Police presence requested at Isanti **Parks and Rec meetings**

Stemming from an incident at a recent city of Isanti Parks and Recreation Committee meeting, Isanti staff has requested a police officer be present at its meetings going forward. If that would happen, however, it would cost the Parks and Recreation Department approximately \$3,500 a

According to Isanti Police Chief Travis Muyers, the Parks and Rec meetings are the only ones that don't already have police presence at a majority of its meetings. He said police presence was originally requested by the council following an incident between two council members back in 2019. Since that time, even though police presence hasn't been needed, he has made part of his own schedule to be in attendance at council meetings, which also means he is present for EDA and Committee of the Whole meetings since they are held immediately before and/or after regular council

"I feel if I don't show up for your meetings, I'm not doing my job," Muyers said, noting the council typically has questions for him on varying agenda topics.

Muyers said the high cost is due to him having to pay overtime to whichever officer was in attendance.

"I couldn't justify to the public that it's more important to pull a patrol officer for a Park Board member than it is for a

Projects to miscellaneous buildings rounds out referendum Question 1

Editor's note: This is the seventh in a series of articles regarding the upcoming Cambridge-Isanti Schools referendum vote, with this one focusing on four buildings.

There are four Cambridge-Isanti District buildings outside the main classroom schools that have proposed projects as part of the bond referendum: the Woodland Campus, Adult Education Center, Transportation Center, and Education Services Center. These buildings feature 15 projects at a total projected cost of just under \$1.8 million.

ADULT EDUCATION CENTER

The Adult Education Center has eight proposed projects, totaling just over \$1.3 million.

The AEC building, more commonly known as the old Cambridge Armory, located one block "up the hill" from the high school, was converted by the district in 2012. Currently, it shares space with the East Central Baby Cafe.

AEC offers programs such as high school equiv-

alency (GED), English Language Skills, Digital Literacy, Citizenship, credit recovery, and ParaPro preparation.

The primary project for AEC is a 30 x 60 multi-purpose room addition for activities such as pickleball, plus indoor/outdoor accessible storage space.

"This is one of the spaces that the community will have access to during the day for recreation and activities," Community Education Director Christina Thayer Anderson said. "It will open up so many more opportunities for programming, and not just for seniors but for adults with disabilities, stay at home parents, and those that home-school.

We have been asked many times by community members of those who do not have children in our schools, 'what's in it for me?' There are many things, but this is one of them that is included in question 1.

This project by itself is estimated to cost \$1.16 million. Besides that, there is some casework, exterior facade repairs, a reconfiguration of the entry, plus

PARKS AND REC: Police presence equates to three overtime hours per meeting

member of the community," Muyers said.

He added even though most Parks and Rec meetings last less than a half-hour, the officer must be paid for at least three hours of overtime.

Neither Muyers nor Community Director Stephanie Hillesheim, who presented the request to the council, would specify which staff member initially made the request or the exact nature of the incident that prompted the request.

"It wasn't criminal" was the only answer Muyers

would give.

Muyers said besides the cost, there are other issues involved with the effectiveness of a police presence once the meeting is called to order. Since the council has abandoned its own code of conduct at meetings by allowing anyone to speak at any time for any length of time, an officer would be handcuffed in terms of removing an unruly member in the audience.

"There's a First Amendment issue there," Muyers said. 'If you have someone up here ranting about political issues you don't like, or even non-political issues you don't like, there's going to be a challenge with shutting that down. Maybe it isn't even relevant to the city. They're going off about alien invasions, because you set that precedence, it's really hard to shut that down."

He suggested the council either re-enforce the code of conduct or having the chair of that particular meeting call a recess or adjourn the meeting. As for incidents before or after the meeting, he said anyone feeling threatened should call 911 and an officer would be able to respond "anywhere between three to 11 minutes, depending on where the officers on duty are located.

After further discussion, the council approved on a 4-1 vote, with Mayor Luke Merrill casting the lone nay vote, to have an officer present at the next Parks and Rec meeting, with the cost of paying an officer overtime coming out of the Parks and Rec budget.

"I don't think we need it," Merrill said. "Hopefully the problem is resolved or people can be adults about their

"I want staff to feel safe, that's my concern right now," Council member George Hemen countered. He also suggested the council take another look at it following the

next Park and Rec meeting.

replacement of electronic door access and the building's security camera system.

EDUCATION SERVICES CENTER

The Education Services Center houses the school district offices. The building, which is known by longtime residents as the old Control Data building, located off North Main Street on the north side of town. It was converted into the district offices in 1981. The building itself was constructed in 1955.

There is a total of five projects proposed for the building, with a projected cost of \$363,000. The most expensive project is a generator addition at a cost of \$230,000. The other projects are replacements of the fire alarm system, electronic door access, security camera system, plus upgrades to the building's ADA access.

WOODLAND CAMPUS/TRANSPORTATION CENTER

The Woodland Campus houses Riverside Academy, Moving Forward, and the district's Level IV special education classes. It is located near the corner of Highway 65 and County Road 19 on the south edge of Cambridge.

The building was just constructed in 2019, so there is just one proposed project at a cost of \$50,000. That project is to relocate a hallway security door by the nursing area and reconfigure two rooms into four spaces.

Finally, the transportation building has a single project at a cost of \$16,000. That project is to add the building to the district's automation system.

Grant benefits NBPD e-bike program

The North Branch Police Department has officially launched its long-awaited E-bike program thanks to a nearly \$10,000 grant from The Dickey's Foundation. A GUIDE TO FALL LAWN CARE FOR

- Lawn & Garden Guide

Spring is the season most often associated with lawn care, and for good reason. Grass starts growing in spring, and the season is a great time to fertilize many grasses in the hopes lawns can look their best and endure the hotter, dryer weather of summer. Spring might mark the time when many homeowners

begin tending to their lawns each year, but it's important to recognize the significance of fall lawn care as well. Grasses vary, and homeowners are urged to identify which type of grass is in their lawn so they can ensure it gets the care it needs before winter's first frost. Coolseason grasses like perennial ryegrass and Kentucky bluegrass are common in various regions, and the following strategies can help homeowners with these types of grasses tend to their lawns this fall.

· Stick to your recommended fertilization schedule.

Homeowners who have been fertilizing since spring are urged to continue doing so in fall at the recommended in- Compacted soil can make it harder for water to reach the terval. It's easy to forget to fertilize in fall thanks to cooler roots of grass, which weakens grass and makes it more temperatures that don't call lawn care to mind and busier vulnerable to damage during adverse weather events like schedules after school starts again and summer vacation season ends. But many fertilizer manufacturers advise users of their products to fertilize several times over the course of the year, including in fall. Stick to the intervals recommended on the packaging of the fertilizer you've been using, making sure not to forget to fertilize this fall.

· Conduct a soil test. A soil test can determine if the soil is lacking any nutritive elements it needs to come back strong in spring. Certain amendments can restore pH balance if necessary and foster stronger growth when lawns come back in spring.

· Aerate, if necessary. Soil can become compacted over

time, and that can cause a range of problems for a lawn. drought. Compacted soil also makes it harder for nutriprofessionals, particularly in larger lawns, as the job can foster strong root development when done properly.

· Remove thatch where it's excessive. Thin layers of thatch can benefit lawns by delivering nutrients from glass clippings and leaves to a lawn. However, when thatch is excessive, it can block air, water and even fertilizer from reaching the soil. Thatch often can be removed with a rake, but lawns with especially thick layers of thatch may need to be scarified. Homeowners can take a DIY approach to scarifying or hire a landscaping professional to dethatch the lawn and remove the thatch from

their properties. Continue to water the lawn. A cool-season grass will continue to require water into the fall. Though the lawn won't need to be watered as frequently in fall as in ents in fertilizer to get into the soil. Aerating is best left to summer, various lawn care professionals note cool-season grasses still need roughly an inch of water each week in

> Remove leaves as they fall. Fallen leaves can affect a lawn in much the same way as excessive amounts of thatch, blocking water and nutrients from reaching the soil. So it's best to remove fallen leaves, especially when they begin to fall in large quantities.

Fall is an opportune time to tend to a lawn to increase the chances grass grows back strong in spring.



Lessons learned from previous column

n my column from last week, I erroneously suggested the city of Isanti could have held a primary election for mayor in April and then held the general election in May. Based on Min-

> nesota state statute, that is not possible.

While writing the column, I completely overlooked the mandatory early voting period. Based on recent Minnesota election history, I thought there had been or will be instances where a special election was held within several weeks of the holding of a primary election. I should have verified my assumptions. That was all my mistake.

Additionally, we will be taking steps on our Facebook posts to make it obvious that my and all our guest columns are opinion pieces, rather than news articles.

At the same time, I and the rest of the editorial staff stand behind my opinion that this election was the ugliest local election of memory and that while it is impossible for candidates and the sitting city council to

candidates' supporters and detractors, at least some sort of effort by the candidates should have been made to try to minimize the most negative of the rhetoric.

Additionally, I fully stand behind my opinion that back in September 2024, when the council was considering changing the city code to eliminate a primary election for this special election (as was reported in the Sept. 19 edition of the Star), they should have done just that. Signals give priority to emergency responders

uestion: My husband and I are wondering if it is true that emergency vehicles can change a light from red to green, if they need to proceed through an intersection. Is this true, or is it just a myth that

people now believe to be true? Also, if this is true, how is the light triggered? Is it triggered by the flashing lights of the emergency vehicle or is it triggered through some other method?

Thank you for your column! We read it every time and we appreciate the helpful and accurate informa-

Answer: Emergency vehicles can change traffic lights using a system called Opticom. The device on the vehicle emits a specific light or signal, which is detected by a receiver on or near the traffic light. The receiver then triggers the traffic light to change, giving priority to the emergency vehicle.

reetings from Anoka-Ramsey Community College! My name is Shannon Kirkeide, and I have the privilege of serving as Dean of Academic and Community Outreach at Anoka-Ramsey. Working 26 years at the Cambridge Campus, my heart is here, and my passion for quality and affordable education for all continues to guide

This year, as Anoka-Ramsey celebrates its 60th anniversary during the 2025-2026 academic year, I felt it was a fitting time to reflect on how the institution has grown — and how it continues to serve the region, especially through its Cambridge The college first opened in 1965

in Circle Pines with just under 600 students and tuition at \$5 per credit. Since then, more than 240,000 students have taken courses through Anoka-Ramsey,

whether in-person at the Coon Rapids or Cambridge campuses, or online.

The Cambridge Campus in particular has played a key role in expanding access to higher education in east-central Minnesota. This rural campus opened in 1978 in a wing of the Cambridge Memorial Hospital and has since evolved into a full-service campus offering a wide range of academic and career training programs. Students can pursue everything from short-term certificates to two-year degrees, and many take advantage of our transfer pathways to four-year institutions.

President Kent Hanson notes that while much has changed over the decades, the reasons students come to Anoka-Ramsey remain consistent: "We all come here for a reason — to better ourselves, to get better jobs and grow and learn." He also emphasizes the importance of exploration, as students use their time at the college to figure out their goals and interests.

Beyond academics, the Cambridge Campus contributes to the local economy and community life. According to a 2023 study commissioned by Minnesota State, Anoka-Ramsey and its partner institution, Anoka Technical College, generated over \$437 million

in economic impact and supported more than 3,300 jobs. That includes workforce training, student and employee spending, and partnerships with local employers.

The campus also serves as a cultural and civic hub, hosting art exhibits, music performances, and community service initiatives. Students and faculty regularly engage in local events, and the college supports a variety of clubs and athletic programs.

As Anoka-Ramsey enters its seventh decade, the Cambridge Campus continues to reflect the college's mission: providing affordable, accessible, and high-quality education to a diverse student body. It's a reminder that even as the landscape of higher education shifts, community colleges like Anoka-Ramsey remain vital to the regions they serve. We at Anoka-

Ramsey are incredibly grateful to our local communities for your continued support, and we are proud to serve you!

Talking back-to-school anxiety with University of Minnesota

Back-to-school season can come with mixed feelings for young learners. While some students are excited to return to the classroom, it can also cause anxiety for many others.

Lidan Gu, PhD, with the University of Minnesota Medical School and M Health Fairview, speaks about the signs and causes of back to school anxiety, and how parents can provide support.

Q: What is anxiety?

Dr. Gu: Anxiety is like an internal alarm system that alerts us to potential threats or stressors. It is a natural process and is essential for human survival. A little anxiety can help us to be more prepared for school, work and day-to-day tasks, and thus promotes positive outcomes. However, it can be a problem when anxiety becomes too intense and interferes with our ability to deal with tasks or solve problems effectively. It can also cause people to try to avoid situations that cause them anxiety.

Q: What are some common sources of anxiety during the back-to-school season?

Dr. Gu: Going back to school may trigger anxious reactions for a variety of reasons. First, going back to school is a time of transition and change. For students who are more comfortable with specific routines, a change in their routine can trigger anxiety and worry. Second, going back to school means increased learning activities. In comparison to activities at a summer camp or unstructured playtime, learning activities require more mental effort and self-control skills to get positive feedback. When a student anticipates that going to school will not lead to positive or rewarding feedback, the student is more likely to feel anxious or worried.

Third, increased social demands can also cause anxiety. For students who are not accustomed to being away from their parents, going to school can trigger separation anxiety. Students who are typically shy may find going back to school to be anxiety-provoking. Students with certain disabilities or immunocompromised status may deal with additional worries surrounding their health when returning to school. Lastly, stress within our community and whether our families feel safe may also contribute to anxiety.

Q: What are some of the symptoms of anxiety in children?

Dr. Gu: Depending on how close the perceived "threat" is — i.e. how soon they'll be starting school — children may feel different levels of anxiety symptoms. When children are reminded a few weeks out from their start date, they may feel mild worry or anxiousness. This can present as restlessness, irritability or being generally more emotional. As the first day gets closer, children may show increased anxiety symptoms, such as difficulty concentrating on activities or difficulty falling asleep. Some children may experience physical effects of anxiety such as increased heart rate, headaches, stomachaches, decreased appetite or increased sweating.

Q: How can young children manage their anxiety? How can parents provide support?

Dr. Gu: Helping young children name their anxiety is a crucial first step. They often lack the ability to connect their symptoms to their anxiety sources, which adults likely have more experience with. Parents and caregivers should acknowledge their emotions and potential causes, validate their experiences and help them understand what their anxiety is. Parents should also talk with children about their specific worries, which can help identify the sources of anxiety. Additionally, parents can model how to manage stress and anxiety by naming and talking about emotions, directing attention to important values that can guide their anxiety management, and finding effective ways to cope with their stress response. It's important for parents to remember that what may seem minor



to adults can be significant to children.

When students worry about the new school year, they may only focus on the stressful aspects. Reminding them of positive aspects, like their favorite classes or going to recess, can help. Creating positive associations with school, such as celebrating the first day together or planning special activities for a Monday can also be beneficial. For children who struggle with learning, reviewing school accommodations and discussing children's concerns is useful.

For students who are concerned about social problems, it will be helpful to discuss social problem-solving and identify support available for working on social skills. For clinically significant anxiety symptoms, seeking professional support from a children's mental health provider is important.

Q: What work are you doing at the University of Minnesota to advance mental health research?

Dr. Gu: Having chronic medical conditions can be stressful and anxiety-provoking. My research focuses on

understanding the neuropsychological aspects and mental health factors that can promote effective adjustment, coping and self-management in the pediatric solid organ transplant population. One of my current research projects is to develop an effective assessment of psychosocial concerns in pediatric kidney transplant recipients. With this assessment, my colleagues and I hope to be able to identify patients' mental health and psychosocial concerns, understand how these concerns are related to health decision making and medical adherence, and how these concerns can be addressed through a multidisciplinary approach.

Lidan Gu, PhD, is an assistant professor with the University of Minnesota Medical School and a pediatric psychologist with M Health Fairview. She specializes in psychological evaluation and consultation for children and adolescents with chronic medical conditions and neurodevelopmental disorders. Her research interests include the impacts of mental health on health-related decision making. -University of Minnesota Medical School

Minnesota Starwatch for September 2025

This September, the sun isn't the only bright object dropping in the sky. Venus also follows a steady course downward.

Venus is now a bright beacon low in the eastern predawn sky. On the 1st, Venus, Jupiter and the star Procyon, in Canis Minor, will form a nearly equilateral triangle with Jupiter at the top. And Sirius, in Canis Major, will be lower and to the south. This is another good time to compare Venus, the brightest planet, with Sirius, the brightest star.

But Venus's orbital motion will soon carry it behind the sun. Don't miss its show on the 19th. On that morning, Venus, a thin waning moon, and the bright star Regulus, in Leo, the lion, appear in a tight group just above the horizon, like a welcoming party for the sun.

In the evening sky, Saturn stands out among the relatively dim fall constellations. On the 21st, Earth glides between it and the sun, which brings us almost as close as we ever get to Saturn. Look for it low in the southeast to east at nightfall, below the four stars framing the Great Square of Pegasus. The rings are only slightly tilted, so almost all its brightness is due to the planet itself.

September's full moon rises the evening of Sunday, the 7th. It appears about half an hour before Saturn and leads the planet across the night sky.

This month, the Summer Triangle of bright stars reaches its highest point—or three points—in the south during the early evening hours. The Milky Way runs through the Triangle, adding a special beauty for viewers with or without binoculars.

Fall arrives with the equinox at 1:19 p.m. on the 22nd, the moment the sun crosses the equator heading south. It's also the moment the Northern Hemisphere's tilt changes from toward the sun to away from it.
