclists need to be aware of this new law and how it will affect them to ensure it is enacted safely and respectfully on Minnesota roadways.

Lane splitting is allowed when two or more lanes of traffic are traveling in the same direction and traffic is moving. It allows a motorcycle to pass another vehicle in the same direction of travel and in the same traffic lane only under these conditions:

- At no more than 25 miles per hour.
- No more than 15 miles per hour over the speed of traffic in the relevant traffic lanes.

Lane filtering is allowed when two or more lanes of traffic are traveling in the same direction and traffic is NOT moving. It allows a motorcycle to move through traffic that is stopped, such as at a traffic light or traffic jam, only under

this condition:

- No more than 15 miles per hour over the speed of traffic in the relevant traffic lanes.

Lane splitting and filtering cannot be performed under the following circumstances:

- At the approach, drive-through, or exit of a roundabout.
- In a school zone.
- In a work zone where only a single travel lane is available for use.
- On an on-ramp to a freeway or expressway.

Motorcyclists:

- It is your responsibility to determine if these maneuvers can safely be performed in a given situation.
- Do not perform them if you cannot do so safely and within the legal speed restrictions.

Motorists:

- Be aware of motorcycles sharing your lane in slow-moving traffic and when stopped at intersections.
- Do not impede their legal right to do so.

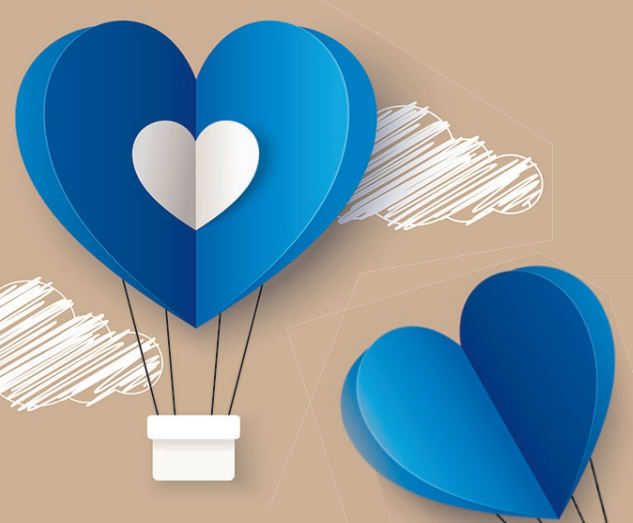

Dean Edward Lund, beloved father, grandfather, great-grandfather, farmer, veteran, and faithful servant of God, passed into the arms of Jesus on Sunday, June 14, 2026, at the age of 92. He died peacefully at his home in Maple Ridge Township, surrounded by three generations of his family.



Dean was born on September 29, 1933, on the family farm in Springvale, Minnesota. He attended the Springvale Country School through eighth grade before taking the bus to Cambridge High School, where he graduated in 1951.

In 1954, Dean received a very important letter that began with the word "Greetings." He proudly answered the call to serve

his country in the United States Army, where he served for two years. When given the opportunity to continue his military career, Dean chose instead to return home to Springvale to farm alongside his father and brother.

On July 7, 1962, Dean married the love of his life, Marie Anderson. Together they built their home and life on their farm in Maple Ridge Township. While continuing to farm, Dean and Marie welcomed three sons and created a home rooted in faith, hard work, and family.

In addition to farming, Dean worked at the Cam-

bridge State Hospital for 31 years, retiring in 1997. Even in retirement, Dean remained devoted to the farm, continuing to grow hay and sharing with his grandchildren the joy—and hard work—of baling hay during the summer months.

Dean received one of his greatest promotions in 1990 when he became a grandfather. His seven grandchildren brought him immense joy, and he delighted in teaching them his love for the outdoors, hunting, fishing, John Deere tractors, and the importance of family. Many treasured Sunday afternoons were spent exploring the farm with Grandpa, whether on foot or riding the four-wheeler.

A humble man, Dean rarely spoke about his accomplishments, yet his life reflected a quiet dedication to serving others. He shared his talents through his work on the Midland Co-op Board and in various roles at Springvale Baptist Church, where he was a lifelong member. His faith was evident not only in his words but in the way he lived his life—with integrity, kindness, and steadfast commitment to those around him.

Dean lived a full and active life, caring for his beloved farm until the very end. In fact, he was still mowing five acres of lawn just one week before entering hospice care.

Dean's sons and their families had the honor of caring for him during his last days, with the support of the dedicated nurses and CNAs of St. Croix Hospice, whose compassionate care brought comfort to Dean and his loved ones. The family is grateful for the outstanding medical care Dean received from the Cambridge Medical Center and the

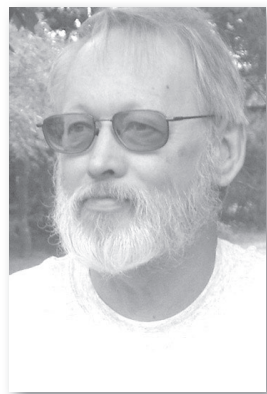

ANSWER: You can find the *Answer* form and instructions on the MN Judicial Branch website at www.mncourts.gov/forms under the "Civil" category. The instructions will explain in detail how to fill out the *Answer* form.

3. **You must respond to each claim.** The *Answer* is your written response to the Plaintiff's *Complaint*. In your *Answer* you must state whether you agree or disagree with each paragraph of the *Complaint*. If you think the Plaintiff should not be given everything they asked for in the *Complaint*, you must say that in your *Answer*.

4. **SERVICE: You may lose your case if you do not send a written response to the Plaintiff.** If you do not serve a written *Answer* within 21 days, you may lose this case by default. You will not get to tell your side of the story. If you choose

not to respond, the Plaintiff may be awarded everything they asked for in their *Complaint*. If you agree with the claims stated in the *Complaint*, you don't need to respond. A default judgment can then be entered against you for what the Plaintiff asked for in the *Complaint*.

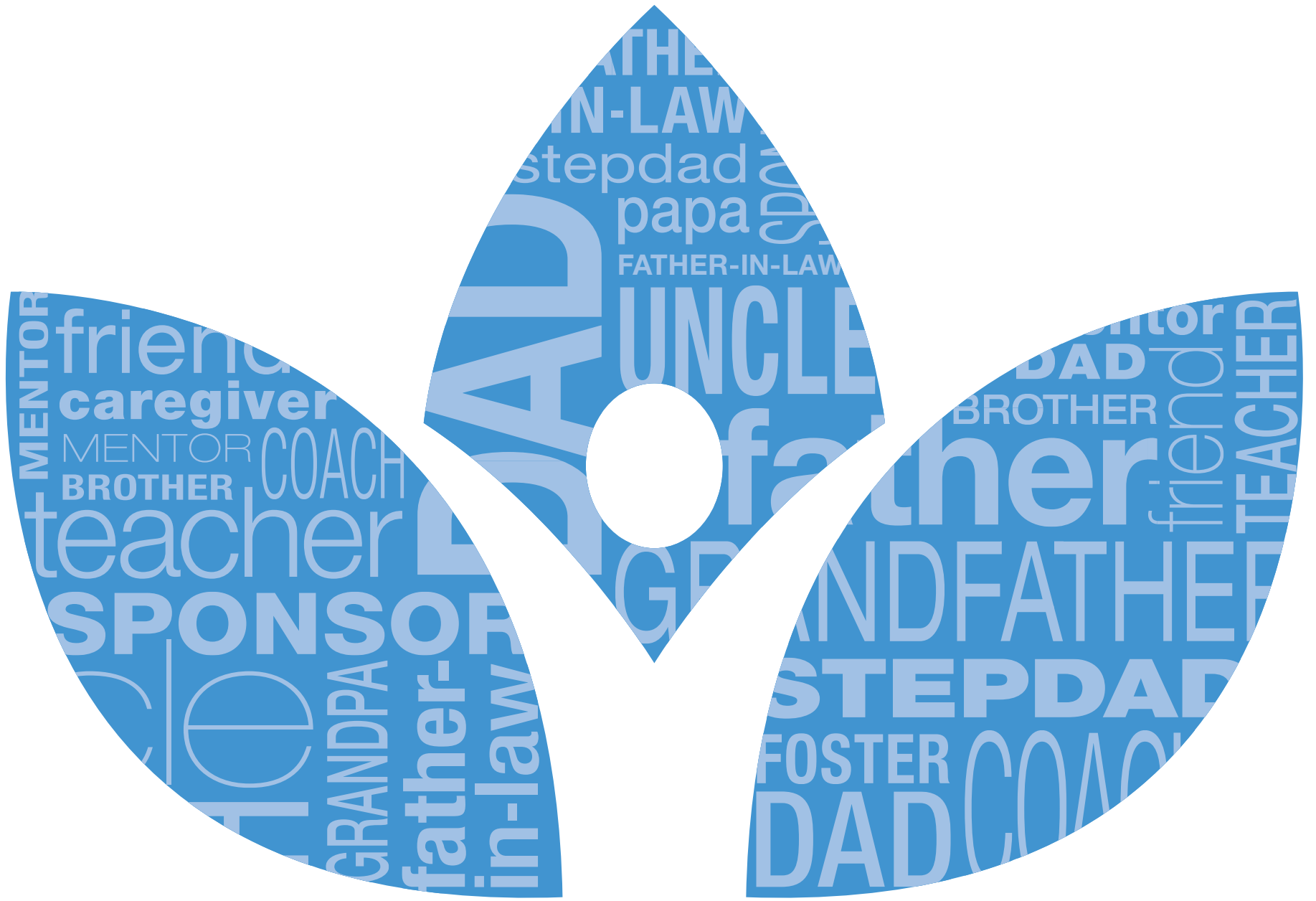
