County now requires permit for larger fireworks displays

After a public hearing on the matter, the Isanti County Board approved an ordinance regulating the use and display of fireworks in the unincorporated areas of the county at its Sept. 18

The ordinance sets forth the need to acquire a permit for the display of fireworks in unincorporated areas of the county, along with the rules for the display of fireworks. There will be a \$50 fee to obtain the permit.

Some of the parameters of the approved ordinance include only allowing fireworks between the hours of 6 p.m. and 11 p.m.; only one permit may be issued to any entity or organization per year without board approval; and only aerial fireworks or aerial shells may be used, with fireworks designed to explode on the ground or underground being prohibited.

Although no members of the public were present at the hearing to make comment, county residents Michael and Lucinda Lundell sent a letter stating they thought the ordinance "would be greatly improved by the inclusion of the requirement to notify

residents and or landowners in a specified distance from planned fireworks displays."

A notification would allow area residents and landowners to prepare for the display if it would affect themselves or their animals.

The Lundell letter shared the story of a fireworks display earlier this summer which spooked their horses, causing the horses to damage a portion of fence and injuring two of the horses. The letter stated if the Lundells had proper notification, they would have been able to move their horses to a location farther away from the display and in a better

Iggy loves life at Farmaste Animal Sanctuary

One year ago, a white goat with impressive horns captivated the people and police department of Inver Grove Heights. He peeked into windows – startling families as they ate dinner – and explored construction sites. His antics led to multiple calls to the IGHPD, a flood of social media posts, and coverage on all of the local news networks.

Finally, after IGHPD's former Chief Paul Schnell promised an an-you-can-eat pizza party ior the officers that managed to nab him, he was captured Sept. 13, 2018. He was caught humanely – alive and uninjured.

Chief Schnell was so pleased that he had been safely brought into custody that he hand-delivered Iggy into Farmaste Animal Sanctuary's care at the University of Minnesota Large Animal Veterinary Medical Center.

For the last year, Iggy has been living peacefully at Farmaste Animal Sanctuary, a nonprofit farm sanctuary located approximately 10 miles southeast of North Branch.

Iggy quickly integrated into a herd of three elderly dairy goats who moved to Farmaste in their retirement. He loves to play with his goat friends - and occasionally he will even challenge a cow to a friendly


When Iggy first arrived, he was very skittish and rarely allowed

humans to get close. Over time, he learned to trust his caregivers and now will regularly give them a gentle nudge for attention.

With a larger-than-life personality, he also continues to captivate the public. Iggy, known for posing dramatically for photos, is one of Farmaste's most popular social media subjects. He also regularly charms guests during Farmaste's weekly farm tours and events, including a large following of Inver Grove Heights residents.



TALKING WITH THE EXPERTS

Marathon training includes mental as well as physical preparation

With the Twin Cities Marathon weekend set for Oct. 4-6, racers of all ages and skill levels will gather to run distances ranging from 3.1 to 26.2 miles.

Chris Lundstrom, Ph.D., a School of Kinesiology lecturer who specializes in endurance training and performance, exercise physiology and sports science, answers questions about how to prepare for and enjoy a marathon.

Q: Do you have any advice for first-time

Prof. Lundstrom: Your first marathon is something you'll never forget. There will be ups and downs — knowing that going in will help you be prepared to deal effectively with whatever the marathon throws your way. If something goes wrong, don't panic. Just figure out how to best deal with it, and then keep moving forward.

Most importantly, try not to get too caught up in the excitement of the event during the first few miles. Many people make the mistake of starting out at a faster pace than they have done on their long runs. This leads to premature fatigue, and a very long last few miles.

Use the excitement of the crowds and the atmosphere to fuel you over the last few miles, where you will really need it.

Q: What kind of training does it take to successfully run a marathon and, for amateur runners, what should a typical marathon training plan look like?

Prof. Lundstrom: There is a pretty wide range of marathon training plans depending on the goals and experience level of the runner. At a minimum, I would recommend running three to

four days per week consistently for the three to four months prior to the marathon. One of those days per week should be a long run, which may start at only five to six miles, but will increase gradually to 20 miles.

In addition, doing some muscular strengthening exercises at least once per week is important for marathon runners.

Q: What are common injuries associated with marathon running and how can they be prevented?

Prof. Lundstrom: There are many common running injuries, including runner's knee, iliotibial band syndrome, shin splints, plantar fasciitis, stress fractures and Achilles tendonitis.

There's no surefire way to prevent running injuries, but there are a few things you can do to reduce the incidence. The first is to use proper running shoes that are the right type for your foot and biomechanics. Some runners need additional support and stability in their shoes, and others are better off in a neutral shoe.

tal? Are there methods to prepare your mind as well as your body? Prof. Lundstrom: Obviously, you can't neglect

the physical training and be prepared for the

marathon, but I would say the same is true of the mental side of running. Runners have a wide range of mental skills and tools that they can use to help navigate the challenges of an event like the marathon. Those skills should be practiced throughout training.

Some of the most commonly used mental skills for runners are imagery, self-talk and relaxation.

Imagery involves seeing oneself running the marathon and mentally rehearsing the event prior to race day. Self-talk is a means of taking the inner dialogue that we all experience and harnessing it for more productive purposes. Focusing on specific phrases at different times during the race allows a runner to redirect thought patterns away from potentially damaging, negative thoughts to more helpful and productive ones. Relaxation is critical before and during the marathon. Being able to find a state of both mental and physical calm can spare energy for when it is needed most, later in the marathon.

Q: What is your current research in exercise focused on?

Prof. Lundstrom: Some of my current research is focused on the energy cost of running, particularly in marathoners. It is my hope to gain a better understanding of how and why some runners are able to cover the same distance while utilizing less energy than other runners. This has important implications in marathon training and preparation, as well as in helping to understand the limits of human performance.

Chris Lundstrom is a lecturer in the College of Education and Human Development's School of Kinesiology. His research interests center on endurance exercise training and performance. More specifically, he is interested in running economy, aerobic capacity, metabolic substrate utilization and heart rate variability.





Work day volunteers must be at least 12 years of age (those 12-16 years old must be accompanied by an adult; all volunteers under age 18 must have a waiver signed by a parent or guardian).

After some discussion, it was decided that the logistics of notifying people of a fireworks permit was simply not feasible, and any distance chosen would

County Attorney Jeff Edblad noted that residents in the county can sign up on the county's website for notifications via text message or email regarding numerous items, including the issuance of permits by the county. Therefore, if someone were concerned about fireworks taking place near their property, they can sign up to receive notifications

The county notification is free, and if anyone has problems signing up, they can contact the county auditor's office for assistance.

TRUTH IN TAXATION MEETING SET: PRELIMINARY LEVY AND BUDGET APPROVED

Once again this year, Isanti County, Cambridge-Isanti School District and the city of Cambridge will hold a joint Truth in Taxation meeting. The board approved a meeting date, time and location of Tuesday, Dec. 3, at 6 p.m. at the Richard G. Hardy Performing Arts Center (located at Cambridge-Isanti High School).

The preliminary levy approved by the board is \$23,225,583; an increase of 6.3%, and the preliminary budget is \$50,487,367.

"This is the preliminary – we are

setting the ceiling," commented Commissioner Susan Morris. "We can come down from here, and we had the conversation at the committee of the whole meeting that we will continue to try to find savings and ways we can bring it down before we set the final levy."

TWO PUBLIC HEARINGS SCHEDULED

The board scheduled two public hearings for upcoming board meetings.

The first would be a public hearing regarding the rezoning of two lots that were incorrectly zoned as water-oriented commercial, but should be shoreland residential.

The mistake was discovered when one of the property owners of the incorrectly zoned lots requested a permit to build a garage. The building of structures is not allowed in water-oriented commercial zones.

The public hearing will take place Wednesday, Oct. 2, at 9:30 a.m. in the county board room.

The second public hearing scheduled by the board relates to the county's feedlot ordinance. After a previous public hearing regarding the ordinance, the board sent the ordinance back to the planning commission to attempt to alleviate some of the issues raised during the public hearing. However, the planning commission does not recommend any changes at this time.

The public hearing regarding the feedlot ordinance will take place Wednesday, Nov. 6, at 9:30 a.m. in the county board room.

Abbie Higley was a defensive standout in the win, collecting 25 digs. Setter Faith Nelson added 25 assists.


FOOTBALL

Braham currently sits at a 6-9 overall record.



Roofs get more abuse from the elements than any other part of the building, and preventive maintenance is a key element to saving money on your roof by providing a longer service life. It's important to inspect our roofs surface after any severe storm or day of excessive winds. At least 95% of leaks occur at points of flashing.

• Clean all debris from the surface of the roof.

This includes debris that has gathered behind HVAC units, pipes and pitch pans, and any other roof penetrations. Debris has a tendency to hold water, and water will expedite roof deterioration, especially if your roof is asphalt based.

• If your roof has a gravel surfacing and there are some bare spots present, clean the bare spot thoroughly using a broom and a wire brush if necessary.

Be sure to remove all loose dirt generated from brushing and sweeping. Blow on the area if need be. Spread a thin layer of asphalt roof cement over the bare area about 1/8 inch thick. Gather some lose gravel from other areas of the roof and embed it in the roof cement.

Roof Maintenance

· Check all flashings.

Make sure that the flashings are not deteriorated and there are no holes in them. Routine inspections need to be performed on your roofing and your flashings. Lots of homeowners fail to properly check their flashing. But flashing that is poorly attached due to wind and poor weather conditions can cause open seams and laps. This can lead to blow-offs of roofing material, leaks and reduced puncture resistance. Flashing protects the most vulnerable part of the roof; it protects and provides a water-proof barrier between the actual roof's material and the structure beneath. If you find your flashing is in need of repair, it's best to do it immediately; if you wait- it can create more problems.

Random Facts About

Ask A Trooper: What is good advice for driving in dense fog?

Question: Can you give some advice on driving in fog? The fog became one car-length dense the other day, and it became a dangerous situation.

Answer: Driving when the weather limits your visibility can be a challenge for all of us on the road. You can reduce

your chances of being involved in a crash by following a few safety Minnesota law says

that every vehicle on a roadway shall display lighted headlamps, lighted tail lamps, and illuminating devices from sunset to sun-

rise. The law also applies when it's raining, snowing, sleeting or hailing and at any time when visibility is impaired by weather or insufficient light, at a distance of 500 feet ahead.

Basic automatic headlights work through sensors which detect how much light is outside. These sensors are located on the dash of the vehicle. The headlights turn on when the sensors detect a certain level of darkness or the level of ambient light.

The problem is there are limitations to automatic headlights. Sometimes they do not turn on during heavy rain, snow or fog, as the light sensor still detects some light.

I see many drivers that fail to physically turn on their headlights, which will also activate the rear taillights and marker lights. Drivers might assume the sensors will activate all of the vehicle's lights in reduced visibilities, but that is not always the case.

We also recommend what's called the 3-second-plus following distance rule. Watch the vehicle in front of you. When that vehicle gets past an object such as a sign, pole, bridge, etc., then count off three seconds. You should not arrive at that spot sooner than your count to three. If you do, then you are following too close!

Also, you must add one second for every hazard that exists. Hazards include but are not limited to heavy traffic, rain, snow, fog, driving into the sun, etc. In some cases you might have to allow six, seven seconds (or even more) to be safe because of existing

If you eliminate all distractions while driving, you might be able to see a hazardous situation in time to avoid it or reduce the severity of a crash.

We recommend when driving in dense fog, heavy rain or snow to drive in the right lane of a two-lane roadway going in the same direction. In the event that a vehicle is traveling the wrong way, chances are that they will be in your left lane as they approach and pass by you.

When visibility is reduced, slow down, increase your following distances, manually turn on your lights and eliminate all distractions.
