Fieldhouse main portion of referendum question 2

Editor's note: This is the eighth in a series of articles regarding the upcoming Cambridge-Isanti Schools referendum vote, with this one focusing on question #2.

In contrast to the 150-plus projects proposed in question 1 of the Cambridge-Isanti Schools' bond referendum vote, question 2 has a "mere" seven projects, with six of them tied to one main project. That one project, however, has a projected cost of just over \$29.5 million, with the total amount of question 2 coming in just under \$36.5 million.

The main project is a four-court fieldhouse. Encircling the courts would be a competitive running

track that could be used for indoor track and field competitions and practices during inclement weather. The four courts could be used for basketball, volleyball, or even tennis during inclement weather.

Scott Lindell, who is a member of the Facilities Task Force along with a youth basketball coach, noted how the youth sports organizations are struggling to attract visiting teams from outside the area for tournaments. One of the main reasons for that is there is no central location for tournaments to be held. He said teams get confused and frustrated from bouncing around from school building to school building for their games.

Unofficial detour giving neighborhood headaches

No sooner has one traffic issue associated with the Cambridge South Main Street reconstruction project been solved when another issue springs up.

Last Friday, the first phase of the project, which included the construction of

a roundabout at the intersections of the Kwik Trip parking lot and 40th Ave SW, was completed. This allows traffic to exit Highway 65 onto South Main Street and get as far as the new roundabout. It also reopens 40th Ave SW.

Phase 2 of the project now begins, with South Main Street closed from just north of the roundabout to 24th Ave SW. The official detours continue to be Highway 65 to Highway 95 for northbound commuters getting to downtown Cambridge, or 11th Ave SE to Garfield Street to Highway 95 to Highway 65 for those wanting to leave the city going

As soon as access to South Main Street and by extension Highway 65 via 40th Ave SW was established, however, commuters savvy with city streets started taking their own, unofficial detours via Holly Street in Goldenwood. According to residents along Holly Street, the amount of traffic has greatly increased, and with that, an increase in the number of vehicles speeding.

REFERENDUM: Fieldhouse to include competitive, recreational tracks, four courts, added gymnastics space

"As a father and a coach of kids going through sports, we've attended many different sporting events and seen how beautiful their facilities are and how far behind we are," Lindell said.

Additionally, the main fieldhouse is proposed to have a walking path on an upper level. This walking path would be open and accessible to the public even while school is

"There really is no good place to walk (during inclement weather)," Facility Task Force member Cathy Smitz said. "We currently walk around Menards, which they probably don't appreciate.'

Attached to the east end of the fieldhouse, but separated by a curtain or removable wall, would be a new, expanded space for the high school and community education gymnastics programs. Currently, gymnastics is housed in a gym in the lowest level of the high school that is too small for proper training of difficult skills or holding a gymnastics meet.

equipment up to a section of the main gym," Bluejacket head coach Wendy Rooney said. "Halfway through the meet, everyone has to then move down to our primary gym for beam and floor.'

Even that arrangement doesn't alleviate all the safety issues.

We have spectators sitting inches away from our competition floor on two sides, which is dangerous for the gymnasts if they fall out of bounds during a tumbling pass," Rooney said.

With the new space for gymnastics, the wrestling program, which also practices in unsafe conditions in another lower-level room, would move into the current gymnastics

Additionally, team rooms, additional storage, a new corridor, restrooms, a community room, and the Activities Department office would be constructed. The cost of that project is estimated at \$3,351,000.

REPLACING PARKING SPOTS

An offshoot of constructing the fieldhouse is that it would take away a number of parking spots at the high school — something which is already in short supply. To rectify this, the district is proposing expanding the parking lot to the south. However, this would also require moving a portion of 8th Ave NW to the south as well. The estimated cost of that is just under \$3 million.

Finally, two art rooms that are currently along the south side of the building would need to be moved to the northwest section of the building at a cost of \$1,186,000.

The passing of question 2 is contingent on question 1 passing. In other words, if question 1 fails, question 2 automatically fails even if it receives over 50% yes votes.

Braham community comes together for one of its own

It's a Wednesday afternoon at the Braham Event Center, and Nancy Vander Heyden has been here

A group of volunteers has just served a noon meal to around 100 pharmacy students from the University of Minnesota, and they are now enjoying a little lunch

Meanwhile, Vander Heyden is cleaning up in the kitchen. She stops to sit for a visit with this reporter, but then gets up abruptly. She needs to make sure all of the helpers at the Event Center have had a chance to eat. So she's off, stopping in the office to tell Tracey Brewer to get a plateful.

Vander Heyden volunteers regularly for Braham Event Center activities and for the Braham Area High School Theater Department. And anyone who knows her will tell you this: She puts others first. Always.

In July, however, it was time for Vander Heyden to come first. On the 23rd, friends gathered at the Braham Event Center for a fundraiser to help Vander Heyden, who lost her home in a fire on June 1.

"For those in our community who cross paths with Nancy Vander Heyden, please plan to join the party .. to support her as she finds a new home," the announcement for the fundraiser read.

The event featured a spaghetti dinner; cornhole tournament; theatre trivia and photo booth; and a pie auction and silent auction.

THE FIRE

According to a news release from the Braham Ponce Department, at approximately 3:09 p.m. on Sun day, June 1, a fire was reported to Isanti County 911. The fire was at Vander Heyden's home on lot 17, 811 Central Drive West.

By the time Braham officers and Isanti County Sheriff deputies arrived, two adjacent homes were also on fire. Officers evacuated these homes, and rescued Vander Heyden and one of her cats. It is thought her other cat perished in the conflagration. Vander Heyden was displaced, and her house was a total loss.

"It started underneath another trailer," Vander Heyden said. "They were fixing it up, but they don't really know for sure how it started.

HELP FROM HER FRIENDS

Since the fire, Vander Heyden has been staying with friends. She prefers not to name them to protect their privacy. She also prefers not to have her picture taken because of her aversion to being in the spotlight. When Brewer mentions the beautiful work Vander Heyden does when painting sets for the Braham Area High School theater department, Vander Heyden demurs, noting that if it weren't she volunteering,

Being part of a fundraiser for her benefit was difficult, she said, since she abhors being the center of attention. But she wanted to ensure that everyone who attended the event knows how grateful she is.

In a prepared statement, Vander Heyden thanked everyone for the "generous donations of food, silent auction items, and the pie auction. Thank you all that donated time and effort to put on the benefit for me. Thank you to all that donated money, gift cards, and all the encouraging words to help me get on my way to a new start after the loss of my home."

Vander Heyden indicated that she tried to speak to everyone at the benefit to thank each personally.

She said she was "appreciative and amazed" at how community members and friends from the Event Center and theater department gathered to help her.

If I didn'tget to speak to you personally," she wrote, please note it was a bit overwhelming for me, since I'm really not used to being in the limelight," she said.

"It's been an anxious and uncertain road that I am forced to travel," Vander Heyden said. With help from those who have expressed concern, she added, "I know that I can (and) will get through this."



State law targets distractions behind the wheel

uestion: I know the distracted driving law has been around for a while now, but can you please talk about it some more? Answer: Driver distraction or inatten-

tion is a leading factor in crashes in Minnesota, accounting for at least 25 percent of all crashes

annually. Distracted drivers fail to recognize potential hazards on the road and react more slowly to traffic conditions, decreasing their margin of safety.

Types of driver distraction: • Visual: Looking away from the Mechanical/physical: Taking

hands off the wheel. • Cognitive: Being "lost in thought."

Distractions inside the vehicle can include activities such as: using a cell phone, using a GPS, reaching for items, eating and drinking, adjusting

the radio, talking to other passengers, and reading maps and other materials. Even when you are watching the road, behaviors such as looking at a crash scene or daydreaming can divert attention from your driving responsibilities. For safety, give the task of driving your full attention at all times.

Illegal driver behaviors in Minnesota Certain driver behaviors are illegal on Minnesota roads. These include using a cell phone or wireless computer device for text messaging, emailing or accessing the internet while driving, including while stopped in traffic. Drivers under age 18 with an instruction permit or provisional license are prohibited from using a cell phone, whether handheld or hands-free, except to call 911 in an emergency. It is also illegal to wear headphones or

a radio or other sound-producing device. A portion of state statutes were used with permission from the Office of the Revisor of Statutes. Referendum will cost more than claimed

To the editor,

In the official C-I School Referendum Fact web page it states that the two referendums will only be an "INCREASED" cost to the average household of \$16 per month. In fact they even split it up and say the larger one will only be an "INCREASE" of \$5 per month and the smaller (\$36.9 million) will be an "INCREASE" of \$11 per month. They even have a large image of a house with the largest numbers on the page being \$0.53 per day. However, the actual cost of these referendums is actually more than \$50 per month if both questions are passed, for the average district household for the next 25 years.

In viewing the dozens of web pages on the fact website, nowhere was the full cost of \$50 noted. It could have easily been included on the FAQs page under 'WHAT WILL THIS REFER-ENDUM COST THE AVERAGE TAXPAYER" but no, again they only mention the \$5 and the \$11 "INCREASES." Was that an oversight? The reason the literature states "INCREASE" is because they are planning to use the monies the taxpayers are currently paying for referendums that were passed 10 or 20 years ago and are now reaching maturity, as the base for the current bonds. When the taxpayers originally voted for those original referendums they did so with the understanding that they were for a specific amount of money and they would eventually be paid off and not continue to be a burden on the taxpayers. They didn't vote all those years ago for the cost of those bonds to be paid in perpetuity (FOREVER). Technically, when old bonds are retired (paid off) the taxpayers could (and should) see a reduction in their tax liability. Then if the district wants new money the true cost would be acknowledged. This would be complete transparency!

The State of Minnesota guidelines on school bonds and levies

states the following:

"Bond Repayment: Once the bonds are fully repaid, the debt service levy for that particular referendum is no longer needed. This means that portion of your property taxes should disappear or decrease"

I had a very astute local businessman whom I respect, call me after my first letter to the editor and ask me if I really had a problem paying \$5 per month for these important initiatives. I now realized why they stuck to the "INCREASE" idea and why they split it into two parts. This iocal businessman knows the Director of Finance and Operations for the District, Chris Kampa, and he set up a meeting for me to meet with Kampa last Tuesday morning.

At that meeting I met with Kampa, Christina Thayer Anderson (Director of Communications and Community Education) and Jodie Zesbaugh who is a financial consultant for the District. In the discussions, Chris agreed that the actual cost of the two referendums over a 25 year term is in fact \$50 per month for a homeowner with a home valued at \$300,000. This is a cost to that homeowner of \$15,000 over the term of the bond. Furthermore, if your home is valued at \$450,000 your monthly cost will be \$80 or \$24,000 over the term of the bond. A home valued at \$600,000 will cost the

homeowner \$113 per month or \$33,750 over the term of the bond. A business that has an estimated market value of \$1,000,000 will pay \$348 per month or \$104,400 over the term of the bond. As a board member of the Isanti County Economic Authority I know this will be hardship for our businesses (these numbers have been confirmed by Chris Kampa, Director of Finance for C-I School District 911).

And these costs don't include any ongoing costs. Nowhere in the C-I Schools sponsored referendum information website does it mention the ongoing costs of these expenditures. How much is it going to cost to staff the new fieldhouse or the classroom addition? It's not just going to sit there without supervision. How much is it going to cost to heat and cool these facilities? What will the annual maintenance cost be? What is the cost for the daily cleaning etc.?

This brings up the operating budget. Over the last four years, district enrollment has decreased every year according to the C-I website with a total decrease of 3%. However, the operating expenses have gone up 40% from \$57 MILLION to more than \$80 MIL-LION. In the meeting last Tuesday I asked about this tremendous increase and Thayer-Anderson explained that those costs were driven by state mandates. During that same time frame, Eden Prairie had an increase in enrollment, yet they only had a 10.7% increase in their operating expenditures.

I do want to point out that in our meeting they did agree that the large graphic of a house with "\$0.53 per day" on the first page of the "Referendum Facts" page was misleading and they said they would remove it, although they would not commit to putting the actual full cost of these referendums on that page, only the

Please don't get me wrong. I am absolutely for a referendum for **RESTORATIVE** maintenance! Something has to be done to the district's aging facilities. In fact, in looking at the pictures on the fact website I would question why many of these items have not been addressed through normal operating maintenance over the years, especially with the huge increases to the operating budget. Where is the oversight?

VOTE NO TO BOTH REFER-ENDUMS and ask the district leadership to propose a realistic referendum to take care of the true "NEEDS" (restorative maintenance) of the C-I School District.

Travis Law fuels surge in Isanti County sheriff, 911 dispatch crisis calls

East Central Crisis Services (ECCS) has reported a 400% increase in mental health referrals from the Isanti County Sheriff's Office as well as Isanti County 911 dispatch. This significant rise is attributed in part to the implementation of the Travis Law, a Minnesota statute that requires law enforcement to involve mental health crisis teams when responding to individuals experiencing a mental neann emergency.

This strengthened partnership between Isanti County law enforcement and ECCS ensures that more individuals in crisis are connected to timely, compassionate care. ECCS clinicians are dispatched from Canvas Health's North Branch clinic, which also provides clinical mental health services to the community

ECCS serves residents of Chisago, Isanti, Pine, Kanabec, and Mille Lacs counties, as well as members of the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe. Services include 24/7 mobile crisis response, emergency intervention. stabilization, and referrals to ongoing support—regardless of age, background, or ability to pay.

"Mobile Crisis Services are tailored to help meet people where they are both physically and emotionally in moments of crisis," said Kelsey Yale, MSW, LICSW, Manager of Mobile Crisis Services at Canvas Health.

The Isanti County Sheriff's Department has partnered with Brianne McClellan, East Central Coordinator for the Minnesota Suicide Prevention Regional Coordination, to make mental health resources more accessible in the community. A QR code linking to local support services is now featured on county squad cars, offering a discreet and immediate way for individuals to find

"As law enforcement, we often encounter people in their most vulnerable moments," said Wayne Seiberlich, Isanti County Sheriff. "The Travis Law has helped us respond more effectively by connecting individuals to trained mental health professionals. Our partnership with East Central Crisis Services is saving lives, and the QR code initiative is another step toward making neip more accessible."

The QR code magnets are now in circulation across the county, and ECCS encourages community members to use them to access support.

North Branch council approves indoor cannabis grower

The farming history of North Branch will get a little greener as a local grower prepares to add cannabis to their crops.

Craig Johnson and Brandon Zehrer of Greenworld Greenhouses successfully sought re-zoning for a 40-acre parcel on the west side of the city's southern border. The parcel was zoned Rural Residential, matching the properties surrounding it, some of which are used for farming, according to the staff report.

Greenworld Greenhouses, located at 36000 Evergreen Avenue, has been in business 55 years, according to its website, selling flowers, ornamentals, art and more.

City zoning code allows for indoor cannabis cultivation only in industrial and agricultural districts, the latter of which now applies to the parcel in question. All existing agricultural parcels in the city were located in the northeast corner, directly opposite the parcel.

Adjacent landowners were notified of the request, including those to the south in Stacy. The only parties present at the public hearing were the applicants, and the planning commission recommended approval, which the council granted unanimously.

council offered several suggestions, including decreasing the speed limit, increasing enforcement of the speed limit, posting the 30 miles per hour speed limit (there currently aren't any speed limit signs along Holly), doing an informal speed survey, or

even adding speed bumps.

The speed bumps were immediately rejected as it would require them being mounted into place, thus damaging the two year-old pavement. The increased enforcement would result in the city paying an officer overtime. Even though cities do have the authority to implement speed limits on most city streets, Vogel said, the fact that Holly Street isn't an official detour for the project, he didn't think the city could justify reducing the speed limit.

"A constraint you have (with reducing the speed limit) is it must be done in a consistent and understandable manner," Vogel said. "What you have to think about is why is this request different than others."

Additionally, Vogel said changing the speed limit doesn't change how fast vehicles travel. "Ask any engineer, police officer, or transportation professional, and they will tell you the same thing," Vogel said.

It was Vogel's suggestion that the city

at most conduct an informal speed study, which would entail an officer sitting in an unmarked car recording vehicles' speeds during a certain time of day. A report of the findings would be presented to the council at the next meeting. Police Chief Shawn Machin said the survey would not require overtime pay.

Council member Bob Shogren asked if Towards Zero Deaths funds could be used to cover the overtime costs of additional law enforcement presence. Machin said it could, however, he didn't think there were TZD funds still available for this year.

During discussion, it was also brought up that this is only a temporary problem. Once all of South Main Street is reopened at the end of October, the traffic volume along Holly Street will return to normal.

Ultimately, the council decided to post temporary 30 miles per hour signs along Holly to remind commuters of the speed limit, to conduct the informal speed survey, and to alter officers' patrol routes so they are in the area more frequently without causing the city to pay overtime.

"This will be helpful in terms of our next street project. If there is another busy road, how is this one impacted by something similar?" Council member Mark Ziebarth



As generative artificial intelligence (AI) continues to evolve, it is raising fundamental questions about how education might change.

As students return to classrooms this fall, many will have spent their summer using ChatGPT for everything from writing emails to learning new skills. George Veletsianos, a professor in the College of Education and Human Development at the University of Minnesota, shares his expertise on critical questions these technological changes pose for teaching, learning and the future of education.

Q. What are the impacts of AI

Prof. Veletsianos: After 20 years of studying educational technology, I've learned to be cautious about claims of something revolutionizing education. AI won't transform education overnight — but it will bring many small, mean-

ingful changes. Schools and universities will largely look the same from the outside — we'll still have teachers, classes, labs, performances and homework. But behind the scenes, things will shift. Students may chat with AI when they are stuck, schools can translate online courses to multiple languages, and teachers could adapt lessons for different reading levels. These small changes could matter more than any big overhaul.

Let's compare AI to GPS.

GPS didn't replace driving, but it completely changed how we navigate. We don't memorize directions anymore and can navigate new areas easily. AI might do the same for education. Will some people learn about a topic one-to-one with AI tutors? For sure! For some topics and in some cases that will happen, much like they already learn via YouTube or online communities. But dramatic, system-wide change is unlikely.

Q. What's the biggest misconception about generative AI in education?

Prof. Veletsianos: People tend to see AI in black and white. They see it either as a miracle cure for all of education's problems or as a threat that will destroy education. The reality is that AI will neither fix nor devastate education. Its impacts are going to be far-reaching, but the long history of learning technologies tells us that those impacts are not going to go in a single direction. Online courses were supposed to make elite education free for everyone, but they mostly helped people who already had degrees. iPads in classrooms were going to revolutionize learning, but they mostly just replaced textbooks.

Something similar is likely to happen with AI. Schools will adopt it, and teachers will adjust to it. Students will write papers and do research with the assistance of AI, and teachers will also grade them with the help of AI. But our classrooms will remain largely familiar

Q. What concerns should we have?

Prof. Veletsianos: AI is tempting to use. It gives us instant answers, but that speed comes with a hidden cost. When students skip the mental work that actually builds understanding, they miss the real work of learning. It's about wrestling with problems, sitting with confusion and slowly piecing things together.

Think about it this way: You can't become a skilled architect, designer, artist or researcher by just reading answers. All of these fields require deep understanding that only comes from working through problems yourself. You need expertise to judge whether AI's confident-sounding answers are actually correct. And you can't build that expertise if you're always taking shortcuts. When we constantly outsource our thinking to AI, we risk losing crucial mental abilities: focusing deeply on hard problems, connecting complex ideas and thinking for ourselves.

Q. What becomes possible if we use AI wisely?

Prof. Veletsianos: AI could ease daily burdens for teachers and personalize learning for students. Imagine teachers spending less time on paperwork and more time actually

talking with students. Picture getting difficult engineering concepts explained through your personal interests whether that's football, painting or movies.


But what really excites me is that AI might push us to develop neglected skills. If AI-generated summaries are everywhere and sometimes wrong or misleading, we'll all need stronger critical thinking. We'll have to constantly question: Is this accurate? What's missing? What's the bias? These are essential skills.

AI also gives us a reason to revisit big questions: What is education for? Who does it serve? How can we make it better?

Real change happens when work with communities to imagine solutions that meet their needs, not just adapting solutions that serve the tech industry's vision of the future.

Q: How does your work at the University of Minnesota support AI in schools?

Prof. Veletsianos: I teach and research in the Learning Technologies program. At the graduate level, these programs prepare students to conduct research about educational technology, and design, develop, implement and evaluate technology-enhanced learning. At the undergraduate level, our learning technologies minor and major prepare students to become responsible, knowledgeable and skilled leaders in

leveraging new and emerging digital technologies.

Right now, my research focuses on how students and faculty are using — or not using - generative AI in learning, teaching and research. Who's using it, how, and why?

My goal is to improve teaching and learning not just based on new developments, but in applying what we have learned through decades of research on technology in education.

George Veletsianos is a professor in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction in the College of Education and Human Development. His areas of interest include the intersection of people, learning and technology, with special emphasis on emerging technologies in education. \$1.35 million available for Farm to School in Minnesota

Minnesota schools, early childhood education (ECE) centers, and licensed in-home family child care providers looking to serve locally sourced meals can apply for funding now through the Minnesota Department of Agriculture's (MDA) Farm to School and Early Care Grant and Local Tots Cost-Share programs. The grant and cost-share program both offer reimbursement for local food purchases of Minnesota grown and raised foods.

The MDA expects to award approximately \$1.35 million through our FY 2026 AGRI Farm to School and Early Care programs. We expect to award approximately \$200,000 to the Local Tots Cost-Share program, with the remaining funds going towards First Bite, Full Tray, and Equipment grants.

"Farm to School and Early Care is one of our most popular grant programs, and it's been great to see strong bipartisan support for expanding it," said Agriculture Commissioner Thom Petersen. "This funding not only brings fresh, local foods to students across Minnesota, it also creates real market opportunities for farmers producing everything from fruits and vegetables to cheese, meat, and other specialty crops. It's a win for kids and a win for Minnesota

The First Bite Farm to School and Early Care Grant is intended for Minnesota K-12 school districts and ECE centers that are new to buying local foods and want to build skills and experience. Applicants may request a minimum of \$2,500 and a maximum of \$5,000 in funding, with no match requirement.

The Full Tray Farm to School and Early Care Grant is intended for school districts and ECE centers that have some experience buying local food and want to expand their offerings. Applicants may request up to \$35,000 based on the number of meals served as a part of federal meal programs, including the National School Lunch Program or the Child and Adult Care Food Program.

The Local Tots Cost-Share program is intended for family child care providers. It does not require a cash match for new participants. For participants who received a Local Tots Cost-Share award during the program's first year in fiscal year 2025, a 1:1 cash match is required. We anticipate awarding approximately \$1,000 per provider, but the final amount will depend on overall demand.

Schools and ECE centers applying for either the First Bite or Full Tray grants can also request up to \$25,000 for kitchen equipment to process and prepare

local foods. Equipment funding must be part of a grant request for local food purchases and cannot be requested on its own. A 1:1 cash match is required. This opportunity is not currently open to Local Tots Cost-Share participants.

The MDA will prioritize projects that increase purchases of a wide range of agricultural products, including culturally relevant foods and specialty crops (e.g., fruits, vegetables, culinary herbs, and horticulture products like maple syrup and honey) and applicants that provide a clear plan to source a variety of agricultural products.

Grant applications and cost-share letters of intent must be submitted by 4 p.m. Central Time (CT) on Thursday, October 23, 2025. Visit the Farm to School and Early Care Programs webpage for eligibility and application details.

Funding for the Farm to School and Early Care and Local Tots Cost-Share programs is made available through the MDA's Agricultural Growth, Research, and Innovation (AGRI) Program, which administers grants to farmers, agribusinesses, schools, and more throughout Minnesota to advance the state's agricultural and renewable energy sectors. ~ MN Department of


