G-I Schools’ referendums fail

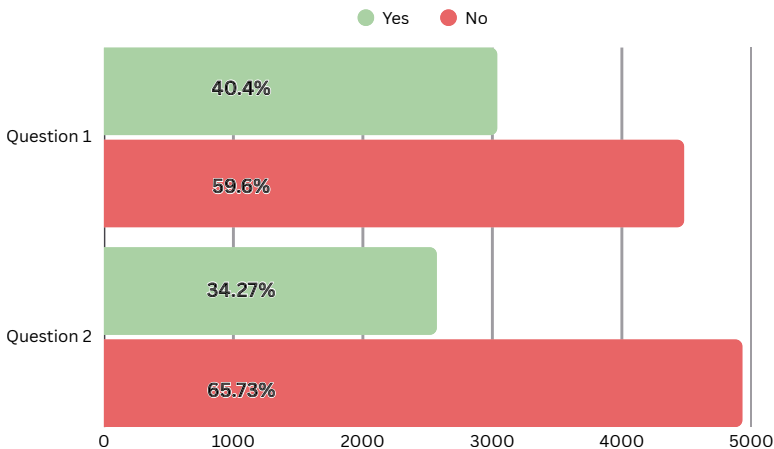
Voters in the Cambridge-Isanti School District overwhelmingly rejected both bond referendum questions during a special election held on Tuesday, Nov. 4.

Question 1, which was asking for up to \$87,100,000 for maintenance, security, and other upgrades to each of the district’s school buildings, received a total of 4,481 (59.6%) no votes, compared to 3,038 (40.4%) yes votes.

Question 2, which primarily proposed the construction of a four-court field house and upper level walking path that would be open to the public, received a total of 4,931 (65.73%) no votes, and 2,571 (34.27%) yes votes. The projected cost of question 2 was \$36,475,000.

“Cambridge-Isanti Schools extends sincere gratitude to

every voter who participated in the November 4 election,” a statement from the school district read. “While the referendum questions did not pass, the district appreciates the engagement, dialogue, and community involvement that took place throughout the process.

“The district’s facility needs remain, and staff will continue to review community feedback, evaluate priorities, and consider options for addressing the most pressing maintenance and safety needs in a responsible and responsive manner.”

Cambridge Launderers and Cleaners going up for auction

Do you have an extra \$100 laying around? If so, you could be the owner of a historic piece of property along Highway 95 in Cambridge. As an added bonus, you will also receive the property adjacent to it to the north. There is a catch, however. The purchase of this property comes with a cleanup cost of several hundred thousand dollars, if not a million dollars.

The property in question is the former Cambridge Launderers and Cleaners. After being tax forfeited in 2023, Isanti County is finally prepared to put the property, plus 11 other tax forfeited properties up for auction.

According to Isanti County Auditor-Treasurer Angie Larson, the county went through an extensive process to assess the values of each of these properties, plus determining what their opening bids should be.

“We are recommending we start the bidding out very low for a few reasons,” Larson said regarding all the properties. “Our purpose is to get them back on the tax rolls. We don’t want the liability for them. Tax forfeit, for our county, has never been viewed as a money making kind of thing.”

Isanti County is set to put the former Cambridge Launderers and Cleaners property up for auction Dec. 15.

In the specific case of the Launderers and Cleaners site, the land is valued at \$101,400, with the building valued at \$24,800. However, the opening bid was set at \$100 in consideration of the anticipated extreme cleanup costs.

“We’ll just see where it goes from there,” Larson said.

She said all hazardous materials reports and any other related information will be linked on the property’s page on the auction site. She encouraged anyone considering putting in a bid should do thorough research so they know what they are getting themselves into, especially considering all sales are explicitly “as-is.”

The online auction will take place from Dec. 15 through Jan. 14, 2026 via MNBid.mn.gov.

‘Official’ Highway 95 project process begins

After years of planning and wondering if it will ever actually become a reality, the first “formal” step in the Highway 95 expansion project is scheduled for less than two weeks from now.

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The new face of business

Women leading with relationships, not just transactions

Each year, The Best Of for the Isanti-Chisago County Star adds a few new categories based on reader feedback. This year, we added Best Women-owned Business to the list, and it became the most-nominated new category ever. This piqued our curiosity, and we looked through the entire list of nominees, discovering more than 90 women-owned businesses were nominated in categories ranging from retail to restaurant to medical and agricultural.

The spike doesn't come as a surprise to John Stavig, the Managing Director at the Gary S. Homes Center for Entrepreneurship at Carlson School of Management at the University of Minnesota.

"Participation of women in the Minnesota Cup (a contest for entrepreneurs sponsored by the Carlson School of Management) has gone from single-digit percentages in the first couple years, up to 44% of the participants this year were women entrepreneurs. I think that shows growth in the participation of women both in our program and, I think, more broadly overall."

THE APPEAL OF ENTREPRENEURSHIP: CONTROL AND FLEXIBILITY

When asked about the reasons for this increase, Stavig suggested the primary appeal of entrepreneurship might be flexibility and control rather than work-life balance.

"I think it's more about control of where they are and when they do things," he said, adding that "going into entrepreneurship for work-life balance is always the best idea" might not be true. The autonomy allows women to "be home for dinners or be home when the children are around," even if it means "staying up late at night taking care of other things" and flexing their schedule.

Stavig also believes women bring a strong leadership style to the table. "I think there are

a lot of folks that believe from a leadership standpoint and from an emotional intelligence standpoint that women can be fantastic and oftentimes better leaders over the long term". Furthermore, he observes that leading businesses are focused on more than profit: "Startup businesses in our classes and coming through the Minnesota Cup, our leading businesses are about something much more than profits. They're solving meaningful problems".

COMMUNITY MATTERS

The winner of this year's Best Women-Owned business, Judith Kissner of Scout and Morgan Books, couldn't agree more that business is about more than just numbers. For Kissner, her business is about community. "It's much more than a transaction at the register. It's like, well, I could make my register sales today the most important thing I think about, or I could think

about, where do I want to be in 5 years or 10 years, and how do I improve those relationships in the community? What can I do to support them? And then, it seems to come back, and they support me as well."

Kissner started her business after 9/11, when Kissner, who had been working for American Airlines, lost coworkers in the tragedy.

"That was the day that I just said I'm not going back. That was the precipitating incident that said, 'you know what, life is short, as you can see, you've always thought you would want to have a bookstore, and now's the time.' So that was it."

Her business grew and evolved from Log Cabin books where she started in a log cabin in 2002 just outside of Cambridge, to Scout and Morgan Books in the space she's currently occupying at City Center Mall, where she moved in 2007. In 2018, Judith won the Midwest Bookseller of the Year Award from the Midwest Independent Booksellers Association. "Those kinds of things really mean a lot, and oftentimes you just don't expect them. You don't have your head up to look for those kinds of accolades."

Through all the changes and successes, one thing remained constant. "We have always said we want to be a welcoming space to everyone. Full stop. We want to appeal to the most diverse group of readers, and we hope that whoever you are when you come into our store, hopefully you can see your life reflected in our books."

FAMILY BUSINESS

Christine Larson, the CEO & President of Empire Insurance, started her business with her parents in 2009. When her parents decided to semi-retire in 2016, she bought their portion of the business. Their plans to retire were short-lived. "We got so busy and expanded at such a large rate that Joe is a manager in my North Branch office, and Laura, she's my life and health director, so she handles all that in the office as well. My sister is also a manager at my Lindstrom office, Nicole Vodicka, and then my husband came on board in 2017 as my operations officer."

Empire's growth has not gone unnoticed. In May of 2025, they were recognized as one of the top three independent agencies in the nation for insurance companies by PropertyCasualty360 a nationally rec-

ognized insurance magazine, which Larson sees as one of her proudest moments. "Seeing the business grow to where it is, that's a huge accomplishment."

In spite of their fast growth, Larson has made time to start a nonprofit whose goal is focused on the community. In 2013, she founded the North

Branch Beautification Association. "We wanted to start with enhancing the curb appeal," said Larson, "just starting with flower baskets, and we did all the welcome banners in the community, memorial benches, and then the Coke mural renovation."

They're now fundraising to create a Veterans Memorial in North Branch's Central Park. "The Veterans Memorial is just dear to our hearts," said Larson. "We want to support our troops and the people that have sacrificed the most."

WOMEN-CENTRIC LEADERSHIP AND SUPPORT

Both Kissner and Larson are not only blazing a trail for themselves but are also actively supporting the next generation of women entrepreneurs.

Larson noted that, especially in the insurance industry, having a woman owner or CEO was more of an "anomaly," and sometimes "you are

on an island on your own but you just have to pave the way". She finds value in networking, saying, "I'm always open, you know, I love trying to help others, meet their goals and just kind of network a little bit so that helps".

For aspiring entrepreneurs, Larson offers encouragement, "I hope they see opportunity and the ability to continue to grow. To do that without sacrificing their family values and, be able to still be a mom and still be able to be successful because you can do both."

"Stay diligent to your vision and set clear goals... Surround yourself with a support system that wants you to succeed... there's always a solution to any problem, so it's about staying diligent and committed." She also recognizes the challenges, noting that to run a business, it's important to "Have a little flexibility but still knowing that you have to be dependable... If you're not putting time in somewhere else, you've got to figure out where to find the time later, even if it means you have to be working all night."

Similarly, Kissner believes in providing support and sharing her experience. She frequently meets with people who say, "Hey, I've always wanted to open a bookstore, would you mind if we have coffee and I ask you a bunch of questions?". She makes time for these conversations to discuss what starting a business "entails."

"If someone asked me for more specific help, I'd be glad to give it or at least direct them to the resources that I thought could serve them." Her motivation is altruistic, "I get to live out my dream of not only being a business owner but having a bookstore. Why shouldn't other people have that opportunity? So I celebrate them."

When Kissner was asked what she thought would motivate other women to open businesses, she said, "The more examples there are of women-owned businesses, perhaps the more it gives other women the courage to give it a try as well."

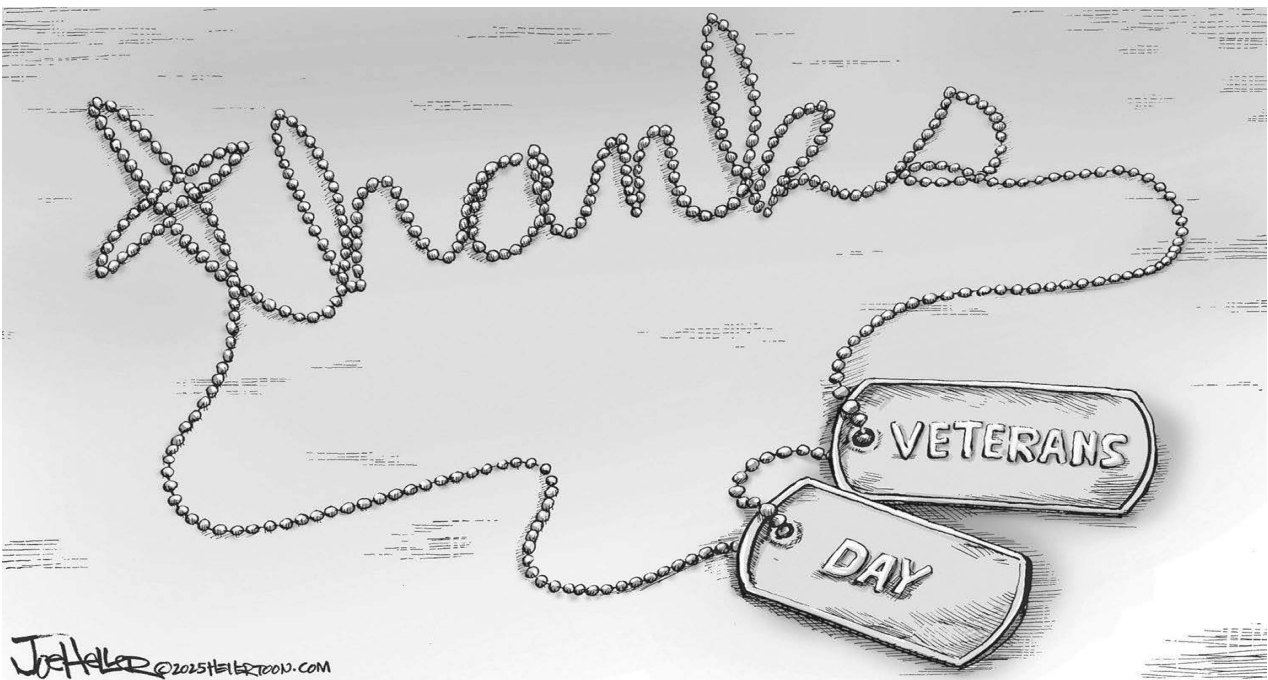

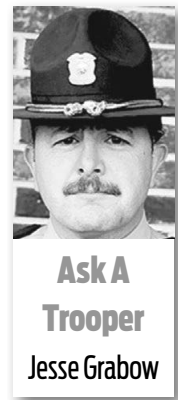

Question: I have a concern and I hope you can bring some attention to this. Several times driving at dark I see people walking or jogging in the dark and wearing dark clothing. As I admire their ambition, it can be scary when driving rather it be rural or in town and out of nowhere you see them. I would hope you could suggest to them to wear some type of reflective clothing. Again, good for them for getting healthy but hopefully to stay healthy and not get hit by someone driving. I guess the same suggestion could be said in daylight as well but especially at night. Thanks

Answer: Yes, fall is a dangerous time for pedestrians due to shorter days and earlier sunsets, which increase the time spent walking in darkness. This reduced visibility makes it harder for drivers to see pedestrians, leading to a spike in crashes involving pedestrians, especially during twilight hours and evenings. Pedestrians can help avoid this risk by wearing bright, reflective clothing, avoiding distractions like headphones, walking on the proper side of the road and using crosswalks, while drivers should slow down and be more vigilant.

Accountability, respect, learning

Last week, a parent reached out to me with a concern about her child. She was hesitant to contact me because she did not have all the facts but wanted to process a situation that involved student safety. I was so grateful she did. That one conversation reminded me how powerful it can be when families and schools work together to support students. She told me she had hesitated to reach out because she worried she might be wrong. What if the information she had is not accurate? I believe there is far more to gain than to lose in reaching out. Regardless of the outcome, peace of mind is everything.



By sharing her perspective, this parent helped us begin the process of understanding what was happening. She only had one piece of the story, but that piece mattered. It allowed us to look deeper, connect with others, and respond appropriately. In many situations, families may only see part of what is going on at school, just as we may only know part of what happens outside of school. When we put those pieces together, we can see the full picture and take the right action. Sometimes the process leads to clear action, and other times it brings clarity about what did and did not happen. Either way, open communication builds trust and strengthens our shared commitment to student safety. We need the assistance of our parents and community members in order to keep our school communities safe.
When families bring information or concerns to us, it allows our process to work as it should. We approach each situation with due diligence, connect with those involved, and take appropriate steps

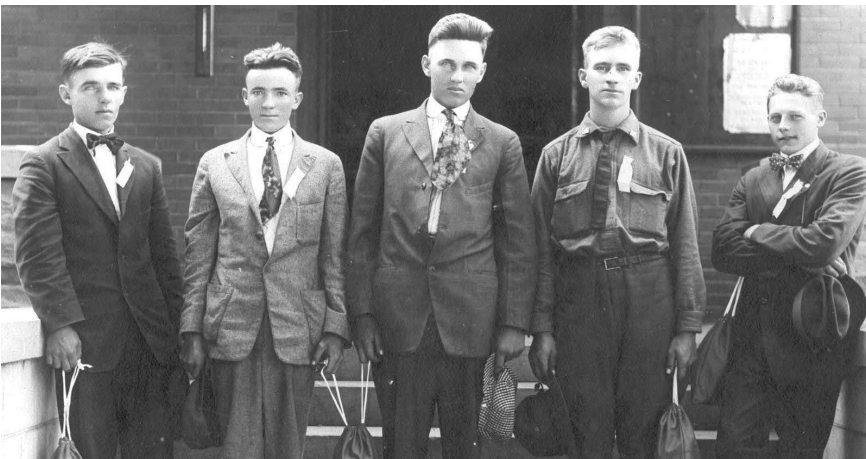
to address the issue and move forward productively. Accountability is a form of respect. Holding students accountable through consequences and follow-up conversations helps them take responsibility, learn from their actions, and grow. We hold students accountable for their choices, but we do not define them by their mistakes. Our role is to guide reflection, support change, and work toward restoring respect in the situation at hand.
Respect is a clear and nonnegotiable expectation in every setting including classrooms, hallways, buses, and online spaces. When students fall short of that expectation, we act immediately. We address the behavior, outline clear consequences, and ensure steps are taken to repair harm and restore a sense of safety for everyone involved. Students learn that accountability and respect work together to create a learning environment where every student has the opportunity to grow and belong.
Families play an essential role in this process. When you reach out, even if you are unsure or only have part of the story, it gives us the opportunity to respond quickly and effectively. Oftentimes understanding the process provides peace of mind. Your communication helps us connect the dots and ensure that students receive the support they need. Every student deserves to feel safe, respected, and valued at school.
As I reflect on that recent conversation, I am reminded that the power of partnership begins with a simple act of reaching out. If you have a question, a concern, or just want to talk through something happening at school, please do not hesitate to connect with your child’s building administrator and other trusted staff members. Together, we can continue to build a culture grounded in accountability, strengthened by respect, and centered on learning.

Isanti County’s Investment in World War I

One hundred seven years ago, the Great War ended. On November 11th, 1918, the final bullet had been fired. The conflict that started in 1914, a world away from Isanti County, had claimed the lives of an estimated 20 million people, of which roughly half were soldiers on all fronts. Additionally, another 21 million were wounded. After three years of neutrality, America joined the fight late in the war and didn’t send soldiers until the spring of 1917. On April 19, 1917, Isanti County celebrated “Wake Up America Day,” where throngs of citizens gathered in Cambridge. During the afternoon of the 19th, all businesses and schools were suspended while community members rallied around guest speakers, student performers, and musical numbers at the high school grounds. Just a week later, Isanti County sent off the first 9 voluntary enlistees to equal fanfare.
As the war raged on in Europe, back home on June 5th, 1917, Isanti County opened its registration for the Selective Service. Immediately, 1,159 young men placed their names on record as being willing to fight if called upon. Later that summer, a total of 2,936 of Isanti’s young men answered the call to recruitment and induction centers to serve at home and abroad. That amounted to roughly one-quarter of the county’s entire population at that time. As the need for soldiers continued, twenty-five high schoolers at Cambridge preemptively volunteered to join the fight.



The first large group to leave was composed of 127 draftees who gathered in the garage near the courthouse on February 27, 1918. As the men approached the courthouse, they were led by a band to the tune of “Marching Through Georgia,” where they were met with guest speakers and onlookers. The men were given a final blessing and speech of encouragement, and as the Isanti County Band led the procession, loved ones, community members, and local dignitaries (including Civil War veterans) escorted inductees to the train station in Cambridge.
After training, many of the enlisted personnel hit the field of battle in some of the most decisive engagements near the end of the war. Along with the young men, four women by the names of Victoria Hawkinson, Bessie Berglund, Esther Thornquist, and Florence Johnson served on Naval ships and as Red Cross nurses during the war. Throughout 1918, several contingents of draftees were summoned to the courthouse as the seemingly endless demand for soldiers continued. Isanti County’s investment wasn’t just needed abroad, as evidenced by the formation of the home guard on March 21, 1918. One hundred twenty-five citizens of Isanti County made up Company D, 12th Battalion of the Minnesota Home Guard, and underwent training to protect their fellow citizens.
As news from the front and abroad made its way back to Isanti County, with it came the first list of casualties. Isanti’s Elmer Palm of the 352nd Infantry Company A died on March 28th, 1918, at Camp Dodge from illness. More news would arrive with the death of Carl Arnold Peterson on July 30th, 1918, due to pneumonia. Over the course of Isanti County’s involvement in the war, twenty-nine men had died from disease while in training camps or on the front lines.

In late July of 1918, news of Springvale’s Bror Olaf Hjelm’s death arrived through a telegram. Bror had taken up service in his younger brother’s stead and was the first but, unfortunately, not the last Isanti County death on the battlefield. By war’s end, eight more of the county’s young men had given the supreme sacrifice in battle. Two months after the armistice, the family of Victor Hanson was hit with somber news that their son, who had been wounded and was one of the 150 missing, had finally been found in the Argonne Forest. The young Private was part of the “Lost Battalion” that had gotten trapped behind enemy lines in October of 1918.
At the end of the war, of the 480 enlisted personnel, thirty-four would never return home to see their loved ones. Many others, who were fortunate enough to survive, likely carried both physical and mental wounds for the rest of their lives. The last contingent of draftees arrived by train in St. Paul on November 11th, 1918, where, upon their arrival, they were sent back to Isanti County. The war was over.

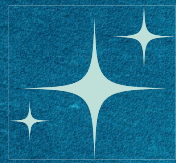

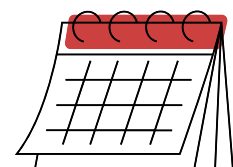

Highway 95: City to pay MnDoT in two installments instead of one lump sum

Vogel, the Minnesota Department of Transportation is set to put the project out for bids on Nov. 19. Before that can happen, however, the city council needs to enter into a cooperative agreement with MnDoT, which will detail the amount owed by the city for its share of the project, when the city will have to pay, and what might happen with any remnant parcels the state had purchased along the south side of Highway 95.

According to Vogel, the city’s portion will amount to \$4,316,250.68, with \$200,000 of that being picked up by

federal aid. He said through negotiations with MnDoT, the city will be able to pay its share in two installments — one within 30 days of the opening of the bids and one on September 1, 2026, rather than one lump sum like usual.

“This allows the project to get going for the first phase (from Fern Street to Main Street),” Vogel said. “It gives us another bite at the apple with the state legislature, to see if we can get the state to fund a state project.”

In regards to the remnant parcels, Vogel said the city will have first right of refusal to purchase those parcels to the east of Main Street at fair market value.

“That puts us in a position where the city will be able to help guide future development in a transitional business district and downtown business district, have a salable asset, and make sure it goes to highest and best use,” Vogel said.

During discussion Council Member Molly Christian questioned what would happen if during construction, it was discovered some of the contamination from the former Cambridge Launderers and Cleaners property had leached into the ground under Highway 95. She said she was concerned that such a discovery would not only increase the city’s costs for the project, but if it would

also essentially force the cleanup of the entire site.

“I can’t answer that because it is a state project,” Vogel said in regards to potential expanded cleanup. He added MnDoT intentionally planned the expansion for the south side of the highway in order to avoid the known contamination.

As for potential added costs for the city, Vogel noted the contract states, “the computation by the state of the amount due from the city will be final, binding and conclusive.”

North Branch cannabis dispensary application approved

North Branch’s first cannabis shop can proceed with plans to open over the objection of nearby property owners and businesses, now that the city attorney has weighed in and determined the city’s hands are effectively tied by its own ordinance.

The unlucky coincidence of the planned microbusiness’s location — near the home of a sitting council member — led in part to a two-week delay in the city allowing the application to proceed.

James Rayer, the owner of Wild River Cannabis LLC, plans to operate in the former Ruddy’s Rental & Party Supplies space at 4628 Isanti Trail.

Under state and local law, the location is perfectly legal, according to city attorney Robert J. Kringler of Flaherty & Hood, P.A. It is more than 1,000 feet away from schools, and the business plan includes all required security measures.

Still, nearby homeowners, including council Member Robert Canada, objected, citing concerns about traffic, a potential increase in crime, and the proximity to an adult day center that serves people with “physical or developmental disabilities, traumatic brain injuries, and other medical needs,” according to its website.

Police Chief Dan Meyer said in a letter there have been no recent traffic complaints about the section of Isanti Trail within city jurisdiction, and repeated his past opinion regarding a potential increase in crime.

“If a cannabis retail business has a proper security plan in place and is committed to following all of the rules, ordinances, and statutes relating to cannabis sales, I don’t anticipate seeing any significant increase in crime regardless of where the retail business is located within our jurisdiction,” Meyer wrote. “Our police department will conduct periodic compliance checks on any cannabis dispensaries within the city similar to what we currently do with our tobacco and alcohol licensees.”

Michael H. Rod, an administrator for Provide Care Inc., which runs the day center, submitted a letter of opposition to the “very inappropriate” location as well, claiming its vulnerable adult clients include people in active recovery or treatment from addiction.

“I believe in this case the city council not only has the right to restrict the location of this business but an obligation to insure it will not be located next to a licensed facility serving vulnerable individuals,” the letter reads.

The law, according to Kringler, disagrees.

“The city’s options here are quite limited,” he told the council, saying cities across the state have expressed frustration at the lack of local control over cannabis businesses.

Kringler said North Branch’s chance to limit where and when a cannabis retailer could operate came up back in September, 2024, when it passed the local cannabis ordinance.

At that time the city declined to impose the strict limitations on location and hours permitted by state law, instead only limiting the distance required between schools and other cannabis retailers, and allowing the stores to operate from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m., seven days a week.

The council at the time, which included Canada, voted unanimously.

As long as the city’s population remains under 12,500 people, it is only required to grant one cannabis retail license, according to Mayor Kevin Schieber, but “as soon as we hit 12,501,” a second applicant can apply.

North Branch’s population, according to ACS 2023 5-year Census data, is 11,182, according to CensusReporter.org.

“So it would be my desire, as well, to put this on a meeting or a work session, to get to a council meeting and figure out if there’s still things we can do, whether there’s buffer zones or whatever that might be,” Schieber said.

The application was approved 4-1, with Canada voting nay.

Massage parlor loses license from sexual assault allegations

A criminal investigation spelled the end of New Comfort Massage LLC’s brief operations in North Branch.

“Credible accusations” of sexual assault of clients led to an investigation which is now in the hands of the Chisago County Attorney’s Office to determine whether criminal charges will be filed against the business’s lone massage therapist, who was operating without a city license, according to city documents.

The council unanimously voted to revoke the business’s license with no objection from the licensee.

Darwin, whose legal name is Tatwing Yeung, offered no objection, telling the council he had shut down operations immediately upon learning about the criminal investigation in September.

“I was in shock when I first heard of that,” he told the council at the public hearing.

Darwin said he had worked with his “auntie,” Lau Tsz Kwan, to open the business, but she backed out after he had already signed the lease. When the therapist in question offered to work there, he agreed, partially because he was not interested in having any part of the business.

Darwin said he was unaware the therapist was unlicensed, but gave up pursuing a license for her upon hearing of the criminal investigation.

The business license, and Tsz Kwan’s own massage therapist license, was approved by the council in February. New Comfort Massage LLC did not actually begin operations until June.

The first complaint came in early June, when a customer reported to the police that the massage therapist had “grabbed his penis with her hand and asked, ‘\$80?’” according to a letter from Police Chief Dan Meyer to the city administrator.

While Meyer and the city administrator were deciding how to proceed, another complaint came in on Sept. 11, this one alleging similar behavior in addition to the therapist failing to provide a cover for the client’s genitals during the massage.

Darwin was the only speaker during the legally required public hearing before the license was revoked.

Mayor Kevin Schieber said the business had been the subject of community rumors before any official action was taken. He and other council members thanked Darwin for his willingness to correct the situation.

As SNAP lapse approaches, more turning to community action agencies

As a lapse in Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) funds approaches, Americans are turning to Community Action Agencies, trusted, locally led organizations tasked with combating poverty, for help. Yet, hundreds of Community Action organizations across the country, responsible for critical services that often include food banks and meal-delivery services for seniors, are being forced to cut back services due to the government shutdown, warns the National Community Action Foundation (NCAF).

NCAF represents over a thousand Community Action Agencies (CAAs) across the country, tasked with combating poverty on the local level. Already, an estimated 14 percent of CAAs have closed programs or furloughed staff. By Thanksgiving, another 20 percent will be forced to shutter programs and furlough staff temporarily. By December, nearly half of all CAAs will have to close programs or close down entirely.

“These agencies are driven by a mis-

sion to assist the people in their community who need help. They are doing everything in their power to remain open, especially as demand increases due to the lapse in SNAP benefits,” says David Bradley, CEO of the National Community Action Foundation. “Community Action Agencies have for decades leveraged federal funds for matching public and private dollars, but they do rely on critical federal dollars and are being forced to temporarily stop programs as funds lapse. A pause in services, no matter how short, will be incredibly catastrophic for individuals and families across the country.”

Community Action Agencies are trusted members of their local community, with many operating for over 60 years. CAAs are known for providing tailored, effective programs that tackle the root causes of poverty. In addition to operating well-known programs like the Low-Income Heating and Energy Program (LIHEAP) and Head Start, they frequently run job trainings,

manage food assistance, and coordinate emergency aid in natural disasters. In many areas, particularly rural communities, they are the sole provider of programs that help individuals and families get on a path to self-sufficiency.

Community Action Agencies rely on the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), federal funding that enables communities to make local decisions about how to combat poverty. CSBG is foundational to Community Action Agencies; it not only funds tailored programs but sustains the staff and facilities necessary for efficient operations.

“In short, CSBG keeps the lights on at Community Action Agencies. These funds are often the glue that makes Community Action Agencies so well equipped to effectively run LIHEAP and Head Start,” says Bradley. “You may have never heard of CSBG, but now I fear the lapse in funds will make it painfully obvious just how important these funds are.”

The Fayette County Community Action Agency, Inc., which assists over 30,000 residents in Southwestern Pennsylvania every year, has been forced to cut both programs and staff. 35 staff have been furloughed, and 30 staff are working reduced hours. “Our food bank and 56 pantries are still open; however, the food boxes will contain fewer items,” shares CEO Kimberly Hawk. “The Senior Center is open two days a week instead of five, and home-delivered meals will be distributed twice weekly. We are not providing rental assistance, nutrition education is not being provided in the schools, and limited staff are working.”

The Community Services Block Grant has long received bipartisan support. NCAF is hopeful that Congress and the President will shortly end the shutdown and continue to support CSBG so that we can quickly return Community Action Agencies to operating at full force. ~National Community Action Foundation
