Cambridge uncertain how to handle dueling cannabis store applications

The city of Cambridge finds itself stuck between a rock and a hard place in regards to the seemingly simultaneous submission of two cannabis distributor applications.

Almost exactly one year ago, when the Cambridge Council was determining how many cannabis stores would be allowed within city limits, the council approved going with the minimum allowed by the state of one. At that time, the council was split between allowing one or two, however a compromise was reached to go with one with the understanding the council could raise it to two at any

Based on the current improbable turn of events, that is exactly what City Administrator Evan Vogel recommended the council do

According to Community and Economic Development Director Marcia Westover, the city received the two applications on the exact same day. She said both applications are fully filled out and meet all city zoning codes and ordinances. She added both prospective owners have been working closely with the city to supply site plans and any other requested business plans. She concluded by saying she and city attorney Liz Vieira could not come up with any findings of facts to legally deny either of the applications.

Westover said during the Planning Commission's public hearing on both applications, the only concerns voiced was the location of one of the proposed locations — 130 Cleveland Street North, was directly adjacent to residential properties, needed a considerable amount of site improvement, and would most likely be inaccessible during the second phase of the

Highway 95 reconstruction project. However, since those concerns weren't legal findings, the Planning Commission felt their hands were tied and they had no choice but to recommend increasing the maximum to two.

Vogel emphasized because of that, if the

North Branch voters to decide technology levy extension

North Branch area voters will weigh in on renewing ISD 138's technology levy at a special election on February

The 3.203 tax rate, approved for 10 years in 2017, will continue, and will raise \$1,159,344 in 2028, its first year, if bassea.

The renewal is tax-neutral, according to Todd Tetzlaff, the district's director of finance and human resources, which means a successful renewal will not raise property taxes.

"Renewing the levy preserves the current level of investment," Tetzlaff said via email, "allowing the district to maintain safe, reliable technology and infrastructure systems without

"This is significantly different than the questions voters were asked to support in neighboring districts," Tetzlaff

Unlike some school levies, state law requires capital projects levies to go before voters again at the end of their term, Tetzlaff said.

The levy amounts to a \$72 yearly

charge on a hypothetical \$250,000 home, according to Shelby McQuay, a senior municipal advisor and managing director of Ehlers Inc., the district's financial advisor.

That charge pays for upgrades to building security, cybersecurity, classroom instruction technology, "preventative maintenance and energy-efficient improvements that reduce long-term $\overline{\text{costs}},$ " among other things, Tetzlaff said via email.

Board chairperson Tim MacMillan expressed gratitude for Superintendent Sara Paul's leadership, noting the district is in a better financial position than it was in the past.

"This is good fiscal management," MacMillan said, "of doing the right things, and applying small amounts, so we don't have bigger problems down the

The 2017 levy was approved by voters along with two bond questions, funds from both of which were used to perform safety system and ventilation upgrades to existing buildings, an expansion of the high school adding gym space and a weight room, among other projects.

council was to choose between the two, it would open itself up for a lawsuit from the owner not chosen.

"When you deny, you have to be able to articulate the reason for denial," Vogel said. "I am not sure that exists here."

Additionally, based on state statute, once the city's population eclipses 12,500, the city must increase its maximum number to at least two. He said based on current population projections, this will happen within the next two years.

"I want you to be aware there is a risk (of a lawsuit) for a conversation that is coming back in a year-and-a-half anyway," Vogel added. "I am trying to protect the city's financial interests going forward. We might not get sued, but we might. We are going to be talking about a second application in a year-and-a-half. We

are two summers away from a population of 12,500. And it (state statute) isn't 13,00, it isn't 17,000, it is 12,501. That's the population number in which we will have no choice but to allow two licenses."

Council member Aaron Berg immediately made a motion to keep the maximum number of stores at one and to approve the application for the store to be located at 626 Main Street North.

During discussion, the council bounced several possible solutions that didn't include increasing the maximum. Council member Bob Shogren asked if the site on Cleveland Street was too close to a daycare center on Cleveland Street South. Westover said based on city ordinance, it has to be at least 500 feet away, and that location was just over that minimum distance. According to Google Maps, the daycare center is

one-tenth of a mile away, which equates to 528 feet.

The council also floated the idea of simply flipping a coin to determine which application to approve. Vieira stated she believed that would legally be considered an "arbitrary" decision, which opens the city up for litigation. After doing some quick research, Vieira altered her determination, saying a coin flip still wasn't allowed, but the city could hold

a "lottery.'

WHICH CAME FIRST?

The council also asked if it could be decided based on a "first-come, first-served" basis. Westover said that isn't written anywhere in the city's ordinance; however, "that is what we have been telling everyone." Again, after some quick research, Vieira stated the city could make a legal determination based on that premise. That revelation, however, only made the matter more complicated.

Originally, Westover said both applications were hand-delivered on the same day, but one was dropped off at the zoning office and one was dropped off at the police department. This prompted a discussion on whether security cameras could be utilized to obtain a time stamp of exactly when each application was

turned in. That idea was somewhat squashed as one of the prospective owners corrected Westover, saying he emailed his application. He said the timestamp of the email being sent was "12:47." The other owner, who was also present at the council meeting, didn't volunteer an approximate time his application was dropped off.

After further discussion, Berg agreed to rescind his motion in order to table the topic until the Dec. 1 council meeting, so staff can see if video can be found indicating when the one application was physically turned in. In doing so, Berg informed the rest of the council that he will again make a motion on Dec. 1 to keep the maximum at one store.

State park visitors can also enjoy several free events on Nov. 28 (mndnr.gov/ptcalendar) including a naturalist-led hike at Wild River State Park, a Free Park Day scavenger hunt at Gooseberry Falls State Park, and a chance to learn about rep-

tiles up close at Lake Maria State Park. Visitors are encouraged to plan ahead for their

Check visitor alerts and find directions on state

park and recreation area webpages (mndnr.gov/park-list) and follow any safety signs posted at the site.

Before a trip, download the free Avenza app and the park or recreation area's GeoPDF map. Avenza will display a user's current location even when not connected to the internet or cell service, a feature that is particularly useful in areas where cell service is spotty or nonexistent. Find additional information on the DNR's GeoPDF webpage (mndnr.gov/geopdf). Visitors can also pick up paper maps outside each park's ranger station.

Check the weather forecast before leaving home and dress appropriately for the conditions.


Visit the information signs near the park entrance for suggestions on what to see and do.

nce again, the State of Minnesota's handling of legalizing cannabis use and sales has been exposed for the mess it is. Unfortunately, this evidence comes at the expense of a gigantic headache for the city of



As reported in this week's edition, the Cambridge Council has been placed in a virtual no-win situation regarding the city's imposed maximum number of cannabis retailers that can be located within city limits. The city had previously established what the state mandated as being the minimum number of retailers for a city with a population under 12,500, which is only one store.

Normally, there wouldn't be a problem with this, but in a turn of events few, if anyone, would have predicted, Cambridge received two equally eligible and acceptable applications on the exact same day. So, with a cap of only one, the council is being tasked with choosing between the

One of the major talking points we have heard coming from discussions regarding approving such applications is the council must have a well-established legal reason to reject an application, lest the city opens itself up to a lawsuit. The catchphrase we keep hearing is the application "can't be arbitrarily or seditiously denied." Isanti City Administrator Josi Wood even went so far as to advise the council unanimously approve eligible applications.

Cambridge City Administrator Evan Vogel emphasized the possibility of a lawsuit in this case as the primary reason for recommending the council simply amend its ordinance to allow for two stores within city limits. He backed that up with the accurate fact that in the near future, the city's population will eclipse the magical 12,500 mark, thus forcing the city to allow for two stores.

I respectfully disagree with this recommendation. In today's lawsuit-happy society, any action the council takes could turn into a lawsuit, no matter how common that action might be. Plus, given the insane instability of the state's legalized cannabis program, the possibility of a


lawsuit for any reason whatsoever is high.

As unpleasant as having to defend a lawsuit might be, Cambridge's situation would make for a very compelling case study. It is the state's micromanaging of local government that has painted Cambridge into a corner. By having such identically eligible applicants based on state statute and city zoning codes and ordinances, the city is forced to find a way to choose between the two for reasons other than the legally definable ones. In this case, the city noted one of the proposed sites is directly adjacent to residential properties, is just outside the minimum allowable distance from a daycare center, and is in greater disrepair than the

I am far from a legal expert, but to me citing these facts accomplishes the spirit of the requirement that denials not be "arbitrary or seditious." Think of it being "tie-breaking criteria.'

The council does have one final straw to grasp at in invoking "first come, first served" as their tie-breaker. Failing that, it is my opinion they stick to their guns of only one cannabis retailer, choose between the two and let the chips fall where they may, especially considering they very well would be facing a darned if you do, darned if you

Post mortem on the referendum

I was at a community meeting a couple of weeks ago and a person facilitating the meeting stated that a community's schools are the major identity of the community. During the referendum I was criticized because I voiced an opinion about this major institution in my community.

That really didn't bother me because I knew my intentions were to help members of our community that would be hurt by the cost of these unrealistic referendums. Now it is time to look at how these referendums, that overwhelmingly failed, were placed on a ballot.

I believe there were two main reasons. First, as we now know, the no votes were nearly 50% more than the yes votes for question #1 and nearly twice as many no votes as yes votes for question #2. However, the seven member school board voted unanimously to place these unrealistic referendums on the ballot. Doesn't this tell us that this board is out of touch with the community they are elected to serve?

Secondly, the school administration put together a steering committee where more than half of that committee receives payments from the school district. This is a direct conflict of interest. Again, I place this on the school board. Where is the oversight?

Are you aware that this board, according to govsalaries.com and opengovpay.com gave this administration's superintendent a 29% salary increase, last year even though he was paid significantly over the state superintendent average? This is for a district with dismal proficiency ratings (i.e. high school math proficiency 35%, third grade reading proficiency 37% according to Niche.com and the american experiment.com)?

However, there is hope. Next year, 2026, four of the seven school board members will be up for election. How NBAPS makes weather decisions

s winter weather becomes a more regular part of our days, it's important for families to know how North Branch Area Public Schools makes weather-related decisions. Families rely on timely, accurate information, and I want to share what goes into

these early-morning decisions so you know what to expect when conditions become challenging.

Two values guide every decision we make: the importance of maintaining a predictable and consistent school schedule for students and families, and the safety of our students and staff when weather presents challenges. Whenever it is safe to do so, keeping school open and on schedule is our goal, and when conditions make travel unsafe, we will adjust as needed.

Because consistency and safety matter so much, it is also important to be clear about what we avoid.

North Branch Area Public Schools does not dismiss students early once the day has begun. We know that many families cannot adjust midday without notice, and unexpected early releases can create safety and supervision challenges for students.

With those guiding principles in mind, our planning begins long before the sun comes up. On evenings when winter weather is in the forecast, we closely monitor weather reports, radar, and updates from local agencies to understand what might be coming and when. If conditions appear likely to affect travel for the following school day, the preparation doesn't wait until morning.

When the forecast suggests that weather may impact the start of school, the early-morning work begins. Around 3:00 a.m., we partner with our transportation provider to compare updated forecasts with what we are able to observe firsthand. This early check helps us understand how conditions are developing versus what was predicted the night before.

Shortly after that assessment, the window for making a decision approaches. By 5:30 a.m., based on our evaluations, along with forecasts and operational readiness, we decide whether to:

Continue with a normal schedule, Move to a two-hour late start, or

Close school for the day

Close school for the day.

Once the decision is made, communication follows promptly. NBAPS sends updates directly to families through automated calls and emails, the district website, social media, and local television and radio stations. Messages are sent by 5:45 a.m. so families have as much time as possible to plan for their morning.

Even with this careful process, we also recognize the limits of weather prediction. We are humble enough to acknowledge that we might not get it exactly right every time. Weather can change quickly, and forecasts don't always match what we see on the ground, but we make each decision with care and with the best information we have at the moment.


Because we all play a role in winter safety, there are also steps we all can take to increase safety on our roads. Giving ourselves extra time in the morning, fully scraping off vehicles, bundling up, and slowing down on the roads all contribute to a safer commute for everyone.

While winter can certainly test our routines, there is still so much to get out and enjoy, and it's part of what makes living in Minnesota so special. Vikings have so much to look forward to this winter! Thank you for doing your part as we work together to ensure safety on our roads, enjoying all the events planned for this winter and adjusting schedules as needed.

How to navigate a four-way stop safely

uestion: At a 4-way stop, when 2 cars stop at exactly the same time, which one has the right of way? Is it the car on your left? It seems like no one

knows what to do these days and everyone just sits there.

Answer: That is a good question for a good topic. Right-of-way and yielding laws help traffic flow smoothly and safely. They are based on courtesy and common sense. Violating these laws is a leading

cause of traffic crashes.

• Intersections without traffic lights or signals: When you reach an intersection at the same time as another driver, the driver on the left must yield to the one on the right.

• All-way stops or flashing red traffic lights: When you reach an intersection at the same time as another driver, the driver on the left must yield to the one on the right.

• Left turns: When you want to make a left turn, you must yield to vehicles approaching from the opposite direction that are in the intersection or close enough to pose a risk of a crash.

• Green arrow signal for left turn: When a green arrow signals that you are allowed to turn left, you must yield to other vehicles or pedestrians already in the intersection. After yielding, you may continue in the direction of the arrow.

• Uncontrolled "T" intersections: When you approach an uncontrolled "T" intersection, you must yield to all cross traffic if you are the one turning.

• Entering a public road from a private road or driveway: You must stop and yield to pedestrians and traffic.

• Transit and metro mobility bus-

es: When driving in the right lane, you must yield to transit and metro mobility buses merging from a bus stop or shoulder. This includes yielding to any school bus trying to enter the lane from a shoulder, a right-turn lane, or other location where the school bus has stopped to load or unload passengers. The school bus must use the left turn signal to indicate intent to move into the right-hand lane.

• Funeral processions: When a funeral procession identifies itself with headlights or hazard warning lights, you must yield to the entire procession.

 Pedestrians: You must yield to pedestrians crossing at intersections and crosswalks, whether marked or unmarked.

Fraley hired as new Public Works Director

Lindstrom's loss is North Branch's gain as the city council narrowly approved Matt Fraley as its new director of public works.

The two nay-sayers, council members Jim Ibinger and Jeff Goulet, complained of a lack of consultation with the full council during the hiring process.

Fraley will replace Shawn Williams, a veteran city employee, who resigned in September shortly after the city celebrated his 30-year employment anniversary.

Several individuals have spoken out against the city since Williams' resignation, including former council member Kelly Neider, claiming he was walked off the job and that losing him was a mistake

According to the staff report, Fraley was one of seven applicants, from a total pool of 43, who proceeded to an interview. Fraley has a certificate in public works and has completed further university-based learning in public works leadership. He has 19 years of public works experience, mostly in leadership roles.

The selection committee consisted of North Branch's City Administrator Matthew Hill, Community Development Director Nate Sondrol, HR generalist and former city council member Travis Miles, Chisago County engineer and Public Works Director Joe Triplett, and Justin Messner of WSB, which provides engineering services to the city.

Goulet said he was surprised when

he got this week's agenda and saw hiring Fraley was up for consideration.

Council member Patrick Meacham said he had a similar reaction, but argued the council hired Miles and Hill in their respective positions to do the work of collecting applications, interviewing candidates, and selecting the best person for the job.

"At the end of the day, I don't want to look through 43 applications, nor am I the person that should be entrusted in that," Meacham said.

"I almost feel like this is a symbolic vote, then, like we're voting our faith in Matthew versus the candidate, because we don't have a lot of information,"

Goulet said.
"So maybe that's what this is, but it doesn't feel right to me."

Mayor Kevin Schieber pointed out the council was afforded the opportunity to provide feedback on the position description.

"There was some input," Schieber said, "I don't feel like we were totally blindsided."

Ibinger reminded Miles that the taxpayers are at the top of his organizational chart, and the council should have had the opportunity to represent them during the process.

Hill said the selection committee did provide updates to the personnel advisory committee. Schieber responded that because the process looked to be moving along well, he did not feel the need to bring it up to the council.

Following the vote, the council agreed to discuss the department head hiring process at a future work session.

Cambridge to distribute \$30,000 in 'unexpected' money

Funds strictly dedicated for affordable housing aid

It isn't often a city is the unexpected recipient of state funding, but that is exactly what has happened with the city of Cambridge.

According to City Administrator Evan Vogel, these funds, which it appears will be issued yearly, can only be distributed for a select few uses, including:

•Emergency rental assistance for households earning less than 80% of area median income;

•Financial support to nonprofit affordable housing providers;

•Construction, acquisition, rehabilitation, demolition or removal of structures, construction financing, permanent financing, interest rate reduction, refinancing, and gap financing of housing to provide affordable housing; or

•The development of properties that are rented at market value if the relevant unit of government submits with their report to Minnesota Housing a resolution and supporting documentation showing that the area meets the requirements of Minnesota Statute 462A.39, subd 4, para. (a).

Vogel admitted when the check for \$29,983 was received, he was unaware of this new state program.

"I got a text from Caroline (Moe, the city's deputy city administrator and finance director) saying, 'Do you know what this is from?""

On top of that, Vogel said about

three weeks ago he discovered one of the conditions of the money is the city must file a report providing a general description of what the money is intended to be used for.

"It's important to note the funds must be dedicated, not obligated and not spent (by Dec. 1)," Vogel added.

Because of the time crunch, Vogel recommended the city dedicates the money to "the lowest hanging fruit," which would be financial support to nonprofit affordable housing providers.

While the council didn't specify exactly which organization(s) the money would go to, New Pathways was specifically mentioned as a possible recipient.

"I think New Pathways would qualify," Vogel said. "I don't know if there are other providers that meet that definition specifically."

Council member Molly Christian wasn't as enthusiastic about the unexpected money.

"We heard tonight about a lot of people feeling overtaxed," she said. "It's frustrating when the state distributes money without it being specifically requested. This isn't the state's money, it is our money because we are taxpayers. On the other hand, the state loves to spend money. So if we don't accept this and it goes back to them and they just spend it somewhere else."

Ultimately, the council unanimously approved dedicating the money to a nonprofit affordable housing provider.




