## Closing North Branch's second liquor store becoming more likely

North Branch may have found a way out of its unprofitable second liquor store: al-

leged breaches of contract by the landlord. The West store, opened in 2017 right next to County Market in the North Branch Marketplace property, has drawn scrutiny from outside experts and city staff alike for its poor cost-to-profit ratio.

Brenda Visnovec of the Minnesota Municipal Beverage Association told the council in October 2024 that she had concerns about the second store's impact on the department from when it opened.

"I'm surprised, frankly, that it makes anything with two small stores,' told the council.

Visnovec, who has 41 years of experience

## **High School features** largest number, expense of referendum projects

Editors note: This is the first in a series of articles regarding the upcoming Cambridge-Isanti Schools referendum vote, focusing on one specific building.

When breaking down the upcoming Cambridge-Isanti Schools referendum vote into specific school buildings, the high school's portion comes out to be the largest in both number of projects, but also in the total price tag for Question #1. The high school has 35 projects, with a total estimated cost just short of \$22 million. Individually, the project costs range from \$45,000 for network-level graphics upgrade for school standardization, metal shop and gym upgrades; to \$3,929,000 for classroom additions on the northwest side of the building for World Languages, Special Education, and English

Language Learning. The high school opened in 1967, making a majority of the building 58 years old. It has gone through three additions: in 1969, 1974, and most recently in 1998. The last addition included the expanded gym space and activ ities entrance, the Performing Arts Center, additional classroom space on the west end of the building, and expansion of the

For this referendum, the high school's projects are broken down into Deferred Maintenance Improvements (\$4.5 million), Educational Adequacy Improvements (\$12,834,000), and Athletic Fields Improvements (\$4.6 million).

#### **DEFERRED MAINTENANCE**

In terms of deferred maintenance, much of that is out of the public view to items that are original to the building or are at least 50 years old.

"There is a lot of plumbing that is original to the building," Ellie Gilliam of Nexus Solutions, LLC, the facilities services planning company hired by the district.

Other items listed include supply fans, ventilation systems, a new main switchboard, security camera system replacement along with other security enhancements, and a variety of ADA updates.

The Performing Arts Center is looking at getting new curtains, theatrical lighting, plus wireless

Also included as deferred maintenance is replacing the lights at George Larson Field. According to Activities Director Matt Braaten, those lights were erected in the mid-70s when the field was

### Air quality alerts often go up in smoke

ver the last several years, there has been a noticeable addition to area weather forecasts: air quality alerts. Admittedly, a number of TV news stations have had their own air quality index report. However, now it is commonplace to

issue air quality alerts similar to a Tornado Watch or Warning.

The problem I find with these alerts is the meteorologists are trying to apply weather science to smoke forecasts. "Well, we have a cold front moving through that will drag the smoke down from the upper atmosphere to the ground, causing a 'code purple' air quality alert across the entire state. So, from 9 a.m. tomorrow morning until midnight, you should stay indoors as much as possible."

Smoke doesn't work that way. It is far more sporadic than rain or snow. It can concentrate in a valley, but be much thinner a half-mile away.

It also may start off as thicker, but then dissipate a couple hours later, only to get thicker again later in

It could also just hover a few hundred feet above the ground so you can see the haze in the sky, but not smell or react to the smoke.

Last Saturday was the perfect example of this. All the TV newscasts were warning of air quality that was unhealthy for everyone the entire day. In the morning, I believed them as I could smell the smoke from an open window at my apartment. It prompted my mom to advise that I minimize my coverage of Isanti Jubilee Days events. I was even questioning if organizers would call it off. A couple hours later, though, there was only a faint hint of a haze in the

A couple years ago, I had set up a Let's Go Fishing trip with my parents and an aunt and uncle. The day before, the meteorologists gave out an air quality warning, so we canceled. Sure enough, it wound up being perfectly blue skies.

What I think should happen is they can give something like what they do for severe weather probabilities — something like "there is a moderate risk of poor air quality tomorrow." Then, it would be up to us to take a sniff and determine if we should take shelter.



Skidded and Skunked is a musthave for local true crime lovers and a quick read for those that want a fast action, down-to-earth crime story that leaves you with answers and a need for more.





first constructed. Replacement parts do not exist anymore, and most electrical companies refuse to even try and make repairs to them.

"Upgrading our field lighting is about more than visibility it's about safety, reliability, and equity," Braaten said. "Our current stadium lights are well past their intended lifespan and on the verge of failure. It's only a matter of time before they stop working entirely, forcing the cancellation of games and events."

ATHLETIC FIELD IMPROVEMENTS The other major project that falls under improvements to the athletic fields is the installation of artificial turf at George Larson Field. Braaten said C-I is currently the largest high school in the state to not have a turf field. However, the biggest reason for this project, which will cost approximately \$2 million, is the current grass field quickly deteriorates to the point of being nearly unplayable late in the fall season, especially if the area has experienced above-average rainfall. An artificial turf field will allow for more games to be played on it, plus it could be used for other sports in the spring.

Beyond that, the district is looking at adding three more tennis courts, plus making the area ADA-compliant for spectators. Lighting would also be added to all courts.

According to Braaten, while the current seven courts are enough to hold head-to-head matches, it isn't enough to hold tournaments. Additionally, both boys' and girls tennis has seen a huge increase in students going out for the sport, which makes holding quality practices difficult.

Finally, the varsity softball field would get lighting, a more permanent sound system, plus an ADA-compliant path to the

#### **EDUCATIONAL ADEQUACY IMPROVE-MENTS**

Besides the additional space mentioned before, much of the educational improvements would be via modernizing existing spaces. There would be a new culinary arts, robotics, certified nurse assistant, and CNC/Machine Coding lab. Student Services and counseling would be "re-imagined."

"Right now, especially your nurse's office, you can't get a stretcher into it," Gilliam said.

Some of the lockers would be removed to make room for soft-seating furniture groups.

"High schoolers really don't use lockers as much as they used to," Gilliam said.

Special education would get two calming/reset rooms, plus another four regular rooms on the second floor.

There would also be two private restroom groups and 16 private changing/showers in four locker rooms at a cost of \$1.9 million. According to Community Education Direc-

### Talking summer skin health with University of Minnesota

The seasonal weather changes that come with summer are out in full force. An increase in heat, sun and humidity brings new needs for our skin, including potential health consequences that go far beyond the cosmetic.

Dr. David Pearson with the University of Minnesota Medical School and M Health Fairview talks about how to keep your skin healthy during the summer months.

Q: How do our skincare needs change in the summer?

Dr. Pearson: Our skin is in direct contact with our environment, which means external factors can have a big influence on our skin's health. Summertime in Minnesota usually leads to increased sun exposure in duration, frequency and the amount of our body's surface area that is exposed to the sun. In the short term, sun protection is important to prevent sunburns and melanin changes in the skin during the increased exposure in the summer months. In the long term, sun protection is critical in skin cancer prevention and preventing premature aging of the skin. More outdoor activities combined with higher humidity may also result in more sweating, which can be associated with skin irritation in body folds, heat rash, athlete's foot and other skin reactions. Dry skin is usually less of a problem, but it's dependent on the person and the activities they partici-

Q: What are some of the biggest skin health concerns that arise in the sum-

Dr. Pearson: Most summer skin concerns are related to sun and outdoor exposure. Sunburns, poison ivy and bug bites are all very common. Lyme disease is endemic in Minnesota and we see it frequently in its early, skin-localized form — a ring-shaped, red rash centered around a tick bite. Most of the time, Lyme disease can be treated with a relatively short course of oral antibiotics. I encourage people to thoroughly look over their skin, including their scalp, after they've been in areas known to harbor ticks, particularly in the woods or around tall grasses. In the clinic, we find a tick or two every week that people didn't know were attached.

People with autoimmune diseases may also be very sensitive to sun ex-



posure, so they have to be extra cautious. Sun exposure can even trigger systemic flares of disease in conditions like lupus erythematosus and dermatomyositis. Pigmentary disorders, like melasma, are also highly sensitive to sun exposure, and we see increased flare-ups during the summer months.

Q: What tips do you have for avoiding and treating sunburns?

Dr. Pearson: In principle, avoidance sounds straightforward. Wear sunblock, sun protective clothing and a broad-brimmed hat. Reapply sunblock every few hours and try to avoid prolonged exposure, especially during peak sunlight hours of 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. In practice, this isn't always easy, as anyone who has experienced a sunburn knows! Working sunblock into your daily skincare routine can reduce the risk of forgetting to apply it. I tell patients that I don't want reapplication to be a barrier to initial application putting sunblock on once is better than not putting it on at all. We don't want people to hide out in a dark basement, but it's important to find a balance between sun protection and enjoying

Sunburns can be treated with cool water. A cold shower is great, but a cold washcloth may be easier to tolerate if your skin is too sensitive. Overthe-counter treatments, like aloe and cooling creams, hydrocortisone and ibuprofen or other non-steroidal antiinflammatories, can be symptomatically helpful. Don't forget to stay hydrated. When the skin barrier is compromised by a sunburn, there is more water loss through the skin and people can become dehydrated easily.

Q: What are the signs and symptoms of skin cancer?

Dr. Pearson: There are a number of different types of skin cancer, but let's focus on the three most common: basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma and melanoma. All three generally have a predilection for sun-exposed areas, although there are some differences in distribution based on the type of cancer and factors such as age, sex and coexistent medical issues.

Basal cell carcinoma is the most common and accounts for about 80% of skin cancers. It's often a pink or red bump

with a shiny or pearly appearance. Squamous cell carcinomas are the next most common: these are usually pink or red, raised and may have a scaly or crusty surface. Both may be tender or painful and can ulcerate. Melanomas are usually pigmented (brown, gray or black) and often present before perceptible symptoms have developed. They may be asymmetric, have irregular borders or colors and change gradually over time (typically weeks to months). New spots or those that have changed over time may be a clue for any of these types of skin cancers. If you're in doubt, bring it to the attention of your doctors.

Q: How does your research at the University support your clinical work?

Dr. Pearson: Much of my clinical work focuses on the overlap between dermatology and rheumatology, which encompasses a spectrum of skin-related conditions and multi-system autoimmune connective tissue disorders including dermatomyositis, lupus erythematosus and vasculitis. My research is based on clinical questions and challenges that clinicians and patients see in everyday life. I am particularly interested in learning how environmental triggers of disease may influence cutaneous and systemic outcomes. For example, many of these conditions demonstrate photosensitivity the onset or exacerbation of symptoms upon exposure to UV or visible light. But the complex interactions between varying wavelengths and irradiances under environmental conditions are not fully understood. Through cross-disciplinary translational work with the Department of Mechanical Engineering, we are developing personalized detection systems to study this in the real world. Hopefully, this will lead to individualized strategies to avoid symptomatic flares.

Dr. David Pearson is an associate professor of dermatology at the University of Minnesota Medical School and a dermatologist with M Health Fairview. He is also the director of the Autoimmune Connective Tissue Diseases Specialty Clinic at the M Health Fairview Clinics and Surgery Center in Minneapolis. His research interests include environmental triggers of autoimmune connective tissue diseases, effects on quality of life and development of novel therapies for these conditions. ## Outhouse digging finds old bottles, items that shape area histories

When it comes to finding old artifacts that can help paint the history of Minnesota, Mark Youngblood has put a unique twist on it.

Youngblood, and his crew, dig up buried outhouses from all over Minnesota. In his terms, 'I dig up old outdoor toilets and trash pits for bottles and artifacts.'

The goals for such an activity, according to Youngblood, is to find bottles with embossing on them from local businesses or drugstore. Embossing is the art of carving a stamp or logo into a surface so it stands out.

"I've got a Palace Drugstore from Sandstone," Youngblood stated. Palace Drugstore is known today as Thrifty White Pharmacy.

#### **CHALLENGES AND POSITIVES**

According to Youngblood, one of the challenges of doing this as a hobby is finding a pit. "To find a pit without it being underneath a garage, or a building underneath a tree, or underneath a pool, or in someone's garden. Or it could be some plaaces where they rebuild houses, it could be in the neighbor's yard, if they cut a lot down, or something," Youngblood explained.

Some yards have as many as eight or nine pits in them, and

Sandstone generally has two or three if lucky.

The hardest part of the digs is getting the owners permission, according to Youngblood.

Being able to provide more history to the area is a highlight of the hobby, to add the history of the area.

#### **BACKSTORY**

"When I was about eight to ten years old, or so, I lived in White Bear Lake. They were doing excavating. They were dredging the lake, out in White Bear Lake, and they were dredging this at a park. I followed the trucks. I found bottles and stuff there when I was looking for scrap metal," Youngblood explained.

Youngblood continued to explain that he collected beer cans and other similar items. He figured there'd be beer cans in the dredging more than bottles. "All of a sudden, I started finding bottles, and I thought this was super cool," He concludes

Digging outhouses, however, is not a job that makes Youngblood any money. Workwise, Youngblood is self-employed and does scrap metal. He also sells used appliances and buys and sells on online.

#### THE DIGS

Youngblood said he hooked up with another guy that had a common interest with him.

Then another man joined that did a lot of scrap and items like that, and soon, the Old Minnesota Bottle group was formed. Youngblood and his group have dug together for 25 years. Youngblood himself, has been digging for 52 years.

As for the bottles that are dug up, Youngblood explained that he cleans them up and divide them up against the diggers to see if any of them wish to keep some. "Some cities are better than others for having embossed bottles with the town on them, like a beer bottle or a soda bottle form the town. I display them, I collect them, I sell some of them."

Mainly, he adds, he mostly just collects them.

As for things he's found, Youngblood stated the most interesting things he's found has been benches, rings, doll heads, bottles, and even dentures.

In order to find the outhouses, the crew uses a long, metal rod and sticks it into the ground. If it goes all they way down without meeting too much resistance, the chances of their being an underground outhouses there is higher.

### Apply for special youth deer hunts through Aug. 15

Once again in 2025, young people will be able to hunt deer with an adult in a number of state parks during several application-only special youth deer hunts. These hunts offer more individualized experiences in unique places, and often on different dates than the statewide youth deer season. "The special youth deer

hunts create positive experiences and also help state parks manage their deer populations," said Paul Burr, acting big game program coordinator with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. "Youth who apply can explore new places to hunt in state parks with great opportunities to see and harvest deer and make great hunting memories."

These firearms hunts are for youth who are ages 12-15 at the time of the hunt and are accompanied by an adult. Hunters can apply for a limited number of permits through Friday, Aug. 15.

Young hunters can also participate in special youth archery opportunities. Sand Prairie Wildlife Manage ment Area in Sherburne County is open only to youth archery hunters ages 10-17 during the regular archery season. Camp Ripley in Morrison County offers a special youth archery hunt for ages

Special youth deer hunts are different from the statewide youth deer season, which takes place Oct. 16-19 and does not require an application. More information on special hunts is available on the DNR website (mndnr. gov/specialdeerhunts). For more information on the Camp Ripley youth archery hunt, contact Jan Ekert, Minnesota State Archery As sociation, at jancrs1@gmail. com or 320-339-9927.

In most instances, hunters may only possess and use nontoxic ammunition when participating in a special firearms hunt in a Minnesota state park. However, nontoxic ammunition requirements do not apply to special youth hunts in the shotgun-use area if hunters remove all parts of harvested deer from the field, including the entrails.

Where nontoxic ammunition is required, bullets, slugs, muzzleloader ammunition and other single projectiles must be made entirely of nontoxic material approved by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. For deer hunting, this typically means copper ammunition. More details about nontoxic ammunition can be found on the DNR website (mndnr. gov/specialdeerhunts).~MNDNR

### **LIQUOR:** City may take action based on alleged contract breach by mall manager

in municipal liquor, said two stores mean about double the operating expenses. Between 2017 and 2018, sales only increased 24%, while operating expenses increased 67% and repair and maintenance increased 71%. Further, since 2017, depreciation has increased by about \$100,000.

What's more, also in 2024, former interim City Administrator Linda Woulfe uncovered excessive property tax charges to the city, allegedly in violation of the store's lease. The city voted in 2023 to extend the lease another five years.

At the time, Woulfe said this may mean the city is entitled to a refund, with the goal of

settling the matter in such a way that both parties abide by the lease terms.

At a recent council meeting, City Administrator Matthew Hill said while the city received credit for its overpayment in 2024, it is still being overcharged in 2025.

"We are still fighting them on this," Hill said.

Further, the city's lease entitles it to sign space, which it lost when Chipotle Mexican Grill and Starbucks Coffee opened on the property more than a year ago — and which it has still not regained, Hill
