Local Korean War veteran receives overdue award

The Korean Conflict is often referred to as "the Forgotten War." Sandwiched between World War II and the controversies surrounding the Vietnam War, many only recognize it as the setting for the acclaimed (but historically inaccurate according to some historians) TV show "M*A*S*H."

There are, however, organizations dedicated to keeping the memory of what President Harry S. Truman called at the time a "police action" alive, along with paying homage to the soldiers who fought in it. One such organization is the Borinqueneers Motorcycle Club.

This organization is dedicated to honoring and preserving the memory of the 65th Infantry Regiment, also known as the Borinqueneers. The Borinqueneers were primarily composed of Puerto Ricans, but over time also featured soldiers from other nationalities. And that is why one of its members rode all the way from Florida to Cambridge — to recognize Braham graduate and current Cambridge resident Sergeant Dehl Lindstrom.

Lindstrom enlisted in the US Army Reserves in 1951 and was inducted into the active-duty Army a year later. He was eventually assigned to the 65th Infantry Regiment in Korea. During his time in Korea, he was awarded a Bronze Star with V device for Valor for helping treat wounded during one particular heavy barrage of mortar fire in July 1953.

CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL

While his individual actions are certainly worthy of recognition, what brought people together in the Cambridge-Isanti High School

Performing Arts Center was his affiliation with the Borinqueneers.

The unit was formed in World War I and activated for World War II, in addition to Korea. During its time, the unit became famous for fighting valiantly but was also infamous due in large part to prevailing racism. Prior to Lindstrom joining the unit, there was an incident that resulted in 91 members being court-martialed and sent to jail. Those courts-martial were eventually overturned and in 2014, President Obama bestowed every member of the 65th Infantry Regiment with the Congressional Gold Medal.

"Though the 65th Infantry was mostly comprised of Puerto Ricans throughout the

Cambridge garbage haulers not changing

Cambridge residents don't have to worry about being forced to change refuse haulers for the next five years. On the other hand, residents won't have any additional options besides the two current ones either.

After making a request for proposals several months ago, only Lepage and Waste Management, who are the current residential haulers; plus ACE, who is the commercial hauler, responded.

According to City Administrator Evan Vogel, all the proposals were nearly identical to current contracts, which expire Dec. 31, with the exception of prices. Both Lepage and ACE put in price increases that would automatically take effect for the third, fourth, and fifth years of the contract. Waste Management put in two bids. The first featured a higher initial price but didn't include any automatic increases. As with the previous contract, if Waste Management wished to increase its fees, it would have to get council approval. The second had a lower starting price but also included automatic increases each year.

After a brief discussion, the council unanimously approved continuing with Lepage as a residential, plus the Waste Management bid that did not include automatic fee increases. ACE will continue to provide commercial service, but not residential.

CITY STAYING WITH MIDCO

Another service that isn't changing, at least for the city itself, is the internet provider. The city's contract with MidCo is also expiring on Dec. 31, and much to Vogel's chagrin, he admittedly didn't get the contract renewal on the council's agenda until the last meeting of 2024.

"This is something I wish I would have brought to you about a month ago," Vogel admitted to the council. "That would have made this a little cleaner."

The reason for this admission is the new contract with MidCo is for five years, and the council was

C-I Schools' levy shows minimal change

The big news coming out of the Cambridge-Isanti Schools' Truth in Taxation meeting is that there isn't that big of news regarding the 2025 budget

As Finance Director Chris Kampa repeatedly notes, a school district's budget is set "backward" from other government entities. While other governments build their budgets and then establish a levy amount based on that budget, school districts are given their local levy amounts by the state, and then they must adjust their budgets accordingly. Each district's levy amount is established based on a complex formula created by the state. Kampa said nearly 95% of a district's budget comes either from state aid or local levies. The only way a district can increase that levy amount is via a voter-approved

Last year, changes to the state's formula mandated Cambridge-Isanti Schools to increase its local levy amount by 12.8%. That increase, according to Kampa, was due to the area's large market rate increase, which the state's formula viewed as an indicator local residents could afford to contribute more of the district's budget through the levy.

This year, Kampa is happy to announce there is a mere 2.5% increase in the district's levy. Given a decrease in the tax rate, many property owners should see a decrease in the school district's portion of their property taxes, assuming their property values didn't

"The overall headline is that this year's impact is pretty minimal," Kampa said. "There will be a small decrease for residential property owners — somewhere in the neighborhood of twenty to forty dollars, depending on your property valuation.'

On the flip side of the coin, however, Kampa said the district's funding from the state has also remained the same, despite the fact expenses continue to rise. One of the biggest areas where this is noticed is in special education.

'Special education is becoming a larger part of our budget," Kampa said. "It is supposed to be 100% reimbursed by the state and federal government, but that's not the case, and I don't think it has ever been the case. So that results in what we call a 'general ed cross-subsidy,' where we take dollars that are meant for general education and all students and we have to apply it to special ed."

He added that the amount as of late has been \$3 million.

Back to the positive news, Kampa said following the years when the district was facing multi-million dollar budget shortages that forced it to drastically cut the budget while at the same time dip into its fund balance, the district's fund balance has been recovered back to an acceptable level. This in large part was due to the voter-approved operating levy referendum.

Kampa cautioned, though, that the district is looking at projections of having to do minor deficit spending in the near future, which will decrease the fund balance.

wondering about doing a request for proposal considering there are now other internet providers available in the area (namely East Central Electric) who might be able to provide the same or better service for the same or less cost to the city.

Vogel said with the contract with MidCo being five years, there are price breaks built in the city probably would not receive with a shorter contract. Additionally, since the current contract does expire in two weeks, the only way the city could renegotiate with MidCo and/or ask ECE for a bid would be to hold a special meeting on Dec. 30 — something nobody on the council appeared to be too enthusiastic about.

"The only concern I have is continuity of service," Vogel said. "We need to have something in place (by Dec. 31)."

Councilmember Aaron Berg suggested that since ECE is still relatively new in the internet provider business, waiting five years will allow them to work

out all the possible bugs and glitches in their system.

"Five years might not be a bad trial run for ECE to get their potential niccups figured out," Berg said. "There's nothing like switching to an internet provider that can't provide the service you absolutely need to provide daily government service."

Ultimately, the council unanimously approved MidCo's five-year contract.

ODDS AND ENDS

In other action, the council:

•Approved the purchase of new tasers for the Police Department;

 Approved a policy change to forbid smoking in city-owned vehicles;

·Amended the city ordinance regarding building exterior wall finishes to allow for engineered wood; and

•Pushed a possible ordinance change increasing the maximum allowable vehicle weight that can be parked in driveways and/or on city streets to the Planning Commission.

North Branch Schools' levy dips slightly

North Branch taxpayers got good news from the schools on the 2025 tax levy, which will go down by 1.07% over the 2024 levy, for a total of \$10,036,461.

The district's finance director, Todd Tetzlaff, presented the levy information at the North Branch Area Public School's board meeting during the annual required Truth in Taxation

The dip is in part due to a fully funded OPEB trust, which funds benefits to former district employees. Last year's levy included a \$419,692 payment into the district's trust.

This savings means the district will collect \$113,893 more for the general fund, \$31,409 more for community education, and \$166,146 more for general debt service while still collecting

\$108,245 less overall compared to the 2024 levy.

According to Tetzlaff's presentation, the majority of District 138's \$48,208,164 revenue budget for 2025 comes from the state, with just 16% coming from local property taxes.

Tetzlaff also told the board the district will still be able to maintain a fund balance to pay its projected expenses during low-revenue months

of the year. Director Adam Trampe praised Tetzlaff and the board for lowering costs to taxpayers at a time when other

local authorities are raising them. "When we're all sitting here, feeling like our property taxes all keep going up," Trampe said, "and we're not part of that this year? Good for us."

The board-certified the 2025 levy unanimously.

Minnesota DNR accepting comments on off-highway vehicle strategic master plans

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is accepting comments through Feb. 21 on strategic master plans for each of the three primary categories of off-highway vehicle (OHV) recreation: all-terrain vehicles (ATV), off-road vehicles (ORV), and off-highway motorcycles (OHM).

The plans communicate the background and trends of OHV recreation, share information about statewide OHV trail management and strategic planning, and provide guidance regarding future trail maintenance and development practices. While the plans do not identify specific trail alignments or include commitments for future development, they do identify considerations that might make an area well-suited or

ill-suited for future trail development. In addition to the three strategic master plans, the DNR has developed an overview document that ties the individual plans together.

The plans and overview document are available for review on the OHV planning project webpage (engage.dnr.state.mn.us/off-highway-vehicle-strategic-master-plans). Printed copies of the plans are available by request.

The DNR will host an online webinar with live captioning on Jan. 28, at 6 p.m. to provide an overview of the draft plans. Instructions for how to join the webinar can be found on the project webpage (engage. dnr.state.mn.us/off-highway-vehicle-strategic-master-plans). Individuals with a disability who need a reasonable accommodation to participate in this event are asked to contact Molly Lou Pintok at MollyLou.Pintok@state.mn.us or 651-259-5095 by Jan. 14. Comments on the draft plans must be submitted no later than 4:30 p.m. on Friday, Feb. 21.

them to OHV.Planning.DNR@state.mn.us. Mail-in comments should be sent to Molly Lou Pintok, 500 Lafayette Road, St. Paul, MN 55155.

All comments will be considered as the DNR finalizes the plans during the first half of 2025. More information about OHV recreation is available on the DNR website (mndnr.gov/ohv).

In favor of 'Cambridge Shores', for now

hen I first heard over a year ago about the city of Cambridge's plans to build a new park featuring a beach, event center, plus more, I will admit I had

some concerns. Those concerns were regarding both components of the plans, with the primary concern being money. Over a year later, as the city has crossed the proverbial "point of no return," I will say some, but not all, of Thousand those concerns have Words been lessened.

The first of my concerns is regarding the selling of a majority of the land to a developer. I remember very

well how this kind of tactic can - and has - blown up in the city's face. What I am talking about is the city purchasing the former state hospital land now

known as Heritage Greens. The city made that purchase thinking they would turn a huge profit only to see a majority of the land sit vacant for years. Even after lots started to get bought up, it wasn't until the city changed the zoning to allow for apartments and townhomes that the city could sell the last large chunk of land to what is now The Emerald Apartments.

With the Munkberg land, the city did do exactly what it said it would do and didn't finalize that sale until it had a developer to almost immediately partner with. On top of that, the city figured out a way to pay for the purchase using cash on hand and not with direct local taxpayer money. However, in these uncertain times in the housing market, I won't breathe easy until the third and final of the yearly payments are made by the developer.

In regards to the park component, I will first say I have always been in favor of adding recreational amenities to the city. In fact, when I was tasked with finding a focus project during a lead-

ership training I took, I chose adding recreational amenities as my project. That being said, I also have repeatedly said I would only support projects that were constructed and operated in a fiscally responsible manner. Many readers know about the ten-plus-year debate about building a YMCA or some other indoor recreational facility that would include a pool. People who have read my comments about that would think I am dead-set against it. That is only true because according to reliable sources, that just isn't possible without a major impact on the levy.

So, why would my opinion be different for this project? Well, for one, maintaining a beach, event center, etc. would be far less expensive than an indoor pool. A public beach would be free of charge to those using it, unlike a pool. The costs of running an event center could easily be offset by the rental fees, just like with any other event center. Sure, there would be some costs such as lifeguards and staffing of a kayak, canoe, and paddleboard rental. But those

would be relatively minor.

That does leave the biggest "if," and what would be a dealbreaker for my support. The construction of the park, which could eclipse \$10 million, must also be accomplished without impacting local property taxes through the city's levy. So far, the city has pledged that is exactly what will happen. They plainly have said construction of the various components of the park will be built piece-by-piece, as cash becomes available. So, for the time being, I will take their word for it.

At the same time, I am giving the city fair warning. As soon as I sense that is no longer the case, as soon as I start hearing any sort of justification for using levy money, I will publicly call them out on it and retract my support for it.

When distracted driving turns deadly: A precautionary message

With the holidays upon us I wanted to share a message about distracted driving. Here is some information we recently shared on our Department of Public Safety blog.



"It was supposed to be a routine trip for 20-year-old Megan Severson. On Oct. 17, 2019, Severson was driving from Preston in southeastern Minnesota to visit her boyfriend in North Dakota. But when she reached Highway 52 in St. Paul, everything changed in an instant.

The crash - Severson glanced over at her

GPS to see which exit she needed to take. "I looked down and I was speeding, so it felt a lot shorter than it actually was," said Severson. "When I came to realize that the cars in front of me were stopped, I hit my brakes as fast as I thought I could."

She couldn't stop in time. Severson Walked away from the crash with her life. An innocent passenger did not. Severson rear-ended the stopped car in front of her, causing a chain-reaction

crash involving multiple vehicles. A passenger in the car she hit, Anthony Kawino, 33, of Burnsville was killed. "I just looked around at the scene that was in front of me," Severson recalled. "It was horrific. I saw them pulling the blanket over the deceased, and at that point it clicked into my brain that this is bad. Very, very bad."

Minnesota State Patrol Sgt. Daniel Dixon was the reconstructionist who documented how and why this crash happened. The answers were obvious, he said. Severson was speeding at 70 mph in a 55 mph zone just before she hit the car Kawino was in. "At that speed, if you're looking at your GPS for five seconds to try to figure out where you would need to go next, you just traveled almost two football fields of distance," Dixon said.

Somber anniversary - Severson was charged with criminal vehicular homicide because she was speeding and distracted at the time of the crash. She still remembers her lawyer explaining what this felony charge could mean for her future. "When he first said people normally get prison time, I went off the rails in my mind," Severson added. "I didn't know what to think. I was in a big state of panic. I mean, nobody wants to go to prison."

Severson pleaded guilty to the charge. She was sentenced to around three months in jail and five years of probation. The judge also granted a request from Kawino's family; having Severson report to jail on Oct. 17 each year – the anniversary of the deadly crash.

"It's probably the worst day of the year for me," Severson said. "Everything just cycles back as if it happened yesterday. All of it. The crash, Anthony, his family. What would he be doing? Would he have a family of his own? Married? Kids?"

Lessons learned - Severson hopes sharing her story will encourage other drivers to put distractions away when they are behind the wheel. "Don't do it, because there are heavy consequences and it's more than prison, jail or probation. It's your whole life. It's the guilt, the pain," Severson said. "We have to realize it's not just us on the road. It takes just one wrong, slight move to end your life or another person's life – and it happens fast"

Across Minnesota, distracted driving was a factor in one in 11 crashes from 2019 to 2023. Distracted driving contributed to an average of 29 deaths and 146 life-changing injuries a year over that same time period. So far in 2024, distractions have been a factor in 27

(comes on Tuesday current as of 12/17) traffic deaths.

It's frustrating for Dixon knowing something preventable is causing deaths on Minnesota roads. "It seems like as the cars get better, safer and smarter that drivers get more relaxed and less attentive to what's going on out there," he said. "It's evident that the message is not getting across because people are still playing on their phones while driving all the time, as much as you try to explain that this is dangerous."

As Severson works to move on from that tragic crash five years ago, she says she is taking this second chance at life seriously – knowing Kawino wasn't as fortunate. "I'm not living for just myself. I'm living for two. The life that I took. It makes me want to push to be the best I can be.""

A time-honored tradition continues at Historic St. John's German Lutheran Church of Bradford.

A German tradition that has stood the test of time in Isanti County is the Epiphany, which is historically recognized twelve days after Christmas. Celebrating the Epiphany varies with different cultures and most commonly signifies not only the end of the Christmas season, but recognizes the amount of time it took after the birth of Jesus for the magi, or wise men, to travel to Bethlehem for the Epiphany. The service and tradition can be traced back thousands of years in countries worldwide.

At one of the last remaining original Isanti County country churches, the Epiphany celebration began during the early conception of the St. John's Church at Bradford shortly after its construction in 1882. This classic one-room country church held services until its closure in 1956. As the church sat vacant for many years, area residents began to recognize the historic significance the church had on the community, and in 1976, the church was brought back to life. Small improvements continued over the years until a substantial restoration occurred in 2007.

The collective efforts of several residents and organizations resulted in the church being placed on the prestigious National Register of Historic Places. The quaint country church is virtually unchanged from its 1882 configuration. In keeping with tradition, a cedar shake roof, clapboard siding, woodstove, rich maple pews, restored pump organ, and old kerosene lamps round out the historic look and feel. The

building however is not just for looks, as several times throughout the year it's open to the public for events.

Bridging the gap in generations, the Isanti County Historical Society and the Friends of Historic St. John's Church of Bradford will once again be hosting a historic Epiphany service. This year, we hope you will join us on Sunday, Jan. 5, 2025. There are two services held that day: German and English. Both services include carols, readings, a candlelighting ceremony, warm drinks, and a host of sweet treats. Everyone is welcome to attend, the German service (spoken in German) starts promptly at 2 p.m. The English service gets underway at 4 p.m.

The Sunday services offer a rare opportunity to not only step back in time to a traditional Epiphany celebration, but also experience the warmth, nostalgia, and sense of community a one-room country church can bring. St. John's German Lutheran Church of Bradford is located 3 miles west of Isanti at 900 County Road 5 NW. There is ample parking on the north side of 5; please use caution when crossing County Road 5.

Talking winter skin health with U of M

The winter months bring fun activities for those willing to brave the outdoors, but time outside in the dry and cold air can be harsh on our skin. Dr. David Pearson, an associate professor at the University of Minnesota Medical School and a dermatologist with M Health Fairview, talks about how to keep your skin healthy during the winter.

Q: What unique challenges does our skin face in the winter?

Dr. Pearson: Our skin is our interface with the environment. As temperatures and humidity levels drop, one of the first places we experience this is on our skin — particularly in places like Minnesota, where it gets very cold and dry. Unsurprisingly, a number of studies show that skin and fingernail moisture content is much lower during the winter months. When our skin dries out, its barrier function is compromised and we become more susceptible to external allergens, irritants and even infections. The effects of cold can range from being a nuisance to quite dangerous. Frostbite can occur when the skin temperature gets to 28 F — this only takes about 30 minutes when the thermometer reads 0 F. Our skin isn't physiologically equipped for unprotected, prolonged exposure to these temperatures, so be sure to wear warm coats, hats and gloves when you're going outside.

Q: What common skin issues do you see during the winter?

Dr. Pearson: We see lots of dry skin, even incidentally, in people who come in for other skin concerns. Winter is often a more difficult time for people with eczema — especially on their hands. Winter itch is a common rash resulting from excessive dryness that resembles a dried-up riverbed, with red, itchy, cracked skin. This is most common on the legs and usually spares body folds and the face, and we treat it with moisturizers and sometimes prescription topical anti-inflammatory medications. We also see many irritant reactions, such as frequent tissue use during respiratory virus season or rashes from licking your lips. I specialize in autoimmune connective tissue diseases and see a lot of Raynaud's and pernio (chilblains). Raynaud's is the rapid onset of white or blue discoloration of the fingers and/or toes from cold exposure due to constriction of blood vessels.

Pernio is the delayed onset of tender pink bumps on the fingers and toes one to two days after cold exposure.

Q: What are your go-to recommendations for those suffering from dry winter skin?


Dr. Pearson: Moisturize, moisturize, moisturize! It's pretty intuitive, but it bears repeating. The environment treats our skin differently in the winter and we may have to change our behaviors to acclimate. I recommend a thick moisturizing cream that you have to scoop out of a jar or squeeze out of a tube over those with a pump handle, which tend to be used for thinner products. I don't like a lot of additives, perfumes or scents — keep it simple. Ceramides are a good ingredient to look for and may help restore the skin barrier. I also recommend a gentle soap that doesn't have perfumes or scents, as these can irritate the skin. Some data suggests humidifiers can be helpful in certain circumstances, but probably less so than moisturizers.

Q: Should people still wear sunscreen/SPF in the winter?

Dr. Pearson: In short, yes. Getting into a routine with sunscreen improves the consistency of use, so I often recommend working in a combined moisturizer/SPF product every day. The long answer is a little more nuanced. In Minnesota, our UV index — how much ultraviolet light reaches us — is pretty low in the winter. People's skin is usually covered up in the winter, but there's actually a fair amount of reflection of UV light from the snow. Prolonged exposure through outdoor activities (or long drives) can add up. If you're lucky enough to travel south or upwards in elevation, I would definitely recommend applying sunscreen like you would during the summer months.

Q: What are you doing to advance research in the dermatology field?

Dr. Pearson: As the director of the Autoimmune Connective Tissue Diseases Specialty Clinic, my interests are focused on lupus, dermatomyositis, scleroderma, morphea and vasculitis, among others. Our group is involved in several industry-sponsored clinical trials aimed at developing new and better therapies for these diseases which currently have limited treatments and can be devastating to people who suffer from them. I'm particularly interested



in the environmental triggers of these skin diseases. I'm working with Drs. Michael McAlpine and Tianhong Cui, both in the U of M's mechanical engineering department, to develop novel, skin-interfaced sensors. Like many autoimmune diseases, the conditions I study are characterized by periods of both increased and decreased activity, and we still have a lot to learn about why and when flares will happen.

Dr. David Pearson is an associate

professor of dermatology at the University of Minnesota Medical School, a dermatologist with M Health Fairview and the director of the Autoimmune Connective Tissue Diseases Specialty Clinic. His research interests include environmental triggers of autoimmune connective tissue diseases, effects on quality of life and development of novel therapies for these conditions. Minnesota starwatch for January 2025

The new year comes bearing gifts of bright planets and the annual splendid display of winter stars.

The year opens with Venus blazing in the southwest for a couple of hours after sunset. In the first three days of January, a young crescent moon climbs out of the sunset and passes Venus. But while Venus gains altitude throughout the month, Saturn—which starts out to the upper left of Venus—plummets. The planets pass each other between the 15th and the 18th.

In the east, all the bright winter stars and constellations will be up by 8 p.m., and earlier every evening. Sirius, the brightest of stars, shines from Canis Major, the big dog. It is also the lowest bright star in the assembly. Try comparing it to Venus, the brightest planet, when the two objects are facing each other from opposite horizons.

Earth laps Mars in the orbital race the evening of the 15th. At that moment Mars will be gliding below Pollux, the brighter of the Gemini twins. To find the red planet that night, follow an imaginary line leading upward and leftward from Sirius. It will lead first to Procyon, the bright star in Canis Minor, the little dog, then to Mars, which will rival Sirius in brightness.

January's full moon arrives at 4:27 p.m. on the 13th. At approximately 8:08 p.m. that night, Mars disapCastor . GEMINI

pears behind the advancing moon—an event that may be lost in the moon's glare.

Also among the winter stars in the east, look for Orion, the hunter, with his hourglass shape and three closely spaced stars in his belt. At the top of the stellar assembly you'll find brilliant Capella, in Auriga, the charioteer. And even more brilliant Jupiter is near Aldebaran, the eye of Taurus, the bull. Next to the moon and Venus, Jupiter is the brightest object in the night sky.





County holds steady at minimal levy increase

Isanti County is going forward with a small, 1.99% levy increase for 2025, despite the last-minute efforts of Chair Alan Duff to have a flat levy for the second straight year.

The levy amount is the same amount as the Commissioners approved as the preliminary levy. To get down to that 1.99% mark, the county will be utilizing the remaining ARPA savings money, which had to be earmarked for a specific use by the end of 2024 anyway, plus drawing from the county's fund balance. The total of those two was approximately \$1.5 million.

Duff, however, proposed to use even more of the fund balance to reach a flat levy. He referenced the recent financial audit report that indicated the county's fund balance was larger than recommended. He was reminded, however, the audit was based on the county's financial situation at the end of 2023. During 2024, the county had already spent almost all of that money so the fund balance was only above the recommended amount by a small amount.

Additionally, Vice Chair Mike Warring reminded the council the county had previously maintained flat levies for several consecutive years only to wind up in a financial bind that took the county several years to recover from. Warring also mentioned Anoka County's current situation. It too had been stubbornly keeping a flat levy for several years and now, this year, they were forced to approve a 16.68% levy increase.

Based on that, Duff agreed to keep the levy increase at 1.99%, also noting that based on preliminary levies for 2025, Isanti County would have the second-smallest levy increase among all Minnesota counties.

The commissioners approved the final levy on a 4-1

vote, with Warring voting nay. He explained his no vote by saying he was uncomfortable with the county using any fund balance money to minimize the levy increase.

CANNABIS SALES PUBLIC HEARING

The county also scheduled a public hearing to be held at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 7 ahead of the commissioner's vote to create the county's ordinance regulating the sale of cannabis. The public hearing is a mandatory part of the ordinance process.

Zoning administrator Trina Bergloff informed the council what the Planning Commission's recommendations were for the ordinance for such things as which zoning districts a cannabis shop could be opened, plus minimum distances away from such things as schools or rehabilitation facilities. Several of the commissioners, especially Commissioner Kristi LaRowe said they wanted to go with the most restrictive regulations allowed by the state, including such things as 1,000 feet, plus a minimum hours of operation.

County Administrator Amanda Usher advised the council they could set those parameters, however the restrictions couldn't be so restrictive to prevent any shops from opening up. She also reminded the council that based on the county's population, the county would have to allow a minimum of four licensed shops within the county borders. It was also noted that the city of Braham had relinquished its jurisdiction to regulate cannabis sales to the county, along with every township. The cities of Cambridge and Isanti kept their jurisdictions, with Cambridge allowing a maximum of one shop to open within city limits and Isanti allowing an unlimited number.

The commissioners were also reminded that technically since the county's ordinance wouldn't be codified until after Jan. 1, if the state miraculously got its act together and started approving license applications, the county would be powerless to regulate those businesses. However, based on recent litigation, the likelihood of that happening was minimal. Despite that, County Attorney Jeff Edblad advised the board to expedite the passing of its ordinance.

People who experience chest pain, shortness of breath, or uncomfortable heart beats, typically receive a stress test, electrocardiogram, echocardiogram, or a Holter monitor as first steps in diagnosing a heart issue. However, to fully diagnose specific heart disease and formulate treatment plans, advanced cardiovascular imaging may be needed.

Cardiac MRI is one of the most comprehensive cardiovascular tests, as it evaluates the size, function, thickness and quality of the heart muscle, identifies valve conditions, measures the aorta size, and quantifies blood flow of the muscle during a stress test.

"The cardiac MRI results provide important diagnostic and prognostic information to the patients, and to providers by guiding the next steps in their care, whether that's a medical intervention, different medications, lifestyle changes or a combination of these," explained João Cavalcante, MD, head of cardiac imaging and senior cardiologist at AHMHI.





Enjoy the ice over the holidays, but check it often

With fresh snow in many parts of the state, anglers and others recreating on the ice must keep in mind that snow can hinder ice-making and cover up potentially dangerous areas, according to the Minnesota Department of Natural

In addition, it's vital people check the ice thickness frequently, and keep in mind the DNR's ice thickness recommendations, which apply to new, clear ice (double them for white or snow-covered

More than 4 inches for ice fishing or other activities on foot.

5-7 inches for a snowmobile or a small

7-8 inches for a side-by-side ATV.

9-12 inches for a car.

13-17 inches for a truck.

More than 20 inches for a large truck with a wheelhouse shelter.

When measuring the thickness of the ice, measure only the clear ice – not any slush or snow that's settled on top of it. It's important to keep in mind, too, that ice thickness and quality can vary even within a small area on the same body of water.

DNR conservation officers report lakes throughout the state are attracting increasing numbers of anglers, and they expect things will be even busier over the holidays. COs continue reminding

ice recreationalists of the importance of wearing safety gear such as ice picks and a life jacket or float coat, and to check the ice for themselves – not rely on someone else's tracks, footprints, or social media

"We understand and share in people's excitement for getting onto the ice and making the most of a short season,' said Col. Rodmen Smith, director of the DNR Enforcement Division. "But there's nothing good to be gained by pushing the envelope. There are plenty of good ice-fishing opportunities out there, but please check the ice yourself and take our thickness guidelines seriously.

Every year, unexpected falls through thin ice result in serious injury or death. Checking the ice thickness with a spud

bar, auger, or other device is the best way to prevent falling through. Wearing a life jacket or float coat is the best way to avert tragedy should someone fall through the ice, since the initial shock of falling into cold water can incapacitate even strong swimmers. A good set of ice picks will help the person get out, and a cell phone, whistle or other communications device makes it more likely they would be able to call for help. Make sure to let someone on shore know where you're going and when you plan to return.



DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS: Section 1 - Repeal. Repeal Ordinances 795 and 579, codified as Chapter 295 of the City Code.

Section 2 - Repeal and Replace. Repeal Ordinances 790 and 786 codified as Chapter 123 of the City Code, and replace as follows:

Chapter 123 CANNABIS, HEMP, TOBACCO AND OTHER DELIVERY **PRODUCTS ARTICLE I** CANNABIS AND HEMP § 123-1. Administration.

The purpose of this ordinance implement the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, chapter 342, which authorizes the City of Isanti to protect the public health, safety, welfare of Isanti residents by regulating cannabis businesses within the legal boundaries of the City of Isanti. The City finds and concludes that

the provisions herein are appropriate and lawful regulations that will promote the community's interest and are for the public good. 123-2. Authority

Jurisdiction.

The City of Isanti has the authority to adopt this ordinance pursuant to: A. Minn. Stat. 342.13(c) regarding the authority of a local unit of government to adopt reasonable restrictions of the time, place, and manner of the operation of a cannabis business provided that such restrictions do not prohibit the establishment or operation of cannabis businesses.

Minn. Stat. regarding the local registration and enforcement requirements of statelicensed cannabis retail businesses businesses.

C. Minn. Stat. 152.0263, Subd. 5, regarding the use of cannabis in public places

D. Minn. Stat. 462.357, regarding the authority of a local authority to adopt zoning ordinances.

§ 123-3. Definitions. Unless otherwise noted in

this section words and phrases contained in Minn. Stat. 342.01 and the rules promulgated pursuant to any of these acts, shall have the same meanings in this ordinance. For the purpose of this chapter, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning. The definitions in Minnesota Statute, as may be amended from time to time, are hereby incorporated and other terms as applicable are in addition

Cannabinoid Productproduct containing cannabinoids including an edible cannabinoid product, that is sold for human consumption whether chewed smoked, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, vaporized, or ingested by other means.

Cannabis Product - A product meaning any of the following cannabis concentrate: a product with cannabinoids including but not limited to tetrahvdrocannabinol. extracted or derived from cannabis plants or cannabis flower; or any other product that contains cannabis concentrate Cannabis product includes adult-use cannabis products, including but not limited to edible cannabis products and medical cannabinoid products. Cannabis product does not include cannabis flow-er, artificially derived cannabinoid, lower-potency hemp edibles, hemp-derived consumer prod-ucts, or hemp-derived topical

Cannabis Delivery Service - A business licensed to operate as a "cannabis delivery service" the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342.

Cannabis Cultivation: A cannabis business licensed to grow cannabis plants within the approved amount of space from seed or immature plant to mature plant, harvest cannabis flower from mature plant, package and label immature plants and seedlings and cannabis flower for sale to other cannabis businesses, transport cannabis flower to a cannabis manufacturer located on the same premises, and perform other actions approved by the office

Cannabis Event - A temporary organized by a licensed cannabis event organizer at which cannabis and/or lower-potency hemp edibles may be offered or sold.

Cannabis Event Organizer - A business licensed to operate as a "cannabis event organizer" the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342.

Cannabis Manufacturer - A business licensed to operate "cannabis manufacturer" by the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342.

Cannabis Mezzobusiness - A business licensed to operate as "a cannabis mezzobusiness" the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342.

Cannabis Microbusiness - A business licensed to operate as 'cannabis microbusiness" the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342.

Cannabis Retail Business A retail location and the retail location(s) of a mezzobusinesses with a retail operations endorsement, microbusinesses with a retai operations endorsement, medical combination businesses operating a retail location, (and/excluding) lowerpotency hemp edible retailers.

Cannabis Retailer - Any person, partnership, firm, corporation, or association, foreign or domestic, selling cannabis product to a consumer and not for the purpose of resale in any form. Cannabis Testing Facility

A business licensed to operate as a "cannabis testing facility" by the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342. Cannabis Transporter - Abusiness

licensed to operate as a "cannabis transporter" by the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, pursuant

Cannabis Wholesaler - A business licensed to operate as a "cannabis wholesaler" by the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342. Compliance Checks - The system

the City uses to investigate and ensure that those authorized to sell cannabis or licensed cannabinoid are following and complying with the requirements of this ordinance. Compliance checks involve the use of persons under 21 who purchase or attempt products. Compliance checks may also be conducted by the City or other units of government for educational, research, and training purposes, or for investigating or laws and regulations relating to cannabis, cannabinoid or licensed

Dispensary - A business licensed to operate as a "cannabis retailer" by the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342.

Lower-Potency Hemp Edible Manufacturer - A business licensed to operate as a "lower-potency edible manufacturer" by the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342.

Lower-Potency Hemp Edible Retailer - A business licensed to operate as a "lower-potency hemp edible retailer" by the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342. Medical Cannabis Combination

Business - A business licensed to operate as a "medical cannabis combination business" by the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342. Moveable Place of Business Any form of business operated out

of a kiosk, truck, van, automobile, or other type of vehicle or transportable shelter and not a fixed address storefront or other permanent type of structure authorized for sales transactions. Office of Cannabis Management

- Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, referred to as "OCM" in this ordinance.

Place of Public Accommodation A business, accommodation, refreshment. entertainment. recreation, or transportation facility of any kind, whether licensed or not, whose goods, services, facilities, privileges, advantages or accommodations are extended, ordered, sold, or otherwise made

Preliminary License Approval -OCM preapproval for a cannabis business license for applicants who

qualify under Minn. Stat. 342.17. Public Property - Real and personal property owned, managed or controlled by the City, including City buildings and surrounding land, parking lots, parks, trails and City rights-of-way consisting of both the traveled portion and the abutting boulevard, sidewalks and trails, and any City personal property, including motor vehicles and equipment.

Retail Registration - An approved registration issued by the City of Isanti to a state- licensed cannabis

School - A public or private facility that provides educational programs or more persons that are under the age of 21 in a classroom setting. The term includes, but is not limited to, any school operated by an independent school district, charter school operating under Minnesota Statutes, chapter 124E, and school operated by the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities system.

State License - An approved license issued by the State of Minnesota's Office of Cannabis Management to a cannabis retail

§ 123-4. Registration for Cannabis Businesses.

A. No individual or entity may operate a state-licensed cannabis retail business or other cannabis/ hemp business seeking retail endorsement within the City without first registering with the City of Isanti.

B. Prior to issuance of a cannabis retail business registration, the City shall conduct a preliminary compliance check to ensure compliance with local ordinances. Pursuant to Minn. Stat. 342, within

30 days of receiving a copy of a state license application from OCM, the City shall certify on a form provided by OCM whether a proposed cannabis retail business complies with local zoning ordinances and, if applicable, whether the proposed

business complies with the state fire code and building code.

C. A registration fee, as established in the City's fee schedule, Chapter 160, shall be charged to applicants applying for a retail cannabis registration as required by the City. An initial retail registration fee shall not exceed \$500 or half the amount of an initial state license fee under Minn. Stat. 342.11.

A medical combination business operating an adult-use retail location may only be charged a single registration fee, not to exceed the lesser of a single retail registration fee, defined under this section, of the adult-use retail business.

D. The City shall issue a retail registration to a state-licensed cannabis retail business that ad-heres to the requirements of Minn. Stat. 342.22.

- E. An applicant for a retail registration shall complete an application form, as provided by the City. The form shall include, but is not limited
- (1) Full name of the property owner and applicant;
- (2) Address, email address, and telephone number of the applicant; (3) The address and parcel ID for
- the property which the retail registration is sought: (4) Certification that the applicant complies with the requirements of
- local ordinances established pursuant to Minn. Stat. 342.13.
- F. The applicant shall include with the form:
- (1) The registration fee as quired by the City.
- (2) A copy of a valid state license or written notice of OCM license preapproval. G. Once an application is consid-
- ered complete, the City shall inform the applicant, process the application fees, and forward the application to the City Council for approval or H. A state-licensed cannabis retail
- business shall be required to submit a new application for registration under this section if it seeks to move to a new location still within the legal boundaries of the City of Isanti A state-licensed cannabis retail
- business shall apply to renew registration annually on a form established by the City at the same time OCM renews the cannabis retail business' license J. A renewal retail registration
- fee as established in the City's fee schedule, Chapter 160, shall be charged at the time of the second renewal and each subsequent renewal thereafter.
- K. A cannabis retail registration issued under this ordinance shall not be transferred.
- L. The application or renewal fee shall be non-refundable once processed. Fees are not prorata.

§ 123-5. Basis for Denial.

The City may refuse the registration and/or license renewal registration if the license is associated with an individual or business who no longer holds a valid license, has failed to pay the registration or renewal fee, or has been found in noncompliance in connection with a preliminary or renewal compliance check.

Suspension 123-6. Registration.

The City may suspend a cannabis retail business's registration if it violates the ordinance of the City or poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the public. The City shall immediately notify the cannabis retail business in writing the grounds for the suspension.

The City shall immediately notify the OCM in writing the grounds for the suspension. OCM will provide the City and cannabis business retailer a response to the complaint within seven calendar days and within 30 calendar days.

The suspension of a cannabis retail business registration may be for up to 30 calendar days ur OCM suspends the license for a longer period. The business may not make sales to customers if their registration is suspended. The City shall reinstate a registration if OCM determines that the violation(s) have been resolved.

§ 123-7. Limiting Registrations. The City does not limit the number of retail business registrations.

§ 123-8. Hours of Operation. Cannabis businesses are limited

to retail sale of cannabis, cannabis flower, cannabis products, lower potency hemp edibles, or hemp-derived consumer products as defined in Minn. Stat.

§ 123-9. Advertising. Cannabis businesses are permit-

ted to place signage if approved in accordance with the permit procedures listed within the Zoning Ordinance

§ 123-10. Permitted Locations. A. Location Regulations.

(1) Cannabis and hemp-related businesses are allowed as expressly applicable provisions of Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342, any rules

- promulgated the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, and all applicable regulations established in this section and the City's Zoning Ordinance.
- (2) Cannabis and hemp-related licensed businesses are not permitted to be located within 300' feet of a school. For purposes of this provision, distances shall be measured from the primary entrance of the business, and the primary entrance of the school. For purposes of this provision, distances of a business within a multi -tenant facility or strip mall will be measured from the primary entrance of the business.
- (3) No registration shall be issued to a moveable place of business Only fixed location businesses shall be eligible to be registered under this ordinance unless explicitly permitted by Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342
- B. Cannabis Cultivator. Cannabis cultivators may be allowed in I-1 Industrial Park (indoor only) and R-1A Rural Residential (indoor only) zoning districts if approved in accor dance with the permit procedures and regulations listed within the Zoning Ordinance.
- Cannabis Delivery Service Cannabis delivery services may be allowed in I-1 Industrial and BIT Business/ Industrial Transitional zoning districts if approved in accordance with the permit procedures and regulations listed within the Zoning Ordinance
- D. Cannabis Event. Cannabis events may be allowed in the B-1 Central Business, B-2 General Business and BIT - Business/ Industrial Transitional zoning districts if approved in accordance with the permit process listed below. The following supplemental regulations apply to cannabis events:
- (1) A permit is required to be issued and approved by the City Council prior to holding a Temporary Cannabis Event. Details for the event must be included in the permit application. There is no fee for this
- (2) A copy of the OCM cannabis event license application must be included with the City permit appli-
- (3) Cannabis events may not occur within 300 feet of a school.
- (4) Cannabis events may occur for no more than 4 consecutive days, there must be at least 30 days between events and no single site may host more than 2 events per
- (5) Cannabis events are prohibited on any city-owned property.
- (6) Cannabis events may not take place outdoors and must be held in a completely en-closed building.
- (7) The on-site consumption of cannabis or hemp products during any cannabis event are allowed.
- (8) Retail sales are permitted so long as compliance with all applicable provisions of Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342, and any rules promulgated by the Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management are followed.
- E. Cannabis Event Organizer Cannabis event organizers may be allowed B-1 Central Business, B-2 General Business, B-3 Neighborhood Business, BIT Business/ Industrial Transitional, and I-1 Industrial Park zoning districts if approved in accordance with the permit procedures and regulations listed within the Zoning Ordinance. The following supplemental regulations apply to cannabis event organizers:
- (1) The cannabis event organizer must complete a Special Event Permit Application to the City Council for approval. The permit application must include:
- (a) Security plan consistent with all requirements of the State Office of Cannabis Management: (b) Waste management plan
- consistent with all requirements of the State Office of Cannabis Management
- Cannabis Manufacturer. is manufacturer allowed in I-1 Industrial zoning districts if approved in accordance with the permit procedures listed with the Zoning Ordinance. Cannabis Mezzobusiness.
- Cannabis mezzobusinesses may be allowed in the applicable zone for the cultivation, manufacturing and/ or dispensary use if approved in accordance with the permit procedures and regulations listed within the Zoning Ordinance. The following sup-plemental regulations apply to cannabis mezzobusinesses:
- (1) Cannabis mezzobusinesses may not take place outdoors and must occur in a completely enclosed building. (2) All cultivation activities
- conducted as part of a cannabis mezzobusiness are subject to all regulations that apply to cannabis (3) All manufacturing activities
- conducted as part of a cannabis mezzobusiness are subject to all regulations that apply to cannabis manufacturers. (4) All cannabis retail sales activi-
- ties conducted as part of a cannabis mezzobusiness are subject to all

- regulations that apply to cannabis retailers provided, however, that such activities may be conducted in the I-1 or BIT zoning districts only if done in conjunc-tion with cultivation or manufacturing activities.
- H. Cannabis Microbusiness. Cannabis microbusinesses may be allowed in the applicable zone for the cultivation, manufacturing and/ or dispensary use as detailed below if approved in accordance with the permit procedures listed with the Zoning Ordinance. The following supplemental regulations apply to cannabis microbusinesses:
- (1) Cannabis microbusinesses may not take place outdoors and must occur in a completely enclosed building.
 (2) All cultivation activities con-
- ducted as part of a cannabis microbusiness are subject to all regulations that apply to cannabis culti-
- (3) All manufacturing activities conducted as part of a cannabis microbusiness are subject to all regulations that apply to cannabis man-
- (4) All cannabis retail sales activities conducted as part of a cannabis microbusiness are subject to all regulations that apply to cannabis retailers of this section, provided. however, that such activities may be conducted in the I-1 or BIT zoning districts only if done in conjunction with cultivation or manufacturing
- I. Cannabis Retailer, Dispensaries may be allowed in the B-1 Central Business, B-2 General Business, B-3 Neighborhood Business, BIT Business/ Industrial Transitional, and I-1 Industrial Park zoning district if approved in accordance with the permit procedures and regulations listed within the Zoning Ordinance.
- J. Cannabis Testing Facility Cannabis testing facilities may be allowed in I-1 Industrial Park and BIT Business/ Industrial Transitional zoning districts if approved in accordance with the permit procedures and regulations listed within the Zoning Ordinance.
- Transporter. Cannabis Cannabis transporters may be allowed in I-1 Industrial and BIT Business/ Industrial Transitional zoning districts if approved in accordance with the permit procedures and regulations listed within the Zoning Ordinance.
- Wholesaler. Cannabis Cannabis wholesalers may allowed in I-1 Industrial and BIT Business/ Industrial Transitional zoning districts if approved in accordance with the permit procedures and regulations listed within the Zoning Ordinance.
- M. Lower-Potency Hemp Edible Manufacturer. Lower-potency hemp edible manufacturers may be allowed in I-1 Industrial zoning districts if approved in accordance with the permit procedures and regulations listed within the Zoning Ordinance.
- N. Lower-Potency Hemp Edible Retailer. Lower-potency hemp edible retailers are only permit-ted in B-1 Central Business, B-2 General Business, B-3 Neighborhood Business, BIT Business/ Industrial Transitional, and I-1 Industrial Park zoning districts. The following supple-mental regulations apply to lower-potency hemp edible retailers:
- (1) The sale of Low-Potency Edibles is permitted in a Municipal Liquor Store.
- (2) Low-Potency Edibles shall be sold behind a counter, and stored in
- (3) A cannabinoid registration fee, as established in the City's fee schedule, Chapter 160, shall be charged to applicants applying for a lower- potency hemp edible retail registration as required by the City.
- O. Medical Cannabis Combination Business. Medical cannabis combination businesses may be allowed applicable zone for the cultivation, manufacturing and/or retail use as detailed below if approved in accordance with the permit procedures and regulations listed within the Zoning Ordinance. The following supplemental regulations apply to medical cannabis combination busi-
- (1) Medical cannabis combination businesses may not take place outdoors and must be held in a completely enclosed building.
 (2) All cultivation activities con-
- ducted as part of a medical cannabis combination businesses are subject to all regulations that apply to cannabis cultivators. (3) All manufacturing activities
- conducted as part of a medical cannabis combination businesses are subject to all regulations that apply to cannabis manufacturers. (4) All cannabis retail sales activities conducted as part of a medical
- cannabis combination businesses are subject to all regulations that apply to cannabis retailers, provided, however, that such activities may be conducted in the I-1 or BIT zoning districts only if done in conjunction with cultivation or manufacturing

activities

§ 123-11. Other Cannabinoid Products; Exclusion.

- Cannabinoid retail sales licensed through the State and outlined per Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 151.72, are required to obtain registration through the City as outlined in § 123-4 and pay the applicable cannabinoid registration fee outlined in the City's fee sched-
- B. Business retailers selling non-intoxicating cannabinoids such as CBD, CBG, and CBN, each serving may not exceed 25 mg CBD and 25 mg CBG, are not required to obtain a City registration.

§ 123-12. Compliance Checks.

The City shall conduct, at minimum, one unannounced age verification compliance check per calendar year of every cannabis business to assess if the business meets age verification requirements, as required under Minn. Stat. 342 and this chapter.

verification compliance checks shall involve persons at least 17 years of age but under the age of 21 who, with the prior written consent of a parent or guardian if the person is under the age of 18, attempt to purchase adult-use cannabis flower, adult-use cannabis products, lower-potency hemp edibles, or hemp-derived consumer products under the direct supervision of a law enforcement officer or an employee of the local unit of government.

Any failures under this section must be reported to the Office of Cannabis Management.

§ 123-13. Responsibility.

All registered businesses are responsible for the actions of their employees regarding the sale, offer to sell, and furnishing of products on the business' premise. The sale offer to sell, or furnishing of any licensed product by an employee shall be considered an act of the registered business. Nothing in this section shall be construed as pro hibiting the City from also subjecting the employee to any civil penalties that the City deems to be appropriate under this ordinance, state or federal law, or other applicable law or regulation. §123-14. Use on municipal

property prohibited.

No person shall vaporize or smoke cannabis flower, cannabis products, artificially derived cannabinoids, or lower-potency hemp consumer products in a public facility or on public property.

Violations and 123-15. Penalties.

Violation of any section of this chapter is punishable as a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished as provided by Chapter 1, Article I, of this Code of the City of Isanti.

§ 123-16. Severability.

If any section or provision of this ordinance is held invalid, such invalidity will not affect other section or provisions that can be given force and effect without the invalidated section or provision.

ARTICLE II TOBACCO AND OTHER **DELIVERY PRODUCTS** §123-18. Definitions.

As used in this article, the following terms shall have the meanings

Electronic Delivery Device - Any product containing or delivering nicotine, lobelia, or any other substance, whether natural or synthetic, intended for human consumption through the inhalation of aerosol or vapor from the product. Electronic delivery devices include, but is not limited to, devices manufactured, marketed, or sold as e-cigarettes, e-cigars e-pipes, vape pens, mods, tank systems, or under any other product name or descriptor. Flectronic delivery device includes any component part of a product, whether marketed parately Electronic deliv ery device does not include any nicotine cessation product that has been authorized by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to be marketed and for sale as "drugs," "devices," or "combination products," as defined in the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act.

Indoor Area - All space between a floor and a ceiling that is bounded by walls, doorways, or windows, whether open or closed, covering more than 50 percent of the combined surface area of the vertical planes constituting the perimeter of the area. A wall includes any retractable divider, garage door, or other physical barrier, whether temporary or permanent.

Licensed Products - The term that collectively refers to any tobacco, tobacco-related device, elec-tronic delivery device, or nicotine or lobelia delivery product.

Nicotine or Lobelia Delivery Product - Any product containing or delivering nicotine or other substance intended for human consumption, or any part of such a prod-

uct, that is not tobacco as defined

in this section, not including any

product that has been approved or otherwise certified for legal sale by the United States Food and Drug Administration for tobacco cessation harm reduction, or for other medical purposes, and it being marketed and sold solely for that approved use.

Public Place - Property that is generally open to or accessible by the public, except on those premises licensed by the State to permit on-site consumption. Public Property - Real and per-

sonal property owned, managed, or controlled by the City, including City buildings and surrounding land parking lots, parks, trails, and City rights-of-way consisting of both the traveled portion and the abutting boulevard, sidewalks and trails, and any City personal property, including motor vehicles and equipment. Smoking - Inhaling or exhaling

smoke from any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, or any other lighted or heated tobacco or plant product, or inhaling or exhaling vapor from any nicotine or other electronic delivery device. Smoking shall include carrying a lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, or any other lighted or heated tobacco or plant product intended for inhalation. Tobacco or Tobacco Related

Products - Includes cigarettes and any product containing, made, or derived from tobacco that is intended for human consumption, whether chewed, smoked, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by any other means, or any component, part, or accessory of a tobacco product: cigars; che roots; stogies; perique; granulated, plug cut, crimp cut, ready rubbed and other smoking tobacco; snuff snuff flour, cavendish; plug and twist tobacco: fine-cut and other chewing tobaccos; shorts; refuse scraps; clippings, cuttings and sweepings of tobacco; and other kinds and forms

Tobacco Products Shop - Any licensed retail establishment that derives at least 90% of its revenue from tobacco or tobacco products and where no person under the age of 21 is present, or permitted to enter, at any time.

Tobacco Related Devices Include any tobacco product as well as a pipe, rolling papers, ashtray, or other device intentionally designed or intended to be used in a manner which enables the chewing, sniffing or smoking of tobacco or tobacco products or the inhalation of vapor from an electronic device. Tobaccorelated devices shall include accessories of components of tobacco-related devices which may be marketed or sold separately.

§123-19. License Required. No person shall sell or offer to

sell any tobacco, tobacco products tobacco related devices, electronic cigarettes, electronic delivery devices, or nicotine or lobelia delivery devices without first having obtained a license to do. Per Minnesota Statutes, the tobacco retail licensing authority is Isanti County.

§123-20. Compliance Checks.

All licensed premises must be open to inspection by law enforcement or other authorized officials during regular business hours. Compliance checks will be performed in accordance with state law.

§123-21. Use in public places prohibited; exceptions.

No person shall smoke a cigarette, cigar, pipe, or other lighted tobacco-related device, or use nicotine or lobelia delivery devices or any other electronic delivery device, in any public place, places of employment, public buildings, or other public areas, as defined under the provisions of the Minnesota Clean Indoor Air Act, or in any other place where smoking is restricted by City resolution or by any other applicable laws except in a tobacco products short by a customer or potential customer for the purpose of sampling such products legally offe sale by such establishment.

§123-22. Use on municipal property prohibited.

No person shall use a tobacco electronic delivery device or smoke a cigarette, cigar, pipe or other light-ed tobacco-related device or use a nicotine delivery device, or chew or otherwise use tobacco, within any municipal owned public place. 123 -23. Violations and

Penalties. Violation of any section of this

chapter is punishable as a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished as provided by Chapter 1, Article I, of this Code of the City of Isanti. Section 3 - Effective Date.

(2) Lower-potency hemp edible manufacturers may not take place outdoors and must occur in a completely enclosed building:

(3) The registration of a Lowerpotency hemp edible manufacturer must include the following: (a) Security plan consistent with

all requirements of the State Office of Cannabis Management; (b) Waste management plan consistent with all requirements of the State Office of Cannabis

Management; and (c) Measures for ensuring that all state and local standards related to odors are satisfied, including, without limitation, standards adopted

by the Minnesota Pollution Control Subdivision 12: Lower-Potency Hemp Edible Retailer.

Lower-potency hemp edible retailers are only permitted in B-1 Central Business, B-2 General

Business, B-3 Neighborhood Business, BIT Business/ Industrial Transitional, and I-1 Industria Park zoning districts. The following supplemental regulations apply to lower-potency hemp edible retailers:

(1) On-site consumption of lowerpotency hemp edibles is prohibited unless the business holds a valid on-sale liquor license.

(2) All locations shall have an

approved security plan consistent with all requirements of the State Office of Cannabis Management.

(3) All locations shall have an approved waste management plan consistent with all requirements of the State Office of Cannabis Management.
Subdivision 12:

Medical Cannabis Combination Business.

Medical cannabis combination businesses may be allowed in the applicable zone for the cultivation, manufacturing and/or dispensary use as detailed below if approved in accordance with the permit procedures listed with the Zoning Ordinance. The following supplemental regulations apply to medical cannabis combination businesses:

(1) Medical cannabis combination businesses may not be located within 300 feet of a school.

(2) Medical cannabis combination businesses may not take place outdoors and must be held in a completely enclosed building.

(3) All cultivation activities conducted as part of a medical cannabis combination businesses are subject to all regulations that apply to cannabis cultivators (see Subdivision 1 of this Section).

(4) All manufacturing activities conducted as part of a medical cannabis combination businesses are subject to all regulations that apply to cannabis manufacturers (see Subdivision 5 of this Section).

(5) All cannabis retail sales activities conducted as part of a medical cannabis combination businesses are subject to all regulations that apply to cannabis retailers (See Subdivision 11 of this section), however, that such activities may be conducted in the I-1 or BIT zoning districts only if done as an accessory to cultivation or manufacturing activities as detailed in Sections 8 and 10 of this Zoning Ordinance.
