Isanti Fire District sees 10-year high in runs

The Isanti Fire District has had a very busy year. The Isanti City Council heard the annual report from Isanti Fire District at its March 2 meeting.

Isanti Fire Chief Al Jankovich presented the report, telling the council there are currently 28 firefighters totaling 187 years of experience. The average years of experience per firefighter is seven.

There were a total of 1,034 fire calls in 2020, with 468 of them being in the City of Isanti, according to Jankovich. This is the most fire calls in one year for the last 10 years of fire calls.

We've had a few dips along the way," said Jankovich, "but overall we are on the rise. That's no surprise as our populations are also up."

The report broke down the fire calls by incident type, with the majority of calls being for rescue and emergency medical services at 649.

Throughout 2020 firefighters participated in many different trainings, including several related to firefighter safety in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, Jankovich informed the council.

"It (the list of training sessions) looks a little different in 2020," Jankovich said. "We took a lot of impromptu trainings to get up to speed with the pandemic and how we could best protect ourselves while still doing our job.'

Isanti Fire District covers an area of 157 square miles, which includes 5,853 households, an estimated population of 16,133, and a valuation of approximately \$1.7 billion, according to the report.

The report stated the district's 2020 budget was

Sometimes irony just simply sucks. After successfully navigating through this strange season without any major schedule adjustments due to COVID-19, the Bluejacket wrestling team was poised to take on Section 7AAA #1 seed Anoka in the team section semifinals on Wednesday, March 10. The City of Cambridge announces the launching of a new series of community podcast shows designed to engage residents, businesses and local organizations. The show will also offer a wide range of guests and opportunities for listeners to call in with their questions and topic feedback during the live shows.

"We feel this is a great opportunity to reach out to our community and invite them to join us on the show. We want to create a new platform allowing for thoughtful and constructive conversation that is aimed at making Cambridge an even better place to live," said Lynda Woulfe, City Administrator and show host.

This opportunity was discussed several months ago between Woulfe and Todd Streeter, principal, Community Collaboration, who assisted the city with their downtown revitalization initiative in 2016. 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Railway has a long history within Isanti County

Summer 2021 marks the 122nd anniversary of the railroad's arrival to Isanti County. When the first steam-powered train rolled through the county on June 30, 1899, it was a monumental affair. The iron horse had finally made

it to growing Isanti County. Before 1899 Isanti County was bookended by two railroads: Princeton to the west

ed by two railroads: Princeton to the west in Mille Lacs County, and North Branch to the East in Chisago County. The Skally line ran north out of St. Paul, through North Branch, Harris, and Rush City, eventually ending up in Duluth. Chisago County was fortunate enough to have the railroad as early as 1870. At that

time, the population along the railroad warranted a direct line through those communities along the St. Croix River Valley. Cities such as Stillwater, Taylor's Falls, and Rush City were established much earlier than cities in Isanti County. As the railroad steamed along the banks of the St. Croix, folks over in Isanti County had to patiently wait for its arrival.

Early attempts and lobbying for a rail line through Isanti County came as early as 1875. Many area businessmen, particularly in Cambridge, lobbied hard to the railroad companies and the State of Minnesota. Isanti County businesses felt like they were being left "high and dry" as most commerce was focused around the railroad. Plain and simple, Isanti County was being left out. Princeton and North Branch were reaping most of the economic benefits associated with the railroad throughout the region. Isanti County's request was simple: build the railroad and prosperity would soon follow.

Prior to the railroad, settlers of Isanti County walked to either North Branch, Taylor's Falls, Princeton, or Anoka for supplies and other necessities not available in early towns around Isanti County. Depending on the destination and particular need, the journey could take up to three days on foot. It wasn't

uncommon for early settlers to make the trek several times per year.

Even a local newspaper of the time would lament the fact that a railroad was needed. In November of 1878 the Isanti Press published an editorial stating that "Without railroad access, the inefficiency of long-distance travel will continue to have an economic impact." It was clear to everyone around Isanti County that a rail was needed, but when?

A survey in 1881 looked promising for Isanti County when a proposed route ran from Sauk Rapids to Pine City. Unfortunately, however, when the final route was established it missed Isanti County completely. A few years later in 1886 found the rail line once again missing Isanti County, passing through Princeton to the West. As the population continued to expand around Isanti County particularly in the late 19th century, it was clear that a railroad was needed, but exactly 'where' was not yet determined.

The railroad once owned thousands of acres not only throughout the U.S. but in Isanti County as well. Most of the County's odd-numbered sections were owned by the Lake Superior

and Mississippi Railroad. They either bought up these large tracts, or they were given to them by the United States Government in the form of land grants. Railroad companies held on to these odd-numbered parcels in hopes of driving settlement to the area. Once the influx of settlers came into the county, the railroad finally started to offer up parcels around 1869. Interestingly enough, some railroad companies enticed certain populations from German and Scandinavian countries with the promise of affordable, productive land along a future railroad. As the railroad companies created a push for settlement, they quickly sold much of their land to speculators and other land companies.

In addition to owning the odd-numbered sections within Isanti County, the Lake Superior and Mississippi Railroad owned the lower quality swampland within the even-numbered sections. Only one-third of land within Isanti County was available for homesteading via the Homestead Act of 1862, the rest was locked up by railroad or speculators. Needless to say, the railroad had a lot of influence over the development and settlement of Isanti County in the mid-late 19th Century. Another attempt in 1892 was on track, but due to the economic scare of 1893, investors of the Cambridge, Minneapolis, and Duluth Railroad reeled back their collective efforts. Finally, enough lobbying would pay off and it was decided that a railroad would run through Isanti County. Work began and tracks were laid along the Great Northern Railroad's "Bee Line" at a rapid pace, spanning the length

of the county, north to south. Upon its completion in June of 1899, the first pass through the county brought people far and wide to see it arrive in Cambridge. The much-needed railroad put not only Isanti County on the map, but several towns as well. Towns such as Braham and Grandy were born along the tracks in 1899. In fact, upon confirmation of the railroad's location, Isanti relocated to its present location along the line, as did the town of Stanchfield. These new towns along the new railroad were then ideally spaced as early steam-powered trains required frequent water stops.

In most of the railroad towns, commerce was centralized along the rail; warehouses and businesses lined the tracks. The growth of these towns continued to elevate well into the early 20th Century. Land sales and immigration were booming; life was good, but it wasn't only businesses that benefited from the railroad. Members of the community could now travel to Duluth, Minneapolis, and beyond in just a matter of hours instead of days. Mail could be delivered much faster; travel took a fraction of the time; people were getting connected on a whole new level. Today the rail line is used exclusively for the transportation of goods. Occasionally, a steam-powered relic can be seen chugging along the Great Northern Railroad to remind people of the significance and impact the locomotive made on Isanti County SAM KLOCKSIEN is Executive Director of the Isanti County Historical Society, which is located at 33525 Flanders St. NE, Cambridge. 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There's no way to avoid the upcoming storm

n the immortal words of numerous Star Wars characters, "I've got a bad feeling about this."

The Derek Chauvin trial for allegedly killing George Floyd is very quickly turning into Minne-



sota's own mini version of the O.J. Simpson trial. The entire trial is going to take way, way longer than any sort of regular murder trial. Just the jury selection is predicted to take somewhere around three weeks to complete, and even if it doesn't take that long, the trial itself won't start before March 25. All told, it will probably amount to over a month before any sort of verdict is read.

Even in the first hour of the trial, it got delayed as the two sides couldn't agree if they could start wading through the jury pool since the defense is in fact appealing to the State Supreme Court the appellate court's ruling that a charge of 3rd degree murder shouldn't have been removed from the

list of charges to be considered. Meanwhile, groups of activists are planning almost daily demonstrations/protests for the duration of the trial. Now, I'm not saying they don't have the right to peacefully protest. But they also have to understand that their repeated marches won't change a single thing going on inside the courtroom. In fact, I would contend the only thing they will accomplish is lighting a very slow-burning fuse, which is attached to a large bomb set to explode pretty much as soon as a verdict is reached.

What's more, I don't think there's a way to extinguish that fuse. It's pretty much established there will be repercussions if the "right" verdict isn't reached. The thing is, though, many have already declared the only verdict they will consider to be just is guilty of 1st degree murder. Well, that ship has already sailed, meaning the best they can hope for is 2nd degree murder.

So, once the verdict is read, the serious, larger scale protests will begin, probably via their favorite form of civil disobedience - the blocking of roads and freeways coupled with massive gatherings in front of police stations, the courthouse, and probably the governor's mansion, just to name a few locals.

And even though most of these protests are meant to be peaceful, the shear numbers will create a perfect opening for anyone to start serious trouble, leading to a repeat of last summer's riots.

To cap it all off, people will be able to watch the entire trial and aftermath on TV thanks to a groundbreaking decision by Judge Peter Cahill to allow cameras in the courtroom. Under normal circumstances, I would be applauding this decision as long overdue for Minnesota. Cameras in the courtroom increases the validity of there being a fair trial. In general, it's hard to fully understand or accept the results of a trial when all you see are corny sketch artist renderings, coupled with soundbites selected by the media. But in this case, I'm afraid it will only add fuel to the fire rather than help extinguish it.

I have been saying all along they should have somehow arranged so that the trial would take place in the middle of Minnesota's winter as it is absolutely true that our harsh weather helps keep the riffraff out. But now, barring a perfectly timed freak early spring snowstorm, I'm afraid our fate has already been sealed.

The experiences of last year will forever impact how we approach our daily lives and how we approach teaching and learning. Our district has always placed a high value on the relationships we build with students and families. After too much social isolation, we see across the country increases in youth mental health concerns. In our community. we have long known the importance of human connection and social interactions for learning and living. We are dedicated to both academic and social-emotional growth and happiness for our students after a

difficult year.

During the last year, we have needed to practice patience and grace. We've focused on relationships and relevance. We have been intentional about fundamental reading skills at the primary level. At our last school board meeting, one of our primary principals reported on the intervention strategies used during the pandemic to ensure all students remain on track to be reading by third grade. There is no more important skill for future learning than our elementary literacy programs. We're pleased to report solid

results on reading assessments this winter, despite the pandemic.

Our students have also gained new skills as self-directed and teacher-supported learners. We have grown as educators, parents and a learning community. Our students and staff have developed advanced technology skills, and we have all advanced in resourcefulness, adaptability and resilience.

If you watch the evening news, you might see students across the country who are just returning to their schools for the first time in a year. But in C-I Schools, our goals since September have been to have students in school as much as possible, as long as it is safe to do so. We have worked within important limitations and guidelines. And we have persevered in so many ways. We will continue to think creatively and innovatively about how to continue to serve all students.

We want to acknowledge the collaboration and cooperation of our teachers' association and all of our employee groups. We have worked side-by-side to prioritize employee health and well-being and find a way to bring students back to school. Our school employees are a model for the state. We have hard-working people with high expectations who want to bring their best for every student, every day. Every employee was asked to do their jobs differently. They had a lot of concerns and questions about how we would pull this off. Working collaboratively we remained focused on students the Bluejacket Way — with responsibility, self-discipline, honesty, respect and compassion. We could not be more proud.

We are now entering a difficult time in our year, as we begin our Budget Reduction Process and planning for next year. Our district continues to face a deficit due to inadequate funding. Our school district receives and spends less per student than our neighboring districts—we rank last in the Mississippi-8 in terms of spending. We also receive \$1,300 less per student than the state average and that equals \$6.4 Million less per year. We have reduced our budget by \$7.5 Million over the last two years, and we will need to make more than \$1 Million in reductions again this vear.

Our Community Task Force is working on planning for the future and providing feedback on areas for reduction. Following Spring Break, we will host a number of public meetings to outline proposed budget reductions. Please watch our district website for updates following Spring Break.

As we enter our third trimester of the year, we could not have imagined the challenges we have had to overcome this past year. We are excited to begin spring term with students back in school, learning and laughing and loving the opportunities to growjust as childhood should be. Our community and our schools are resilient. And even more families are discovering what a great place the Cambridge-Isanti community is to raise a family. We are excited to be enrolling kindergarten children and have seen great interest in families re-enrolling for the fall. We are turning the corner and have great hope for the future

Frivolous lawsuits and awards of attorney's fees

ubsequent to the November election, there were many lawsuits challenging the election results. I have no intention to enter the political discussion but

simply to discuss the obligations of attorneys not to file frivolous lawsuits. In Minnesota, an attorney starting a lawsuit must acknowledge by signature that they are in compliance with and aware of Minnesota's sanctions

laws. Minn. Stat. §549.211 and Rule 11.02 of the Minnesota Rules of Civil Procedure provide, in part:

By presenting to the court, an attorney or unrepresented party is certifying that to the best of the person's

knowledge, information, and belief... (1) it is not being presented for any improper purpose, such as to harass or to cause unnecessary delay or needless increase in the cost of litigation;

(2) the claims, defenses, and other legal contentions are warranted by existing law or by a nonfrivolous argument for the extension, modification, or reversal of existing law or the establishment of new law;

(3) the allegations and other factual contentions have evidentiary support or, if specifically so identified, are likely to have evidentiary support after a reasonable opportunity for further investigation or discovery; and (4) the denials of factual contentions are warranted on the evidence or, if specifically so identified, are reasonably based on a lack of information or belief. Under our American system of justice the ability to collect attorney's fees if you win your case and are the "prevailing party" is severely limited, considerably more so than under the British system, from which our common law is derived. Under the "English rule," the prevailing party's attorneys' fees are largely paid by the loser. This rule has been adopted by the State of Alaska. In Minnesota, by comparison, the winning party in a lawsuit generally can only obtain an award of their attorney's fees against the losing party if such an award is allowed either in a written contract between the parties or by a statute. For example, the court may award attorney's fees to a party in a divorce case because it is allowed by statute. Attorney's fees may be awarded based on

the inequality of the incomes of the parties (income-based fees) or based upon misconduct by one against the other in the litigation itself (conduct-based fees).

Contract-based attorney's fee awards are based upon a breach of a written contract providing for an award of attorney's fees and costs if a lawsuit is necessary. Common examples include lawsuits to collect unpaid rent under a house or apartment lease, to collect a down payment on a contract to purchase real estate, and to collect an unpaid credit card debt. Awards of attorney's fees must be reasonable and based upon the amount of legal services provided to the prevailing party. However, absent a statute or contract allowing an award of attorney's fees to the prevailing party, an award of attorney's fees is not available if the claim is not in "bad faith," that is, if "the claims, defenses, and other legal contentions are warranted by existing law or by a non-frivolous argument for the extension, modification, or reversal of existing law" and are supported by evidence. If the claims or defenses are clearly "frivolous" and not warranted under existing law and evidence, an award of attorney's fees can be made to the prevailing party.

Many "frivolous" or unsupportable claims or defenses never get to jury trials as they are either dismissed by the court, or judgment is entered for one party, upon 'motions for summary judgment" by one of the parties. Summary judgment is granted when there are no material facts in dispute and one party is entitled to win as a matter of law. There are a variety of remedies available to the defendant who is "frivolously sued," or the suing party (plaintiff) who faces a frivolous defense, but certainly, people have differences of opinion on what is frivolous. Basically, if you do not have facts to support your claim, your lawsuit will be dismissed. For example, you couldn't sue your neighbor who lives 200 yards away for spraying weed killer in his yard that you claim killed your champion rose bushes without proof from an expert witness. Facts, not theories. Ultimately, the court will decide what lawsuits are frivolous and must be dismissed, and whether an award of attorney's fees is warranted under the law. with stomach pain that turned out to be a perforated ulcer and other complications. She needed immediate surgerv. But this was happening at the height of a COVID

surge in the state, and ICU beds were in short supply. The only place they could bring her was St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester.

Morsching is recovering. But a month later, they received an ambulance bill for \$5,200.

The thing is, they shouldn't have been charged for that ambulance ride at all.

That ambulance ride appears to have been billed incorrectly by the hospital, and so slipped through the cracks of their medical insurance - which was through Minnesota's Medicaid.

The moral of the story? Check through your medical bills carefully. Both the hospitals and insurance companies can make mistakes. And if something seems strange, check into it before you pay it. It might save you thousands of dollars.

I was happy to hear that the Morschings are not being charged for this, and that Katie is on the mend. The KARE 11 team do a great job of explaining the issue. COLD SHOCK

Things are getting back to normal now, but it was quite a shock to our southern neighbors when they were deluged by snow followed by an icv stretch. They just aren't built to handle the cold. I lived in a hot state for a bit, and found it was true. They can deal with multiple days over 100 degrees, but anything close to freezing becomes a crisis. And the common-sense lessons we've learned about the dangers of carbon monoxide and hypothermia - they're just not common down there. It was tragic to hear about the suffering and deaths down in Texas. \$632,785, of which \$84,729 was from grant income. It also provided a list of assets owned by Isanti Fire District.

The report concluded with a breakdown of fire calls by incident within the City of Isanti itself, which included nine calls for fire, 311 calls for rescue and emergency medical service, 13 calls for hazardous conditions, 16 calls for other types of services, 93 good intent calls, and 26 calls for false alarms.

The City of Isanti's contri-

bution to the district's budget in 2020 was \$238,077, which is 38% of the district's total budget. Fire calls within the City of Isanti accounted for 45% of the district's total calls in 2020.

Following the report, the City Council approved the lease purchase agreement for the building that currently houses the Isanti Fire District in the amount of \$600,000, which will be paid in increments through 2025. Previously, the Isanti Fire District leased the building from the city.

COUNCIL APPROVES NEW FEES FOR FOOD TRUCKS

The council approved amending its fee schedule regarding food truck fees and background investigation fees. Background investigation fees will now be \$35, and food truck fees will be \$10 per day, \$50 per month, or \$130 yearly.

Herpes gladiatorum (HG) is a virus that causes a skin condition that to the untrained eye simply looks like a cold sores. For wrestlers, it is a highly contagious condition that is taken very seriously among their ranks. Skin checks are performed prior to every match or tournament to try and prevent the spread of the virus. However, sometimes it gets missed.

That is the case with the Jackets as on Monday, March 8, one of their recent opponents reported at least one, and possibly as many as three positive tests for HG. Since it can take several days before symptoms of HG can be visibly detected, the Jackets now ran the risk of spreading it to Anoka or even Forest Lake and Coon Rapids, who also opted to stay in the team tournament.

But for the coaching staff, who had experienced a similar situation back in 2010 when it was C-I who experienced an HG outbreak the week prior to the section team tournament, the decision was easy. They too would pull out of this season's section team tournament. They would also discontinue practices featuring direct contact among the team, along with enacting an even more vigorous cleaning regime than what they had been doing for COVID.

Fortunately, assuming an outbreak doesn't take

place within the team in the coming days, they will still be able to compete in the Section 7AAA individual tournament, which begins next Wednesday, March 17 at a site still to be determined.

VIKINGS ALSO OPT OUT OF TEAM SECTIONS

In North Branch's section, four of the 11 Section 4AA teams opted out of the team tournament, including the Vikings. If they had decided to stay in the tournament, North Branch would have most likely been given the #8 seed and had to face #1 seed South St. Paul. And since North Branch isn't able to field someone at every weight, the six points awarded to their opponents for forfeiting those weights would almost in itself make beating South St. Paul a statistical impossibility.

Individual sections for the Vikings will take place the week of March 15-20 in Chisago Lakes. Due to COVID restrictions, only a limited number of spectators will be allowed at sections.

The state wrestling tournament, which is usually held entirely at Xcel Energy Center over three days, will be held regionally for the team quarterfinals and individual preliminary rounds March 13-20, with the semifinals and finals for both teams and individuals being held at St. Michael-Albertville March 25-27.

Isanti County gets clarification on ordinance amendment request

The Isanti County Board revisited its decision Feb. 17 to send an ordinance amendment back to the planning and zoning commission for clarification after a request from Zoning Administrator Trina Bergloff at its meeting March 3.

"At the last county board meeting we held a public hearing on some ordinance amendment language, and I think there was a misunderstanding on my end in regards to the language that the applicant proposed in the agriculture/residential district for a conditional use permit," Bergloff explained. "They were requesting indoor storage for excavation contractor equipment in a fully enclosed building where the

for excavation contractor equipment in a fully enclosed building where the owner of property did not reside. I took that as, 'OK, it's not going to have a

house with it.' But, that really wasn't the intent of the request."

Specific language in the ordinance amendment stated:

#21. Indoor storage of excavation/ contractor equipment in a fully enclosed building where the owner of the property does not reside.

a. The fee owner of the property must be the business owner and/or the principal operator of the business whose excavation equipment or contractor supplies are stored.

b. No outdoor storage.

c. No single family dwelling on the property.

"Those three bullet items were just kind of reiterating the language, but at the last county board hearing, it was denied due to the fact that it kind of conflicts with the interim use permit process. I'm here today to request a new public hearing just for going directly

to the county board and not having it go back to the planning commission," Bergloff explained, noting zoning office staff, the applicant, and Assistant County Attorney Tim Nelson met and worked out new language to remove any language related to a dwelling or residential status of the property owner.

The revised language of the ordinance amendment would remove "where the owner of the property does not reside" and "c. No single family dwelling on the property."

"I'm comfortable with that language, I feel it's more specific language than just an extended home occupation or interim use permit," Bergloff stated.

The board approved scheduling a new public hearing for the ordinance amendment, which will take place April 21 at 9:45 a.m.

SMALL BUSINESS AND NONPROFIT RELIEF GRANTS

"So, this is kind of exciting," said Isanti County Administrator Julia Lines, noting the county has approved \$790,847 in small business and nonprofit relief grants ranging from \$376 to \$15,000. "This is money that came from the state for this last round of grants."

The process was completed internally, she noted, thanking Isanti County Auditor Chad Struss and the finance team for their work. "It's exciting to get these dollars out the door and to remain local here and be able to help these businesses to stay afloat at this time," she added.

The board approved the awarded grants unanimously, with Isanti County Commissioner Terry Trunquist abstaining due to his business being a recipient of one of the grants.

Rush City/Braham finished their regular season by splitting their final triangular, beating St. Croix Lutheran 57-14, but losing to Virginia 64-12.



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
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Opossums get a bad rap

I have been writing articles about critters and pests for a long time and since both categories seem to expand all the time, I thought I should find out what the difference is between the two.

According to the dictionary a critter is a creature, but only in some regions. A pest is a thing that causes trouble especially an insect or small animal that destroys things. I consider a critter larger than an insect and does damage and the category has expanded to include wild turkeys, coyotes and now opossums.

Native Americans call them possums which means white animal with the spelling opossum first recorded in 1613 and has been used ever since. Although our area has dealt with them for the past forty years, fossils indicate that opossums have remained unchanged for seventy million years. Although they don't hibernate and are generally nocturnal, in cold and snowy weather they may hole up for days in an unoccupied doghouse, your haymow, other out buildings, etc. More than once, while feeding our outside cats, opossums have been sharing the feeding dish side by side with them.

They present the least health risk of any wild animal. Rabies and other viral diseases are rare to them due to their low body temperature. Like all warm-blooded animals, they can host fleas and ticks, and hay or grain that has been tainted with their feces has been linked to Equine Protozoal, a health risk to horses.

Karen Kirsch wrote an article in the 2013 Farmer's Almanac, writing that it's much better to have opossums around than many other wild animals. They won't dig up your garden or lawns and they won't chew wood or wires. They catch and eat mice and rats and devour insects, especially cockroaches, snails, slugs and snakes. Although we may need not to worry about our area, opossums have a natural resistance to some poisonous snake venom. Their menu also includes grasses, overripe fruit and berries, bird eggs (which some of you may not like), human garbage and pet foods. Their favorite diet is road kill which helps keep the environment clean. Ironically, when the opossum is eating road kill, it often becomes a meal for some other critter.

To keep an area "possum free", the first thing is to clean up whatever is attracting them. If you have pets outdoors, feed them during the day and remove their food when they have finished eating. Keep doors and windows closed when possible and keep all garbage away from them because that's their favorite meal. If they get into a building turn on the lights and turn on a radio or other noise to help hasten their departure.

They are not aggressive and they don't attack humans and other animals, but with their razor-sharp teeth they will bite if cornered. To protect themselves they may give off a smell from the anal glands that smells like a rotten carcass. They can also faint dead-away thus earning the saying "playing possum."



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In-person criminal jury trials resume March 15

CONTRIBUTED MINNESOTA JUDICIAL BRANCH

In-person criminal jury trials for all case types will resume in state district courts effective March 15, 2021, under a new statewide order issued by Minnesota Supreme Court Chief Justice Lorie S. Gildea.

'We are gradually increasing in-person activities in court facilities in a safe and responsible manner that will allow the courts to fulfill our constitutional obligation, while we continue to do all that we can to protect public health and safety," said Chief Justice Gildea.

In-person criminal jury trials in all case types may commence March 15, as long as the court adheres to the Minnesota Judicial Branch COVID-19 Preparedness Plan and approved local jury trial plans. These plans, which are consistent with guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Minnesota Department of Health, address changes to facilities and protocols that must be followed to meet social distancing and public health and safety needs.

All other proceedings, including civil jury trials, will be conducted remotely through April 30, unless the chief judge of the judicial district grants an exception. To help move civil disputes forward, the Minnesota Judicial Branch will soon launch a pilot project that will authorize approved courts to conduct civil jury trials via remote hearing technology, if the judge and all parties to the case agree. The pilot project is anticipated to begin in late March,

with additional courts being approved for remote civil jury trials in the months ahead.

The new order extends provisions that were included in a November 20, 2020 order that limit in-person activities in court facilities. These include:

Remote Hearings: Hearings across all case types will be conducted remotely to the extent possible. Exceptions may be granted by the district chief judge for in-person proceedings under limited circumstances.

Appellate Courts: Proceedings in appeals pending before the Minnesota Court of Appeals and the Minnesota Supreme Court will continue as scheduled by those courts.

Civil Commitment: Proceedings that are before the Commitment Appeal Panel shall continue as scheduled, and be conducted remotely to the extent possible

Case Filings: Courts will continue to accept filings in all case types.

·Public Service Counters: At least one public service counter in each county, and one in the appellate courts, will be accessible between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday - Friday, excluding court holidays. Counter service can be provided remotely, by appointment, or in person.

Self-Help Services: Self-help services will be conducted by appointment, remotely, or by telephone.

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
