# **County Commissioners back** staff amid social media 'rhetoric'

For the past several months, the Isanti County's Health and Human Services Department in general, and specifically Child Protective Services, has been the subject of scrutiny by a small, but vocal, group of people over allegations made by the group pertaining to the removal and fostering of children from their families. This criticism was voiced during public comment at multiple board meetings but mostly took the form of numerous social media posts. According to County Administrator Amanda Usher, some of those posts have crossed the line and can be interpreted as threatening to certain current and former staff members.

"Last week, things unfortunately took a significant turn, where there were some threatening comments on social media," Usher said.

As a response to those comments, Usher crafted a letter of support from all of the county commissioners to Child Protective Services.

"These professionals provide an essential service to our community by safeguarding children and ensuring their well-being in complex, difficult, and sometimes heart-wrenching situations," began the letter. "We understand that child protection services can be challenging for all involved—families, social workers, and the community. The work done by social workers is never taken lightly and is always guided by the relevant state statutes and legal frameworks that dictate child welfare law. These statutes are designed to protect vulnerable children while also

# Isanti council appoints Pedersen to fill vacancy

Borrowing from a well-known hockey game announcement, the Isanti City Council is now at full strength — again.

On a unanimous 3-0 written vote (Councilmember Steve Lundeen was absent), the Isanti Council has appointed Nicholas Pedersen to fill the remainder of Luke Merrill's council seat, which opened after Merrill was appointed interim mayor at the beginning of January.

Pedersen was chosen after interviews with four of the five applicants. The fifth applicant, Kenneth Waldo, informed city staff he would be unable to attend the Jan. 21 meeting, when interviews

The four remaining applicants each admitted they had limited government experience. The closest to having experience was Jacob Miller, who unsuccessfully ran against current council member Jeff Holmgren in last November's special election.

In his interview, Pedersen said he moved to Isanti in 2018 from St. Paul due in large part to getting tired of the crime, which culminated with a police chase ending with a vehicle crashing into his neighbor's house.

Pedersen admitted it wasn't completely his idea to apply to be on the council. "Initially, I did not have a desire to be on the council," he said. "But many people keep asking me to get involved in

local government. So here I am." He said to prepare for the interview, he watched videos of the council meetings from the last three months.

"I heard many points where I agreed with the council, however, I do feel I have some input I can offer that wasn't there.'

He added that he helped campaign "for a few candidates," but beyond that, his only other government experience was being in the National Guard as an MP. He also said he had a "deep inter-

He said his top priorities are maintaining or decreasing taxes, added road maintenance and safety is another of his priorities.

Differing from the previous council appointments, Pedersen was immediately sworn in and took his seat for the remainder of the meeting. His term expires Dec. 31, 2026.

# North Branch to hire staff HR Director in midst of alleged HR turmoil

As North Branch grapples with an apparent human resources issue, an attempt to outsource handling such situations is dead in the water.

Council member Peter Schaps again sought information on the cost difference in hiring an outside firm to do a job traditionally handled by city staff, echoing his earlier unsuccessful attempt to investigate whether hiring the Chisago County sheriff's office to handle some of the city's police work.

"We haven't even had a company come in here and lay it out," Schaps said. "What are we afraid of, here? I would think that we'd want to do that before we hire someone."

According to Mayor Kevin Schieber, the time has

"I see a need, and I've seen it now for several years," he said, before joining the 3-2 majority supporting hiring an in-house HR Director. Previously, Ragini Varma, who also served as city clerk and IT, was also tasked with HR duties. Varma resigned from all of

her positions last November.

An immediate HR concern is an alleged conflict involving Angela Tveit, the city's public works administrative specialist who took over the duties of the city clerk last fall when Varma resigned after eight years with the city.

Tveit submitted her letter of resignation as deputy clerk effective Jan. 10, putting it to consideration of the council at its Jan. 14 meeting. According to the staff report, Tveit intends to continue her work for the Public Works Department.

During public comment at that same meeting, Lynn Wilson, a commissioner on the city's Parks, Trails and Open Spaces Commission, condemned city staff harshly over their treatment of Tveit, going so far as to call for the immediate removal of City Administrator, Matthew Hill, for failing to prevent or manage it.

"It is my understanding that the atmosphere in the offices of the city of North Branch has become so toxic and that other staff members were deliberately undermining Angela to such an extent that her remaining in the position of city clerk had become untenable," Wilson said in a letter to the mayor, which she read aloud during public comment.

Wilson went on to say that she was delighted, as a long-time election judge, when Tveit took over as clerk just before the 2024 general election. She said she has worked with Tveit in the past and praised her in glowing terms, calling the staff who allegedly mistreated her "small-minded and short-sighted."

Wilson said the city should take advantage of the fact Hill is still in his probationary employment period, and terminate him for failing "miserably" to properly handle the situation.

Wilson declined further comment on the matter,

directing inquiries to Tveit herself. Tveit did not respond to a request for comment.

For their part, the city voted to discuss the matter further in a special closed session, which had not been scheduled at press time according to the city's website.

At the mayor's suggestion, the council unanimously agreed to acknowledge Tveit's resignation without accepting it, and ask that she, Hill and Public Works Director Shawn Williams try to work out a solution.

Schieber declined to comment on the situation directly, citing personnel privacy, and pointed out that Wilson is not a city employee, and that any information she presented was of unclear origin and veracity to him.

"I will say, however, that the city of North Branch has experienced a few personnel matters over the past few years, in which personnel code of conduct and workplace standards have been compromised," Schieber said via email. "The city will wholeheartedly support our employees with their needs and challenges, but also hold them accountable when necessary. In my opinion, this is simply a common sense approach that all should understand and embrace."

In the meeting, Schieber used similar reasoning to support his vote to hire an in-house HR manager, saying in the past there were "some heartaches we could have saved, some funds we could have saved if we had someone guiding us."

respecting the rights of families, and they often leave little room for easy or quick decisions."

The letter goes on to say that while it is the county commissioners' job to oversee the Health and Human Services Department, "As commissioners, we do not and will not insert ourselves into individual child protection cases. Those cases are the purview of trained

professionals who work in conjunction with a range of experts including guardian ad litem, attorneys, judges/judicial staff, mental health professionals, and other caseworkers to make decisions in the best interest of children.

"We want to make it very clear that this type of behavior is unacceptable and we will continue to take aggressive steps to mitigate these behaviors and protect our staff," continued the letter. "Our social workers and staff work under incredibly difficult circumstances to protect children and help families, and they deserve to be treated with respect. Threatening language or actions toward our dedicated public servants will not be tolerated."

Commissioner Bill Berg took the sentiments of the letter a step further





# Now is the perfect time to start thinking about your garden

Now that we are in the doldrums of winter and our gardens are waiting to be woken up by the warmth of the spring sunshine, now is the perfect time to start thinking ahead to this



rotate your crops in your garden. Different crops deplete the soil of different nutrients. Rotating crops helps to replenish the soil, helps cut down on diseases and insects, helps soil structure, and may help manage soil moisture. If you haven't come up with a crop rotation, this is a good time to plan it. Some people keep

a certain rotation in their head and others will draw out a diagram. Whatever works for you. The University of Minnesota Extension website has more information.

I love looking at various seeds in the

catalogs that are sent to me or going to my favorite online sites. There can be so much to choose from. I have my staples that I order every year, but I love looking at the different varieties of crops and thinking if I can fit them in my garden this year. I try to grow at least one new crop each year, or at the very least, something that you usually don't find. My kids got a kick out of the purple beans and cauliflower that I grew one year.

Have you had issues with growing

Have you had issues with growing produce in past years? Has your produce been small and not very bountiful? Your soil might be the problem. Soil has nutrients in it that are essential for plant growth. Most soils will have nitrogen, potassium, phosphorus, and other small amounts of micro-nutrients. Where you live in Minnesota and what your soil type is (i.e. sandy or clay) varies greatly. Proper organic material will help maintain these nutrients.

Soil has organic matter in it that is very important for plant growth. Organic matter is decomposing material in different stages, plant roots, and microbes. If there is an issue with growing your produce, organic matter may well be the problem. Typically, your soil should have 3 to 6 percent organic matter in it. For true organic gardeners, you may need even higher levels. So how can you add organic matter? You need to add things like manure, grass clippings, and straw. Heck...you can throw fish guts in your garden. The University of Minnesota Extension website has some great information about organic matter. Just be careful not to throw anything in your soil that is toxic or bad for your health and obviously plastic is not an option. Having proper organic matter may also affect your acidity level in your soil.

Did you know your soil acidity is important? Certain plants like a more acidic soil to grow. Potatoes, strawberries, and corn like a more acidic soil. Blueberries like very acidic soil. Other plants like a more alkaline soil. Beans, asparagus, and garlic are some examples. You can amend your soil by using elemental sulfur to make your soil

more acidic, or lime to make your soil more alkaline.

How do you know what's going on with your soil? After the frost is out of the ground, you need to test it. The University of Minnesota Extension offers soil testing for a minimal cost. They provide results and give recommendations for your soil. Know that amending your soil is not an overnight process. This will take time and patience.

Whether it's planning your rotation, seed shopping, or testing/amending your soil in the early part of spring, the winter months give you ample time to make an action plan on your next produce garden. Your local University of Minnesota Extension office has qualified Master Gardeners standing by to answer your questions, give advice, and give you encouragement.


In both these examples, the inability to find any common ground ultimately led to everyone's demise. Let's hope reality doesn't follow fantasy in that

# Minnesota bicyclists no longer required to stop at every stop sign

Question: I have seen numerous times where a bicyclist will not stop at a stop sign, if they are shar-



Trooper Jesse Grabow ing the road with automobiles. I have seen a couple of close incidents where the bicyclist is almost hit as well. Are bicyclists under the same rules if they are sharing the road with automobiles?

Answer: There was a state law change back in August of 2023. It states, "a bicycle operator who approaches a stop sign must slow to a speed that allows for stopping before entering the intersection or the nearest crosswalk. If there is not a vehicle in the vicinity, the operator may make a turn or proceed

through the intersection without stopping." Nothing in this subdivision changed

the right-of-way requirements. It is important to note that bicyclists must still stop at intersections controlled by a red light, a peace officer, or a person authorized to control traffic.

Essentially, the bicyclist can yield or perform a "rolling stop" at a stop sign if they don't violate anyone else's right of way. When approaching a stop sign, the bicyclist should be traveling slow enough to stop before the crosswalk if necessary. However, after yielding, if there is not a pedestrian crossing in front of them or other traffic approaching near enough to constitute an immediate hazard, they may continue without making a full stop.



# Braham asks for county's help with possible roundabout

Over the last couple of years, both the cities of Isanti and Cambridge have set in motion the construction of a roundabout. Now, the city of Braham is joining in on the fun. However, it won't be able to do it without the county's help.

According to Braham Mayor Nate George, the city is in the early stages of looking into the construction of a roundabout at the intersection of Highway 107 and County Road 4. That intersection has become increasingly congested especially before and after school as it is the most direct route to get to the schools. Additionally, County Road 4 passes by the Braham Event Center.

"The goal would be to not only increase traffic safety, but pedestrian safety," George said. "That is a primary pedestrian crossing for our schools. It would also help slow down traffic coming around the curve at 55 miles-per-hour."

He added there has been an increase in crashes at that intersection as "impatient" drivers attempt to pass in the right turn lane a car making a left turn.

"In previous conversations with MnDOT, they have agreed that would be a good potential location for a roundabout," George said. George said the fact the intersection includes a

Chair Alan Duff asked if George had any traffic data for that intersection. George said he didn't at that moment, however he could get the county that infor-

Commissioner Bill Berg asked if a roundabout was possible at that intersection considering the close proximity of a railroad track crossing.

"MnDOT has already taken a look at that," George

said. "Maybe the highway would have to be adjusted a

Duff and the rest of the board agreed they were willing to explore a partnership with the city and suggested George contact the county engineer to help with a feasibility study, especially in terms of the proximity to the railroad crossing.

"That's something we were looking at really closely with the city of Isanti," Duff said, referencing the ongoing County Road 5 roundabout project. "I think our county engineer will have a really good grasp on what's a reasonable distance from a railroad."
